What a great start to 2010. Congratulations to the brilliant designer of the Paper's website.

Member for Barron River, Steve Wettenhall. announced the completion of the toilet block at Barron Falls lookout at a cost of \$250,000. The structure is most timely and aesthetically pleasing.

The good news continued when Housing Minister, Karen Struthers, confirmed on 17th January "Queenslanders are due to see a massive roll-out of social housing across the state as the Bligh Government works to build more than 3000 social housing dwellings by the end of this year. Breakdown of planned social housing build to 2012 by region under Nation Building... Far North Queensland 260".

With just four electorates in FNQ surely we can expect 50 odd in Barron River by 2012?

In Kuranda Paper (Feb 10) Steve gave the welcome news "Top Korowa community will benefit from the completion of a capital works program that includes construction of five new four-bedroom houses and the upgrade of one existing duplex. The estimated project cost .. is \$3,814,683." - \$700,000 plus for each house? No, let's not go there!

I have been rattling on for some time about the Govt.'s lethargy in social housing construction and am very happy to now eat humble pie. I eagerly await Steve's announcements on the progress of the possible further 45 dwellings in Barron River over the next 33 months.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

RE: Jenny's Jottings in your last edition,

Kuranda Envirocare's does support the council's upgrade project at this unsafe bridge crossing. However, we were not involved in the design or scheduling of works in the lead up to the wet season.

We alerted Council to the sensitive nature of the creek bed area as a Myola frog breeding site at the time the new bridge was announced on the project list. We were disappointed, however, to see the large disturbance footprint and the initial quality of sediment and erosion controls.

We contacted council on a number of occasions in October and November to advise on the need to improve sediment controls after a number of rain storms as initial controls were clearly inadequate. To their credit Council did improve the sediment controls and on-going maintenance may still be required to ensure their effective operation.

We also sought advice regarding the release of water from behind the council made dam wall upstream of the bridge and council followed that advice, also removing as much of their works material from the creek bed as practical, especially in the originally shallow frog breeding area.

Monty John Davis 30 July 1926-25 January 2010



ONTY DAVIS was born on the 30th July 1926 at Hughenden: the fourth child of twelve. He left school at 12 years old; mainly, he said because he was

Monty worked as a stockman on cattle properties around the central west of Queensland and around Hughenden today you can still hear stories of Monty and his

He married Myra Grace Delacour in Charters Towers on the 15th of January 1949. Myra was the fourth of ten children. In 1956 Monty, Myra and the first four children moved to Tinaroo to start work on the Tinaroo dam. Being a good bush mechanic, he rebuilt an old Fargo truck and with a dozen or so relatives on the back he would cruise along the flats – but all on board would have to jump out and help it up the hills.

In 1959 he and Myra, now with six kids in tow, moved to Kuranda. While in Kuranda Monty worked on the Barron River Hydro scheme and the new high-level bridge over the Barron. Monty loved his old Landrover and the chance to go bush for a short break. Each son would have a different story to tell about his own particular trip.

In Kuranda Monty built the family home (much to the Council's dismay) by demolishing old houses and salvaging what timber he could, and the nails if possible. Monty and Myra raised their twelve kids (and many others) in that house and although the house changed shape a few times it stood the wear and tear of his large ever-growing family for 45 years. Even the street it's on is called Monty Street.

He was a truly great man; loved by his family and all who knew him.

Monty John Davis will never be forgotten.

Book Sale: KNC held a week long book-sale that raised some funds to contribute to future programs (such as Safe Freedom for Young Men and similar programs). Right now we know families who need: washing machines, fridges and dryers. If you have any of those items that you no longer need, please give us a call.

Broadband for Seniors: Broadband for Seniors Kiosk providing two computers for broadband internet and email access for people aged 55 and over. It is a free service funded by the Queensland Government.

Starting a Vegetable **Patch**

There's great satisfaction in being able to pick vegetables from your own garden. They are as fresh as you can get and taste sensational. It doesn't take a lot of space to have a few plants like tomato, cucumber, lettuce and herbs – we have a great herb garden in pots under kitchen window where the eaves protect it from excessive rain.

While March can still be too hot and wet to really start a vegetable garden, it is never too early to plan it. If it is dry enough you could start adding manure, compost and lime/dolomite to the ground to give it a chance to break down before planting in April or May. If you have been growing green manure crops over the wet season, now is a good time to chop up the greenery and dig it into the vegetable beds.

Instead of having big areas to mow every other week, why not turn some of that lawn into a productive vegetable plot that can feed the family? If you don't want to dig the ground, raised beds can be placed straight on the lawn and filled with soil or try no-dig gardening with layers of lucerne hay and compost. You can even plant into old hay bales by creating a hollow in the bale and filling it with potting mix and compost to set the plants into. It provides an instant raised bed where the hay rots down as the plant grows.

If possible choose a garden spot that gets full sun most of the day for your vegetables. If it is partly shaded, morning sun is preferable to the hot afternoon sun. Run the rows north to south to give individual plants equal

As vegetables need to grow quickly with the least stress to provide a tender, tasty crop, make sure you prepare the ground well to give them a friable, well draining soil with lots of nutrients and organic material. Rainforest soils like Kuranda's clay are notoriously heavy and need lots of organic matter to open them up.

Cow manure and mushroom compost are some of the best soil conditioners, adding nutrients and organic matter to improve both sandy and clay soils. However some commercially bagged cow manure can be highly alkaline (pH 10) so don't add extra lime when using it and just spread it thinly. A light dressing of dolomite or garden lime may be necessary if the soil pH is too acidic (eg pH 4.5-6). Dolomite differs from garden lime in that it also contains magnesium. Yellowing leaves on plants often indicates a magnesium deficiency, another sign of acidic soil.

Most vegetables thrive with a pH around 6.5, which frees up nutrients and vital trace elements. Test kits for pH levels are available from plant nurseries and hardware shops.







THE BOOGIE BROTHERS MUSIC REVIEW - CD review

AL DI MEOLA - "World Sinfonia": This is a sampler - giving a taste of what Al Di Meola offers in concert. Simply, virtuosity, impeccable musicianship; free-flowing latino jazz journeys, exploring musical themes that showcase the exquisite musical talents of the players. If free-form latino-jazz with nice percussive chops is to your taste, you'll love it! If you're more attuned to clearly defined melody

lines and solid rock oriented structure you may find your attention wandering. Go see the concert and decide for yourself.

PORT O'BRIEN "Threadbare": An ethereal mix. Modern-day California Dreamin'. There's a touch of innocence of the early Beach Boys overlaid with the sweet velvet fog of the Cowboy Junkies. If you got into the recent flow of soft America, say Bon Iver etc then this is in the same vein - sweet and high. The lyrics are soaked with a good dose of angst - not much to laugh about in Port O'Brien it would seem - but it travels well: nice rolling rhythms and solid drumming: harmonies that hark back to the Beach Boys and the Beatles, with echoes of Neil Young drifting along that musical stream that links Canada and California. 

Awards presented at Australia Day



The Tablelands publicly honoured its community, sporting and cultural achievers at the 2010 Regional Australia Day celebration on 26th January, held at Merriland Hall Atherton. Mayor Tom Gilmore and Tablelands Regional Councillors announced the winners of the Regional Australia Day Awards in 12 categories, with Herberton's Ivan Searston named TRC 2010 Citizen of the Year.

Local Kuranda residents were represented in the nominations, including Mrs Kathryn Edwards who was nominated for the Senior Community Service Award and Mrs Krishna Buhler who was presented with a Quiet Achiever's Award in recognition of her service to the community.

Kathryn Edward's contribution to Kuranda and Tableland Region covers several areas across sport, cultural, education, tourism and environmental interests in this region since 1976.

Of particular note has been Kathryn's dedication to the Kuranda Pony Club, Mantaka, which secured a significant parcel of land and community infrastructure which has now benefited several generations of local children and which is a favourite sports venue

It is 16 years since this facility was secured through Kathryn's efforts. Activities such as horse sports competitions, regular pony club rally days, equine instruction schools, endurance rides and bush dances and fund raising events have all benefited from the infrastructure secured through her work. In the 1980s and early 1990s families coming to pony club had no electricity, no water, no toilets and it was difficult to maintain the enthusiasm of the membership.

for equestrians across the Tablelands.

This facility would not have eventuated without some single-minded dedication and persistence over many years. The land was Crown Land and was due to be returned to the Crown at the end of the pony club lease and would have been lost forever without intervention.

Kathryn worked with the then State Member, Tom Gilmore and Shire Clerk, Colin McDowell, the Lands Department and the State Sports and Recreation Department to secure the land in perpetuity and add built infrastructure through club fundraising, state grants and generous donations of time and effort by various locals including her husband, John.

Today, the Kuranda Pony Club is a prize asset for the Kuranda region. It is particularly significant that this year is the 40th anniversary of the 'Kuranda Pony Club Association' being in existence in Kuranda.

Kathryn was for 10 years the Kuranda Pony Club Secretary and Events Organiser, also founder / member of the Endurance Horse Riding Club FNQ for 20 years and Founder/Secretary of the Arabian Horse Club FNQ for 14 years.

Kathryn's artistic and small business expertise was shared for 5 years with the Mareeba Shire Council Regional Arts Development Committee of which she was a member.

She also participated in the support of the Kuranda Primary School and the Kuranda Information Centre for a number of years and is a life member of Kuranda Envirocare.

Krishna Buhler's contributions have not only been centred within the region close to where she has lived since 1990 but have extended across different areas of the Tablelands Shire and in various areas of activity. Her care for community is centred on its people and social well-being and she has created foundations in this community which extend to a wider network of people who help each other

Krishna stepped down last year from the position of President of Kuranda Information and Support Centre (the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre – next to the Australian Butterfly Sanctuary) after 10 years and is now an honorary member.

Krishna was an inaugural committee member in 1991 and in 2000 garnered the enthusiasm and commitment of a wide range of caring community members to manage the set up of the \$1.3m facility, and paid staff which now services the identified needs of the Kuranda community including; community group support and facilitation, family support and counselling, Interagency networking, community space for meetings, Senior's computer/internet support and service, Not for Profit Loan, second hand bookshop/photocopying, work and training experience opportunities and a Play Group Centre amongst other activities.

This contribution was facilitated concurrently whilst also managing a full time small business with husband Rudi and staff. Many of Krishna's business and management skills were transferred to this project, which benefited from the professionalism that she bought to management decisions.

Krishna's horticultural interests found her contributing to committees such as the Cairns Garden Expo, the Far North Qld Nursery Industry and the Mareeba Uniting Church Annual Flower Shows for over 15 years. Krishna was the initiator/Secretary in 1991 of the Kuranda Media Association (The Kuranda Paper), was actively involved for 8 years, and is now an honorary member.

Krishna's qualifications in theology and counselling equipped her to offer her skills as a Lifeline volunteer for Far North Queensland Community Care/Lifeline Australia for 10 years, preside over the Cairns Uniting Church hospital chaplaincy committee for 10 years, and conduct public services in Kuranda such as ANZAC Day and local church services.





THE KURANDA PAPER

An Active Indigenous Life

THE PROFILE FOR THIS MONTH is of an Indigenous lady who has lead a very active life and is still active in the community. She is Glenis Grogan, a member of the long established Grogan Family from the Kuranda area. However, she has an ancestry that extends beyond the local Djabugay people to include the Djurri (Mission Beach), Tagalaka (Croydon) and Western Yalanji (Palmer River/Maytown) peoples. Her ancestors include several members of the stolen generation. Glenis's family are also of Irish (Grogan) and Malayan (Assan) descent. Her mother June is still alive and living on their family block at Boyles Road. Her Indigenous family history involved much suffering and is still very much a living thing. This bred in her a strong sense of justice. She describes herself as a change leader rather than an activist

Born in Cairns, she was brought up in Kuranda. She attended the local school and then in Cairns. A bright student, she went to Business College in Brisbane until she was old enough to start nurses training. Glenis enrolled and completed both her General Nursing and Midwifery at Innisfail District Hospital. As a Registered Nurse, what followed was a long period working in various locations across the country, mostly with Indigenous people, in Queensland, Northern Territory, Western Australia and South Australia. Her first Nursing post was at the Normanton Hospital.

During this time Glenis and her sister (Sheryl) ran the first café in Kuranda called Bamboo Inn. She went to work to make money for the café equipment and never returned. Sheryl continued with the shop for some time – before she went off to work at Groote Island.

Glenis's early work in the Territory included a stint with the Central Aboriginal Congress where she was the first qualified Aboriginal Nurse. While there, she was a part of a team sent out to work among the Anangu people of the Pitjantjatjarra Desert Lands collecting data to set up their Homelands Health Service and later moved to the desert to work for the newly established service. She lived with the Pitjantjatjarra people for some years.

Glenis also coordinated the clinics in the Kuranda, Mareeba and the Tablelands area for the mass national eye health screening for Aboriginal people conducted by the late Fred Hollows and as a Nurse joined one of the Torres Strait Island screening teams

She became involved in assisting to establish several Indigenous services such as the Mookai Rosie Bi Bayun home for pregnant mums and was the first RN at Wu Chopperen Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Service in Cairns.

With a group of Indigenous health professionals she went to China in the 8os to look at the barefoot doctors scheme. During the mid 8os she worked the Cairns based Alcohol Rehabilitation Program and soon after with the Aboriginal Health Programme, looking after the Kuranda region and soon after ran the Mareeba program. Her husband was then appointed as ranger at Laura and she became the unofficial nurse as no paid position in Laura was available.

Her only son Brad had a motor bike accident at Mona Mona and living at Laura became difficult. Soon after she decided to leave Laura and separated from her husband, moving to Tennant Creek and worked as a midwife. After an attempt at reconciliation, she moved to Brisbane, and then to Perth for Brad to attend as a Boarding Student at the WA Carmel College. Glenis worked at the Coonana community outside of Kalgoorlie. While there, Curtin University of Technology staff discovered Glenis, an Indigenous nurse working there, and soon after offered her a position to steer the development of higher award courses in Indigenous Health for Indigenous Health Workers. This culminated in the then Premier Carmen Lawrence launching the Curtin University Associate Diploma and Bachelor of Applied Sciences in Indigenous Community Health.

Glenis was involved heavily in the development of these courses and the new Centre for Aboriginal Studies at Curtin University, a leader in its field. She was a tenured staff member/senior lecturer at Curtin even though she had not completed her Masters in Public Health. At the same time she undertook state and federal government consultancies in relation to Indigenous Health and Aboriginal terms of reference. She has given many lectures and has written many articles.

Glenis travelled widely and has been to New Zealand, China, Malaya, Mexico, various states of the USA and Canada.

In 1996, she took a position as District Manager with the Health Department at Weipa. Unfortunately this led to some conflict that took nearly eighteen months to resolve. Glenis was devastated at her treatment. She decided to give up health work. She moved to Bribie Island (unknown to her, according to Aboriginal people of that region is known as the Place of Healing Sands). She with family set up a home maintenance business and worked at part-time as a Cultural Liaison Officer at Woodford Men's Correctional Centre. During this time at Bribie Island, she re-established and further developed her interest in the arts and held markets at Eumundi and Brisbane Riverside. Glenis was always interested in Aboriginal Art and had also worked in a Cairns Art Gallery for a few months as a younger woman.


Her father (Finley) died in 2001 and by 2003 she decided to move back to Kuranda to look after her mother and to manage Ngoonbi while the then Executive Officer was away on leave. She tried an Indigenous Art Shop in Therwine Street without much success. In July 2007, she and her cousin Coralie took over the shop in Central Coodoo Street, trading as Djurri Dadagal Art Enterprises, which she still successfully runs.

Among her other current activities she is on the Western Yalanji Aboriginal Corporation RNTBC and the Mona Mona Steering Committee. She goes to Perth at least once a year to see her 14 year old Grandson Tuan. She also has a 10 month old Granddaughter Timmirri who lives in Cairns.

Her present objectives include getting her Gallery in order, supporting local Indigenous artists and further development towards reclaiming local ownership of local Indigenous art. She's optimistic about the future and sees plenty of scope for Aboriginal people today and for future empowerment and self development for individuals, family and the community in general. She says that we must be responsible for our own issues and to develop our own capacities with appropriate support. She believes that you must never stop, her father's words being that there is no such word as "can't". Her long term aim is to set up a healing centre in this area. We hope she succeeds!

A Thought for March

This month we open our Bibles to St Luke's gospel Chapter 5 and read verses to 11. As we watch Jesus move towards Simon's boat and climb into it we might ask ourselves a question. What in my life could Jesus use? Are there things I may not think a great deal of, things I take for granted, which I could offer my Jesus? Could he use some of my time? Could he use some of my money? Could he use some of my professional gifts? These things are to each of us what Simon's boat was to him.

"Put out into the deep water and let down your nets. Simon is nonplussed. They have just had a frustrating night: they didn't catch a thing. However, Simon pulls out into the lake, probably expecting to say "I told you so." What happens shakes him to the depths of his being. They are inundated with fish; so much so that they have to yell for help.

What would it mean for you and for me for Jesus to say to us "Put out into the deep and let down your nets?" He might be saying that he wants us to invest ourselves in areas where we are holding back. He might be saying that he wants us to invest more, risk more, contribute more to our marriage, or our job, or our children or our own spiritual journey. He might be suggesting that if we don't expect more we will certainly not find more!

Simon responds to the great catch by feeling unworthy. He has done nothing to deserve it. But, come to think of it, when we look at the various blessings we have been given, can we really say that we deserve them? If there is any truth in that thought, then perhaps it is time for us to bow down to Jesus and acknowledge our unworthiness, as Peter did. Our Lord's great generosity and love toward us will fill us with a sense of gratitude, and will give us a sense of great joy. I know that this may sound too simple, yet the good news of Christ is essentially simple! Jesus said that unless we can be childlike, which surely includes simplicity; we can't even see

If Jesus said to his disciples "You will be catching men,' and if we claim to be his disciples today, what can this promise mean for us? It will mean different things for each of us. But surely it means for all of us that we find some way of communicating to others that faith in Jesus Christ is an important factor in our lives. After all, if you or I discovered something of immense help to us, wouldn't we share it with others for whom we care? If Jesus used Simon's boat, what ordinary and taken-for granted elements of our lives could be use?



Kuranda District State College has begun the year with significant growth and community support. MAZLIN CREEK GARDENS CSA: How it started

IN MID 2007, after both of us had spent several (collective) years travelling, working, volunteering and WWOOFing at organic and biodynamic farms, we decided we wanted to get our teeth into something. The concept of Community Supported Agriculture was all but unheard of in FNQ, so before we launched into a full scale system, we grew mixed vegetables and herbs at home, where we live with our extended family of seven.

We supplied a small number of families and individuals (seven, to be exact), with vegetables and herbs for a few months. In the meantime, we researched CSAs and their myriad beginnings. One thing was apparent: they were all completely different. The only common thread seemed to be that they were passionate about creating a link between wholesome food, the grower and the people who eat it.

We did an initial market research survey, and from the respondents of that we drew our first members. We agreed with a landowner that we would rent one hectare of land from him at the going rate, that is, \$300 per year, per acre. We started work in about August 2008. The area was mapped out on paper, then the landlord fenced the land and put a water line in. We paid for a contractor to deep rip the soil. We spent a lot of money on irrigation, tools, a tractor, and all the various equipment we needed to begin. We built a potting shed and another shelter.

Before anything could be sown we had to plan for our members needs. We had started out with twelve paid up members. They had signed up for three months, starting in November 2008. Before we put a seed in the ground we meticulously planned the quantities we'd need to produce every week, based on the area required for each crop. We had to bear in mind bad weather, failures and natural attrition rates, and still give our members a decent selection of weekly vegetables. We were on a steep learning curve, and still are.

We used, and still use, a combination of organic and biodynamic growing methods. We regularly sprayed out 500 and 501, made BD compost, and used various BD-enhanced compost teas, but by no means are we experts in biodynamics. We attended as many BDFNQ (the local biodynamics association) events as we could and tried to put as much as possible into practice.

In 2009 we signed up 22 member families, or about 60-70 people - and we have supplied produce from May until December. We grew about 90% of the contents of the boxes, but bought potatoes and garlic from a certified farm in Kaban, and avocadoes from an organic grower in Kairi. The crops we had varied from season to season but included potatoes, onions, garlic, carrots, beetroot, parsnips, lettuce, Asian greens, radishes, broccoli, cabbages, zucchini, tomatoes, cucumbers, corn, silverbeet, and peas.

We took on 2 volunteers (we wanted to have more, but we were restricted by the fact that we didn't own the land). There were issues with insurance because we didn't have any and really didn't want to pay a bunch of parasites in an insurance company. In the end the volunteers, who were friends as well as colleagues, signed a Disclaimer Statement to the effect that we wouldn't be legally liable if they got injured.

In 2010 we have other plans. At the moment we are meeting with about eight other organic/biodynamic growers to create a food co-op which we will all use to sell our produce locally. There is growing demand for organic/biodynamic produce. A lot of people get in touch with me asking when they can join. From our perspective, it will take the pressure off us to try to supply the growing numbers who are keen to get involved! We still intend to keep our CSA going, only it will be under the name of our new co-op.

We are always willing to talk to others about CSA and growing food in general. It's our belief that we should all be cooperating in our work. There will always be room for one more CSA, wherever we are. CSAs are small scale, beautiful, individual, and life-affirming! They can supply 5 families, or 300. They are created according to the needs of their members, and so, inevitably, they are the reflection of a positive, empowered, and *healthy* community.

A Message from the Hopi Elders for 2010


You have been telling people this is the Eleventh Hour.

New Agreement for Kuranda Tourism Infrastructure, Upgrade to Amphitheatre

A new agreement between the State Government and Tablelands Regional Council that will ensure funding for tourism-related infrastructure in Kuranda over the next 10 years will be signed at 2.30pm on March 1 at the Kuranda Amphitheatre, which is also the focus of celebrations with the completion of an important upgrade to the facility.

Minister for Local Government Desley Boyle will join with Tablelands Mayor Tom Gilmore and Chief Executive Officer Ian Church to sign the new Kuranda Infrastructure Agreement which will replace the previous agreement.

Over the years, the agreement has provided funding through the agreement has been used over the years to provide Kuranda with improved infrastructure including the Lower Therwine Street footpath, the refurbishment of Coondoo Street, improvements to Centenary Park and the upgrading of Wrights Lookout.

A number of projects are currently in the planning stages for the village in the rainforest, with the Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee set to develop a new 10-year strategic and conceptual plan over the next six months in association with lead consultants, the Arup Group.

Arup will be consulting widely with businesses and local residents on matters such as traffic and parking, tourism infrastructure and streetscape and has established a dedicated website (www.kurandain frastructureplan.com.au) which will keep locals up to date on projects, background information and

will be a host for surveys that will tap into the views of residents, visitors and businesses.

Kuranda will also be celebrating a \$125,000 upgrade to its famous amphitheatre. The project means the Kuranda Amphitheatre Society can look forward to operating with a reliable power supply without blackouts, flickering, overloads and common power failures.

The project objectives were:

- to increase the power supply coming into the Kuranda Amphitheatre.
- to upgrade the stage power installations to accommodate at least 400kva.
- to upgrade all auxiliary power installations to safety standards.
- to create an electrically safe venue for the greater community and groups.
- to enable the Kuranda Amphitheatre Society to promote the facility to the region as a whole.

The upgrade will virtually eliminate the need for hire generators with significant cost savings to the Society which in turn will improve the financial viability of the Society to host major acts and attract high profile artists which will be beneficial to the wider Kuranda community and to the region as a whole.

The State Government, through the Rural Living Infrastructure Program, contributed \$50,000 to the works, with Tablelands Regional Council contributing \$50,000 and another \$25,000 was contributed by the Society.

Community Cash Grants Available

Tablelands Regional Council invites applications from eligible, not-for-profit community organisations to apply for cash donations up to \$3,000 under the Financial and In-Kind Support Program.

Applications close at 4.45pm on Monday, 1 March 2010 and must be made on the relevant application form. No late applications will be accepted.

The purpose of the Financial and In-kind Support Program is to provide financial assistance to community organisations in order to:

- Contribute to the social, economic, cultural and environmental benefit and wellbeing of residents in the Tablelands region;
- Support the fabric of community life in the region including supporting festivals, community events and celebrations;
- Support not-for-profit groups and organisations that rely on volunteers;
- Provide seed funding for new initiatives; and
- Increase the capacity of community organisations to leverage other sources of funding for community projects.

Two funding rounds will be held each year for cash donations, September and March.

COUNCIL ACTS ON PARKING ISSUES

A dedicated Local Laws officer will be employed by Tablelands Regional Council to focus on managing regulated parking areas within Mareeba, Atherton and Kuranda.

Council also decided to increase parking fines from \$10 to \$20 to fund the new position after numerous complaints from business owners in the three shopping precincts that vehicles were being parked in available

The increase in parking fines will not be passed on until the appropriate processes have been completed which will take several months, as the parking fines as part of the Local Laws.

Steering Committee to investigate the establishment of performing arts centre

A steering committee will be formed to investigate the possibility of establishing a purpose-built performing arts centre for the Tablelands region. A preliminary

report into the proposal was presented to Tablelands Regional Council's Mareeba meeting yesterday which indicated that a dedicated performing arts centre could cost between \$5 million and \$15 million.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said Council would not be committing to the project before it determined whether there was a desire or need for such a facility, where it may be located, what form it would take, and how it would be funded.

The preliminary report stated that based on advice from Cairns Regional Council, the cost to establish a theatre that would seat approximately 500-600 people could be around \$7.5 million. Taking into account possible subsidies from government and public donations, Council could be facing a contribution of around \$5 million. The report also estimates that annual costs to operate and maintain the centre would be in the vicinity of \$500,000.

Council will soon advertise for expressions of interest from groups or individuals who wish to be part of the Performing Arts Centre Steering Committee which will also include four Councillors - Cr Evan McGrath, Cr Jenny Jensen, Cr Chris Adams and Cr Len Curtis.



Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

It depends on the work load, but normally I treat my art work as my day job.

Describe the work you do in your studio.

Mainly metal sculptures, various commissions, some 'homewares' in various metals, stainless steel and precious metals. My metal fruit bowls are very popular.

List three things you listen to while working.

My mind, my hammers, and my bank manager's words ring in my ears.

Your favourite tool?

Hammers, I love them.

How do you identify your work? (signature/stamp/chop)

With my engraved signature.

How do you sell your work?

Through our own gallery, Verandah Gallery Studios in Mareeba, and from other regional art galleries, exhibitions, our website, promotions, and sometimes art markets.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

Our gallery and studio is open for sales to the public most days. I do not teach, however, if any other local artist requires advice or assistance I readily help out.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

I do periodical maintenance at hydro power stations around the country to placate the bank manager.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

Drainage. I have an outdoor studio and although covered, the elements sometimes get in, particularly in the wet season.

If you were not working with art what would you be doing?

I would do anything that would require my creativity. I can't imagine a life without creating. I have been doing this for so long it has become part of me, physically and metaphysically.

Rates, water usage now all in one account

Rates notices issued, residents urged to pay in discount period

Tablelands residents will now only get one bill twice a year for all Council rates and service charges including water consumption.

Tablelands Regional Council has streamlined its accounts system so that ratepayers will pay one bill twice a year that will contain all charges including general rates, water access, water consumption, the State fire levy, and applicable waste and sewerage charges.

More than 23,000 ratepayers will receive their half-yearly accounts in the mail this week, and are being urged to pay the full amount owing by close of business on Monday, 29 March 2010 to take advantage of the 10 per cent discount on the rates portion of the account.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said he recognised the difficulty people had paying their rates and other charges and encouraged them

to contact Council immediately if they were experiencing financial issues

"The message is 'don't wait until it's too late' - people should call Council and make an arrangement to pay if they are having problems," he said.

"I also urge people to consider setting up a direct payment arrangement whereby a certain amount of money is debited from their bank account on a regular basis and paid directly into their rates account.

"Rates are one of those bigger bills and when they come, they can leave a fairly large hole in the family budget.

"A direct payment arrangement is one way Council can help to ease that financial burden. The 10 per cent discount will still apply, provided rates and other charges are paid in full by the due date."

Those people wishing to take this action

should make the arrangement with their bank. Ratepayers should ensure they use their billing number or property number as a reference (this can be found on the top right corner of the rates notice).

A pensioner discount also applies to those holders of a State Government Pensioner Concession Card or Repatriation Gold Card. Rates can be paid at all of the Council's service centres or agencies. A detailed list of agency locations and opening hours is on the back of the rates notice.

Payment can be made via BPay, EFTPOS including debit and credit card (Council only accepts Mastercard and Visa credit cards), cheque and money orders.

Ratepayers are reminded that BPay transactions should be processed and funds cleared into Council's bank account on or before the discount date, to benefit from the discount.

Community cash grants on offer

Tablelands Regional Council invites applications from eligible, not-forprofit community organisations to apply for cash donations up to \$3,000 under the Financial and In-Kind Support Program. Applications close at 4.45pm on Monday, 1 March 2010 and must be made on the relevant application form. Two funding rounds will be held each year for cash donations -

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Residents of Speewah - We Are at the Crossroads

What lies ahead for our future?

It is crunch time! Do residents want a voice to represent their interests in Speewah or will the 20 year old Residents Association wind up? If you, as a resident of Speewah, are interested in our future, please read on...

Over the past 20 years the interests of Speewah residents have been "looked after" by an Incorporated body of interested residents who established and operated The Speewah District Residents Association Incorporated. This association has met at least four times each year to consider issues that affected the amenities and lifestyle of our residents.

A bit of History (which may be helpful for new or recent residents)

The association was formed in 1990 to discuss a major development application for the rural property know as "Boonaloo".

Ron and Pam Elgar, the owners of this property, were proposing a major development of their property called "Boonaloo". Ron and Pam had hired consultant to draw up plans for an 18 hole golf course, along with a lot of accommodation in the form of condominiums. It was the era when the Japanese were the dominant group of tourist visiting the Far North: they were particularly interested in playing golf and wanted to buy residences or holiday homes in Australia.

Some residents had approached the Elgars to seek more information on their proposal. The information was not made available. It was then decided by a few residents to have an Incorporated body to represent the interests of residents. This was done and after the Incorporated Association was established, a public meeting was held. The Elgars were asked if their consultant could attend the meeting to answer questions and give answers to the concerns of the residents about the proposed development.

The Elgars agreed to the Association's request and the consultant was present at the meeting to give answers to the residents questions.

The establishment of the Residents Association made the developer more accountable to the community than to individual members of the community and this strength has proved of value in subsequent issues as well. The outcome of the consultations was a revised development of rural residential blocks.

Development application by Bob Norman for 51 Park Residential blocks

Bob Norman applied to Mareeba Shire Council for the above-mentioned development on the site of the present "Possum Valley" on the Douglas Track.

Mareeba Shire Council agreed to his application with the condition that reticulated water be provided to the site. Council passed a motion to allow Bob Norman to bring water from the Kuranda Village from the end of Masons Road. The Council was to assume an easement from landholders to enable easy access to bring the water to the subdivision. This would have saved Bob Norman a lot of money. Council also announced that the Speewah area would be required to connect to the Kuranda water supply from the new development. As this was not a viable option for the Speewah residents, after a lot of discussion, this decision was reversed with the new development now being constructed into rural residential blocks.

TV Reception Blackspot Funding.

When it was announced that this community was not eligible for Blackspot Funding (as there were not sufficient residents or interest in this area), the Association gathered sufficient evidence and made representation to the local member Warren Entsch and Mareeba Shire Council and the Communications Dept it was decided that we were entitled to the reception.

Roscommon Park Community Development.

In 1983 the then Grove Creek Rural Fire Brigade was formed and is now known as Speewah RFB. When they purchased their fire truck it was recognised that a suitable location was required to house their equipment. Through a combined effort, representation was made to Mareeba Shire Council for a site to house community facilities, be made from their developers parks contribution fund. Council then came to the party and purchased the corner block which now houses the RFB and the tennis courts. The council has now also provided this community with children's play equipment, a dressage ring and picnic table. The members of the association wish to continue with the work that has been done in the past but it will only be possible with input from the community. If you are interested in looking after your community by becoming a member please join us at the **next AGM (the first for some time), which will be held at the RFB Shed on Roscommon Park on Monday 22th March commencing at 7.30 pm**. Membership of \$5 is requested to assist with the running costs of the Association.

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Controversy Over the Kuranda Train ServicePeter Ryle

WITH THE GRIDLOCK on the access roads north and south of Cairns at peak traffic times, many people are suggesting that Queensland Rail provide a commuter transport system utilizing the existing rail tracks. This is not a new idea, as regular railmotor services were provided on both north and south lines for many years. Even before the introduction of railmotors, the Railway Department was planning a new timetable offering a commuter train service between Cairns and Kuranda. as early as 1913.

However, good intentions do not always end in good results. A correspondent writing under the pseudonym "Passenger" wrote to *The Cairns Post* in November 1913 doubted the Railway Department could run an efficient service:

Sir,- There has been a great deal said about a new Time Table coming into force shortly, which will enable business people of Cairns to reside at Kuranda during the summer or permanently, as they are to arrive in time for business in the morning and return in reasonable time in the evening. This would be a great boon indeed and one sought for many years, but under the present management would it be a success? What is wanted is an up-to-date management with some idea of what half an hour's delay in 20 miles means to a business man going or returning from his office. Last Wednesday and Saturday the trains leaving Cairns at 5 o'clock and 3.20 p.m. respectively were about half an hour late. The cause appears to be running an overloaded goods train in front of the passengers in one case, and overloading the mixed train in the other. Last night the passenger train stuck on the range a quarter of an hour at a time, through overloading a small engine. A few extra people are now living at Kuranda anticipating a new service. Is the Traffic Manager trying to disgust them before the new service comes in?

Other correspondents to the paper defended the operation of the railway, pointing out that the traffic manager was only in charge of one facet of the system, and had no control over the speed allowed over any section of the track or the power of the engine pulling the train. One correspondent writing in November 1913 under the name "Steele Rudd" criticized "Passenger's" letter:

Take the last affair when the afternoon train stuck on the Range, and a Kuranda resident was late for dinner and had to take his soup cold. Surely he did not blame the Traffic Manager for the engine losing steam? — in conclusion I will offer a suggestion to the folks who desire this express service. Let them collect the names of fifty persons who are willing to avail themselves of its use, and hand in their applications for first-class yearly season tickets along with the cash for same, and then see if the Railway Department will meet them; and in the meantime extend a little more fair play to the Traffic Manager.

The controversy raged on, with one group of people sending a telegram to the Commissioner for Railways complaining about the service. This brought a reaction in January 1914 when "Fogsignal" wrote a letter to *The Cairns Post* and *The Northern Herald*:

Sir,- Fully 99 per cent of the Cairns public are heartily sick and tired of reading these tirades against the Traffic Manager, regarding "late trains to Kuranda". None of the "Noble Nine" who signed that famous telegram to the Railways Commissioner at the New Year had the common decency to come out in the open and state their complaints, and suggest a reasonable remedy in the press with their names appended. They prefer to hide their identity under such nom-deplume as "passenger." Perhaps if the truth were known they were dead-heads, because some were very likely traveling at their firm's expense. They forget that on that particular day, the up-train had a very valuable freight on board, some 300 navvies going to work on the Mount Mulligan line, and it was far more important to the State in general that they should be conveyed to their destination safely and speedily; besides, they were all wage earners, and the loss of half a day's pay to them was of some concern, whilst on the other hand, the "Noble Nine" who were delayed at Kuranda did not risk losing a half-day's pay, in fact a few days more rest might have improved their digestive organs.

It is strange but true, that one of them is noted for missing the train at Nelson, and is often seen motoring into Cairns on that account; perhaps the next time he is going to Kuranda he will take his motor up Douglas Track, and be independent of trains.

"Fogsignal" seemed oblivious of the irony of him criticizing the "Noble Nine" for not having the decency to append their names to their complaint while he wrote under a nom-de-plume himself.

The editor of *The Cairns Post* even entered the fray. He pointed out that the railways had to pay for themselves and said the Cairns railway was probably the most difficult line in the state to operate. It had to service vast distances of harsh terrain, but the area had little population to make the lines pay. He said "We would be only too delighted to see fast expresses speeding up and down the Range at short intervals. But all that kind of thing depends upon a reasonably dense population."

Not to be outdone, "Blowfly" entered into the fray with yet another letter to the papers about the subject. It is clear that correspondents then had no fear of being sued for defamation. There seemed to be no insult that was too crude to use:

Sir,- I have been suffering from influenza during this week, but the unpleasantness of my complaint has been modified somewhat by my amusement at the wild effusions of correspondents who are attacking the management of the Cairns railway. The only sensible letter I have seen on the subject is that which appears under the nom-de-plume of "Fogsignal." I agree with him that our local Traffic Manager believed in the greatest good for the greatest number, and not bowing and scraping to any little clique who, if attendance is not danced upon them, wire hysterically to the Commissioner about their alleged paltry grievances.

As to the letter which appeared from "Passenger" a few days ago I have my doubts if he is a genuine passenger at all, judging from his rubbishy effusion. He is biased from the very first sentence, and is out from beginning to end to condemn the whole railway management. Let me again din the fact into the stupid powers of apprehension, evidently possessed by "Passenger," that the Cairns railway is admitted to be the best managed in the State. We have had visitors from all parts of the world here, but never a complaint from them about the way the railway is run. It is only a local clique, who should get the burr out of their whiskers, who are crying unceasingly day and night. Anyway, Kuranda is only a one-eyed place at the best of times. There is not very much permanent settlement there, and what does it matter if a train is a few minutes late.

As to "Passenger" saying that the members of the Shire (Barron Shire I suppose he means) who were traveling to their meeting in Cairns did some tall swearing because they were delayed a little at Kuranda, I don't believe it. From press reports the Councilors seem to reserve their category of recriminations for the meetings, and don't bother about paltry trifles at Kuranda. The whole letter of "Passenger" reminds me of a lunatic obsessed with one idea, and no power in heaven or the other place will remove it.

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

Regarding the letter from "Flyblown," I think he must be a Chinaman, as to make any logic out of his arguments I should doubtless have to read them backwards.

The letter from "Nemo" reminded me of a drunken man who has gone to a waterhole to light his pipe. From beginning to end his screed is one tirade of stupid assertions, and in not one sentence is a grain of wisdom to be found. "Nemo's" attempt to be funny is a hopeless failure, and I should advise him to go in for breeding alligators or some other harmless pastime before he attempts the impossible task of proving that the management of the Cairns Railways is up to mud. He says he attended an excursion and was not satisfied with the carriages. The next time he goes I would advise Mr. Prewett (the traffic manager) to put the Governor's State car on for his special

Despite the furor being played out in the local newspapers one Kuranda publican saw the proposed new timetable as a boon to his trade. The Cairns Post carried a notice in April 1914:

Living at Kuranda, enjoying the mountain air, is now within the reach of all who attend business from 9 till 5. The morning train arrives at Cairns at ten to 9 each morning, and leaves for Kuranda at ten past 5. permanent arrangements can be made for board at Hunter's Barron Falls Hotel. Season tickets cost only 1/- per day.

Obviously there were some residents of Cairns who were satisfied with the railway service, as an article in The Cairns Post in June 1915 under the heading "Over The Range" shows:

Some 350 persons traveled by Sunday's excursion train to Kuranda and Mareeba. The "Midsummer Night's Dream" party, numbering about 60, got out at Kuranda, where Mr. Hogan entertained them to games behind the State School. Mr. and Mrs. Cordug brought their instruments, and contributed music. Cairns was reached again at 8.15 p.m., all having spent a most enjoyable day. The railway arrangements were excellent, and all the carriages were well lighted.

One interesting article in *The Cairns Post* in September 1925 raised the prospect of an innovation in rail services:

Now the warmer weather is approaching, the matter of a rail auto-car to ply between Cairns and Kuranda should be urged upon the railway authorities. These convenient conveyances are no longer in the experimental stage. In England and America, as well as New South Wales and New Zealand they are in regular use, with good results. If the car or cars were running between Cairns and the Barron Falls, and Kuranda, it would be a splendid medium for residents and visitors, and, it need not interfere in any way with the train service. Indeed auto-cars should prove a good thing for the department and officials, as well as for the public passengers. And the cars could run at more irregular intervals than can the heavily mixed trains. They would be a great boon in the summer season. Then in the winter term the tourists would avail themselves of the cars.

It is difficult to discover if the "autocars" referred to in the article were what we call railmotors or if they were some other form of vehicle.

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

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Weeds are winning?

Weeds are popping up all over at present; perfect conditions for them. One worrying weed, which is harder to control the larger it gets, is Sickle pod. You can see a great crop on the property at the corner of Myola and High Chapparal Roads, amongst the pine trees. Happily, it's being dealt with there and already dying off.

Sickle pod is a class 2 declared weed which means it's established in the State and has adverse impact. By law, land owners must take reasonable steps to keep the land free of these weeds.

It's related to annual weeds, grows up to 2.5m high and 1m wide. It has leaves divided into 3 opposite pairs, rounded at the end and wedge shaped at the base. It has five-petalled yellow flowers and a long slender seed pod, 10-15cm in length. Recognise it now?



As it's said "A stitch in time saves nine". So too with sickle pod. The most common manner of spread between properties is via cattle or horses eating seed pods and passing the seeds out in their dung. Seeds can be viable for up to 10 years so treat infestation before seeding the first time.

Small actions with big consequences


Sometimes the little things we do can have a big effect on our environment. This week a young fig bird was rescued after becoming entangled in human hair that had been discarded from a hair brush. The young bird's feet were bound tightly together and must have been for quite a while as the hair had cut into the bird's legs and toes. The bird had struggled along the ground and as a result, twigs and leaves had also been caught up in the hair. It looked like all that was needed was to remove the hair from the bird. However, as the bird was cut free it was obvious that the bird's toes had become deformed through being bound for so long and its feet started to bleed. There was also hair on the bird's beak and as this was removed a large ball of hair came out of its mouth. At first it was thought that the bird could manage with a deformed foot. However, after a visit to the vet it was discovered the bird had a broken leg and was unable to perch or hold itself upright. Sadly, it had to be euthanised for its own sake.

Who would have thought that throwing the hair in your hairbrush to the wind could have such a disastrous consequence.

Many hands make light work

Over the past few weeks, 700 students have enjoyed the experience of working at the Kuranda Conservation Community Native Plant Nursery and planting trees for the benefit of the Kuranda community along the Fairyland Road boundary of the Kuranda College.

They have converted the unsightly barrier of prickly guinea grass and wild raspberry into a wall of low growing, bushy, colourful native trees and erosion-resisting Lomandra. The revegetation project provides a border for the 4Ss project (Sustainable Society, Schools and Sawmills) timber growing project and the new playing fields at the school. 

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
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

Amphitheatre: Joint funding from Council, the state government and the Amphitheatre Society has enabled the recent electrical upgrade at the Kuranda Amphitheatre. The Amphitheatre is a wonderful asset in our community and it is great to see these works now completed. There will be a small ceremony on March 1st at 2.30pm to "open" the electrical upgrade. Everyone is welcome.

Works at Old Primary School: The works on Block C, the Undercover Shelter area, the toilet/ shower block and Sports Store shed are very close to completion. These works were funded under the federal government's RLCIP program and will be officially opened by Jim Turnour MP on Saturday March 6th from **8.30am to 10.30am**. The Kuranda community is invited to attend the opening and the free BBQ breakfast. The Advisory Committee is currently working on Guidelines for use of these facilities. Other areas of the old school have not yet been repaired. The old Pre-School is available for commercial lease. Interested parties can contact Dean Davidson at Council (Email: deand@trc.qld.gov.au)

FIKS Grants applications: All community groups and organisations are invited to apply for small grants (up to \$3000) to assist them in their work. Grants can cover such things as events, projects and equipment. Applications for these Financial and In-Kind Support Grants (FIKS) are now open and closing date is March

1st. Contact person is Gwen Fyfe at **gwenf@trc.qld.** gov.au or phone 40434112. No late applications are accepted. The next round of applications will not be until September, so don't miss out.

RADF Grants: Applications for grants from the Regional Arts development Fund (RADF) close on May 1st. Local artists and cultural workers can apply to RADF under the categories of projects, individual professional development, skills development workshops and concept development. Full details are available on the TRC website or by contacting Gwen Fyfe on 4043 4112 or email gwenf@trc.qld.gov.au Tourism Infrastructure: On March 1st, the new Kuranda Infrastructure Agreement will be signed with the Minister for Local Government. This will ensure funding from the State government for tourism related infrastructure in Kuranda over the next 10 years. In preparation for planning for projects, the Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee (KIAC) will be developing a new Strategic Plan. Over the next 6 months, a team from Arup will be preparing the new plan and will be consulting widely with businesses and local residents on matters such as traffic and parking, tourism infrastructure and streetscape design. Further details will be published to residents very soon.

Gardens and Figs: With the assistance of ITEC Employment, a team will soon begin work on gardens projects and irrigation systems in the village area. Council staff are also investigating ways to ensure the long term health of the large fig trees in Coondoo Street.

Composting Trial: Council has agreed in principle to undertake a 12 month Composting Trial at the Mareeba Transfer Station. The details of the Trial are still being finalised. The project will see waste composted to produce materials which will be sold to farms in the local area. This is an exciting initiative as it provides great potential for the future.

Safer Communities: Council has recently made application for funding for 2 projects to assist in creating safer communities across the region. We are still awaiting the outcome of the application (hopefully it will be approved). If the application is successful, the funding will assist in providing more Youth Activities across the region and a trial CCTV project in Kuranda. If you are interested in more details, please contact

Aged Care Housing: Council has been successful in accessing federal funding of \$3.3million to build pensioner units across the region. Two new units will be built in Kuranda and these are expected to be available by December this year. To be eligible for consideration for allocation of these units, a current application is required. Please contact Council for further information on how to apply.

New Planning Scheme: Many residents will be aware that Council is developing a new planning scheme which will direct and manage growth over the entire Tablelands region. The new Planning Scheme will replace the four separate planning schemes of the former Atherton, Eacham, Herberton and Mareeba Shire Councils. This is a complex and lengthy process. A number of projects I have been working on for some time are now coming to fruition.

Most residents will be aware that tourists travelling to Kuranda on the scenic rail and Skyrail pay a levy that is used to fund tourism infrastructure in Kuranda. The levy is collected by the state and given to Tablelands Regional Council to spend according to the terms of a formal agreement, originally made in 1997. If it were not for this levy, ratepayers would have been saddled with the cost of keeping Kuranda an attractive tourist destination.

In 2007, I initiated a process of reviewing the original levy arrangements which has resulted in the complete re-negotiation of the agreement to reflect modern practice and current circumstances The new agreement, to be signed at community cabinet, extends the life of the levy for a further five years until 2019. Now, the continued development of tourism infrastructure can be planned with confidence and certainty.

Residents will soon be asked to have input into the development of a new strategic plan that will guide the

development of new infrastructure that will benefit the fire season. residents and tourists.

Also at Community Cabinet, a major electricity upgrade at Kuranda Amphitheatre will be officially opened. In 2006, I secured a state government election commitment of \$50,000 toward patron safety enhancements at the amphitheatre. That funding commitment has leveraged additional funding of

\$30.000 from the amphitheatre society and matching funds from TRC. The Kuranda amphitheatre is a famous and much loved venue among locals and performers. It is one of very few community managed and controlled entertainment venues in the country and I am delighted to have been able to support live outdoor cultural events in the heart of Kuranda.

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


