The Kuranda District State College (KDSC) held its 2025 AWARDS prevention on Wednesday 22 October, in the beautiful grounds of its Myopia campus.

Principal Natasha Glover addressed the gathered students, staff, parents and community members: "As we close the year, I want to take a moment to recognise our students. Every success, big or small, belongs to them. They are the reason we show up each day. Across the college, students have achieved more than numbers can show. We have seen improvement across all areas of the curriculum. Our primary students have grown in confidence as learners. Our secondary students have pushed through challenges and are walking out with clear pathways and purpose.

We have students gaining early university offers, completing VET certificates and securing apprenticeships. Others have stepped into leadership roles, represented the College in sport, the arts and community events, and shown what respect, responsibility and resilience look like in action.

Learning has extended well beyond the classroom. Excursions across both primary and secondary campuses have brought the curriculum to life. Students explored new places, built real-world connections and deepened their understanding of what they learn every day. This year, NAIDOC celebrations were a highlight. The whole College came together with families, Elders and community members to celebrate culture, identity and pride. The energy across both campuses was powerful. It showed what happens when school and community move as one.

Our students also made their mark in sport. We have experienced individual student success and college team success. The Cross country and Athletics Carnivals brought our community together to witness our students not just competing, but having fun together with their friends and peers. In a first for Kuranda we fielded a rugby union 7's

team for a school competition in Cairns. They trained hard, worked as a team and finished second in the local competition. A remarkable effort for our first season.

Partnerships continue to grow. This year we welcomed Mulungu Health back to the College, providing on-site health checks and early support for students. We are also working closely with Ngoonbi, who have been running regular girls' and boys' groups, building confidence and supporting the social and emotional wellbeing of our young people. Our student Support and Wellbeing Hub is ever-growing with the introduction of our Transitions Pathway Officer this year, a support for our secondary students in their transition from school to work, or further study.

Our One College identity is also growing stronger everyday. We are taking small steps within our college community to enhance student learning experiences for staff, and students from Prep to Year 12 to learn together, sharing celebrations and building pride in who we are and where we come from. These achievements are not luck. They are the result of strong teaching, teamwork and belief. To every staff member, thank you for your commitment. You have lifted expectations and built a culture where every student is known, valued and supported.

We know it takes a 'village' to raise a child and we are all part of this Kuranda District State College 'village'. Parents, carers, Elders and community partners, your trust and partnership have strengthened our village. You remind our students that they belong here. To our students, thank you for your effort, your honesty and your courage to grow. You have shown what learning looks like when it is lived with pride and persistence. As we look ahead, we carry the same focus. Keep showing up. Keep learning. Keep believing that your effort matters. Because it does.

There had been no estuarine (saltwater) crocodiles present in the area until a commercial Saltwater crocodile farm was established adjacent to Two Mile Creek area some years ago.'


Remembrance Day 11 November 2025

Our masthead this month is an aerial photograph by Kevin Explores, of the Savannahlander train crossing Surprise Creek on the Cairns-Kuranda railway line. This photo was taken by Kevin Explores in July 2023.

Sadly, this year, operation of The Savannahlander on the section of railway line between Kuranda and Mareeba was halted due to the poor condition of several wooden rail bridges, which are in need of repairs to allow the track to be re-opened. Currently, Savannahlander passengers are being bussed up to Mareeba to commence a journey which has historically started in Cairns.

To date no funding has been allocated to repairing these wooden bridges and that is a great concern because it would be a terrible loss if what should be a temporary situation, and remedied, became permanent because of a lack of political will to keep the entire length of the historic, and strategically important, railway line open for all rail users.







Councillor Column



In October, the Mareeba Shire Council participated in Get Ready Queensland Week by hosting Dinner and Disaster at the Mareeba Drive In Theatre. It was great to speak to residents about how to be prepared for emergencies, bushfires and the upcoming wet season.

Kuranda residents are no strangers to disasters, with the impacts of Cyclone Jasper still being felt across the region. This weekend, I encourage you to think about what you can do to Get Ready.

KNOW YOUR RISK

- Emergency Dashboard Visit Mareeba Shire Council's website to view the Emergency Dashboard. This is your one stop shop for everything you need to know. From road conditions, fire warnings, flood cameras, Telstra outages, Ergon alerts, river heights, BOM radar, severe weather alerts, fire danger ratings, helpful contacts and more - save the Emergency Dashboard as a favourite page on your computer.
- Early Warning Network Sign up for severe weather alerts to your email or phone by visiting the MSC Dashboard.

Make a plan online so you know what to do when disaster strikes. Consider what you need to do for your family, pets, neighbours, medical conditions and insurance. The Get Ready Queensland website has a fantastic tool to help you make your plan.

PACK A KIT

Have an emergency kit stocked and ready to last at least six days. Many residents across Mareeba Shire were cut off for days during Cyclone Jasper with very limited communications available and many were without power.

Items for your kit may include: First aid kit, toiletries, USB with your important documents, documents (e.g. passport), canned / non-perishable food (be prepared to not have power), drinking water (in severe events, town water can be interrupted), battery powered radio (tune in to the ABC Far North 106.7 FM for updates), torch, medication, tarp, batteries, pet supplies, cash, gas powered stove or a generator, blanket, rain coat, spare clothes, baby supplies, safety knife, safety glasses, rubbish bags, mask, gloves, hand sanitiser and phone charger / power pack.

Let's work together to stay safe this season.

Plenty of things to share this month, starting with the Barron River Bridge. After a lot of advocacy, we have finally got the go ahead to trial night works on the Barron River Bridge throughout November.

The night works trial will run from Monday 3 November to Friday 28 November 2025, shifting routine bridge inspection and maintenance from daytime to 9pm-4am hours to minimise traffic disruption during the day.

During this four-week period, the bridge will be reduced to single-lane traffic overnight, with short intermittent full closures of up to 10 minutes required between 16-27 November. These full closures will pause at midnight each night to allow queued traffic to clear. Importantly, there will be no night work on the bridge on Friday or Saturday nights, when the Kuranda Range Road also remains open to traffic without night works.

This is a big win for our region and something I have been pushing the Minister for Transport and Main Roads on for months now. If the trial proves successful, TMR will consider making night-time inspections a permanent feature of the bridge's quarterly maintenance schedule.



Now, onto the Kuranda Range. Recovery works will continue along the Kuranda Range Road, where repair crews are stabilising more than 30 geotechnical sites affected by last year's severe weather.

To date, 13 landslips have been completed, including major works around Henry Ross Lookout and Streets Creek, with seven more sites expected to be finished by the end of 2025, weather permitting.

The remaining 17 sites are scheduled for completion during 2026.

At Traffic Site 1 (Henry Ross Lookout), five slips have been completed, with ongoing stabilisation on others, including a large downslope site towards Cairns. Traffic Site 2 (Streets Creek) reopened to two-way traffic, while Traffic Site 3 (bottom hairpin bend) is now under one-way traffic control between 7am and 5pm on weekdays.

The Kennedy Highway continues its scheduled night closures (9pm-4am, Sunday to Thursday) until December 2025, with a midnight let-through in both directions. No closures occur on Friday and Saturday nights.

TMR will coordinate to ensure that bridge closures and highway let-through times do not overlap.

Thank you for your patience with these projects, and I will continue to keep the community informed.

I also want to thank Kuranda District State School for their invitation to attend the 2025 Kuranda District College Presentation Evening, and present Bursary awards to these incredible students. Congratulations to all the award winners and to all students for successfully finishing another year (almost!). Thank you to the parents, carers, teachers, support staff and P&C for supporting the next generation's schooling journey.

Finally, the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre is seeking donations of underwear, pantry items, blankets, clothes, and household items, to support those in need, especially in the lead up to Christmas. The Neighbourhood centre is also organising a Christmas Toy Drive. 



BushGuardian AI Camera Training

The WA Murdoch University BushGuardian

AI camera training project continues with two cameras now out of action due to vandalism! No, not human vandals, instead, the very naughty native cat, the Northern Quoll (Dasyurus hallucatus), who is persistent in getting to the lure, a special mixture of yummy oils that mammals find irresistible! The quolls have damaged two units so they are offline getting repairs, with extra strong lure components added this time.

Aside from the quolls, the cameras have captured bandicoots (pictured), bettongs, black-footed tree rats, bush rats and various types of native mouse. The AI is being designed and trained to recognise feral cats and to rule out native species. In future after the training is completed, when the camera detects a feral cat it will release a

dose of poison. The project is funded by

KURANDA WASTE-BUSTERS

COMPOSTING FOOD SCRAPS

This month's challenge: Don't put any food scraps in the kerbside bin.

We have been looking at ways to avoid wasting food. But even if you waste no food at all, you will inevitably have food scrapsthings like fruit and vegetable peels and eggshells.

It is important to keep all food, including food scraps, out of landfill. Not only does food make the landfill stink and attract pest animals, food in landfill produces very high emissions of methane because it cannot break down properly.

There are different ways of keeping food scraps out of landfill. The simplest is composting, which is organic recycling using air, moisture and internal biological heat.

When I was growing up (in Victoria), we had a food-scraps bucket in the kitchen that was My mum, an avid gardener, had to keep an eye on the ratio

emptied daily into the open Composting can be cheap and easy with a second-hand compost pile in the backyard. compost bin and compost bays made from reclaimed materials.

of "greens" (nitrogen-rich things like food scraps, coffee grounds and grass clippings) to "browns" (carbon-rich things like leaf litter, scrap paper and egg cartons) in the compost heap, making sure there was enough "brown" cover material to avoid attracting rats.

When I moved into an apartment in Cairns, I bought a Maze Bokashi bin and spray. Bokashi is a fermentation system where food scraps are kept in an enclosed container and sprayed with organic accelerant so they start breaking down before they even go into the ground. I kept the bin sealed, under the kitchen sink, and used it for all food scraps (including meat and fish). The Bokashi bin produces a juice that drains out of a tap and can be used as fertilizer (when diluted) or drain-cleaner!


Once the Bokashi bin was full, I did simple trench composting: I dug a shallow pit in the garden, emptied the fermented scraps into the pit and then covered them with soil. My "guerilla gardening" in the apartment complex produced a patch of soil that was so healthy it was teeming with worms.

These days, we have a second-hand compost bin in our garden, so everything is contained and doesn't attract vermin (this makes it snake-safe). We collect food scraps in containers in the kitchen and take them out either to our chooks or the compost bin. Chooks are great for processing certain food scraps. You can also try a worm farm (vermiculture) where the worms produce castings, which are excellent for your garden.

It's important to keep compost and worm farms moist, otherwise the organic material cannot break down. If your compost is smelly, add more "browns" (carbon-rich things).

If you don't have your own compost system and you're not ready to start, perhaps you could give your food scraps to a friend who has a compost bin, worm farm or chooks.

Composting allows you to close the loop for your food scraps, feeding them back to the soil, for use in waste-free gardening. And keeping them out of landfill. What a great way to reduce your household's waste!

A Grinter's Tale

It's a little disconcerting that my mobile phone doesn't recognise me. After all, it's lived with me for years. I don't really care, I only wanted a friendship, not a marriage.

It's not like I took the facial recognition password photo first thing in the morning. If that were the case I would fully understand. I only opted to try that method of identification because my fingerprints are swiftly being erased by tapping in the password every few minutes.

Baby Bat Season:

Spectacled Flying-foxes settle into maternity roosts.

The annual baby bat season has begun for Spectacled Flying-foxes as mothers settle into maternity roosts across Far North Queensland, including Kuranda, to give birth and raise their pups.

The Spectacled Flying-fox is an endangered keystone species vital to the health of the Wet Tropics rainforest. Dr Hilary Whitehouse, Chair of the Spectacled Flying-fox Recovery Team and secretary of Bats and Trees Society of Cairns (BatSoc), said the population declined by over 75% between 2004 and 2017, and every pup counts for this species' survival.

"Baby bat season is a particularly vulnerable time. During the first month, mother flying-foxes carry their pup with them as they go out at night to forage. After this time, pups are left in the roost with other pups while Mum flies out to feed at night. Females return in the early morning and spend the day looking after their pups. To minimise pup deaths, the community is being urged to avoid disturbing roosts. These young pups cannot fly at this stage and are unable to move themselves away from danger, and mothers may abandon their young if they become disturbed or stressed."

The first pup was found on 7 September, by 24 October there were 26 pups in care, there would have been more but seven fallen pups were luckily able to be reunited with their mothers. It's dangerous on the ground, because the green ants attack the fallen pups if they are not quickly rescued.

November is the busiest month for pups coming into care. This year, there are considerable numbers in camps in Kuranda and the surrounding areas. We ask people to drive slowly near camps that are close to roads and to avoid walking through roosts during the day, particularly with dogs, to avoid disturbing the nursing mothers and their pups.

Some of these camps are close to people and you may find a bat in trouble. Sometimes, nursing mothers may not return and pups can become orphaned. If you find a pup, or adult flying-fox on its own, low to the ground, please do not touch It, but ring FNQ Wildlife Rescue on (07) 4053 4467.

Look up! You may save a life.

We also urge people to look up!. Flying-foxes caring for young may tire easily and stop to rest from powerlines. While electrocution is usually deadly for flying-foxes, if the flyingfox is female, she may be carrying a pup, and the pup could be alive. Please report any bats on powerlines to FNQ Wildlife Rescue, and trained bat volunteers will check for young and contact Ergon to arrange a rescue.

This season has also seen considerable numbers of little reds caught on barbed wire. During recent windy weather, over 70 Little red flying-foxes were badly injured on barbed wire in the Tablelands, with over half needing euthanasia. Each year, hundreds of flying-foxes and other bats are entangled in barbed wire in Mareeba Shire, including in Kuranda.

There are alternatives to barbed wire, but if you cannot afford to change all your fencing, there are things you can do to make your fence more wildlife-friendly. Top strand options include barbless double-strand twisted wire (barbed wire without barbs) or plain wire.

Leading Recovery

Terrain NRM and James Cook University are currently monitoring populations of Spectacled Flying-foxes using drones, thermal imaging and AI technology to get a clearer picture of numbers and long-term trends, and are currently gearing up for the annual November census.

Dr Andrew Dennis, Project Leader at Terrain NRM, said populations of Spectacled Flying-foxes have been impacted by habitat loss, human conflict and climate change, including over 23,000 deaths recorded in an extreme heatwave in Cairns in November 2018.


"To rebuild numbers, we need to maximise survival by protecting breeding females and their young while also tackling sources of mortality," he said.

"At this stage it is unclear whether populations have recovered after the heatwaves in 2018 but we're trialling new methods which should give us a much more accurate picture of how they're going. We're also mapping their roosts across the region and assessing habitat areas for improvement."

The Kuranda and FNQ community can help by reporting sightings of spectacled flying-foxes to Bats and Trees Society's Flying-fox Watch program. President, Maree Treadwell Kerr said "We are interested in how long spectacled flying-foxes are roosting in camps, and what they are foraging on. We particularly want to know where they are roosting and what they are feeding on in winter.

KURANDA'S TIGER

New species of spiders are classified on a regular basis, but it is rare for something so large and spectacular to go unnoticed for so long. Meet the Tiger huntsman; an undescribed species (that is discovered but not yet formally named and described) which just happens to be one of the largest and most colourful species in Australia. It lives right here in Kuranda.

We found the first recorded specimen of this species in 2006 near Lake Morris while working for the Melbourne Museum. When I first laid eyes on the spider I knew it was something special. It was the kind of spider that you would expect to see on the cover of a spider book, yet I had never seen a picture of it anywhere. Fortunately, we were able to capture the spider and I took plenty of photos. The photos of the specimen were sent to a variety of spider taxonomists throughout the country, but no one was familiar with it. The specimen was sent to the South Australian Museum where a taxonomist who specialised in huntsman spiders was working. He confirmed that it was in fact an undescribed species. Unfortunately, that taxonomist retired soon after and the Tiger huntsman remains undescribed.

As luck would have it, the first specimen we found turned out to be a pregnant female, and she laid eggs several months after she was collected. We were able to raise many of her offspring and display them within the Melbourne Museum's live invertebrate exhibition 'Bugs Alive!'

For the next three years after finding the first specimen, we continued to visit this region looking for invertebrates for the Melbourne Museum. We spent hundreds of hours in the rainforest and encountered an enormous number of invertebrates, but not a single Tiger huntsman.

We moved to Kuranda to live in 2010, and in early 2011 we were contacted by a local couple that had found an unusual bright orange spider in their possum box. They Googled the spider and it led them to us. It was a Tiger huntsman. Since then we have found 13 more specimens, including several on our own property. One climbed in my office window while I was actually writing an article about them. We are also aware of few more sightings. One dead specimen turned up in a fumigated house in Mossman, and a couple more have been photographed in the Daintree region. There is no doubt more people that have seen them without knowing their significance.

We suspect that these spiders are not all that rare, but may spend much of their time in the rainforest canopy. They show great aptitude for jumping, far more so than most other huntsman species. We have observed them moving to the edge of large leaves, spreading their legs wide, and leaping competently to leaves 30cm away. This is a behaviour that species residing on the tree trunks do not exhibit.

Like other huntsman spiders, this species are accomplished hunters. We have observed them capturing moths in midair, and they readily prey on cockroaches, katydids and other smaller spiders. Their reproduction is very similar to other huntsman spiders, producing hundreds of eggs and wrapping them in white disc –like egg sac. Tiger huntsman in captivity often silk together large leaves to conceal themselves while incubating their eggs. We have learnt a great deal about this species in the past nineteen years, but there is still much more to know. The species still remains undescribed, but molecular work on specimens sent to US brings us a step closer to getting the species described. One thing is for sure, though - Kuranda is certainly the home of this elusive species.



The Kuranda History Story Boards Project

In 2022, the Kuranda Historical Society received a grant from the Queensland Museum to create six story boards bringing to life the rich cultural heritage of Kuranda. The six story

- Kuranda Range Conquering the Mountain
- The Barron Gorge Hydroelectric Power Station First in Queensland
- F.P. Dodd the Butterfly Man
- Hippies Kuranda's Alternative Lifestylers
- Timber Industry of Kuranda
- Djabugay Our Traditional Owners (content and images supplied by Djabugay Aboriginal Corporations).

The story boards were initially installed at the KHS Office (old information centre in the ablutions block complex) in Centenary Park. We were hopeful these large history tales would catch the eye of visitors as they traversed the Park and instil pride in Kuranda locals by having these stories told. But sadly, our story boards were barely visible behind the reflections and tinted glass of our office.

Then opportunity came a'knocking - Mareeba Shire Council agreed, as part of their refurbishment of the Centenary Park infrastructure, offered to help us improve the visibility of the story boards. In partnership with Mareeba Shire Tourism, a new home for the boards has been found on the outside of the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre adjacent to the playground. Council and Kuranda Historical Society worked together to have the interpretive boards framed and prepared for exterior conditions and then installed in their new position. Unfortunately, only five panels could fit in this space, however the results still speak for themselves. The Kuranda Historical Society would like to thank Mareeba Shire Council for supporting this project which showcases Kuranda's unique heritage to both visitors and locals.

TAKING THE PRESSURE DOWN

Except for Nature, things have been a little less frantic during October. We've had time to clean up, take stock and plan for the future. Much of our time lately has been taken up with construction, finishing off projects, preparing for the upcoming Wet Season. We've also been planting lots of seeds because it's that time of the year. It is such a thrill to see new shoots come up through the moist earth. It's reassurance our preparation has been correct. We're always learning. The wait for seedlings to emerge can sometimes take 12 months for Licuala and Quandongs but only weeks for Cat's Whiskers and many of the Syzygiums (Lillipillis).

With the strong, steady sunshine, the new delicate seedlings need extra protection and can't last long without regular watering. We are very much in touch with the needs of each plant and we're kept on our toes.

October saw an amazing burst of new leaf growth. Everything looked so fresh and new. It lifts the human spirit.

CASSOWARY UPDATE

It appears that Elvis has lost one of his two chicks. Reports indicate that he has only had one chick with him for the last 3 to 4 weeks. Of course this is a significant loss but not unexpected. The first few weeks and months of their tiny new lives are treacherous. The grass is so tall and they are so small. It's hard to keep up with dad and they make such a nice meal for whatever is lurking in the grass. It is hoped the remaining chick will survive so the cassowary population is maintained.


THE FUTURE

Who knows? Times are uncertain, even in the nursery, with variations in the seasons. We used to expect thunderstorms in October only a decade ago, coming in from the west. It's different now. Temperatures were not so high in September to November a few years ago. Again it's different now. When can we expect substantial rain? We have noticed that some species are not thriving in the changed weather conditions. More questions than answers.

We have chosen not to use mechanical irrigation. In the past we learnt that with irrigation you lost touch with the plants. Everything got the same amount of water and some consistently missed out altogether. Not all plants need the same amount of water. This can be controlled by hand watering. Also, you can weed as you go when you are checking your plants every day.

home. Some people start to consider the future of the trees they have lovingly tended or just watched as the forest grows back over the decades; the return of the cassowaries, birds, butterflies, frogs and all types of wildlife in general.

The longer we stay in one place, the more we think of it as As the bush regenerates, it's on a 500-600 year long journey back to near-pristine forest and those early years of regeneration are vital to the process. If you are thinking you'd like to see the forest on your block preserved into the future, there are mechanisms available to protect it. A Nature Refuge, if your block is big enough and has threatened species, or there's a Voluntary declaration under the Qld Vegetation Management Act which can be established for the next 25 years with a management plan and a record on your title to indicate a declaration, with plan attached, has been made. The 25 year period is not a huge amount of time but the world will be in a very different place and state of mind by 2050. It's a start, and hopefully the opportunity to extend the declarations further into the future will be recognised by future governments as necessary for the future of the wild species that we share this planet with.

> Several Kuranda residents have applied for and achieved these voluntary declarations - it takes time and a little patience but it's not onerous. We're here to help you through the paperwork too. To recognise these declarations, we've devised a simple sign you can place at your gate to show your forward thinking. Combine this with a Wildlife Land Trust sign (free) when you register with Humane Society International / for Animals

> Our area's most recent voluntary declaration has just been placed on a property on Masons Road owned by Laurie Fisk. Even with the declaration in place, covering the land's steep slopes and Platypus creek running through, there's ample open space around his house, shed and dam plus another space suitable for another small dwelling in the future, all while protecting the majority of the regenerating forest. Well done Laurie, for having the foresight and seeing it through.

Plant of the Month:

Alpinia modesta - Modest ginger

This small ginger plant is a tropical local, with mid green foliage and delicate, pale yellow to white flower spikes. The flowers are in loose clusters near to the tip of the leaf stem, adding a subtle touch of elegance under a shady tree. This species grows to a height of 1-1.5 m and spreads slowly by underground rhizomes to about 1-1.5 m. It thrives in partial to full shade in well-drained, moist soil. Ideal for adding a casual spread of greenery to a heavily shaded area.

We are the invasive resist-ants

Focus on business & industry

Does your worksite or community group have a lot of materials moving in or out? You may be at increased risk for spreading invasive ants. High risk activities include:

- Landscaping, garden & raw materials
- Construction and carpentry
- Wildlife parks & native animal carers
- Agriculture & horticulture, including roadside and market stalls.

All of these groups tend to move potential ant 'carrier materials' between different locations, such as soil, gravel, mulch, timber, plants, fruits and vegetation.

Reduce your business risk

If you work with a high risk business or community group, you can take some common-sense steps to help reduce risks:

- Check the AntZone map (bit.ly/4cABq1s) before moving materials This will show you current known infestations of both Yellow Crazy Ants and Electric Ants across the far
- Arrive clean & Leave clean Wash or brush down equipment such as mowers, wheelbarrows, boots and tyres. You may have invasive ants clinging onto these and unintentionally move them to a new site.
- Never dump waste Illegal dumping of green waste and construction waste is one of the top spreaders of invasive ants. Green waste should be composted onsite wherever possible. If you're working in an Electric Ant zone, talk to Biosecurity Queensland about your options for waste disposal.
- Store materials off the ground Ants are more likely to move into materials that are in direct contact with the ground. You can discourage ants by storing materials up on blocks, or storing bulk materials like mulch in trailers or on tarps until needed.
- Get your site checked Book a free property check by phoning 13 25 23 or online at AntZone (bit.ly/4cABq1s).
- Book a free toolbox talk We would love to come and speak with your workers or community group. We will bring live ants, talk about how they spread, and help you make a plan to reduce your specific risks.

Say a Lot With a Little

Most writers have heard it before.

Make every word count.

There is little dispute about this, especially when writing for children, so let's assume that our aim is to say a lot with a little. You need incentive? Pretend that you will be charged 20 cents for every word you use.

Okay, but how do you tighten your writing?

There are many ways to tighten your writing; below are some foolproof fixes that will put you on the fast track.

1. Approach adverbs with caution. Contrary to beginners' belief, the overuse of adverbs (-ly words) does not strengthen writing. It can actually weaken it. To check for these, search for 'ly' in your story. Test each one and try the sentence without it. Does it change the meaning? If not, delete.

Hazel raced up the steps quickly.

If it does change the meaning, try to replace this with a stronger verb.

- a. Hazel drank her thick shake noisily.
- b. Hazel slurped her thick shake.
- 2. Reduce adjectives. Long lists of adjectives can create clarity but they can also interrupt the pace of your story. Keep them under control by cutting back to one or two and trying to integrate the rest of the descriptors into the action.
 - a. The tall, skinny, angry, old nurse stood in front of me.
 - b. The skinny, wrinkled nurse glared down at me.
- 3. Look for common words you don't need. There are some words in some contexts that will never be missed.
 - Up/down.

Parker stood up and left the room. Parker sat down on the throne.

She was so hungry that she ate a green ant.

- Said
 - "You can have it," Cynthia said as she wriggled the snake.

"You can have it." Cynthia wriggled the snake.

Eleanor sprawled across the steps of the library.

Eleanor sprawled across the library steps.

Suddenly Bradford burst into the room

Very, really

Jason was really sad. Peanut was very happy

- Sometimes, Brutus pummelled Popeye. Saw, felt, knew If you are writing in one character's viewpoint, these words are often unnecessary. They will be assumed.
- Nigel felt the cold air surround him.
- b. The cold air surrounded Nigel.
- a. Simon saw a light shining in the tunnel.
- b. A light shone in the tunnel.
- Sonny knew the crocodile waited for him.
- b. The crocodile waited for him.

Check for redundancy

It's easy to use redundant phrases as some of them are so familiar they simply slip off the tongue. These are some of my favourites.

- Round in shape (Round is a shape.)
- Small size (Small is a size.)
- Past history (History is always past.)
- Free gift (Think about it.)
- Completely destroyed (Destroyed is pretty complete)
- Frozen ice (Again, think about it.)
- Off of (Fell off the chair.)
- Write down (When do we write up?)
- 5. Change your sentence structure Sometimes you may need to play a little. Try using dialogue to tighten.
 - a. When Beezle meets a wizard one day and he asks him for a spell that will change his brother into a hippo, the wizard tells him that he can only make him into a hamster as tigers are way too complicated for a junior wizard.
 - b. 'Can you turn my brother into a hippo?' Beezle asks a wizard.

The wizard shakes his head. 'I'm only a rookie. How do you feel about hamsters?'

6. Read your work out loud One of the best ways to check your work for inconsistencies, redundancies and wordiness is to read your work out loud. Listen to the rhythm of your sentences and test each word and phrase to make sure it's necessary.

Fewer, stronger words create more concise prose. Your readers are interested in reading a fast-paced, seamless story. If you still aren't convinced, instead of paying 20 cents for each word you use, pretend you will be paid a dollar for each word you lose.



Toni brought along Judy Zugish, a weaving friend from USA she invited north after they had both run workshops at a recent international weaving conference in Tasmania. 'Threads' was the chosen writing prompt.

Toni's piece went again to the now notorious Beef Wellington lunch in country Victoria in 2023 that contained highly toxic death cap mushrooms. As cook, Erin Patterson now has three murder convictions - her estranged husband's parents and aunt, while her poisoned uncle recovered. Her ex had declined the lunch invitation. Two appeals are underway. The prosecution claims the sentence is 'manifestly inadequate' while the defence team calls the sentence 'excessive'. Toni enjoyed wisecracking about there being a movie series on the subject, which is in the pipeline. She thought perhaps the mushrooms will be the 'fun guys' in this tale. "After all, Erin is no Lady Macbeth. She is awful, but only in her banality. The mushrooms dominate the stage with their fascinating, almost occult powers." Toni said. "One Beef Wellington, thirty years of 'porridge'" she added. A new book called The Mushroom Tapes by three award-winning authors - Helen Garner, Chloe Hooper and Sarah Krasnostein - promises to be an essential analysis of the trial that has gripped the world through riveting podcasts. Due for release by Text Publishing in November, the book may be delayed by the appeals. Toni's second piece was about her own family in Hobart.

Gerard pursued a crime narrative that nevertheless contained humour. Gerard experimented with a different style of writing he wasn't comfortable with but the outcome was well received by the group. While his tale had an unexpected conclusion, it was both emotional and positive.

With our USA guest Judy at the meeting, conversation opened into various aspects of Australia's colonial history that were never taught at school. What does 'Terra Nullius' mean, Judy asked.

A long history exists of unsuccessful attempts to establish native title to land in Australia, most notably the Yirrkala bark petitions of the Yolngu people of Arnhem Land NT presented on painted tree bark to the Australian Parliament in 1963. These were never understood as intended, to assert their traditional land rights. It was the Mabo case in 1992 that abolished the legal fiction of Terra Nullius followed by the 1996 Wik case that found native title could co-exist with pastoral leases. To hear more on this, head to ABC Radio National's extensive archives.

While excluding shameful parts of colonial history is one thing, there is a reverse scenario where well documented history is currently being erased from the record. Such revisionism is happening apace in USA under new executive orders to remove former Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) initiatives. Slabs of non-white history, employment and research is disappearing from websites. Programs across all spheres of government, education, law, science and sport are being defunded and cancelled, and workers fired. Effects limit how slavery and racism can be taught; facts of active service by minorities in the military back to WW2 erased, such as medal of honour recipients of female pilots removed; references to black athletic heroes such as basketballers erased. This is having a chilling effect on job security and discrimination.

At such junctures in history, dedicated curators have often been known to preserve the physical treasures in secret caves and vaults, but it's difficult to imagine in this internet age that all expunged tracts of USA history won't be preserved forever in the Cloud.

Coming back to our own backyard with a thump, the writing prompt for Monday 10 November meeting at 10.00am at Kuranda Library is 'The Wet'. To provoke creativity, this can be taken any-which-way you want. Newcomers will be welcome.

Book Review-Three Wild Dogs and the Truth by Markus

Publisher's Blurb: "What happens when the Zusaks open their family home to three big, wild, pound-hardened dogs - Reuben, a wolf at your door with a hacksaw; Archer, blond, beautiful, deadly; and the rancorously smiling Frosty, who walks like a rolling thunderstorm?

From one of the world's great storytellers comes a tender, motley and exquisitely written memoir about the human need for both connection and disorder; a love letter to the animals who bring hilarity and beauty - but also the visceral truth of the natural world

- straight to our doors and into our lives, and change us forever." This is not a "how to train your dog manual". Three Wild Dogs and the Truth is certainly not a how-to book. It is as the back of the book promises: "an ode to the pound-hardened dogs who have shared the Zusak family home".

I am a fiction reader of espionage, thrillers and fantasy. It took me years after The Book Thief was published to finally read the historical fiction novel written by Australian author Markus Zusak. I, like many others, added Markus to my must-read author list after being captivated by this wonderful novel.

I do enjoy a talking book, so when the audio edition of Three Wild Dogs and the Truth was released narrated by Markus himself, I decided to listen instead of reading. This was a very good decision! There is an added intimacy when listening to a memoir when it is narrated by the author. The emotions - the highs, the lows - just feel more vivid.

As the title promises, Markus shares the life of his family and their dogs in open honest storytelling. From the day the big wild dogs enter his family's lives, to the final moments when they leave, the novel shares the joy, frustration, chaos, laughter and love of owning a pet.

I laughed, held my breathe in anticipation, was horrified and cried. I found every minute I could to pop in my earbuds so that I could listen to the next rollicking chapter of Reuben and Archer's escapades.

Markus draws you in with his writing, making you feel like you are there beside him during the dog's trials and tribulations. You are breathless with Markus after the possum incident, disappointed with him after the, not a few, incidences of violence and laugh along with him at the many comedic moments.

Pick this book up for a read when you need a laugh or when you need a reminder of how wonderful life can be. I have never been a dog owner but am considering visiting the "group home" after reading this captivating story.

A guide to the pronunciation of Djabugay words

is pronounced as the vowel in the (English) words /a/ "some, "come" e.g. **bama** (person) is pronounced like the /a/ sound in "father" but /a:/ longer e.g. **buda:dji** (carpet snake) is pronounced like the /i/ in the word "bin" e.g. /i/ (ear)

the vowel sound is lengthened and pronounced like the vowel sound in "heat", "beat", "feet" e.g. biri: (again)

/u/ word is pronounced as the vowel sound in the English

/u:/

"book" e/g. **mudu** (back) the vowel is lengthened and pronounced as the vowel sound in the words "good", "tool", "rule" e.g. **djungguu**: (behind)

Consonants

The sound is like a /d/ and a /j/ pronounced /dj/ simultaneously e.g. **djulbin** (tree) is pronounced as in the word "gun" e.g. **gindan** /g/ a trilled, or rolled /r/ as in Scottish pronunciation of /rr/

the word "sporran" e.g. **burra-y** (to fly) as in the American pronunciation of /r/ in car /r/

e.g. biri (fire)

is like the initial /n/ in onion, like an /n/ and a /y//ny/ pronounced simultaneously e.g. nyurra (you) as in the word "singer" e.g. bungan (sun) /ng/ when you see the n.g broken by a stop do not run /n.g/

two sounds together e.g. djin.gal (sky) is pronounced as the ng sound in the word "finger' e.g. **nyinggarra** (eel)

/ay/ is generally pronounced as in the English word "eye' e.g. Djabugay

Stress

When saying Djabugay words which syllables

In words of two syllables, the first syllable is stressed e.g. bina (ear).

In words of three syllables, the first syllable is stressed e.g. ganyarra (crocodile).

However, if a long vowel occurs in the second syllable of a word of three syllables, it is stressed e.g. bud<u>a:</u>dji (carpet

In words with more than three syllables, stress falls on the first syllable and on the syllable before the last one e.g. ganyarra - ngu (crocodile).

St Saviour's Thought for November

This month we open our Bible to St Luke's Gospel Chapter 16 and read verses 19-31. In the passage we read about the rich man and the poor man Lazarus. In the passage Jesus asks us

How do we deal with our physical and tangible possessions? How do we deal with our spiritual gifts? And guess what, Jesus requires an answer.


All through this chapter of Luke's Gospel Jesus is talking about us and our possessions. He says again and again that this is one of the most important relationships in our lives, and that we will be judged largely on the way we have dealt with it. He has also been saying that possessions can be both outer and inner. Our relationship to our outer possessions, from which we take so much pleasure, is only an outward sign of our relationship with our inner possessions, our spiritual riches. We can be very rich outwardly and very poor inwardly. We can be poor outwardly and rich inwardly. We can sometimes be rich both outwardly and inwardly, but only if we are prepared to be good stewards of our riches before God. The chapter ends with Jesus telling the story of the rich man and Lazarus. On the surface it is a simple and straightforward story, and we can take a moral lesson from it about the uses of riches. But it has other levels of meaning, most certainly to the men and women of Jesus' time and nation.

To them he was presenting the rich man as an image of themselves, rich and comfortable, but irresponsible and without compassion for others. On another level Jesus was questioning his countrymen's use of their spiritual riches. They claimed a special relationship with God, but how was this spirituality seen in their actions? "Between you and us there is a great chasm." It is not that Lazarus would not go to help, he cannot go. The division is too great, and it is too late. Again Jesus is emphasising the way judgment takes place in human life.

We judge ourselves by making our own choices and living the consequences. When, in the story, the rich man beseeches Lazarus at least to go to his still-living brothers, the answer he gets is a terrible one. They have placed themselves beyond reach, and cannot be made to hear. The terrible truth is that we can by our own patterns and choices place ourselves out of the reach of God. That will certainly not be God's wish for us, but it will nevertheless take place. We are free beings, free to make moral decisions. There is of course always a way back, but only we can choose to take it. Throughout our lives Jesus continually offers us grace to help us to choose his kingship rather than that of the tyrant in each one of us, which we know as the Self. So when Jesus asks us, how do we deal with our physical and tangible possessions? How do we deal with our spiritual gifts? How do we answer?

Damaged Window

The window is being repaired by Klaus Brucksch, an expert in fused & painted stained glass - oil painting.




