LOCAL FIRE BAN

- I, ANTHONY JOHN HAZELL, Relieving District Inspector, Rural Fire Services, Queensland Fire and Rescue Service as delegate to the Commissioner of Fire Services and pursuant to Section 86A (1) of the Fire Service Act 1990 do hereby impose a local fire ban on the Local government area of Cairns, Cook, Douglas and Mareeba prohibiting the lighting of all fires in the said Local Government area with the following exceptions:
- 1. Fires within a properly constructed barbecue are permited, provided they are not left unattended (gas and electric barbecues may be used).
- 2. Fires for the purpose of disposal of animal carcasses are permitted, subject to the issue of a Permit to Light Fire by the local Fire Warden.
- 3. Fires of commercial necessity are permitted subject to the issue of a Permit to Light Fire by the rural Fire Services District Inspector.
- 4. Fires lit for the purpose of burning standing sugar cane for harvest in accordance with the established practice of the industry.
- 5. Fires lit for the purpose of burning tops and trash between the hours of 1800 (6:00pm) and 0900 (9.00am).

The local fire ban shall commence from 2400 hours (12.00am) on Thursday, 21 November 2002 and shall continue until 2400 hours (12.00am) on Thursday, 05 December 2002.

This was a great morning, with visitors from Kuranda, Tolga, Atherton, Mareeba, Innisfail, Babinda, Pt. Douglas and Mt. Molloy joining us to celebrate sixty-five years of service to QCWA and the community in general. Lots of goodies to eat and terrific prizes at the Mini Cent Sale. A pity the grounds look so dry as does the council park next to our hall, perhaps they may turn the sprinklers on shortly and green it up a bit.

Many members are still busy with craft - which ranges from card making to foundation patchwork, bobbin lace, brussels lace, snutki embroidery, aluminium embossing - to name just a few handcrafts being taught and learnt at our weekly craft mornings. The constant stream of ladies who came with food, fed tired fire fighters and left to return with more supplies; the tired yellow fire gnomes who fell asleep at 4.30 am beside the fire break while waiting for the last of the back burn to black-out to a safe stage, before they could go home to bed and arrive later that morning to begin all over again, checking breaks and trying to keep up with wild fires; the Year 12 student who arrived to help, went home for his end of year celebration only to return early next morning to put in a man sized effort of hot and tiring work.



A Thought for December

One of the aspects of the Christmas Story is the journeying and arrival of the Wise men, we can read about it in St Matthews Gospel Chapter 2 verses 1 to 12 This lovely and haunting passage might take our thoughts back to the shepherds on night of Jesus birth. The Shepherds that night had to make a decision about how they responded to the news they had been given. Likewise what is significant about the Wise Men is simply that they came. Presumably scores of other astrologers saw the same conjunction of stars. Presumably some wrote copious notes on the phenomenon. Others probably wrote learned papers for monthly meetings of colleagues! But only certain Magi decided to take a long and dangerous journey based on a hunch. Once again the Bible is telling us that the way of wisdom is to respond to those promptings in our lives which are possibly the calling of a loving God.

Obviously not everything that calls us is the call of God. Herod also called the Wise Men to search further for the child. He suggested that when they found the child they should bring him word. Quite rightly something made the Wise Men decide that there was something about this call which made it less valid than the one they were responding to. The all-important message for us is that we are wise about religious experiences in our lives only if we are prepared to evaluate them. To do so does not mean we are questioning God's way. Each of us is given many human powers to evaluate everything in our experience. To pretend we do not possess these powers or to acknowledge that we possess them and then to refuse to use them is not being a responsible

How do we decide that God is calling us to a certain course of action? Our first step is to realise and evaluate Saint Paul tells us to "test the spirits." That means that we must always evaluate

There are influences that are of God and there are influences that are otherwise. The latter arise from that part of our lives which has many names. The Bible refers to "the old man," and, one presumes, the old woman in our human nature. Saint Peter refers to the flesh that wars against the spirit in us all. By this he means far more than our body. Paul is telling us about all that part of our human nature which refuses to acknowledge the will of God and insists on our own will. If we wish to use Jungian language we would say that "the shadow" in our human nature issues many "calls" to us that can result in our destruction if we give ourselves entirely to them.

Having realized the hard necessity of testing the spirits that impinge on our lives we must then use to the full the resources which God has given us. It may sound very obvious to say so but we can begin with some hard disciplined thinking about the particular direction in which we feel called. At the same time we can commit that thinking to God in prayer, asking that our thinking be guided toward the discovery of God's will for us. We can also turn to other people whom we trust, friends who understand what it means to seek the will of God about some course of action to which we feel called. If we are a member of some group, a Bible study group or a prayer group, we might consider sharing our need for guidance with them. In the end we must make our decision. But if we have carried out the process just described we will have made a responsible Christian choice. Such a choice Our Lord will accept and respond to. Our Lord's response will be the gift of his grace to enable us to live out the consequences of our decision. Many voices try to guide and shape our lives. When is a call God's call? How do we decide?

This was a special celebration for that group of students who had made the transition from baby faced year 8's when Kuranda High opened in 1998 to mature young adults about to take the next important step in their life journey. I enjoyed the opportunity to congratulate them all wish them well in their chosen careers. Congratulations go also to parents for a job well done and to staff for preparing these young people with the knowledge and skills they will need as they make their way in life. Best wishes and thanks to our foundation school principal Jenny Jensen for your wonderful commitment and dedication over the last 5 years – the love and caring you have shown over that time is a gift that I'm sure will shape students lives for many more years to come.

The year has seen a number of important new developments for the Kuranda community that will continue to bear fruit in 2003. The Kuranda Neighborhood Centre now offers a comprehensive range of services from the cottage on the corner of Barang Street. Part time coordinator Cherry Ferrari has played an important role in fostering interagency cooperation and building bridges between the indigenous and non indigenous community in Kuranda. Next year I will be working with Council and a range of local organizations including the Neighborhood Centre to establish a community centre that they can call home.

Improvements in health, housing and infrastructure for Kuranda's Aboriginal communities has been one of my priorities this year and the work underway at Koah, Kowrowa and Mantaka will make a big difference. The first stage of the housing redevelopment at Top Kowrowa will start next year following extensive community consultation. The establishment this year of the Kuranda "Negotiating Table" in which representatives of the Aboriginal community work with government agencies to improve services and achieve their economic, social and cultural goals should see further runs on the board next year. However, there has been some sadness

this year with the loss of loved ones. The loss of elder Lance Riley being a particular blow to the community. My sincere sympathies go to Joy and all the family.

Special thanks to Dr Dave Cumming for taking the plunge and committing to the building of a whole new medical center for Kuranda. Queensland Health will rent space in the building and the whole community should benefit from this partnership with an improved range of both private and public health services over time.

Kuranda Arts Coop has been busy this year, not just with moving around town (!) but with artists getting into the export market with the Craft Connect project seeing their work in demand in Singapore. I also heard that the guests at the new Liberty Resort have been buying up big time!! I hope that is a good sign for the future for our local talent.

Tourism business should pick up for everyone next year with the additional Australian Airlines flights from Asia. The redevelopment of Lower Coondoo Street should be ready for the next season with work kicking off at the end of February. This will really transform the main street with new paving, landscaping and underground power. Local art will also be integrated into the work and for a preview of what might be in store come along at 5.30pm 9th Dec at the CWA hall. The completion of this project together with the new bus parking area in Arara St will see the completion of all the major infrastructure projects funded by the tourist levy.

Organic Growing

Like everyone else my plants are hating the drought. The extra watering is a nighmare for me. Put lots of mulch around the fruit trees to stop them drying out after watering. I've just heard about a product called "water crystals" which is supposed to hold water around plants. Has as they come up something eats them. They just any reader any information on this product? Please ring me. dissappear. I have also had rats eat my tomatoes. With Shadecloth over vegetables and other delicate plants help them to cope with the dry conditions. I've used this with great success in the past.

Of interest to Mareeba Council is the use of lemon scented Geraniums to absorb toxic waste from contaminated soil. Apparently this plant thrives in these conditions. A tip for everyone disposing of plastic bags. Always tie them in a knot, if they happen to escape into the environment they are less likely to be a threat to animals.

Gardening Tips

~ Seed Saving ~

I have been asked about how to keep your own seeds and storing them. First I'd like to clear up a myth about keeping seeds. There are two types of plants - open pollinated and hybrids (not including G.E.)

Open pollinated means plants which are bred from the same plant or same species of plants. A hybrid plant comes from two open pollinated plants, usually different varieties, of the same species and are usually manually pollinated.

The breeders will take part of the flower from plant A and pollinate plant B. They are usually quite different plants . Plant A might have high resistance to a disease and plant B might be a good producer, so by hybridising they can get a good producing plant with high disease resistances. The thing is, when you plant the seeds from the hybrid, you will get either plant A or B or sometimes in between, not the hybrid. They have to cross-pollinate every year to keep getting seed for the hybrid plant.

On the farm we try to keep as many seeds from our own plants as possible by using open pollinated plants. We select the best looking plant and the best fruit on each plant each year.

If you want to keep your own seed it is important to let the fruit grow until it is over mature, almost going rotten. This is so you get the best germination rate of the

THE KURANDA PAPER Dec 2002 Page 7 seed. Cut open the fruit and scoop the seed out into a bucket. Wash it two or three times, each time letting the seed sink to the bottom and pour off the water, pulp and any floating seed. After washing the seed, place it on some paper or flyscreen to dry. Move the seeds gently as they dry to prevent sticking to each other and whatever you have put them on.

After they are dry put them into a bag or bottle, label showing the date and what they are. We also like to put inside the bottle a note in case the label gets damaged or fades - its hard to remember what you did 12 months ago if there is a variety of seeds! I have found the best place to keep seed is in the bottom of the fridge. It's not too cold, and the temperature is consistent. I have kept seed for four to five years in a fridge and had very good germination after that time.

)Another thing to keep in mind when keeping your own seed is they can sometimes be pollinated by your neighbour's plants. E.g. if they have cherry tomatoes flowering at the same time as your bullock heart tomatoes, it is possible to get cross pollination with them by bees and other insects. I am not going to guess what sort of tomato you would get from that cross! So if you can plant earlier or later than your neighbours, or talk them into growing bullock hearts too ...

HYDROPONIC GARDENING

I have been growing greens for the chooks in my hydroponic set up. They love warrigal greens, watercress etc. I also grow purslane, which is like a weed but is one of the only vegetables to have Omega 3.

I am having trouble raising seedlings. As soon no rain all the animals are hungry.

My Paw Paw tree in the ground is still only about half the size (both in width and height) as the hydroponic one. Lettuce and herbs are doing well. Basil looks beautiful, with all the different colours and shapes.

I am continually adjusting my nutrient mix as the bore water is more concentrated and has a higher salt content as well as the water content evaporating. Most plants are coping though, my capsicum looks like a Xmas tree with decorations. For Information

GETTING AHEAD OF THE GAME

Within the next two months, Mareeba Shire Council's new Plan for the shire will be referred to the public for comment. This is the time to take a close look at what you want for our area, where you think residential development should be and should not be.

From time to time, we receive distress calls from people worried that someone has cleared their block wall-to-wall. Are there any laws to stop this? Why buy forested blocks if they wanted cleared ones?

In most Rural Residential, Park Residential (Top of the Range Estate) and Urban zones, there are no restrictions to land clearing. That's because when the plans and the Local Laws that go with them were made, we (with our local knowledge) did not let Council know that certain areas are environmentally precious and therefore not suitable for such development. Now, when people who don't recognise and appreciate the value of their forested blocks choose to clear all the vegetation, we're on our back foot. They're not breaking the law, and we can just look on in dismay.

We, as a community, need to get ahead of the game. This can be done by getting our heads around the planning documents which Council has prepared (and the State Government vetted) at the time they come to us for comment. This is about to happen in the Mareeba Shire.

KURANDA *EnviroCare* will conduct a series of small workshops for people who are interested in understanding what the plans mean and how they can make Council aware of their concerns. We'll have these workshops on different days and times so that you'll get a chance to come to at least one of them. There may not be a Kuranda Paper in January in which we can let you know about these workshops, so if you give us a call on 4093 8834, we'll put you on a list to contact when the plans come out for public consultation.

Land for Wildlife Revival

We are pleased to report that the Land for Wildlife program is about to enjoy a rebirth in this area, with a number of members of KURANDA **EnviroCare** undergoing training to assess properties. We've also received a cheque for the first stage of a project to desludge and revegetate the Oueen and Dismal Creeks mouths. This will involve constructing a track over the creeks for the horse riders.

Amphitheatre Dear Members & Friends.

Again, it's been a busy month for the Amphitheatre. At our last meeting with Council it was agreed that as the Amphitheatre is listed on Councils' Asset Register, that Council is liable for all of the Amphitheatre land, buildings and permanent fixtures!!! This means we only have to insure for Amphitheatre activities and contents. Obviously, this will cut our costs immensely. The final forms were sent to the Insurance Taskforce (AO Risk Services, Suncorp & Old Govt) on 11 November and we expect an answer within the next two weeks. Unfortunately, we can't give a reopening date as yet, but we are getting closer. At present, the Hirer must bring own Public Liability Insurance for the event and Council is liable for the rest. The Amphitheatre is required by law (for insurance purposes) to conduct a Risk Assessment by a certified company. This is a huge cost, and Idocc Consultants in Brisbane are conducting this assessment free of charge! We started the Risk Management process in August, and because of the continual work being done in the Amphitheatre grounds by members of Council, we are well on the road to satisfying the needs of a Risk Assessment. Our Lease is now with Councils' solicitor, who is looking at amendments we have requested to Causes 13 & 14. We are hoping that we can have amendments made to these clauses because if a new Lease is required, it will cost the Amphitheatre in solicitor fees etc. Councils' request for a Business Plan is well under way, with the assistance of Michael Lawrence (Old Regional Business Advisor - Tableland Economic Development Corp. Inc.). The committee has decided to name this a Development Plan, in keeping with the fact that the Amphitheatre is not business, but a notfor-profit community organisation. This requires members & community input. We have conducted surveys throughout the year, and these items have been incorporated in the Development Plan. A community consultation process is next, and Michael Lawrence has kindly offered to facilitate this meeting free of charge. So watch the notice boards for this date, where the community can obtain information about the aims, goals etc of the Amphitheatre and also offer input as to neighbour and community ideas.

The prize for our last raffle was a beautiful hand-painted tablecloth by Rob Walton, which was won by Leith Silva. Congratulations Leith and thanks Rob! John Lockyer has kindly donated a painting for a Christmas raffle, which will be at the Kuranda Village Coffee Sop soon. Thanks to all of the people who use the donations pot at the Coffee Shop. One again, a big thank you to the Coffee Shop management and staff. Greg & Lora have been a great support to the Amphitheatre this year. There is a good possibility that TAFE, in conjunction with the Amphitheatre, may use the venue next year for classes. 



News from the neighbourhood centre

Hello everyone, It's been another busy month at the centre and, as the end of the year approaches, a time to evaluate what we've done and how far we've come as well as to acknowledge how much more there is to accomplish, for, and with, the Kuranda community. At recent service assessment with the Old Dept. of families (who provide the modest funding) concluded that KNC is well and truly doing what it is supposed to do, that is: co- ordinate and develop local network, provide community education, groups and courses, offer information, referral, advocacy, support and counselling. In addition, as many of you would know, the Neighbourhood Centre provides and inexpensive book exchange, super-cheap photocopying and a free selection of pre-loved clothing and home wares. One of the services that may have to cease in the new year is the provision of emergency food parcels to needy families and individuals. fact or fiction..what the medical evidence suggests.

Can I protect my children against meningitis?

Meningitis is a life threatening disease, causing infection of tissue around the brain & spinal cord. It is caused by either bacterial or viral agents, the former generally more serious. There is no immunisation available against viral meningitis. The bacterial causes are nasty and one of the commonest is the somewhat confusingly named Meningococcus. Other bacteria include Haemophilus & Streptococcus. Meningococcus comes in various stains; A,B,C & W135 with B & C the most serious. No vaccine is available against B but subtype C, which is significant cause of disease & death in children under 4 yrs and adolescents, has been the focus of much research. The old vaccine offers life-long protection. Any patient over the age of one year requires just a single immunisation, Children aged between six weeks & one year can be immunised but requires 3 needles. A national immunisation program was introduced in the UK in 1999. Data from the Communicable Disease Surveillance Centre in London suggests that the cases of Meningitis C have fallen by 85-88%. In summary a new Conjugate vaccine is now avail ale to offer your child life-long protection against one of the most virulent strains of meningitis.
