

In response to Jenny Jensen's letter to *The Kuranda Paper* June 2012.

I find it very disturbing that one of our councillors is reverting to scare tactics on the issue of deamalgamation. Is her comment that "the cost of de-amalgamation would be enormous" designed to scare ratepayers or based on fact? What is enormous? If you want people to make an informed decision please pass on your wisdom of the actual cost; one thing that is guaranteed is that it will be a fraction of what was wasted on the process of amalgamation.

Since amalgamation my rates have risen 78.59% (and I have the rate notices as proof!). At a meeting with the former Mayor and a councillor prior to the recent Council election I questioned this obscene rise. The response that I received from the former Mayor was that the methodology used was not as he believed it would be. I would have thought that determining Council rates would rank very high on the scale of council decisions. It is a pity that the TRC did not apply the "professionalism, pain and hard work" when determining the methodology used to calculate Council rates!

I also support the call for Kuranda residents to have their say on de-amalgamation but before they do, I urge them to check what percentage increase they have had on their rates in the last four years. Then calculate approximately what an additional 120 plus staff since amalgamation is costing them, check if their roads and services etc were in a better condition prior to amalgamation. We were all told that amalgamation would reduce costs and increase efficiency – all we have seen is cost increases coupled with diminishing services.

From Councillor Jensen's comment on the former MSC boundaries I can only conclude she would like to see Kuranda become part of Cairns Regional Council; would she please inform ratepayers if she has held preliminary talks with them and how that idea has been received.

I have read with great interest the letter submitted to your paper by Councillor Jenny Jenson on the subject of de-amalgamation.

Unfortunately I believe that the views expressed therein are inflammatory and inaccurate to say the least. On what basis is Councillor Jenson founding her assumption that "...The costs would be enormous and Kuranda ratepayers would bear a significant burden..."? The TRC has bandied about the figure of \$12M as the cost to date of the amalgamation process, however this has never been substantiated, nor was this figure accepted by the State Government. In a similar fashion the conjecture that de-amalgamation is going to be extremely costly has been used by the powers-that-be to sway the residents of the various amalgamated councils against demanding a referendum.

One would have hoped that a person in Councillor Jensen's position would not stoop to making alarmist statements without concrete figures to back them up.

I would like to make one final (but extremely moot) point: I would imagine that Councillor Jensen's salary would be cut substantially should she be representing a smaller Mareeba council?

Don't Feed Butcherbirds

Ten years ago when I moved to Barang Street there were sunbirds, finches and wrens etc. Since a neighbour started feeding butcherbirds, the small birds have vanished. Every year sunbirds have nested on my veranda. The butcherbirds are smart – they wait until the babies hatch then attack, killing fledglings and usually the mother bird who tries to defend her babies. Last year was the worst. They struck at dawn. By the time I got to the remains of the nest a black parent butcherbird and brown juvenile had killed the mother sunbird and two babies. You wouldn't believe how much blood these tiny birds had shed – it was smeared everywhere.

The idea that if you feed butcherbirds they won't kill so many little birds is absolute rubbish. Through being fed in my area their numbers have built up so much that is all you hear in the dawn chorus. I am told that in the wild there should be approximately one pair of butcherbirds to ten acres. Yesterday there were five in my garden. The final straw was when they found my veranda frog who had lived in a pot plant for ages. I heard an awful squawking and the frog was being bashed to death on my veranda rail.

Please consider how you are upsetting the balance of nature by encouraging these terrorists of the bird world to hang around dwellings when they should be out in the forest catching rats and snakes etc.

I'm pleased to see there is even more to do from this month with the launch of an interpretive walk with the Djabugay Aboriginal guides at Skyrail Rainforest Cableway's Barron Falls Station and the opening of LeadBEATS, one of the newest stalls to open at the Kuranda Original Rainforest Markets.

These two new additions further broaden the range of experiences available in Kuranda and highlight what regular visitors know – you need more than a day to make the most of them. To help plan your next visit we have included time allocations for various activities in Kuranda's Official Map & Visitors Guide. Get a copy from your local tour desk and start planning your next trip to Kuranda. The guide includes restaurants, galleries, attractions, shopping and, of course, accommodation options so you can stay a little longer.

With a maximum of 10 people per group, the walk provides visitors with the opportunity to be part of a personal tour.

Djabugay Elder and Director of the Djabugay Tour Guiding Aboriginal Corporation Gerald Hobbler said Djabugay guides would share their knowledge on the walks. "We are extremely proud of our heritage and look forward to sharing our traditions and culture with visitors from far and wide," he said. "My grandson Aarron is one of the guides. I am very proud of him and everyone involved with the launch of the walking tours for continuing to ensure the survival of our culture and history for generations to come."

STARTING A NEW BEAT: With a mix of musical instruments and leadlight gifts, the name LeadBEATS was a given for one of the newest stalls at the Kuranda Original Rainforest Markets. Musicians Pam Moray and Mario Baroni were surprised to discover there were no music shops on the Atherton Tableland where so many musicians live, so they decided to step in and fill the gap in the market.

"As musicians, we want to be able to service the Tableland community with instruments and accessories of all kinds, as well as offer a repair service and lessons. We also make original live recordings of our music at the shop which is proving a definite winner with the tourists as a souvenir of their Kuranda trip," she said.



Gardening Kuranda



JULY and with the cold biting, the garden probably looks a bit ratty. If, like me, you are a procrastinator, now is the perfect time to cast a judicious eye over your plantings and make some hard decisions - that plant that has failed to thrive despite all efforts; the garden bed planting that has never sat well, or that tree that needs severe trimming or to be taken out. Remember that with the return to warmer weather and being caught up in the promise of the joys of summer, if not done now, those put-off decisions will probably irk you for another year.

Now is also the time to take on the weeds which, despite everything else slowing down, continue to grow and seed. The old gardening saw of "one year's seeding means seven years' weeding" holds true with any bare earth an invitation to weed invasion, so deeply mulch those bare spots. Vinegar is a good weedicide and although table vinegar contains only about 5% acetic acid, a spoonful of salt added to a litre of vinegar and a couple of applications usually take out most weeds. Choose a forecast dry sunny spell, remembering that vinegar is not selective so apply carefully to avoid damage to nearby planting or lawn. Cheap and effective with stronger vinegar concentrate usually available from farm supplies. Works a treat on weeds in paths

The next couple of months are also the time to clean out ornamental ponds removing detritus and thinning out exuberant growth, remembering to dispose of carefully as many water plants are highly invasive if carried to waterways. Time also to place orders for lotus and waterlillies.

Plant of the Month: Alocasia, A genus of broad-leaved rhizomatous or tuberous perennials from the family Araceae. There are over 70 species of Alocasia occurring throughout tropical and subtropical Asia to Eastern Australia with some widely cultivated in Oceania and South America as a food source.

As a keen collector of Alocasias and possibly biased, I think these plants although beloved by marauding Scrub Turkeys – give more bang for bucks than any other plant family. With emphasis on foliage, plants range from the towering (5-6mts) Alocasia macrorrhiza 'Borneo Giant" to the petite and somewhat more dainty A. cuprea (possibly one of the most beautiful with its emerging new leaf in copper tones), A. infernalis and the numerous dwarf variations on A. amazonica such as "Bambino" - all these under a metre.

Becoming more readily available are some of the pewter/blue leafed Alocasias endemic to the Philippines which may be seen at site: http://www.pinoyplants. com/aroids.php#alocasia. These can be somewhat touchy as often growing on

limestone underlay slopes that requiring well drained but moisture retentive soil.

Probably best grown in soil, some of the smaller, more touchy and rare species may do better in pots. All appreciate rich living to improve growth and size of leaves and while generally most relish good water supply particularly during the warmer months, some of the more delicate require careful watching as often prone to rot. Most benefit from morning sun although some of the larger types will take full sun although growth will be tighter and leaves smaller.

Q @A Dear Mary, You were asking about organic mixes to ward off various beasties. Well here are a few:

- All-round Insecticide: Chop four large onions, two cloves of garlic, and four hot chillies. Mix them together and cover with warm, soapy water and leave it to stand overnight. Strain off that liquid and add it
- to five litres of water. • Grasshopper, Caterpillar and Possum Deterrent: Mix a cup of molasses into one litre of water and spray it over new foliage.
- Aphids, Caterpillars and Other Insects: Add two tablespoons of soap flakes to one litre of warm water and stir thoroughly until completely dissolved. When cool spray as is.

News from the Council



Fluoride on the way – like it or not

Tablelands Mayor Rosa Lee Long has advised that fluoride will be added into the Malanda and Kuranda water supplies on 11 July 2012.

Cr Lee Long said Tablelands Regional Council was being forced to adhere to the Water Fluoridation Act 2008 and had no choice but to implement the decision of the former State Government to add fluoride to

water supplies servicing towns with a population of more than 1,000.

"This is not a matter of choice for Council and it is certainly not democracy when people are being forced to have fluoride put into their water supplies," said Cr Lee Long

"The people were never asked their views on this and obviously there are many people who have a lot of concern about fluoride, but Council has its hands tied in this matter."

Cr Lee Long said anyone with concerns should write or email their local State Member of Parliament.

"When this Bill came to Parliament in 2007, all the major Parties supported it, whereas myself and the other Independents did not vote for it," she said.

"I would have preferred to allow people to have the choice and to pick up free fluoride tablets from their local council as was the practice in the past, but this was not to be and now Council has to enforce this legislation."

Fluoride will be added into the water supplies of Malanda and Kuranda from 11 July 2012. Atherton and Mareeba water supplies will follow at a later date to be advised.

Kuranda Arts Co-operative

"Areas of Beauty" is a Regional Partnership between artist Jill Chism, Master of Creative Arts, 10 members of the Kuranda Arts Co-operative, and two prestigious art galleries in the regions. Jill will deliver high level training to the 10 artists, focused on a site close to the giant penda trees in Kuranda National Park.

Catherine Jacoby, Kuranda

This project aims to develop further local connections between the Disability and Arts sectors. It will introduce art forms of Assemblage and Sculpture to participants. The project will employ three local artists, and lead to an exhibition at the Old Post Office Gallery, Atherton in 2013.

Mayor Welcomes NBN announcement

Tablelands Mayor Rosa Lee Long has welcomed an announcement that the National Broadband Network (NBN) will be rolled out to areas of the Tablelands by 2015.

The company building Australia's national broadband network, NBN Co, this week announced that it would be working with Tablelands Regional Council to identify appropriate locations for fixed wireless network infrastructure that will deliver high-speed fixed wireless broadband.

Initially the Tablelands region was to be one of the last regions to be connected to the NBN which would have seen businesses and households not having access until 2020.

However, after campaigning by Tablelands Regional Council and Far North Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils (FNQROC), many areas of the region will be networked by the end of 2015.

"I am thrilled that the lobbying that has been done by Council and FNQROC has been successful in getting all of the smaller rural and remote communities across the Tablelands region connected to high speed broadband through fixed wireless or satellite services by the end of 2015," Mayor Lee Long said.

"I am advised that construction of fibre optic cabling will also commence by 2015 to connect Mareeba and Kuranda to the NBN". However, there are many areas that will not have access to the NBN until sometime between 2016 and 2020 and this means they will not be able to capitalise on business and economic development opportunities as well as improved access to health, education and other tele-services until then. Cr Lee Long said further lobbying by Council, businesses and community was required to bring forward the rollout of the fibre optic cabling in Atherton, Herberton, Malanda, Ravenshoe, Tolga and Yungaburra.

No fee for on-site sewerage treatment plants

Property owners with an on-site sewerage treatment plant will not have to pay an annual fee for Council to administer the required service reports.

On Wednesday, Council decided not to charge a proposed annual fee of \$46 to maintain the register and administer the reports, and instead charge property owners who were non-compliant with their service reports a management fee of \$84.

Council was told that a fee of \$84 for the plumbing inspector to perform an indepth desk top analysis of the non-compliant unit would be appropriate and an additional fee of \$167 may be incurred if a site inspection was required.

Under the Plumbing and Drainage Act 2002, Council is required to maintain a register of all on-site sewerage and grey water use facilities and property owners are obligated to have the treatment plant serviced regularly by a service operator.

Council was told that there were approximately 1000 on-site treatment plants around the region, but only about 400 were submitting regular service reports. However, since letters were recently sent to every property owner with a sewerage treatment plant, another 102 had submitted a service report to Council.

Update on Fallon Road bridge

A new two-lane bridge over Jum Rum Creek on Fallon Road, Kuranda, is expected to be completed by the beginning of September.

Council approved the construction of a new bridge across the causeway after a fatal car accident in 2011.

Design of the bridge is in progress and Council is currently gearing up to pour the concrete bridge deck units for an onsite start-up at the beginning of August. Preliminary work, including onsite drilling to investigate the foundation material will be undertaken in the next two weeks.

The bridge is estimated to cost \$400,000 and is being funded from developer contributions as well as Roads To Recovery funding from the Federal Government.

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

Families as First Teachers

In the course of our work, initiatives are brought before us that cannot help but leave us in awe of the concept and/or those who have created them or brought them to fruition.

Families as First Teachers is a fine example of one such project. Inspired by this program, I cannot help but wonder what aspects of FAFT most impress me. Is it the creativity and insight of the person who first recognised a need and took steps to address it, the project itself, or perhaps the seemingly endless ways in which this benefits the community? I suspect it is a combination of all these things, but it takes an exceptional mind to see the potential of, and develop such a scheme.

That exceptional individual is Dr Kathryn Mannion. a teacher at the Kuranda District State College in the Atherton Tablelands, who has worked tirelessly with Rosetta Brim and Roz Owen to develop the project and make it the success it is today.

In 2005, the school established a Parent School Partnership Program with the help of funding from DEST. The program was aptly named "Families as First Teachers', aimed at supporting families in helping their children in developing early literacy and numeracy skills, thus smoothing the path to school entry.

Extended families play an active part in the interactive process, which engages not only parents and children in the community, but everyone involved in the children's language and cognitive development, emotional maturity and ability to socialise effectively.

The program has significantly increased school enrolment, improved absenteeism and behaviour, and increased parental involvement in the activities of the school. It also enhances the cultural awareness of teaching staff, enhancing communication with the children and parents.

Most of the people involved in the program are quiet community dwellers, who live out of the mainstream

and aren't politically active; at great risk of 'falling through the cracks'. Their children are vulnerable, in other words lack the advantage of formal early learning that most Australians enjoy, and thus their entry to school is not only traumatic but their settling in period greatly protracted.

A teacher who commenced at Kuranda District State College in 1975, commented that when she worked with prep age children prior to FAFT establishing, it took 12 months for children to settle in. Now the entry is seamless, with FAFT children ready to run as soon as their feet touch the ground.

FAFT has grown exponentially, with 80 to 120 participants attending over the two day period each week. In 2008, in his electoral platform, the Northern Territory Chief Minister pledged \$11m support over four years for the establishment of FAFT in the Territory. FAFT NT is now being rolled out through 20 growth towns and regional areas.

Sadly, here in North Queensland, while interest and involvement in FAFT is growing by the day, expanding to other schools, further development and indeed the survival of this immensely insightful initiative, is hindered by lack of funds. DEWAR funding, while generous, ceased last year, and FAFT in Kuranda now utilises 'Closing the Gap' funding to the school, which is not expected to last until the end of the year.

FAFT has been rewarded and recognised by national and State awards including Dare to Lead, Quality Schooling for Excellence in Family/School Partnerships and Queensland State Showcase Award for Excellence in Early Phase Learning.

The first years of a child's life are recognised as crucial. Dr Mannion tells me it is widely recognised now that children of nine months old who have been denied mental stimulation and whose parents are unresponsive, are already at risk.

Our Indigenous communities deserve equality in

educational opportunity. In the USA, the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 resulted from concern over the state of education. I believe this catch phrase is most appropriate in recognising and supporting this enterprising advance in 'Closing the Gap'.

Congratulations to Kathryn and her team at Kuranda District State College. I fully support your

Marshmallow & 1-histadine: soothe and reduce allergic reaction.

This can all be found in the one product and not

only gives symptomatic relief but also helps boost the immune system to prevent further reactions. Anti-histamines often suppress the symptoms on a short term basis. With two simple steps you can reduce the symptoms and address the root of the issue by boosting the immune system for long term relief. 
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

Yoga and Health

Our Yoga topic today is Pranayama or "deep conscious breathing"

Prana refers to "vital energy" or life force which governs the whole planet. It is a wonderful key to good health, calmness, longevity and spiritual advancement.

Breathing is the least understood and most unappreciated of all human activities. It is the first thing we do when coming into this world and the last thing we do when leaving and in between most of us aren't aware of the breath at all.

We are so concerned with eating and drinking habits, breathing habits usually don't appear on our radar. Deep "conscious "breathing not only expels accumulated carbon dioxide and other impurities in our lungs, it nourishes all organs, tissues and cells and improves circulation.

When breathing is shallow (using only one third of our lung capacity) all these impurities build up in the lungs and then picked up by the bloodstream instead of oxygen. Your body then pulls calcium from your muscles and bones to re-buffer the blood stream so it is important to "blow off" carbon dioxide with exercise



or pranayama techniques.

The following is instructions for a basic three stage yoga breathing practice, maybe outdoors in the fresh air and sunshine.

Standing in a comfortable relaxed position, reach the spine upwards and relax the shoulders. Consciously breathe into your abdomen feeling it rise, then breathe into the ribcage and finally taking the breath all the way to the collarbone, completely filling the lungs, hold the breath for the count of four (to allow the fresh air to mix with the stale in the bottom of our lungs) and then a slow exhalation releasing the tummy first feeling all the tension in your body letting go. (It is important to breath through the nostrils and do not strain.) Bring arms overhead, palms facing outwards on the inhalation looking up and turning arms out to sides, palms facing down, on the exhalation.

Happy Pranayama and remember "oxygen is the most powerful drug on the planet and it is free".

Namaste.

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Our Tragic Past

ONE of the most tragic occurrences in our district occurred in November 1918 when a train engine left the line near the Barron Falls. Two of the crew died from injuries sustained in the accident. This article contains a transcript of the reports of the accident in The Cairns Post of 26 November 1918. It is interesting to note the graphic details contained in news reports in that era. It would be rare to read such explicit descriptions of injuries in today's press.

The Cairns Post, Tuesday, November 26, 1918.

TERRIBLE RAILWAY FATALITY

Engine Leaves Rails at Kuranda. Death of Driver and Fireman. Guard Seriously Injured. A terrible accident, attended with fatal results, occurred on the railway line about a mile from the Kuranda railway station on Monday morning.

The first tidings of the disaster were received by a lengthsman, who set out from Kuranda shortly after a light engine, which came up from Cairns with the early morning train, had commenced the return journey. On the engine were Driver Thomas Patrick Duignan, Fireman Evan William Whiting and Guard James Foley. When the lengthsman had gone about a mile he met the driver Duignan staggering along the sleepers towards Kuranda. He appeared quite stupid, and the lengthsman could not understand what he was saying. He gathered from his wild talk that he had fallen off his engine and did not know where she was. The lengthsman went back and immediately notified the Kuranda Stationmaster, Mr. Wickham, who accompanied him to beyond where he met Duignan. The three men were found sitting on the side of the railway track in a group. Fifty yards further along, just at the head of the Barron Falls, an engine was lying on her side against the bank. Wickham approached the men, and saw at once that they were terribly injured. The fireman and driver spoke to him saying, "We have lost our engine." Wickham said "Come along, I'll take you to the hospital." They said, "Where's our engine; that's all we want." He made them as comfortable as possible in the circumstances with the assistance of Mr. Ernest Hunter and Constable Kinealy, and dispatched them in trollies to Cairns.

Scene of the Accident

The scene of the accident was at the 19 miles 28 chains from Cairns, and approximately one mile and a quarter from Kuranda. At the spot where the engine was lying there was a sharp curve, with a guard rail and a sign, "5 Mile Curve." On the right is the range towering above: on the left there is an embankment, and behind that the Barron River is fifty feet below. The embankment is not very dense, but is mostly of rock. Had it been of earth, the engine would have plunged through it into the gorge. The rails were torn up and the engine was lying on her side, a total wreck, the tender

separated from her. The boilers appeared to have burst, and the fire boxes were badly damaged. An examination of the scene disclosed that the tender would have to be dragged some distance in order to free the debris.

Immediately on receipt of the news at Cairns, the Traffic Manager, Mr. Hooper, ordered out a break-down train, and left for the scene, accompanied by the District Engineer, Mr. Forbes, the locomotive superintendent, Mr. Leitch, and the maintenance inspector, Mr. Peter Allen.

The injured men were transferred to two pump trolleys, and taken down to the foot of the range to Redlynch, where they were met by Mr. Hogan, superintendent of the Cairns Ambulance Brigade and his assistant, Mr. Murphy. A special train had been sent to Redlynch, in rear of the breakdown train, to

convey the injured men to Cairns. They presented a terrible appearance. Mr. Hogan describes their injuries as the most painful he had seen in all his experience. The first to arrive was Duignan, who cam on one trolley. Whiting and Foley were on the second trolley. When Mr. Hogan examined Duignan rolls of flesh peeled off his shoulders and back and down his arms. He was suffering greatly from the burns he had received when the steam escaped from the engine as she went down, and was also very weak from shock. Although burned about the face, he was able to speak. He had a bad wound on the back of his head and over the right eye. He was attended to and placed in the special train to await the arrival of his mates. They arrived about ten minutes later, and also received prompt attention. It was seen that Whiting was in a terrible state, and his hope of recovery was deemed to be very faint. He was unable to lie down, and had to be dressed in a sitting position, in Mr. Hogan's arms. When the steam pipes burst he had apparently put up his hands to protect his face, as they were badly burned, and his eyes could not be seen. His mouth was open, and he cried piteously for water and a doctor. When Mr. Hogan told him the ambulance men were with him he cried "Thank God." Foley, the guard, had a gaping wound in his hip near the buttock. He was in great pain, and said one of his ribs was sticking out.

Deaths of Whiting and Duignan

A telephone message had been sent to the Cairns District Hospital, apprising the Matron of the terrible occurrence. The men were taken there from the special train. Whiting expired ten minutes after admission. He passed away in great agony, exclaiming "My God." Duignan died at about five thirty in the evening.

Evan William Whiting was born on July 21, 1896, and was 22 years of age. His

mother resides at Toowoomba. He joined the Cairns loco. staff on August 4, 1916. He was a member of the Citizen Forces. His brother was killed in action some time ago. Thomas Patrick Duighan was born on February 1, 1891. He was a married man with four children, and resided at Cairns. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. P. Duignan of Kenilworth Farm, West Cairns. James Foley is also a married man with three children, and resides with his mother, Mrs. P. Foley, near Edge Hill. Flags flew at half-mast throughout the afternoon as a mark of respect to the deceased men.

Eye Witness's Accounts

Sergeant-Major Bert Hunter, son of the licensee of the Barron Falls Hotel, who recently returned from the front, was on duty at the Kuranda Refreshment Rooms when the lengthsman brought the news. He accompanied Mr. Wickham to the scene, where they used their shirts to bandage the injured men. Sergeant-Major Hunter states that the men were immediately placed on the pump trolleys and conveyed to where their engine lay. When they reached her none of them could recognize her. They were lifted off the trolleys and taken to the Cairns side of the derailment. The trolleys were then carried past the wreckage and placed on the rails, and the injured men conveyed to Redlynch. They were moved off within fifteen minutes of their being found by the station master's party. When they laid Whiting down he was unable to breathe, and he had to be borne in a sitting position.

Another eye-witness states that the engine was seen traveling past the school down the range at a terrific speed. It would appear that the tender left the rails at the curve, and was dragged some distance before it eventually pulled the engine over. Some idea of the pace of the engine could be gathered from the fact that it cut into the solid rock for a distance of 30 or 40 feet. The accident was the first fatal one that has occurred on the line.

Arrangements for Traffic

The traffic manager spent a very busy day at the scene of the disaster, effecting arrangements for the detrainment of passengers at the point of derailment, and

for their continuing their journey. The afternoon train was less than an hour late arriving at Cairns, which speaks well for the success of Mr. Hooper's plans. The scene of the accident was an object of the greatest interest to passengers to and from the Tableland. By 8 p.m. the tender had been placed on the rails, and it was anticipated by the traffic authorities that the block would be cleared by early morning.

James Foley's Condition

Late on Monday night inquiries at the Cairns District Hospital elicited the information that Foley was comfortable, and was improving.

Military Funeral

Members of the Citizen Forces and Returned Soldiers are requested to parade in uniform at the Drill Shed, Cairns, at 3 p.m. to-day (Tuesday), to attend the funeral of Private E. W. Whiting.

The Cairns Post, Wednesday, Nov. 27, 1918 Funeral of the Victims

The funeral of Driver Duignan and Fireman Whiting on Tuesday afternoon was a deeply impressive sight. The coffin bearing Whiting's remains was placed in St. John's Church of England, and Duignan's body was deposited at St. Monica's Catholic Church. The churches were visited prior to the funeral by large numbers of worshippers.

For an hour prior to the cortege moving off, people lined the course. Children were present in large numbers. Over the whole town was an atmosphere of gloom. The greatest sympathy was felt and appeared on all sides with the relatives of the dead men, particularly so in the case of Duignan, whose death bereaved a young wife and four children. Short impressive services were held at St. John's and St. Monica's. The measured tolling of the church bells added to the solemnity and sadness of the occasion. The coffins, which had been heavily hung with floral tributes, and that of Whiting with the Commonwealth flag, were born simultaneously to the funeral carriages, and the cortege moved off as one column. It was led by the Cairns Citizens' Brass Band, to the impressive strains of the Dead March in "Saul." Next followed a firing squad of the Citizen Forces, who had turned out to assist at the interment of Whiting, they marched with arms reversed, and with that slow tread that always adds to the solemnity of a military funeral. A detachment of returned soldiers marched under Sergeant Mazlin. Chief Petty Officer Allen was present with men of the Australian Naval Reserve. The railway authorities placed every facility in the way of employees wishing to attend, and, as a consequence, there were representative detachments of the Engine Drivers', Firemen and Cleaners' Association, Queensland Railways' Union, Amalgamated Society of Engineers, and Guards' Association. Heads were reverently bared as the cortege formed up into a long cavalcade of vehicles and moved slowly along Abbott St. traveling in the direction of the range, where the unfortunate men had met with such terrible injuries.

Inside My Studio

Sitting at the desk alongside Claire Souter in her studio/gallery is like sitting in quiet contemplation in the middle of a tropical garden. I was surrounded by very realistic paintings of cassias, eucalypts, flowering gingers, and in particular, a study of pink roses in full bloom. Directly above the desk was a large painting of red beach almond leaves in their autumn tones. If a leaf had fallen lightly onto the desk in front of us I would not have been surprised. Talking to Claire, about and amongst her work, was a most enjoyable privilege.

Where is your current studio?

My 'claire souter GALLERY at kuranda' is in the middle of the Settlement Building in Rob Veivers Drive. I was originally next door in the same building and I moved into the larger space when it became available. My ten years in this building is coming up. Perhaps it is a good reason for a celebration.

Do you work alone or with others?

Both. I can work anywhere and have learnt over many years to deal with distractions of all sorts. However, I must say that when I do the preparation and planning of my artworks I prefer to work alone.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

I certainly need good ventilation for the oil paints and solvents. I need plenty of space and light for my teaching sessions as I can have up to ten students at a time.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/ weeks.

My studio/gallery is open 9 am-4pm five days a week.

The mornings are spent helping others with their paintings and in the afternoons I am usually painting alone.

Describe the work you do in your studio.

Using oil paints on canvas and paper I am mainly painting botanical studies, working in a realistic manner. I enjoy being able to fit some family portraits in between my exhibition work. The other half of my studio work is teaching others the techniques of oil painting. These 'others' range from beginners to exhibiting artists and dedicated

Why is painting your chosen medium?

I have tried other mediums but I always came back to painting. It expresses what I want to say and what I see. My botanical work took me to James Cook University a few years ago to advance my knowledge of the science of botany.

List three things you listen to while working.

Unfortunately, we are forced to listen to noisy buses and speeding motorbikes. I much prefer the conversations and queries about painting from the 'others'. There is always some music blending into the background in the gallery, usually classical instrumental, although my tastes are eclectic and usually run to the new and unusual.



dared dream of.

Your favourite tool?

It would be a toss up between my camera (Claire is referring to her smart new iphone which she is most competently scrolling through) and my paintbrush. Step 1 for me is the subject I see and its photograph. Step 2 is my translation of that photograph through Photoshop and in turn, onto the canvas with my paintbrush.

How do you identify your work?

I have always signed my artworks 'Claire Souter' and the date; the year the painting was completed.

How do you sell your work?

Sales are made through my gallery in Kuranda, my website www.clairesoutergallery.com and my blog. I try to have one exhibition each year in an interstate gallery and my paintings can be purchased through that gallery at the time. My last exhibition was in South Australia.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

Both. As my studio is also a gallery, my paintings surround the walls. I find they are a goodteaching aid and reference for the 'others'. The large paintings are also an attraction for the many tourists visiting Kuranda who find their way along on the spacious verandah of the Settlement Building.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

Fortunately, life has made me quite experienced in many unpaid but rewarding jobs and activities within our family,

our home, our garden and close environment. If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? Nothing. I wouldn't change anything. My studio/gallery means more to me than I

If you were not working with visual art what would you be doing?

The part of my life I spend painting is a bonus. It has always reflected my surroundings - nature and my family. I cannot imagine not painting so I am not able to give this question a quick answer. I had other ambitions, many in fact, when I was much younger but I have always come back to painting.

Claire Souter has won many major art awards over the years. Her botanical paintings have been selected in the Waterhouse Natural History Art Prize, the richest prize for natural history art in Australia, at least six times. Over these years Claire has received a 1st prize, 2nd prize and a number of Highly Commended awards at this annual exhibition curated at the S A Museum. Claire has received the People's Choice Award in exhibitions in Townsville and Port Douglas. Sometimes it is harder, but much more rewarding, to be judged so favourably by your peers.

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The Inside Out on Minibeasts

Have you ever found a 'dead' hollow spider, or seen the shell of a cicada on a tree trunk? These fragile lightweight items are exoskeletons - the old outer skeletons of the invertebrate animals they once surrounded. The term invertebrate actually means without a backbone, and over 95% of animal life on Earth belongs to this group.

Life without a backbone is very different than the life we and our vertebrate relatives experience. For starters, we are supported from the inside by our skeleton, which is surrounded by soft tissue such as organs, muscles and skin. Many invertebrates, including insects, crustaceans and arachnids are almost the reverse. Not having an internal skeleton, they are instead supported by their exoskeleton, which is some ways is like a suit of armour with muscles attached to it. Their insides are all soft, with the internal organs suspended within blood filled cavities.

The tricky part of life with an exoskeleton is growing. Imagine if a child was to have a custom suit of armour fitted. It would not last long before it became exceedingly tight and would have to be replaced. Many invertebrates go through a situation very much like this, however they have to grow another 'suit' beneath the old one before they make the change.

The shedding of the exoskeleton is called ecdysis or moulting, and is the process where the exoskeleton splits open and the entire thing is cast off. As this amazing process unfolds, the vulnerable creature wriggles its way free, is very soft, and expands to its new size and shape. This can include the emergence of wings and other structures before it hardens up again to resume life in its new form. The outcome is that the animal emerges from the exoskeleton at a new stage of development - it has grown.

There are many risks involved with moulting; if something goes even slightly wrong the animal can get stuck and die. It is one of the most critical stages in the lives of such invertebrates. Many species moult at night to reduce the risk of being eaten by predators while in such a vulnerable position. Others moult underground or in hidden positions. Lower temperatures and higher humidity at night also reduce the risk of the animal drying out and getting stuck before moulting is complete.

So next time you see that 'hollow spider' in the garage, have a closer look. It might just be the exoskeleton, with the former occupant is still alive and well somewhere, and bigger...



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Dr Dave Renty, Katydids and Music

ONE OF THE INTERESTING THINGS about the inhabitants living around Kuranda is that it includes a number of eminent scientists. The profile this month includes one of these, Dr Dave Rentz, who lives here with his wife Barbara. Both were from California originally but have lived in Australia since 1977 and enjoy the Australian way of life. Both are "new" Australians. Dave says he really likes Kuranda, with its native background, wonderful weather and nice people. Their house backs directly onto rainforest that cassowaries and other native animals inhabit. He certainly deserves profiling in this Paper – he is a scientist of world standing who has made a major contribution to our knowledge of certain insects.

Dave was from San Francisco and undertook his tertiary studies at U Cal Berkeley Campus. He has a PhD in entomology. Then he worked with the US Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia for five years and then the Californian Academy of Sciences for two years. He also taught courses at academia. He and Barbara married in the late 70s. They have no children.

Dave then obtained a position with the CSIRO, Division of Entomology, so they moved to Canberra. Dave worked with the CSIRO for 25 years, undertaking a wide range of research and related activities, publishing widely. In about 2000 he retired from the CSIRO and in 2003 they moved up to Kuranda after the Canberra fires.

Dave still leads a very active life based in his home office in Kuranda. He is still undertaking

research, going on field trips and writing. He has a large correspondence. Last year he was awarded the IG-Nobel prize in biology at a ceremony in Harvard University, an award that is similar to the Nobel Prize but with no monetary content. There is no Nobel Prize in biology. The award was based on research carried out jointly with Darryl Gwynne of Canada on the sexual habits of a male beetle from the WA desert when confronted with discarded glass beer stubbies. The research lead to modifications by the manufacturer to the bottles to avoid environmental harm. It was an excellent illustration of the need for manufacturers to take into account the unresearched and unforeseen environmental effects of their products.

Dave has other awards. These include one for his leading book on the genus of



insects called katydids and one for another book entitled "Grasshopper Country". He is a recognised expert on insects in the category Orthoptera, which comprises grasshoppers, katydids, crickets, cockroaches and mantas. He is currently working on a book on cockroaches. He also sub-edits an online journal. Currently he is an Adjunct Professor at the JCU School of Marine Biological Sciences and supervises graduate students. He maintains his relationship as a Research Fellow with the California Academy of Sciences and with the CSIRO.

The lesser known side perhaps of Dave's activities is that for 35 years, and still ongoing, he has been presenting programs on radio in the music of the 20s and 30s. He also at one time produced programs on jazz. Currently he produces programs on line that are sent out to 28 stations Australiawide through the Community Broadcasting Association in Sydney. Those that "stream" allow listeners to hear the program anywhere in the world. He has a very large collection of recordings including vinyls. He won the Australian Sound Recording Association (ASRA) Award for public broadcasting and nature sounds. In addition, he was President of the Friends of the Cairns Botanic Garden for four years and is helping set up the Cairns Aquarium Society.

He has a live-and-let-live approach to life. Quietly spoken and friendly by nature, he is still quite concerned about certain trends, particularly as they affect the global environment. The emphasis on "growth" has him particularly concerned. He says if you want to see the end results of this approach, look at Los Angeles or

Hong Kong, concrete nightmares with huge social problems. He is also concerned about Australian mining, producing huge pits that look like lunar landscapes, and adversely affecting many unique plants and animals. His own emphasis is on the quality of life on earth, embracing all living things.

It is with great sorrow we heard of the passing away of Gary Bresnan on the 31st May 2012. Gary was a member of The Kuranda RSL sub branch.




Every ANZAC Day Gary would march with the RSL in Kuranda and afterwards over a few beers, many world problems were solved.

"The Lost Mother"

by Dr Anne Summers (2009, Melbourne UP) ISBN 9780 52285 6354, RRP \$34.95

The author, the noted Australian feminist, political adviser, environmentalist, journalist, former administrator of the Status of Women office as well as writer and commentator, has written that this is a story of art and love. It is that and more.

It is a story of art in that it uses the story to discuss in some detail the life and career of Australian painter Constance Stokes, intersecting as that life and career did in several ways with that of the author. But in doing so Summers uses the opportunity to try to elevate the knowledge and status of that female painter, and in turn to reflect on the relative lack of recognition of quality women artists in Australia as compared to male artists of the same generation.

It is also a story of love in the lives of several people - Constance Stokes the painter, plus the idiosyncratic Lydia Mortill, who supported Stokes and bought her paintings, as well as others.

But more than anything else, it is a story about the author herself, and how her life was affected by art and by her feelings for her mother and how those feelings were reciprocated.

In this sense it is a story of self discovery and reflection, a very personal and moving portrayal of the mother-daughter relationship and how certain discoveries made after her mother's passing caused a major but understated reappraisal of that relationship. It is a bitter-sweet story that makes compelling reading.

The reviewer picked it up one morning and had to continue to read it until he finished it the same evening. It will induce personal resonances within many readers who have themselves experienced, or at least observed at fairly close range, the intense feelings and emotions generated by mother-daughter relationships across the generation gap.

It is a book the reading of which requires a little concentration. It tends to jump for one place to another, from one subject to another and from one time to another, as the various threads are woven into one overall theme.

One moment we find ourselves as readers in Adelaide or Melbourne, the next in London or Paris, and then again in Latvia. There are stories within the story, as the author determinedly beavers away in her detective-like enquiries, following leads that sometimes appear at first glance to be rather tenuous. And as you would expect from this author, there is social comment.



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But the connections between all these threads are there throughout the book, all leading back to the significance of the paintings made of the mother as a child and to the mother-daughter relationship itself. These connections are helped by certain coincidences, things that appear to be mere accidents but which have greater

The author finishes up with possession of one of the paintings by bequest, but we are not too disappointed in the end when the second painting is not located and observed. The paintings are primarily a vehicle for the examination of the relationship and its reassessment. They provide the focus, as the stories within stories revolve around them.

I personally felt moved by the book. Both the author and her mother come across as strong yet likeable personalities, with more than a tinge of vulnerability. One cannot help but reflect that there is always some scope for reconciliation in personal relationships no matter how broken, even after death.

Reconciliation is a very powerful feeling and concept. It is a meeting ground for regret, love and forgiveness. And a person's life and stories can survive beyond physical death to facilitate this, in this case at the very least by the personal documentation and pictures left behind by bequest. Beyond that, it is a matter of belief and spirituality.

And I also thank the author for making something of the life of a very good female painter of the 20th century who might otherwise have been largely overlooked.

A book for thoughtful readers who also just love to read interesting stories from real life. Not to be missed.

We've problems needing a concerted, co-ordinated effort by the Men of our region. Our youth needs to learn from the "old bloke next door". I learnt some carpentry and metal work from old blokes who own time in the company of other men. A major objective is to lived nearby. That callow youth of 14 years grew up better because of the experience of their seven decades. I didn't realise then, but I do

Our rural retreating lifestyle and our "Stranger Danger" fears long been a part of Australian culture. Look inside and you'll see men quashed these opportunities. Men's Shed provides a safe way for the old to teach and guide, and for youth to learn and experience

Shed: We need a shed! There are two possibilities and both need assistance and approval from Council. The first and best is B Block at the old Kuranda Primary School. It is due to be demolished. Council doesn't want to pay \$120,000 for renovations and the projected \$20,000 annual maintenance. We've had discussions with Mayor Rosa Lee Long suggesting we provide the strong right arm and the

We have licensed builders willing to oversee the renovation and Council's staff that are happy to give guidance. They have indicated that they are willing to stand in these positions during the formation process but we really need more shoulders to do the work. We need a vice-president, and several people who are prepared to take on roles of negotiation, and shed setup, and finding donations for fit out, and discussions with suppliers, and communications, and a web site development - and lots more. We have to go from infancy, through childhood and into adolescence all on the one afternoon

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Items of interest from **Council meeting**

CCTV trial for Mareeba

A CCTV unit will be installed on the Mareeba Fire Station Building in Byrnes Street in a bid to reduce incidences of vandalism and other crimes in the CBD.

The trial will be conducted over a two-month period to determine the camera's capability, image quality and ease of monitoring and retrieval of data by

Tablelands Mayor Rosa Lee Long said if the trial was successful, Council would seek approval to maintain the CCTV unit on the Fire Station building on a permanent basis.

"We have had some issues in Byrnes Street in terms of vandalism, particularly around the Cenotaph, and we hope that by putting a CCTV camera in the area, it will deter potential offenders, or we will capture their image and this will give police another tool in apprehending the culprits," she said.

The installation of the trial unit, estimated to cost \$30,000, is being funded from the Mareeba Benefitted Area rate (contributions from Mareeba businesses).

If the trial is successful, Council will consider extending the installation of CCTV cameras in other CBDs throughout the Tablelands as funding permits.

Avoid a parking fine!

Tablelands Regional Council has recommenced regulated parking patrols in Atherton, Mareeba and Kuranda CBDs.

Mayor Rosa Lee Long said she wanted people to be aware that the officers would be out and about enforcing the parking regulations.

"It's important people know that officers are out there so they get an opportunity to do the right thing and avoid receiving a parking infringement notice."

Parking fines were set at \$30 during the drafting of the new set of Local Laws which came into effect on 1 January 2012.

Update on Kuranda Community Precinct

Tablelands Regional Council has approved the demolition of Block A at the Kuranda Community Precinct, but will postpone the removal of Block B to allow community representatives to put a business case to Council about the future use of the

Council made the decision after a request from a Kuranda community member who asked that Block B not be demolished at this time and that Council considers allowing an organisation, yet to be formed, to take on the facility as a project.

Council agreed to defer the demolition of Block B to allow the group to put forward a business case by 31 August 2012 on how the facility would be refurbished and utilised in the future.

Keeping Warm in Winter Costs the Earth

NOWADAYS using timber logs to keep your home hour (kWh) for general domestic tariff 11 Google search warm throughout the night with its long slow cosy heat is considered an environmental no-no. It was normal to use timber, we lived in rainforest and the timber mills provided housing material, and timber for our fireplaces. But that was then and many timber mills have closed down. UK style central heating wasn't popular in Australian homes, unless you lived in alpine areas maybe. We were content with oil, gas, electric and wood as the main source of home heating. But now, even electricity is expensive.

There are many factors involved in keeping our homes warm.

- Mattress Bedding Bedrooms
- · Windows, Doors and Weatherising
- Room heating Insulation Landscape
- House construction House design
- House orientation.

This article is about electrical household heating and appliance running costs.

It's difficult not to create a big carbon footprint if you only consider electricity as the main source to keep warm. The recent cold weather during May and June may have you thinking about feather doonas, bread makers, slow cookers, thermal underwear, extra room heating, repairing your car heater or an emergency electric blanket.

But what are the costs of running wintertime household appliances?

Here in North Queensland, Ergon Energy the electrical provider, charges 22.759cents per kilowatt for Energy-Sense-Guide-for-Web-Jul-11, if you need a more detailed list plus use online Energy savings calculators for a full household audit of your electricity

Wood-fired heaters and stoves are not necessarily more energy efficient but they are considered to be carbon neutral: the carbon dioxide they release when the wood is burnt equals the carbon dioxide the tree absorbed while growing.

The most eco-friendly and energy-efficient (although most expensive) type of wood heaters use compressed wood pellets, which burn efficiently at high temperatures and are made from sawdust waste from mills.

- Details of any other income not already mentioned

- Work related expenses e.g. motor vehicle, travel, uniform, protective clothing, selfeducation, sun protection, union fees, telephone, tools and any other expenses incurred for work related purposes.
- Donations to charity
- Tax agent fee for the previous year
- Rental property expenses

Other Information

- Days spent in remote areas
- Private Health Insurance details
- Names and dates of birth of dependent children or spouse
- Total net medical expenses for your family if over \$2,000 in total.
- Bank details BSB and Account No. (this will generally speed up your refund)
- Education Tax Refund Receipts not required. This has been replaced by the School kids Bonus. Refer to www.fahcsia.gov.au for more info.

Jedda

An Aboriginal girl is adopted by a white woman on a Northern Territory cattle station. She is called Jedda, after a wild bird. Although brought up as a white child she feels the pull of strong spiritual ties with her people. These impulses become focused through her attraction to Marbuck, an Aboriginal full-blood. He takes her away from the station – a frightened, but half-willing captive.

As the last movie made by the Australian filmmaker Charles Chauvel, the film

is most notable for being the first to star two aboriginal actors (Robert Tudawali and Ngarla Kunoth) in the leading roles. It was also the first Australian feature film shot in colour. *Jedda* is seen by some as an influential film in early Australian cinema, as it set a standard for future Australian films. It won more international attention than previous Australian films, during a time when Hollywood films were dominating the Australian cinema. The director, Charles Chauvel, was nominated for the Golden Palm Award in the 1955 Cannes Film Festival, but lost to the American Delbert Mann for *Marty*.

After the director's 18-month search for a suitable filming location, the filming took five months to complete, plus post-production work done in Sydney. *Jedda* was filmed on location in the Northern Territory in Australia. The production process was as laborious as the colour technique used, Gevacolor, could only be processed overseas in England. The film was fragile and heat-sensitive, which was a problem as the Northern Territory had a typically hot climate; during production, the film was stored in cool caves to protect it from deteriorating. The last roll of negative was destroyed in a plane crash on its way for developing in England. Chauvel re-shot the lost scenes at Kanangra Walls in the Blue Mountains west of Sydney.

Brilliant young composer Tommy Matisse has left behind his family and girlfriend Alysse, to further his studies at the Royal Academy of Music in London. When Tommy's sister Emma experiments with drugs at a dance party and suffers a fatal overdose, Dan returns home. However, instead of the young lovers being reunited and sharing in their grief, Emma's death is the catalyst that drives them apart.



Lots of Competitions are coming up, so it's a busy time ahead. Good luck to all who are competing.



Putting powerlines way above the trees is also an option. We might not think that's aesthetic but that's only a human value, not a natural one. Putting up with such ugliness is one way we could 'pay' for the convenience of electricity.

All this costs money (another human commodity). It seems that the poor old defenceless environment always pays the price. It might just rebel sometime soon. Maybe it already is.

And another thing: Ever wondered why power lines are up there at the height of trees tops? It's because tree trunks were/are the material used to hang the lines on. We seem to be stuck in that old way.

With all the amazing technology that is shaping the way we live, you'd think we could come up with a cleverer way to deliver electrical power to the users.

Don't move - you are surrounded. There seem to be an awful lot of feral pigs raiding gardens at the moment. We successfully eradicated a breeding female recently from a property between Mason Road and Jumrum Creek. This sow was running with a big boar which escaped so he's out there somewhere. He's been seen near the Rainforest Resort. Please report sightings to help us keep tabs on their movements.

Cassowaries

Our spies report that there have been cassowary shenanigans in the backyards of properties in Butler Drive in recent weeks which have resulted in the laying of eggs. After the children have been put to bed, you can view the x-rated video on www.kurandabird watcherscabin.com.au (all one word, no gaps).

Dad has been making it very clear to his previous brood (2 now juveniles) that they must look after themselves and get out of his sight. This can be quite alarming to witness and it is no doubt very stressful for the youngsters. The male can become very aggressive and punishing towards them.

The question regularly arises at this time as to where the young birds can go. They must leave the range of the parent birds and find their own habitat with enough food to support them. We people have taken up a great deal of their

We are investigating the possibility of tagging these two young birds to find out where they might

Apparently, the pine plantations along Black Mountain Road are to be logged in coming weeks. This will mean heavy trucks thundering along the road - just in time for newly hatched cassowary chicks and wandering juveniles.

What are we going to do about Ergon?

You can throw yourself on the ground, rampaging and gnashing your teeth. You could try falling to your knees, weeping and pleading. You could even tie yourself to a tree Ergon wants to cut down and sweat anxiously as the chainsaw draws closer - but it won't do any good.

OR

You can make the best of the situation and plan to plant low growing shrubs in place of the big trees that are being removed. Kuranda Conservation, at Pademelon Lane, specialises in low-growing trees and shrubs – by the community,

Yes, we all want reliable power. But, Kuranda is different from Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne or even Mareeba. That's why we live here. It is because it's different that some things should be done differently here, such as putting power underground, bundling cables so the wires can pass through the branches of the big trees, even laying cables (protected and insulated, of course) over

the ground in places where there's no traffic.

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While we plant 'em, Ergon prepares to chop 'em down.

No doubt you've all have seen the pink tags on trees along the roadsides of the Kuranda area, wherever powerlines are nearby. Ergon contractors are now preparing to clear up to the allowable 10m corridor around their powerlines. If you have concerns about the trees they've marked and the methods they're using, you should call Ergon on 131 046 to discuss. To regain your privacy, especially where screening plants have been removed from your front yard, consider planting suitable natives under the 4m max. height which is allowable under powerlines. Ergon runs a Plan Smart program in conjunction with Greening Australia and Kuranda EnviroCare nursery has their list of suitable screening plants. We can provide most of these at minimal cost, so some along and check it out.

Extending the Barron River Kuranda Green Corridor

Thanks to a generous Federal Government Biodiversity Grant, Kuranda Envirocare volunteers are very excited at the prospect of spending the next 5 years focussed on extending their work, repairing and enhancing the biodiversity along the Barron River. Besides our usual nursery and tree planting activities, we'll incorporate bird monitoring (to gauge the return of rainforest bird species as the corridor revegetation matures), a long term Kuranda frog-monitoring study on the creeks in the Myola area (to record population numbers as we improve the habitat), and provide a corridor for easy human walking, with a focus on cassowary food trees, in case our feathered friends need to wander through to connect to other forest ranges such as Rainy Mountain. All welcome at the planning session, Thur. 5th July.

Tree of the month

One of the less well known screening plants is Phyllanthus cuscutiflorus, it is a very hardy, fast growing shrub to 4m, that bears masses of petite pink flowers. It's fast growing and will maintain its foliage to the ground. New growth has a copper tone especially as the weather cools and the general leaf tone is pale green. We have a few good specimens in the nursery and one, as an example, which growing very well at the end of our potting shed.

Fluoride: I am hopeful that further discussions with the Member for Barron River may lead to the Queensland Government re-considering their position on the compulsory fluoridisation of Council water supplies. The Kuranda water supply is scheduled to commence having fluoride added to the water on July 14th. Please read the comments from Michael Trout in this edition of the Kuranda Paper. Updates will be provided as they become available.

Kuranda Community Precinct: Tenders for the removal of Building A have been let. Tenders for Building B are being held over until August. Planning work has already commenced for the establishment of the Library at the Community Precinct. The entire lower floor of the Block C building will be used to create a spacious community Library and resources hub, with space for small meeting rooms and additional library services for our community. Council's 2011 resolution ensures that the Kuranda Community Precinct will be a family friendly community space available for use by all sections of the local community, without detracting from the current facilities at the CWA and the Kuranda Recreation Centre.

De-amalgamation? The Minister for Local Government has advised that there will be a vote on whether residents of the former Mareeba Shire wish to de-amalgamate. However this will not occur until Queensland Treasury has provided full costing details to residents. The full costs of any de-amalgamation will be borne by the ratepayers of the de-amalgamating Council. Only the residents of the former Mareeba Shire will vote on this. I urge you to consider the matter very carefully as there will be cost implications for you. In the meantime, the Council of the TRC is intent on getting on with the business of running the TRC.

Road Projects: Works to commence within the next few months include: reconstruction/upgrade of sections of Speewah Road and Ganyan Drive, Morton Street/Rob Veivers Drive intersection, Bridge 3 on Black Mt Road, Mona Mona Road and Black Mt Road, Fallon Road/ Jum Rum Crossing Bridge. NDRRA (Natural Disaster/ Reconstruction) federal funding for reconstruction of Windy Hollow Road is expected very soon. Council is endeavouring to have these projects completed before wet season.

A Full Safety Audit on the Intersection of High

brought to Council in July for decision on actions.

Charges for Onsite Waste Treatment Plants: Recently Council decided not to charge a proposed annual fee of \$46 to residents who have onsite Waste Treatment plants. Under the Plumbing and Drainage Act 2002, Council is required to maintain a register of all on-site sewerage and grey water use facilities and property owners are obligated to have the treatment plant serviced regularly by a service operator. This is important so that Council can ensure that such plants do not create negative environmental impacts to our water catchments and the environment. Any residences which are non-compliant with their service reports will be required to pay a fee. There are approximately 1000 onsite treatment plants around the region, but only about 400 have been submitting regular service reports.

Black Mt Road Forestry: Later this year, Qld Forest Products (owners of the forest timber in the Black Mt Road area) are expected to start their program of harvesting timber and transporting this by truck along Black Mt Road and the Kennedy Highway (to Cairns and to Emerald Creek). Residents will be advised of details once finalised, however there will be impacts on road use and road users. Council is currently in negotiation with QFP.

Riverwalk Project: Construction has commenced on changes to the bus set-down area near Skyrail and the Scenic Rail. The project also includes the construction of the riverwalk track from the pontoon area to the Barron River Bridge. The Riverwalk will be a great asset for both locals and tourists and is funded through the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund.

Congrats Kuranda Rec Centre: The Kuranda Recreation Centre has now reached record membership levels and hosts a range of family friendly and community activities. The hard working volunteer committee deserve praise for their efforts in bringing the Centre back to life over the past few years.

New Kuranda Visitors Centre: Charles Wright Architects have commenced design work for the building of the new Visitors Centre (funded from the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund). Community consultation is being undertaken by the architects. The new building will not take away any park green space and the community use of the park will not be compromised. In fact the design is required to meet the needs of both visitors and locals and will complement both the community use and the tourism use of Centenary Park.

Council Budget 2012-13: Council is currently finalising the 2012-13 Budget which is expected to be handed down on July 18th. More details in August edition.

TRC Planning Scheme: The TRC wide Planning Scheme has been submitted to the State Government and review is expected to take approx 4-6 months.

KIAC Committee Vacancy: Following the recent advertisement of the current Committee vacancy, Expressions of Interest closed on June 25th. This Committee manages the Strategic Plan and projects of the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund (funded by contributions from Skyrail and Kuranda Scenic Rail). The next Committee Meeting is July 17th.

Amphitheatre Toilet block: Building Plans for the construction of the new toilet block at the Amphitheatre are currently being finalised. The project is funded and construction will commence once the Building Plans are approved.

Tourism Kuranda: Members of the TK Committee are all volunteers who devote hours to promote Kuranda. The current Committee is due to retire in August and nominations for positions on the Committee are currently being advertised.





A Thought for July

This month Bible reading is from St Marks Gospel Chapter 4 verses 26-34.

HENEVER we read in the bible about Jesus speaking about the kingdom of God, we may be sure of two things. What he is saving will sound very simple. Its images will be very familiar. We will think we understand it. But if we reflect on it in our minds, we will find a surprising thing happen. What he has said will yield more and more meaning to us.

In this passage the image that Jesus set before us is once again simple. The kingdom is "as if a man should scatter seed upon the ground." Jesus points out how human participation in the process of nature is very largely one of spectator. This man sows at the beginning and reaps at the end of the process.

In between those times the rhythm of life goes by. Jesus seems to be saying that there is much of the stuff of life which is not in our control. It demands our cooperation. It demands that we wait on the process. That is very true. These days we are more involved in the processes of nature, sometimes disastrously so, as we well

But we have to learn that if we intrude too much, if we insist on manipulating and directing the process, refusing to wait on nature's time and pace and ways, we will bring real disaster. There are many levels of meaning in what Jesus is saying, but perhaps this is the level at which the scripture speaks most directly to us

The next image Jesus uses to speak about the ways of God is that of the mustard seed. He wants to get across to us something we see coming true again and again. It's a kind of a joke life plays. We begin something. It is pitiably small. We smile at the possibility of it ever becoming significant, but time teaches us otherwise. A chance remark dropped in a conversation remains in someone's consciousness. Quietly it begins to affect their life until there is a very different person.

A few people in an area begin to meet for prayer or Bible study or worship. Nobody thinks anything of it. Then the group begins to grow, and one day there is a congregation of Christians. Very often we can become discouraged about some Christian service we are doing.

Clergy can have doubts. A Sunday school teacher can wonder if his or her efforts are making the slightest difference. Parents can lack confidence, wondering why they seem to be abject failures with their children. And vears later someone says thanks for a single afternoon, a fleeting encounter, a slight exchange of conversation, a forgotten insight shared. The mustard seed is suddenly seen to have become a great tree beneath which another human being, maybe many, have sheltered and been given resources for living. We constantly forget that God comes in little things to which we accord no significance at the time.


