Kuranda 'Bike Friendly' for Saturday 2nd October

The Tablelands Regional Council (TRC), in an unprecedented move, has declared the Village of Kuranda Bike Friendly for Saturday 2nd October. The initiative has been approved by the TRC in support of the Kuranda Motorcycle Expo to be held on the same day. The bike expo is to be held at the Kuranda Amphitheatre and will be officially opened by Federal member for Leichhardt Mr Warren Entsch in one of his first public outings since being reelected as the local member. Mr Entsch is known to be a motorcycle enthusiast and is said to be delighted at the opportunity to open the show.

Motorcycling visitors to the village will enjoy special treatment when they arrive, with a section of the main street (Coondoo Street) to be cordoned off from 8.00am to 1.00pm between Thongon and Therwine Streets, for the exclusive parking of motorcycles. This promises to be a spectacle in itself and may also inject much needed funds into the flagging tourist economy of Kuranda. October is traditionally the beginning of the decline in tourist numbers in the village and organisers of the Motorcycle Expo hope this initiative will help already suffering small business owners, who have also sponsored the event. He knew our surname and initials, as well as that we live in Kuranda. He asked me if I use Windows Operating System and informed that my computer has been infected by Frozen Virus. He refused to give me his contact phone number or his company's website and when I asked for his contact details, he put me through to his 'supervisor' who told me that their phone number should have appeared on my display phone and that he is calling from Sydney. When I said I am going to forward this information to Police, he hung up.

My neighbour received a similar phone call few weeks before me.

Do not give your personal information or any computer information to people claiming to be working for Windows. Request their contact details and say that you will be checking them out with Police. Be Vigilant For Vandals These School Holidays

MEMBER FOR BARRON RIVER STEVE WETTENHALL has urged neighbours around schools to be on the look-out for vandals during the term three holidays. Mr Wettenhall said the eyes and ears of the community offer the best chance of stopping vandalism during school breaks (Sept 17 to October 4).

"Schools are always hardest hit by firebugs and vandals during holiday-time but the rate of attacks can be reduced if the community works together," he said. "If you live next to or near a school, or if you are travelling past a school during the holidays please watch for any suspicious behaviour. You can report suspicious activity 24 hours a day to the School Watch hotline on 131788. School staff and students remain thankful to those who have helped in the past."

The cost of vandalism to state schools in 2009 increased to \$12.7 million, split almost evenly between primary and high schools.

Mr Wettenhall said last year's figure was up from \$4.5 million in 2008 and in 2007 the total for primary and high school damage was almost \$7.3 million.

"This is a completely unacceptable attack on our schools and it is up to all of us to do our bit and protect them," he said. "Good old-fashioned 'neighbourhood watch' and using the hotline is the best defence. A number of 'at risk' schools use security patrols and many have electronic security alarms or CCTV camera systems. Schools also employ School Security Advisors and enter into crime prevention partnerships with police and other authorities."

The majority of schools damaged from July 26, 2008 to July 26, 2010 were subject to fire damage, most of which was arson.

Kuranda Interagency Network: The Kuranda Interagency Network has historically been hosted by KNC with meeting venue, minutes, reminders and a general email out of information and resources. The last meeting held on Wed 8th September was at Ngoonbi Co-operative Community Support Service office with Thea Buthman and Rosaria (Rosa) Quartermaine hosting. Rosa chaired the meeting with Jacky Conroy (our standing minute taker) recording minutes. These meetings will rotate across services/agencies/organizations in Kuranda into the future with the next meeting scheduled at Kuranda Justice Group venue (Ngoonbi Farm) on Wed October 13th at 2pm. KNC will continue to assist with review of minutes, email out reminders and general info, however, the host of each meeting will also check minutes before they are sent out. If you wish to be added to the email grouping please contact me at knc@qld.chariot.net.au.

Strong and Proud Young Men's Program: KNC has received a grant through PCYC Back on Track funding to deliver a program for young men (age 15-19) over 8 weeks in October/November 2010. The program is based on the material from the Standing In Your Truth program written by Jacqueline Conroy and Patricia Crouch, as was the Safe Freedom program for young women delivered in March/April 2010. It has been tailored specifically for young men and will be facilitated by Jacqueline and a male co-facilitator (still firming up this arrangement). Referrals can be made directly to KNC by contacting me or Ceri or emailing: knc@qld.chariot.net.au.

Young Women's Group: A pilot young women's group (age 15-24 – with some flexibility) will be starting on Tuesday afternoons from 3.30pm on the 5th October 2010. This has been at the direct request of young women who participated in the Safe Freedom group earlier in the year. Attendance is open, however we will follow firm group rules around confidentiality, respect and collaboration. If you want to be involved in the group please come along, or for more information contact me at the Centre. The goal is for the group to be run by young women for young women with a view to sustainability, positive social opportunities and support (as requested by the group) from KNC.

Step Forward Program: is being facilitated by Ceri Hughes and myself with face to face counselling available through an ATODS counsellor upon referral. Step Forward is an ongoing program that commences in the 1st Wednesday of October (6/10/2010) for two hours. It is a free relapse prevention group that includes harm reduction skills, understanding and planning for your triggers and cues, prevention management, goal setting, relaxation skills, motivation to change and alternative activities. Contact Marg or Ceri for a confidential referral.

Youth Substance Misuse Service (YSMS): A drug and alcohol program for young people aged 10-17 is providing an outreach service one day per week (Wednesdays) based at KNC. This service, auspiced by Anglicare North Queensland Limited, will provide one on one support for young people, attend the school if needed, and also support families and/or any collegiate support or community development that needs support or collaboration. Referrals are through KNC or you can contact the service directly on 40541943. All services provided are free of charge and strictly confidential.

Family Support Items Needed: Thank you to those who have generously donated items recently. We have an informal way of linking up families and individuals with different items of furniture and household goods etc that they need. Right now we know families who need: all sizes of beds/mattresses, bed bases/frames, warm blankets/bedding, a washing machine, a fridge, a dining table, chairs and baby items (eg cots, prams, highchairs etc). If you have any of those items that you no longer need, please give us a call.

OUTCOMES Adult Numeracy and Literacy: OUTCOMES from Atherton are delivering courses to improve numeracy and literacy for adults – this is helping with learning to read, write and manage numbers. Please contact KNC or OUTCOMES directly on 40914277.

Lifeline Financial Counselling: Lifeline financial counselling sessions can be arranged at KNC on Monday mornings. The counsellors are experienced workers who can help you sort out how to manage financial problems, debts and budgets. So if you find yourself in a pickle with money troubles, someone is there to help work out the best way forward. Appointments are necessary, so please call or come in to make a time.

Coffee and Fear

I breathe in deeply, and smell coffee. I also sense fear. In between sips of coffee, the surgeon yawns. He has been busy this morning. I love the smell of coffee. I can't drink it, but I have always enjoyed the early morning aroma that comes from the coffee shop around the corner from my place. These days, there are so many coffee shops down my street, but most of them don't open until late. They exist for the tourists. The tourists were once a colourful and jovial spectacle, but now they remind me of ants. Day in, day out, they follow each other up and down the trail, high above the forest canopy. It is true that the tourists play an integral part of the Kuranda's eco\$ystem (economy over ecology), but some days I just get sick of them throwing cigarette butts and lolly papers in my garden.

The fear comes from the other patients nearby, and also from my children. My children are so very worried. Of course they are not my children in the literal sense, but our connection between runs deep. They came to Kuranda when they were so young and full of zest. They loved me from the first moment they saw me, and I loved them back. Many of them have children of their own now, and I consider all of them part of my family. The quintessence of the rainforest runs through all of our veins.

It is almost time for my operation. They have painted the parts of me to be removed yellow. My lower limbs are safe from the knife today. They are buried deep in the bed. I have not been able to feel much down there for a long while, not since I was crushed. My children still believe that there must have been foul play, but surely no-one would be so cruel as to deliberately main an old dame like me. It has been many years since the concrete and bricks fell from the nearby development into my garden and crushed me. I no longer feel sorry for myself, or seek to blame anyone. I am still alive. If I could, I would reach up and branch out, but I am too weak.

Despite their furrowed brows and sad eyes, the faces of my children are so beautiful. I have sheltered and loved them for so long. They have provided me with so much joy. There is no greater pleasure than watching your children grow. One of my children is missing. She used to live next door to me, but moved away some time ago. If I die, I think she will miss me the most. She stayed near to me and cared for me long after the others had left. The sicker I got, the harder it was for her. When the government finally insisted on taking over my care, she left. I desperately miss her company and sweet singing.

Whatever happens, I have my affairs sorted. My birds have found new homes with some old friends. The many specialists who have visited me at home to poke and prod, have scared away my wild animal companions. I have already given my children everything that I have to give. I feel at peace, knowing I have loved, inspired and protected them well.

The surgeon scrunches his paper coffee cup and puts it in the bin. It is time! My children are asked to leave my side. I bid them farewell. The time for sentiment is over. Just as the surgeon picks up his tools, I hear someone singing. My daughter, is that you? I strain to hear. It is her! For a moment, I am soothed by her beautiful voice, but she is soon drowned out by the chainsaw. In a flash one branch is cut and then another. They fall onto the street with a crash. My children weep, as I silently scream. I am soon reduced to little more than a stump.

It is raining, as it so often does in Kuranda, but today the raindrops seem to mock me. Moisture has not been able to reach my roots for many years, but at least I have absorbed a little of the sweet rain through my leaves. Attempts to reduce me into an exhibit have finally been successful. The concrete and brick brigade are the victors. I am no longer a magnificent tree. I am now an ugly carbuncle in a concrete box. As the rain begins to clear, the tourists start to arrive. I hope it stays cloudy for them, as neither I nor my Coondoo Street comrades will be providing any shade today.

Various Far Northern artists are lending their skills to a series of workshops for the Go Troppo Arts Festival in Port Douglas from October 22-31. The festival is designed for people of any ability, and even absolute beginners, to get some tips from the experts and explore their creativity in a fun atmosphere.

At an introductory event last month I surprised myself at how easily I could weave a coconut frond basket with workshop presenter Richard Mustchin and learnt how to protect my vocal chords with Vocal Boot Camp presenter Gail Rogers. I had an attempt at collage with the Mowbray Gallery founder and artist Jill Booth and was introduced to various creative fibre weaving techniques by former art teacher Joy Shand Culley.

Richard Mustchin, from Palmweavers Artworks, even sources his lawyer cane for weaving from Kuranda landowners wanting to clear sections of the rampant wait-a-while vine. He says even honeysuckle vines can be used for weaving.

Joy Shand Culley uses Alexandra palm flowers and lomandra grasses among other materials for her works, which are incredibly individual pieces from baskets to natural sculptures.










Spring has sprung – let's celebrate

PAN SCHNAPPER AU CHAMPAGNE (Aussie sparkling wine)

Designed for the glamour of a special occasion when the best of French Champagne or Australian Sparkling wine flows. Add to the lavishness by creating a sauce for the schnapper steaks with the very same champagne or sparkling wine. It's great fun to work with since it bubbles very brightly in the pan and as the alcohol evaporates, the chef can inhale deeply. It might improve the look of

some of the guests too.

STEP 1. Gently poach the schnapper steaks in enough bubbly to cover until cooked.

STEP 2. In a second pan melt some butter and sauté some finely chopped mushrooms with the white butts of a few spring onions; drain a can of Artichoke hearts and add to the combination, flavoured with salt and pepper.

STEP 3. Remove fish fillets and arrange on a serving platter.

STEP 4. Reduce champagne or bubbly; add mushrooms, spring onions and artichoke hearts. Add ½ cup of cream. Stir well and pour over fillets. Serve with pre-cooked Mahatma long grain rice.

P.S. Dill is especially easy to grow and will in a short time achieve noxious weed proportions. Use it generously in white sauce, over steamed fish, to liberate potato salads, to add a fine tang to sliced cucumber. Chop it very fine with parsley, mint and lemon as a dressing for rice or lima beans.


Permaculture Convergence


The Bathtub Test





Inside My Studio



Interview by Toni Rogers

I thought it was real. Buck Richardson had just left the veranda table, where we were doing the interview, and in his absence I spotted a large multicoloured moth on the branch of a tree in his garden. I immediately imagined that 'like attracts like' and that this visiting moth was attracted to the artistically man-made moths in a collection on the veranda decking. On his return with the mugs of welcoming steaming coffee Buck showed me how he had attached his artwork to the tree. On further investigation there were other colourful moths amongst the branches.

Buck's digital artwork is based on his original photographs of moths found in the World Heritage listed Wet Tropics of Far North Queensland.

Where is your current studio?

As my artwork is based on original photographs, my studio can be anywhere in Far North Queensland. However, the final results from the images are undertaken in my home/studio amidst the rainforest in Kuranda.

Do you work alone or with others?

Mostly alone, but I do night field trips to photograph moths in the bush with Dave Rentz, a local entomologist. As my final product is based on digital art, I need to work with printers in a variety of media.

And sometimes I make special requests to fabricators either for the substrate or if I'm working with threedimensional ideas. I share my life and my work with Eve Stafford - my wife, my muse and my greatest critic. We established Kuranda Kreations together.

How long have you been working in your current studio?

Eve and I built this home 30 years ago. We have both lived and worked here ever since.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

It is essential that I have a connection with the environment. I need space, in particular, flat work surfaces. Uninterrupted power is important for the computer and printer. Wall space is also essential and at the moment this space is fairly thin on the ground, or wall I guess.

Describe your work pattern – hours/days/weeks.

When the need is there I am very focussed. I spend the first hour of every day in the Kuranda village centre photographing the moths and insects on and around the path lights, in the telephone box and around the fluoro lights at the Post Office. Application of the results and the identification of the images follow during the day. My pattern is mostly seven days a week and/or as need demands.

Describe the work you do in your studio.

I work primarily with the Photoshop program on my computer. I play with macro images – colours, shapes, sizes and compositions. I have also built up a 'subscriber list' and share daily 'Tropical Tonics'; images of the mostly under-appreciated beauty surrounding us. This started as a 'personal gift' to Eve, rather like giving her a flower each day, however, the recipient list has since expanded and these Tonics go out to those 'who don't have time to see'.

Why is photography and digital art your chosen medium?

It gives me the opportunity to be prolific, both in scope and output. Current standards of digital printing are supreme even for finished artwork. M C Escher, my greatest influence, would really appreciate and value today's technology for his famous graphic art.

List three things you listen to while working.

I listen to the many birds in the garden, the rustle of leaves, and the lizards in the roof.

I don't have the radio or CDs playing while I am working. They are not necessary for my inspiration. In the car is fine, but not while I am working.

Your favourite tool?

Photoshop. It really is. My work starts with my camera, then my computer and Photoshop. Digital technology is wonderful stuff. (While much of Buck's time is spent on the computer, there is no way he comes into the 'nerd' category. There is no sign of a three buttoned grey cardigan and lunch case to be seen. He is surrounded by laughter, colour, fresh air and, or course, moths.)

How do you identify your work? (signature/stamp/chop)

Identification is by my digital signature and the date. I also work under the banner of LeapFrogOz.

How do you sell your work?

Through exhibitions, from galleries, with my book 'Mothology - Discover the Magic', my website (www.leapfrogoz.com.au) and my annual pictorial calendar.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

I don't teach, but on occasions I am able to assist other artists with technical support.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?



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Unpaid - is there any other? I have undertaken some public speaking opportunities with the Botanic Gardens in Cairns, Cairns Seniors and Toastmasters. I have enjoyed this. I also indulge in performance and have had a couple of one hour shows - a one man repertoire.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I dream about a bigger and more powerful computer with new software programs. I really look forward to the benefits of the much talked about National Broadband Network. It cannot come soon enough for me.

If you were not working with art what would you be doing?

I would literally be pushing up daisies or burning in Hell. Or, I would spend more time writing and reflecting on life, pondering on some of the 'big' questions.

Buck Richardson's work can be found in the Kuranda Arts Co-op gallery in Coondoo Street. He has won several digital art awards this year - at Cardwell, Mareeba and the Cairns Show and he was one of ten artists commissioned to provide installations for the Cairns Festival Esplanart 2010 exhibition.

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
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Book Review

"52 Secrets of Psychology" by Dr Chris Day (Enlightened Publications, 2009)

(Enlightened Publications, 2009) ISBN 9780 64651 0088 RRP \$25.00

Dr Day is an award winning clinical psychologist from Brisbane. This book draws upon her years of clinical practice and provides readings for each week of the year that seek to improve the reader's life in a positive, psychologically sound way. It is intended for the ordinary lay reader who wants constructive help on an ongoing basis to manage the stresses and strains of normal contemporary life. It is value or principled based, as well as being socially oriented.

It contains concepts for life that Dr Day says she has consistently found give her clients insight into their situation. Sadly our education system and our social and family upbringing seem more often than not to miss out, or to gloss over, good constructive advice on healthy behaviour and thinking. Sometimes this is because teachers and parents either don't know the principles involved or find them difficult to articulate. Sometimes it is because of a concentration on materiality, the three "R"s, self interest and selfgratification. It seems that the holistic approach to education is only gradually being rediscovered. Social and ethical values were once part of our forebears' ordinary education through religion, community and other sources. Now that these sources are in retreat, leaving frank and open discussion of these critical aspects of life difficult for many, it has caused a gap in their lives, to be left to trial and error and ignorance. It can lead to a loss of direction and purpose, frustration, anger and other negative feelings. It is a pervasive western illness, now spreading world-wide. We need all the help we can get, and Dr Day's book is, in my view, a valuable contribution to this end.

Let us examine briefly one example from the book. Take week three - "Should". The book makes the point that as soon as we use this word we are probably engaged with unreality. This is because the word nearly always implies a disconnect between what we think ought to be happening and what is actually happening. In my experience it is closely connected to the "they" word - "They should consider my needs", is one of the examples given. When so used, it generally means the presence of some frustration, resentment, anger, etc., directed at others. The book suggests instead that our focus shift from "should' to what is actually happening, and then to consider what can be done to fix the situation, or how to prevent it re-occurring. Otherwise Dr Day says that it can be very expensive in terms of our mental health and our relationships. We can then return to week one in the book, differentiating between those things which we can realistically change without damaging relationships and social harmony, and those things we just have to good-naturedly accept.

Acceptance and patience are often lost values in a modern society that stresses instant gratification and an aggressive attitude to go out and get what you want at all costs. The habit of constant complaint against others is part of this frame of mind. But it is ultimately very damaging to ourselves and to relationships. This is a book that is well worth reading. The reader will be made aware of a range of life choices different from the perspective that he or she may be accustomed to, and which may help the reader in his or her life. It will certainly help counter poor thinking patterns and behaviours derived from the individualistic, competitive, consumer society.

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Flying-fox Summit in Cairns

What an amazing effort the Mayor, Val Schier, her Cairns Regional Councillors and Council staff put into organising the list of professional and interested parties from many parts of Australia to come and share their information with us – the equally interested people attending the summit on Friday 13th August.

Many people living near flying-foxes just see them as noisy, smelly and now, potentially infectious nuisances, and many calls are made to the local councils to remove them. In the past these thousands of little critters that darkened the sky as they fly out at night to look for food whilst pollinating the trees, and returned to roost during the day, were just a fascinating spectacle, that was, until we moved toward them in housing developments and on farms and they moved closer to us.

Dr Hume Field, from Biosecurity Queensland, explained that the world is experiencing a 75% increase of infectious disease originating from wild animals as we encroach into their domains. Two of these viruses that have come to attention in Australia are Hendra virus and Lyssavirus. Although these two infections are rare in humans, they are associated with a high mortality rate and naturally there is an intense fear from the general public about contracting one of these diseases, especially as so far, it is not clear how the Hendra virus is actually transmitted from bats to horse and then onto humans. But for the Hendra virus, it is only people like veterinarians and others who actually handle horses that may be at risk. The Lyssavirus is only spread via saliva entering through bites or scratches from an infected bat. People who do not handle bats have nothing to fear. Others who care so deeply about the dwindling flying-fox colonies that they look after injured and/or orphaned babies must have a course of preventive injections, at their own expense, before they can become bat fosters.

People living near bats don't want to hear this and don't care, they simply just want them 'moved on'! Moving them on is not as simple as herding cattle, as the administrators of the Royal Botanic Gardens in Melbourne found, when the number of bats reached 30,000 in 2003 and they ventured to remove them to a different locality. I wonder if they had known at the beginning that it would take many volunteers making sure that every flying-fox left the trees at dusk and every morning more volunteers preventing the bats' return to roost in the trees using noisy and frightening devises for 6 months and the cost - \$1.7 million, would they have proceeded. Even then, the flying-fox paradise they planned to move them to was apparently unacceptable to this intelligent, determined colony as they finally settled themselves in another area altogether.

Other councils have not been so lucky with their determined but unsuccessful attempts to 'move on' the flying-foxes from their daytime roost. At first, some of their efforts seemed to be triumphant, only to have those pesky flying mammals return back home at a later date.

These successful and failed attempts have shown councils and people of interest that we know little about the life and habits of these wandering animals, and if we are to be successful in living in harmony with these essential night pollinators of the forest, we must study them more.

Keith Noble, a fruit farmer from Tully, braved the obviously mainly pro-bat audience to tell about his experience in trying to produce tropical fruit. Growers in his area at first thought that flying-foxes didn't eat the tropical fruit on the farms. Well they got that wrong! They're not called fruit bats for nothing!

Keith tried many things from shooting to noise, eventually settling on netting to try and protect his fruit from the nighttime invaders and the daytime birds. Although it has been a difficult and expensive experience to both find some way to protect his fruit as well allow himself and his neighbour to get some sleep, his greatest frustration has been from the regulators who make him and his actions legal one day, then, without any consultation or notice change the rules overnight, changing what was once officially permitted to an indictable offence.

Bird strikes around the world have disabled and/or caused many aircraft to crash. We here in the Cairns region have to contend with the fly-out from the bats' nearby daytime roosts across the airport at dusk. The airport officials have wisely decided that 'moving on' the colony could cause future unpredictable problems, and instead have chosen to modify the



movement of the aircraft arriving and departing within this fly-out time frame.

The more people who move to Cairns to live, the more complaints the Cairns Regional Council receives. As Russel Wild from the Council explains to these people. that legally within the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999, there isn't a lot that the Council can do about flying-foxes roosting so close to their homes, that the bats are a protected species and most of the time are roosting in conservation areas. What the Council would like is for developers to tell potential buyers what they are letting themselves in for, although how the potential buyers can be ignorant of their noisy neighbours if they view the prospective accommodation during the day, is beyond me. Jenny Maclean, from Tolga Bat Hospital, talked and showed a video about what brings all flying animals, not just bats, into care. Barbed wire is the greatest cause, most being caught on the top strand, loose or black, backyard fruit netting, and on the Tablelands, the paralysis tick. Electrocution on power lines happens everywhere, and as the world heats up many thousand of flying-foxes die when the temperature climbs over 42 degrees. Cairns Regional Council has decided to embrace the flying-fox colony at the Cairns Library for the wonderful tourist attraction that it is. After the Summit we all attended the unveiling of an interpretative sign whilst getting to speak to other batty people and buy bat paraphernalia. A face painter was there, supposedly for the kids, but when the Mayor had two bat paintings beside her eyes, I decided that if it was good enough for the Mayor, it was good enough for me to re-visit childhood and have my face painted too. Congratulations to the Mayor and the Council on having the courage to conduct a summit on such a controversial subject, whilst hopefully fostering a better understanding for the people dealing with both sides of a problem.





Alvin Purple



The latter remains one of the most profitable Australian films yet produced. Its popularity clearly reflected the moment – with the relaxation of censorship in the early 70s, a high-spirited sex comedy in the Australian idiom had special appeal to Australian audiences. Alvin is an ordinary young bloke desiring a quiet life whose very ordinariness seems irresistible to women. The comedy is based on incongruity. Sex is rendered as slapstick. Jokes are at the expense of bastions of hypocrisy: psychiatry, the press and the law. The would-be recessive hero is the object of male sexual fantasy – sex without responsibility – a fantasy with which women could also apparently identify.

The highlight of all events so far has been winning the NQ regional showcase award and having another trophy added to Kuranda College's list of fantastic student achievements. We greatly appreciate the support, enthusiasm and generosity of parents and the community.





After the Permaculture Convergence in Kuranda on September 24-26, hopefully everyone will be enthusiastic about getting out in the garden.

The unseasonal rain in September mixed with the intense sun caused a bit of early rot in our vegetable garden this year. Hopefully, October will bring a little relief and keep some traditional vegetables going strong while our onions have a chance to dry off before harvesting.

We're now looking at putting in green manure crops and are growing pigeon peas for the first time.

A native of India, pigeon pea (Cajanus cajan) is a woody perennial that grows to about 2m. It is a type of legume, containing nitrogen-fixing bacteria in its roots so it can absorb nitrogen from the air. This makes it ideal to cut later on and use as a mulch to help boost nitrogen levels in the soil over the wet season when so much is being leached by the heavy rains. The roots of pigeon peas also give off a chemical that dissolves iron phosphates in the soil so they can be utilised by the plant.

As a vegetable crop, the plant produces green pods that can be eaten like beans when the seeds inside are immature, or wait until they mature and the dried seeds can be used as a pulse. In India they are known as toor dhal and their sweet flavour make them ideal for curries and vegetable soups.

Nutritionally they contain up to 28 per cent protein and have three times more vitamin C than normal peas and five times the vitamin A.

Being perennial the plants can be regularly pruned and added to the compost or fed to stock. Plant the seeds in groups of two or three about 1m apart in raised beds. They are also drought resistant so great for the drier areas of Speewah and Koah. Harvesting can begin about four months after your initial planting, and continues throughout much of the year.

If you've been growing rosellas, later this month should be good for taking cuttings to propagate more plants as they are quite difficult to start from seed.

Among the other plants suitable to put in now are snake beans, winged beans, sweet potato, kangcong or water spinach, Ceylon spinach, okra and ginger.

Open Garden Scheme

Two stunning tropical rainforest gardens will open in kuranda for the open garden scheme on 23 and 24 October, 10.00am to 4.30pm.

• Kuranda Retreat, 51 Mason Road, Kuranda is a one acre garden, home to massed plantings of gingers, cordylines, bromeliads and heliconias. Collections of fan palms, cycads, philodendrons, pandanus and ferns edge broad lawns, and a large central stringybark provides a sitting place for rare birds. Lily and frog ponds add a cooling note, and a walking track has been extended down to Platypus Creek, where all new planting is of plants native to North Queensland. A small barbecue pad in this area provides a great resting and relaxation spot overlooking the

creek, and the railway sleeper steps and gentle slopes and terracing enable easy access to the creek.

"After 15 years, our Retreat is now a mature garden with many very large plants," say garden owners Greg and Julie McKeown. "It's a relatively easy garden to maintain these days. We keep finding spots for those special finds and we really enjoy swapping plants with other collectors and old time growers whose knowledge we admire. We're forever on a mission to find more colourful shadelovers."

• Kuranda Palms Garden, Lot 10 Saddle Mountain Rd, Kuranda is a large tropical garden set in more than 100 acres of pristine rainforest adjacent to the magnificent natural environment of the World Heritage National Park of the Kuranda range. Mature palms and large trees overhang the entrance, which opens out onto a large lawn surrounded by colourful borders and tall palms, backed by the rainforest. There is a wonderful collection of heliconias and gingers, and everywhere are rare tropical palms from around the world. The combination of the exotic plants in the garden, and the surrounding forest with its walks, creek and waterfall, will make this Open Garden visit a memorable experience.

"Having created gardens in the temperate climate of England and the Mediterranean climate of Portugal, we were keen to experience a tropical garden when we moved here four years ago," said garden owner Graham Payne. "In our first two years we rejuvenated the garden, planting beds of colourful exotics. In the warm, moist tropical climate the garden has grown rapidly, so that after only a few years it is already looking mature."

The Kuranda Palms Garden recently won First Prize in the Country Rural Gardens category in the Northern Zone of the Tablelands Regional Council Garden Awards. The Kuranda CWA will provide delicious refreshments on the weekend. The garden is suitable for wheelchairs, and there will be plant sales.

Coming Home, Healing, Growing Strong from the Stolent Generations – Jaye Clare

WHAT DOES ONE SAY to a local person who was stolen, as was her mother, and on her mother's early demise, as were all of her four surviving siblings while still children, to be separated from one another in far off Tasmania? What

does one say to such a person who, notwithstanding such a traumatic start, has made of her life a success. Such a person is this month's Profile, **Jaye Clare** of Kuranda. This is just one instance of the past inhuman treatment of Aboriginals in this country. Australians have yet, despite the 1967 referendum, the deaths in custody report, the apology and other landmark events, to really come to terms with the deep sufferings and continuing trauma of our indigenous people.

Jaye has the family name Koorabubba. Her mother's traditional lands is Dumburra, home of salt-water people of the Gulf, of the Gangalidda/Garwu clan and language group. The nearest town is Burketown. Her mother lived a traditional lifestyle with her people. At 10 years old, she was taken away to Doomagee Mission and brought up there, being denied her cultural and spiritual links. When she was old enough her mother was put out to domestic service. There she met her husband of Scottish descent, a kind man with ideas in advance of his time. To get married they had to have the permission of the Protector of Aborigines. Later they moved to Tennant Creek. They had six children, of which five survived, Jaye being the second eldest. Jaye pays tribute to both her parents, who encouraged her to be strong, to get a good education and proud of her Aboriginal identity. Growing up, Jaye learnt about her Aboriginal culture and her heritage.

But major changes occurred. Her older sister was stolen in 1967. Then both Jaye's parents died in 1970. In 1971, the other four children, including Jaye, were taken away from from their home to far off Tasmania and split up. Jaye was 13, the others younger. Jaye was moved around and largely left to her own resources. She occasionally saw her siblings. It was a difficult time but she learnt to be strong.

After Jaye matriculated, she moved to Melbourne and did a Diploma of Social Welfare. She then returned to Tasmania to undertake a Psychiatric Degree in nursing. But she longed to return home to Tennant, where her parents were buried. There she worked in Aboriginal related areas and had two children with her partner. But she still wanted to further her education, so she moved back to Tasmania and completed her education degree while also working and raising her two children. Later she started up her own cultural/art consultancy business there, being contracted to various schools and colleges, including the Tasmanian Aboriginal Education Unit. It was quite successful.

The year 1998 was the "Year of Bringing them Home". Jaye visited Doomagee with her daughter to acknowledge her mother and to start the healing process. She met many family members and shared stories. It strengthened her Aboriginal identity, but left her feeling her life in Tasmania was empty. So in 2000 she moved

to Kuranda and has lived here since. Her daughter stayed down south where she had her own child, but Jaye still had her son Sam. Sam went to Kuranda State and then Smithfield High. He then received an indigenous youth leadership scholarship to


> St Joseph's College in Brisbane, became a prefect, dorm captain and a great sportsperson, then matriculated. In 2008 he was selected to go to South Africa as a delegate for Youth for World Peace. He is now studying for a Bachelor of Health Science in Tasmania.

As to Jaye, she leads a busy life. Currently she provides counselling support in a mental health recovery program at Yarrabah three days a week with PHaMS Worklink. She also facilitates women's healing groups using art as a therapy. She is also an artist. She has an artistic, spiritual and cultural approach to personal and professional development and healing. She gives talks and lectures, has written a story for children and has mentored students. She has attended many courses and received many awards and certificates.

Jaye has strong beliefs about her spirituality. They are earth-based – an Aboriginal cultural Spirituality, not a religion as she understands that term. It is an allencompassing Spirituality that extends to every aspect of her life. It is something given, rather than imposed or chosen, to be passed down orally using the arts, and coming from the Earth and the Spirits. It involves stories, songlines, creation beliefs, totems, Dreaming (but not the notion of a dreamtime) and kinship. It is not based on myths but on an Aboriginal view of the world. In this age it includes the Stolen Generations, which has

affected all generations and requires deep spiritual healing. The healing has been and still is a major part of Jaye's life. We wish her well.



A Thought for October

This month we turn to St Luke's Gospel Chapter 16 and read from Verse 1 to 13.

In this month's reading Jesus asks that we invest the same energy in our relationship with God that we invest in our personal affairs. Jesus often outraged his listeners. He would say things that seemed to fly in the face of all reality, and advocate things that seemed to offend all their ideas of religious propriety. Jesus was determined to say something so startling that it would penetrate the layers of resistance waiting to block it.

This story is a first-class example. All over Galilee there were great estates run by a manager, often, but not always, a Greek. The manager was very powerful and in a position of great trust. Therefore, when one was found to be fiddling with the books it was very serious indeed.

Jesus' story is of one such manager. The story may well have been based on a real incident known to his listeners. The master asks for the accounts, and the manager is caught red-handed. But he is resourceful. He rushes around doing deals with his master's customers, deals that will benefit them and therefore make them kindly disposed to him when he comes looking for a job. Thus, he survives after being fired. Up to that point it is just an interesting story on human ingenuity. But then Jesus says, "the master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly."

The listening crowd must have gasped. Normally the manager would end up in prison. But, as always, Jesus is portraying the nature of God, and applying the attitudes and values of the kingdom of God. What is the most important issue here when we look from God's point of view?

Here is a man faced with a serious situation. Instead of remaining passive he puts every ounce of his intelligence, ingenuity and energy into dealing with the crisis. Jesus now asks us to apply these standards to our spiritual lives, to our relationship with God. Jesus asks that we invest in our spiritual journey those things we invest in the other parts of our life journey. Think of the energy we put into our financial affairs, into our quest for promotion in an organization, into the upbringing of our children. What Jesus is demanding is that we make that investment in spiritual things.




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

Hello to all, we have had a quiet month with only one call out, for a lost person, but he arrived back safely before we were dispatched.

We are currently training all of our members so that they will be able to go up in rank and have a few stripes on their shoulder bars. Greg Sutton is now an official member, and is already sporting his orange uniform.

Our little unit is slowly growing with another two members joining up this month, which is a fantastic effort from our local people.

Through the next couple of months, you may see us around practising our chainsaw and tarping skills, so that we will be prepared for the wet weather; if you do come and have a chat, we would love to meet you.

As we have had quite a bit of rain through the winter months (if you could call it winter) the ground won't need much heavy rain to bring down trees. It is never too early to start preparing for the cyclone season, and removing any dead trees around your property. Cleaning out your gutters is another essential part of preparation. I know that we always seem to "harp" on about this, and nothing ever seems to happen, but I would prefer for us all to be prepared for that dreaded cyclone and not have it come, than for no-one to do anything and we get hit. It should be an automatic approach to the wet season, to bring out the emergency kit and check it, and to stock up on tin food, batteries, milk, etc. Don't leave it till the last minute, as the shops may also run out of stock.

For those of you with generators, if they haven't been used for a while, check your oil levels and fire it up, you may have stale fuel, which will not start the engine; better to find this out before you need it than when there is no power.

If anyone needs any more information on preparing for cyclones, please don't hesitate to call me, or pop into BP and see me.

The Old Primary School – a great opportunity lost!

About eight years ago, a few locals realised that the primary school would be moving out to the Kuranda College land. They determined that Kuranda should not lose the land and buildings as there was a great demand and need for community facilities in our town. We lobbied a couple of State Ministers. One said "You have no chance – look at Cairns Central, look at North Cairns". But we and they persevered and then Steve Wettenhall came on and did a vast amount of lobbying and submissions and eventually, we succeeded. Steve really deserves a lot of thanks for his tireless and successful efforts.

The school was valued at over \$1.6 million and the Council was able to purchase it for a bit over \$700,000. Essentially, the State Government gave our Kuranda community a donation of about one million dollars. They realised that there was very little available crown land in Kuranda and a serious lack of facilities.

We envisaged that it would take a decade or so to slowly bring it up to full potential. We hoped that the old preschool could maybe be used as a women's shelter – a desperately needed asset. Or perhaps a teen-youth centre to develop skills and capabilities. We hoped that various associations in the community would use the over 16 rooms in the old school, slowly repairing and maintaining them at their own cost with assistance and support from Council. We hoped for guidance, leadership and facilitation from the Council. This would be a community effort with lots of people and organisations contributing, and benefiting, and developing the facility. We foresaw the use of the vacant land for pensioner cottages and facilities into the future, or maybe a hall or auditorium if it did not compete, but rather assisted the CWA and Amphitheatre. There were so many opportunities, so much potential, so much time to succeed – slowly and certainly.

Well, that is not going to happen. We started with over 3¹/₂ acres, 16 rooms, a two roomed demountable, and a house. Within short months we will have 1¹/₂ acres, 4 rooms, and no house. Council believes that this is a good outcome. I believe that it is a huge opportunity converted into a shameful disaster.

The two older buildings (blocks A and B) will be removed or demolished. Tenders close on 5th October. Much of the land will be sold. A change of use application has already been lodged. The house (old pre-school) will be sold.

I have had three meetings with Council's representatives over the past 4 months. I asked to address Council – that was refused. I asked for the building inspection report months ago. Until a day ago, it was classified. This is an essential document for five community organisations that want to put together a joint application for use of one of the older blocks, to be repaired and maintained at our cost. It was always refused. Two community organisations have made submissions to Council where they were prepared to spend thousands of dollars doing the necessary work. Both were refused or ignored and no subsequent negotiations were entered into, nor offered by Council.

Another community organisation wanted to rent the house and was prepared to pay market rental if Council was prepared to waive the rental to the value of their quoted repair costs. The negotiations took months and Council refused.

I have asked repeatedly over months for Council to call a joint meeting of all of the associations that expressed an interest in using the school. This was to allow these associations to form a united group with joint ideas to fund and to use the buildings. This was refused. I have asked for a list of the associations who expressed such an interest so that I could call a meeting. That information was classified.

I have asked for a formal community consultation process so that our residents can actually have input into Council's directions. That has been refused until after the demolition of the buildings and the sale of the house and land. Maybe we will have consultation at the end of this year, maybe next year, maybe.

I have stated that the outcome is a disaster and that Council has no mandate and has

Small Business GST and BAS Preparation Companies and Tausts not consulted with the community. Sale of community assets under these circumstances is very dubious. Councillor Jensen has stated that she has consulted because she talks to lots of people and that there is a Community Advisory Committee. Well, two of the members of the committee have resigned, one hasn't attended for months and they have never approved any motion for the sales or the demolitions. They still meet even if there isn't a quorum and at many meetings there are no motions, only reports by Council. The minutes are on the TRC website – look for yourself. The members of the committee are Council appointments. It doesn't sound like real consultation to me.

There are five community organisations that desperately want to use these old buildings in a joint effort, using our money and our work. Council has always refused to facilitate, or negotiate, or give us the information that we need in order to make a submission.

Councillor Jensen tells me that the surplus funds will be placed in trust to build a new facility after consultation sometime in the future. She believes that these funds will be sacrosanct and that no future Council might change their mind. I have seen too many examples in the past to give this any credibility.

I really believe that this community has lost a great asset, and a once in a generation opportunity. If you agree with me, it would not do any harm to contact a Councillor or two and ask for reconsideration. I would contact the Councillors in the other divisions of our region. Ears have a way of hearing only what they want to hear – sometimes they are closed. Does this make me angry; not really – just very, very sad.





ENERGY: the essence of lífe

Whether you're trying to keep up with the kids these school holidays, maintain that demanding work schedule or simply getting the most out of life, then your energy levels are an important issue. Ever wondered how some people have boundless levels of energy whilst others struggle just to get out of bed. This isn't simply down to luck, many factors influence how you feel.

Where does energy come from

'ATP (Adrenosine triphosphate) transports chemical energy within cells for metabolism'. The human body is constantly manufacturing and breaking down ATP for energy production. It is used for brain function (20% of the bodies ATP) & fuels the 'pumping' action of the heart. It is stored in the muscles for instant fuel. Once used energy is converted into ATP from sugars, fats & amino acids (protein).

How can I maintain optimum energy levels

Chromium helps 'regulate blood sugar levels' therefore helpful for sugar cravings.

Protein from meat, dairy, nuts, legumes etc., is very important as this provides essential amino acids to fuel the body.

Vitamin & Mineral deficiencies i.e. magnesium, zinc & iron can cause fatigue. In the tropics (with higher humidity levels) we loss such minerals & other electrolytes in our sweat leading to higher requirements.

B Vitamins: Not only essential for ATP production but nourish the nervous system. When we are under stress our bodies demand increases.

CoenymeQ10: Is directly involved in the production of ATP. It is a component of almost every cell within the body but our natural production begins depleting after the age of 30.

Ginseng: There are several types including Korean, Siberian and Withania. Whilst helping provide energy they also help balance the adrenal glands.

Avoid: Simple sugars and caffeine products that deplete the adrenal glands ie coffee, tea, energy drinks and guarana. The adrenals are designed to release adrenaline for instant energy. This is needed for our fight or flight response ie if we are in danger. Over stimulation of the pituitary gland results in a depletion in your bodies natural adrenaline production therefore resulting in fatigue.

Other factors effecting energy

The liver: is a site that absorbs and stores many nutrients. If it is sluggish then this can effect its productivity therefore leading to a depletion in energy.

Parasites: can infest the body putting a higher demand on the system. Sleep: Without adequate rest the body doesn't have time to rejuvenate. Many factors can interfere with sleeping patterns such as melatonin, calcium or magnesium deficiency. Valerian can also help sleeping disorders.

Stress: can interfere with many body functions, which can be addressed with personalised bush flower essence and other supplements.





WATER CRYSTALS





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AGENT FOR:



When planting your trees, add a sprinkling of water crystals to the hole, backfill with soil and water in generously. The water crystals will take up some water which will be available to the tree roots when the soil dries up. Water crystals are expensive but **DID YOU KNOW** that disposable baby nappies have a layer of water crystals to soak up the urine. You'll water and fertilize if you strip out this layer and dig it in around your trees. If you're faint-hearted, you can get water crystals from the KCons nursery at Pademelon Lane.

Beware the Stinging Tree


A common and dangerous plant in the Kuranda area is the Stinging Tree (Dendrocnide moroides) which is found in clearings or on the edges of rainforest. Its giant, somewhat heart-shaped leaves usually grow horizontally and can be difficult to see edge on. Leaves and stems are covered with fine stinging hairs which can inflict pain for many months. While it is sometimes found as a small tree, more usually stings are caused by small plants, which are less likely to be noticed. Even a dead leaf can cause a sting, and while the raspberry-like fruit are edible, they too can carry the odd stinging hair and are best left alone.


The sting is intensely painful and often the lymph nodes will swell almost immediately. Intense pain can last a few days. One treatment for the pain is to remove the stinging hairs by applying artificial skin or a similar film, then tearing it off. Painkillers are not usually effective and folk remedies such as the sap of Cunjevoi plants that often grow in the same area are practically useless.

It is wise to learn to identify stinging trees if you are going to spend time in the rainforest. They are common on tracks in some areas. They can be confused with other trees and shrubs with heart-shaped leaves, such as the Bleeding Heart (Omalanthus nova-quinsis) which has shiny leaves, some of which turn bright orange or scarlet red, and the introduced raspberry, a scrambling weed with somewhat similar leaves but a very different growth habit, that also infests rainforest margins.

COONDOO STREET TREE: I am aware that there have been concerns regarding the mango tree. It is always sad to have to remove a tree and it was certainly a difficult decision for Council to take. The decision was only made after a full assessment from Council's Parks and Gardens Co-ordinator and an independent arborist. In essence, both the tree and host tree were diseased and there was irreparable damage to the tree structures. This meant Council had to take action due to risks of public liability. Future plans for Coondoo Street include some trimming of the fig trees. Council is also working with the Kuranda Garden Group in developing the streetscape of the village through new garden plantings.

OLD SCHOOL SITE: When the old Kuranda State School site was sold to the then Mareeba Shire Council by the state government in March 2008, the community had a clear expectation that the entire site would be maintained and developed as a community facility by and for the benefit of residents and ratepayers of Kuranda.

Now the Tableland Regional Council has resolved to carve up the site for residential subdivision and remove some of the buildings (Blocks A & B). Two lots are proposed to be sold off including the old pre-school site and an adjoining lot of 873 sq.m with a further lot But how much land and how much money will be left?

I think TRC has put the cart before the horse here, but if TRC persists in going ahead and selling the land and buildings, at the very least **every last cent of the gross sale proceeds should be held in a specific reserve and TRC should absorb all the costs of bringing the site to market including survey, sale and subdivision.** Otherwise there is a real risk that the Kuranda community will end up with very little or nothing towards a new building.

BOOK DONATIONS: To celebrate Book Week last month, I donated a book to each of the 14 Barron River school libraries. Candlenut Steiner School and Kuranda District State School received a copy of "Crockee's Country" by local author and illustrator Dr Sasi Victoire (A crocodile story which highlights the need for protecting waterways). of 4837sq.m on the village side of the old block B to be created but not yet offered for sale.

This leaves 7993 sq.m left of the original 14 984 sq.m site. Why has TRC made this decision without first investing in a strategic management plan for the site with proper community input? Why hasn't the community been properly consulted about this major decision?

Why have the blocks A & B been allowed to run down so badly when \$250 000 Federal Government stimulus money has been spent on other various upgrades, renovations and new facilities?

TRC needs to keep faith with the Kuranda community on this issue. They say proceeds of the sale of the land and buildings will be used to "finance the construction of a new purpose built facility on the remaining land". **TENNIS:** I hope you were able to see some of the Davis Cup tennis action between Australia and Belgium at the joint State and Council funded \$6.2 million Cairns International Tennis Centre. The region certainly benefited from celebrities like Lleyton Hewitt gracing the games.

OPRAH: It's also a boon for Queensland Tourism and Tourism Australia with the announcement that Oprah is bringing her show to the country in December - with likely filming in Cairns and the Reef. 
