Don't Let Electric Ants Get a Foothold in Kuranda

KURANDA RESIDENTS are rallying to help stamp out electric ants in their area. New detections in Fallon Road, Tully Court and Kullaroo Close this month show how easily this highly invasive pest can spread.


Biosecurity Queensland Control Centre's northern operations manager Russell Gilmour said the new finds followed an earlier detection in Kuranda in December.


"The co-operation of Kuranda residents has helped us to fast-track responses to the detections," Mr Gilmour said. We are investigating the possible sources of the new infestations, which will give us an idea of the extent of the spread. While electric ants themselves are slow-moving, they can easily spread though the movement of plants, soil and machinery. A friendly gesture of giving a friend a pot plant is all it takes for this tramp ant to spread. We urge you to check your place for electric ants and if you think you might have them, give us a call on 13 25 23 as soon as possible. We have staff in the area who are available to help."

Mr Gilmour said Tablelands Regional Council was undertaking a kerbside collection of green waste. "We advise Kuranda residents that collection may be delayed by about a week in some cases because we are treating waste from their area to eradicate electric ants. The council advises that Kuranda residents can take any green waste to the Kuranda Transfer Station where it will be treated and subjected to ongoing monitoring."

"Electric ants (Wasmannia auropunctata) are incredibly small, but despite their tiny size, they have a sharp sting that can cause irritation for up to a week. If they get into your pet dog or cat's eyes, they can cause a painful sting and possibly blindness. They are a threat to native wildlife as well and we need to make sure we safeguard our rainforest areas. We recently learned of a goanna that was blinded by electric ants and it had to be put down. Look everywhere – under leaves, rocks and even litter. Electric ants are known to climb trees and tropical garden plants and get into houses and caravans. They can move on water and several people have been stung in and around their swimming pools."

Dear Kuranda Paper ... Cyclone Warning

Wow! We were lucky with Cyclone Yasi and our thoughts go to those on the Cassowary Coast. The notion that Kuranda is somehow immune from serious cyclone damage needs refuting. Neither the low Kuranda Range hills nor a "kuranda kosmic karmic kone of spirituality" is going to stop a determined cyclone.

The Cairns Post of 4/2/1920 reports on a cyclone – "At Kuranda the damage was indeed very severe. Remiltons Hotel was partly unroofed. Hunters residence was unroofed; Dodds' Hall was moved off the blocks, and portions of the residence unroofed. The School of Arts was blown down, and was completely wrecked. Pierce's Hotel was unroofed, and the Carruthers' family lost their verandah. Harriman's house was blown down. K. Beavis's house was blown off its blocks...The Mantaka school was blown off its blocks, and the shelter shed blown away...R. Veivers' house was blown down. Mr. Smith's residence was also demolished. The goods-shed, station roof and refreshment rooms also suffered severely."

A photo in the book "Kuranda. 1888-1988" by Shep Humston on P.10 shows "Devastation at Mona Mona 1920" referring to the same cyclone hitting the then Mission about 20kms north of Kuranda.

Also, the cyclone season is not over! Three of Queensland's worst cyclones have occured in the month of March:

a] 4 March 1899. At Bathurst Bay north of Cooktown a cyclone caused a massive storm surge on a pearling fleet killing about 307.

b] 10 March 1918. Almost all buildings in the Innisfail/Mission Beach area demolished. About 100 dead.

c] 20 March 2006. Cyclone Larry crosses coast at Innisfail.

Hopefully no more cyclones will hassle us this year but in general over-preparation is better than being under- prepared.

Gardening in Kuranda



March – The heavy rains post-Yasi certainly tested gardening skills and property for capacity to prevent soil erosion, water-ponding and soil compaction. The wise gardener usually mulches garden beds not only in the Dry to conserve moisture but also prior to the Wet to prevent soil compaction and slow down run-offs. Judging by the colour of water to creek and road from many properties, considerable soil is being lost to severe rains. Remember that soil from your property once it runs into waterways is usually lost forever. Like the old saw that one day's weed seeding makes seven years' weeding – the careful gardener takes zealous preventive action to conserve their soil. A sound tip is if any bare soil not yet planted up, mulch thickly to prevent run-off, compaction and weed infestation.

The prudent gardener will also usually be reluctant to dispose of any plant material from their garden preferring to compost and return to the soil rather than dumping. It is important that persistent weeds and easily propagated vegetative growth like Syngonium is well and truly "cooked" by placing in a black baggie and placing in a sunny spot

Another responsibility to be taken seriously is regular checking of ponds and any receptacles holding water for mosquito infestations. The introduction of native blue-eye or for the less ecologically minded (and by far a cheaper proposition) – the humble guppy – taking care that same are not released to waterways.



Plant of the Month

Worthy of consideration for any garden with dappled to shady situations is the Anthurium. This large family with an estimated 600+ species comes from Central and South America and ranges in habitat from coastal to mountain forest – temperature range may be a factor in the growing of some species e.g.: A. corragatum.

The major consideration in successful growing of all Anthuriums is to consider that many are epiphytic (growing on or in tree trunks and branches) some are lithophytes (growing on rock) and others, forest floor dwellers. As a general rule of thumb then, full attention and should be given to good drainage and very open and humusy soil mixes. One old local grower reported that early days successful growing was in 50/50 coarse river sand & rice-hull mix with annual repotting.

Another consideration is plant growth with some species growing to considerable size in leaf and/or nest form as well as scandent and pendulous growths.

Probably the best known Anthuriums are the many hybrid forms of A. andreanum and A.scherzerianum because of their colourful spathes. Sometimes known as the "Flamingo Flower" or "Boy Flower" - referring to the structure of the spathe and spadix, these are well known for their utility as long lasting cut flowers with the Dutch introducing an amazing range of colours and spathe sizes.

However, the real gobsmack jaw-droppers are to be found in the ornamental leaf species with an infinite range of leaf shape, size and some amazingly beautiful patterning.


Recommended to start you off, easily and cheaply obtainable and of relative ease of cultivation are the trio of A. crystallinum (terrestrial), A. veitchii (the King Anthurium – a scandent epiphytic) and A. warocqueanum (the Queen Anthurium, also scandent epiphytico). Often grown from seed, there is wide variation in colour intensity and veining/ruffling of leaf and it pays to look over stock carefully.

A good local source is Equatorial Exotics carrying a large range of species, illustrated on their site at http://www.equatorialexotics.com/

Another great and inspiring site is Rainforest Exotics developed by the late great Steve Lucas who did so much to inspire and teach at: http://www.exoticrainforest.com/

The only drawback with this family is that they quickly become addictive.

TIP: Newcomers to the area should seriously consider joining the Kuranda Garden Club. Not only do you meet other keen gardeners but have the opportunity to see great gardens in the area and learn what plants do well and how to cope with the many new trials and tribulations facing gardeners coming from other climes.



The Way it Was (Part 5) by Peter Rylo

This is the fifth instalment of the article "The District of Cairns" from The Cairns Post 23 July 1890.

The District of Cairns

By our own Reporter (Continued)

Near the end of the second section but over the other side of the river are situated the homesteads of Mr. Garrett and his two sons. These selections although near the railway line are so situated that the difficulties of getting to them are manifold and great. When Mr. Garrett first arrived in the neighborhood he spent two months in endeavoring to cut a track to his land, but the country was so rough and so many gullies and creeks had to be passed, that the attempt was given up in despair. These selectors appear to have had an uncommonly hard time in fighting with the difficulties they have had to contend against, both Mr. and Mrs. Garrett being taken ill at the most inopportune time, and Mr. Garrett meeting misfortune in other ways. Now, however, a boat over the river conveys everything to the selection. The Divisional Board is clearing a road up the river from the Middle Crossing, but except for packs it cannot be anything but impassable. During floodtime the numerous creeks are backed up and the crossings rendered extremely dangerous. As far as I could see Mr. Garrett has done his uttermost to fulfill the spirit of the Land Act.

The area cleared is 20 acres, and now there are five acres of corn in. Last year there were 15 acres of corn, but Mr. Garrett assured me that it did not pay for pulling, the cost of getting it off the selection being so great. There are a quantity of fruit trees consisting of mangoes, oranges, citrons, lemons and limes and all are looking well. An enormous amount of work has been done by these selectors. Scrub has been fallen on each of the three selections, but the largest item so far is the work done in endeavouring to get to the selections and settle down thereon. Whoever selects on the banks of a river in mountainous country must expect a certain amount of trouble and expense, which need not be incurred by those on the plains or tablelands, but it is patent that a great deal could be saved when in the first instance the lands are taken up and surveyed.

One of the most highly improved selections on the top of the range is that of Mr. G.W. Monk. This property situated near the Barron Falls with a mile frontage to the main Thornborough road and a half a mile frontage to the railway, is dignified with the euphonious name "Moscotte." The really handsome residence erected here by Mr. Monk is built of that beautiful timber known as silky oak. It is two-storied with front and back verandahs. The internal arrangements are exceedingly pleasing and comfortable, the drawing room upstairs deserving mention on account of being unique. It is ceiled, and papered with wall-paper of neat pattern with a dado and skirting board. The piano and other "town" furniture on the Brussels carpet gives it a look of one of the houses of merry England without the fireplace. Outside, Mr. Monk has been none the less complete in his operations. Thirty five acres have been cleared and planted with fruit fit for manufacturing purposes --- that is to say lemons, limes and citrons. But very few oranges have been planted, for Mr. Monk believes that very quickly the local demand for oranges, mangoes, &c., will be satisfied and the markets will be clotted, but in the case of fruit that can be manufactured there must always be an unlimited demand. Besides, says he, very soon we shall have a jam factory here and then these fruits will have a good and ready market. Apples are being tried as an experiment and besides Mr. Monk has put in peaches, pears, figs, nectarines, nuts, quinces, English potatoes, and different grasses. Rather extensive experiments are going on concerning grasses for fodder and chaff, but I do not consider it fair to give the results, although Mr. Monk most generously told me all he had done in that direction. I must not omit to mention that all Mr. Monk's 35 acres of fruit trees are seedlings which have been treated to the root pruning and transplanting process. That these are the trees for North Queensland becomes more patent every day. They cannot however be called seedlings proper, as they nurtured and attended to. A seedling, one would imagine would be a plant raised from a seed and put in the ground and not touched for years. Then climate and soil would have their sway, the fruit would be sour and the tree about 20 years old before it produced much fruit. These seedling trees under notice are transplanted several times while in the nursery, and each time the roots are pruned. They are treated with manure, watered every day, kept free from pests of every form, so that in reality they require more manual labour than grafted trees and therefore are more expensive. To form the ground-work for future water supply and irrigation, Mr. Monk has erected a waterwheel and numps in a running stream at the back of the house and the water is numped

a distance of 10 chains (200 metres), up a stiff hill to the back yard where a threequarter inch stream is discharged. The waterwheel shows that great ingenuity has been at work on it. It is built of silky oak in a light yet strong manner. Of the type known as the undershot wheel it requires but a small stream of water to turn it and develops a remarkable amount of power. The motion is communicated to the force pump by means of a beam action. A crank on the spindle of the water-wheel moves a beam hung in the centre, the further end of the beam in its turn moving the pump. By this excellent arrangement the wheel is made to do its work at the moment when it is developing the most power. The creek has been dammed up with boulders and bags of earth, and a low concrete wall will be built across to provide more water if necessary. The wheel is placed on the inner side of the creek just below a turn, and therefore any debris or logs coming down will miss the apparatus altogether. To further provide for the safety of the wheel in case of flood, Mr. Monk has erected a boom which reaches over the wheel and hauls it up with tackle out of danger when required. I was shown a piece of machinery called a "devil" used for pulling down trees. One end is anchored to a stout tree and the chain fastened half way up the tree to be pulled up. The chain is then tightened with a long lever which multiplies the strength of one man 120 times. The whole affair works upon a combination of the 1st and 2nd order of levers, and might prove serviceable in certain localities. However, it seems that the best scrub exterminator or forest devil for North Queensland scrub is the axe.

Fowls and pigs disport themselves in comfortable domiciles, and everything that ministers to the wants of a household seem to have been done by Mr. Monk. Bees swarm, vegetables flourish, flowers bloom, creepers climb, and altogether a budget (as big as Goaschen's) of improvements have been effected, rendering the place a very beautiful one.

RINDERMAN: "Grinderman" Nick Cave and his fellow journeymen all get equal billing here. Guitar, bass and drums pulling this thing along like a freight train. Full FX on the guitar; and a fat driving bass and solid pounding drums. But it stills belongs to the Caveman. Wolfish, dark and sardonic and the lyrics full of weird images. Emotional roller coasters and dark beauty. Hard, intelligent, stark poetry. Some sections of driving monotonous rhythm that give the nod to Velvet Underground, Hawkwind and the acid days and some very limi-like waa-waah.

If the Nick Cave genre stands like a dark mountain in

The pace is slow (some might even say boring) and gentle with the occasional sweet guitar line and always, the swirling

Many artists change course during their lives but the personal style, and precision of their work, still shows through in the new direction. Kuranda glass artist Judy Davies is no exception. Enroute to her 'studio' to talk with Judy about her beads, I passed a tall cabinet filled with the most beautiful porcelain dolls. Each handmade in 'another life' and each face its own delicate work of art. The embroidered and smocked dresses are worthy of a place in the Victoria and Albert collection. But Judy's talents progressed to hand-made glass beads, equally as beautiful and precise; their creation now well established in her current art practice. On the table lay a handful of wires with variations of blue beads atop, elegant in the extreme, waiting to be removed and polished.

Where is your current studio?

I work at a large table on the back verandah at my home on the edge of the rainforest in Kuranda.

Do you work alone or with others?

Usually by myself as my torch is very noisy so it is difficult to hear conversation when the gas is on. Also, if I don't concentrate I am likely to burn myself.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Good ventilation and lighting, a gas torch and a work bench, a kiln and lots of colourful glass. I also have a fire extinguisher and Aloe Vera at the ready.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

During the summer months I can only work in the evenings, if they are cool enough. The winters of North Queensland inspire, motivate and enable me to also work in the daytime. I then make use of every opportunity.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

I design and create jewellery with glass beads. The process involves melting coloured glass rods over a torch (a hot head torch - naked flame), and winding the molten glass around a steel mandrel to form a bead of varying shapes and sizes. Sometimes I add silver or gold leaf or frit (crushed glass) to the bead for extra effect.

Why is working with glass your chosen medium?

I love the rainbow colours, the inexhaustible combinations and shapes. It is challenging and ever changing. Further down the track I would like to extend to making free form glass sculptures.

List three things you listen to while working.

The sound of my torch as it controls the melting process, my son's cockatiel (which has a lot to say, and loudly), and the rainforest birds – when the torch is off.

Your favourite tool?

There are three. Firstly my marver. (Judy produces a handled graphite paddle, light but well balanced). I use this tool constantly to shape, squash and reshape my bead or to roll them in frit (crushed glass) or metal leaf. Although not perhaps my favourite, but certainly very important, are my torch, which I cannot work without, and my crockpot of vermiculite to slowly cool down the finished bead to avoid cracking.

How do you identify your work?

I do not mark my beads, although they are very easily recognisable to me. Your hand-made work usually is. I have to rely on identification tags or a card on my finished pieces of jewellery.

How do you sell your work?

Through galleries and I am a regular at Yungaburra and Tanks Markets. Also by word of mouth, sometimes the best selling point.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No, I don't, for the same reasons as in your second question – the noise and responsibility. Using this equipment can be a dangerous exercise for the uninitiated. However, if I was asked to demonstrate or teach in a suitable and insured venue I would be happy to do so.

What do you do with your seconds?

I melt them into cabachons for earrings or pendants or I gift them.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

I am a volunteer at the Kuranda Arts Co-operative gallery and at the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre.


If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I would love an air conditioned room providing me the ability to create all the year round. A better and quieter torch which runs on propane and oxygen would be great. I would be able to hear my phone.

If you were not working with art what would you be doing?

More than likely pottery. Certainly something hands-on with which I could express my emotions. I rather fancy the thought of freelance photography.

"In The Tropics: Great Houses Extraordinary Lifestyles"

Eugenie Navarre Cairns, 2010 ISBN 9780 98079 5004 \$29.95

Eugenie Navarre is a Cairns author and freelance journalist who has written and compiled this new book. It had its launch in December last year. She has developed a great interest in the unique heritage and history to be found in north Queensland and the people that live here. Her first book was on the story of the cane barracks to be found in sugar plantations in the north for housing the cane cutters. This new book explores the houses and lifestyle of some north Queenslanders.

Well illustrated, it tells the tale of the dreams and philosophies of selected people who have chosen to express themselves in unique housing styles, going beyond the imported suburban urban development that reflects southern, quarter-acre preferences.

As Eugenie states, the book is a north Queensland journey to discover unique town and outback dwellings, exotic tropical castles and our grand pioneering past. It is most often a story of uniqueness, of the unusual, of the unconventional, as owners and builders have sought to architecturally express themselves in new ways while still trying to do so within the constraints of narrow building regulations and the need for comfort (and in a few cases, perhaps unfortunately, the demands of institutional building financiers such as banks).

Usually the stories in this book reflect a quest for that which is appropriate and comfortable to meet the tropical conditions encountered. They also often reflect the use of locally available materials, such as rocks and local timber. For example, there is one entry of an earth-covered house.

This is not to say that the chosen dwellings do not display outside influences. The designs chosen sometimes incorporate such influences as the typical elevated Queenslander, tin mining cottages, left-overs from the war and the pastoralist homestead with wide-verandahs. But there are also some overseas influences evident, from castles and Bavarian houses to art deco, domes and Balinese styles.

Diversity is apparent, which with adaption, proclaims that individuality is the key. It says something about north Queenslanders, particularly for those living outside the cities; they are not entirely like their southern cousins. They tend to be more individualistic, more self-sufficient, more aware of their environment, less conventional, perhaps even more creative.

There is one entry in the book for Kuranda, being the home of Ulrike and Roger Quinn. Other localities covered include Atherton, Ravenshoe, Tolga, Chillagoe, Babinda, Herberton, Mossman, Malanda, Yungaburra, Mareeba, Rocky Creek, Mt Garnet, Daintree, Georgetown, Innisfail, Charters Towers and Karnak. Some homes are those of famous people such as Xavier Herbert and Diane Cilento. Some of the homes are of outstanding design, others are typical of a period past. Most are still lived in, in some cases by senior citizens who were pioneers themselves. All the entries tell a story.

Dr Jan Wegner, a James Cook University lecturer with an interest in heritage matters, and who has a particular interest in the Kuranda area, writes of the innovative nature of northern builders from the 19th century onwards. They built for the climate. But she notes that from the 1970s, southern styles of housing were dumped on northerners with no concessions for climate.

Fortunately there are still enough examples of earlier housing styles, and innovation has not entirely disappeared. Commenting on this in the Foreword, Dr Stephen Naylor, a James Cook University lecturer, states that the challenge is to reflect upon the rapid development over the last 30 years and to recognize the impact of alien architecture inappropriate to the northern conditions.

This is a book for those looking for building ideas, for those interested in northern history and heritage, for those interested in tropical adaptation and for those who are interested generally in northern issues and its ways of life.



A reminder about living with cyclones!

Kuranda escaped the massive Category 5 Severe Tropical Cyclone Yasi, on 3 February, 2011. But are you prepared for the next one?

BEFORE THE CYCLONE SEASON

http://www.bom.gov.au/cyclone/about/checklist.shtml

- Check with your local council (www.trc.qld.gov.au **1300 362 242)** or your building control authority to see if your home has been built to cyclone standards.
- Check that the walls, roof and eaves of your home are secure.
- Trim treetops and branches well clear of your home (get council permission).
- Preferably fit shutters, or at least metal screens, to all glass areas.
- Clear your property of loose material that could blow about and cause injury or damage during extreme winds. In case of a storm surge/tide warning, or other flooding, know your nearest safe high ground and the safest access route to it. Prepare an emergency kit containing:
- A portable battery radio, torch and spare batteries; recharge all batteries;
- Water containers, dried or canned food and a can opener; matches, fuel lamp, portable stove, cooking gear, eating utensils;
- Masking tape for windows and waterproof bags;
- First aid kit and manual, plan for necessary medications including special needs for babies, elderly and pets;
- List of emergency phone numbers on display.

Check neighbours, especially if recent arrivals, to make sure they are prepared.

Check your house and contents insurance, check your car insurance.

Gather together all copies of your personal information including Identity documentation.

WHEN A CYCLONE WATCH IS ISSUED

36 hours to prepare

- Re-check your property for any loose material and tie down (or fill with water) all large, relatively light items such as boats and rubbish bins.
- · Fill vehicles' fuel tanks.

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- Check your emergency kit and fill water containers.
- Ensure household members know which is the strongest part of the house and what to do in the event of a cyclone warning or an evacuation.
- Tune to your local radio/TV for further information and warnings. See below.
- Check that neighbours are aware of the situation and are preparing.

WHEN A CYCLONE WARNING IS ISSUED

24 hours to prepare

Depending on official advice provided by your local authorities as the event evolves the following actions may be warranted:

- If requested by local authorities, collect children from school or childcare centre and go home.
- Park vehicles under solid shelter (hand brake on and in gear)
- Put wooden or plastic outdoor furniture in your pool or inside with other loose items.
- Close shutters or board-up or heavily tape all windows. Draw curtains and lock doors.
- Pack an evacuation kit of warm clothes, essential medications, baby formula, nappies, valuables, important papers, photos and mementos in waterproof bags to be taken with your emergency kit.
- Large/heavy valuables could be protected in a strong cupboard.
- Remain indoors (with your pets).
- Stay tuned to your local radio/TV for further information. See below.

ON WARNING OF LOCAL EVACUATION

- Based on predicted wind speeds and storm surge heights, evacuation may be necessary.
- Official advice will be given on local radio/TV regarding safe routes and when to move. See below.
- Wear strong shoes (not thongs) and tough clothing for protection.
- Lock doors; turn off power, gas, and water; take your evacuation and emergency kits.
- If evacuating inland (out of town), take pets and leave early to avoid heavy traffic, flooding and wind hazards.
- If evacuating to a public shelter or higher location, follow police and State/Territory Emergency Services directions.
- If going to a public shelter, take bedding needs and books or games for children.
- Leave pets protected and with food and water. http://www.trc.qld.gov.au/disaster-management/pets-livestock.

WHEN THE CYCLONE STRIKES

- Disconnect all electrical appliances. Listen to your battery radio for updates.
- Stay inside and shelter {well clear of windows) in the strongest part of the building, i.e. cellar, internal hallway or bathroom. Keep evacuation and emergency kits with you.
- If the building starts to break up, protect yourself with mattresses, rugs or blankets under a strong table or bench or hold onto a solid fixture, e.g. a water pipe.
- Beware the calm 'eye'. If the wind drops, don't assume the cyclone is over; violent winds will soon resume from another direction.
- Wait for the official 'all clear'.
- If driving, stop (handbrake on and in gear) but well away from the sea and clear of trees, power lines and streams. Stay in the vehicle.

AFTER THE CYCLONE

- Don't go outside until officially advised it is safe.
- Listen to local radio for official warnings and advice.
- Check for gas leaks.
- Don't use electric appliances if wet.
- If you have to evacuate, or did so earlier, don't return until advised.
- Use a recommended route and don't rush.
- Beware of damaged power lines, bridges, buildings, trees, and don't enter floodwaters.
- · Heed all warnings and don't go sightseeing.
- Check/help neighbours instead.
- Don't make unnecessary telephone calls.

Oils ain't Oils...

A bit of a confusing topic... buying the right cooking oil is almost like choosing a bottle of good wine, it pays to look and choose very carefully!

GOOD OILS are those that contain 'essential fatty acids' (EFAs). In my opinion this is one of the most important supplements for health and beauty because the little membrane that surrounds and protects each cell in our body is made of

If our cell membranes break down or weaken, it can result in chronic inflammation, degeneration and ageing of cells.

EFAs are not made by our bodies, so we have to get them from food. There are two kinds – the Omega 6 and Omega 3 fatty acids.

They are both extremely important for Inflammation, Hormones, Cholesterol, Skin, Hair and Nails, Circulation and the Heart!

The main problem we have in our modern diet is that we automatically consume a great deal of Omega 6 foods, but not enough of the Omega 3s.

Omega 6 is found in almost all vegetable oils and seeds, nuts, eggs, meat, cereals, whole grain bread and more.

Omega 3 is found mainly in the humble Walnut, Flaxseed oil and Fish like mackerel, sardines, tuna, salmon (Eskimos don't suffer from heart disease!).

The normal western diet has a ratio of about 20:1 for the Omega 6 to the Omega 3, whereas the healthy balance is supposed to be about 4:1. Studies show that this imbalance can cause disease.

What about the BAD fats and oils? Of course there are the saturated fats that we all know about, like fatty meat, full cream dairy, butter, fried foods etc. It pays to reduce those to be healthy and slim, but there is another kind of really bad fats called 'Trans Fatty Acids'.

The bulk of them are found in margarine, shortening and processed foods and oils used for cooking in the Fast Food Industry - nicely hidden in yummy cakes and biscuits! Also, watch for the words 'hydrogenated vegetable oil' - it means the oil

has been made solid, which increases the shelf life, but in the process has become toxic to us.

So, what to do? Buy yourself a bottle of Flaxseed Oil from the health food store (it doesn't have to replace your bottle of 'Red'!). It has the highest amount of Omega 3 fatty acids (needs to be kept in the fridge), take a spoonful every day or use in salads. Alternatively take a couple of good fish oil capsules a day.



Use Virgin Olive Oil as your main cooking oil, it has the most Omega 3 and least Omega 6 and is high in mono unsaturated fatty acid (doesn't get rancid very easily). Our humble Macadamia Nut also produces excellent oil and can be used alongside in your kitchen (available at the old Kuranda Markets or Woollies). Replace them for the Canola, Sunflower, Safflower or Soya Oils and Margarine. Don't forget to eat

Born in 1924 in central Queensland, the daughter of a cane farmer, she went to primary school at Foxtail, Proserpine and then Blackheath College in Charters Towers to junior level. She had an early involvement with arts and crafts and remembers going to the local show with her father, the head steward, in a horse and buggy. She worked with a local solicitor until employed at a local bank (another bank declined to employ her on a policy of no women employees).

She married in 1947 to a local cane farmer Roy Matsen who worked a property with a brother. The farm was too small for two families, so her husband bought a run-down farm on his own further out of town. It was very hard work

and initially they had no vehicle. They were typical of the early hard-working people that developed the north. It was in this period that Emily joined the local CWA for the first time and became quite active. They also had a daughter during this period. Their first contact with Kuranda was during a holiday up on the Tablelands at a time when the high level Barron River bridge was being built.

Roy had some illness so they decided to sell up in Proserpine and move to Kuranda, which they particularly liked. They purchased several hundred acres in Myola with an old elevated house on it and moved up in 1967 to live. Roy ran cattle. Unfortunately he passed away after some time in Kuranda.

Kuranda Village at that time was only a small place, but Emily remembers that the people were very friendly and helpful. The train was the main mode of transport to Cairns, although the Range Road was not too bad. She recalls a grocer shop, butcher, service station, two official pubs, post office, the old primary school and a police station with one officer. There were no doctors to begin with. The chemist had a business in Cairns but you could leave your prescription at his house. She thinks there were local movies. There were no arts and craft shops or cafes at that



time although a few tourists used to come up. She recalls many Aboriginal people living a more traditional life in the region, although when the Mona Mona Mission closed some were moved to Palm Island.

Emily particularly remembers the late Mrs Grace Veivers, known as "Aunty Grace", who was extremely friendly and was instrumental in getting Emily involved in the local CWA. So continued Emily's long association with that organisation, both in an official capacity (variously Treasurer and President at different times) and in many of its activities. She has won many prizes for her arts and crafts and received various awards. And not so long ago, she was awarded the 50 year membership pin.

Although originally attending the Presbyterian Church, in Kuranda she joined the Anglican Church. With the arrival of Father Chris Wright, she became a member of the new Church Committee and has been Treasurer ever since. She is still closely involved with the Church and supports the Welcome Pocket development, for which she says there is an

urgent need.

Emily recalls the arrival of the hippies to Kuranda, the start of the local markets and the beginning of local ashrams and communes. She was a bit shocked initially by their dress and way of life and did not have a lot to do with them, but accepted that they were all children of God. Kuranda began to change with them. More tourists came to the Village and new businesses started.

Emily now lives in a ground level house, built after Roy passed away, on her property in Myola and close to her daughter. She has two grandchildren. She no longer drives a vehicle so is not so active. She is a quietly spoken lady, sincere and friendly. A person of strong but simple Christian beliefs, she regards all people as God's children even though very different. Her faith assures her of a spiritual life after death and she is content with the Divine will.





HIS month is all about beginnings (and endings). Why is this so? Well, almost all the planets are cusping between Aquarius and Aries. A Thought for March

THIS month we open our Bibles to St Luke's gospel Chapter 5 and read verses to 11. As we watch Jesus move towards Simon's boat and climb into it we might ask ourselves a question. What in my life could Jesus use? Are there things I may not think a great deal of, things I take for granted, which I could offer my Jesus? Could he use some of my time? Could he use some of my money? Could he use some of my professional gifts? These things are to each of us what Simon's boat was to him.

"Put out into the deep water and let down your nets". Simon is nonplussed. They have just had a frustrating night: they didn't catch a thing. However, Simon pulls out into the lake, probably expecting to say "I told you so." What happens shakes him to the depths of his being. They are inundated with fish; so much so that they have to yell for help?

What would it mean for you and for me for Jesus to say to us "Put out into the deep and let down your nets?" He might be saying that he wants us to invest ourselves in areas where we are holding back. He might be saying that he wants us to invest more, risk more, contribute more to our marriage, or our job, or our children or our own spiritual journey. He might be suggesting that if we don't expect more we will certainly not

Simon responds to the great catch by feeling unworthy. He has done nothing to deserve it. But, come to think of it, when we look at the various blessings we have been given, can we really say that we deserve them? If there is any truth in that thought, then perhaps it is time for us to bow down to Jesus and acknowledge our unworthiness, as



Peter did. Our Lord's great generosity and love toward us will fill us with a sense of gratitude, and will give us a sense of great joy. I know that this may sound too simple, yet the good news of Christ is essentially simple! Jesus said that unless we can be childlike, which surely includes simplicity; we can't even see his kingdom.

If Jesus said to his disciples "You will be catching men," and if we claim to be his disciples today, what can this promise mean for us? It will mean different things for each of us. But surely it means for all of us that we find some way of communicating to others that faith in Jesus Christ is an important factor in our lives. After all, if you or I discovered something of immense help to us, wouldn't we share it with others for whom we care? If Jesus used Simon's boat, what ordinary and taken-for granted elements of our lives could he use?

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

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"Electric Ants in Kuranda"

You may have heard about the Electric Ants infestation discovered in Kuranda over Xmas. All the Kuranda nurseries, including the Envirocare nursery, have been cleared of harbouring these ants. This was a major concern for us as Kullaroo Close, Kuranda and Monaro Close in Myola both have established

Reddish in colour and small like the little sugar ants you get inside, but very slow moving. Unlike other ants which appear to be on fast forward, especially when disturbed, these ants are the "turtles "of the ant world.

For the environmental risk they pose and to learn more about them, see the feature article in this edition of the Kuranda paper.

<u> "CYCLONE YASI - Cassowary Survival Appeal"</u>

Thanks to our volunteers not one plant was damaged in the minor impact sustained in Kuranda. All the plants were taken off the racks and placed on the ground, no doubt protecting them from foliage damage.

The social and environmental impact further south of us is immense. In 2006 in the aftermath of Cyclone Larry, a large percentage of the Mission Beach Cassowaries died of starvation, were killed by vehicles or attacked by dogs as they came to search for food.

Cyclone Yasi, has had an even worse effect, if that's possible. For the first week or so, Cassowaries were able to eat fallen fruit on the rainforest floor. Now that's run out, there will be no falling food for the Cassowary until the rainforest recovers, which could take

18 months or more. Feeding stations have been set up and aerial food drops started. This will be a huge ongoing effort for some staff and many volunteers in the area. With government funds stretched, private donations are needed to support this feeding program, literally for cassowary survival.

Yasi: We are all so fortunate to have "dodged" Yasi and thankfully our beautiful area has come through relatively unscathed. Thanks to our local emergency volunteers and the SES (more members are always needed!) for all their help. Our southern neighbours have sadly borne the brunt of the cyclone damage and the Tablelands Council has been assisting in the Cassowary Coast area with vehicles and staff to support both the initial response and the continuing recovery efforts. Some parts of the TRC area were also quite badly affected and Council workers who have been helping in those areas. Council is conducting a full review of Disaster Management. Many things worked well, but there are some areas for improvement. I know that there was great confusion in the Kuranda area regarding Evacuation Centres and I have made sure that the concerns of Kuranda residents will be discussed in the Review. Council has also established a great Facebook page for disaster events, so use this communication if you can. Donations to the Disaster Relief Fund can still be made.

Community Planning Meetings in Speewah and Koah: Consultation for Council's new 10 Year Community Plan (a requirement of all Councils to guide Council plans and budgets over the next 10 years) is coming soon. You really need to have a say on this as it includes all issues that affect you. (whatever they may be.. roads, housing, services, communications, environment, planning issues etc etc) Really important to add your input via the Facebook page and/or attend the meeting in your area. You will see signs up soon, plus notices in your mailbox. Dates as follows: Koah: March 1st, at the Koah Hall, Speewah: March 23rd, at the Rural Fire Shed at Ros Common, Kuranda Indigenous

community: June 16th, Kuranda area: June 28th Kuranda Parking and Traffic Review: Many people have raised concerns about parking and traffic movement in the Kuranda Village; some of you have received parking tickets; many of you get frustrated at the lack of parking near the Post Office; pedestrian safety issues are common. Council has funds in the Kuranda Parking Reserve and has now agreed to undertake a parking and traffic study to work out some solutions and plan for improvements. In the meantime, parking regulations do still apply, so be careful where you park and for how long.

Kuranda Infrastructure Plan: If anyone is interested in reading the report on the \$6m Kuranda Infrastructure Plan, you can download/read it at: http://www.trc.qld.gov.au/my-community/kurandacommunity. The 10 Year Plan maps out how the

Kuranda Infrastructure Funds will be allocated. Projects include upgrade to the Visitors Centre, Development of the Riverwalk, an Indigenous Tourism precinct and upgrades to the Amphitheatre. These projects are planned over 10 years, so it will take some time. The funding also depends on visitor numbers to the Village, so the costings are estimates only.

Speewah Digital Television Switchover: Along with the Speewah Residents Association, I have been working towards a solution for Speewah residents to manage the switchover to Digital Television later this year. Council has agreed to upgrade the Re-Transmission site at Speewah so that residents will be able to access digital services. The next Residents Association Meeting (April 4th) will be able to provide more information or you can contact either Bob Madden or me for more details. The Manager of Telstra Countrywide has also agreed to come to that meeting to discuss mobile reception in Speewah.

Speewah Road upgrade: Good News. After some funding glitches, funding is now confirmed for the upgrade to Speewah Road. I am very hopeful that this work will be undertaken before the end of the financial

Kuranda Library new appointment: Welcome to Ann Thompson who has been appointed as the new Coordinator at the Kuranda Library. Ann will join Roz at the Library very soon.

Optus Telecommunications Facility at Koah: Council has approved an application from Optus to construct a telecommunications tower at Koah.

RLCIP Projects: Round 3 of the Commonwealth funds for Community Infrastructure have been received by Council. The projects in this round include development of a playground at Kowrowa, (with walking access on Myola Rd) as well as safety compliance work at Block C at the Kuranda Community Precinct. These projects follow Round 2 projects at Ros Common at Speewah.

Closure Barang Street: Unfortunately Barang St has had to be closed while repair works are carried to a collapse in the road surface and drainage. It should reopen soon.

Water Main Cleaning Program in Kuranda: As a part of the regular maintenance program on water supplies, the water mains cleaning (air scouring) will be carried out in Kuranda between March 7th and March 28th.

Extension to Kuranda Visitors Centre: As a part of the Kuranda Infrastructure funding program, the Kuranda Visitors Centre will be extended. The current Centre is very small in area and the extension will enable visitors and volunteer staff a little more room, plus the opportunity to develop an interpretative area for visitors. The building plans will be developed over coming months and works will probably commence next year.

International Women's Day March 8th : March 8th is International Women's Day and this year is the 100th Anniversary of the celebration. The TRC hosts a function each year to celebrate the event and this year the function will be in Kuranda! So ladies (and gents) please come along. Details will be advertised.

Community Consultation for Kuranda Community Precinct: Council has now approved funding for an independent Consultant to do a consultation throughout the Kuranda community about the old school site. The new name for this area is the Kuranda Community Precinct. Council received 9 applications from Consultancy firms and have appointed the firm Engagement Plus. The firm is Brisbane based, with an excellent record in community consultation and sound methodology. The Consultants will start work soon and the consultation is expected to take place during March/ April / May). A wide range of consultation methods will be used, so that everyone can have their say. There will be lots of info coming out soon. Yes, this costs money, but it is very important that we get a clear picture of all the different views about this. Also important that we have an independent consultant. I am very confident that the independent consultation will draw together all the different viewpoints in the community and that we will end up with a clear view of what this community wants and needs and what is realistically possible.

Kuranda Office: The small office in Rob Veivers Drive has now closed. My office is now housed in the Kuranda Community Precinct (Block C at the old school), however there is no public access yet until the fire safety and compliance work is completed (early 2011). In the interim, I will still be available to meet with residents/ groups at the Kuranda Library (not when the Library is open) and I am always available by phone or email.

Council Meetings: Council Meetings in March will be held on Wednesday March 2nd in Mareeba and Wednesday March 16th in Atherton. Anyone can attend. Requests to address Council can be made by contacting the Mayor's Office.

Insurance

This wet season has been particularly severe and with two months of cyclone season and wet weather to come, now is the time to check your insurance is up to date and that you understand what is covered by your policy. All insurance policies are different. Although storm or rain damage is covered in almost all home and contents insurance policies, some home and contents policies specifically exclude floods. Also, the definition of flood varies considerably from insurer to insurer. If you are in doubt about your coverage, get advice. If you have made a claim but you feel you have been treated

unfairly you can appeal with the insurance company, take your claim to the Financial Ombudsman Service

High rainfall this season with more to come creates the ideal conditions for dengue mosquitoes to breed. Please remember to take precautions such as wearing insect repellent and reduce breeding sites that hold freshwater such as buckets, old tyres, tarpaulins and black plastic, pot plant bases, vases, boats, tin cans and plastic containers, roof guttering, rainwater tanks with damaged or missing screens, birdbaths, drain sumps, fallen palm fronds and coconut shells.

Electric ants may delay Kuranda green waste pick-up

The recent discovery of electric ants at Kuranda may cause some delay in the collection of green waste in the area following Cyclone Yasi.

Tablelands Regional Council is currently undertaking a kerbside collection of green waste, but residents are advised that in some instances, collection may be delayed by approximately one week due to the treatment of this waste by Biosecurity Queensland for the eradication of electric ants.

Biosecurity Queensland is undertaking regular surveillance and treatment for electric ants, and asks the public to be on the lookout for tiny ants with painful stings.

To date, the ants have been located in Fallon Road, Monaro Close and Kullaroo Close.

The ants favour hiding under debris, stones, leaf litter and rotten trees and limbs rather than establishing distinct nests. They are about 1-1.5mm long and are golden brown in colour.

The ants can inflict a painful sting and inject venom that can cause painful itchiness, persistent pimples and occasionally a severe allergic reaction. They are also known to sting the eyes of pets and cause blindness.

Free mulch available at waste transfer stations

Tablelands Regional Council is offering free mulch to residents in the wake of Cyclone Yasi.

The mulch has been generated from the massive amount of green vegetation being collected from across

Residents can bring a ute or trailer to waste transfer stations to collect their free mulch at the following places and times:

Kuranda Waste Transfer Station: mulch will be available on Saturday 19 February all day from

Mareeba Waste Transfer Station: available at any time the transfer station is open.

Long-distance bus shelters to be established

Sites for two long-distance bus shelters and the architectural style of the facilities have been approved by Tablelands Regional Council. The shelters will be established on the Kennedy Highway at Walkamin and Tolga, at sites where buses currently pick up and drop off passengers.

The shelters will provide passengers with a high degree of protection from adverse weather conditions and will cost approximately \$7750 each. It is hoped the shelters can be manufactured by local fabricators to provide local businesses with an opportunity to benefit from the project.

Council supports Men's Shed proposal for Rocky Creek Igloo

Tablelands Regional Council has given its support to the Rotary Club of Atherton for a proposal to convert the Rocky Creek Igloo into a "Men's Shed".

The proposal comes after Council relinquished its responsibility for the land and structures on the World War II site, due to the costs associated with upgrading the building and complying with the Queensland Heritage Act 1992.

The Rotary Club proposal would require the land to be designated as a Community Purpose Reserve. Council will advise the Department of Environment and Resource Management that it supports the creation of the reserve and for it to be leased directly to the Rotary

Council will also commence negotiations with DERM to allow for the existing water and power infrastructure to remain on site to benefit any future trustees of the site and for the Rocky Creek Rest Area.

Kuranda Parking Review

A comprehensive traffic and parking study within Kuranda's central tourist district will be undertaken to

identify where future parking facilities may be located.

A previous report to Council identified a number of issues to be considered including the location and allocation of loading zones for service vehicles, increased local bus services and the need to expand pick-up/set-down areas, limited parking for motorhomes, and a limited number of parking spaces close to the retail area.

The report indicated that between 1500 and 2000 vehicles were entering and leaving Kuranda via Rob Veivers Drive each day between 7.00am and 6.00pm, but noted that all these vehicles would not require parking in the central business area.

Council agreed to call for expressions of interest from consultants to conduct the traffic and parking study.

Kuranda to be consulted on **Community Precinct project**

Tablelands Regional Council has engaged consultants, Engagement Plus, to undertake a comprehensive community engagement program to determine the views of residents about the future use of the former Kuranda Primary School site.

The consultation program will take about eight weeks and provide the Kuranda community with an opportunity to give its views on what is now known as the Kuranda Community Precinct should be used for.

Divisional Councillor Jenny Jensen said she was very pleased that an independent consultant had been engaged to carry out the project.

"The idea of a Kuranda Community Precinct is long overdue and we need to find the best way to use the old school site," she said.

"I am very confident that the independent consultation will draw together all the different viewpoints in the community and that we will end up with a clear view of what this community wants and needs and what is realistically possible."

Council was made aware of the desire for additional community consultation on the project after a public meeting held in October last year. Following the meeting, Council resolved to halt work on the site until further consultation was carried out. Meetings of the Kuranda Community Centre Advisory Committee were also deferred until the consultation phase has been completed.

The consultation will include one-on-one interviews with community organisations, government agencies, commercial operators, and local groups; a forum aimed at enabling residents to hear the issues from different points of view and weighing the consequences of their choices from both a cost and benefit perspective; on Online Survey; and a hard copy survey.

Residents will be advised the start date of the consultation process via the quarterly Kuranda Community Precinct newsletter due to be distributed in March.

Upgrade for transmission towers to provide Digital TV to Speewah and

Tablelands Regional Council will upgrade the retransmission facilities at Speewah and Chillagoe to enable residents to switch onto digital television.

Speewah will be first cab off the rank, with the analogue signal to be switched off for that area later this year, while Chillagoe will be done at a later date to cater for its switchover in 2013.

Council was given the option of taking up the Federal Government's Viewer Access Satellite Television (VAST) system which would place the onus on residents to put in their own satellite dishes with a subsidy provided by the Government to assist with installation. However, Council was told residents would be up for \$300 to install the system for one television set only and additional sets would come at further cost. For commercial businesses such as hotels, pubs, and caravan parks, no subsidy is provided.

There were also concerns that satellite TV would not provide residents with a reliable service, as the signal would be affected during rain events.

Another concern was the inability by tourists, specifically grey nomads, to access television services in Chillagoe without having their own satellite dish and tuning that into the signal.

Council will write to the Federal Government to advise that it will not be taking up the VAST option. Instead, Council will upgrade the re-transmission

facilities and will seek funds from different sources to reduce the overall cost of the upgrade to the resident. Council will advise residents in due course as to the final cost and how that will be recouped from users of the services.

Green Waste pick-up post cyclone Yasi Tablelands Regional Council wishes to advise residents that it is continuing to pick up green waste from the kerb as a result of Cyclone Yasi.

Council is asking residents who have NOT had their green waste picked up by Thursday 24 February afternoon, to call Council on 1300 362 242 and register their address. Council expects that all green waste will be picked up by 4 March.
