CONCERNS FOR KANJINI FESTIVALS

One might wonder how a development, including the holding of noisy festivals, could have been approved right next to the serene Emerald Creek Falls

In 2022, Kuranda Region Planning Group had a long discussion with Council about how, despite MSC 2016 Planning Scheme requirements, ecological assessment reports were not included in development applications. Kanjini's MCU/22/0002 was named as an example. Because of the many environmental values on the property and to safeguard them from negative impacts of development, an expert report would have been necessary, at the very least, to determine noise impacts on wildlife.

I then was pleased to see that Council requested an ecological assessment report on 13 September 2022 as per Confirmation notice and amended Confirmation notice 2 March 2023.

However, I was unaware that in the response to information request on 5 November 2023, the applicant made some unqualified comments in respect to environmental concerns and an ecological assessment report was not supplied. Council obviously was satisfied with the word of the developer (the old case of letting the fox look after the hen house) and issued an amended Confirmation notice on 14 November 2023, no longer requesting and ecological assessment report drafted by a qualified expert.

Consequently Council approved MCU/22/0002 on 16 October 2024 with insufficient information, which now is apparent in the conflict between Kanjini and The Agile Project. Noisy festivals are not compatible with wildlife.

I hope Council will do something to reverse this ludicrous development approval as it was based on a flawed assessment process?

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FEDERAL ELECTION – SATURDAY 3 MAY 2025 8AM TO 6PM

VOTING IN KURANDA (POLLING DAY ONLY) Kuranda CWA Hall, cnr Barang and Thongon Streets

All Australian citizens 18 years and over are eligible to VOTING ON ELECTION DAY vote. Voting is compulsorv.

You can vote at any polling place in your state or territory on election day. Polling places are open from 8am to 6pm. To find your nearest polling place visit aec.gov.au/where

When you arrive at a polling place, a voting official will ask for your full name and address, and whether you have voted before in the 2025 federal election.

- Your name will be marked off the electoral roll.
- You will be given a green ballot paper for the House of Representatives and a white ballot paper for the Senate.
- Follow the instructions on your ballot papers to complete them correctly or ask a voting official for help. Once you have completed your ballot papers, place them in the correct ballot box.

To vote for a Member of the House of Representatives (green ballot paper) you are required to write the number '1' in the box next to the candidate who is your first choice, and the numbers '2', '3' and so on against all the other candidates until all the boxes have been numbered, in order of your preference.

To vote for the Senate (white ballot paper) you need to either:

- · number at least six boxes above the line for the parties or groups of your choice, or
- number at least 12 boxes below the line for individual candidates of your choice.

EARLY VOTING as we go to print – Thursday 1 May and Friday 2 May remain for early voting. Note there is NO early voting available in Kuranda.

This month was a busy one with plenty of Easter celebrations and Anzac commemorative services. It was great to hear so many attended the Magical Easter Egg Hunt on Easter Sunday and I enjoyed catching up with many locals at the annual Anzac service dinner at Speewah Tavern, and at my mobile office held at Cafe Suzi on Coondoo Street.

Although it's always nice to take the drive up the Range, I am disheartened to see so many small business owners and residents struggling. Vandalism, attacks on tourists, public drinking, small business thefts and break-and-enters, it's clear there is a lot to do in this space. I've spoken to the locals and the owners and it's evident. We've all had enough. I know there are many conflicting sides to what can be done, but there is something that everyone can do and I hope everyone can agree on doing. This is to report any crime you see to the police.

I've been told that many small business owners don't bother as it doesn't do anything. I get this. But, in order to push for more police assistance, housing and facilities, we need incident reports. **We need every single incident to be reported.**

So, I am urging all small business owners and residents to report the criminal activity to the police. Vandalism, broken windows, car thefts, stolen goods, even public nuisance. 
Now, onto one of the hottest topics of the month – the Barron River Bridge. I know everyone is eagerly waiting for work to commence on our new bridge and I feel the same way. But this is a process.

The Crisafulli Government has completed its first step in delivering a new Barron River Bridge by securing \$245 million in the Federal Budget. I welcome the funding from the Federal Government, something the former Labor State Government was never able to achieve, nor did they put any money in the State budget for it.

Our Government's first State Budget will be released in June, and I am confident we will have the remaining money allocated for this vital project. Please remember that Labor had over 10 years to get this done and they didn't do it. We are in the final stages. It's been less than 200 days since our Government and I were elected and we will honour our election commitment which was to deliver a new Barron River Bridge.



A Heartfelt Thank You from the Amphitheatre



Artist Profile – Sarah Watson

Introducing our newest artist who joined the Gallery in April – Sarah Watson. Sarah is a ceramic artist originally from the south-west of England, and has been living in Far North Queensland for the last 20 years.

She is inspired by the nature around her home and memories of her childhood garden which was filled with cottage garden flowers.

Sarah makes organic flower forms, sculptures and vessels using mainly a hand-building process. She mostly prefers to leave pieces unglazed to highlight the raw, tactile beauty of the clay and see its natural, colour, texture and matt finish.

Sarah is currently studying a Diploma of Visual Arts and continues experimenting with new forms, techniques and processes.

Can you describe your artistic style. What is your preferred medium, and why? My style is organic, nature-inspired and sculptural. My medium is porcelain and dark clays.

What motivates you as an artist? I'm motivated by beauty in nature. I also find it relaxing working with clay, it's a time to slow down and be quiet.

Describe the best piece of art you have created? My favourite piece is the *Titan Lily* (or corpse plant).

What artists inspire you and where do you find inspiration? Two artists that inspire me are Vanessa Hogge (www.vanessahogge. com) and Sandra Davolio (www.sandradavolio.dk). Both artists create beautiful flower-like sculptures. My inspiration comes from nature and plants and flowers found locally, and memories of my parents garden.

How do you learn new skills and/or techniques? I have been lucky to spend some time in the last couple of years studying ceramics at TAFE with an amazing teacher, Olivia Azzopardi.

What has been the most challenging, and rewarding, part of being an artist? When you

make pieces with clay you never know if they will survive the kiln, this part is both challenging and rewarding!

What do you like to do when you're not creating art? Gardening.

Can you describe your studio/workspace and your favourite time of day to create? My workspace is on the side of our house overlooking the garden. Mornings are the best time of day for me to work.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) would like to remind road users of changes to Kuranda Range Road night closures. TMR understands many road users travel during these holidays and have factored this into the reconstruction program.

There is no scheduled night closure on Sunday 4 May

or possible to open the road during ongoing works, night Site 3 (multiple slips) closures are continued.

TMR will continue to provide updates to road users based on the progress of works or where significant changes in site conditions, closures or traffic management are required.

TMR would like to remind road users

- Streets Creek area
- Additional soil nailing and shotcrete works have been completed to stabilise the embankment.
- Rockfill embankment works will commence in April 2025 pending weather and site conditions.

Night closures will continue as previously advised from Monday 5 May 2025 until December 2025:

- 9 pm to 4 am on Sunday to Thursday nights.
- No scheduled night closures on Friday and Saturday.
- Scheduled traffic let throughs from top and bottom of the range at 12 midnight.

TMR will continue to notify road users of changes to traffic control and night closures.

For the safety of road users, traffic control measures and single lane measures will remain in place.

Night closures are necessary for certain reconstruction works to be undertaken safely.

"Come on, come inside, and no, no, don't pee on your brother's head."

It suddenly occurred to me while uttering this the other day, that these are not normal conversations one has outside one's gate, and maybe my neighbours are too polite to suggest I need help.

This is what happens to you when you live with animals. Anything goes. I mean, peeing on someone's head is not acceptable behaviour in anyone's books, and the last person you would do it to is the oldest member of the family who wouldn't even notice because he has had two strokes, is away with the fairies and deaf. You can't let that go without saying something.

After a decade of foster failing rescue dogs, and rehoming dozens of compromised horses, I finally decided it was time to buy a young horse for me and a puppy, a border collie to replace Boo, the little rescue border collie that passed just before Christmas at the age of 15. She is sorely missed, apart from the high pitched bark that accompanied her latter years and made my every re-entry into the driveway a nightmare. She was also deaf, so I supposed she had no idea how loud she was.

I can't imagine a life without dogs and horses. Well actually, that's a lie. I frequently dream about how I would spend the fortune I would have amassed over the years had I not had so many animals.

And then there are the friends I might have retained, had they not been unimpressed by the time I spend entertaining and exercising said animals and making excuses for staying at home that make me seem agoraphobic. The truth is, I just can't bear to see three sad faces staring at me as I drive away.

Or the social faux pas presented by them. I recall an old skydiving friend coming with her family to stay with me at Clifton Beach. I hadn't seen her for years, not since we used to rough it over many a weekend camping on the drop zone in the Hunter Valley in our younger years, sitting in the dirt around the campfire and eating potatoes straight from the ashes. And then probably licking our fingers. They were funny days. Us gals used to lift a wetted finger to the wind in the morning and if we felt the slightest zephyr cool our fingers, we would opt for a wine tasting at the local vineyards rather than risk flying with the pilot who had spent last night imbibing at the local Aero Club and liked nothing better than to dive bomb the drop zone for a laugh.

The boys not on that jump run would line up for a 'mooning' as the plane soared over a couple of metres from the ground, while the poor jumpers on the first morning run prayed for redemption from death or the loss of last night's Chinese dinner, not necessarily in that order. I recall our pilot flying so low one day that the row of 'moonies' became like a little mountain range as they all fell flat on their faces when the plane appeared to be hell bent on taking them out. It was not a sight to behold.

The first run of the morning was always late, while nerves and last night's medley of chow mein, sweet and sour pork, flied lice and wine sent jumpers running back to the

long drop dunny before taking their uncomfortable kneeling position in the cramped Cessna.

> Anyway back to the story, I'm not sure what happened in the intervening years, but it appeared I had welcomed the Von Trapps to my abode. All immaculate, ready to burst into song in unison, albeit without a mountain for inspiration, designer suitcases, each family member clinically clean with stain free, ironed clothes from head to underpants, and definitely not used to the tropics. That was evident by the look of disgust at two geckos mating on the living room wall. I made a mental note to shoo the wee lizzies and strip the beds and iron the top sheet and pillowcases while they were out at the beach.

I wilted rapidly during the ensuing two weeks of being told I had the wrong clothes pegs, my swimming pool needed a shade, my windows needed cleaning, and I should wash my hands every time I came in from outside. There was a frog in both the downstairs toilet and the bathroom so I was asked to please keep both doors shut to make sure they did not frighten the kids, or God forbid, jump onto a kitchen bench. I was sorely tempted to plant one of those cute little pottery ones on every windowsill and maybe in a guest bed.

Not only that, my pans needed replacing, the sofas were uncomfortable and I spent too much time walking my dogs and tending to the horses and not enough sharpening my

knives, which were all blunt and useless. Good job they are, I thought. I was counting down the days to murder with a blunt instrument when catastrophe struck. I walked into the kitchen to face four people in total apoplexy. They turned to look at me accusingly. The daughter looked like her head would swivel on its axis, and my old friend appeared to be gagging. Her husband looked decidedly nervous waiting for his wife to implode. As it was, she sort of exploded.

"There's a dog hair in your butter! A DOG hair!!!!".



Thankfully they left the next day and the dogs and I sat around the dining table to debrief, sharing a large bowl of Chum.

There is that old saying about liking dogs more than people. I don't subscribe to that theory, but mmmm, I look at the world and do consider that dogs have a lot going for them that many humans haven't and I seem to be more acceptable to people who like animals. I suppose that could be taken a few ways...

Projects progress – Focus on Jumrum

Another of our 2023 projects is coming to a successful close, with the installation of another component.

Bin ya butts!

To protect our beautiful waterways and wildlife

If you've been in Kuranda village recently, you may have noticed a newly installed cigarette butt bin in one or more of 12 locations.

Kuranda Envirocare secured funding for 12 cigarette butt bins, to install in key sites in the Kuranda village centre. After meeting with Mayor Angela Toppin and CEO Peter Franks, it was agreed that after Envirocare sourced funding for the bins, Mareeba Shire Council would be responsible for installation and ongoing maintenance.



Strategic locations for the bins were identified, with a focus on points in Kuranda where cigarette village smoking and storm water drains were co-located. The ground around these areas typically experiences a lot of butt litter, which is likely to enter the stormwater drains. The drains contain baskets to catch litter, but

they generally won't catch things as small as butts, which will then the wash out to waterways like Jumrum Creek and the Barron River. Cigarette butts

may be little, but they can also be lethal to wildlife. Littered cigarette butts leach toxic chemicals into the environment, such

as arsenic (used to kill rats)

and lead, to name a couple, and so can contaminate water. The toxic exposure can poison fish. Cigarette butts are often mistaken as food by fish, birds and other wildlife, and they can cause serious digestive problems or even death. This can be prevented by simply binning your butts!

Drain stencils will also soon appear throughout Kuranda village, promoting this message.

Many thanks to Kuranda Envirocare member Sarah Rizvi, who was the project manager for this component.

Thank you also to Kuranda based artist Zachary Barclay and Tableland Yidinji artist Dan Joseph who collaborated to create the designs which you can find etched onto the butt bins, and Traditional Owner Dennis Hunter who provided the message in Djabugay. Also to Jacob Grundling from Mareeba Shire Council and Adric Rusch from TRACQS, who collaborated to install the bins.

Celebrating 10 years of action!

In April 2015, Kuranda residents concerned about the limited resources available for yellow crazy ant control organised—under Russett Park resident Mikhaila Jacoby-to form the Kuranda Yellow Crazy Ant Community Taskforce. Kuranda Envirocare secured funding through a Terrain Natural Resource Management grant to support the Taskforce's activities and provide a part-time paid coordinator.

Local fundraising—including \$10,000 from our very own Kuranda Paper-kept the Taskforce going and supported critical research by James Cook University.

In those early days, Taskforce volunteers conducted field surveys to better understand the infestation, made and set out traps to monitor ants, and even treated areas under the close supervision of the Wet Tropics Management Authority (WTMA). What a great example of local grassroots action!

In recent years we have been fortunate that the State and Australian Governments have provided stable funding for the Wet Tropics Management Authority's Yellow Crazy Ant Eradication Program. This allowed Taskforce volunteers to focus on education and monitoring. The Taskforce has continued to play a big role in keeping yellow crazy ants in Kuranda 'on the radar' for government partners.

Saying farewell to the Taskforce model

The Kuranda Yellow Crazy Ant Community Taskforce has been hugely successful, not just in controlling these invasive pests, but also in raising community awareness and support. Let's celebrate that success!

At the same time, we recognise that the taskforce model no longer really reflects our activities. We no longer have a group of committed volunteers. Instead, activities are now organised and led primarily by the Taskforce Coordinator (currently Rachel Reese).

in the Kuranda community, and we will continue to need volunteers to help with big events. Residents in treatment areas will liaise directly with WTMA rather than going through the Taskforce Coordinator.

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

Protecting our inter-generational food-plant seeds

Yardlong beans and Mouse melon

Yardlong beans are growing longer every day. I wonder if they will turn into a yard long or this is just a name for a long bean? One yard is 91.44cm and our bean is 90cm at the time of writing. This is indeed interesting. Yardlong bean of the Leguminosae family is also called Chinese long bean or asparagus bean. I am only hoping that these beans will grow to maturity before the wildlife make any discoveries.

To harvest the bean for seed saving, the pod has to dry out on the plant. The bean seeds originate from Jane Lawrance also known as Jane Many Leaves. Jane lives in Babinda and has been growing organically, open pollinated seeds for many years. We quite often receive seeds from Jane as she is a keen seed saver herself and one of her wonderful missions is to share these seeds.

Saving seeds from crops you have grown adds another tier of joy to gardening. There is a lovely sense of satisfaction when you see your plants through to the next generation. Then there is the brilliant promise that, if the variety has done well at your place, its seeds are also likely to do well. Perhaps even better, because it carries the genetic memory of adaptions to your garden's unique conditions.

This is exactly what I am experiencing at the moment growing Marjorie Spear's bean. After a few generations of this bean in my garden in Koah, it is now longer and fuller with bigger seeds.

My Mouse melon is growing vigorously at the moment. Mouse melon is also known as Cucamelon or Melothria scabra. It is a small fruit that resembles a miniature watermelon and has a taste similar to cucumbers with a hint of sourness. It is a fast growing vine and can soon take over your garden so keep it trimmed. I eat it raw and sometimes pickled. To harvest for seed saving, pick the largest ones, cut them open and squeeze out the seeds into a glass jar. Remove

any pulp. Add water and let seeds soak for two days. Rinse once a day. Then dry on piece of paper. Label and store.

I have been wondering! How do plants know when it's time to do things, like grow or flower, setting fruits and creating seeds? I read somewhere that plants are very good at tracking time. They need to produce their flowers and fruits for maximum impact. No use putting on a glamorous floral display when your insect pollinator is still a grub and unable to flutter from plant to plant.

Makes sense to me so I will continue to make garden observations.

Testing and maintenance works Barron River Bridge Kuranda 6-30 May 2025

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) will continue testing and maintenance works

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on the Barron River bridge near Kuranda from Tuesday 6 May until Friday 30 May 2025, weather permitting. The works are part of an ongoing testing and monitoring program to ensure the bridge remains safe and operational while TMR works on a long-term solution for the bridge.

Crews will be on site between 7am and 5pm (including Saturday and Sunday). Changed traffic conditions will be in place during the works, including a single-lane operation of the bridge. Traffic controllers will monitor queue lengths and working hours will be adjusted if required. From Monday 19 May until Friday 30 May 2025 short, intermittent full closures of up to 10 minutes will be required between 9am and 3pm.

Variable message signs (VMSs) will be in place to inform motorists about the changed traffic conditions. Any changes to the date of works will be posted on the VMS.

Motorists should expect minor delays and plan their journeys accordingly.

We'd like to thank road users for their patience while we carry out these important testing and maintenance works.

SHAPELY HUNTERS

Spiders come in all manner of shapes and sizes. One group that breaks the 'standard spider' mould are the Triangular spiders (*Arkys species*). While not all members of this group are truly triangular in shape, they all certainly fall into the unusual spectrum of spider forms.

Triangular spiders are quite small and if it wasn't for their bright colours they would often go unnoticed, however, with bright red, orange and yellow adorning their bodies they often catch the eye.

Like all spiders, Triangular spiders are predators, with insects and other small spiders making up their diet. They are ambush hunters that do not use a web to catch prey, instead sit and wait patiently beneath leaves or hanging from silk lines for prey to come within striking distance.

When prey approaches, these little hunters snatch them up with their powerful and spiny front legs. Once in their clasp, the prey is bitten and injected with venom. Like the vast majority of spiders, their venom works well on their invertebrate prey, but has little or no effect on us.

Locally we have three species of Triangular spiders which are commonly encountered. The most common is *Arkys lancearius*, which is true to its name and has a distinctly triangular-shaped abdomen that is deep red and adorned with white and yellow spots. These little jewels become more common as the weather warms up and are often seen hanging beneath leaves and can remain in the same area for quite some time.

Another species here in Kuranda is *Arkys cornutus*. It is orange-red in colour with an abdomen that resembles an arrow head. Its deep red-coloured head has two horn-like protrusions that extend out at either side.

The third local species, *Arkys furcatus*, has an abdomen more like a lampshade than a triangle. It has enormous spines on its front legs which form a cage of sorts when it captures prey.



Kuranda's Big Cassowary

The countdown is on until we launch Kuranda's Big Cassowary. The project has been split into three steps in order to create a developmental story for the Big Cassowary life cycle and implemented over a longer period of time.

Step 1 – The Big Cassowary will be set up in Centenary Park, Kuranda in the second half of 2026 with an interpretive sign showing all the local artists involved, the story they will paint on the cassowary, as well as all the sponsors, supporters and collaborators.

Step 2 - After the launch of the Big Cassowary, some eggs will be added - one unhatched and the other a cracked egg with a chick looking out.

We have been instrumental in having the Kennedy Highway speed limit reduced to 60kph near Top of the Range where we've lost generations of cassowary chicks to vehicle hits. Love us or hate us for that, since the speed reduction in this area, we've had no more hits.

Design matters for Steiner school development

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Voice – Vague but Vital

Voice is an elusive concept, but we tend to throw the term around freely.

We're looking for a fresh voice. It's important to develop your voice.

We also hide it in the middle of a list of similarly vague terms.

Pay attention to the tone, mood, voice and style. Make sure your style, tone and voice are consistent.

What is voice? Ask half a dozen writers and you could get six different answers. I am giving you mine. I have two – the author's voice and the character's voice.

The author's voice

The easiest way for me to define the author's voice is with a visual.

Let's pretend your story is a stack of pancakes. The ingredients you've used – flour, egg, milk, salt, butter – are the elements of your story. You combine plot, characters, dialogue, setting, and conflict and spoon the mixture into a pan. It cooks; you turn, fiddle and adjust the heat. When they are golden brown and your mouth is watering, you flip them onto a plate and admire your work. Your story is complete. Or is it?

You take your first bite, expecting culinary perfection. It's okay, but something's missing.

Voice.

Voice is the rich syrup that soaks into the crevices and the pores of your story and flavours the entire experience.

Three tips for finding your author's voice

Be yourself. Your voice is your personality. It's how you creep into your stories and become familiar to your readers. This may have to do with your chosen topics, structure, language or even settings. Your voice is as unique as you are.

Choose topics or storylines that are important to you. Avoid writing a book because you think it might sell. If you have no interest in werewolves, don't even try it. They will not cooperate. If small aliens bore you, run away. They won't work for you either.

If, however, you have dreamt about a fantasy world where children are in charge, adults follow orders and Labradoodles take care of all menial labour, create it. If it means something to you and you love the concept and possibilities, dive in. Your passion will inevitably soak into your writing.

Write as you speak. This can be difficult at first and often intimidating but trust yourself. You are the only person who can write like you.

A great way to practice this is by free writing for at least ten minutes a day. Let your thoughts pour onto the page without censure or editing. Your quest is not to find correctness, but your unique voice. You may write in short bursts of emotion or with languid thoughts leading lazily into the next. Your writing will be unfettered with insecurity or fear as no one will ever see this. The more you practice, the stronger your voice will become. *Speak to your audience.* Once you've found your voice, it's important to be able to alter it slightly to suit your readers.

You probably wouldn't write a letter to your in-laws like this:

Yo!

Thanks for the shirt.

Your twelve-year-old daughter might be a little confused if you left the following note on the fridge.

Dear Ms Harth,

Please find your lunch in the refrigerator and your bus money on the bench. Transportation will be waiting for you in the agreed-upon place, subsequent to your final class.

Sincerely, Mrs Harth

These are extreme examples of altering a voice, and usually your changes will be more subtle. But even though you may modify your writing according to varying age and interest groups, your voice can still ring true.

A character's voice

Once you're comfortable with your own voice, you can play with your characters' voices. My own voice is not appropriate for an eight-year-old boy with a passion for soccer. If I don't want him to sound like an aging woman, I must back off and tell the story through his eyes.

Two tips for finding your character's voice

Know your character. There are countless ways to do this with interviews, questionnaires, and just walking through a day with a character to notice tiny details about his life. As you get to know him, you might imagine his voice inside your head through conversations and interactions with friends and family. When his voice is clearly in your mind, it should be easier to integrate this into your story – your character's story.

Write through your main character's viewpoint. Once you have become buddies with your character, you can step aside and make room for him. Allow readers to see, hear and experience only what he does and share his thoughts and impressions. Invite readers to identify closely with your main character and care about him. If they care about him, they will become more involved in the story.

A final word


So what is voice?


Book Review – *There Are Rivers in the Sky* by Elif Shafak Trade Paperback, published by Viking Press, released 8 August 2024.

In the ancient city of Nineveh, on the bank of the River Tigris, King Ashurbanipal of Mesopotamia, erudite but ruthless, built a great library that would crumble with the end of his reign. From its ruins, however, emerged a poem, the Epic of Gilgamesh, that would infuse the existence of two rivers, and bind together three lives.

In Victorian London, an extraordinary child, Arthur, is born at the edge of the dirt-black Thames. His only chance of escaping poverty is his brilliant memory. In 2014 Turkey, Narin, a Yazidi girl living by the River Tigris, waits to be baptised with water brought from the holy site of Lalish in Iraq. In 2018 London, broken-hearted Zaleekhah, a hydrologist, moves to a houseboat on the Thames to escape the wreckage of her marriage.


A dazzling feat of storytelling, There Are Rivers in the Sky entwines these outsiders with a single drop of water, a drop which remanifests across the centuries. Both a source of



life and harbinger of death, rivers—the Tigris and the Thames transcend history, transcend fate: "Water remembers. It is humans who forget."

Elif Shafak is one of my favourite modern writers, so I was chuffed to get a hold of her latest release, *There Are Rivers in the Sky*. If I wasn't already familiar with Shafak's work – I would have picked up this book on the cover art alone – the artwork is stunning and caught my eye immediately – and luckily for me, the content of the book was equally as powerful as its cover art.

Shafak seamlessly weaves together three seemingly disparate characters separated by time. Initially, each are connected by a single drop of water – but as the story progresses, you realise there is much more connecting them than just that.



1903 until the first moon landing in 1969. Today with 100,000 commercial flights a day globally, the momentum of change within our own lifetimes continues apace. The opening words for writing pieces at the April meeting, "Do you remember when...?" led to shared stories reflecting on the days of yore. Members wrote of the stoic and heroic challenges of the outback, on common attitudes of the times such as racism including Queensland's history of slavery, then to finish, humorous tales on the trials and tribulations

of the outdoor loo. Starting instead with the first person "I remember when..." opened the

option for much more personal revelations. When it came time to sharing 'goss' (and what's the point of gossip if you don't pass it on?), we learned that Kuranda has a new bookshop (more on that next month, but see the advert above for location and opening times), shared strategies to escape the overwhelming media tsunami of US politics coming through all channels, and the news that Port Douglas is having a Writers Festival on 1-2 August.

Our meeting came with a hubbub of children's shrieks of delight as the tykes on school holidays enjoyed stroking a black-headed snake or patting a dragon in a wildlife display event in the children's area of Kuranda Library.



Each of the protagonists – Arthur, Narin and Zaleekhah – are dynamic and interesting, and I was really invested in each of their stories. Shafak doesn't pull any punches in depicting the tragic, harrowing, and heart-breaking events the characters face. My heart was in my throat several times, and I confess this book did make me cry.

Something I adore about Shafak's writing is how effortlessly she combines the historical and the magical. She also delves into a lot of complex themes – touching on colonialism, the climate crisis, the historical and ongoing persecution of the Yazidi people, as well as the role that water plays in all our lives, whether we are conscious of it or not.

The only thing that stopped me from giving this 5 out of 5 stars was the pacing of the book. I felt that there was a huge amount of build-up through the beginning and middle of the story, but the ending felt rushed, and just didn't quite hit the mark for me. I wish we would have had more time to explore the conclusion for the characters – but the story must end somewhere.

If you love historical fiction, magical realism, and stories told from multiple points of view – don't miss out on this one!



LITTLE ANT – BIG PROBLEM

They might be tiny, but electric ants (*Wassmania auropunctata*) are one of the world's worst invasive pests and can cause significant damage and disruption to native flora, fauna and ecosystems.

Electric ants are native to Central and South America but have now invaded many other counties, including Australia. Electric ant infestations in Australia are limited to Far North Queensland, with known infestations from Bingil Bay in the south, to Kuranda and the Tablelands in the west, Cairns and further north in the Douglas Shire, as far up as the Daintree.

The National Electric Ant Eradication Program (NEAEP) has made significant progress reducing the number of infestations overall but needs everyone's help to find them all.

NEAEP Acting Principal Project Officer, Gary Morton, said more than 40% of electric ant infestations were found during registered free yard checks.

"Free yard checks are quick and easy to organise and are a huge help in detecting electric ants while colony numbers may be still low, making eradication much faster and reducing the risk of spread," Mr Morton said.

"Self-checking is not effective or thorough; the program's field officers are trained to lure, detect and collect ant samples."

"Many residents were completely unaware they had electric ants on their properties until we detected them. Early, proactive action is key."

Free yard checks involve the use of small pieces of sausage meat attached to bamboo skewers being placed around the garden areas where ants are most likely to be, leaving them for one hour, then collecting all samples for identification in the Cairns Diagnostics Laboratory. Following the identification, residents receive a report on any ant species identified.

"Yard checks that find no electric ants are equally valuable to the program and are never a waste of time," Mr Morton said.

"We encourage residents to have their yard checked at least every 12 months. The more properties the program can check, the closer they get to eradication."

At just 1mm to 1.5mm in size, electric ants are tiny and very hard to spot and can only be positively identified under a microscope by trained specialists.

Electric ants are ginger in colour and are generally slowmoving, often travelling in distinct foraging lines. They do not build distinctive nests but live in mulch, soil, pot plants, under rocks and in garden beds. Electric ant colonies can contain multiple queens, with each laying up to 70 eggs per day.

Left untreated, electric ants will kill and displace native wildlife and animals, disrupt the ecosystems and harm the environment. Native flora and fauna, along with agricultural crops and fruit trees, will fail to thrive.

Recovery is usually rapid following electric ant eradication, with native frogs, ground nesting birds, insects and pollinators returning quickly to their natural habitats after treatment.

Mr Morton said there was often confusion between the different species of invasive ants present in Queensland, which could lead to misinformation.

"The different eradication programs, their detection methodologies and treatments are all designed specifically for each invasive ant," he said.

"The treatment we use for electric ants is different to that of other eradication programs. We use a small, protein-based granular bait designed specifically for electric ants, which is harmless to humans and animals."

"On an average 1000m² block, just 250 grams is used in each treatment. The granules contain less than 1% of the active chemical – so about 2 grams of chemical is distributed.

"The treatment is designed to attract the worker ants who carry it back to feed the queens, before it breaks down within about 48 hours. Only the infested areas receive treatment. In those infested areas, it is unlikely any other species will be present as they will have been driven out by electric ants," he said.

If NEAEP officers detect a different invasive ant during a free yard check, the relevant program will be contacted so they can commence their specific treatment regimes.



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St Saviour's Thought for May

This month we read from St Luke's Gospel Chapter 24 verses 46-53. Reading the end of this Gospel of Saint Luke's Gospel is not actually an ending, it's really a beginning. Although it marks the end of Jesus being among the disciples in a visible, objective way, it also shows them being called to the beginning of a new responsibility.

They had seen Jesus die, and had scattered, demoralised and defeated. Then the unbelievable had happened: he came among them again. Although he was changed, the disciples were quite sure it was Jesus whom they had known and followed for the last few years. From time to time he reappeared: to all of them in Jerusalem, to Mary in the garden, to a group fishing in Galilee, to a couple on the road to Emmaus. It is just after this last encounter that this Gospel passage begins. The two disciples have just come running back from Emmaus. They have gasped out the story of their encounter with what they had thought was a stranger. In the simple action of his breaking a piece of bread they realised that the person with them was far from being a stranger. It was their Lord!

The news electrifies the rest of the disciples into all sorts of thoughts and hopes and plans. Suddenly, Jesus is among them. Once again, he explains the meaning of all that has happened and is happening. He reassures them that the world is not falling apart. The ghastly cross was part of a great plan, and his coming from the tomb was the climax and triumph of that plan. Now something new must begin in and through them.

What has happened has to be communicated, and that task is in their hands. This Gospel's point is that we are those whom Jesus calls disciples. Whatever was said in that long ago encounter after the resurrection is being said again today and will be said in every age. Ours are the ears that hear him – or choose not to hear Him – today.



Jesus was asking for His disciples' commitment, and He asks the same of us. If we commit ourselves to him He promises us what He promised those men and women. He promises his Spirit, the Spirit we call the Holy Spirit, in our deepest being. It's a real promise which millions of men and women have found to be true. If we say Yes to him giving him our spirit, poor and limited though it may be, He gives us his. We get much the better side of the bargain!

Jesus ended this last encounter by gathering the disciples, blessing them, and going from them. As people have discovered in every generation since, He went away only to return into every one of their lives. He has already returned to yours and mine; all we need to do is to realize it. When Jesus left his disciples He did so only to return into every one of their lives. He can return to our lives as well.


