News from :

2A students at Kuranda District Primary School have been working very hard to create and run an Animal City in the classroom.

Each student has built a cardboard box house for a stuffed animal. The houses - which all have letterboxes - are set up along streets.

Students are running several businesses and services in Animal City: builders, restaurant, chemist, hotel, disco, pool, hospital, post office and bank.

Students use a keycard with their name and signature for withdrawing their pay in "Funny Money" - earned for each day they attend school ("work").

Students are comparing their experiences in Animal City to the real world by visiting real businesses in Kuranda (or faxing them in other places) to find out how they are run. Animal City has been an engaging way for young students to practise reading, writing and number skills while learning how towns, services and businesses are organised and run.

Most importantly young students are experiencing the value of cooperation and interdependence in preparation for an increasingly complex world.

Business & Youth -A Recipe for Success

Take one small township and add a number of businesses who make a living from local or tourism patronage. Next, mix in young people who need local support in discovering their career pathways. To help ingredients combine well, add school staff

who will support students and employers in the vocational experience. Sift in mentoring and skilling and allow to set. Finally combine all ingredients well until we realise that we can better our community by working together. Bake and enjoy!

Armed with current information on vocational pathways, and an opportunity to test the waters, Kuranda businesses are proving valuable in getting the recipe right. A number of local businesses are providing great vocational opportunities for students at Kuranda High. Their commitment can be as elementary as providing work experience which allow students to taste-test a given job/career or the opportunities can extend as far as taking on a student for a School-based Apprenticeship or Traineeship (which we call a SAT).

<u>For work experience</u>, students from year 11 and 12 are able to utilize Thursdays each week to pursue job sampling. Some year 10s are also experiencing workplaces on a regular basis (approval for work experience in year 10 is based on considering the individuals age, case and timetable negotiations with administration). The work experience process involves:

- 1. School contact with employers to discuss placement outcomes, expectations and needs of employer and student,
- 2. A Contract Agreement between the 4 parties: student, family, school and employer. Under this contract, Public Liability and Worker's Compensation is covered by Education Queensland. The paperwork is quite simple and requires the student to obtain all 4 signatures.
- 3. A Pre-placement visit/interview if deemed necessary by employer or school.
- 4. Follow up communications with employer, student and family.

School based Traineeships: - Students at Kuranda High School are embracing school based Traineeships and Apprenticeships. After a successful 2002 work experience placement during year 10, Ellen Wyatt secured herself a traineeship in Clothing Production where she attends school four days a week and works one. These are her thoughts on the training arrangement: "Working amongst adults is great because it improves your maturity and it (the traineeship) is providing me with great workforce skills". Vicki Massey, owner of Wicked Weaves also supports young people in her fashion business which is located in Therwine Street down near the original markets. Rohanna Rusch, a year 10 student started a School-based traineeship in Clothing Production with Vicki in August last year . Owner Vicki comments that "a school-based traineeship provides a very practical (hands-on) approach that establishes strong foundation skills (compared to training that might essentially be theoretical with little practical experience). Vicki also values this style of training as "a wonderful opportunity for a young person to get accustomed to the "real" world of work". Jarrod Wiggins is another senior student who has started a school based apprenticeship in Fitting, Turning and Mechanical with a local business. Jarrod attends school three days a week, studying Maths, English and technical subjects and works Thursdays and Fridays. Salena Dieben is a year 12 student who has also kickstarted her career by proving herself in work experience and picking up a florist traineeship. Work experience is most often the key that opens doors to further training and employment opportunities.

School based Apprenticeships and Traineeships (SATs)-

provide an extended opportunity for both parties. Employers can take on a part-time employee at a training level thus teaching and moulding that young person to the needs of the business. For the young person it means completing his/her senior certificate by attending school a minimum of 3 days per week <u>and</u> obtaining a start in a chosen career by working and/or attending training the other 1-2 days of the week. The young person can make a steady transition into the world of work and be earning a qualification and income at the same time. While SATs can start almost anytime through year 11 or 12, ideally a young person would start in year 11 and by the end of year 12 have completed a traineeship or the first year of an apprenticeship.

Incentives for Employers:

A number of Commonwealth incentives are available to employers who take on a Trainee or Apprentice. The **New Apprenticeship Incentive** of \$4400.00 is available to employers who sign up any nationally recognised Traineeship or Apprenticeship, be it full time, part time or as a SAT. A further \$825.00 is available if the training is School Based. Further Wage Assistance between \$2200 - \$4400 is also available for employers who take on Indigenous Job Seekers (through the **Indigenous Wage Assistance** Program). **New Apprenticeship Centres** (NACs) can clarify incentive information for employers considering a trainee or apprentice in their business.

Who's doing what on the local scene:

Several businesses providing our students with regular <u>Work Experience</u> include: Martinne and Duncan: *Kuranda Tyre & Mechanical*, Paul Massee and staff: *Koala Gardens*, Vicki and Terry Pates: *Banjos Restaurant*, Lorraine Akkerman: *Kuranda Community Kindy*, Mark Evans and staff: *Kuranda Primary and Pre-Schools, Community Health*: (Kuranda), *Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation*, Jan and Rod Endres of *Kowrowa Cash Store*, Jimi and Chris Hannam of *Speewah Valley Nursery, Kuranda Library*, Judy Buschkens and Miguel Trapaga of *Kuranda Health Sciences*, Sue and Phil Gregory of Cassowary House, Australian ATV tours, Kangaventures and Birdworld. Others businesses are joining in all the time so apologies if we haven't acknowledged you in this round.

Full time Traineeships and Apprenticeships: *KMKM Corporation* and *Ngoonbi Co-operative Society*, indigenous organizations located in Coondoo Street have signed up a number of trainees over the last few years. For the second year running Ngoonbi has taken on a year 12 leaver to complete a fulltime traineeship in Business Administration. Thea Buthmann, staff member of Ngoonbi comments that traineeships "provide on-the-job skills for community people in a familiar environment. It helps to build confidence." *KMKM* organization provides traineeships in areas such as manufacturing, office administration and retail. Ian Pike of *Kuranda Trading Post* also provides regular traineeships in Food and Beverage while Martinne Ludicke and Duncan Cameron of *Kuranda Tyre and Mechanical* support mechanical apprenticeships through their business.

The community commitment being shown by the above businesses is awesome and we as a school are privileged to be working in with them. There are no doubt other local businesses who are also leading the way in providing training opportunities for our local people- your commitment is also recognised and appreciated. On the flipside, other businesses might *just* be learning about the current system of training options and still in the contemplation stage. As a significant stakeholder in our community, Kuranda State High School welcomes your enquiries and support on training opportunities for young people.

Library News







What the Medical Evidence Suggests.

Use of Steroid Inhalers in Children with Asthma.

As many as 1 in 5 of our children now suffer from asthma. Most are mild cases but a significant number need to use regular inhalers to control symptoms and parents remain concerned about the possible long-term effects of inhaled steroids. These children may also need to use short courses of steroid tablets during a serious flare in their asthma and a recent study published in the journal Paediatrics has thrown a reassuring light on the effects of taking this medication.

The study reveals that there is no permanent effect on a child's growth, bone density or hormonal function (specifically the adrenal gland). The study also found that bone density was the same in children with asthma whether they were treated with inhaled steroids or not.

I believe there are two important take home messages. Use of oral steroids (prednisolone), which is potentially life saving medication in asthma, has no significant side effects. If your child is struggling with asthma you can take him or her along to the GP reassured that the most effective medication has no long-term side effects.

WAIT-A-WHILE by Lesley Clarke

It is Wednesday March 19th as I write this column and it is likely that in the next 24 hours US, Britain and Australia will have begun an invasion of Iraq. By the time you read this column in early April, I really don't know what might be happening but almost certainly many hundreds or thousands of innocent people will be dead and our federal government will have been a party to that dreadful outcome. I feel both angry and devastated.

Simon Crean has made it clear that the Labor Party opposes Australia's involvement in this war and we believe the troops should return home. It is not in our national interest to be involved in the war with Iraq when there were alternatives to conflict. The Prime Minister has effectively given control of our foreign policy to the US and I am very concerned that our involvement in a war with Iraq will make us a target for future terrorism attacks here in Australia.

I commend the members of the Kuranda Partners for Peace for their commitment to a range of activities to promote peace and I was pleased to be able to support them. The Peace Rally in Cairns was attended by about 1000 people of all ages and backgrounds, including Kuranda people. Millions rallied that same weekend from all over the world, but tragically our voices for peace have been ignored. John Howard obviously made up his mind long ago to follow Bush regardless of the outcome of any UN deliberations.

Whilst opposing the war, let me make it quite clear I do support the men and women who are serving in our defence forces. They should not be condemned by the Australian community for doing their job, as were the veterans of the Vietnam War. My daughter Jennifer is a peace activist while my son David is Trooper Clark serving in the Army. Fortunately David is not involved in the conflict as he is currently undergoing training to serve as an army medic. I am proud of both my children but I believe we should only use our defence forces to protect Australia - not fighting wars of America's choosing.

Despite the momentous events unfolding on the world stage, life goes on at our local level and I would like to congratulate Jim Carless of SitePlan, Margy Timmermans of Arts Nexus, the local artists, the Council staff and construction crew for the excellent job to date with the design and streetscaping of Lower Coondoo St which is starting to take shape. I am really looking forward to seeing the public art work component completed which will transform the street.

Finally, I have mailed out to all households a summary of the State Government's achievements in Barron River which included a section for you to provide feedback. I have worked hard and am proud of what the Beattie Government has delivered in my electorate, including in Kuranda, but I know there is more to be done so I welcome your comments.

UPDATE form Warren Entsch : Commended in Prime Minister's Work for the Dole Awards

Two Far North Queensland projects have been recognised as Highly Commended in this year's Prime Minister's Work for the Dole Achievement Awards.

The details of the awards were announced at Parliament House in Canberra yesterday. The renovation of the Ngoonbi Kuranda SDA Community Centre project received a high commendation in the Work for the Dole Activity - Caring for our Community category, while the ongoing Cairns-based restoration of the pearl lugger Floria was highly commended in the category of Work for the Dole - Caring for our Heritage.

Member for Leichhardt Warren Entsch today congratulated the projects' participants and their corresponding community work coordinators (CWC), QiTE in Mareeba and Northern Training and Development in Cairns, which are contracted by the Commonwealth to provide Work for the Dole services locally.

Mr Entsch said the awards recognises not just the contribution participants and their CWCs have made to the Work for the Dole program, but also their achievements in helping to provide quality services and facilities to Far North Queensland.

"To be singled out for highly commended awards from among the thousands of Work for the Dole programs conducted around the country last year is a tremendous effort by anyone's standards," he said.

"I would have been thrilled for our region to include one award-winning project, but to have two is absolutely outstanding.

"The communities of Kuranda and Cairns have much to thank these dedicated jobseekers and CWCs for. Their excellent work has certainly made Far North Queensland a richer place."

The project to renovate the Ngoonbi Kuranda SDA Community Centre, under the guidance of QiTE, saw six jobseekers learn valuable skills including project planning and design, block laying, landscaping, painting and carpentry.

"When the six-month project wound up in September last year Kuranda found itself with a unique and colourful new centre that the local community can be really proud of.

"Steven Soda of QiTE tells me the participants chose the final colour scheme themselves, a scheme that has lifted the spirits of the Kuranda community," Mr Entsch said.

The project to restore the Floria to its original 1914 condition, coordinated by Northern Training and Development, is at the half way mark, with a new wave of jobseekers beginning their training next week. When it's completed in six month's time, more than 100 jobseekers will have learned the ancient and dying art of wooden shipbuilding.

WALK AGAINST WANT

Kuranda's fourth annual Walk Against Want for OXFAM/Community Aid Abroad was held on Sunday, February 23rd. Nine walkers - 6 from Speewah, 1 from Kuranda, and 2 from Atherton - walked the 10 km route to the Barron Gorge lookout, and then out along Fallon Road to the highway and back to the village following the walking track. Our efforts raised over \$300.

Thanks to all those who made donations, and to the Kuranda Police for helping out with the paperwork. Our numbers were down, as was the amount of money raised. But given the growing number of humanitarian causes in this troubled world, this was perhaps to be expected. We also had less lead time to organise the walk and get others involved. We hope to rouse more participants for next year's walk. Watch this space! Keila Waksvik & Riette Voogt The Maritime Archaeological Society of Far North Queensland, which owns the pearl lugger, plans to sail the Floria as a tourism venture in the Cairns region.

"I am very impressed with the way in which this project combines practical skill development with a profound sense of history," Mr Entsch said.

"The Floria spent her early years as the fastest pearl lugger in the Torres Strait and was much loved by the men of Darnley and Murray Islands because she represented a way they could make money and contribute to their communities.

"I am certain the people of the Torres Strait will welcome her with open arms when the Maritime Archaeological Association sails her back to the Torres Strait for a visit."

The two winning Far North Queensland projects were chosen from a shortlist of 50 of the nation's most notable Work for the Dole projects.

Mr Entsch said the Work for the Dole program provides valuable work experience for participants and offers local communities new or better facilities.

Since the program began in 1997, more than 215,000 unemployed people have boosted their chances of finding paid employment through 12,000 projects across Australia.

"Work for the Dole shows real partnerships between community groups who sponsor activities, participants and the community. That's why it's such an extremely successful program," he said.





HYDROPONIC GARDENING

Last Saturday there was an interesting article in the Cairns Post re Hydroponic Tomatoes. The Indonesian regional police chief advised his men to grow tomatoes to avoid bribes. The idea was to help them raise their incomes. They were told it was easy to grow tomatoes using hyroponics and that the technique would be taught to the policemen. Tomatoes must be expensive in Indonesia too. Hydroponic Tomatoes grow all the year round and it is very nice to have your own when they are \$6 a kilo in the supermarkets. There is very little equipment required. I grow mine in 25l containers with part of the top cut out. You can grow two tomatoes in these containers. I use river gravel as the media and make my own formula but nutrient can be bought at Nu Leaf in Cairns. It



She knew that it would eat the world one day. Then Yoko left her sad city and her sad, sad people and floated away.



KURANDA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE & TOURISM INC

What follows may be important to you. If you want to express your opinion on the following matter, please contact any of the Chamber officers below or Val Shannon of Mareeba Shire Council or Lesley Clark, chair of the Kuranda Advisory Committee. You'll need to do this before Wednesday 2nd April. Once Council has made a decision on this issue it will very much harder to make changes.

MOVEMENT OF BUSES THROUGH TOWN

Years ago it was decided to keep buses out of Coondoo Street and this has been partially achieved between Thongong Street (post office street) and Therwine Street (beside the park). With the upgrading of the Skyrail/train end of town, it is now proposed to exclude buses from lower Coondoo Street. All buses moving to and from Skyrail/train will use Barang Street while buses at the markets end of town will come in via Rob Vievers Drive and leave via Therwine Street. What's the Problem? - Take a Second Look

There is concern that visitors being met by buses at Skyrail/train will be wisked out of the town via Barang Street leaving them completely unaware that the shops and attractions in Kuranda exist. Obviously they won't be making plans for a return visit if that's the case.

What's the Solution?

There may be a case to allow buses to continue to move along lower Coondoo Street so that those visitors being taken to other places on the Tablelands will at least get a glimpse of what they are missing. They may then choose to return here to explore further.

You need to be vocal about your opinion on this before irreversible decisions are made. We'll be discussing this at our next Chamber meeting. You'll get a vote on this issue if you are a member.

BUT THERE'S MORE ...

The Chamber is now homing in on two projects that we believe will help solve problems of touting and create an equitable environment for all businesses to operate in.

One of the projects involves setting up an information booth (as an adjunct to the main information centre) at the Skyrail/train entry area, manned (or womaned) by a meeter & greeter. This receptionist will be able to give directions or provide brochures to help people choose where they want to go and what they want to see.

The second project is related to this and to the buses issue discussed above. The Chamber is proposing to fund a continuous loop, 10-minute turnaround, bus service that will take a route that benefits all the businesses in town. Visitors should be able to hop on and off the bus as often as they like. Only this bus would be allowed to enter the car parking area outside Skyrail/train and move along Coondoo Street. Any other shuttle bus service would have to move via Barang Street.

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

AN UPDATE ON THE PROGRESS OF THE MAREEBA WILD ANIMAL PARK

The following information was presented to both the Envirocare and Chamber of Commerce meetings by Kevin Evans, Manager of the Mareeba Wild Animal Park in March 2003.

David Gill is the owner of the Park. David also owns a large zoo in the South Lakes District of Northern England called the South Lakes Wild Animal Park (SLWAP). The SLWAP has an extensive collection of animals and is also the head quarters of the Sumatran Tiger Trust.

Construction at Koah has been underway since 2000, after purchase of the 100-hectare property in 1999. The approvals process for permits to import the animals is lengthy and stringent, taking several months per species. Queensland has tight legislation, appropriate due to the fragile ecology of the area. Five species have so far been approved (lions, bears, baboons, cougar and orang-utans) but it is hoped 11 species will have been approved by the time the park is due to open (around June/July 03). The first animals will arrive at the end of April after a minimum 30 days quarantine period. DNR&M, QPWS, and EPA are all involved in the permitting process as well as Commonwealth agencies AQIS and EA. No breeding is allowed as a condition of the permits for at least 12 months and subject to appropriate negotiated amendments to existing permit approvals. This process is designed to further minimise any risks. The Park currently employs six people and this will increase as the Park opens to the public develops in the next few years. This will make the Park a local significant employer. Some 500 unsolicited applications have been received and recruitment will be selected from those who have submitted CVs. By comparison, the Western Plains Zoo in Dubbo (NSW) started up with a dozen staff and now employs over 200 people becoming a major employer and tourist attraction in that region. The MWAP will act as a link between Kuranda and Mareeba and is another drawcard to visitors to the Tablelands. The primary targets will be the self-driver market, organised tour groups and locals. It is hoped the Park will work with local businesses and share souvenir sales and services. It will not compete with existing animal parks in that it will not at this stage display koalas and crocodiles. It will display exotic mammal species and a small representative collection of

native species. Hopefully, it will be able to assist with wildlife rescue in due course when our infrastructure develops and appropriate permits granted. The only other exotic collections in Queensland are at Rockhampton, Toowoomba, Seaworld and a developing collection of small exotic mammals and reptiles at Wildworld in Cairns.

The Park will be open from 9am to 5pm daily but busy times are expected to be around 10am and 1pm.

The Park is not intending to do any major marketing drives initially but will depend on word of mouth and the fact that it is a unique product in the local region. A slow launch/ opening is planned so that infrastructure and services can be tested and modified before large numbers visit the Park. The Dubbo park currently draws 300,000 visitors per year; the Mareeba park is expecting to draw approximately 150,000 visitors in its first year.

The site of the Park is 100 hectares. The lions will roam in a 4ha section through which a small, closed bus will pass. It will not be open to self-drivers. Seven of the lions will come from the UK safari park. There are four dams on the site. The orang-utans will live on a spacious island surrounded by water. Six ringtail lemurs will be coming from NZ.

bringing exotic animals into this bio-diverse region; fears re escape of animals into the wild; fears re exotic diseases being transferred to indigenous wildlife; the difficulty of effectively cyclone-proofing the park; concerns about the water from wash down areas being recycled on to the land and how that could affect sub-artesian water resources; and concern about bringing exotic flora into the orang-utans area to make it home-like for them.

Kevin noted all of these concerns and explained what conditions had been put in place by Council and other government agencies to ensure that the local environment was protected.



In closing, Kevin invited anyone with queries to contact him on 4093 7777.


