The activity will link all community Kindies, Creche and Kindergarten branches, and Family and Child Care Centres who operate with the support and assistance of the C & K Association.



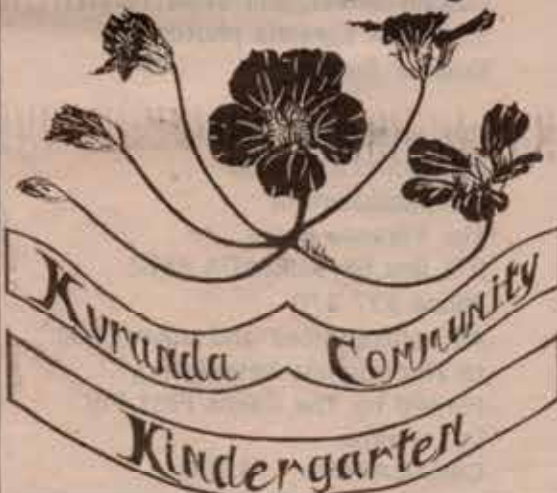

Dear Kuranda Paper,

I read with horror Howard Stevens' article "The Rape of Kuranda" in which he tells us water samples taken from a stream passing through Top of the Range Estate showed coliform counts (faecal bacteria) of up to 1680 per 100 ml! On the previous page Councillor June Rees informs us of failed septic tanks on Vievers Street and Barron Falls Road resulting in raw sewerage flowing over the ground. These are the cases that we can see. What about the leaking septic tanks which seep into the ground water systems? Out of sight, out of mind? Septic tanks are obviously unsuitable for high rainfall areas. Over the years, tanks are damaged by the tree roots and ground movement which allows effluent to seep out. It's only when good rains come, the problem becomes apparent as the rain water flushes the effluent out of the tanks resulting in the first noticeable bad smell. But the fact is a lot of septic tanks are leaking all the time! The blue-green algae blooms seen in our more densely populated southern rivers are almost certainly the result of human waste - albeit not always deliberate. Does the same fate await our beautiful Barron? Connecting the sewerage is obviously not the answer. It's too costly to connect and then we have to treat all that extra sewerage. My suggestion is composting toilets. Modern designs have given us many options which are cheap, clean, odourless, low maintenance, and, most importantly, non-polluting. Instead of paying \$330,000 for sewerage extensions, a programme of replacing existing septic tanks in high risk areas could be commissioned. New developments should be required to use these composting toilets at no cost to council, eg Rainforest Gardens Estate. Every shire council in Queensland was sent comprehensive information on composting toilets by a Toowong company called "Alternatives", so MSC cannot be ignorant of them. All that is needed is a slight shift in attitude by Council and the gumption to admit error and set about correcting it.

The first RED MUD POLLUTION OF JUMRUM CREEK downstream of the Fallons Rd crossing near the S & S Club began with the red runoff that gouged down the steep slope to the creek as soon as the wet, rain fell on the new cutting flanking the road. ("Upgrading" can swiftly become downgrading!) But after a dry March this situation only worsened considerably during April-May. At times the creek water's consistency (through our property not far below the crossing) appeared thickened, as never before, and dyed to a kind of hectic carrot pea soup. This can be traced to the additional gouged red mud runoff from the SE corner of the newly made and roughly levelled sports ground BELOW the bowling green and very close to the creek.

There were at least 3 platypuses in our stretch of creek late last year. We have seen them survive dirty water previously, but have they and/or their main food source (tiny crustaceans living on the bottom) managed to survive this coagulated "pea soup", the remnants of which still colours and clings to the creek bottom? We have not sighted them to date.

With a kind of innocent irony a small Platypus Logo decorates most pages of the current June Kuranda Paper, and I quote from the short connected article: "Kuranda the original people of this area knew as NGOONBI which means place of the platypus. It will be a tragedy if one day the name Kuranda comes to mean place of no platypus".

Let's take this as an uncanny warning. The lesson seems clear enough: In most instances, IF we can afford cuttings we must afford promptly seeding them and IF we can afford earthworks, then we must afford prompt and proper drainage. For, as the article says, "We must maintain our environment which maintains our culture and community".

And now the specific question remains: What can be done BEFORE THE NEXT WET SEASON about Fallons Rd. and the S & S Club precincts?

The hullabaloo over the FNQEB cutting down 200 metres of regrowth under the high voltage powerlines (Cairns Post 18/6) will be nothing compared with the public outrage when people realise the true facts of the Kuranda Cableway.

Chairman Tom and Dr Clark expressed their regret at the incident yet they are both pushing for the cableway.

The Cairns Post editorial writer jumped on the bandwagon and decried the destruction of trees alongside the Barron Falls Road. By the same token he acclaimed the Kuranda cableway as a boost to the area's tourist potential.

The other night a TV news camera showed a section of QEC powerline near Paluma where a helicopter crashed with tragic results for the pilot. The camera clearly showed a clearfelled strip at least 40 metres wide cut for the powerline through thick rainforest.

Throughout the world where cableways are routed through forests a clearfelled strip is mandatory for passenger evacuation in case of mechanical failure.

Skyrail's claim to glide along just over the forest canopy is a sick joke. They have not concluded an agreement with the Commissioner of Transport under the provisions of the State Transport (People Movers) Act 1989. All requirements of the Workplace Health and Safety Act would also have to be met with.

It appears that this company is making up it's own rules as it goes along as if they were running a backyard enterprise instead of a major Public Transport System.

have a container which takes up little room in the fridge- tall & thin like a cereal container is good. This time of year is OK to use this method but in the hot weather use the freezer. As you cook put scraps like potato peels, onion skin, ends of carrot, zucchini, corn cobs etc. Every few days put these in a saucepan with water, a bayleaf & 1 tblsp of oil. Chilli & miso optional. Bring to the boil & simmer for 10 minutes. Strain and either use straight away or freeze for later. At the same time soak some soup mix or individual beans or pulses such as lentils or borlotti beans or chick peas. During the day soak, end of day drain & rinse & store in fridge. Every couple of days treat as stock- important : do not save the water beans are cooked in as it contains a very complex sugar which causes flatulence. Pulses such as lentils, split peas & chick peas are OK and save their cooking water.

SUPER PUMPKIN SOUP

- 1 small pumpkin
- 1 large sweet potato (red)
- 1 large potato
- 2 large onions
- 3 sections garlic
- 1 tbsl minced fresh garlic
- chili paste/sauce

- 1 tbsl wh/meal plain flour
- olive oil or butter

OPTIONAL:

- natural yoghurt- dollop
- fetta cheese-cubed
- lemon juice
- chives -chopped

METHOD:

Cube pumpkin, sweet potato & potato. Steam or boil until soft. Drain & save water. Finely chop onion, garlic & ginger. Heat oil or butter in soup pan, add flour and heat until brown. Turn heat down, add water from pumpkin etc and whisk until it thickens. Add chili sauce, pepper and salt. Add pumpkin etc and cook for 10 mins on low heat. If not enough liquid add water or stock. Allow to cool for 10 mins then either puree in blender or use masher for chunkier consistency..

TO SERVE:

Heat. Add cubed fetta cheese and heat in oven until fetta is soft but still firm (microwave 2-3mins). Add a dash of lemon juice to each bowl & chopped chives. Serve. Alternatively add a dollop of natural yoghurt & lemon juice & chives to each bowl as you serve.

Skyrail Update

Grant Kelly (Queensland Transport Department) gave an overview of the Skyrail Project and Ken Chapman (Skyrail developer) answered questions from the floor. The meeting was advised that: The Skyrail Project would cost \$30 million, for 7.3 km of cableway, monitored by Department of Environment and Heritage, with strict supervision of all phases of the construction.

Ken Chapman advised that stations at Caravonica would consist of a kiosk facility only, Rainforestation Station (Red Peak) a cafe, approximately 600-700 sqm. with Station on top, low key - no walls - composting toilets. Could include Interpretative Centre. Barron Falls Station - no eating facilities; Kuranda Station, perhaps a souvenir shop, cold drinks. Ken Chapman stressed that there would be no high density development and that Skyrail buildings would 'fit' the Kuranda scene. There would be minimal pollution of scenic values - ie a 'small' amount of cable 'might' be visible from Barron Falls Station.

Ken Chapman stressed that concessions would be given to identifiable residents and he saw the need to provide on-going transport to High School Students presently 'bussing' the Range Road. 'Skyrail' could move 300 kids down the range in an hour at a reasonable cost. Disabled people would also be catered for. Skyrail expects to commence operations in 1995. Ken Chapman is invited to a future meeting and was requested to supply pictures, drawings, plans etc and is happy to attend a meeting 'on site' to show exactly where the Kuranda station will be situated. As soon as more information becomes available this will be arranged.

RE-ELECTION OF COMMITTEE OFFICE BEARERS (as advertised)-

Six people nominated for Committee. It was moved that the Meeting increase the number of committee members to 6. This was carried and we welcome Bob Colefax to the Committee. The committee consists of:

CONCERNS RE DEVELOPMENT IN SPEEWAH AREA -

Letter from John Beaseley re the proposed Park Residential development by Beta Gamma 41 in the Speewah area was discussed. Cr Wally Gray advised that there is no way Council can revoke approvals already given, if they did the developers will sue the Council and ratepayers money will be used to pay for defence. The meeting strongly felt that this development may cause environmental and visual pollution and resolved to write to the Minister and all relevant parties protesting the application.

DEVELOPMENT CONTROL PLAN FOR KURANDA ENVIRONS -

Jax Bergersen presented a Community draft plan for the development of Kuranda environs which has been assembled by a dedicated group of residents over the past 3 months. Meeting agreed that we should urge Council to complete the Control Plan for the Environs while the Management Study consultants were in place and that the Plan be compatible with the results of the Study.

REPORT ON WATER POLLUTION-Top of The Range -

Howard Stevens reported that it has still not been resolved where the pollution is coming from. He has suggested to Council that a non-toxic dye be put into the septic systems in the Top of the Range Estate to establish if the problem is with the septic systems. Council will use dye on 4 or 5 systems and have sent water samples to Melbourne for a complex test to determine if the faecal contamination is human or not. Four households have been served with notice to repair their septic systems or be prosecuted. Meeting felt that the rezoning was approved by Council and part of the approval process was for the use of septic systems installed by licensed plumbers, therefore any upgrading of sewerage system should be met at cost to the Council not the residents.

VISION WORKSHOP

Was a run away success. Thanks to everyone for such a great beginning to a very important project for this community. Thanks especially to the Kuranda State School, The Kuranda Kindergarten for catering and childcare, The Kuranda Media Association for publicity, The Mareeba Shire Council for assistance with clerical work, the handbill artists, the consultants, facilitators, secretaries and go-fers. Kuranda Fire Station

We would like to make the community aware of the difficulties being experienced in staffing the Kuranda Fire Station. The current situation sees staffing level of 50%, with five active Auxiliary staff on the roll. This situation regularly leaves the Kuranda area with little fire protection as staff seek employment outside the area. If the five vacant positions could be filled the fire/emergency cover would be much improved. Previous pamphlet drops have resulted in some interest, but I know much more support exists if I can get this message to the right people.

Who are the right people?

Any community minded male or female who meet the following criteria:

- a live and work within 3km of the Station
- b are physically fit (medical examination required)
- c hold a C2 class licence or are prepared to obtain one (assistance will be provided)
- d are prepared to attend training (four nights per month)

and are available for emergency calls

The conditions of employment include:

- 1 Free fire fighting uniform including safety boots and overalls
- 2 Pay rate of \$14.48 per hour for fire calls and training
- 3 Comprehensive insurance coverage while on duty or while responding to a call
- 4 The opportunity to attend specialist training courses is also provided after a probationary period of three months.

The Kuranda community is expanding and tourist numbers are on the increase, traffic movement is reaching an all time high and tons of dangerous goods are transported up and down the Kuranda Range. The Kuranda Fire Service is well equipped to handle most likely emergencies, including crash rescues, but all this equipment is useless unless firefighters are available to use it. Professional firefighter backup is already available from Smithfield and Mareeba Fire Stations, but as always initially the community must help itself.

Here is a golden opportunity for the community to back this vital service and ensure its survival.

Since 1989 I have actively opposed the Skyrail project and it has cost me a lot of time, energy and expense.

At the last meeting of the Kuranda Consultative Group a motion from the floor was put to 'support the Skyrail project in principle'. This motion was held over until next month.

I personally do not support the Skyrail project in principle, or in any other way.

I still believe it is a mistake. I only hope that I am proved wrong. If I am not, of course, it will be too late and if it is a mistake it will be a very big one.

We are told that Skyrail will solve our problems - buses, parking etc. These problems are already solvable - if the powers that be had the will to do so. I fear that Skyrail will only add to existing problems unless it is made to work for the better management of future development in Kuranda and I have no confidence in anyone, other than this community, working to make it do that. For we are the ones who will feel the full impact of the changes Skyrail brings - not the beanpushers in Canberra or Brisbane, Cairns or Mareeba.

Life's too short to waste it chewing on old disappointments. Time to stop wasting energy and get serious about being a part of the development process so that we receive the least possible negative effects & the best possible integration of this major project into our community. Life goes on whether you go with it or not.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

In this Kuranda Paper you should see a questionnaire for Kuranda people, seeking their opinions on traffic and what control they want. It is for the Vision for Kuranda report and your input is important. Please do your part before it is too late.

Last week I attended a follow up Vision Group meeting. I was astounded that a very vocal element was favouring ousting residents' cars from Coondoo St. Compromise between Big Business and little people is a main issue, so have your say in the questionnaire. It should help to maintain Kuranda as our town and not an overcrowded tourist mecca. We came to live in the Kuranda area for peace and beauty, not for noise, dirt and bus fumes.

Since the Kuranda Consultative Committee started at the C.W.A. Hall 3 years ago I have been a regular attendant at meetings. I was surprised that the K.C.C. hierarchy moved the meeting venue a few months ago to the Sports Club in Fallon Rd, without approval from attendants at a meeting.

I consider the Sports Club unsuitable for the K.C.C. meetings as: 1. The situation is far away from most Kuranda homes. 2. The unsealed road is very difficult to negotiate parking. I have seen cars pushed out of the mud. 3. Several people have told me they will not attend meetings at the club because of either of the above reasons or because the club has a licensed bar. At meetings it is desirable that sobriety is observed. The Kuranda Consultative Committee is not there to promote the sports club, but to discuss and make decisions on what is affecting Kuranda. At the next meeting I shall move that the venue be changed to either 1. The Kuranda School or 2. back to the C.W.A. Hall if the meeting can be changed from Wednesday as the C.W.A. now has bookings for Wednesday nights. If you cannot attend the K.C.C. meeting on Wednesday July 21st and would like a change of venue please ring me on 937205 or write to me at Black Mountain Rd.

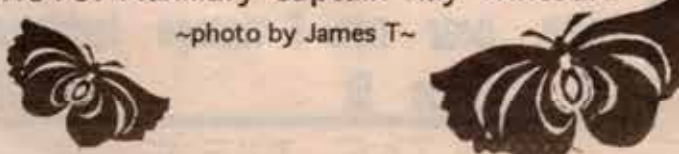

Land Care has come to Kuranda, stimulated by the exposure that septic waste pollution goes into our waterways. Any people wanting advice on suitable trees to plant on their land can contact Land Care. I am happy to oblige and have 25 years experience of growing trees in Kuranda for fruit, for birds, for shade etc. All trees hold the soil. My own block was treeless in 1968. It slopes to the Barron and a deep gully had developed from years of soil erosion. Now there are hundreds of trees. Erosion has stopped and Bamboo is growing in the gully to stabilise the soil. I was given a Land Care Award in 1990 for Tree planting success and erosion control.

Vegetables are thriving but if cabbages etc are being eaten try spraying with a chilli spray. Cut or vitamise chillies soak in water for a few days, strain and spray, you can add cayenne pepper. Clensel which contains Citronella oil is now back on the market. Coles may sell it, and it is an efficient organic insect repellent. By using no poisons and natural manures you will be helping to stop pollution of our waterways. So organic fruit and vegies taste better and growing them does not harm the environment.

Nasturtiums are a pretty addition to the vegie garden. They are edible and also deter insects. They do need a sunny spot. Busy Lizzies (Impatiens) are easy to grow and they smother weeds. Butterflies love them. They seed readily and grow from cuttings. Cut them off when lank; if seeding, throw the tops on some bare soil and you will soon have a patch of Impatiens. The Rare Fruits August meeting is on Wednesday 3rd. Martin Tenni will talk on growing fruit trees and demonstrate marcotting.

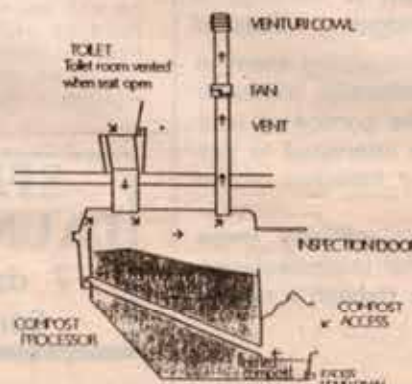

Kuranda Landcare

The Kuranda Landcare Group was formally established and a committee elected at a recent meeting in Kuranda. The committee elected were Howard Stevens (President), Harvey Lovewell (Vice-President), Julie Martyn (Treasurer), Jax Bergersen (Secretary) and committee members Wendy Walsh, Russ Larkin, and Bob Colefax.

The area of interest of this group is the Barron River Catchment in the Kuranda region. As this is a hilly, high rainfall area, our major concerns are the establishment and maintenance of high water quality in this catchment, and careful land use practices to avoid noxious weed overgrowth, soil and riverbank erosion and ecologically sustainable development in the region.

Degraded public land will be sought for reforestation to maintain the beauty and improve the natural habitat of the area. We are at present, looking into the possibility of replanting the road reserves, at the entrance to Kuranda from the Kennedy Highway. This requires liaison with the Main Roads Department, Mareeba Shire Council, tree nurseries, and FNQEB. We would like the entrance to Kuranda to be an attractive display of local forest trees rather than the current eroded earth, rocks, and Guinea grass.

Another project we are investigating is to encourage the local Kuranda School to "adopt" Jum Rum Creek. In other areas of Australia school-based Landcare groups are involved in longterm ongoing studies of nearby creeks, observing, measuring, tabulating and rectifying such things as soil erosion, water quality, and noxious weeds. Our school is well located to care for Jum Rum Creek. This is excellent training for our kids and gives them first hand experience in dealing with some of the major landcare issues this country is faced with.

We also will be putting submissions into the Vision Workshop, and the Barron River Catchment Study currently in progress. Our Landcare group can also be a community based catalyst for other activities as part of our work is to inform the public of different schemes that may assist them. For instance, the Community Rainforest Reforestation Program setup last year by eleven local shire councils, will reforest large areas of private land. If any landholders along the Barron River, or other areas of degraded land, would like to join together to provide an area of at least 10-12 hectares, then a large part of the degraded land could be reforested by this scheme. Also the Dept of Environment & Heritage is encouraging landholders with steep hillsides or ridges or areas of some particular environmental value to consider protecting them in perpetuity. This can be done by signing over this otherwise unuseable land to the Department as a wildlife reserve. The portion of land would still be on the landholders title. Any person interested in this scheme is asked to contact one of our committee members or the Department directly.

Our committee is currently involved in establishing these programs and when we have some definite plans for implementation we will notify members and other interested people through a regular column in this paper - so please stay tuned!!



Speewah District Residents Association Inc.

The last public meeting of the Speewah District Residents Association was held on the 14th June 1993. Despite being a public holiday and a chilly evening several people attended the meeting. Councillor June Rees was unable to attend, hopefully her report can be made at our next meeting. Eric and Elsie Follon's presence was missed also.

There was reports on several local meetings, Kuranda Consultative Group, Bump Watch Meeting, Kuranda Land Care, Grove Creek Bush Fire Brigade and the Kuranda Vision Workshop. Reports such as these are very interesting as not everyone has the opportunity to attend all these meetings but can at least be kept up to date with the developments in the area.

The condition of unsealed roads in this area is still causing concern so we are continuing our requests to council to maintain regular work on these roads. Residents safety must come first.

Another concern raised at this meeting was the number of residents who display an incorrect number on their properties or no number at all. Tradespersons delivering in this area are having difficulties especially when several people are displaying the same number in the same street. We have requested council to supply and display a map of this area. This would help the situation.

The meeting decided to form a sub-committee for the management of Roscommon Park and have requested council nominate one councillor to sit on this committee to facilitate liaison with the council. KURANDA STATE SCHOOL ARARA STREET

The Vision Workshop took place on Saturday 29th May 1993 at the Kuranda State School. It was attended by 139 people and facilitated by 17 volunteers. 86 people joined working groups on the day to deal with the following topic areas:

The findings of the workshop were distributed to the group chairpersons in a report and through the post to all those who registered on the day. Members of the Consultant Team have attended the inaugural meetings of these groups, where appropriate. The working groups have been asked to liaise directly with the Kuranda Consultative Group and the Consultant Team, in order to feed ideas and issues into the planning process.

Max Boudan, the Mareeba Shire Planner, has agreed to facilitate the Development Control (Environs) group on an ongoing basis as part of his work in connection with the preparation of a new Development Control Plan for the Environs.

Many of the groups are now into their second or third round of meetings and some really interesting and exciting actions and goals are emerging. There will be room in the next paper for some detailed reports from the various groups.



It was always considered vital that the aboriginal people be equal partners in the project and so it was great to see such a good turn up to Ngoonbi Farm on June 10th for a Vision Workshop to be held in order to provide an input into the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan Study. KURANDA STRATEGIC MANAGEMENT PLAN TRAFFIC & TRANSPORT WORKING GROUP

As part of the study instigated by the Kuranda Consultative Group, a Transportation Management Plan for Kuranda Village will be produced. It is required that this plan should identify the needs of the Village, with regard to transportation provision and control, in order to manage project growth.

At the Kuranda Vision Workshop on May 29 this year, transportation issues were identified by participants as requiring a high priority review considering the problems which now exist. A working group was established to provide the community input into the formulation of a Plan, and it was agreed that consultation with all Stakeholders in the Village would be crucial to the plan's success.

The group's first meeting was chaired by Harvey Lovewell with fourteen people in attendance. Discussion centred on overall planning issues related to the Village. Implications of the proposed SkyRail project, problems which are being encountered and visions of alternate systems which may be implemented. The next meeting is scheduled for July 15 at 7.30 pm at the school. Group members are looking to put forward ideas and work towards finding solutions to existing problems.

Data is currently being gathered and collated by the consultants to determine the physical constraints and design parameters which must be considered to implement a system for traffic management.

In order to carry out a Local Area Traffic Management Study within recommended guidelines we must now ascertain specific problems relating to the existing road system within Kuranda Village. The following questionnaire has been produced so that design strategies may be formulated to address all issues.

Your input is requested to identify all issues which should be considered in order to produce a Transportation Management Plan. Areas of concern which have been highlighted to us are given particular mention, however please include details on other issues (eg. street signage, road marking, provision for bicycles) where you think a problem may exist.

LANDSCAPE & STREETScape WORKING GROUP

At the Kuranda Vision Workshop the character and improvements to the village and streetscape were identified as being important to both the lifestyle of locals and to the visitor experience. A working group was established chaired by Paul (Larry) Haddock and had its first meeting at Frank Burton's house on Wednesday evening, 9th June 1993. Consultants Tim Nevard, Andrew Prowse & Joseph Corbin discussed landscape and streetscape issues with the group. In future the village improvements identified by this group, through townscape and streetscape strategies, will form part of the Management Plan. From the meeting the following actions are being undertaken. Input from any residents, business people or organisations is sought to provide input into this part of the proposed Strategic Management Plan for Kuranda.

- To locate and identify areas and blight spots that need attention for landscape and streetscape improvements including blight spots.
- To investigate advanced tree and plant sources which may be donated to help replace past landscape characters.
- To research the previous or lost character of Kuranda through historical photographs, records and interviews with older residents.
- To research plantings or indigenous plants that contribute to the character of Kuranda and may be useful in the street plantings.
- To identify significant and/or interesting local gardens, houses, buildings, etc that could be incorporated into a garden and lifestyle appreciation for the community and visitors at select times of the year. This would help encourage a different awareness of Kuranda and its history.
- To liaise with the arts and culture group.

YOUR VIEWS ON VISITORS TO KURANDA

Important parts of the Management Plan for Kuranda will be the management of visitors to Kuranda and determining a works program for village improvements and facilities related to tourism to be funded by the proposed tourist levy. These works may include projects that benefit both visitors and residents such as footpath improvements, traffic management, toilets, park upgrading, seating, lighting, car parking and projects specifically visitor orientated such as visitor information and bus parking. I do not know. Our ways are different from your ways. The sight of your cities pains the eyes of the red man. But perhaps that is because the red man is a savage and does not understand.

There is no quiet place in the white man's cities. No place to hear the unfurling of leaves or the rustle of insects' wings. But perhaps it is because I am a savage and do not understand. The clatter only seems to insult the ears. And what is there to life if a man cannot hear the lonely cry of the whippoorwill or the arguments of the frogs around a pond at night?

I am a red man and do not understand. The Indian prefers the soft sound of the wind darting over the face of a pond and the smell of the wind itself, cleansed by the midday rain, or scented by the pinion pine . . .

So we will consider your offer to buy our land. If we decide to accept, I will make one condition. The white man must treat the beasts of this land as his brothers.

I am a savage and I do not understand any other way. I have seen a thousand rotting buffaloes on the prairie, left by the white man who shot them from a passing train. I am a savage and I do not understand how the smoking iron horse can be more important than the buffalo that we kill only to stay alive. . .

If all the beasts were gone, men would die from a great loneliness of spirit. For whatever happens to the beasts soon happens to man. All things are connected. . .

Teach your children what we have taught our children, that the earth is our mother. Whatever befalls the earth befalls the sons of the earth. If men spit upon the ground, they spit upon themselves.

This we know: the earth does not belong to man, man belongs to the earth. This we know: all things are connected like the blood which unites one family.

Man did not weave the web of life; he is merely a strand in it. Whatever he does to the web, he does to himself.

But we will consider your offer to go to the reservation you have for my people . . . It matters little where we spend the rest of our days.

Our children have seen their fathers humbled in defeat. Our warriors have felt shame. And after defeat they turn their days to idleness and contaminate their bodies with sweet food and strong drink. It matters little where we pass the rest of our days - they are not many. . .

But why should I mourn the passing of my people? Tribes are made of men, nothing more. Men come and go like the waves of the sea. Even the white man, whose God walks and talks with him as friend to friend, cannot be exempt from the common destiny. We may be brothers after all: we shall see.

One thing we know which the white man may one day discover, Our God is the same God. You may think now that you own him as you wish to own our land. But you cannot. He is the God of man. And His compassion is equal for the red man and the white. This earth is precious to Him. And to harm the earth is to heap contempt on its Creator. The whites, too, shall pass - perhaps sooner than other tribes. . .

But in your perishing you will shine brightly, fired by the strength of the God who brought you this land and for some special purpose gave you dominion over this land and over the red man. That destiny is a mystery to us, for we did not understand what will be when the buffalo are all slaughtered, the wild horses are tamed, the secret corners of the forest are heavy with the scent of many men, and the view of the ripe hills is blotted by talking wires. Where is the thicket? Gone. Where is the eagle? Gone.

And what is it to say goodbye to the swift pony and the hunt? The end of living and the beginning of survival.

We might understand if we knew what it was that the white man dreams, what hopes he describes to his children on long winter nights, what vision he burns into their minds, so that they will wish for tomorrow.

But we are savages. The white man's dreams are hidden from us . . .

When the last red man has vanished from the earth and his memory is only the shadow of a cloud moving across the prairies, these shores and forests will still hold the spirits of my people. For they love this earth as the newborn loves its mother's heartbeat.

So if we sell you our land, love it as we have loved it. Care for it as we have cared for it. Hold in your mind the memory of the land as it is when you take it.

And with all your strength, with all your might, and with all your heart, preserve it for your children, and love it as God loves us all.

One thing we know, our God is the same God. The earth is precious to him. . .

We may be brothers after all. We shall see.]

The words are so moving and so prophetic that it is hard to believe that they were composed by an unlettered man so long ago, before our own grasp on the natural world would become a stranglehold. Unless we start heeding the words of such men, we will destroy our planet in the next 140 years.

LAMENT FOR BROTHER EARTH

The case for conservation is not new - it was put beautifully 140 years ago.

The following prophetic words were a response from Chief Seattle to the US President Pearce's proposal that reservations be established for the Indian tribes in the North-West Territories. It shows the commitment and caring of native people for their land and is very relevant to Australians in the face of the Mabo decision repercussions.

The Great Chief in Washington sends word that he wishes to buy our land.

The Great Chief also sends us words of friendship and goodwill. That is kind of him, since we know that he has little need of our friendship in return. But we will consider your offer. For we know that if we do not sell, the white man may come with guns and take our land.

What Chief Seattle says, the Great Chief in Washington can count on as truly as our white brothers can count on the return of the seasons. My words are like the stars - they do not set.

How can you buy or sell the sky, and the warmth of the land? The idea is strange to us.

We do not own the freshness of the air or the sparkle of the water. How can you buy them from us?

Every part of this earth is sacred to my people. Every shining pine needle, every sand shore, every mist in the dark woods, every clearing and humming insect is holy in the memory and experience of my people . . .

The white man's dead forget the country of their birth when they go to walk among the stars, (but) we are part of the earth, and it is part of us. The perfumed flowers are our sisters: the deer, the horse, the great eagle, these are our brothers. The rocky crests, the juices in the meadows, the body heat of the pony and man - all belong to the same family.

So, when the Great Chief in Washington sends word that he wishes to buy our land, he asks too much of us. The Great Chief sends word he will reserve us a place so that we can live comfortably to ourselves. He will be our father and we will be his children. So we will consider your offer to buy our land. But it will not be easy for us.

The shining water that moves in the streams and rivers is not just water, but the blood of our ancestors. If we sell you our land, you must remember that it is sacred, and you must teach your children that it is sacred and that each ghostly reflection in the clear water of the memories in the life of my people.

The water's murmur is the voice of my father's father. The rivers are our brothers, they quench our thirst. The rivers carry our canoes, and feed our children. If we sell you land, you must remember, and teach your children, that the rivers are our brothers, and yours, and you must henceforth give the rivers the kindness you would give any brother.

The red man has always retreated before the advancing white man, as the mist of the mountain runs before the morning sun. But the ashes of our fathers are sacred. Their graves are holy ground, and so are these hills, these trees. This portion of the earth is consecrated to us.

We know that the white man does not understand our ways. One portion of the earth is consecrated to us.

We know that the white man does not understand our ways. One portion of the land is the same to him as the next, for he is a stranger who comes in the night and takes from the land what he needs. The earth is not his brother, but his enemy, and when he has conquered it he moves on. He leaves his fathers' graves behind and he does not care . . . His fathers' graves and his children's birthright are forgotten.

He treats his mother, the earth, and his brother, the sky, as things to be bought, plundered, sold like sheep or bright beads. His appetite will devour the earth and leave behind only a desert.

Volunteering makes a better world and it has an important place in all societies. It enhances the human potential and enriches society through the involvement of human resources.

However, in today's world we need to realise that volunteers are not free and require appropriate recruitment, placement in suitable occupations, job support training, a daily chance to develop and the right recognition of the value of their work. In Australia alone there are 67,000 non-profit organisations served by 4 million volunteers offering the gift of 7 billion hours of service in voluntary work each year.*

Volunteers need to feel that credibility and appreciation are given to their share of talents and experiences and that it is possible through volunteer effort to bring a corporate discipline to the non-profit world. Volunteers still need appropriate job descriptions, agreed hours of work, adequate tools, appropriate career development and consultation if they are not to feel put upon and used. They need protection against risks and reimbursement of expenses when necessary. Paid staff need to offer proper management and support to their volunteers and not treat them as second-class workers.

Volunteer work needs the recognition that it is an expression of our love, caring and concern for each other and the environment in which we live. We must not fall into the trap of recognising only work with a dollar value. We must give value to the unpaid work accomplished by so many in our society.

PUBLIC MEETING - LAMB RANGE DUMP JUNE 1993.

The meeting called by the Mareeba Shire Council commenced at approximately 7.45pm at Sam's Barn, Koah. In attendance were members of the Mareeba Shire Council, Kevin Byrne and Mr. Brian Smyth of the Cairns City Council and Tom Pyne of Mulgrave Shire Council. The meeting was chaired by Chris Lewis of the Mareeba Shire Council.

The opening address centred around a submission on the geotechnical and hydrogeological assessment of the proposed Lamb Range Landfill Site - (Dump!)

A number of questions and many contradictions arose following the release of this document.

Questions were asked about :

1. How six (6) bore holes over 120 hectares could resolve the subterranean water flow.
2. Why permeability tests all indicated low to very low permeability but why it will be necessary to import three different types of clay to the site.
3. Conceptual land fill design which state low permeability lining materials. Note the comment LOW permeability, not NO permeability.
4. Management of the landfill operation to minimise rainfall inflow. One wonders how.
5. Ground water modelling by computer modelling. This is a worry! The old sayings with computers is " data in data out" or "garbage in garbage out". You can tailor computer results to give answers required.

One very pleasing aspect of this meeting was the attendance of a group of Aboriginal people. These people voiced their concern about the dump polluting the waterways where they fish and spend a lot of their time. They also stated that they were very concerned about the possibility of sacred sites in the area and advised the three councils that they were undertaking studies of the area in the forthcoming weeks.

A unanimous vote for the BRCWDN committee was given. The next day (11th June) the Mareeba Shire Council sent a letter of appreciation for their contribution to the meeting and acknowledging that they represent the citizens of the area and that the Council will continue to advise us of future developments.

The BRCWDN committee sincerely thank the public for their support.

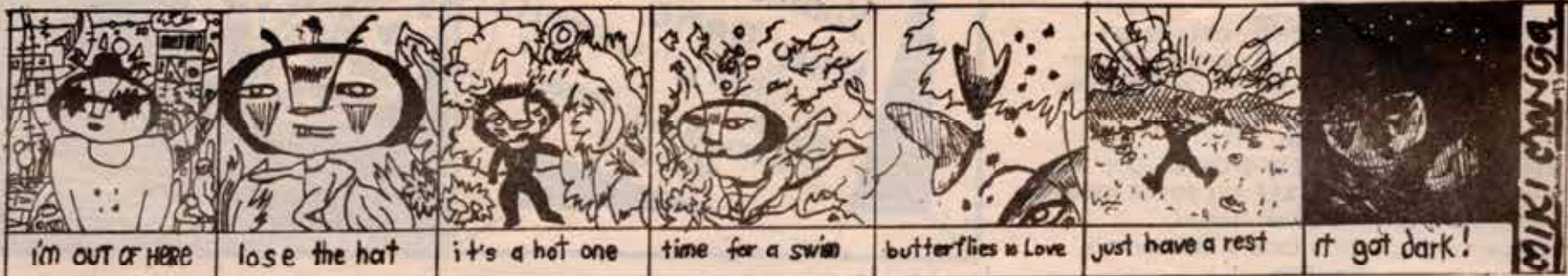

Aboriginal Council of Leaders appointed by Mareeba Aboriginal Community.

The Council members are: Co-Chairpersons George Meldrum and Lynette Hastie. The other members are Jessie Donahue, Michelle Gore, Doreen Binsiar, Joyce Blooranta, Beris Anning, Charles Rodgers, Thomas Wason, Larry Manning and Thomas Mitchell.

The Council of Leaders will be meeting on a regular basis to discuss important community issues. The Council also calls community meetings as required. The first community meeting took place in April when 15 local Murri organisations reported on their activities, services, problems and achievements. The second community meeting in May was attended by 15 local, state and commonwealth government departments which reported on their policies, plans and programs for Aboriginal people.

At the last Council of Leaders meeting on the 1st June the Council discussed the urgent need for a youth centre and youth workers in Mareeba for Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal youth. Concern was expressed about the alleged disinterest by the Mareeba Shire Council in assisting the State Government to fund a youth coordinator in the town. The Leaders believed that all tiers of government should provide joint funding for youth services and workers in Mareeba.

The Aboriginal Leaders also discussed the need for additional housing for families and the elderly. While additional housing was needed throughout the town, only 13 homes have been built in the Bunbarri area whereas a further 31 house sites were available for development. The Bunbarri Residents Committee and the Mooraridgi Housing Cooperative are having joint discussions with the Mareeba Shire, the Department of Family Services and Aboriginal and Islander Affairs and the Department of Housing, Local Government and Planning regarding the future of the area.

The Council of Leaders welcomed the cooperation and unity of purpose that was occurring with the different Aboriginal organisations and groups in the planning and development of the local community.

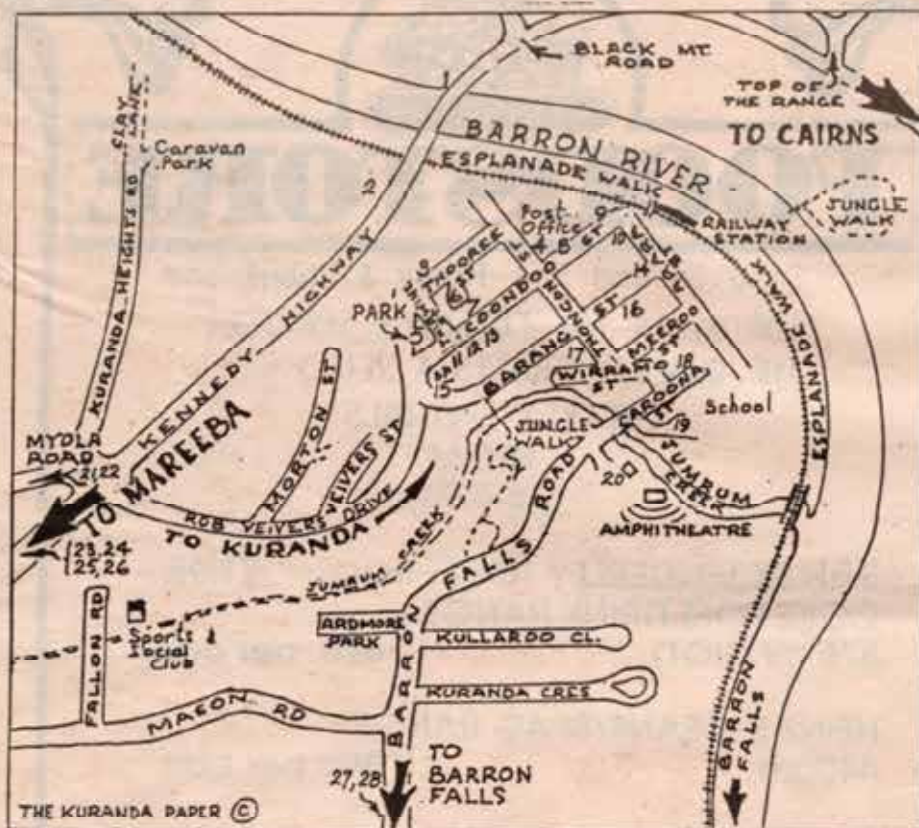

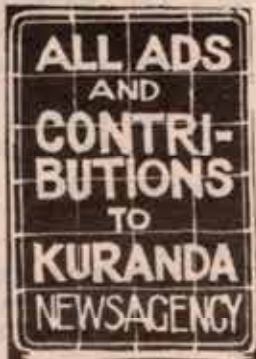
