Mareeba Is Propping Up The Southern Shires

No. As part of the information Treasury Corporation requested, an assessment was made of what has been spent and where it has gone. The former MSC makes up 44 per cent of revenues but has received 54 per cent of our infrastructure spending. This has been because at amalgamation an inventory was made of all infrastructure to assess what was in most need of repair/upgrading. The greatest need was in the former MSC so that is where we have spent funds. The Boundaries Commissioner said this about it: "A reconstituted MSC is unsustainable and is currently being subsidised by TRC".

If Mareeba Is Such A Burden Why Keep It?

Because Mareeba Shire as part of the TRC is very different to a Mareeba Shire trying to go it alone. As a stand-alone shire the independent, professional assessment of the QTC is that it will be unsustainable, that debt burdens will not be able to be serviced and so on. But as a part of the TRC it is not trying to pay for a new sewerage plant by itself, it is not trying to bring roads and pipes and other infrastructure up to standard by itself, it is not having to fund the \$8.2 million for de-amalgamating - and that money will not pay for a single pothole to be filled. As part of the TRC MSC is a strong, healthy and contributing part of a regional organisation. By itself it is not.

There Are Plenty Of Ways A New MSC Can Pay For De-amalgamating So It Won't Cost Ratepayers Anything

The most common ways that funds could be found, it is suggested, are from the \$1.7 million income from a waste contract, from profits from the Mareeba Industrial Estate and from rental payments from the Mareeba Leagues Club. The truth is that the waste contract's \$1.7 million is gross income. By the time all relevant costs are taken in to account there is only about \$850,000. However there are major costs in the very near future for the Mareeba landfill that is estimated at \$4.7 million. It is also likely there will be carbon tax costs.

The Industrial Park is a very large, multi-stage development and any stage-by-stage profits are rolled over to funding future stages. It will be decades before there is clear profit. The League Club funds help defray the costs of other -based activities. If it is taken to pay for de-amalgamation then something else may well miss out on funding.

Mareeba Has No Voice On TRC

TRC has eight councillors and a Mayor. Of the eight councillors three have divisions entirely within the old MSC. Another two have parts of their divisions within the old MSC. The track record of spending, which has seen more than half go to the old MSC, should be cold, hard proof Mareeba's voice is heard and its needs addressed.

Rates Soared Under TRC

The TRC kept rates increases to about 8 per cent (less than almost any other amalgamated council) despite having to cope with the cost of amalgamating (more than \$10 million) and massive new demands from the State for things like Asset Management Plans, Audit Committees, a single Planning Scheme, long term financial plans, disaster management and so on, all while also continuing to provide the normal day-to-day services of roads, libraries etc. The last TRC budget had a general rate increase of only 3.8 per cent.

Mareeba Shire Experienced Significant Growth Prior To Amalgamation

The last MSC report prior to amalgamation quotes growth of 32 to 39% since 2000. This was growth in development approvals, not real growth. Real growth of only 17% was achieved over this period. That is only about 2% each year between 2000 and 2008. Since GFC this has dropped back to 1% annually and this drop has been reflected across all communities. However TRC has fared better than Cairns and other coastal councils. Development approvals accelerated in the mid-2000s in MSC. Today we have approved lots (from this period) in excess of demand and developers requesting extensions as they are unable to move these lots (extensions which Council is approving). This reduced demand is reflected across many regional areas but is more prevalent in MSC where there is a significant oversupply of lots especially in Mareeba.

ED: The only information available in print from the proponents of deamalgamation has been in the form of misleading and sometimes incorrect advertising. Their case has been made by assertions, not backed up by facts. They have commissioned the Cummings Report which purports to disprove the findings of the Queensland Treasury Commission but has not been successful in this attempt. In any case, the Minister has said that the only source of statistics he will use is the QTC report.

Under the old Mareeba Shire Council, Kuranda fared very poorly. We were treated with disdain and struggled to be able to speak, let alone have any influence. We see no evidence that anything will change under a new MSC. Under the amalgamated TRC we have had representation and a voice at the table. Far from being simply biased, as this correspondent alleges, this paper is wholeheartedly and unashamedly against changing the present situation. We believe Kuranda's future lies with the TRC, which is doing an excellent job under very difficult circumstances.

More On De-amalgamation

A Mareeba Shire residents group has continually challenged the accuracy of the costs of de-amalgamating saying they are inflated and have not been audited. Sadly the community has been misled on this and many other de-amalgamation issues. Mr Crisafulli, the Local Government Minister, has said he stood by the accuracy of the figures that predicted a surge in rates for councils that de-amalgamate and the data has been audited, reviewed and rigorously tested.

The cost of de-amalgamation will be \$8.2M and the Government has said it will solely be on a new Mareeba Shire Council. No share of assets, no reserves and no State Government handout to offset the costs has been promised. According to the independent Treasury report each and every ratepayer on average will be charged with a whopping \$872 in the first year and a total of \$3750 over the first 5 years. These cost will flow on to affect everyone in the shire as landlords, landowners and business seek to recover their additional costs. The LNP State Government have warned the community, de-amalgamation will be very costly, the risk is great, the decision once made, one way or the other, it cannot be reversed. It's up to everyone who has a vote to ask themselves the question "what's in it for me personally if I vote yes". For most people the answer will be absolutely nothing, just a guarantee of an unwarranted financial burden and much uncertainty.

An Open Letter to the Residents of Kuranda District

What does living in Kuranda mean to you? Being one of the many small parts that goes to make up the Kuranda district community excites and energises me. To all of the elements that combine to make our community such a fantastic place, I offer my sincerest thanks. However, demographic change looms as inevitable, resulting in a surge in available real estate. I'm not predicting new developments or additional land releases ... I foresee the potential for significant migration from Kuranda ... when the price of petrol goes beyond \$2 per litre (or \$2.50 per litre ... or \$3 ... whatever the nominal price point, it is inevitable). It must be challenging for families who live their lives 'down the hill' and sleep in Kuranda. There are challenges for individuals who work in Cairns and the Northern Beaches – however, they are are not the issue upon which I wish to focus today. Families with kids at school is who I feel for. Apart from ... the additional expenses incurred (fuel, maintenance, tyres etc...), the environmental guilt they must feel, the increased odds of being involved in a Range Road accident, the negative effects on health through stress and frustration in transit ... living down the hill and sleeping in Kuranda must exact a huge toll on friendships and community connectivity.

Reserves Allocated To Mareeba Airport Have Been Wasted By

Reserves at the time of amalgamation were approx \$236k and were intended for both Mareeba and Chillagoe aerodromes. They currently stand at approx \$135k. The \$100k has been spent on MSC aerodromes. With grants funding received so far since amalgamation approx \$2.6m has been spent on MSC aerodromes. This ranges from a development plan and improved drainage for Mareeba aerodrome to GPS and lighting facilities at Chillagoe.

Staffing Numbers Are Overly High

Employees at amalgamation for the former MSC = 1.2 per 100 population. Employees now for TRC = 1.2 per 100 population.

For completeness, at amalgamation:

- Former Atherton = 0.9 per 100
- · Former Eacham = 1.2 per 100
- Former Herberton = 1.3 per 100

Mareeba Has Missed Out On TRC Spending And Has Propped Up **The Southern Shires**

- · Since amalgamation a total of \$34.3m has been spent in the MSC area on roads, drainage, bridges, water, sewerage, plant and fleet and buildings, etc. This compares with \$29.6 in the southern shires.
- · This represents 54% of the total infrastructure spend in the MSC area and yet this area only contributes about 44% of total TRC revenues.
- The infrastructure spend over the next 5 yrs to 2019 is forecast to be \$113.6m in the MSC area which will represent 63% of the total TRC infrastructure spend.
- · This will bring the standard of all infrastructure across the region up to a comparable level.

Are There Any Successful De-amalgamations?

- · There have been numerous submissions made for de-amalgamation but throughout Australia there is just one recent example of de-amalgamation
- Delatite Shire in Victoria de-amalgamated in 2002. Originally the estimates of the likely rate increases were placed at between 12% and 16.5% for the two new councils formed after Delatite was de-amalgamated in 2002.

The actual increases were over 30% immediately following de-amalgamation and, after adjusting for inflation and population increases, the rates in 2006 (just four years after splitting) were between 72% and 78% higher than before.

What Did Each Council Bring To Amalgamation?

Mareeba Cash \$22.57m out of a total of \$52.9m (42.6%)

Mareeba Debt \$6m out of a total of \$8.93m (68%)

Mareeba Net Assets \$293m out of total \$633m (46%)

At de-amalgamation Mareeba will get about \$25.3m in cash, \$1.66m in debt and Net Assets of \$352m.

I came across this unique individual plying his art at the Original Kuranda Rainforest Markets the other day. Martin is a world renowned sculptor who now prefers to busk, taking his art directly to the people. He has been sculpting since age 14, and over the last

40 years has exhibited and sold his work in Australia and overseas. But these days Martin prefers to do his sculpting in the open air, in public, for all to see. "The art is in the act of creating, not in the end product". Martin's work is ephemeral in nature. Watching

him work, you will see a lump of clay, in his skilful hands, metamorph from one object into

of income from his work is from the generosity of those who appreciate his talent and his unique approach to the creation and sharing of his art form. If you are into sculpting or the creation of art generally, I suggest you get along to the marketplace and

have a look at Martin's work. Originally from Melbourne, Martin has been all over the place and now lives at Mission Beach. He will be in Kuranda for a few months, so you have plenty of time to catch him at work. Some of his earlier work can be

found on the net. Just google "Martin Sharp sculptor" (note: Martin Sharp artist is someone else). Better still, get along to the Original Kuranda Rainforest Markets and watch Martin pour life into an inanimate lump of clay in an everchanging expression of pure form.

How do we make art? Easy, by painting, sculpting, dancing, acting, singing, playing, photographing, digitising, producing, etc. etc. The list is long. Why do we make art? Not so easy. Some do it for money. Some do it for love. Some do it for both. I recently saw some art that was not much more than dirty brown smudges on canvas. The artist had created many such smudges, all original, all roughly the same. These can be yours for about \$2,000 to \$4,000 each, or if you have some dirt and a canvas you could make your own. The problem with this is that some art critic will tell you that it's not art. The real art is in the spin or This then becomes your art rather than the things you create. The art critic will then good luck to you artists who can pull it off.

proclaim your brown stain to be a significant and meaningful work of art in words that are grand but meaningless. Now "Emperor's New Clothes" syndrome takes over. The wealthy, not wanting to seem uncultured, will willingly part with big cash

for your brown stain. So the art in this case is in the presentation, or spin. It's a cultural placebo, i.e. it's not real, but it makes the buyer feel better for having spent a lot of money on it. Unfortunately there are still many (not all) in our academic story you weave around it. 

Kuranda Indigenous Men's Health Group

Following a strong start to the year the Kuranda Indigenous Men's Health Group (KIMHG), with the on-going support from Relationships Australia and Ngoonbi Co-operative Society, has made an impression in the community and has received good feedback from participants, community members and local organisations. In recent weeks KIMHG Co-ordinators, Joseph Oui, Relationships Australia and Jermane Herbohn, Ngoonbi Co-operative Society have actively organised future events, social outings and sessions which will develop links and better support the concerns of Indigenous men in the community.

The KIMHG has planned future partnerships with other local Indigenous men's groups in Yarrabah, Mareeba and Mossman that can work to implement a holistic and culturally inclusive approach, benefitting Indigenous communities and targeting Indigenous men, women and children.

The KIMHG recently held a group session in Kuranda, hosted by Jermane Herbohn, about the function of the heart, and heart disease awareness. Before the session the men had cooked savoury mince and rice and it was good to see the men cooking and having a good time together. The session started with



a minute's silence because of Survival day (Australia Day) and a power point presentation of old archival pictures of Rainforest Aboriginal people. After the minute's silence Jermane handed out words to a Djabugay song Called 'Gagay Mu' and Biri Jah played the guitar as men sang the song. Then came the session on 'Function of the Heart'. While music played, men had their blood pressure measured and then had to write down their systolic and diastolic levels for the session. Overall the session was explanatory and very

informative. It made the men aware that they faced the reality of mortality figures that underline the importance of understanding Chronic health diseases affecting Indigenous men in Australia.

On the following weekend the KIMHG had its first weekend outing. This saw many Indigenous men participate: visiting the Cairns lagoon for a barbecue and swim and later to Freshwater for another swim. The weekend activity started with a bus trip from Kuranda to Cairns at around 9am. Throughout the day the men had a great time playing a game of touch footy together and also a game of cricket to work up an appetite for lunch. After lunch the KIMHG travelled to Freshwater creek for a refreshing swim. Uncle Andy Duffin played guitar. Some of the men sat and relaxed in the shade and some of them went fishing. The men who participated were very grateful to have been included and would like to go on future weekend outings.

The KIMHG outing and sessions showed that many Indigenous men in the community are willing to engage and participate, and have shown that they are moving forward to create a inclusive and respectful relationship with others and most importantly themselves, building confidence, self esteem, pride and resilience.



Welcome Home Sybil

In the early hours of one morning last August, an adult Striped Possum was injured in a quiet Kuranda cul-de-sac. Sybil came into care at BatReach via the local vet, where she had been taken by the early morning walker who had found her by the roadside. Sybil had sustained a severe concussion, presumably from an encounter with a car.

As is typical with head injuries, progress was slow. Meanwhile Sybil was comfortable and safe in her hospital box being cared for by Pam and Kristy, who fed her delicacies such as mealworms and avocado. She also happily gnawed her way through a nightly supply of tasty logs.

Over time Sybil's condition improved – as she became more coordinated she become more active. She was then moved to a larger enclosure where she could exercise on the branches at night and rebuild her strength.

Eventually Sybil was ready for release back to the wild. Fortunately her exact territory was known through details originally taken at the vet surgery. After spending two nights in a portable release enclosure at a property close to where she had been found, her door to freedom was opened. She calmly exited the enclosure and began to reacquaint herself with her familiar trees, gaining speed and confidence as she raced up and down, leaping from branch to branch before vanishing into the night.

Sybil's story is the best case scenario for rescue and rehabilitation of an injured native animal, where she was placed into appropriate care, rehabilitated and released back into her own territory.

Healthy Kuranda-ite

Don't Take Sleeping Issues Lying Down

MODERATION IS THE KEY to balance within our lives. Not only in the foods we consume but also in our daily activities. Sleep is an exceptionally important commodity that is often only truly appreciated as it becomes restricted.

Sleeping patterns at a glance

- 1. Alpha waves we begin to become
- 2. Theta waves transform us from waking to sleeping. Occurs for only a few minutes.
- 3. Beta waves the body is asleep and our systems slow down but we are still sensitive to noise
- 4. Restorative Sleep Phase during which cells repair and rejuvenate themselves. This is the deepest phase of Sleep.


their house cleaning.





In support of Cairns Base Hospital – Intensive Care Unit

It really is amazing how the events of a few short days heart, also toileted, fand ed individually. Many patients can make dramatic differences to our lives.

Just before New Year I caught what I thought was a stomach bug. Naturally one just took a couple of Panadol and waited for it all to pass.

Of course when it hadn't by the next day, the wife insisted on dragging me off to the Kuranda Medical Centre. At this stage (late on 2 January) I started to feel "heavy", "lethargic" and "slow" both physically and mentally (although I guess there's some who'd say that was nothing unusual for me). The KMC decided to send me off by ambulance to Mareeba Hospital.

From there it was decided to ship me off to Cairns Hospital by way of the Rescue Helicopter. My first chopper ride, but alas, from my stretcher on the floor no sightseeing was possible. Then I'm wheeled into Cairns Base Hospital Intensive Care Unit – which turned out to be my 'home' for the next 34 days.

It happened that I had somehow developed Septacemia and suffered complete kidney failure and the next couple of weeks was a blur of continuous Dialysis, various IV drips, blood transfusions, daily blood tests, breathing and feeding machines, etc. Some of the drug induced hallucinations in that first week, were, however, quite interesting.

Anyway, a horrendous time overall. In total I was about thirty-four (34) days in ICU, and then another 10 days in recovery wards.

But this is the real story I wish to tell. The ICU team is such a professional and 'well-oiled' machine that it is hard to know where to start praise.

The doctors, of course, in their daily rounds who with honesty and non-technical waffle update your condition; the nurses, with their friendly efficiency; even wardsmen and cleaners offering grins and 'owyagoin mate'.

For those not familiar with an Intensive Care Unit, it is completely different to the 'normal' hospital ward. Catering for only limited patients at a time, nurses are allocated to generally 12 hour shifts, 7.30 to 7.30. Nurses and patients are mostly 'one on one', except when there may be some on-the-way-to-recovery patients who may 'share' a nurse. One on one may seem a little extravagant to some – but let's remember that most patients are not 'with it' and have to be continuously monitored for all functions - breathing,

(such as me for the first few weeks), are hooked up to a variety of machines going "ping ping" that need close attention. In most cases, the ICU is the last line of defence. Generally, there's nowhere to go from ICU except recovery or Palliative Care.

I overheard a small group of nurses unfavourably discussing their pay rates in comparison to recentlyreleased unskilled workers pay rates. As a society we should hang our heads in shame that skilled and dedicated workers are seemingly devalued. Where is the perspective?

But it's not all gloom and doom in the ICU. The staff really do attempt to chat to and cheer up the patients the best they can.

Oddly enough, they also get the occasional whinger. Over my extended 'stay', I observed people who were there in the ICU, usually having had their lives saved by the team, revert back to their self-centredness after feeling better for a few days – and start criticising staff, food, etc.

As for me, after all this intensive treatment, eventually my kidney function fought back to be working at about 20% capacity, at which point I was sent off to recovery wards in Cairns hospital, then Mareeba hospital for a total of 10 days. Again, I have nothing but praise for the staff and procedures in the 'normal' wards of either hospital, even the food was pretty damned good.

There were a couple of minor glitches in administrative procedures – but what big organisation doesn't have these?

The latest round of hospital sackings and redundancies annoy me. In my 'stay' I certainly didn't notice any staff lazing about, and I cannot for the life of me see where these sackings are coming from. For me, I'm obviously grateful to the professional and dedicated ICU team to still 'be here'. and will hear no criticism whatsoever.



To Split or Not to Split?

On March 9th, Kuranda residents will vote on whether the old Mareeba Shire is reestablished, splitting the current Tablelands Regional Council into two. How would this affect Kuranda?

Friends of the Earth (FoE) Kuranda asked Mick Borzi, ex mayor of Mareeba Shire and present Mayor of Tablelands Regional Council Rosa Lee Long about various issues including drinking water quality and sewerage.

Lack of space prevents the answers being published in full but these can be read on our website at http://www.foekuranda.org/.

We were particularly interested in the overdue upgrade of Mareeba's sewerage works, how the respective councils would fund this and when the work would take place.

Over \$25 million must be spent on Mareeba's sewerage to comply with minimum standards, work that should have begun many years ago under the old Mareeba Shire Council. (According to the Tableland Advertiser http://www.cairns.com.au/ article/2012/05/25/220745_local-news.html the sewerage works have failed to meet license agreement for more than two decades.)

Rosa Lee Long commented, "If de-amalgamation is defeated at the 9 March poll, I anticipate a decision will be made at the next Tableland Regional Council meeting after that date and the upgrade then commence as quickly as is possible."

Mick Borzi did not answer the question about when the upgrade would be actioned if Mareeba Shire is resurrected, but said, "It would be funded by charges."

Oueensland Treasury estimates that Mareeba Shire Council would face financial constraints from day one and after five years have an additional debt of over \$70 million. So it is likely that long-overdue capital works expenditure, like the Mareeba sewage system would be a low priority.

And we would go from a Council that's financially stable to a Council strapped for cash. The Treasury also estimate that ratepayers would be liable for drastic rate increases in the years following amalgamation.

In the meantime, the Barron River would continue to be polluted by the defunct Mareeba sewage system, from which Mareeba and Kuranda's town water is supplied.

Would Mareeba Shire's financial problems then support a culture of unsustainable, open-slather development to try to build up the shire's financial base?

For these reasons, FoE is concerned that de-amalgamating would result in mismanagement and increased environment degradation of our most precious environmental assets including the Barron River catchment.

And we believe a united Tableland Regional Council has more chance of successfully managing this with their whole region approach than piecemeal with separate councils.

Draft Tableland Regional Council Planning Scheme Submissions on this are due by 28 March 2013. For details, log onto http://www.

trc.qld.gov.au/. Friends of the Earth Kuranda will be putting a submission on our website, http:// www.foekuranda.org/ by mid March.

The review of local planning will have far reaching effects on where and how development takes place. It's a planning document and subject to change so make sure you have your say.







Inside My Studio

The Wikipedia definition of 'no fixed abode' is "If at a particular time a person has no fixed abode (in England and Wales or elsewhere) he shall at that time be treated as having his sole or main residence in the place where he is at the time." While Peter Jaensch has the comfort of a permanent residence, his 'studio' is certainly 'in the place where he is at the time.' Thoroughly enjoying his daily freedom after being locked in his gallery 'Spiral Studio' in the Kuranda Original Markets for seven days a week for six years, Pete says it was initially like being divorced from life. He felt a huge loss at the time but it now feels like being on holidays. What is next for Peter Jaensch? The list is extensive and one of the best things about his art is that it is portable. What Pete can't do with wire isn't worth writing about.

Where is your current studio?

Everywhere. I work where ever the inspiration takes me. The world is my studio. At the moment it is anywhere inspiration can appear – sitting on the side of the road, in my car, at home or even at a café.

Do you work alone or with others?

Both. You can always find someone who is like-minded and 'bounce off' each other. I conduct workshops at the local High School and the energy of the students blows me away. I really enjoy teaching. I have a degree in Landscape Architecture from UWA in Perth and this interest led to my artwork. But I also work in solitude, for many hours, whittling, carving, bending wire and researching.

What are the essential features your studio has to have? Air, light and inspiration. My fingers and my imagination.

Describe your work pattern hours/days/weeks.

From nothing to a sudden burst of inspiration and then there is no stopping me. When I had the gallery I once had five days off in a row in six years. Now my timetable is in my hands. I spend time roaming Op Shops collecting old beads and recycling materials. I am an 'opshopaholic'. It is incredible what you find. Treasures indeed. Pieces in particular that can be included and reused in workshops.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

Carving and sculpture. I make jewellery, optical illusions, and some funky bathroom fittings, mainly using wire. I am only limited to my imagination.

Why is working with wire your chosen medium?

I find it is a challenge to go from the sublime to the ridiculous, using my imagination as my major tool. Working with wire is my favourite medium. Wire wasn't readily used to create art pieces before around 1990. It was quite unique when I started. Now, instead of using a pencil and paper, a length of wire is my pencil. It is a malleable medium. It is playing. Art should be a game and fun.

List three things you listen to while working.

Silence isn't bad, but it is scarce. Silence can be a thunderous roar. But there is always the sounds of nature; the wind and the birds. I listen also to ABC Classics



and to 'talkback radio' and let the mind float off.

Your favourite tool?

Pliers, any form of pliers. I couldn't do my artwork without a pair of pliers. Also my dremel. I currently have a fascination with raw palm seeds and I am carving

(scrimshawing) these. This was an old pastime of sailors while

How do you identify your work?

My work identifies itself. I have never signed a piece. My art is my signature.

How do you sell your work?

I sell privately, by commission, and by word of mouth. I am currently working out of 'Didi's Garage Sale' premises beside the Kuranda Arts Co-operative Gallery in Coondoo Street. I am able to work and sell my own pieces at the same time as manning the Garage Sale. I do private workshops at the schools, the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre and on the Tablelands. Some of my pieces are available at Amber's stall at the Heritage Market.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I wouldn't change my current 'studio' situation for quids. I would lose my well earned freedom and the choice of where I want to be. The next step for me is to create a Gallery Café. I dream. I like the idea of combining art and food together.

If you were not working with visual art what would

you be doing?

I really enjoy teaching and I would like to establish some regular Recycling Workshops under my banner of Bent'n'Twisted Creations using fabric, plastic, found objects, wood and jewellery. The materials are limitless. It would be in Kuranda. I grew up in Perth and later moved to Darwin where I spent a number of years. I came to Kuranda in 1999 for a week and stayed five months. I came back again on Australia Day in 2003 and have been here ever since. I do not want to leave. There is something special about the people in this village – it is like a family unit, like slipping on a pair of comfortable slippers.



The Chemical Cocktail Called Venom

VENOM is a term strongly associated with Australian wildlife, as some of the most venomous creatures on earth live here. Venom is a mix of chemicals which are produced by animals to be injected into other animals, to either capture them as prey or in self defence. Although the terms venomous and poisonous are often used interchangeably they do mean different things. Poisons are chemicals which are absorbed or swallowed, whereas venoms are injected via a bite or a sting. Centipedes and millipedes are good examples of this. Centipedes can bite; they have modified claws which are used as fangs to inject a chemical to kill their prey – they are venomous. Millipedes on the other hand are not venomous, they are poisonous. They have chemicals inside them which they can release to cause irritation as a form of defence, and can cause animals to become ill if they eat them.



A rainforest millipede is mildly poisonous. It cannot bite, but releases chemicals as a defensive tactic that can be absorbed by other animals.

Obviously not all venoms are the same; they work in a variety ways. They are made up of various components (called toxins) which attack specific parts of the victim. Neurotoxins target the nervous system, while myotoxins act on muscles. Some toxins affect the clotting capacity of the blood, either by causing clotting or haemorrhage. Most venoms are very complicated chemicals, usually containing a combination of toxins.

The effects venoms have vary from species to species. Some animal species may be particularly susceptible to one type of venom, whilst other species show little effect. The venom of the well known Sydney Funnelweb spider is a perfect example. It efficiently kills its prey (small animals such as insects and other spiders), and is very toxic to humans as we well know. The quirk is that most other mammals (eg. cats and dogs) experience little effect from the bite of this spider. As far as mammals go, it is just us and our relatives (primates) which are particularly sensitive to Sydney Funnelweb venom.

Fortunately, we now have effective antivenoms for many of highly toxic venoms in Australia. This includes our venomous snakes, and spiders such as the Sydney Funnelweb and Redback. Our increased knowledge of first aid has also helped to significantly reduce the impact of these venoms on us.

Whether it is the spiders, snakes, jellyfish or jumping ants, tourists from other countries often come here with a distorted level of expectation for encountering some of our venomous animals – and with a sense of fear that simply is not necessary. Many Australians also worry far too much about these venomous animals. The fact is that although we do have more than our fair share of venomous animals in Australia, the risk of being seriously affected or killed by one of these creatures pales into absolute insignificance compared to taking our chances with motor vehicles on a daily basis.

"The King's Speech"

by Mark Logue and Peter Conradi

(2010, Quercus) ISBN 9780 85738 1118, RRP \$13.95

Many will have seen the recent movie of the same name as this book, featuring Australia's own Geoffrey Rush plus Colin Firth and others, directed by Tom Hooper. It was I think an excellent film and made riveting viewing. It is really enjoyable to now read the book setting out in more detail this story, with pictures from the film still in the back of the mind. The book is in one sense the biography of Lionel Logue, the Australian speech therapist on whose head fell the daunting but unexpected task of treating the Duke of York, later King George VI, for his serious speech impediment. The story was made possible by access to Logue's diaries. In telling the story, we gain an interesting insight into the British royal family in the 20th century, and in particular the role played by some of them upon the abdication of King Edward VIII, and the unexpected and forced imposition of kingship upon a shy, speech affected and unprepared younger brother at a time of global crisis. We see the considerable determination and dedication of this new King in facing his own personal difficulties, and can see how this must have influenced his eldest daughter the present Queen.


The book describes how Logue was born in 1880 in Adelaide, of Irish ancestry. He had a fairly normal upbringing, leaving school at the age of 16 years. At the time the study of elocution was given some importance, and Logue showed some propensity for it. He studied under a local teacher and was soon giving public recitals as a form

of entertainment. He moved west and set up his own elocution school. Soon married, the pair decided to travel around the world, Logue gathering experiences relevant to his chosen craft as he went. Back in Australia, Logue continued his work in elocution as well as in drama. With the advent of World War I, he put his talents to helping returned servicemen with speech impediments. In 1924 Logue and family decided to return to England, and notwithstanding that he had no formal qualifications in medicine or psychology, he set up practice in Harley Street. He placed the emphasis on the physical aspects of speech impediments and held himself out as being able to treat them. It was of course quite unforeseen that this would lead him in the future to treating the future King of the country and Empire.

The book gives some interesting insights from the perspective of the Duke of York, second son of the former King, who came to end up unexpectedly on the throne. The Duke was known within the circles of royalty to have a speech impediment that was quite embarrassing, but this was not viewed with great

> concern whilst his older brother was expected to take the throne. But the defect weighed upon the Duke, who still had duties to perform. The book offers two versions of how the Duke came to consult Logue, a colonial with a somewhat unusual, confident and assertive approach. For example, as the movie accurately depicted, Logue insisted that the Duke come to consult Logue in his rooms rather than Logue attending on the Duke. Given the class distinctions of the time and the elevated status of royalty, one can imagine the difficulties that this gave rise to. One can only assume that the Duke was rather desperate to find a cure. This makes most interesting reading.

The first period of treatment by Logue occurred from 1926, and considerable progress was made over several years. The Duke was clearly pleased. As progress was made, the treatment gradually came to an end, although contact was still maintained. Then the previous King died in 1936, and the brief reign of Edward VIII followed. The Duke, soon to be George VI, asked for assistance again from Logue, primarily with his speeches. The book goes on the recite the history of this period, extending through World War II, and the considerable assistance that Logue gave to the King. It is not easy to gauge the importance of this assistance looking backwards in time, but it is clear that the King's addresses to his people during these critical years were of great importance.



I recommend this book.

arch and the year moves on with nothing much so far from the Wet. To stay on top of things, the keen gardener should maintain vigilance as many weeds are seeding now and, once established and dispersing, pose longer term efforts to eradicate.

In the garden, a leisurely walk with keen eye will discern the best spot for that finicky plant with specific requirements and also reveal, where needed, a plant to be removed or planting added to. As the garden develops, small micro-climes are established and sun/shade ratio changes, opening up opportunity to fill in and expand plant profiles.

Conceptually, plantings may be considered as an ongoing painting in three dimensions and a radically changed plant and colour palette from the illustrations in general gardening magazines written for cooler climes. The broad swathes of colour planned in the herbaceous border are replaced in the tropics by the stronger, bolder colours and forms of foliage plants. These most often lack billowy form and generally are planted in isolation, leading often to a chaotic and eye-challenging melange.

Too often, plant form and foliage type are not considered as key elements in the garden composition. Rather than merely concentrating on colour, the more durable elements of plant form/foliage type and texture should be a priority.

Plant of the Month: Monodora myristica, the African or false nutmeg is a large tropical tree (to 10m) with striking fragrant, waxy, red spotted vellow orchid-like flowers. These have four 10 cm long petals and hang from long peduncles. This is another floral and perfumed gem from the large Annonnaceae family, with its near 2,300 species across 130+ genera. Included in this family are the pawpaw, custard apple and soursop.

Monodora myristica's abundant flowering attracts bees, butterflies and birds. The leaves are drooping and large (to 50 cm) purple when emerging and then changing to deep green when developed. The bark of the established trunk is deeply fissured, adding to its appeal.

Frost intolerant, average garden soil and moderate watering especially in early stages until established. Expect to pay up to \$50.00+ for an established plant but certainly worth a place in the large garden.

Dear Susan, One thousand apologies and I humbly eat worms! I omitted to acknowledge the excellent photograph of Phaius tancarvilliae taken by Susan Piedmont, MO at the Missouri Botanical Garden's Orchid show in St. Louis. Susan, thank you for permission to reprint – by the way, if any reader has seed or seed source of same, please advise as Susan cannot obtain in USA.

Dear Pauline, The flower you asked me to identify is Ecbolium viride- the Turquoise Crossandra. While arresting in its flower colour, this small shrub has a tendency to become weedy and also to spread itself too freely around the garden – like most Crossandra - by seed dispersal.

Dear Jacob, Your new acquisition of an Episcia introduces you to the wide world of gesneriads – possibly the best known of which is the African Violet (Saintpaulia). Episcias commonly known as the "Flame Violet", Teddybears" or ""Hot Water Bottle Plant" are generally accommodating plants easily grown to a good specimen in pot, basket or in a sheltered garden spot. The secret to success is a light fluffy mix, holding moisture but fast draining. A good African Violet mix is suitable. Propagated from

stolens, Episcias will go backwards with temperature drops below 15C, however recovering when weather warms. There is a large selection of leaf patternings with some tricolour forms, (pink, white, green/brown) and flower colourings in reds/pinks/ lavenders and yellow.





SEWER FOGGING PROGRAM Atherton and Kuranda

Council advises property owners in Atherton and Kuranda that a sewer fogging program will commence 25 March 2013. The sewers will be fogged using Pyro fog to reduce insect vermin.

The sewer fogging program is being carried out in accordance with the Water Act 2000 and the Local Government Act. It will be carried out by Council's authorised persons.

The Sewer Fogging team may require access to individual properties. Each household will be notified in writing prior to Council accessing their property. The sewer fogging will start from Kullaroo Close and progress across the Kuranda sewered area. Once the Kuranda sewered area is complete the Fogging team will relocate to Atherton.

LOW or NO Cooking Ideas During Electricity Blackouts

T'S March now, and the rain which usually occurs November to April each year hasn't really arrived. Why? Well it depends on a La Nina (wet) and El Nino (dry) weather pattern. At the moment it is a neutral pattern, so we may not have the deluge, but electricity blackouts will occur when it does rain. http://www.bom.gov.au/info/ leaflets/nino-nina.pdf

In 2012, no cyclones crossed the coast; all the rain moved south creating headlines such as "extraordinary deluge, once-in-a-century event". Christmas 2011 to January 2012 Australia had the worst floods in 160 years, a La Nina pattern.

Now it's 2013, and those people who just rebuilt their flooded homes didn't know it would all be repeated again. Elsewhere Aussies battled heat waves and catastrophic bushfires.

Examples of 2013 news headlines 'Heat wave hits Australia', 'Thousands flee firestorms in Tasmania', 'Worst ever fire danger', 'Catastrophic fire alert', 'Australia swelters through hottest EVER recorded'! Records melt away in historic heatwave Mini tornadoes. Cyclone Oswald began in the Gulf causing destruction on the east coast all the way to NSW. Disruptions to Telstra network - parts of Queensland, including Triple Zero (000) calls, Bureau of Meteorology victim of Telstra network outage. Schools closed for the start of the new school year. Blackouts could last days says Energex. Food supply risk from floods. Queensland damage bill to top 2011 floods.

Yes, it's absolutely vital we have enough food supplies, especially if you have a young family.

When you have no electricity, food is thawing out in your freezer, roads are closed, automatic teller machines are empty, mobile phone lines are congested, petrol is running out and you are caught un-prepared, the last thing you want to think about is cooking.

LOW OR NO COOKING

Tapas style: Appetizers, Nacho, Taco or Tortillas, Pita sandwiches, not sandwiches, lettuce wraps a good substitute for bread.

Set out plates of cooked chicken, turkey or beef meatballs, hardboiled eggs, chorizo sausage, ham, cured meats, antipasto platters, cheese, olives, marinated chickpeas, any salad vegetables, marinated artichokes, olives, roasted capsicums, dried tomatoes, pickled vegetables. Try smoked salmon, anchovies and sardines too. Leftover quiche. Salsa, dips, spreads, like guacamole and hummus. Grab a loaf of crusty bread if you have one, or just use mountain bread. Add tomato sauce for the kids to use as a dip.

Ceviche cooking: If you are pregnant, do not eat raw fish or seafood. Acid cooks the fish, not an oven. Raw fish or seafood is marinated in citrus juice, and its acids cook the meat proteins without heat. Chop a fillet of firmfleshed fish, prawns or scallops and let it marinate in the refrigerator in a mixture of citrus juice and seasonings.

After an hour or two, the fish will be opaque and ready to eat. Serve over salad greens, wrapped in tortillas or with chips for scooping. Add a few slices of avocado and some salsa are delicious accompaniments.

Cold soups: Add milk and seasonings to any condensed tin of soup, then serve

No cook Asian Noodle salad: Crush a bag of uncooked ramen or rice noodles into small pieces. Discard the seasoning packet. Mix noodles with 1/2 cup bottled sesame ginger salad dressing. Let stand at room temperature until the liquid is absorbed, about 1 hour. Stir in vegetables, shredded carrots, sliced snow peas, wombok or spinach & sliced water chestnuts. Serve cold or at room temperature. The noodles taste terrific, despite not being cooked!

No cook Couscous or Pre-cooked Pasta salads: needs only hot water and a short soaking in water to prepare them. Boiling the water isn't required; Soak until absorbed/or drain, add any salad vege, meats, cheeses, seasonings or dressing you have on hand, and serve family-style.

No-Cook Ricotta Sauce for Pasta: Ricotta cheese, minced garlic cloves, oil, chopped capsicums, fresh basil, Romano cheese, Parmesan cheese S&P. Combine ingredients, mix into HOT cooked pasta.

We are already half way through our First Term of Swimming lessons and charging toward Easter. Students can start lessons anytime in our season and even casual, weekend or private sessions can be arranged.

Most learners book in for blocks of seven or more lessons and consistency is the key. Being a public learn to swim pool allows our clients to stay and play anytime in between formal lessons and reinforce skills and movements practiced during class half hour lessons.

The Amalgamation/De-amalgamation Debate

With all the various claims and counter-claims being bandied around regarding the decision whether or not to de-amalgamate the Tablelands Regional Council, it is perhaps timely to look at the history of local government in our area. Unfortunately, rhetoric and emotion often plays too great a part in such debates, and the reality of the situation is lost.

Throughout Australia the electoral boundaries of districts, Federal, State and Local, have regularly been altered. Changes in Federal electoral boundaries have always been set by a Commission, and have been accepted as honestly reflecting the changing demographic of electorates. State boundaries were historically more under the control of the government of the day, and until relatively recently were often changed to advantage the incumbent government. This was called gerrymandering.

In Queensland, successive governments of all persuasions gerrymandered the electorates to disadvantage opponents. This changed only after the Fitzgerald Inquiry recommended the establishment of a boundaries commission to take the regulation of boundaries out of the hands of politicians. In Queensland local authority boundaries have also changed many times since they were first established.

These changes were usually made to accommodate changes in population density or to provide better services through pooling of resources.

Resistance to change seems to be embedded into the DNA of some people, but the reality is that change in local government boundaries is the norm. The history of local government in our area is a history of quite frequent change. Early local authorities originated as Divisional Boards.

These Boards usually covered large areas, and were established mainly to provide roads and other basic infrastructure. They were funded by rates on property, augmented in the initial stage by endowments from the Colonial Government. As the Divisional Boards became established the government endowments reduced, and were eventually withdrawn.

The previous Mareeba Shire saw great changes between when the area was first settled by Europeans and the present time. Some of what we knew of as the Mareeba Shire was actually part of the Barron Divisional Board when it was created in 1890. The Barron Divisional Board area included Redlynch, Kuranda and Tinaroo.

Ironically, in 1893 the Barron Divisional Board was discussing a proposal for part of its land to be excised and incorporated into the Tinaroo Divisional Board's area. The Chairman, Mr. Tills, had no opinion on the change, and said he would defer to the members "from over the range," presumably because they had better knowledge

of the area under discussion. Mr. Walton objected to the change as it would cut out "some good country at Emerald Creek." He said "it necessitated the Board keeping in repair the roads through the Barron country from Mareeba, which produced no rates; the country proposed to be cut off would return rates." Obviously at the time the Mareeba area was a burden on the Barron Divisional Board.

The Woothakata Divisional Board was based at Thornborough, on the Hodgkinson goldfield, and at one point came close to Mareeba. Woothakata was established in 1879, and its boundaries extended on the east almost to Port Douglas, on the west to the Gulf of Carpentaria, and its north and south boundaries were several hundred miles apart. In 1880 the Chairman of the Board said the annual value of the rateable properties in the Division would yield only £350.

Even with the Government endowment this would not fund road construction and the necessary repairs. Mining claims could not be taxed, and he suggested a tax on all gold produced. This did not happen, and the Woothakata Divisional Board remained poorly funded, especially when the population drifted away when the gold ran out. All the Divisional Boards became Shires in 1902 with the introduction of the Local Authorities Act 1902.

In 1919 the Barron Shire Council was abolished and its area was distributed between Woothakata and Cairns Shires (later Cairns City). Mareeba and the surrounding area was transferred to the Woothakata Shire Council. By this time the population of Thornborough had declined to 58, so the decision was made to make Mareeba the administration centre for the Shire.

When Premier Theodore visited Mareeba in December 1919 a delegation of Councillors asked for funding to build a Council office at Mareeba. Theodore agreed, providing the Council provided half the funds. The Woothakata Shire office at Thornborough was taken down and re-erected in Mareeba.

The area saw more changes in 1932 when the shires of Walsh and Chillagoe were merged into the Woothakata Shire. The Council was renamed Mareeba Shire Council in 1947. Some parts of Mareeba Shire, including Redlynch, were excised and incorporated into the City of Cairns in 1996.

The amalgamation of the Tableland Shires in 2008 was a continuation of the evolution of local government in Queensland. It is interesting to note that while there is constant pressure to remove the duplication between State and Federal Governments, some people want to return to smaller local authorities where duplication is even more prevalent.

A Cantata – A Musical Experience with a Difference

A musical experience with a difference awaits you in the form of the Cantata, "The Fingerprint of God".

A 70 voice choir from Mareeba and surrounding areas, including Kuranda, will present this work, accompanied by a small instrumental ensemble, in Emmanuel Uniting Church, Brown Street, at 8.00pm on Friday 22nd March. Soloists and a narrator complete the performers.

It will also be presented in Atherton Uniting Church at 4.00pm on Sunday, 24th March and in Mareeba on the same day at 7.45pm in St Thomas's Catholic Church.

Here is home grown material, if you like, as local resident, Ruth Beasley, has written the music following the words being written and compiled by her sister, Audrey Francis. Ruth will conduct the choir.

Soloists include Andreas Jodner, one time Kuranda resident and Alan McLean currently on the staff of the Steiner School. Sue Jodner will play her cello as part of the instrumental ensemble. Admission is free but there will be an opportunity for a donation to help cover expenses.

The whole project is supported by the RADF through the Tablelands Regional Council and the Queensland Arts Council.

Tableland Council Draft Planning Scheme - how well does it protect our environment?

We are, after all, just here for a moment in time. We are more like guardians of the land we have paid "key"money for and it will persist for future generations, where we as individuals will not. The draft planning scheme is now out for public submission and the TRC has done a balanced job of including protection for our most significant environmental assets, such as creeks and streams and significant threatened habitats. If you would like to make a submission, we can assist you with the format and also provide some points which you

may like to consider for inclusion in your own submission.

Consider this: If the YES vote on March 9 to de-amalgamate is successful, the new Mareeba shire will have to go through this same Planning scheme exercise itself.

One of the last acts of the previous Mareeba Shire Council was to pass the Myola development plan, which the majority of Myola residents did NOT want. A Thought for March

The Wind

This month we read from St John's Gospel Chapter 3 Verses 1 to 17 and then concentrate on Verse 8. (Jesus said,) The wind blows where it wills; you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from, or where it is going. John 3:8

Nicodemus came to see Jesus by night. People in high places have to be careful. Criticism by our peers can be devastating, and the last thing is to give people the impression that you are letting down the system. When you are highly placed in public life and have everything to lose by making a careless move, you watch yourself very carefully if you wish to survive. But what if you are haunted by something which won't rest until you track it down? Half of you wants to do this and the other half is afraid of real danger. What if this is the situation? For all these reasons Jesus' visitor came by night.

His name was Nicodemus. His assured role and position was at the very top in the national cabinet called the Sanhedrin. Nicodemus was the custodian of a great tradition. He was supposed to be, and expected to be, a national expert on God!

But he had met a stranger - we don't know how - casually passing a group in the temple area, or visiting

a house to hear a Rabbi from the north: it could have been thus or otherwise. But Nicodemus had been at first interested in a patronizing way, then intrigued, and finally to his surprise and alarm magnetically drawn. They may have met at the house in Bethany. That's where Jesus often stayed at night when he was down south. That too would be safely away from Jerusalem, from its sentries, and from the community in which Nicodemus usually moved.

For Christians the conversation between Jesus and Nicodemus is one of the great shining jewels of the New Testament. Nicodemus begins by trying to reassure this rural teacher, who might be overawed by



such a visitor. Jesus has certain powers; he must then be genuine. It's quite logical. But with devastating directness Jesus dismisses the cool deductions of Nicodemus and speaks of the need to experience the presence of God and offer oneself to him. Nicodemus counters with levity. The Rabbi must be joking, with this image of being born again! Surely they are chatting as intelligent men, are they not?

Again Jesus moves in without mercy. Nicodemus has a great deal of information, an endless supply of learning; for him there is a magnificent system of religion in which God is categorized and analyzed. Jesus does not so much say that this is evil or even undesirable; he says rather that it is not enough. There is another level of knowing God. The image which Jesus uses is a tantalizing one. He speaks of a wind, an unpredictable wind which you cannot order at your wish nor predict when it blows. Something deep down in Nicodemus is drawn to what Jesus is saying. Layers of being, beyond thought and analysis and speculation, live within him like ancient instruments not played for many years. And here is a voice plucking at those half forgotten strings of his being, making for him a far-off music that is wild fierce and joyous.

We never see how they part that night. All we do know is that months afterward, when his peers on the Sanhedrin are preparing to move against Jesus, Nicodemus manages to postpone the inevitable clash, not without risk to his position. Still later Nicodemus assists Joseph of Arimathaea with the body of the man who had argued him above reason. Nicodemus was haunted by the distant sound of the wind which Jesus had spoken of. He had begun to suspect that there is more to the relationship between God and his creatures than merely a law, a system, an organization, a formal belonging, a distant acquaintance. Nicodemus had begun to suspect that God is a lover who wishes to possess and be possessed, to be known not merely as information but to be experienced as friend, as Lord, as Saviour.





Jax Bergersen features in two lots of congratulatory messages this month, firstly in conjunction with Margaret Genever and everyone at Kuranda Conservation Community Nursery Inc.

KCCN were awarded \$2,065.00 through the Gambling Community Benefit Fund (GCBF).

The GCBF receives money from taxes on Golden Casket lotteries, wagering, keno and gaming machines. It distributes these funds to not-for-profit community groups on a quarterly basis (the next round closes on 31 May). One-off grants of up to \$35,000 inclusive of GST (and more for applications that have substantial community benefit) are allocated to approved not-for-profit organisations to help them provide community services or activities that benefit the Queensland community.

Jax also received, very deservedly, a Senior Community Award in the Australia Day Awards! Congratulations, Jax.

Great news for Kuranda with a working group set up to improve cruise industry facilities for Yorkeys Knob. The working group will include representatives from the Yorkeys Knob Boating Club, the Cairns Regional Council, cruise industry, bus operators, boat ramp users, Tourism Tropical North Queensland, Transport and Main Roads, and Ports North.

Yorkeys Knob Boat Club has proposed to develop a serviced 60-metrelong cruise ship tendering dock and redevelopment, and beautification of the foreshore area. This will make a huge difference to tourist traffic to Kuranda, as tourists won't spend half their mainland time sitting on the dock in hot sun or rain, awaiting their turn to be ferried back to the cruise ship.

TRC clears first hurdle in push to upgrade Mareeba aerodrome

MAREEBA aerodrome has taken a major step forward with a Federal grant scheme accepting a Tablelands Regional Council funding application for detailed consideration.

"The fund, the Rural Development Australia Fund, called for expressions of interest last year and TRC put forward the long-awaited upgrade of Mareeba aerodrome," Tablelands Mayor Rosa Lee Long said.

"The opportunity was jumped on because the State LNP Government under Campbell Newman tore almost \$12 million in funding away from the airport almost as soon as it came in to power.

"Council received formal notification yesterday (Wednesday 13 February) that our application has passed the EOI phase and we have been invited to make a detailed funding application for this project.

"An essential part of this funding stream is a capacity and willingness for the applicant, that is the TRC, to put up a portion of the funding. In this case we have already agreed that if successful, TRC will fund \$5 million toward the total \$19 million project.

"However, should de-amalgamation go ahead this entire project will fall over. To begin with the TRC as the applicant will no longer have the Mareeba airport under its control and secondly, the new MSC will not be able to fund the necessary \$5 million to trigger the Federal funds.

"Unfortunately we are now in a position where the only chance of the Mareeba aerodrome ever going ahead is if the area remains amalgamated."

Councillor Lee Long said significant work had already been carried out on what was needed at Mareeba.

"This was in hand to underpin the \$12 million upgrade that had begun last year and which was stopped by the Newman Government," Cr Lee Long said.

"The potential for Mareeba aerodrome is terrific in terms of new industries and new jobs but it is now at risk thanks to the de-amalgamation campaign."

Detailed submissions are due to be made by 27 April.





De-amalgamation Update: The vote on whether vou want de-amalgamation or not will be held on Saturday March 9th. This is a **compulsory vote** for all residents of the former Mareeba Shire. You will be asked whether or not you wish to remain as the Tablelands Regional Council or de-amalgamate to have a Mareeba Shire Council and if you are prepared to pay

I ask that you consider this matter as very important. I will fully support whatever the majority of residents choose. However, as your elected Councillor, I urge you to consider the facts. I believe that it is important that you hear from the TRC and what the TRC information is. There is a lot of detailed information on the TRC website, including the Statements from the Minister for Local Government, the Boundaries Commissioner's Report and the Old Treasury Corporation Report. All have highlighted the significant costs of a deamalgamation.

Election Information: The vote on March 9th will be conducted by the Electoral Commission of Qld (ECQ). You will be able to cast your vote in person at a Polling Booth in either Speewah (Rural Fire Shed) or Kuranda (CWA Hall) on voting day.

Early Voting at the Kuranda CWA Hall commenced on Monday 25th February and continues until Friday 8th March. If you are still not on the Electoral Roll, you can do so until March 8th by contacting the Returning Officer at the Pre- Polling Booth in either Kuranda (CWA) or Mareeba. More details at the ECQ website www.ecq.qld.gov.au or phone the ECQ at 1300 129 107 Council Information Stall Monday 4th **February:** (Outside the Kuranda Post Office) Thanks to all residents (approx. 500) who called in to the stall which was a great success. There were lots of enquiries and information provided on a whole range of Council Services (Town planning, Animal Management, Aged Housing, Disaster Management, Road Maintenance, Parks and Gardens, Environmental Management, Arts and RADF, Cemeteries, Customer Service, Building Applications, Waste and Water, Land and Facilities, Sport and Rec, De-amalgamation Information, FIKS Grants for Community groups, etc etc etc)

The Draft Planning Scheme was a major topic.

Draft Planning Scheme: The Draft Planning Scheme is out for public comment. Every property owner should have received a letter indicating what this could mean for your property. The Scheme is "Draft" and it is very important that you respond with comment if you have questions or concerns.

I am aware of concerns over the Overlays, particularly for Flood Mapping, Biodiversity and Landslide. These are State Govt imposed Overlays and Council is currently pressing the State Government to amend these.

It is very important that you provide your individual feedback to Council so that Council can better "argue the case" with State Government. You may also like to contact your local State MP.

Kuranda Pool: Last week Council approved upgrade works to the Kuranda Pool. The treatment system and heating systems will be improved. Funding will be from TRC General Fund and will not impact on local residents.

Fallon Road: The Fallon Road Bridgeworks are taking longer than expected and I apologise to all the residents who have had to use the alternative route since November. However, I am advised that the bridge should be open by just after Easter. It has taken time, however the Bridge is a substantial one and obviously we all want the new bridge to be a safe and well constructed bridge. A request has been received to name the Bridge in memory of Michelle Murray who sadly perished at the site.

Australia Day Awards: Congratulations to Jax Bergersen who was awarded the TRC Community Service Award for the region. Jax was a standout winner and it is certainly very well deserved recognition of all that she does within this community.

Kuranda Community Precinct: The new KCP Advisory Committee has been established after a number of nominations were received by Council. Independent Chairperson is John Baskerville and community reps are John Robinson, Mandy Dewey, Arch MacArthur, Nicki Gibson. The Committee convenes this month to begin the next stage of developing the site as a Community Precinct for the Kuranda District.

The long-term plan is to create a community space

for all the community to access and enjoy. The broad Master Plan is to relocate the Library to the Precinct and to sell the old Pre-School site to fund the development of the community space. 
