Catch the multi-coloured dreamboat

Kuranda Amphitheatre 27-28-29-30 May

This is our community's project for the international Year of Indigenous People (IYIP). It's an ambitious joint effort between Kuranda's Junction Theatre and Mona Mona, involving theatre, cabaret and training.

At least every second year in Kuranda during the 80's, there has been a joint black and white theatre project. This goes back before Odyssey to the Harry Reade play about Cooktown, through Timewarp, and So This is Christmas, and more.

The Multi-Coloured Dreamboat is the latest. In many ways it's more developmental in that, at its base, it has a training program that can empower the Aboriginal community of Kuranda to go forward with the skills to organise and staff their own theatre and stage productions, and run the Mona Mona festival, without having to pay so many outside professionals.

The Play

The Foreman by Jill Shearer. This short one-act play about racism and reverse racism is a four hander (3 Aboriginal and one white). A recent conversation with the playwright reveals that this work from the 70's has seldom been in production, due to the difficulty of getting Aboriginal cast.

Joe (Ali Ramzan) has been living and working in urban Red Hill ever since he brought his Aboriginal family (mother Rosetta Brim, daughter Tammy Gray) to the city. He gets on well with his white mates (Steve Holtsbaum) at the worksite and the pub as the token black, until he's made foreman over them. Racism also arises in reverse when Joe objects to his daughter going out with a white boy.

On the Queens Birthday long weekend in June, the play will then be performed at the FNQ One-Act Drama Festival at Port Douglas.

The Multi-Coloured Cabaret,

This multi-cultural event follows the play into the evening, compered by Carol Riley and others from our community. Acts include the Torres Strait Islander Dancers from Mareeba, an Irish band called Celtic Confusion, singers and instrumentalists from the Kuranda and Mareeba communities. More acts are sought for the cabaret.

International Food.

From 6.30p.m. international food will be served, including Kup Murri (literally a feast of murri in the traditional meaning), Billy Tea and Damper by the Brim family, Srilankan food by Ramona, and others. More indigenous and multicultural food stalls are invited.

Training program,

During the rehearsal phase (as of now) training especially (but not exclusively) for the Kuranda Aboriginal community in stage-craft will be underway.

Tutors are Sue Prince (voice), Jim Gosden (theatre lighting), Di Monaghan (theatre makeup, compering and microphone technique), John Goward from Mena Creek (sound), Hacka Harris (set construction), Rhondda Young and Pat McFarlane (costume), Barbara Burke (singingfinale song "Melting Pot"), and Peter McCabe (video training and documentation).

Opportunity Knocks.

Still room for more people with time and curiosity to learn, to join in the training sessions during May, with Aboriginal people especially invited. Still more room for multi-cultural cabaret acts. Still room for more multi-cultural stalls in the international food hall.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

REF: 'Good Idea' by Howard Stevens, K.P. 91.

Howard's article is extremely thought provoking, yet stops well short of what is occurring here - not in the loss sense, but in the creative sense, in a manner which will prevent the destruction by over-population

Any of us would, and do, welcome any genuine visitor, tourist or guest into our lives and living areas however, when said touring guests en masse require to take over to the extent of pushing us out of our own livingroom of our cultural development, into that proverbial well stocked country toilet as if we were disposable items and swamped lives, then it is time to delare our vision.

I will call it quite simply:

VISION KURANDA: FAMILY OF (CREATIVE) HUMANITY: (NOW!)

The entire Kuranda area must be declared a zone of CREATIVE HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT and as such, gazetted in law. We have virtually an entire community dedicated to the recovery of both natural principles and harmony of Spirit. Why don't we say so?

I propose the the following area and offer the following reasons:

The area declared to extend from an elevation of 100 metres back of Cairns, over the mountain range, extending 20 kilometres inland, with a coast parallel projection from Cooktown to Tully. The future no longer belongs solely to those who are trained for jobs - it belongs also to those who have become their own creators. The era of life based on the economy and the holding of humanity in enslavement to one of its own extended servant energies is over. Kuranda holds the response-ability of holding and expressing the central integrity of a self-creative family of humanity in a cultural community form. This is vital for Australia and this is who we are. This is how we enter the 21st century. Let us take the lead and

Environmental extremism will automatically come into balance as will commercial processes. Remember: The process of becoming, equals the quality of being.

If our mountain range was the home of the last known ten pairs of the lesser ringtailed golden twit, there would be a national outcry to create a protection zone. How much more important, a nursery for 21st century humanity and our necessity to self create? Are we not an 'endangered species' as well? Let's state our place. Let's lift our vision. Anyone care for a meeting to ratify this?

The workshop is held in the belief that people in this community:

- * Have excellent ideas for its future.

- * Shaping their own destinies.

- * Have the ability to formulate a comprehensive range of plans

Information gathered will feed into preparation of the new Kuranda Development Control Plan as well as form the basis for implementation of the Kuranda tourism levy. Council is also committed to the upgrading of the Kuranda & Environs Development Control Plan in the near future.

While co-operation in spirit has been very encouraging, so has the shared funding which results in the community benefitting from talent, skills and experience of professional consultants who will be responsible for turning vision into hard data and plans, allowing us all to be a part of the future design and development of our own community and environment. 



Kuranda Consultative Group April meeting

The Chairman opened the Meeting and thanked residents attending. Informed the meeting that Ian Oelrichs of Pacific Asia Travel Association (PATA), would be the guest speaker and would speak on Endemic Tourism

matter of traffic travelling down Barang Street, along the Esplanade and into Thongon St. past the Police Station was introduced by Terry Pate. He stressed the need for something to happen before the peak tourist season arrived. Cr. Rees said the matter would be addressed urgently by the Strategic Management Study and nothing could be done until this committee looked at the problem. Cr. Rees was opposed to the idea as people in Barang St. had not been consulted.

Endemic Tourism - Ian Celrichs spoke on Endemic Tourism making the following important points:. Kuranda is a unique location which should be preserved by

 The quality of the environment must be paramount and must be negotiated to allow sustainable development.

Marjorie Spears requested that some action be taken to erect a sign on each end of Barron River traffic bridge advising which side is used for pedestrian traffic. Bob Colefax pointed out the inconsistency of double no passing lanes at Top of The Range and a passing lane on the bridge and moved that the matter be brought to the attention of the Dept. of Transport.

Shire Strategic Plan - Noted that Cr. Gray promoted development at Jum Rum Valley. Only two developers' suggestions were included. Cr. Rees advised she had opposed Cr. Gray's Motion. Gray promoted

Councillors Report - Mr. Cliff Stevens raised the subject of the proposed Marecha Leagues Club and asked about the petition the proposed Mareeba Leagues Club and asked about the petition signed by ratepayers for a plebiscite on the proposal. Advised that Minutes of Council Meeting had shown Council had rejected the petition as the petition was defective. Mr. Stevens requested Cr.Gray to state what his decision had been on the matter. The meeting was informed that Cr.Gray had given his support to the Council proposal to build a Club at Mareeba. Mr. Stevens queried reasons for Cr.Gray's support for the Club given that the Kuranda Consultative Group meeting on 17th February had requested Cr. Gray not to include Kuranda. In the February had requested Cr. Gray not to include Kuranda in the proposal and the meeting had voted against the proposal. Cr. Gray informed that he had also to think of Julatten and the final decision was his to make and he had supported the Leagues Club proposal. Mr. Stevens said he had attended a Public Meeting at Mareeba where a majority had shown lack of support for the proposal. He also mentioned that the Poll had been signed by 20% of the Shire including many signatures from Julatten. Cr.Gray was of the opinion that the final decision was his to make. Mr. Stevens requested that the Consultative Group send a letter to Council expressing disgust at the manner in which Council had ignored public opinion.

Draft Strategic Plan - J.Bergersen advised that a small group of people were working on an optional Strategic Plan to be submitted to Local Government. All input is welcome. The group meets at Ms.Bergersen's house on Sundays 10am - 12.Ph.938934.

Skyrail - Dr.Clark advised that Dept.of Environment & Heritage and Wet Tropics are finalising conditions which will be sent to the Minister. All concerns have been addressed. Bob Colefax advised that the conceptual plans had been produced. The plan envisaged reduction of coach numbers and the transfer station had been scaled down. Mr. Marshall raised concerns about the company and produced a summary of the Skyrail project to date, for distribution, and raised points about access through National Parks and World Heritage areas. It was suggested that Skyrail users transferring to Tablelands tours could be transported by train to Koah and met by coaches there. It was resolved to write to Dept. Environment & Heritage and Wet Tropics seeking an update of proceedings and requesting a Social Impact Study be conducted. Dr.Clark advised that Dept.of Environment & Heritage Social Impact Study be conducted.

Shire Strategic Plan - Minister is aware of concerns and will respond in due course.

<u>Library</u> - Cr. Rees advised that money for the Library is in a Trust account and is still accruing. Community should be looking at a suitable site and design.

Kuranda Dump - Bill Nicholls informed that there was no legislation in Queensland governing garbage dumps. Environment Impact Statement for garbage is an open ended document. The Dumpwatch Network should get a firmer committment to public process. The Dump Network should act as the Consultative Group representative. Dr. Clark recognised the Dumpwatch Committee as the Consultative Group for the proposals at Lamb Range.

Bill Nicholis (Koah) asked Cr.Chris Lewis what is the most economic type of waste disposal. Cr.Lewis replied that landfill was recognised as the most economic way to dispose of waste. Bill Nicholls requested that Cr.Lewis supply the cost of establishing a landfill system at Lamb Range as he had been advised that establishment of a landfill system would cost about \$5.2 million. Sue Robertson suggested that a user pays system be introduced. In some countries rubbish is weighed at the source. Council needs to consider recycling.





ORGANIC GROWING by Marjorie Spear

Yellow passion fruit are ripening well now but they would like a bit more sunshine. Cockatoos are devastating the passion fruits at the top of my vines. I have future plans for keeping the vines lower (out of cockies reaches). The bats eat some low fruit but cockies eat far more. They can devastate a whole crop of lemons in a few hours. They eat the seeds, so keep your lemon trees low.

Citrus are thriving now. Mandarins ripening but need more sun for sweetness. The fruit piercing moth is invading the ripening fruit. As its eggs mature a nasty brown patch develops on the fruit. Best to pick the fruit as most is still edible. If you don't pick the fruit it will fall off. The grubs do not mature in the soil like fruit-fly larvae. So you can compost fruit attacked by the piercing moth. For years I have hung plastic bottles baited with sweet juice in my citrus as the fruit start to ripen. Some moths get trapped, but there are so many that this year I am not baiting. For the energetic, go out after dusk with an old badminton racquet and slaughter the moths. Their red eyes will show them up. The moth will also attack the early grapefruit. When winter comes the moth will go. They have been feasting on Abiu fruit, they like the yellow colour. You can pick your passionfruit when pale yellow. They will ripen up indoors (and get less insect damage).

Pawpaws are hating this weather. Many now have wobbly stems and the fruit little flavour. Those trees must come out soon. I hope you have some new plants ready for the open ground but do not plant where the sick trees come out. Tropical vegetables love this weather. In their homes in the Pacific they thrive on moisture. Insect attack is nonexistent in taros, cassava, wing beans etc. My leafy green senposai still thrives.

Marigolds brighten up the vegie patch and keep insects away from tomatoes. If the birds eat your tomatoes use old mosquito netting over the plants.

If you intend buying seedlings make sure they are sturdy plants. Célery and Italian parsley are good to buy now. Triple curled parsley has little flavour and is used mostly for garnishing.

Lettuce will thrive now and so will the small ball cabbages, but do not try cauliflowers. Kuranda does not have enough cold weather. For these vegies you need plenty of nourishment. Pelletised chicken manure is OK.








DAY RESPITE CENTRE FOR KURANDA

For the frail aged or the frail young, this is a nondenominational programme, provided through the Blue Nursing Service, under the auspices of the Uniting Church. Initially one day a week will be offered, at the C.W.A. Hall in Kuranda, and 4 days a week in the old Manse by the Uniting Church in Mareeba. The number of hours is yet to be decided but will cover the working day.

If you are looking after a frail person, at home, and finding you need time-out, this day will be important for you. A chance to place the frail person in our care while you get the break and they make friends and have a change of scenery.

The Government has allotted \$35,000 towards the cost of the bus, which is required to pick up the frail persons from their houses. A couple of months ago I described the lumbar discs. This month I will explain how they become damaged. One of the important things to remember about discs is that they have a poor nerve supply. This means that the disc can be damaged bit by bit without us getting "pain" warnings until one day we abuse our back once too aften and get a bulging or ruptured disc. Often after 20-30 years of spinal abuse we pay the

The following activities will lead to minor ruptures of the disc fibres:-

*sitting slumped and/or without good back support,

*bending over to pick up or put down instead of bending through the knees (no matter if it's a pin or a bag of concrete).

*working for a prolonged period with the back slightly bent (eg over a washbasin, or the engine of a car).

*vibrations, particularly large amplitude (eg sitting on a tractor or ride-on-mower or in a car with poor suspension over a dirt road).

*prolonged twisting, particularly if bending forward or backwards at the same time (eg reaching to the back seat of the car, if sitting in the front, to attend to a child).



Buck IS 'Scanlan'

BLIP Theatre

Back surgery gives one time to reflect and read volumes. So while recovering in the Cairns Base, Kuranda's Buck Richardson read reviews of plays that Max Gillies had recently performed. One was Scanlan, by Barry Oakley.

Keen to put his back behind him, Buck decided to have a crack at something theatrically meaty. He hunted down Scanlan in print. It was perfect. Scanlan is a one-act play of just under an hours duration - but just as stretching as his previous role in Stretch of The Imagination, just as challenging, perhaps even more so, in the strongly dramatic sense.

Scanlan is a middle-aged academic experiencing mid-life crisis, a time when we are prone to do some pretty silly things. He has been lured by his rival, Dr. Grigsby, to give a seminar in the hope that, given enough rope, he will hang himself publicly, metaphorically speaking.

The hapless Scanlan obliges. He completely loses the plot in a way that will take the audience on a journey through your own emotional spectrum. The critical stress factors in Scanlan's life are exposed, as the drama of his private life surfaces during that one hour after-dinner seminar

Playwright Barry Oakley's wry, sceptical, nervy drolleries and implacable sense of irony helped him survive the neurotic and paranoid days of the nascent Australian theatre scene in Melbourne. He endured dozens of violent meetings at the Pram Factory, terrible rehearsals and terrible arguments about his work. Since then, he has published novels, short stories, and a collection of essays and written many plays for both stage and radio. In 1982 he was the winner of the Canada/Australia Literary Award. He is currently the books editor of The Australian.

Buck Richardson has been directed by Rhondda Young as Clive in On Top of the World, by Jim Gosden as the mountain woman, Myra Gantry, in One Way Pendulum, and by Ricardo Rusch as Monk O'Neill in Stretch of the Imagination Jonathon Farrell's review of Stretch in Barfly had this to say, '... performed with the grace and dexterity that captures Jack Hibberd's unique melding of high comedy and tragedy ... for those sceptics of one man plays here's a chance to regain your trust in solo performers. . .'

As Scanlan he is being directed by Joyce Berendes, who trained for Dance and Drama at the former Chris Hofland Theatre for youth in the Netherlands. She worked as principal dancer, actress and teacher for this company for five years. In Australia, she studied speech and drama with Joan Whalley, then Director of Twelfth Night Theatre in Brisbane; won Twelfth Night's best actress award; and established and ran 'The Children's Operetta Group' in Brisbane teaching drama and ballet and writing/directing and producing musical plays for children.

She has recently written, with Glen Gummow, a musical play, 'A Fool's Gold' and is currently working to up-date 'Nullagundi', one of her musical plays for children.

Monkeys BYO is the perfect forum to stage the drama that is Scanlan, an intimate venue for this type of naturalistic theatre. Keen to help were Monkeys new proprietors, Peter and Beverley Adamson. A prize-winning Toastmaster from Melbourne, a very active Beverley has assisted at rehearsals.

The men ordered and sat down with the others. "How're things Ernie, anything new", said Bazza.

"Nope, just the same, plenty of hard work, not enough time, not enough money, the same old Truckie's disease," Ernie replied. Obviously hungry, the two newcomers bogged into their meal. On its disposal, they pushed back their plates and relaxed while drinking their coffee.

"Ay, Ernie; you've been around; do you know anything about them old time Romans?" an eager Barney asked.

"Oh, for Gawd's sake, Barney, give it a bone. Ernie doesn't want to be bothered by your stupid Romans," said an irritated Bazza.

"Do ya Ernie?" Barney persisted.

"Well, Barney, when I think of the Romans, my first thoughts conjure up blokes in mini-dresses wearing a sort of crash helmet that's decorated with chook feathers, driving round in two-wheeler billy-carts pulled by a couple of horses. When they aren't having billy-cart races, they jump around in a sort of bull-ring, donging their mates with whopping big bunches of knuckle-dusters.

Some of the others play what they call Roman golf, trying to knock the heads off their opponents with dirty big clubs. As knuckle dusters and clubs are regarded by some of them as being sissy they favour three pronged spears and nets. My heart bleeds for this human being (real people) and I will miss him . . . no words written or spoke can express the loss that I feel. They came from all across Australia to show respect. This black fella will be remembered by migloos and brothers alike for lots of good things!!

I WILL MISS HIS SMILE, HONESTY AND THE LIP AND LEAF.

Then there was the last collection of artworks by indigenous prison inmates exhibited in open space against the back drop of chook wire . . . a real nice touch! "What the eye sees can often tell what one's heart feels" I said this when asked by another what I thought of the INSIDE OUT EXHIBIT. 

FILM REVIEW

LORENZO's OIL

Kennedy Miller films should take a big bow for their latest effort, Lorenzo's Oil. This intense film DOES have an up inspiring ending. I hasten to say this because I'm sure that many people will be reluctant to see a film about the struggles of a severely ill child and his family, expecting to come away disheartened and depressed.

Lorenzo's Oil is, in fact, a story of triumph, and of love, and will probably encourage any one facing adversity.

Based on the true story of the still living Lorenzo Odone, this masterful production stars Susan Sarandon and Nick Nolte as Lorenzo's parents. But the real star of this film is the story itself and the obvious inspiration it gave to the cast and to the production crew.

George Miller, the director was formerly a medical doctor and I suspect that this allowed a great deal of empathy between Miller and the Odones, because the film has a lot to do with the scientific method, and with a healthy but respectful debunking of the medical establishment.

George Miller the doctor doesn't have doctors on a holy pedestal, and neither do the Odones, who were actively involved with the development of the script.

The film is also a wonderful tribute to the strength of motherhood and of fatherhood, and also to the strength and courage of young Lorenzo Odone. This film seems to ring true to life.

The withdrawal of the parents of the sufferers of this disease into despair, and into a self help group which was wary of any thread of hope, was also especially touching.

Written by Australians George Miller and Nick Enright, beautifully photographed by Australian John Seale, and with all the post production work completed in the Kennedy Miller building in Sydney, Lorenzo's Oil is another very impressive feather in Australia's hat.





NEWS FROM THE KINDY

If you haven't been to our premises yet, you'll be surprised to see how spacious and bright they are. Inside we have areas for many activities ranging from our book section and quiet area, to our "restaurant", "shop" and not forgetting the "bank".

Painting, drawing and craft activities, including some woodwork, are carried out under our large verandah area, and of course, swings and sandpits are outside in our developing garden area. By Government standards, we could enrol 40 children, but we prefer, under Creche and Kindergarten Association guidelines, to limit our size to 20 children per session, thus maintaining a more personalised atmosphere.

There are always 2 trained adults in attendance to supervise all activities. We place high stress on professional development and all our staff are currently studying for further qualifications. One of our main objectives is to provide an affordable educational program for 3 or 4 year olds. Currently, the Government provides funding which covers 52% of our running costs. 

OUTSIDE SCHOOL HOURS CARE

An after school care programme has been set up at the Kuranda School. This service is for parents who can't be home for their children in the afternoons. The aims of the programme are to provide quality leisure activities for children between the ages of 5 and 12 years and to care for and supervise the children between the hours of 3pm and 6pm daily. This service will commence on 10th May. Children enrolled in the programme will report to the "old Kindy room" at the school after they are dismissed from class. They will be given afternoon tea and then encouraged to choose from a number of set activities or out-door play. Initially, the after school care programme will be staffed by 2 mothers (one of which is an ex-school teacher). The fees will be kept to a minimum varying according to whether the child is enrolled full-time, part-time or on a casual basis and also according to how many children are enrolled from the same family. Child care assistance (fee relief) is also available.

Details of fees will be given upon inquiry. If your child does not require reg 'ar afternoon care, you might like to enrol your child in c se of emergency when you are delayed and can't get home in time.

Answers to the questions

EDUCATORS have been hitting the airwaves recently to answer community concerns about composite classes.

Following is a summary of some of the often asked questions and the replies they

Q: Multi-age and composite classes are spoken of synonymously. What's the difference?

A: The concepts are similar in that children from two or more age levels work together in the same class. The difference is that multi-age class are a long-term projects whereas composites usually are for just that one individual year level. However, composite classes come under the genre of multi-age classes

Q: No-one ever spoke of composite classes in the past. Is it a modern trend?

A: It is a phenomenon of the last 15 years or so a consequence of the move to reduce class sizes. However, multi-age classes have always where more than 50 per cent of schooling is done this way.

classes (as opposed to multiage) just a matter of convenience a number-crunching exercise?

A: Composite (like all multi-age) classes offer a way of tailoring education to individual student needs. Syllabus documents have content stretching over a number of years not limited to one year level. There is now a series of sequences in, for example, mathematics which has to be covered between Years 1 and 10.

Q: Is it true that choice of pupils for composite classes is based on school needs rather than students', e.g. the worst of Year 4 with the best of Year 3?

A: There is no real formula for the making of choices, however, schools are encouraged to place students together who are from a range of abilities and to explain how choices are made to parents.

Q: Isn't there a danger that older children are more advanced and will make younger children-feel less adequate?

A: The opportunity for increasing self-esteem is raised in a multi-age classroom. The older children get a chance to be leaders while younger ones can learn from them. Social opportunities are enhanced.

Q: Multi-age classes may be good for the students of average and lesser ability, but won't they impede the outstanding student?

A: Brighter students in composite classes are better placed and are encouraged to undertake more self-directed or independent learning.




