The View From **300**

THIS 300TH EDITION OF THE KURANDA PAPER

falls serendipitously on the 27th anniversary of the first issue, published in July 1991. Mathematicians amongst you may wonder how that might be, and the answer will be revealed within this paper. But it seems a lucky happenstance to be having a double celebration. And worthy of some reflection back over those 299 issues – the first 92 of which exist only as physical hardcopies which have managed to largely survive the ravages of the tropics.

Looking back through stacks of old newspapers, many of which are a bit yellowed now but were once black and white (spot colour only appeared in December 2011, just 72 issues ago), the consistent picture that emerges is of a strong, ambitious, innovative, collaborative and diverse community. The recorded history of the development of many substantial and enduring community generated and led projects, the tenacity and inventiveness of those who had a vision and pursued it from nothing, might also perhaps be a message of hope. And inspiration.

So many things we may now take for granted were never guaranteed. An ambulance centre, a Neighbourhood Centre, The Kuranda Amphitheatre, the Koah Hall, Roscommon at Speewah, the Arts Co-op, the Kuranda Recreation Centre, the Village Information Centre, Djabugay Aboriginal Corporation, Ngoonbi, Kuranda Pony Club, sports clubs, fire brigades, schools, community support services...and so many more, including this community newspaper...began with nothing but a need, an idea, shared skills and effort.

Often they took years to realise and involved the most basic of fundraising (raffles, sausage sizzles, trivia nights etc) to get off the ground. And many many hours of volunteer work where the only reward was the satisfaction of teamwork and meeting another milestone. And maybe a cold (or hot) drink along the way.

There are the same concerns expressed then as now: for our young people, the precarious nature of employment, the threat of development to lifestyle, concerns for our wildlife in the face of habitat loss, and of course there is the Range Road. All these



Sugar to Fuel the Nation

Another sugar crushing season is upon us.

The opposition Treasurer Chris Bowen has called for a paper from the KAP on ethanol and I am giving each of the key members in the ALP and Liberal parties an outlined brief on the significance of ethanol.

KUR-Questions

Why did Mareeba Shire Council Planners accept a submission from Cardno showing a Ground Floor Area (GFA) of less than 200m² in the recent KUR-Cow Tourist application?

If the toilets and Restroom areas had been included in the measurements then the total GFA would have been well above 200m² and the D/A would have become Impact Assessible instead of Code Assessible. As it was Code Assessible the Community was denied the opportunity to comment on it beforehand and also appeal any decision that was made.

In another application presented by Planners at the same meeting as the KUR-Cow application, the planners accepted another D/A that had toilets and bathrooms included in the GFA measurements.

Why then did the Planners accept the Cardno application which excluded the same areas, thus denying any community involvement in the KUR-Cow Tourism application. How was this allowed to happen? I am sure there are many others in the community like me that are having difficulty accepting that this was a mistake.

The Kuranda Paper has reached the 300th edition milestone this month, and celebrates 27 years of production (July 1991–July 2018).

In January 1991, 15 people representing 27 community groups attended a workshop at the Kuranda CWA Hall and after several months of networking and another large public meeting the Kuranda Media Association was born. Krishna Buhler who worked both on the Kuranda Media Association executive and in paper production for eight years (1991–1999) outlines the moves which led to the creation of a community newspaper for the Kuranda district:

"The *Kuranda Community News*, which would later be renamed *The Kuranda Paper*, was one of the outcomes of that meeting. Members of the local Uniting Church, some already involved in the formation of what would become the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre, wanted to identify pressing needs within the Kuranda district and explore ways to meet them."

It had been identified that there was NO effective means of communicating for the Kuranda area, there being little or no services offered by the Tableland newspapers or the Cairns Post AND they came at a cost.

Krishna had recently arrived from a small rural town in NZ (Clevedon) where she had been contributing to a monthly community paper. In Clevedon, volunteers had used typewriters, duplicating copies on a hand turned "Gestetner" (roneo) machine, hand folded and hand delivered. Which sounded like a LOT of work, covering the entire Kuranda district. And just WHO would put this newspaper together? This question was still being tossed around when Joan Dods, a local trailblazer in such projects as the establishment of the Kuranda Amphitheatre, suggested Shep Humston, a local Kuranda historian and publisher (Shep's work lives on to this day in the book *Kuranda; The Village in the Rainforest* 1888-1988).

Word got around. There being no other way to spread the word this was done largely by word of mouth and utilising various community notice boards (in pre-Facebook days these were actual boards on actual walls). A support group for the concept was set up as the Kuranda Media Association. Finalising preparations for the very first edition Shep's experience with newspapers came to the fore when, at the suggestion of a 'modest' newsletter type of affair, he confidently said "No. If we are going to do it let's do it right. Let's do a proper newspaper". And with some helpful donations and advertisers, the process was underway. It was in hindsight an audacious idea: to create a newspaper not owned by anyone in a little town in Far North Queensland, with no money and no resources, in a time with no internet and few phones or faxes. With no editors or reporters and a policy based on community participation dictating the content in a conscious decision to move away from standard paper procedure and "journalese". And to make it free to all residents and delivered into every mailbox.

The first five papers, initially the *Kuranda Community News*, were put together in the Humstons' back room. Then we were offered a temporary space behind the old Monkey's restaurant kitchen near the Markets and we became *The Kuranda Paper*. Still without a permanent home at the beginning of 1992, and with a wet looming, Gayle Hannah offered a space at her house. And then, bless them, the Fire Brigade came to our rescue, offering their rec room for one week a month. The pool table with a plywood top added became our layout table and as we grew from 8 to 12 to 16 to a steady 20 pages in 1993, we spread our cardboard layout boards to additional tables.

The Cairns Post would receive our layout paste boards, photograph and print them. Brian Davison, a Kuranda local, and Cairns Post sub-editor, guided us through this process. Our advertisers and contributors were wonderful and while we had no money for frills we had enough to pay the bills. While we had the odd glitch (missing our once a week "window" for printing by the Cairns Post we had to abandon the July 1992 issue as we couldn't afford to do two in one month, and Cyclone Justin in April 1997 made conditions too dangerous to allow us to work. These were the only times we were unable to produce a paper in 27 years, otherwise this would be issue #302).

In September 1999, a call went out on the front page to the folk of Kuranda: a cry for help. *The Kuranda Paper* HAD to transition from paper and glue to computer and disc or close its doors. The Cairns Post were no longer going to be able to accept our pasted pages of hard copy for printing. A meeting was called and as a result it was discovered that there were people who might be able to step into the breach. But the pivot of this change in direction was Saddhen Edwards, who had worked on the Paper since 1992. Saddhen, who STILL folds papers on delivery day, recalls:

"I was brave enough, or foolish enough, to hope my computer knowledge such as it was, might be able to help us make the compulsory transition. Kuranda readers had responded to our desperate plea. Julie Ramage in particular turned out to be of vital help. Others were willing to learn. We obtained a Windows computer and a printer to aid proof reading. Julie looked after the text, I did the adverts and graphics while others watched and learnt. We were forced to use a simple publishing program as the expense of a professional version was beyond our means, let alone the steep learning curve. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 6**

"The view from here"


A monthly column by Michelle Murray-Beckman offering a glimpse into Kuranda's bespoke rainforest architecture along with interviews with residents who share with us why they have chosen to call Kuranda home.

THE VIEW from Brian Clarke's verandah is lush and green. Post wet season, there is abundant new growth and tall palms framing the view down a gentle slope to the creek that runs through the lower part of the four acre property. Brian tells me that it needs cleaning up – but to me it looks languorous and inviting.

It seems appropriate that for the 300th edition of *The Kuranda Paper* we will be sitting on the verandah talking about why Brian chose a quiet wedge of a corner of land near the Barron Falls to create a home.

I say this because Brian is a long-time resident, one of the 'new settlers' of Kuranda. New settlers is a term given to a group of young people who arrived in the early 1970s from Holloways Beach near Cairns. There will be readers of this column who are themselves part of this group and who will be familiar with Brian's story. For a new resident and near neighbour such as myself I am curious to hear his recollection of these times.

Before the influx of new settlers, the population of Kuranda in the 1970s was less than 350. The town comprised of a sawmill, two pubs, corner store, butcher, post office and a red telephone box. Residents were 'not plugged in'. There was no radio, TV, or internet.



Originally from Sydney, Brian made his way up the "Crystal Highway", named for the large amount of broken glass from shattered windscreens that littered the rough stretch of dirt road from Rockhampton north to Cairns. It was a spontaneous decision to leave behind a well-paid job and the Bondi Beach lifestyle and the up side was the greatest of luxuries - no limitations, no career, just going with the flow. Arriving in 1969 Brian found an artistic, bohemian community camping on the foreshore at Holloways Beach. It was a disparate group of characters - educated artists, musicians, croc hunters, professionals, even trade union wharfies from the southern States and overseas. Holloways Beach and Kuranda were locations that formed part of 'The Hash Trail' that ran from Europe, through South-east Asia, Darwin and Far North Queensland. All members lived light, free and easy under canvas tents. However, this light and easy life on the foreshore at Holloways was often interrupted by the authorities. In 1969 the Premier of Queensland was Joh Bjelke-Peterson. Vagrancy was an offence and eventually the camp was closed and the group forced out. Cairns was proving a difficult place to lead such a bohemian life. It is at this point that Brian is keen to make the distinction that the move to Kuranda was not motivated by some utopian dream. It was practical. To avoid being harassed, moved on, or charged with vagrancy and other offences, there was a need to accept the western legal paradigm and embrace land ownership.



creative lives to become legitimate. In Brian's words, "We didn't want to be a part of what we had left, but we didn't know what was next either".

Kuranda offered a cooler climate, more affordable land, and the opportunity to live with nature. It was also important to Brian to have a sense of ownership and a sense of structure – "to have a place to call home".

Quiet, wet and cool – the air dripping condensation. A soft, sloping gully filled with bird song. These are the first impressions of the place that was to become Brian's home. Through friends, a share became available in a tenancy-in-common. The only agreement between the tenants was no dogs, no cats and the maintenance of a vegetation corridor between each dwelling. This suited both the human residents and the wildlife inhabitants.

The land was cleared by hand with a scrub hook. The building site was determined by pushing an abandoned Combi van down a snigging track until it stopped. A raised platform with a tarp for a roof was added to complete the first dwelling. Later, with the collective knowledge and labour of friends a house was built by hand on the same site. The first ten years were lived without electricity. Kerosene lamps provided light, a wood fired stove for cooking and heating.

According to Brian, what was wonderful about living off the grid was the lack of constraint – "we worked with what we had". The scales of economy and the availability of resources drove the build, resulting in the individual, organic style of architecture of his house. Incorporated into the walls are original Jum Rum Creek bridge timbers. Bricks from the Clohesy Brickworks form retaining walls and reject timber from the Foxwood Mill in Mareeba line the walls. The house tells its own story and it is apparent that it was built with love.

This fluid approach to design and construction was embraced by many of the new settlers and there was a conscious effort to eschew suburban style concrete block houses. Brian talks of the freedom to allow creativity and talent direct the course of the build – that the process revealed itself as it went along. This position was not embraced by the local Shire Council and there is a detailed history of conflict between residents and the Council over building regulations and approvals, which is the subject for another column.

Brian's house first appeared in the Kuranda Village News in December 1979. His house was described as simple, functional and aesthetically pleasing. Comment was made by the editor of the KVN that the creative urge is reflected in the style of buildings prevalent in Kuranda – simple, beautiful houses blending into the forest. Not symbols of wealth, but shelter and a vantage point to observe the beauty of the native flora and fauna. I concur.

Brian's involvement in community life in Kuranda for more than 40 years is one that cannot be described in this column's 1000 or so words. During our discussions which followed many paths and covered many topics certain principles kept emerging which are worth noting.

The idea of the collective spirit and collective thought to steer a concept to fruition underpinned the development of the Kuranda Markets, the Amphitheatre, the reestablishment of the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce and the marketing of Kuranda as the village in the rainforest. Brian refers to social innovation and enterprise of the community as the drivers that have seen Kuranda develop its very individual character.

He is also quick to point out that everything he has undertaken comes from a

This would enable him and others who shared the same desire to lead alternative,

motivation to help himself as well as the community, with an ethical underpinning. He stressed that it is not from a capitalistic perspective, but rather the position of subsistence and self-reliance. This reminds me of "put your own oxygen mask on so that you can help others".

I asked Brian his view of Kuranda in 2018. His first response was that he is still comfortable to call this place home and that the collective spirit remains. One of his great joys is the people. With a certain amount of self-awareness he laughs when he says 'the eccentricity and the madness – that feeling that you can't identify it in yourself but you can see it all around you'.

He has recently spent a month away travelling and upon returning talks about the sense of home he feels when he hears the call of the Orange Footed Scrub Fowl and the Wompoo Pigeon – indeed all the sounds of the rainforest. For him coming back to Kuranda means you know exactly where on the planet you are.

Finally we talk about the sense of interconnectedness that we all share – with each other and our environment. How by sharing stories we become part of those stories and we and those stories are forever changed.



"We endeavoured to finish our first digital edition a few days early to allow time to make alterations if required. But the Cairns Post team were our saviours and solved all the problem areas. We were very grateful for their assistance particularly as they only had one PC at that time, having converted almost entirely to Macs. Then in the third month after transition we were hit with a new challenge when the CD which we used to send the Paper to them was sent back to us to fix. It took two tries to get right.

"At this stage I was doing beta testing of new programs for Adobe and decided to use a pre-release version of a program. It proved challenging to start but much more successful once we mastered it. A short time later the full version with all the bugs straighten out was released by Adobe and we purchased that improved version. *The Cairns Post* bought new PCs and the same software because they were so impressed with what it could do.

"Our team settled in well and learnt quickly. We had to work in pairs with only one computer, so some worked at home and brought content in on floppy discs (remember them?). There were still many struggles though, with contributors using many different formats. Small traces of colour were appearing and the Post could not process these. Many times we spent hours trying to find and correct this, and after a while we became experts. Other problems were the different fonts readers used as for many months we only had a choice of two because font technology was behind the pace on PCs.

"In December 2004, I handed over the role of co-ordinator to Peter Anderson who really had a good grasp of what was needed. We had successfully made the digital leap, and survived."

However, as Beverley Adamson described in the May 2000, 100th edition of *The Kuranda Paper*, there were still a few "doozies" post transition: "Only being able to see one page at a time on the computer caused ongoing stumbles. We no longer can have a large team, but by necessity must work in groups of 2-4 at any given time. We've struggled with...minor and major catastrophes! The worst occurred a couple of months ago when an incorrect font caused the paper to be a week late. Our deadline was a Wednesday night. Thursday afternoon a call was received... one page had not been accepted by the print run. Hours later the page was found to have incorrect fonts and typing bullets in one ad. But, as Thursday is the ONLY day *The Cairns Post* prints papers other than its own, we therefore had to wait until the following Thursday. What it did achieve though was a warm knowledge that the locals look forward to their paper as the cries of foul

were heard both near and far."

With the mastering of digital production the Paper was able to offer better quality images and straighter lines than those achieved with handcut paper and glue but it lost none of its Kuranda flavor. And the 100th, 150th, 200th edition marks were passed, under the steady guidance of presidents Joan Dods, Bob Madden, Christopher Wright, Allan Rose, Liane Barrett, Garth Owen and their executive committees. A chronological list of the many helpers involved in creating each issue, month by month, appears on the back page of this Paper.

In 2008, recently arrived Kuranda "treechangers" Helen Douglas and David Gormley of Halley Design brought their professional talents in graphic design



and layout into the mix and really put the polish on *The Kuranda Paper* "rock", greatly enhancing the reader experience. Helen's front page design style in particular h



page design style in particular has really set *The Kuranda Paper* apart in community newspaper standards with its wow factor.

The Kuranda Paper website was developed over three months in late 2009 by production member Seren Starlight and the first online Paper appeared in March 2010. Seren stated at the time that it was not meant to ever replace the hard copy (especially in relation to bird cages or wrapping fish) but rather to offer high quality online viewing of current and some past editions to anyone, anywhere. Especially loved by homesick Kurandites wherever they be. (Seren continues to run the website and produce the Arts Page; Kitty Clignett produces the Music Page.)

Colour came first as "spot colour" on some pages of the Paper in December 2011, and the first full colour *Kuranda Paper* was published in December 2012. Now we had the tools to really showcase the natural beauty and artistic talents of the community. Social media has also enabled us to better connect with readers and contributors, alerting them of deadlines and alerting us of breaking news and potential stories.

The one thing which hasn't changed is the job of paper folding for all the papers which go into mail boxes and on the outlying mail deliveries. Our paper folders still gather early on the last Thursday of the month to do this job after our copies are delivered from Townsville to the Kuranda Post Office.

Throughout the years, readers have been treated to some wonderful content on a wide range of subjects by passionate and knowledgeable contributors, too numerous to name. But of particular note have been the decades of expert garden advice by "Alectura" aka long time Kuranda resident Peter North, who was also invaluable to the continued success of the Paper as a hardworking and dedicated member of the Kuranda Media Association executive and production team. Peter has only just laid down his pen and now his value is most evident as we wonder who might take it back up.

Words written on the occasion of the first anniversary of the Paper in 1992 still ring true: "This paper is for us all and the more community members use it for their news and views the more interesting it will become. The support of advertisers and

> constructive criticism are both important; but in the end it is those who live in our community who are interested enough to write, photograph or draw expressing concerns and recording events, sharing talents and other interests who will provide the material for another 12 issues—and beyond—of our own Kuranda paper. Don't be shy, write in with your news and views. This is your paper."


Thank you to the Kuranda Media Association for lending us a drawer in one of their filing cabinets. In return we are hoping to collaborate to get all copies of Kuranda's TWO independent newspapers (*Kuranda Village News* 1979-1981 and *The Kuranda Paper* 1991–present day) digitalised and made available online, possibly through the National Library or Queensland State Library, as they comprise rich local history resources indeed.

Speaking of historical resources covering the Kuranda region, tribute must be paid to the enduring work of the Kuranda Centenary Book Committee (Shep Humston, Joan Dods, Sammy Humston, Jim Mealing, Dugg Stratford and Betty Wilson). Thirty years ago, in 1988, this group of Kuranda residents, with funding from the Mareeba Shire Council, local businesses and residents, took on the job of creating a book "Kuranda: The Village in Rainforest 1888–1988" covering Kuranda's 100 years post European settlement as recorded through documents, stories and photographs. At the time the committee admitted "In telling the story of Kuranda, we are fully aware



that our history is just a small sample of the events worthy of recording and preserving."

Nevertheless, it was a mighty effort—specially as it occurred before internet access became available in Australia. And it remains the only book of its kind covering Kuranda history 1888–1988. Copies are available to view at the



Kuranda library, and available to purchase in limited quantities via sites such as ebay. No Kuranda bookshelf is complete without one.

The book's main author, the late Shep Humston, is also a key figure in the history The Kuranda of Paper. His previous publishing experience was crucial to the leap from an idea in early 1991 to create a kind of community newsletter to the realisation of a full blown newspaper for the Kuranda community in July 1991. Shep and his wife Sammy even gave up their pool table for production of the first few editions. His efforts as a lead author and publisher have left us a great legacy.

THE BARNWELL'S STORY

Few people know the story at the end of the Barnwell's life in Myola, but many are hearing the story of their land at the end of Barnwell Road now being developed by a Macau businessman at the angst of many in the Kuranda community.

Those who knew the Barnwells, (Old) Bill, Vera Grace, the parents of Bill (Jnr), Grace and Dawn, now imagine that they would be turning in their grave at the development of their beloved property which had been in the family since 1930s. Home was a galvanised shed with a dirt floor until the current old Queensland style home was built in 1954. They were very private people, independent and selfsufficient; they wanted to be left alone.

The last family members who remained on the property until about 2013 until being committed to hospital care in Herberton, have since passed away; Dawn in February 2014 and Bill (Jnr) in September 2016. Their beloved property and sanctuary was sold at auction in January 2014 by The Public Trustee.

Many stories have circulated as to the circumstances of them being taken from the property in about 2013. Dawn and Bill (Jnr) are no longer here to defend their good name, but this account is written on their behalf in the belief that history should be recorded as accurately as possible.

*

Only a couple of local people were trusted and called upon for help by Dawn and Bill (Jnr) as they reached their 70s. Dawn could not drive and they did not own a car. Bill (Jnr) had a diagnosed mental illness and was monitored via a mental health order for drug supervision treatment. He also became blind. Dawn was his carer. Brother and sister were good company for each other.

For many years, every Tuesday, a trusted local lady took Dawn into Kuranda to shop. Dawn was a capable carer for brother, Bill and a good housekeeper. She did her best to manage the cattle on her own, to ensure water supply and fencing. But in her 60s and 70s this was not possible. Two local men often went to the property to help her voluntarily.

On a second Tuesday shopping day, when Dawn did not turn up at the property gate for her trip into Kuranda, help was sought from a trusted retired nurse and friend, to organise a visit to the house to make sure all was well.

An awful situation was discovered. Dawn was very sick from diabetes and was unable to care for Bill (Jnr). There was no food, Bill was blind, and unable to help Dawn and was afraid to call for help.

Their staunch independence was not serving them well. Although very sick, Dawn refused any medical treatment or to leave her home to go to hospital. Their trusted friends had to make some difficult decisions on that day. The local retired nurse was asked to travel to Mareeba to complete paperwork to obtain a court order with the Mareeba Magistrate so that treatment could be initiated. An ambulance was then able to be called for Dawn to take her for treatment, but Dawn was so unwell that she did not understand why she had to leave. Billy remained at the house for a few days but was so afraid that he barricaded himself into the house and it took some negotiation for the local nurse to convince him to let her in so he could be helped. A few days were needed for Billy's health case manager to organise a place in hospital. He was then happy to go to the hospital to be with Dawn.

Dawn was cared for and her diabetes bought under control. Bill (Jnr) was with her. Everyone thought that they would go back to the property. As Dawn's physical health improved, the doctors realised that she was also suffering from dementia. The medical staff at the base said she could not go home as she was unable to care for herself or Billy (Jnr) any more.

Dawn and Bill (Jnr)'s remaining extended family decided that Herberton Hospital was the best place. Close enough for them to visit and make sure things were as good as they could be.

Dawn and Bill (Jnr) never returned to their beloved property which was sold by the Public Trustee in January 2014 for \$2.1m. Their sister was also a beneficiary of the property sale via their Mother's Will which had been made many years previously.

Dawn and Bill (Jnr) had little education and were ill equipped for a life in Kuranda in the 2000s. Their tenacity and independence however ensured their survival with a very basic subsistence lifestyle at a time when Kuranda had few comforts and adversity was the norm.

Theirs was a very tough life that few of us could relate to now.

Smoke Signals

'OPERATION COOL BURN' SET TO START

KURANDA RURAL FIRE in collaboration with Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service (QPWS) and Bulmba Rangers are hoping to conduct a planned burn within State Forest to the west of Mona Mona Road from the end of June 2018, weather permitting

This burn is part of the annual fuel reduction and conservation management program Operation Cool Burn.

As a result, smoke may be seen in the Black Mountain, Kuranda and Koah area.

The aim of this burn is to reduce the volume of forest fuels and to create a mosaic pattern of burnt and unburnt areas. This will help reduce the intensity of any subsequent wildfires and provide favourable conditions for natural forest regeneration.

PLEASE NOTE: Operations are conditional on prevailing weather conditions, and the dryness of the grass at the time.





LOCAL LAWS ADOPTED

At today's meeting, Council adopted a number of local and subordinate local laws including Administration, Animal Management, Community and Environmental Management and Parking, overriding the existing Local Laws.

Legislation which was previously enforced by the Queensland Government for Waste Management was also adopted by Council, under a new Local Law.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said the adoption of the new Local Law is a process of governance that all local Councils must implement.

KURANDA INFRASTRUCTURE PLAN

Following recent ministerial approval, Council today approved an amended Kuranda Township Masterplan. The plan includes a number of projects which will be carried out to enhance and maintain the character of the Village and conserve the natural environment while providing the necessary infrastructure to cater for the needs and demands of increased visitor numbers and the community.

The \$1.3M redevelopment of Therwine Street is part of the masterplan which is designed to enhance the amenity of the Village and improve safety for motorists and pedestrians.

Mareeba Shire Mayor Tom Gilmore said the project forms part of Council's ongoing commitment to systematically upgrade infrastructure to adequately service visitor demand and enhance Kuranda's appeal as a world-class tourist destination.

"There has been significant consultation with a broad range of stakeholders, including visitors and Kuranda business owners, in the lead up to the development of the plan which includes the re-development of Therwine Street and other projects," he said.

Over \$4 million will be spent in Kuranda over the next two years which will include the construction of walking tracks to the Barron Falls, the installation of new wayfinding signage, improvements to information technology, Centenary Park toilet block refurbishment and street furniture restoration.

LATE FEE FOR LIBRARIES

Mareeba Shire Library Services has introduced a late fee for those who don't return their resources on time.


Mayor Tom Gilmore said residents would have to pay an overdue fee of \$5 for resources that are not renewed or returned within three weeks of the due date. "Council decided to introduce the small fee to encourage residents to be more diligent and return their items on time, so that others have more time to enjoy the shared resources," Cr Gilmore said.

Concerns over Spraying on Lake Tinaroo

On 6th June, Tablelands Regional Council (TRC) in conjunction with SunWater, a Queensland governmentowned corporation, commenced aerial herbicide spraying of Lake Tinaroo, with the aim of eradicating the noxious weed Water Hyacinth. While windy weather interrupted the spraying, it's expected to be completed when weather permits.

Water Hyacinth is considered one of the world's worst weeds – affecting creeks, rivers and dams, choking wetlands and waterways, killing native wildlife and interfering with recreational use. Water hyacinth grows most strongly in warm, nutrient-rich (polluted) waters. Interestingly, it is known for its ability to remove toxins and heavy metals from the water. In parts of Asia it is used for biomass in compost, as cattle fodder and in fish food for caged aquaculture. Under certain conditions, it can be argued that it improves water quality, provides habitat for invertebrates and small fish and is a potential agricultural resource. Conversely, when large mats of water hyacinth are poisoned, sink to the bottom and rot, water oxygen levels are depleted, potentially causing an entropic cascade resulting in large scale fish death and algal bloom.

As a restricted invasive plant, TRC has a legal obligation to enact a biosecurity plan to control water hyacinth in Lake Tinaroo. The plan currently being implemented is aerial-spraying the herbicide Reglone - with the declared active ingredient diquat dibromide. Diquat is the only herbicide registered for use in water storage areas used for human consumption, though 14 days must elapse after treatment before water can be consumed. The Safety Data Sheet declares it as "very toxic to aquatic life with long lasting effects".

Advice issued by TRC and SunWater was to avoid contact with water in the affected area for



10 days and to avoid using the water for livestock or garden irrigation for 10 days. Despite Lake Tinaroo being the water supply (via the Barron River) for many Tableland towns including Kuranda, Mareeba and Yungaburra, no direct advice was given about use of town water for human consumption. Should residents be advised to not drink town water for 14 days after the spraying? Is SunWater in breach of government legislation?

Department of Agriculture and Fisheries guidelines state, "in most cases the best management approach combines herbicide, mechanical, fire and biological control methods with land management changes". Were alternative or complimentary strategies investigated? Mechanical removal by hand or machine offers potential opportunities to stimulate the local economy through employment, as well as the use of harvested material, thereby transforming a problem into a potential resource. Another control measure would be prevention of nutrient flow into the lake. In combining such alternative controls, herbicide use may well become redundant or at least substantially reduced.





Fibre Art Workshop





Feed your Joints

And the mercury has plummeted! It's harder to get out of bed in the morning and harder to get moving. If you have painful joints anyway the pain may be magnified making even the simplest task, like getting dressed, seem like climbing Mount Everest.

There are some interesting theories being discussed in scientific circles including barometric weather changes and sensitized nerve endings.

Apparently even small changes in barometric pressure can trigger pain in injured and arthritic joints. So, grandma wasn't going mad when she said her knees were predicting a storm!

In cases of arthritis and inflammation natural supplements and pharmaceutical drugs most definitely have their place but let's look at what you can contribute from the kitchen side of things.

Essential Fatty acids:

These are super important to combat inflammation. And they are easily found in food! Oily fish like salmon, mackerel and sardines.

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They are also found in nuts and seeds. Make up a mix of almonds, walnuts, brazil nuts, pumpkin seeds and sunflower seeds to snack on throughout the day.

Turmeric/black pepper and ginger:

Turmeric is definitely a buzz word these days and found everywhere! But it really does live up to the hype as an anti-inflammatory! Add it to your curries, stews and even rice. But be sure to eat with black pepper.

When consumed together the bioavailability of tumeric's active ingredient is increased 2000% (not a typo, you read that right 2000%).

Ginger:

Also has anti-inflammatory properties and should not be overlooked as it is so easy to add into our diet. Grate a 5cm piece into a cup of boiling water and drink as a tea, grate it into your dinner, add a bit to a salad.

The opportunities are endless (and yummy).

Anti-oxidants:

Just eat lots of fresh fruit and veg folks! I sound like a stuck record, but yes, eat a rainbow every day. Antioxidants protect joints from damage by cleaning up free radicals and helping develop normal cartilage.

B vitamins:

Are an under-used resource in pain. They can reduce pain sensitivity so get eating oily fish (salmon, mackeral and sardines), avocado, wholegrains, brewer's yeast (but not from a stubbie), eggs and 'drum roll' organ meat... I lost a few there didn't I?

For those that are still with me add some kidney to your beef stew, fry up some liver and onions. Totally underestimated food and brimming with the most amazing nutrients.

Avoid inflammatory foods like coffee and alcohol, excess red meat (2-3 times a week is generally enough)and processed foods generally.

I know that may sound like a no brainer but have an honest look at what goes in your mouth and you may be surprised at what slips through!

Kuranda, it's time to wake up to Electric Ants!

THE NATIONAL ELECTRIC ANT ERADICATION PROGRAM (NEAEP), operated by Biosecurity Queensland within the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, is urging residents and business owners in Kuranda, Myloa, Kowrowa, Speewah and Koah to wake up to the real threat posed by electric ants (Wasmannia auropunctata).

NEAEP Program Coordinator, Gary Morton said our entire lifestyle here in the tropics was at risk.

"This highly invasive species poses serious health risks to our pets, our environment and to us," he said.

"They deliver a painful, venomous sting that can result in hospitalisation should the recipient suffer from anaphylaxis, and can cause blindness to our pets, with several cases having previously being reported.



"Given that electric ants also predate on sick and vulnerable wildlife, such as frogs, skinks and young hatchlings, we are particularly concerned for the Myola Tree Frog (listed as endangered under State and Commonwealth legislation) with a new infestation being detected within known habitat - an additional pressure on a species already under threat."


Since the first detection in 2010, 21 infestations of electric ants have been found in Kuranda and its adjacent suburbs, which is more than one in five of all the infestations found in Far North Queensland, and suggests that residents and business owners of the area do not understand the threat they pose.

Throughout March and April this year, NEAEP ran a four-week campaign appealing to the community of Far North Queensland to 'Join the ant hunt' and register their properties for a free yard check. The campaign was a huge success, with over 1700 people registering their properties for a yard check. Approximately 80% of the registered properties have been checked to date, with the remaining yard checks expected to be completed within the next few weeks.

Of the nine new infestations detected throughout FNQ during the campaign, three are within the Kuranda district, and were found during only 60 yard checks. As a result, the Program has decided to commence checks for electric ants on all properties located in Kuranda, Myola, Kowrowa, Speewah and Koah.

Residents and business owners in these areas can help us by allowing ease of entry to their properties and by telling us of any potential difficulties such as locked gates and dogs.

"It is incredibly important that every property is checked – if one property is missed, it could be the one with an infestation, thus jeopardising the entire program,'

Mr Morton said.

"Without any assisted movement, electric ants are incredibly slow moving. It is estimated that they only move up to 50 metres per year. As such, it is the people of Far North Queensland that continue to spread them through the movement of electric ant carriers.

"Electric ant carriers are anything that can harbour electric ants, the most common being pot plants, mulch, and green waste. Residents can help stop the spread by getting electric ant carriers checked by Biosecurity Queensland prior to moving them."

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

The Eyes Have It

THE EYES OF MINIBEASTS come in a spectacular range of shapes, colours and forms – they are very different than our own. Some minibeasts have excellent vision, and for others it is extremely poor, but it is safe to say that none of them see the world in quite the same way we do. Their eyes, however, are all perfectly adapted for their way of life. Whether it be on the wing or crawling through an underground burrow, minibeasts have ways of getting by – and many have remarkable visual abilities.

Insects have 'compound' eyes. Their eyes are made up of many tiny lenses, all combining to form an image. Some dragonflies have 29,000 individual lenses in their eyes and can see 360 degrees. It is quite a mind boggling thought from our point of view – imagine trying to cope with seeing everything at once! Nevertheless, dragonflies do it, and it allows them to fly with incredible precision and to catch other insects as they zoom through pond reeds at breakneck speeds.

The eyes of praying mantids are also compound eyes, but are arranged in such a way as to allow them to strike accurately to catch their prey. They too have vision which wraps right around them, but not quite as wide as the dragonflies. Mantids and many other insects have obvious 'pseudo-pupils' – a black dot in the eye. This dot seems to change position – an optical illusion which creates the impression the mantis is always watching you. This is a handy thing to have as predators sneaking up will think they've been spotted.


Spiders have very different eyes than insects. They have single lens eyes, rather than the compound eyes with most spiders having eight of these single eyes. Many spiders have tiny eyes and relatively poor eyesight, relying on their other senses, but some species have great eyesight. Jumping spiders and wolf spiders are two groups which have noticeably large eyes, and can see very well. Both these groups of spiders have their eyes spread right around their head, so like many insects, they too can see what is going on behind them.

Snails eyes are even a little more bizarre. Although their eyesight isn't great, it is good enough to allow them to find their way around. The remarkable part about their eyes is that they can retract them by turning them inside out – their eye-stalks (tentacles) actually invert when they are withdrawn, just like a rubber glove being pulled back inside itself.

So next time you are in the garden or out for a walk, take a moment to get eye to eye with one of our local minibeasts, and check out some of these amazing features for yourself.

Love is blossoming in the Nocturnal Wonders exhibit at Kuranda Koala Gardens now that Alice, the newest bilby, has settled in to her new home. The fiveyear-old arrived from Alice Springs Desert Park to keep male bilby Sunny company and the pair often sleep curled around each other. Sunny was living separately to his father Kalka, 8, as males often fight. Although Sunny is about six months older and twice the size of Alice, his girlfriend is becoming the boss of the enclosure. The nocturnal house tour is at 2.00pm daily when the bilbies get very excited about dinner time.

Sugar Gliders have been introduced to a new exhibit at Rainforestation in the Koala and Wildlife Park. Small LED lights have been added to the exhibit allowing visitors to see these cute little possums. The keepers make a special meal from mealworms and nectar which the gliders lap up. Sugar gliders have a gliding membrane, called a patagium, which extends from their forelegs to their hindlegs and acts like an aerofoil allowing them to glide 50 metres or more. Moving their arms up or down and adjusting the tension of the membrane allows the gliders to steer themselves from tree to tree.



Zane Saunders' Current Project

Kuranda's Visual Artist/Performer Zane Saunders is featured again at Kickarts this month, after his very successful exhibition/performance in May.

The official Opening Performance is scheduled for Thursday 12th July at Kickarts Gallery 1 from 2.00-4.00pm. Those attending can expect a visual feast from Zane's unique expressive use of a wide range of mediums and media to produce stunning and critically challenging work.

Nature's Rainforest Diary

Wander around the gardens at Skyrail's Smithfield and Kuranda terminals to catch a glimpse of the Cairns Birdwing Butterfly. It is the largest endemic butterfly in Australia, with females growing to more than 16cm. The males are very brightly coloured with patches of green and yellow on their wings, a bright red thorax and a yellow abdomen. The Cairns Birdwing relies on the native vine Aristolochia tagala as one of only two food sources for its caterpillars. The caterpillars store the toxins in the vine's leaves to use for defence against predators.

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Cairns Tropical Writers Festival will host a breakfast with awardwinning author, journalist and broadcaster Tracey Spicer AM as a fringe event at The Hilton in Cairns on Monday 23rd July 2018.

Well known as a national anchor newsreader with the Ten Network for 14 years, Tracey was sacked by email aged 39 in 2006 while on maternity leave. With speculation she was fired due to her age, she hired a lawyer, her ground-breaking fight about discrimination in the workplace making national news.

Spicer has produced and presented documentaries in Bangladesh, Kenya, Papua New Guinea, and India, and is an ambassador for World Vision, World Wildlife Fund for Nature, the Penguin Foundation, Dying with Dignity, Autism Spectrum Australia, QUT's Learning Potential Fund, ActionAid anti-poverty and global human rights agency, Domestic Violence NSW, and Karitane Parenting Services. She is Patron

of the NSW Cancer Council, the newborn care unit at the Royal Hospital for Women, Life's Little Treasures Foundation and the National Premmie Foundation, and the face of the Garvan Institute's research into pancreatic cancer, which claimed her mother.

Her advocacy has also seen her nominated for a Walkley Award, and in 2018 she was appointed as a Member of the Order of Australia, *"for significant service to the broadcast media as a journalist and television presenter, and as an ambassador for social welfare and charitable groups"*.



Describing herself as 'the bogun from Brisbane', last year she published her noholds-barred "femoir", *The Good Girl Stripped Bare*. In the book, Spicer is her usual defiant and outspoken self, given to hilarious public confessions as she nails the structural barriers facing women in the workplace. She encourages us all to "shake off the shackles of being the good girl".

In the wake of the scandals in the entertainment industry in Hollywood and elsewhere, Tracey has become the face of the #MeToo movement in Australia to break the silence. More than 1600 women across industries and backgrounds have contacted her with their stories involving over 100 men, 40 of them household names. This is actually a very small number of repeat offenders who have used their fame to avoid detection, until now.

Working with the police to bring them to court, Spicer has just launched *Now Australia* together with Tina Arena, Deborah Mailman, Sacha Horler, Clare Bowditch, Missy Higgins and a host of other women in entertainment to bring about permanent change. Equivalent of the *Time's Up* movement in the US, this is a service to support both men and women who have been sexually harassed, assaulted or intimidated in workplaces, putting them in touch with counsellors and lawyers.

Tracey's agitation since last October has now led to Sex Discrimination Commissioner Kate Jenkins announcing a national inquiry into sexual harassment in Australian workplaces, to bring about permanent change. **Breakfast bookings are essential.**

Women in Media FNQ, and the Media, Entertainment and Arts Alliance have supported Tracey's visit to Cairns. Tickets to the 23 July full breakfast from 7.00am-9.00am with Tracey Spicer AM are available for individuals, or friends and work colleagues can book a whole table. Collins Booksellers will be on site and Tracey will sign books after her presentation.

Local authors at the Cairns Tropical Writers Festival in August include Bill Wilkie, author of the The Daintree Blockade: the battle for Australia's Tropical Rainforest, winner Queensland Premier's Award 2017 for a work of State Significance, with the activism directly responsible for the World Heritage nomination of the Wet Tropics Rainforest, a decision that changed FNQ forever and fuelled its successful tourism future.

Also magistrate Cathy McLennan, whose book Saltwater: an Epic Fight for Justice in the Tropics won the Queensland Premiers Non-Fiction Award for 2017, as well as *The Courier Mail*'s People's Choice Queensland Book of the Year Award. It tell of Indigenous juveniles caught in the criminal justice system, her first-hand stories leading directly to changes in juvenile justice policies with Queensland.

And Far Northerner Nicolas Rothwell, whose Quicksilver book won the 2017 Prime Minister's Award for Non-Fiction.

"Mass slaughter of wedge-tailed eagles could have Australia-wide consequences" screams the headline. It seems in East Gippsland about 135 wedge-tailed eagles were poisoned because they may have been picking off the odd lamb or two.

This act was not only astoundingly cruel but also completely illegal and unnecessary.

If the unlikely justification was indeed true, then there were other ways to deal with it rather than a mass killing. Acts like these make me ashamed to be human. But what strikes me is not the facts of the act but rather how could the person who did this face themselves in the mirror? How can they live with their self or soul intact? Where is their integrity, their honour?

Will they be punished to fit this crime? Will we, as observers, call for it? What of all the other crimes we let go by? Cases are now being made for prosecution for crimes against future generations. Saying to our children that we didn't know about climate change or there wasn't enough evidence will not hold up in courts.

The World Future Council states: Actions which are so terrible that they put the very survival of life at risk or threaten the way of life of communities should be prohibited and prosecuted. When individuals act despite knowing the severe consequences of their acts or conduct on the long-term health, safety, or means

of survival of human populations, they are committing what we call a crime against future generations.

"In keeping silent about evil, in burying it so deep within us that no sign of it appears on the surface, we are implanting it, and it will rise up a thousandfold in the future. When we neither punish nor reproach evildoers... we

are ripping the foundations of justice from beneath new generations."


> It would see every soldier be a soldier for peace and rebuilding all that is broken rather than contributing to more destruction and death.


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with identifying just who is who in this humble trio. Parsnip, Swede and Turnip are in my opinion under rated and not nearly well known enough. Although all three are probably most often cooked by either boiling for mash there are plenty of other ways to enjoy the health benefits of these less common root vegetables. Tip: For the best odd mashes ever bake cut in large pieces in foil or a covered dish rather than boiling or steaming which can make them watery.

Parsnip (Pastinaca sativa) is a root vegetable closely related to the carrot and parsley. Native to Eurasia, it has been used as a vegetable since antiquity and cultivated by the Romans, although some confusion exists in the literature of the time between parsnips and carrots. It was used as a sweetener before the arrival in Europe of cane sugar. The parsnip is usually cooked, but can also be eaten raw. It is high in vitamins and minerals, especially potassium. It also contains antioxidants and both soluble and insoluble dietary fibre. It looks like a pale yellow large carrot, but I find its uses and flavour more akin to sweet potato.





Swede (*Brassica napobrassica*) is a root vegetable that originated as a cross between the cabbage and the turnip. The roots are prepared for human consumption in a variety of ways, and the leaves can be eaten as a leaf vegetable. The first known printed reference to the rutabaga comes from the Swiss botanist Gaspard Bauhin in 1620, where he notes that it was growing wild in Sweden. It is often considered to have originated in Scandinavia or Russia. Sometimes known as yellow turnip, it is both yellow outside and in.

Turnip (*Brassica rapa subsp. rapa*) is a root vegetable commonly grown in temperate climates worldwide for its white, bulbous taproot. The word turnip is a compound of tur- as in turned or rounded on a lathe and neep, derived from Latin napus, the word for the plant. Small, tender varieties are grown for human consumption. It has a partly purple outside and white flesh.



PARSNIP GNOCCHI via meatfreemondays.com (Serves 4)

Ingredients: 2 floury potatoes, 4 parsnips, salt, 2 tablespoons olive oil, ground pepper, ground nutmeg, chilli powder, 200g/11/2 cups very strong or first clear brown flour, 200g/3¹/4 cups breadcrumbs, ¹/2 bunch chives, 2 spring onions/scallions and flour for the work surface.

QUITE OFTEN when I take my "odd bunch" through the checkout I am asked to assist *Method:* Peel the potatoes and the parsnips and cut into 1cm/^{1/2}-inch cubes. Cook the potatoes and half of the parsnips in boiling, salted water for about 20 minutes until soft. Drain and leave to steam. Heat the oil in a frying pan and fry the remaining parsnips on a medium heat until golden brown. Remove the pan from the hob.

Mash the cooked potatoes and parsnips into a purée with the potato masher. Season well with salt, pepper, nutmeg and chilli powder. Mix in the brown flour and the breadcrumbs and work everything into a dough. Press the dough down flat and leave to cool in the fridge. Cut the chives finely. Wash and prepare the spring onions/scallions and finely chop. Form the gnocchi dough into long rolls on a floured surface. Cut into 2cm/3/4-inch pieces with a sharp knife. Form these into oval-shaped balls with floured hands and imprint with a fork. Cook the gnocchi in portions in boiling, salted water for about 4 minutes (they are done when they float to the surface).

Heat up the parsnip pieces again on a medium heat. Lift out the cooked gnocchi with a slotted spoon and mix with the parsnip pieces in the pan. Season again with salt and pepper and serve scattered with the chives and the spring onions/scallions. Or your favourite pasta sauce or a sprinkle of roasted pinenuts.

SWEDE PILAF adapted from <u>agenuiskitchen.com recipe</u> (Serves 8)

Ingredients: 1 tablespoon olive oil, 2 shallots, finely diced, 1 garlic clove, minced, 1¹/₃ cups basmati rice, 1/2 teaspoon ground turmeric, 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2²/₃ cups vegetable broth, 3 cups of peeled swede, medium diced, ¹/₃ cup pecans, chopped, 2 tablespoons fresh basil, chopped.

Method: Heat the oil in a saucepan over medium heat. Stir in the shallots and garlic, cook until slightly softened. Mix in rice, turmeric, cumin, salt and pepper. Cook stirring 1-2 minutes until spices are fragrant and rice is lightly toasted. Stir in the broth, bring to a low simmer and continue cooking for 5 minutes. Add the diced swede and continue simmering covered until all the liquid has been absorbed, about 15 minutes. Remove from heat and let stand 5 minutes. Gently fluff with a fork, stir in pecans and basil and serve.

TURNIP AND RED LENTIL SOUP WITH LEMON via vegansandra.com (Serves 4-6)

Ingredients: 4 tbsp oil, 2 onions, 400g turnip, 2 bay leaves, 200g red lentils (dried, uncooked), 6 cups (approx. 400 ml) boiling water, 2 heaped tbsp finely chopped lemon zest, 2-2^{1/2} tsp salt, 2 tbsp lemon juice.

Method: Heat up a thick-bottomed pot. Add some oil and chopped onions. Cook for a couple of minutes until the onions are slightly golden brown. Add peeled and cubed turnip, bay leaves, red lentils and boiling water. Boil for 12-15 minutes, until the turnip and lentils are soft. Add chopped lemon zest, salt and lemon juice. Cook for a couple of minutes. Serve with fresh parsley.

Methamphetamine Response:


There was good attendance at the March Rally in early April. There was a community survey through survey monkey open until 15th June 2018. There have been over 100 responses which will help inform the way forward. There is a need to ensure that a realistic approach is taken to ensure accurate information and effective methods of community input and participation.

The term that is recommended so as not to over sensationalise the issue is Methamphetamine rather than ICE and to work proactively to not stigmatise users or their families/friends. The early feedback from the community suggests that a range of approaches may be most effective including a facilitated public meeting to solidify key issues and questions.

Then an information session to address these and provide up to date information about services etc, and concurrently the development of support groups. In addition, there are regular meetings that are taking place at the amphitheatre on Monday afternoons with community groups which are willing to work with the Kuranda Interagency Network to coordinate a collaborative and holistic response. Notification of a public meeting will be made in the near future through flyers on noticeboards, Facebook and the next edition of *The Kuranda Paper*.

KNC No Interest Loan Scheme (NILS) Changes:

Good Shepherd Microfinance has drastically reduced funding which affects our capacity for loan applications and processing. For the time being we have been forced to reduce our loans down to 1 or 2 per week. Once the appointments are made we cannot do any more loans. We will inform the community when any future changes occur, as we are in negotiation with Good Shepherd and Shelter Housing Action Cairns, to work on a potential transition arrangement to increase access for Kuranda applicants.

QuIHN Counsellor:

A counsellor is at KNC on Mondays. Peter works as a psychologist for the Cairns Therapeutic Service offering a counselling service, providing support around drug use and mental health concerns, relapse prevention and management, referral to specialist services such as detox and rehab, self-care, stress management and enhancing motivation to change. There may also be some group sessions if there is demand. Referrals and appointments can be made directly to QuIHN on 4032 1463.

ARE YOU NBN READY? THE TIME TO ACT IS NOW

With the rollout of the NBN in Kuranda having completed nearly 15 months ago, the disconnection date for all analogue telephone and ADSL services is now looming.

NBN have provided migration areas with an 18 month period from service ready dates to switch off. This means that for most of Kuranda the forecast date of disconnection will be 14th September 2018!

NOTE: A little reprieve for some Kuranda Residents (in the Top-of the Range area), as your area only became active for NBN in Mid 2017, your switch off date is scheduled for January 2019 – but it is still a good time to prepare to make the switch if you have not already done so.

Alarmingly, little more than half of Kuranda has actually already migrated to the NBN, meaning that the time to act is NOW, otherwise you will be left behind!

What does this mean for you?

According to NBNCo the following services will be permanently disconnected for those living in 'fixed-line' NBN areas, if you don't arrange to move them to the NBN network before the advised date.

• All home and landline phone services (provided by Telstra or another provider)

• All ADSL, ADSL2 and ADSL 2+ Internet services

Note: disconnection does NOT apply to residents in NBN Fixed Wireless or NBN Skymuster Satellite areas. (These areas include Speewah, Koah, & Myola areas). You will retain a landline service IF you desire.

The only other exceptions to the switch-off are specialised business services such as ISDN lines, and previously identified services in place that are not yet compatible with an NBN service. These lines will be placed in to quarantine and disconnected later. You should have already received mail from NBNCo if this is the case.

As well as phone and internet, it is important to also consider other services running off the old copper network that will be affected after the switch off date. These include:

• Medical Alarms, auto diallers and emergency call buttons – Contact your alarm provider for advice.

• Monitored Security Alarm Systems - You may require an upgrade module to

communicate via the 3G/4G network or an IP module to communicate via your new NBN internet service.

- EFTPOS and health claim terminals Contact your service provider to upgrade to mobile or IP terminals
- Monitored fire alarms Contact your Fire & Safety installer
- Fax and teletypewriter devices You may need to upgrade these or purchase a fax compatible VoIP device to attach these to.

If your home or business uses any of the above equipment do not leave it to the last minute to determine if your setup is compatible or requires an upgrade. Time is running out and you won't want to be left with services that are not working.

What happens if you don't switch to the NBN?

Unless you are in an NBN Fixed Wireless or NBN Skymuster Satellite area, or in a small amount of areas that are in quarantine, the switch to the NBN is mandatory. If you do not switch, you run the risk of losing your home and business broadband internet and phone services.

What do I do now?

For most customers it is as easy as contacting your telephone and internet provider and asking them to make the switch. Since the evolution of NBN, there are over 300 providers out there all fighting for your business.

If you are out of contract with your existing provider, you may wish to shop around to find the best deal. Typically, a switch from ADSL to NBN takes approximately three weeks, and in most cases you will require a new modem compatible with VDSL and VoIP if you are keeping phone services active under the NBN.

Allow an additional 2 weeks if you are transferring or keeping your phone number too. (Note: keeping a home phone is optional after the switch).

DON'T, whatever you do, leave switching to the last minute. You will find that there may not be enough time to switch, and with the influx of people making the switch additional delays in switching may occur.



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FIRST OF ALL, I would like to congratulate all involved past and present on this the 300th edition of *The Kuranda Paper*.

Councillors Nipper Brown, Angela Toppin and I, as Councillors for the Mareeba Shire, will keep you informed about what is happening in your area by writing a monthly column.

I would like to start by telling you about my role in your community. Since 2016 when I was elected, I have been part of the Tourism Kuranda Advisory committee. Only being on this committee for a short period, I was appointed to the role of chairperson and I am very proud to work with such a dedicated team, who represent all facets of the tourism industry in Kuranda.

I am also the Council representative on the Speewah Residents Association, attending quarterly meetings to

update the association on what is happening in Council and listening to the residents' concerns. I really enjoy this part of being a Councillor, as residents get to speak with me face to face and know that they can all contact me with any concerns.

As a volunteer at the Kuranda Information Centre I try to get there at least once a month to keep my hand in and see what the tourists are asking about, as well as to meet the wide variety of tourists who come to Kuranda. However, I am very aware that yes, tourism is a huge focus for Kuranda but it is you the locals that I represent, so working alongside the local fellow volunteers at the Kuranda Information Centre is another great aspect as my role as Councillor. Enough about me.

BUDGET:

On Wednesday 20th June 2018, Council adopted its budget for the next financial year. Over the next 12 months, Council will invest \$12.9 million to improve and maintain roads and bridges across the Shire. Close to \$18 million will be spent on water, waste and sewerage – while community facilities, libraries and culture will receive a \$4 million boost.

In Kuranda, an additional \$1.9 million will be spent, sourced from the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund, to improve and to maintain Kuranda as a unique tourist destination.

KURANDA INFRASTRUCTURE MASTERPLAN:

Kuranda and surrounding areas will see quite a bit of heightened activity over the next year and a half, with some really exciting projects planned including:

Therwine Street upgrade	\$1,050 000
Barron River walking trails	\$2,000 000
Wayfinding signage	\$ 150,000
Centenary Park toilet refurbishment	\$ 200,000
Street furniture refurbishment	\$ 50,000

Therwine Street: The redevelopment of Therwine Street is part of the Masterplan which is designed to enhance the amenity of the Village and improve safety for motorists and pedestrians.

Works will begin next month on redeveloping upper Therwine Street with the lower part of the street to follow.

Street Furniture: Blacksmith artist Hans Pehl is doing an excellent job restoring the street furniture in Kuranda. Hans has spent months rejuvenating and restoring the unique iron fixtures back to their former glory.

DOG REGISTRATION RENEWAL:

Dog registration renewals are due on 30th June. Make sure your pets are registered to avoid risking a fine – but also to help our staff reunite you with your loved one if it makes a great escape. It is also just as important to let us know if any details of your dog's registration have changed – if you move house, you no longer own the dog, or you move away from the Shire, make sure you let us know so that we can update our records.

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

NTAC NRM Land Care (Ngyangabarra **Traditional Aboriginal Corporation**) is the recipient of National Land Care Programme Round 3 Plant 20 Million Trees Project 2018-2020. The leaders of this project are Thomas Gertz and Lorraine Lewis (pictured) .Their project engages trainees, landholders, community members, visitors and tourists, other community groups and local businesses to increase the area of a threatened ecological community. The project is located at the spring-fed head of South Cedar Creek in Ravenshoe which has been heavily cleared through agriculture for more than 138 years.

Their community project will restore the area by revegetating rainforest fragments in the landscape by planting out 25,000 native tree and shrub species to enhance connectivity between fragmented rainforest pockets on private land that connects with surrounding National Parks.

This will provide a safe haven and feeding grounds for protecting the threatened southern cassowary and other native fauna.

This sounds very similar to our **Connecting Cassowary Corridors** project, but much larger. We are supplying the project with as many trees as they need.

NTAC is expecting to complete Stage 1 by planting out 6,160 native species in the last week of June 2018 ending with a BBQ lunch hosted by the landholders David and Linda Hooper. Thomas Gertz will lead a cultural walk into the existing rainforest pocket of giant red cedars and a secret spring-fed waterfall.

It may save valuable time. Would you be able to accurately describe your location in an emergency? The majority of triple zero (000) calls are now made from mobile phones. People often aren't aware of their location, especially if they are in open space areas like beaches, parks or long stretches of road.

Unfortunately, unlike in the movies, it is not usually possible to readily pinpoint your location using your mobile phone in an emergency but the good news is you can — using a mobile app our friends at Fire & Rescue NSW have developed and have made freely available.


In a fight between Yellow Crazy Ants and Electric Ants, Electric win 6 feet down. Believe me you don't want them on your property, they will change your lifestyle, not to mention eliminate the wildlife, if left without controls.

- Funding for this pest ant eradication is limited and federal funding has already ceased.
- Don't delay. It's up to you, the land owner or tenant and down to two things:
- 1. Get your block checked for pest electric ants by Biosecurity. Its free to you. Ring 13 25 23 $\,$
- 2. Don't accept any plants from someone who hasn't had a clearance on their block. Don't be responsible for an S.T.P. (swap transmitted pest) tell your friend "thanks but no thanks"— if its not on, that plant is not (coming) on (your property).

And just for good measure, dunk any plant in water to float off any ants and spray the plant with a contact insect killer spray.

Come on Kuranda residents, you can do it.

Wordsearch explanation and dedication

The Bama of this area shared a common ngirrma, language. The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like archaic English 'aye' for 'yes'.

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have a people been able to reside continuously in the one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual word "bulmba" has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the world itself, time, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of year, the season, the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for this selection of words and to the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation for its work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

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
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A Thought for July

THIS month we read from St Mark's Gospel chapter 4 verses 35-41

Notice something in this month's reading. Whenever Jesus begins to speak in the scriptures about the kingdom of God, we may be sure of two things. What he is saying will sound very simple. Its images will be very familiar. We will think we understand it. But if we reflect on it in our minds, we will find a surprising thing happen. What he has said will yield more and more meaning to us.

In the passage Jesus image is once again simple. The kingdom is "as if a man should scatter seed upon the ground." Jesus points out how human participation in the process of nature is very largely one of spectator. This man sows at the beginning and reaps at the end of the process. In between those times the rhythm of life goes by. Jesus seems to be saying that there is much of the stuff of life which is not in our control. It demands our cooperation. It demands that we wait on the process. That is very true.

These days we are more involved in the processes of nature, sometimes disastrously so, as we well know! But we again have to learn that if we intrude too much, if we insist on manipulating and directing the process, refusing to wait on nature's time and pace and ways, we will bring real disaster. There are many levels of meaning in what Jesus says, but perhaps this is the level at which the scripture speaks most directly to us at this time.


The next image Jesus uses to speak about the ways of God, is that of the mustard seed. He wants to get across to us something we see coming true again and again. It's a kind of a joke life plays. We begin something. It is pitiably small. We smile at the possibility of it ever becoming significant, but time teaches us otherwise. A chance remark dropped in a conversation remains in someone's consciousness. Quietly it begins to affect their life until there is a very different person. A few people in an area begin to meet for prayer or Bible study or worship. Nobody thinks anything of it. Then the group begins to grow, and one day there is a congregation of Christians. Very often we can become discouraged about some Christian service we are doing. Clergy can have doubts. An RE teacher can wonder if his or her efforts are making the slightest difference. Parents can lack confidence, wondering why they seem to be abject failures with their children. And years later someone says thanks for a single afternoon, a fleeting encounter, a slight exchange of conversation, a forgotten insight shared. The mustard seed is suddenly seen to have become a great tree beneath which another human being, maybe many, have sheltered and been given resources for living.

We constantly forget that God comes in little things to which we accord no significance at the time.

The Stars in July
