Feedback On Fig Trees

It was with great interest and some concern that I read the front cover story on the Coondoo Street figs. I am pleased that the council recognises the importance and value of these icons of Kuranda and is prepared to spend a considerable sum of money on their preservation. I don't doubt the good intentions and integrity of people who have been involved, but as a professional horticulturist with over thirty five years experience I disagree with the assessment and recommendations of the report.

Firstly I think that the trees having 'a short lifespan due to the growing conditions' is not necessarily true. They are essentially growing in containers, and having grown many species of figs as Bonsai I feel I can safely say that they can adapt to their growing conditions and live for an indefinite period if their nutritional needs are met. Figs are gross feeders with a high demand for nitrogen; their roots naturally spread over the forest floor in a thick layer of leaf mulch. In their current situation they have almost no sources of nitrogen available to them and I believe this is the main cause of their lack of vigour. This could be easily and economically remedied in any number of ways.

I am glad to see that the editor corrected the description of the epiphytes as parasitic. I would hope that the arborist who wrote the report also understood the distinction. Epiphytes are a natural and perhaps even beneficial part of the ecology of large fig trees. A visit to the Cathedral Fig near Lake Barrine should be enough to convince even a casual observer that large figs occur as a whole community of plants and animals, rather than discrete individuals. Of course, large basket ferns at the end of long skinny limbs have the potential to be a falling hazard, but I hope that the epiphytes will be assessed on a individual basis and not all removed as a matter of course.

If I read it correctly, I understand that the council has rejected the recommendations to remove trees, either now or every 5 to 8 years, and the council is to be greatly commended for this approach.

I would be concerned about what the 'more suitable species' would be if they were replaced; I guess ones that aren't as 'messy'. Figs by their nature produce and drop a lot of fruit and this is what makes them so important to local ecologies.

At the time of writing, many of the trees have just produced a big flush of healthy new growth. Managed properly, I believe the trees have the potential to outlive us all.

Social Housing

Steve Wettenhall, Member for Barron River, lauded his considerable achievements over the last five years (KP Sep 11).

Steve said "a local action plan is being developed and I am confident that I will be able to secure additional funding to address the need for housing in Kuranda".

With only five homes built in the Kuranda region over the last fifteen years it is quite churlish of Steve to assert "it is a pity some media chose only to focus on the negative and ignore the progress being made".

Steve has avoided addressing my letters (KP May & July) on the *lack of progress of the "massive roll-out of social housing across the state. This "massive roll-out" announced in Jan 10 includes 260 for FNQ (four electorates) by 2012.* Barron River has 37 units being constructed at Palm Cove and Trinity Park (and none for Kuranda region), leaving 223 for Mulgrave, Cairns and Cook electorates.

So I ask Steve to stop ducking and weaving and respond to a simple question – how are the 260 housing units in FNQ allocated between these four electorates?

I don't want to start this process all over again in 2012 with the next local member.

Next year Tourism Kuranda will be including some evening activities to encourage all the contestants and families to overnight in the village. Discover a Turtle

Keep the kids active in the school holidays with one of the many walks around Kuranda where they will discover exciting things such as the turtles in Jum Rum Creek. From the Visitor Information Centre three linked paths form an easy circuit walk through the rainforest in Kuranda Village which takes only an hour for the family to do at a leisurely pace.

The Jum Rum Creek walk follows a short paved path past the fire station on Coondoo Street to the Jum Rum Creek Conservation Park where it winds through rainforest, crosses Jum Rum Creek, and then climbs to Barron Falls Road. At this point it connects to the Jungle Walk, which continues through rainforest to the River Walk beside the Barron River. The River Walk follows the riverbank to the railway station where a staircase links the walk to Coondoo Street, 500 metres from the Visitor Information Centre.

Boost for Busking

Buskers will be flocking to Kuranda after concerns about the high costs of public liability insurance and the red tape involved in applying for a permit have been addressed by the Tablelands Regional Council. The new rules will streamline the application process through the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre and make it easier for buskers to hit the streets of Kuranda village and bring back the vibe that Kuranda is famous for.

Cruising into the Village

The expedition cruise ship Orion arrives in Cairns on September 21 with a crew of 75 and the capacity for 106 guests. Many of the guests will be travelling to Kuranda on Skyrail and the train before they return aboard to travel south through the Great Barrier Reef. Kuranda is an integral part of many day trip itineraries for cruise ships visiting the region as guests enjoy the festive feel in Kuranda. This year, 33 cruise ships will arrive in Cairns carrying more than 22,000 passengers, with an additional nine visits by larger cruise liners scheduled to moor off Yorkeys Knob.

\$7 million for Indigenous Housing in Kuranda

A partnership between a local Indigenous community housing organisation and the Queensland Government will result in new homes and existing homes being renovated in Kuranda.

Steve Wettenhall MP today (23 September) announced \$4 million in Queensland Government funding to build 16 new homes on land owned by Ngoonbi Cooperative Society (Ngoonbi). These homes will be owned and managed by Ngoonbi under the One Social Housing System.

A further \$3 million in funds will be spent upgrading and refurbishing Ngoonbi's existing 24 rental properties, many of which are 30-40 years old. These funds have been provided by the Commonwealth Government under their Indigenous Community Housing Organisation funding.

Mr Wettenhall said that as a result of the partnership, Ngoonbi would now operate its housing service as a community housing provider under the One Social Housing Scheme.

Transitioning to the One Social Housing Service means Ngoonbi will have support from Queensland Government's Department of Communities to assist with tenancy management, maintenance, and links to support services.

"I know that overcrowding and unsuitable accommodation is a critical issue in Kuranda, with a growing demand for affordable housing for Indigenous peoples in the area," Mr Wettenhall said.

"That is why I am committed to working with Indigenous Community Housing Organisations, such as Ngoonbi, to access available Federal and Queensland Government funding to build the number and quality of long-term community housing to reduce overcrowding in the region.

"The \$4 million in Queensland Government funding will target the construction of seniors and two-bedroom units to provide senior and single people with suitable homes.

"This housing development will also improve access to health services, education and employment opportunities for people living in settlements outside of Kuranda.

"The Queensland Government is committed to closing the gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Queenslanders and we understand that improved housing is an essential building block in achieving this."

"This new funding is a major step forward however I will continue to work with the community to achieve further improved housing options for local people."

Gardening in Kuranda



October and, by now, the Winter sleepers should be emerging – Caladiums, Globbas and some of the more heat-loving gingers and Alocasias. Application of a general fertiliser well watered in will boost growth and flower production around the garden and again mulching will conserve moisture until the rains come and also provide cover against soil compaction when the predicted heavier than usual Wet begins.


The frantic drama of bush turkey nesting continues apace and the emergence of grasshoppers and other leaf-munchers is upon us, ditto the bloody horse-flies. The Kuranda Garden Group, meeting monthly, is the ideal opportunity for both the keen gardener and particularly, the newcomer to tropical gardening, to see how it's done and share commiserations about bandicoot bandits, pesky pademelons and the awful Alectura.

Plant of the Month

Brunfelsia: formerly called Franciscea and often commonly called "Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow" or "Morning, Noon and Night" as many in this genus of about 40 species of neotropical shrubs and small trees have flowers that change colour as they age. Brunfelsiasare in the family Solanaceae and all parts of these plants are poisonous.

Leaves are alternate and simple, with shapes generally elliptic to ovate with large five petal tubular flowers which in many species, are highly perfumed particularly in the evening.

Of easy cultivation, preferring full to half-day sun, good drainage and average soil, with tip pruning most can be kept to manageable size and also make excellent hadring or large potted specimens.



My personal favourite is B. americana with its repeat blooming, small clusters of large white fading to cream flowers intoxicatingly perfumed in the evening. However there are many others of significant garden worthiness that are sometimes available including:B. brasliensis, B. chiricaspi, B. densifolia, B.grandiflora, B.nitida, B. splendida, B. undulate and B.uniflora. 

Dear James, N-P-K refers to the ratio of the major elements in fertilisers where N stands for nitrogen, responsible for strong stem and foliage growth, P for phosphorus, which assists healthy root growth, flower and seed production and K stands for potassium, responsible for improving overall health and disease resistance. NPK ratios vary from product to product and you need to think about the plant's requirement and what you are wanting to boost. One sound dictum with applying fertiliser in any form is less more frequently than more, less frequently. This applies particularly when fertilising tender or ailing plants, seedlings and house plants. The consequence of overdosing, just as with humans, can prove fatal.

While some native plants including a few Grevilleas are extremely sensitive to any significant presence of phosphorous in the soil, most Australian native plants respond well to a regular fertiliser regime. While paying a little more, there are specially formulated fertilisers for use on specific plants, e.g. citrus , houseplants, roses and Australian native formula.

Dear Jean, An easy-to-care-for miniature garden for your mum in the retirement village, requiring minimum space and care would be mounted Tillandsias or potted Crypanthus. The Tillandsias could be mounted with Liquid Nails on well washed drift wood and hung in a window receiving morning sun and only requiring regular misting. Small shallow bowls provide ample room for good displays of Cryptanthus in their highly coloured starfish forms and again require minimum maintenance. Again bright light is necessary to maximise and retain colour. These plants provide a lasting alternative to the usual cut flowers and the ubiquitous orchid – a dream in flower but rather uninspiring the rest of the time. Both suggested plant families are readily available at local markets at most reasonable prices and given their varying forms, you may find Mother re-engaging with her old collector-self once again.

remember watching my dad draw metamorphosing humanoid insects and my eager desire to learn and follow the path of the artist. As a child I had a life changing dream in which I experienced firsthand the love, truth and eternal nature of the omnipotent and omnipresent Creator. Art became a means of catharsis and later a language for translating the journeys of the spirit. After studying art at uni I headed to Europe in search of the trail of the Old and the New Masters and to retrace my own family roots. While in Vienna, the city where I'd been conceived, I was 'led' to an experience of unity consciousness. Looking into the light refracted within an insect's wing I felt all time and space crescendo into a single point then collapse into the present moment. The experience showed me my place within the unity of creation and the illusion of death. Two

Upon returning to Melbourne I landed a job as a picture framer and restorer and met a woman whom I later married. Soon after our meeting we began receiving channellings from inter-dimensional beings. One particular day we received a message from Adam Kadmon,







Kuranda Aquatic Centre News

We are back into full swing for Term 4 with lessons for swimming in the afternoons and the little ones in the three mornings filling fast. Our under ones program babies are appreciating the warmer water and the lovely sunny days recently. The heating is reaching the comfortable 29 degrees now and, with the comfortable out of the water temperatures at the moment, this is the ideal time to take the plunge into fitness and fun at the pool.

In our Learn to Swim program, Mums (or Dads) generally stay with their babies until around 30 months for their bonding water lessons which are a privilege to be part of. Each little one has unique and wonderful experiences in the water when they sense, feel and at times drink in the water. By introducing babies early to the water they seem to develop an innate ease and flow with and in the water. When they come back between 3 and 5 years old they have learned a healthy respect for the dangers and accept buoyancy and propulsion principles better. Anytime (even as Adults) is a good time to learn or improve swimming but these early starters have a base that never leaves them. My final acceptance of the power of water didn't come till into adulthood having to swim more than 50m at Phys. Ed. College.

It is a great pleasure and satisfaction in working with young Mums and Dads with their own precious new borns and babies. Teaching is easy when everything is new and first time, we find we all learn together. Classes for babies conducted at 9.30am on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

We will have many Stoke Development classes across the week, mostly at 4.15pm but other times can be arranged. After that every afternoon during the week we have Squad Training, again depending on ages and abilities, generally 3 Junior and 2 Senior sessions per week at 5.00pm. Adults are welcome to join in the training regime at any stage at the same rate as kids \$12.50 per 1 \$20.00 per 2 \$25.00 per 3 times a week.

It is quite likely through this Summer 2011/12 Season that we will turn over one afternoon and some other slots in the week to a "Club Night" multi activities type afternoon/evening. This could provide a cross over effect from just doing Swim Training into Lifesaving and Aquatic Sports and Recreation. The aims would be to provide greater camaraderie among the Swim Community of Kuranda. To provide a pathway to Aquatic and Surf Lifesaving skills and even careers would be also an aim. The Velvet Assassin

here is a kind of local animal that looks much like a caterpillar with a dozen 🗘 or so extra legs. However, this animal will not pupate into a butterfly or moth, and it is not the harmless leaf-eating larva that we are so familiar with. This is a stone-cold killer – if you're an arthropod. A deadly hunter, the animal in question is a key species in the evolution of the arthropod (but itself is not one). It appeared on Earth around half a billion years ago, which is no mean feat, making it one of the

first invertebrate animal species to evolve. It is known as the Velvet worm (phylum Onchyphora), and though described in 1826 as a slug, it is neither worm, slug nor caterpillar.

In Australia, the adult Velvet worm is between 20 and 40mm in length (depending on species). The local Kuranda species is at the upper end of this size scale. Pigmentation can vary depending on species, but is generally a brown or grey base colour with intricate patterning over the top. It appears to have up to 14-16 caterpillar-like legs, but these contain no actual joints or muscles. They achieve motion by the body's water pressure (hydrostatic) pressing against

them and keeping them extended, and then by the contraction of inner-body muscles. The head can be identified by the presence of two stumpy precursors to antennae.

Unlike today's arthropods, the Velvet worm has no hardened exoskeleton. Its skin is composed of a membrane of dead cells covered in tiny hairs, which are in themselves covered in tiny scales that give it the appearance and feeling of velvet. These hairs function in a sensory capacity and respond to touch. This covering is also water-repellent, which makes it perfect for living in a very moist environment seconded by its inability to regulate water loss. It is therefore very easy for a Velvet worm to succumb to desiccation, and as such, it is only found in Australia's tropical and temperate rainforests.

The Velvet worm is interesting to science not only for its evolutionary status,

but also for a sticky, glue-like secretion it produces. This 'glue' is made up almost entirely of water, but also contains a few key proteins. Originally, these proteins are kept from chemically interacting by the water acting as a shield. However, this 'sticky' property is present for a reason, and the Velvet worm's prey of small arthropods get to find out first hand. After locating prey, the Velvet worm shoots this sticky liquid from tubes near its face. It lands on the prey quite harmlessly,

> but after a few moments, the arthropod's water-repellent exoskeleton causes the water in the secretion to evaporate and the proteins interact, stopping the victim in its tracks with an impossibly sticky web.

> The Velvet worm's mouth is located on the underside of its body and is composed of outer lips with internal teeth. As the worm begins to feed on its immobilised prey, it covers the food with saliva which contains enzymes that cause the prey to break down outside the body, before it has even been chewed. As a result, the worm ingests a semi-liquid concoction that is easier for the simple digestive system to cope with.

Mating in Velvet worms is largely unstudied, but can be supposed to consist of, in most species, depositing of the spermatophore by the male to the female for fertilisation. Curiously, the males of studied species carry the spermatophore on their faces in a set of ever-present dimples. It has been likened by researchers to a kind of crown, or trophy.

After mating, eggs are often laid, but some species keep the eggs internally and give birth to live young, like a mammal. The babies are miniature versions of the adults, and they will continue to shed their skin every 14 or so days into adulthood.

Breaking Through Depression

Tragedy at the **Barron Falls**

THE AREA AROUND KURANDA AND THE **BARRON FALLS** witnessed several tragedies in the early years of European occupation. There were two particularly dangerous places where drowning occurred. Several people drowned at the road crossing known as Middle Crossing, just upstream of where the road bridge is now. A letter to the Editor of The Cairns Post in April 1888 called for the Divisional Board to erect notices to guide

travellers in crossing the ford safely. The letter mentioned that a Mr Levy had lost his life two years previously at this crossing. Then in May the same year the paper reported that a man named Smytherun drowned at Middle Crossing while trying to ford the stream. Alcohol could have been a factor in some of the drownings. It was not unusual for travellers to be a bit under the weather at that place and at that time, as there were two hotels near the crossing, and the track between Cairns and the Thornborough gold fields was difficult and very dry. The original hotel at the crossing was the Jum Rum Hotel, and another called the Shamrock Hotel was opened by T. Hatton in early 1884. The other dangerous area that experienced several tragedies was the Barron Falls, with its swift water and dangerous precipices.

One tragedy at the Barron Falls was reported in *The Cairns Post* on 29 October 1890, when the railway line was still under construction. On 19 October J.W. Martin and G.M. Rice, both employed by John Robb on the railway construction gangs, went into Kuranda and visited the Kuranda Hotel, owned by Henry Remilton. In evidence later given at a Magisterial Inquiry into the death of J.W. Martin, it was claimed that the two men spent only about ten minutes in the hotel. Rice and some other men then went to the river and traveled upstream to fish. Martin left the hotel a short time after the others, and was supposed to join up with them. However, he failed to join his companions. Witnesses at the Inquiry asserted that all the men were sober when they left the hotel.

William Grendill told the Inquiry that he passed the Barron Falls at about 2.15 p.m. on 19 October and saw Martin on the rocks on the other side of the river about 100 yards above the falls. He said Martin was alone and fully dressed. He never saw him again.

Evidence was also given by M. Vogh, who worked with Martin at No. 37 bridge. He said that when he heard on 20 October that Martin was missing he went searching for him. He searched at the Barron Falls but had no success. However, on 22 October he was told that Martin's body was at the bottom of the falls. He said that a man called Donald told him that he had been down to the base of the falls and seen the body. He said there were no clothes on the body, which he recognized the body "by the hair on the face". Vogh said he assisted in retrieving

Senior Constable Thomas Hill of Kamerunga said he was told on 22 October that a man called Martin had been lost near the Barron Falls. He and another constable went to look for the man but had no success. The next day he saw Martin's body at Kamerunga, where it had been taken. He examined the body and found the head all smashed into bits. The lower part of the body was torn but because of the advanced state of decomposition it was impossible to determine the extent of injuries. He reported the matter to the Police Magistrate and was given permission to order the burial of the body. He handed the body over to the deceased's friends for burial.

G.M. Rice told *The Cairns Post* that he had assisted in retrieving the body, and that 700 or 800 feet of rope was used to bring the body from the bottom of the falls to the railway line. He said the last tracks of the deceased were found about two chains (40 metres) from the top of the falls. He thought that Martin must have fallen into the rock filled water and been knocked unconscious. The current would then have taken him over the falls. We will never know!

It is noticeable that there are very few young people stepping into traditional community support roles and this may be indicating the need to assume a different approach.

It is up to the members of Advance Kuranda and interested members of the Kuranda community to decide where to from here. Let's talk about this further on Tuesday 4th October.

Graham Payne and David Sturge purchased 100 acres of rainforest which contain the three acres of garden at the beginning of 2006. It is adjacent to the magnificent natural environment of the World Heritage National Park of the Kuranda range.

Having created gardens in the temperate climate of England and the Mediterranean climate of Portugal, we were keen to experience a tropical garden. Over the years we have rejuvenated the garden, planting several beds of colourful exotics, which are alive with lush, vibrant colours of the tropics, palms, trees, shrubs, feature plants, and lawn. In the warm, moist tropical climate the garden has grown rapidly. A permanent creek with a waterfall runs round the edge of the garden.

We are most fortunate that a previous owner was an avid collector of unusual palms and cycads, with the result that there are many magnificent specimens here today. There are fine stands of Alexander Palm which provide a spectacular backdrop to the view across the large lawn from the house. There are also several mature unusual cycads.

Plants of note include many kinds of gingers, especially Heliconias, Torch Ginger, and Costus. Climbing through the Queensland Umbrella Tree are the spectacular Jade Vine and Flame of the Forest.

About one third of the garden is planted with ornamental and fruit trees set in lawns, providing an extensive shaded area on a hot tropical afternoon.


Our land is registered under the *Land for Wildlife* scheme. Book Review

"Creative Writing"

by Adele Ramet

(HowtoBooks, 8th Edition, 2010) ISBN 9781 84528 4022 RRP \$17.95

Creative writing, writing that displays individual creativity and excellence, is undoubtedly a special skill. It is part of good, written communication, something more than simply being literate. It requires appropriate education and practice as well as a creative, thoughtful mind. This hasn't changed with the advent of computer technology. In fact that technology has assisted creative writing by making it easier to get ideas down quickly in draft and then to save them electronically, with the capacity to quickly amend, rearrange, delete and insert, including from other documents. Transference of documents is also quicker and easier. There are various other electronic aids. Long hand writing skills may have suffered, but there are many beneficial offsets.

But even with this technology, it is still necessary to possess certain basic skills and techniques in creative writing, whether for writing fiction or non-fiction, or just in the ordinary course of life where some form of written composition is required. Thus if you are contemplating an entry in this Paper's short story competition, for example, it is advisable to have some reasonable idea of the nature of a writer's craft before you begin to write your entry. To a considerable extent these skills and techniques can be taught and learnt. There are courses available in creative writing which you can enroll for. In addition there is a raft of books available and designed to assist the writer to improve his or her craft. The book review for this month is just one of these. It is described as a book "...to unlock your imagination and develop your writing skills".

The book is full of good ideas and suggestions to assist the budding writer. Thus it advocates making time to write something every day. Regular rereading of your own writing the following day is advocated, a practice much facilitated by using computers. It also recommends a lot of reading generally, but with a writer's eye. The author states that a good writer will simply make time for these activities. Good writers are also good observers of life around them or as reported to them, and the book makes various suggestions as to how to facilitate this.

The book has various suggestions for good writing, both fictional and non-fictional. Setting and atmosphere, characterisation and dialogue writing are given particular attention. Specific chapters are dedicated to specific types of writing, namely love stories, crime and thriller writing and writing for children.

This edition of the book makes reference to the use of computers in writing. It notes that if a writer wants a manuscript to be published, the computer must be used to prepare and present the manuscript to the publisher. It contains recommendations on accompanying digital images. It deals with writing in internet blogs. There is a separate chapter on sending your work to a publisher.

Some people might argue that the craft of writing is suffering in the community with the advent of modern electronic technology and communications. I am not convinced of this. True it may be that good letter writing is losing its importance, often being replaced now by shorter electronic messages. But this book illustrates the fact that the computer has to now be accepted as a necessary tool in writing, and that this opens up access to many new aids to good writing that were not previously available. In addition we have the vast resource of the internet to draw upon for facts and ideas that can stimulate the creative writer. Children at an early age are learning how to use the computer, including by way of writing assignments, etc. Readers have access to a vast array of published writing, not only in the traditional paper/book version, but now also in electronic eBook forms. It seems to me that creative writing is entering upon a new and more prolific age. Anything that can assist with good creative writing, such as this book being reviewed, must be seen as commendable.

Preliminary approval for Retirement Village

Tablelands Regional Council has given preliminary approval for a large retirement village and residential care facility near Kuranda.

The Welcome Pocket proposal involves the development of 450 retirement village units and a 140bed residential care facility, as well as other facilities including a child care centre, a convenience store, a medical practice, dental practice, hair dressing salon and café.

In its application, the Corporation of the Diocesan Synod of North Queensland said the focus of the Welcome Pocket facility would be to "deliver lifestyle and housing options to retirees looking to live on the eastern Tablelands... and to provide a holistic approach to aged care and aged accommodation".

The project will be constructed in stages at a 30hectare site in Myola, with the church to provide Council with a detailed plan outlining the nature and timing of each part of the development.

Rural Fire Brigades to assist Council in fuel reduction burns

Rural Fire Brigades will work with Tablelands Regional Council to undertake fuel reduction burns on Council

Council is responsible for 10,000 hectares of land and with such a vast area to cover with limited resources, was finding it difficult to undertake the number of fuel reduction burns necessary.

Why Are They Wrapped In Sacks?

This question was asked recently of one of the Co-op's fibre artists, relating to mats wrapped around the bodies of the mourners of the devastated Pacific Island families losing loved ones in the horrific house fire in southern Queensland.


These special mats known as $\it kie\ hingoa$ are embedded with genealogical histories. "The history of our people is written in our mats", Queen Salote Tupou (1900-1965) noted. They are heirlooms passed from generation to generation as treasures (to'onga). What makes them valuable is that they contain the reproductive power of Tongan and Samoan society. The mats are rectangular constructions plaited from prepared pandanus leaves and are worn or presented during weddings, funerals, investitures and commemorative events. Some are as large as three metres long and 1.5 metres wide and are so finely woven, as many as twelve strands to a centrimetre, that they look almost like linen. Kie hingoa appear only rarely, and when they do, it marks the occasion as one of note and records the importance of the event.

New Sculpture in Kuranda Garden

A stone sculpture by highly regarded Kuranda artist, Kim Prentice, has taken up residenceinthegarden at Cantata Studio. Nestled amongst the trees, "They" appear extremely happy in their new home.

Kim Prentice's publicartinstallations throughout the village are identified on the Kuranda Arts Trail brochure, available at the Arts Co-op and the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre.

Under the arrangement, Council will approach individual rural brigades to seek their assistance in conducting fuel reduction burns in their areas.

The burns will also provide rural fire brigade members with an excellent opportunity for training and to gain experience.

A report presented to the Council meeting revealed that wet and windy conditions had hindered very recent attempts to burn, but Council staff were confident there was still good opportunities to burn in October and November providing a total fire ban was not in place.

The report also stated that a review had been conducted of planned fuel reduction burns, with the schedule revised on the basis of the risk presented by each parcel of land.

Senior Cambodian Officials Visit Tablelands

The program was led by Associate Professor Bill Carter and colleagues from the Sustainability Research Centre, University of the Sunshine Coast.

The visit to the Tablelands provided opportunity to examine agri-tourism and natural and cultural heritage tourism projects.

Their visit to Mount Uncle Distillery, Atherton Chinatown and Mungalli Creek Dairy was preceded by a meeting with Tablelands Mayor Tom Gilmore, and an opportunity to view refuse collection and recycling facilities at the Atherton Transfer Station.

Ganger Brendt Ross showed the group through the facility and explained its operations.

Both H.E. Saroueth Kousoum and H.E. Mr Sarath Sbong, Governor of Preah Sihanoukville, said later they were delighted to have had the opportunity to view refuse handling project at close quarters.

They commended Council on its recycling and thanked Brendt for his enthusiasm and time, noting how useful such a service would be in Cambodia as it welcomes increasing numbers of international tourists.





Local Resident Receives Heritage Award

Kuranda resident and illustrator/graphic designer, Nettie Dunne, was recently awarded a High Commendation in the National Trust Community Awards category at the 2011 Heritage Awards ceremony in Brisbane in August, for her work on two centenary publications for the Kairi State School. The history book and cookbook commemorate the school's centenary in 2011. The award was presented to Nettie and her sister, Pauline Leinster, on behalf of the Kairi School and its P&C.

"A Journey of 100 Years" and "100 Years of Family Recipes," are two beautifully presented resources that are well-illustrated and brought to life with dynamic layout in a colour palette that represents the school colours of black and gold. The 192 page history book contains a comprehensive history on the township of Kairi, the school, and three other schools that have since closed; Waringle, Lake Euramoo (Danbulla), and Tinaroo Falls schools. It also features a collection of memories that capture the true spirit of a small rural community and country school, whilst the cookbook is a collection of a century's worth of recipes that reflect the trends in the family kitchen in a rural community.



Nettie, a former Kairi School student, was very proud to be a part of the centenary celebrations and ecstatic with the end result of the publications and her subsequent award. Her love of the town and school was a driving factor in her volunteering for the massive task that took 18 months, and also included the design and production of a flyer, school crest, DVD cover, research and display of seven local pioneer farming families, and a display of seventeen past students and their success stories.

The books have raised a considerable sum of money for the school to further improve aspects of the school and its grounds, and they will also serve as a lasting reminder for all who attended the Kairi, Waringle, Lake Euramoo, and Tinaroo Falls State Schools.

Barang Street works to begin soon

Work will commence soon to replace a collapsed culvert under Barang Street, Kuranda.

The culvert collapsed as a consequence of monsoonal rain in January 2011, resulting in the street being closed to vehicular traffic since that time.

In January, Council made a submission to the Queensland Reconstruction Authority under the NDRRA guidelines for funding towards the repairs of the culvert and in May, received funding approval of \$291,327 for the repairs.

However, the cost of the repairs was much higher than expected and Council had to again seek approval from the QRA for the higher amount.

At Wednesday's Council meeting, a tender submitted by Heavy Equipment Hire Pty Ltd for \$523,730 was accepted.

Work will begin at the site next week, with the project expected to take 11-12 weeks, weather dependant.

Support for busking promotion in Kuranda

Tablelands Regional Council has amended its Busking Policy to help support an initiative being driven by representatives of the local community, Tourism Kuranda and Advance Kuranda.

The introduction of "Busking Saturdays" is aimed at attracting people to the local area. The concept is to develop a regular Saturday afternoon program that includes artists' workshops, buskers and supporting initiatives from local businesses.

Council approved amendments to the Busking Policy including:

- introducing on-site assessment of busking applications by Council staff based at the Kuranda Library and Kuranda Visitor Information Centre
- introducing a three-month busking permit for a \$20 fee
- extending hours for busking performance in Kuranda
- adding four additional busking sites of 7 Coondoo Street (outside St Saviours Church); 9 Coondoo Street (outside Djurri Dadagal); Therwine Street (outside the Information Centre); and the corner of Therwine and Coondoo Streets.



Pioneers in Perspective

Cairns and its surrounds are built on a history of winners and losers. It is only natural that it is the version of the story which suits the winners which is the known and accepted history. But the heroic stories of pioneers, their divisions of the land and their building projects; the exploits of explorers and adventurers – these tales for children mask a more complete, a more grown-up story.

We recently had a letter published by The Cairns Post (Saturday 27th August) which dealt with these issues. However, lack of space meant that the letter was edited and much of what we had to say was lost. We thought that readers of The Kuranda Paper might like to see the complete text:



We would like to offer another viewpoint in regard to the colonial pioneering spirit that established Cairns (and elsewhere of course). As Bob Dixon of JCU wrote, in Words of Our Country, in 1991,

"Within a generation [from 1876] the Aboriginal way of life had been permanently destroyed. Forests were cleared, with the elimination of many native foods. Some Aborigines caught European diseases [...], to which they had no immunity. Others were hunted and shot by the European invaders. Those who survived were sent off to missions and government settlements where it was thought that they would soon die out."

Pioneers such as Christie Palmerston (Palmerston Highway) and Archibald Meston (Meston Street, Brinsmead) boasted of their killings of the original inhabitants of this area. After one battle with Mamu people, where Christie Palmerston noted that "they had to be submitted to the usual ordeal", meaning wooden swords and wooden shields against guns, he spotted 'a little boy running away':

"I soon overtook him, and, laying the barrel of my rifle gently against his neck, shoved him over. [He began] biting me, spitting and shouting. In my present garb I should have been an object of terror to a child of my own race — only a shirt and cartridge belt on, my legs bespattered with blood."

Much of the violence towards the owners of the land was perpetrated through the Native Police, an organisation which used dispossessed and unruly aboriginals brought in from the South, led by the Queensland Police. The Native Police were used to enact reprisals against the Aboriginal population. The usual rate of payback for the death of one Colonialist was, at the very least, between ten and twenty Aborigines.

One reprisal perpetrated by the Queensland Native Police was, "led by Second-Class Inspector Thomas Clohesy [Clohesy River], Acting Inspector Tom Coward, Sub-Inspector Edwin Townshend and Acting Sub-Inspector Alexander Douglas [Douglas Track, Port Douglas], reinforced by white civilian volunteers, [and] culminated in a large-scale massacre of Aborigines at Skull Camp" near the Palmer River.

One of the participants of another massacre, Jack Kane, later told his story to the anthropologist Norman Tindale, who recorded: "Each man [was] armed with a rifle and revolver. At dawn one man fired into their camp [at Skull Pocket] and the natives rushed away in

three other directions. They were easy running shots close up. The native police rushed in with their scrub knives and killed off the children. A few years later a man loaded up a whole case of skulls and took them away as specimens. Kane added matter-of-factly, 'I didn't mind the killing of the 'bucks' but I didn't quite like them braining the kids." This massacre lasted a week and the killings continued as the party travelled from Skull Pocket near Yungaburra down to Skeleton Creek in Whiterock. Whiterock has a street named Skull Road.

A pioneer squatter tellingly wrote, in 1912, "It was often charged that the native police behaved with great cruelty and this may have been correct, but it is difficult to see how a small and scattered European population could have continued to occupy the country without some such protection."

Another pioneer wrote from Ravenswood in 1880, "I have known plenty of men in this Country that will shoot the poor things for Sport...the same as we used to shoot rabbits back home."

The image of the brave boy resisting the 'gentle', civilised, pressure of Christie Palmerston's gun barrel is the image of an heroic struggle against insurmountable odds. The pioneers of Cairns were only able to establish themselves on the back of a war they could never lose. We need to go beyond the naiveté which is often shown in recounts of our history and move towards a mature recognition of the complex and confronting history of this area.

Married & Happy: 52 Years after Last Meeting

It is nice to hear a heartfelt story, and this month's profile is just that. Let me introduce Frances and Leo Vandersar of Seven Springs, Kuranda. Both were born as Dutch-Indonesians pre-World War II in Java. Both suffered with their families during the Japanese occupation of Indonesia in that War and thereafter in the Indonesian struggle for independence. Leo was interned in an Indonesian prison camp for two years up to 1947. Upon release, Leo went back to school in Surabaya. At the school annual ball in 1948 he met and became good friends with Frances who lived with her parents, who, although divorced, had to share a house due to shortages. But then Leo's father was posted to Djakarta at the end of 1948. Physically separated, the two kept in touch from a distance for a little while, but eventually the contact was lost.

Leo went on to marry a Dutch-Indonesian lady named Ilse. He qualified as an aircraft engineer and worked with KLM until Indonesian independence loomed, when he went with his wife and little daughter to Holland. He then moved to USA in 1959, later working with Continental Airlines. The couple had one child in Indonesia, one in Holland and one in the USA. Then in 1969 they emigrated to Australia with Qantas. Voluntary retrenchment followed in 1983. His son-in-law Bob Colefax had land in Kuranda and suggested that Leo and his wife move there. This they did. Sadly, Ilse had a stroke eight days before their 50th wedding anniversary and passed away in 2003. Leo now has 10 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Frances in the meantime had worked as a secretary, starting with the Dutch Army in Indonesia. She left Indonesia in 1956 after a visit from the Secret Service advising her to leave and moved to Brazil to be with her mother and step-father. She took with her a daughter from a past relationship. When attending the Dutch Consulate in Brazil for a visa she met her future husband Paul, who worked there. They married and had four children, the last two being twins born in Holland after they moved there in 1961. Frances had a fire accident which hospitalised her for some considerable time. Then Paul passed away in 1982 with cancer. Frances continued working as a secretary, later setting up a catering business while living in the Canary Islands for four and a half years. She adopted two more children. She now has 13 grandchildren.

Leo in Kuranda decided in 2000 to try to make contact with old friends from Indonesia. He put an advert in a Dutch-Indonesian magazine in Holland, mentioning Frances among others by her nickname. They had not been in contact for about 52 years.

Frances did not even know of the magazine. One day the editor rang Frances, now back in Holland, to ask if she knew Leo and whether she could give Frances' phone number to Leo. 



Inside My Studio

Tigers and lions are the subjects of many of Irene Majer's paintings. I half expected to see some silently lazing in the sunshine drenched garden and Irene's ground floor studio. Such colour and artistic energy awaited me inside her studio, "a place for everything and everything in its place", with an abundance of finished canvases stacked vertically, easels, drawing boards and assorted uniform sized small paint pots placed in neat and co-ordinated rows – such enviable discipline.

Where is your current studio?

I work in my studio at my home in Kuranda village. I have almost the entire ground floor, purposely built to my specifications – it's easy to get to work, I just walk down the stairs.

Do you work alone or with others?

Mostly alone, however, I collaborate with my close friend and fellow Kuranda artist, Anne Fitzpatrick, on a series of wildlife portraits, which in turn we have produced as limited edition prints and painted canvases. For a number of years we have been working together, photographing, painting and printing tigers, lions, elephants, snow leopards, gorillas and zebras. Our business is called '2

Wild'. We are fortunate to have a world standard zoo on our doorstep and access to

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

I need good lighting, plenty of space and running water.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

I start between 8-9am and finish around 5pm, Monday to Friday. I am 'flexibly inflexible'. Sometimes I work in the evenings and on weekends.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

I have experience in a variety of mediums including ceramics, printmaking, sculpture and photography. My favourite art form is painting using mixed media on canvas.

Why is painting your chosen medium?

I have enjoyed painting from an early age. My career started in Melbourne as an industrial designer with Ford Motor Co but I moved to the tropics in 1987 to pursue a passion for scuba diving. As my family grew I started working professionally from home. Painting ticked all the boxes.



List three things you listen to while working.

Always the radio, with the choice of ABC stations - but excluding sport. Although I am 'tuned out' a lot of the time, key words will attract and I enjoy 'coming back' and being informed.

Your favourite tool?

I really enjoy using my 'shape makers'. [Irene produced a variety of rubber tipped tools and a small square of yellow plastic looking rather like a slice of cheese.] These tools are used for marking lines of varying thicknesses through the paint and creating textures.

How do you identify your work?

My logo is a swirl. I draw one on every artwork and the swirl appears repetitively in many of my paintings. I also sign my name on most pieces.

How do you sell your work?

My artwork is sold mainly through art galleries, and local markets and tourist outlets. I also sell directly from my website www.irenemajer.com.au and the '2 Wild' animal prints are sold at various zoos, galleries, or through the website www.2wild.com.au.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

Not at present but I envisage both happening at some stage in the future. It is on the drawing board.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

I volunteer at the Kuranda Arts Co-op gallery two afternoons per month.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? I would like bigger windows to access more light and a larger view of my garden. I would also welcome a spectacular view overlooking ocean.

If you were not working with visual art what would you be doing? Whatever that change of direction might be, I would still try and find time to paint.

I am addicted to it. However, perhaps I could pursue a deep hidden desire to be an astronaut and hitch a ride on a Virgin space flight.

Food storage in the tropics

Living in rural or remote regions requires planning to ensure you have enough food and medical supplies to see you through any emergency, natural or otherwise. Without constant transportation, supermarkets in North Queensland only keep enough stock for approx 4 weeks before being replenished.

Don't be caught out during the coming wet season, start stockpiling now and plan your food storage area. Pre-packaged products are essential items on any survival pantry list. At supermarkets their products must meet certain standards and they (the seller) are not allowed to sell packaged food past its Use-by date.

The Manufacturer/packer is responsible for the shelf life of a food, i.e. the Expiry Date. The best-before date means longer storage than products labelled Use-by date. Any 'reduced items' or bargain bin 'specials' are only good value if they are safe to eat.

Babies, children, the sick or elderly may be seriously affected by even the slightest food deterioration. Here in the tropics any 'cheap highly perishable food items' such as meat, fish, chicken, milk, eggs etc., must be eaten as soon as possible, properly cooked or if possible, cooked then frozen.

Food storage hints

Dry or dehydrated foods, purchased at supermarkets, have some degree of mould or insect infestation caused by long term storage in a warehouse or 'food mills'. e.g. RICE. Imported rice usually has evidence of insects or eggs when stored for too long. Imported gourmet breads if frozen, thawed and refrozen, may turn rancid! HIGHLY PERISHABLE FOODS: meat, fish, seafood, chicken, milk, eggs need to be bought as fresh as possible and stored correctly. Some interaction/chemical contamination can take place between food and packaging. FRESH GROCERIES bought locally, as fresh as possible and stored correctly ensures a healthier diet too. Apples imported from overseas may have a chemical protection cover and may have been in 'cold' storage in supermarket central storage for many months prior to arriving on the supermarket shelf. Bright white garlic imported from China has been chemically sprayed.

BUYING FRESH fruit and vegetables from local markets has less stringent regulations than supermarkets but also may be contaminated with chemicals. If your health is already compromised, and you cannot buy organic produce, take special care in selecting your produce, or grow your own fruit, herbs and vegetables.

Animals and pests

Someone years ago on Misty Mountain told me the 'white tailed rats' could read the Sunshine Milk tin labels because the rats always chewed holes in them. Actually I think it's only because white tailed rats 'need to gnaw/ chew' on something and they have a good sense of smell, was the real story.

Fruit and vegetables left on open benches attract not just cockroaches, but our cute Australian marsupial mice, so please don't get them confused with ordinary house mice. If you ever have a mouse or brown rat plague and they are caught in a trap in your kitchen pantry, dispose of them immediately, or they will attract snakes into your home.

New immigrants to Australia don't realise how despised the 'blow fly' is, especially at BBQs or outside entertaining because any cooked meat left uncovered or unattended will soon be flyblown. Even during the heat and humidity of the wet season, you may want to slow cook a chicken in a crockpot, and not heat up your kitchen. A precaution here! Put aluminium foil underneath your lid. It will stop the 'blow fly' laying their maggots on the rim of your warm and cosy slow cooker.

Food deteriorates quickly in the tropics. Storing potatoes and onions in a dry, dark cupboard preferably in a brown bag, is a good idea. Washed and packaged potatoes in plastic may already have bruised or cut portions in them leading to obnoxious smells. Large onions in 2kg bags if not used quickly often go slimy and mouldy inside. Many pantry items go mouldy! Spices, wholemeal flours, brown rice, baby formula etc. Store these in the fridge or freezer.

At home, plan your vermin and animal proof storage area. Dry and liquid foods must be stored away from heat, light and moisture, in 'food safe' plastic containers, glass or bags.

Freezer storage

Consider this your emergency storage or long term storage especially for highly perishable food items. (Meat Fish Seafood Chicken Milk Eggs) they may not be available during a natural disaster or transport problems.

If you have purchased large quantities of Christmas hams, meat and fish and the electricity supply is cut off (and it does quite often in Kuranda), these frozen foods may be at risk if you don't own your own generator. Check your Household Contents Insurance for a food spoilage clause.

Dry pantry foods

Powdered milk, flour, bread mixes, spices, condiments, nuts, seeds, grains etc are usually stored at room temperature in drier areas. In the tropics however, they go mouldy quickly. To stop wastage, freeze them, it extends their use by date.

Refrigerator foods

Consider this your temporary storage for daily or weekly usage only (including medications) and your family will stay happy and in good health during these hectic times.






WETLAND CONSTRUCTION

A Thought for October

5.00pm Evensong

his month we read a passage from the Gospel according to St Matthew Chapter 21 verse 33-43. Jesus during his earthly ministry offered the people of his time a vision. Today in our time Jesus offers the same vision to us. The vision is of a kingdom, what he always calls the kingdom of heaven. It is another way of living life, a kind of alternate universe. Jesus didn't just talk of that vision, he was the vision. He didn't just speak of the demands of that kingdom, he did them!

So why didn't it all work out in a wonderfully successful way? Why didn't everybody think that Jesus and his vision were just what the world needed? It's difficult to frame a simple answer to this but we can try. In his Gospel John has two phrases which express the tragedy without necessarily explaining it. He says: The world knew Him not – his own people received Him not. Why? John later reports a statement of Jesus which seems to answer that question. Jesus says, "This is the judgement, that the light has come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light" [John 3.19]. There it is in the starkest and simplest of words - the tragic heart of the human condition. The Bible's word for this condition, itself simple and stark, is Sin.

This is what this parable of Jesus is about. In it he tells his own destiny. Jesus had no illusions about the consequences of his words and actions. He knew the dark depths of the human nature which surrounded him. The ironic contradiction in human behaviour and experience is to reject that which is utterly in our interest to accept. Our judgement is deeply flawed, and our choices are apt to be terribly wrong. The kingdom that Jesus offers us is not taken from us by some grudging God; we ourselves choose something else. But even as we paint that grim portrait of our human nature another face shines through it, that of Our Lord. The face is a promise that in him our humanity is also capable of a shining glory. Through Jesus we can if we choose set foot from time to time in the very kingdom we refuse most of the time. We sometimes have to make tough choices about the kingdom God offers us and the kingdom we ourselves want.



Celebration RC of completed projects

More than \$400,000 of works have been completed across the Tablelands, thanks to funding from the Federal Government's Regional and Local Community Infrastructure Program.

On the 9th September, Labor Senator Jan McLucas joined with Mayor Tom Gilmore and members of the community to celebrate the completion of the projects which included:

Community Facility (Block C)

at the Kuranda Community Precinct

\$50,000 – Funds used to commence refurbishment of the facility, including installation of new carpets and vinyl, installation of four kitchenettes, refurbishment of the roof above the stairwell, installation of safety switches, installation of a suitable parking facility and path from Arara Street to Block C to accommodate people with disabilities. Further works will be undertaken with funds received in the RLCIP Round 3 to complete the building for future use.

Roscommon Recreation Area, Speewah

\$100,000 – Funds were used to install lighting to tennis courts with a token system; clean and re-surface the basketball court and install bollards around the perimeter of the court to deter vandalism; construct and install an Adult Fitness Circuit which includes equipment for strength, cardiovascular and stretch exercises; and upgrade the horse dressage arena which included replacing the sand in the dressage area with river sand for resiliency, traction, and cushioning ability and installing a safety fence between the arena and playground and the Adult Fitness Circuit.

The weather didn't put the crowds off and we were kept busy with a steady stream of the interested and curious. Our "seed basket" displaying the many fruits of the forest was a hit.

Then, last but not least, our table at the Kuranda District State College NAIDOC EXPO. It was a delight to have students come and identify our forest fruits and keenly want to share with us the knowledge they have of their environment. Heaps of literature and stickers hopefully have made their way home for Mums and Dads to enjoy as well.

It's that time of year again when we get the plant books out and decide what we can and would like to plant during the coming wet season, so we will feature various species which might help make the choice a little easier.

TREE OF THE MONTH



Our choice for tree of the month is the Weeping Brown Pine, <u>Podocarpus</u> grayae, one of the southern conifers. In the open, it is a beautiful conical feature tree with foliage to the ground.

The leaves are about 20 by 1cm, deep green, with periodic flushes of shiny light green new growth.

In fruit, the shiny green seeds (1.5cm by 0.7cm) are carried on an edible swollen red stem and are favoured food for pigeons and cassowaries.

It is a slow grower. Although it can reach 20m height, several grown by the writer grew to 7 – 10 metres in 25 years. The long period of retention of the foliage makes it ideal for a screen tree.

Rates Discount Period: The Rates Discount period ends on October 4th. If you have any questions about your rates notice, please contact me or the Council Office at 1300 362 242.

Congratulations to Kuranda Amphitheatre: The Amphitheatre recently celebrated 30 years of service to this community and to the greater region. This is a major achievement for a volunteer group and the KAS deserves congratulations for all their work over the years. Given the history, the Amphitheatre will no doubt enjoy many more successful years.

Barang Street: The good news is that the State Reconstruction Authority has now approved the funding for the Barang Street repairs. The tender for the contracted works has been let to HEH and work is now commencing. This is a major construction job and is expected to take 3-4 months to complete. Total cost for the work is \$523,730.40.

Ganyan Drive: Ganyan Drive in Speewah is subject to the same NDRRA funding guidelines and timelines. The Ganyan Drive works are estimated to cost approximately \$600,000 for a reconstruction of approx. 1km of the road. Funding for this project has not yet been approved by the State government. However, interim drainage works have been completed.

Fallon Road: Line marking and signage works have been undertaken at the Fallon Road crossing at Jum Rum Creek. This is the first stage of the Council decision to upgrade the crossing.

Pedestrian, Traffic and Parking Study: The Study is now well underway and all residents and business operators are encouraged to provide input. The study covers all issues related to parking and traffic and pedestrian movement within the Kuranda Village

area. Comments, issues, feedback can be emailed to Kuranda@bitziosconsulting.com.au . Further details from the consultants, Bitzios, are available in a separate article in this paper. The study and any resulting works will be subject to Council decision and will be funded from developer contributions (not from general rates).

Fluoride in Water: There is currently a strong community campaign opposing the state legislated fluoridation of the Kuranda (and other towns) water supply. This is a state government legislated requirement and Council is required by law to implement the state legislation. Any enquiries need to be directed to the state government.

Community Plan: The 10 Year Community Plan for the Tablelands Regional Council is almost complete. Over 10,000 people across the region have contributed their opinions and many Kuranda residents will recall the stalls at the Post Office and the Community meetings to develop the plan. The Community Plan will guide Council planning and budgets over the next decade. Thanks to all who added their voice to what they would like to see in the region.

"Welcome Pocket" Approved: The preliminary application for the "Welcome Pocket" Aged Care and Retirement Village has been approved by Council. This will be a major project and will provide aged services which are so much needed in this and other local communities.

Kuranda Community Precinct: The consultants (Engagement Plus) have completed the community consultation process and the final Report is expected to be presented to Council in October. Unfortunately, the Consultant has experienced some delays in completing the Report, but I am pleased that we will finally have

the Report very soon. I will certainly be pressing for a Council decision as soon as possible on the next step in the development of the Community Precinct. We have always known that the facility cannot meet everyone's need and that significant funding is required. However, there has now been extensive community consultation and I am looking forward to finally having a decision on the future of the facility. The full Report will be available from Council.

Funding for Community Groups: FIKS. Reminder to all community groups and organisations that applications for Financial and In-Kind Support (FIKS) from Council are available throughout the year. Young people selected in regional sporting teams can also apply for grants. For further details, please contact myself or Gwen Fyfe at Council (Ph: 40434112)

Bursary: Any resident of the Tablelands Regional Council area is eligible to apply for the Nellie Willetts Bursary (\$4000) to enrol in any Agri-Industry tertiary studies in 2012. Further details available: phone Judy Burness at Council Ph: 4092 6899.

Official Opening of Speewah Roscommon Upgrade: The new facilities at Ros Common (Lights at Tennis Courts, Fitness equipment, Horse Arena) were officially opened by Senator Jan McLucas recently. The cost of approximately \$100,000 was funded by the Commonwealth government. The upgrade is a major boost to the Speewah community.

Council Meetings: Council Meetings in October will be held on Wednesday October 5th in Malanda and Wednesday October 19th in Herberton. Anyone is welcome to attend meetings. Requests to address Council can be made by contacting the Mayor's Office.

For those people who would prefer not to consume fluoridated water, there are reasonably priced water filtration products on the market that will remove fluoride from tap water and of course harvesting your own water is always an option.

Health: Community health services provided by Queensland Health to Kuranda include 1.4 full time equivalent day shift nurses and two full time health workers delivering family care, post acute care, chronic disease and school screening. These services are provided in close co-operation with the Kuranda Medical centre, an arrangement that works well for Kuranda.

Even though the health needs of the Kuranda community are being considered within the District Health planning currently underway, I believe that Kuranda needs a specific Health Needs Assessment. I am lobbying the Health Minister to fund this proposal which should also examine funding for home and community care services and look at the role of transport in facilitating access to health services. I will also be supporting the re-activation of the Health Action Group.

The Joy Luck Club (1993 – 133 minutes)

Based on Amy Tan's best selling novel, this movie tells the story of four women who were born in China and eventually went to America, and of their daughters. Around these eight women circle innumerable friends and relatives, in both countries, Chinese and not, in widening circles of experience.

The Joy Luck club of the title is this group of older Chinese ladies who meet once a week to play mah jong and compare stories of their families and grandchildren. All have made harrowing journeys from pre-revolutionary China to the comfortable homes in San Francisco where they meet. 
