I started the first week that the old Centre opened in May 1996, but there are other unmentioned volunteers who also started in the first year who are still loyally working to this day.

Djabugay Gerald Hobbler welcomed us and the Aboriginal dancers reinforced that welcome in a 'dance of the Emu Eagle meeting of the two tribes'.

The Mayor, Tom Gilmore, of the Mareeba Shire Council, opened the new Centre and the CEO, other councillors from both Mareeba and the Tablelands Regional Council were present for this wonderful day. Tom brought to everyone's attention the dedication and hard work over and above what could have been expected from our amazing team leader, the boss, Cathy Harvey, and the committed volunteers without whom the Kuranda Information Centre could not operate. The new Centre with its ample space where we will finally be able to display more articles depicting local interests and abilities, starting with 'Silas' the seven

foot crocodile, Wet Tropic murals, Aboriginal artefacts and products made from local artist. Congratulations was given to Osborne Construction for bringing the Centre in under time and under budget, money partly supplied by the Kuranda Tourism Infrastructure Levy derived from Skyrail and the Kuranda Train, as well as the Council.

It hasn't been an easy, quick path to bring about our new Centre; three previous designs and budgets have been drawn up over the years when Kuranda came under the Mareeba Council, and it is to the credit of the Tablelands Regional Council which finally made the new Centre happen and to Jenny Jensen, who made sure that the contract for the construction of the Centre was signed before Kuranda returned to the Mareeba Council.

What a wonderful day. So many volunteers turning up in our many different coloured uniform, as well as officials and just plain interested locals, enjoying the excitement of the day, the sunny weather, and the huge afternoon tea: scones with jam and cream supplied by Fudge Shop, delicious fruit cakes, cakes and more cakes, whipped up so easily by the cooks in our own centre. Finally the purple ribbon, matching our first official uniform was cut with outsized shears, and the 'celebratory 1st Birthday cake for the Centre' sliced into mouth size pieces, the official part of the afternoon was over. But few of us left: we were just so excited and happy that the building that I thought I would never see built in my lifetime had finally come about.



# **Memorial Plaque Found**

If you ever doubted the power of our local community paper to connect us in an incredibly real way here is reason to put that doubt away. Even in the digital age there is nothing quite so effective as the paper in your mailbox. The Kuranda Paper, in the last edition, ran my request for photos which might help to have a copy of the old 1952 brass Battle of The Coral Sea memorial re-installed on the sad, bare concrete plinth at the Lookout on the Kuranda Range. This plaque "went missing" a number of years back and was considered lost probably forever. Within hours I had a phone call from a local person to say they had the plaque - which had been found abandoned in a bush camp, probably left there by the person/s who had removed it from the plinth – and were so pleased to be able to hand it over with a hope it might lead to a re-installment of the memorial. This person is not online and without the help of *The Kuranda Paper* our connection would probably have never happened. The plaque itself – which has been touched by so many travellers' hands over the decades – is intact but quite damaged. Like all things from my past the object itself seems smaller and more humble than I remembered it. And obviously vulnerable. It would be foolhardy to just put it back – even if it could be repaired enough – but I do think there must be a 21st century solution so that future travellers, as well as those with more direct connections to the Battle of The Coral Sea, can experience the sense of history and place the memorial provided for so many years. I am hopeful that can be achieved. And that bare plinth put to its proper use again. Thank you to the person who found it, the person who saved it and *The Kuranda Paper* for helping us to connect the dots. No thanks obviously to the ratbags who removed it of course.

# From December through to May,

those Skyrail travellers who stretch their legs at Red Peak Mid-Station will notice the imposing bulk of the golden orb weaver spider. These showpiece spiders may also be seen at other locations around Kuranda. Golden orb spiders are conspicuous for their size. Their legs, which are black with golden bands, grow to 10cm ensuring the spider is about 20cm wide. Their colossal webs can span several meters and have numerous strands of gold which glint in the sun.

Although their diet consists almost entirely of insects, golden orbs are opportunistic feeders. Small birds such as silvereyes and finches will not escape the incredibly strong web of this species. In the event of a bird or even a young snake becoming ensnared, the golden orb subdues its prey by injecting venom.

If you are close to the web, look out for a small red spider. This is the male of the species which is roughly one-fiftieth of his spouse's size. Also look out for other small spiders which resemble the male golden orb, but are not quite the real thing. These are likely to be female dewdrop spiders which are impersonating male golden orb spiders in order to feed on scraps. The female tolerates these imposters as they serve as charwomen to safeguard web hygiene.

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# Kuranda Cohousing Project A Village Within the Village in the Rainforest

# A village within the village in the Kainforest

You may have heard from others or seen the advertisement in a previous Kuranda paper that there's some sort of new housing project going on in Kuranda.

A group of friends and acquaintances got together three years ago and started planning a not-for-profit, intentional village of houses for a residential block 20 minutes walk from Kuranda's main street. We spoke of aspirations for this planned community, how we could live more lightly on the planet, sharing our creative energy, fun, imagination and resources, knowing our neighbours, and working together to share in the rewards both tangible and psychological. We defined the physical features of our community as well and set to work at monthly meetings to go through a well-defined and used method called "cohousing" to progress building this community

After three years of much thought and hard work we now have a council development approval which defines the layout of the houses and council services such as water, sewerage and storm water. But there's still much to do – colour schemes, external building treatments, landscaping design and house internals are to be completed. Policies for things such as community contributions, pets and renting. We also have come to the point where we can start to bring the permaculture ethos into being, with things like community gardens, orchard and chooks, workshop and craft room design.

So we're looking for more people to join us in this mind expanding experience as we pool our life experiences to build a cooperative neighbourhood for mutual benefit, that is a comfortable sustainable living arrangement at reduced cost, enhanced by open communication, sharing of resources and a spirit of cooperation.


Here's some of what we believe this intentional community can offer:

- It's open to all ages to build this sustainable neighbourhood, as cohousing has been designed to be both a support for working families right through to a better retirement solution,
- You can be as private when you wish or engage your neighbours to the extent that you want, it's like living on a lifestyle block (nearly 8 acres) but with a group of like minded people to share the work and the rewards,
- You will be part of the management of the community council and your efforts will be rewarded by reduced fees and a sense of achievement,
- You can live in park like surroundings close to the heart of the Kuranda village, within walking distance,
- It will be possible to organise shared meals on a dinner roster, where shared meals mean more opportunities to spend time with the family,
- · A more secure physical environment for kids,
- Communal chores will be equitably distributed breasted on your interest and time constraints,
- · Overflow visitors can be accommodated on site in the common house,
- You can take on projects in the shared craft room and workshop, sharing tools
  where possible, recycling will be built into the running of the community,
- · Permaculture based gardens with chooks for fresher, cheaper food,
- It will be energy conscious with solar PV, electric car connections, shared equipment, volume discounts.

Residents will gain skills in active listening, conflict resolution and consensus decision making to engender a respectful, supportive community.

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

# The Iceland Adventure

Iceland is a long way away from Australia. On the way to Iceland we stopped off in Brisbane, Singapore and Copenhagen.

We arrived in Copenhagen around 9am. When we had finished getting all our bags, we went with one of Mum and Dad's old friends. We went to breakfast at a café and then went on a boat tour. On the boat tour we saw the Parliament, the Opera House, The King and Queen's Palace, one of Denmark's most famous company's headquarters and of course: 'The Little Mermaid'. Iceland Air does not give free meals, snacks, drinks or head phones to adult passengers. Paul Oscar, all the girls were really psyched! Each day we had some activities to do (like archery, mountain biking, sword fighting, rockclimbing and abseiling) and some free time (to trade badges, eat ice cream, hang out with friends).

Each night there was an activity. Here are some: The Big Game, Time Bandits, National Campfire. In The Big Game there were challenges like 'Who can light a fire fastest' and 'Knot tying challenge'. In Time Bandits you had to do activities and if you completed them the hosts would give you a bottle of soft drink so you could refill the hour glass (at the Jamboree there was a giant hourglass...each night some of the staff would dress up as bandits and raid the hourglass of some of the soft drink so there was room each day for us to add to it). When the Wizard arrived in Iceland he saw that Iceland was guarded by four guardians: a troll/giant in the south, a dragon in the east, an eagle/griffin in the north and a bull in the west. The Wizard went back and told the Chief of Denmark not to invade because the four guardians were not to be messed with!

On the way back from the Jamboree we had three nights in their capital Reykjavik. We did our laundry in a Laundromat café. Lazaretto: Jack White Third Man Records 2014

ack White, without apologies, has always been his own man: deeply in writing, singing, playing lead guitar and producing. On his second solo album he's performed some special alchemy, producing a rich, intense and engrossing display of a songwriter/performer at the height of his wizardry. It's a diverse set; there's heavy electric rock infused with jazzy bass and power chords, glittering country folk, and rollicking bluesy 'Stonesy' piano-ed up rockers.

White has never been short of strong material so this 11 song album contains a few instant classics, rockin party song 'Lazaretto', the massive electric blues spooky psych-out of 'Hill Ball Stepper' and the cheeky funky power rock of 'Three Women'. His respect for the genuine and impeccable taste in the playing and arrangements let him indulge some very entertaining melodrama; check out 'Would You Fight for My Love?' Expertly setting up moods and situations, he is often theatrical, even funny, but always tough. His patented snotty punky lyrics & attitude and unique singing style steer him onto the right side of real.

Jack White has always maintained a retro, home-spun ethic somewhere

between the farm and the bar-room, so it is no surprise there is country and folk here. Tracks like 'Entitlement' and 'Temporary Ground' glow with fiddle,

slide guitar and vocals echoing Gram and Emmy Lou are delivered with the easy authenticity of a true pro. And 'Alone in My Room' is as a perfect radio friendly modern folk rock song as you would want to hear.



# **How Important Is Correct Alignment**

WHEN TEACHING KIDS, the understanding of alignment can be a little relaxed. Kids don't need to perfect their pose or focus too much on impeccable form. Children learn through experimenting and movement so keeping poses as fluid as possible creates a better environment for learning and self inquiry. There are poses, however, where proper positioning is key to avoiding injury or weakness in joints and other areas of the body. Over time knees, ankles, wrists, elbows, necks and spines can all be damaged if a pose is done incorrectly. This can lead to pain and tenderness in the joints – sometimes even showing up later in life. In this regard proper alignment does have an important role in yoga for kids. There are usually two or three important alignments for most poses in a kids yoga class. Here are our top five.

Warrior 1 and 2. Standing poses can be strong for the knees. In this pose the feet need to be positioned correctly and the front leg bent at a right angle. This makes the thigh parallel and the shin perpendicular to the floor. To keep the knee safe make sure the bent knee is stacked over the ankle, then direct your knee cap to be in line with the second toe. The knee must not go beyond this point and lean out over the toes or to either side. Knees don't often show immediate strain, only later do you realise you pushed too much.

**Tree Pose.** A great pose for balance but can also be bad for knees. Never place the foot of your bent leg onto the knee joint. Make sure to place it above or below the knee. Being a hinge joint it does not like to be pushed side ways. This can create pain, weakness and injury over time.

Wheel. This pose is attempted at the end of class when the spine and upper back have been warmed up. It can be hard on the wrists and also the neck when coming out of the pose. To keep wrists safe make sure fingers are pointing towards the feet before lifting up into Wheel. When coming back down, tuck chin to chest to lengthen the neck and keep it free from tension or injury.

**Shoulder Stand/Candle.** A favourite for kids especially if you blow on their feet to try and extinguish the 'candle flame' of wiggling toes. The alignment for this pose is to make sure the neck is safe. The eyes need to be looking at the toes, to keep the head from rolling to the side.

Headstand/Dolphin. The kids beg to do headstands but we don't attempt it in a kids class. Mainly for the safety of little necks. Kids are very eager to show you they can stand on their head but often this is done without taking the weight into the upper body first. This leaves the neck taking the strain. We do teach prep headstand which is also known as dolphin pose. In dolphin

pose the children get a feel for how much weight they still need to lift in order to come into headstand without effort or injury.

Yoga should never be painful. If there is tension or too much effort the body can become tight, leading to injuries. The key to a beneficial yoga practise is to keep the body free from tension, creating openness and spaciousness. Only go so far as to feel a good stretch. Once at that point use the breath to go deeper. Don't push or force your body. One yoga teacher explains proper alignment as if you are ironing a shirt. "It is easy to iron in a crease but much harder to iron it out again".

Meaning that it is harder to undo a bad habit than to practise the correct way from the very start.

The most recent animals into care at BatReach are two orphaned Musky Rat-kangaroos (Hypsiprymnodon moschatus) – their mother killed by a cat.

Inhabitating a limited range of tropical rainforest, the Musky Rat-kangaroo is the smallest of the macropods with an adult weight of approximately 530 grams. It is usually active early morning and late afternoon, foraging in leaf litter for rainforest fruits, seeds and insects. Normally two young are raised, staying in the pouch for approximately 20 weeks.

The natural predators of the Musky Rat-kangaroo include birds of prey, pythons and quolls. It is also susceptible to attack by cats and dogs.

These unobtrusive marsupials are sometimes misidentified as bandicoots, possums, even rodents! They are, however, unique to our tropical rainforest habitat.

Amy and Ivy (pictured) will be raised and eventually released back to the wild.

**CTOBER** and gardeners, with an eye to tomorrow, are mulching for the drier months ahead to conserve soil moisture, keep roots cool and continue to add to the tilth of their soils. Often however, the golden footed scrub fowl and bandicoots find the mulch layer brings their evening repasts to the surface so be prepared for holes dug, large and small.

**WEED OF THE MONTH: A Possibly Potential Weed?** The Horseradish Tree, *Moringa oleifera*, also known as the Drum Stick or Miracle Tree is increasingly in the news. Coming from the foothills of the Himalayas, this tree is being widely planted in South America and famine stricken African States as much of the plant is edible by humans and farm stock. The leaves are rich in protein, vitamins A, B and C and minerals. Feeding the high-protein leaves to cattle has been shown to increase weight gain by up to 32% and milk production by 40%+. Products derived from *Moringa* are increasingly being introduced in alternate health-care products and also its considerable potential for biodiesel fuel production is rapidly being developed.

Easily germinated from seed and cutting with rapid growth to 10m, *Moringa* has a deep tap root and can grow in dry and poor soils with leaf and seed production increasing with moisture. Trees are usually pruned for more compact growth and increased leaf yield. Its large seed load ripens during the Dry and can be dispersed by rain and water-run during the Wet. Seed dispersal and dumped prunings (bird dispersal risk unknown) pose a potential threat with currently ongoing weed risk assessment by Biosecurity Queensland.







**PLANT OF THE MONTH: Impatiens** (cont.) Another
Impatiens with striking leaf
patterning is *I. omeiana* and its
variant "Silver Pink". Hailing again
from China, this plant appears not
yet to have been introduced into
Australia.

At least two Impatiens introduce that most elusive of floral colours – the blue-purple range. Impatiens *I. namcharbarwenisis* was discovered in 2003 from two colonies in the world's deepest canyon, the Tsangpo Gorge in Tibet. This increasingly much sought-after bright true-blue beauty is seemingly of easy cultivation and seed is sometimes available from O/S vendors although germination may take in excess of six months.

Impatiens arguta with several variants, comes from Nepal and is another sought-after species with increasing reports of its climatic tolerance, however seed is seldom available. Shaded placement and cooler nights seem primary requirements for successful cultivation for all Chinese and Himalayan species although some 40 years ago, I saw I. arguta used as a bedding plant shaded only after 2pm. in the S ydney Botanical Gardens.

I. flanaganae is an endangered species from South Africa with large rosy pink orchid-shaped blooms atop 1m+ red stems arising from quickly multiplying red tubers and goes dormant in the cold months. Seed is sometimes available on-line at <a href="http://www.ebay.com.au/usr/strange\_wonderful\_things">http://www.ebay.com.au/usr/strange\_wonderful\_things</a>

This very reliable eBay seller carries many rare and extraordinarily beautiful plant introductions.

Another fascinating aspect of Impatiens are the several caudex forming species from Africa, Madagascar Thailand. Impatiens tuberosa, from Madagascar, can make a 20+cm fat caudex, enabling survival in the dry. Multibranching with orchid-shaped blooms of vivid magenta, with yellow and red markings inside the white throat, it makes an excellent potted specimen. Even more striking is *I. mirabilis* from limestone cliffs in coastal Thailand. Fairly quick and tall growing

to 3m, single thick trunked carrying mixed deep pink and white flowers or, more rarely, yellow on long racemes, it has the usual explosive seed dispersal. Reputedly it has the longest and thickest leaves of all Impatiens species, dropping these in too cool or dry conditions. Plants are available locally from Equatorial Exotics. Again from limestone cliff faces in Thailand is the even rarer yellow flowered *I. pengklaii*.

Finally and easily the most sought-after and extremely rare Impatiens is *I. psittacina*, the Parrot Flower. This was first discovered at the end of the 1800s in Upper Burma and reported in very small (possibly extinct in some) areas in North Thailand (near Chiang Mai), Burma, and in the north-east Indian state of Manipur. With its striking colours of light purple, carmine and green, and flowers from the side resembling parrots in flight, such is I. psittacina's rarity that the Thai Government prohibits any export of its seed or plant material. Good hunting then!



With an estimated 1000+ Impatiens species and new discoveries still being recorded, this diverse family certainly provides interest and challenges to the dedicated gardener.

# **Creative Dance links Kuranda Youth**

INSPIRATION for the Dance and DJ classes at the Kuranda Amphitheatre originated from the genuine enthusiasm of a group of Kuranda State College girls. During a day of supply teaching the students implored me to open the dance room for practice during morning break and lunch time. When I asked them if they did any dance classes outside of school they said there weren't any classes being held in Kuranda and that they would have to travel to Cairns.

I know young people in our community for whom travelling to Cairns for dance classes is not an option. Besides, opportunities for creative expression and socialising are key to a vital, healthy, connected community.



Dance classes bring together young people with similar interests from local schools and from different sociocultural backgrounds. We miss out on this 'community' benefit if we have to travel so far.



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


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# Nothing To Fear

**THERE IS A CURIOUS CONDITION** among human beings all over the world that is characterised by an aversion to dark crevices, dusty alcoves and walking through trees. It is an aversion to the silent but speedy scuttling of unseen creatures, or to 'large', hairy animals with more than the usual allocation of legs. It is a fear of fangs sinking into one's flesh, or losing sight of something that was there, and then suddenly was not. It is a condition known as *Arachnophobia*.

The fear of spiders and, to a lesser extent, other arachnids, is arguably the most common phobia in the world. A bizarrely large amount of people suffer from a fear of what, for the most part, are utterly harmless creatures. Many of these live in countries without a dangerous spider to their names. Another cohort of people suffer from a crippling and acute phobia of objects so harmless as photographs of spiders, or even the word 'spider'. It is a peculiar and debilitating way to live, but is the reality for many otherwise rational people going about their daily lives. But what is Arachnophobia, and what is truly behind it?

One common thing to be noted about Arachnophobes is that most seem entirely capable of admitting their fear is irrational. They do not fear a dangerously venomous bite, or the loss of life or limb (not that this is not an anxiety for many people still!). This has led to the conclusion that much of the human aversion to spiders is made up of a disgust, rather than a fear. Spiders, it cannot be denied, are very different from the pet cats and dogs that we keep in our yards, or the birds that we so willingly invite to our trees. Spiders are perhaps viewed as unnatural in many ways, due to the little most know about such common household visitors, and thus unappealing in the same way of the Beast in *Beauty and the Beast*. All these unfamiliar qualities – the speed of movement, the long legs, the love of the dark, the hairy body – are commonly cited as the reasons for Arachnophobia, and are all things that could be easily seen in another manner, if more familiar.

However, for others still, Arachnophobia seems a very rational fear indeed. The tiny critters of so many nightmares — scarcely ever growing larger than the human hand at best, and usually smaller than a fingernail — are viewed as dangerous predators. This fearsome image is one of a thickset spider the size of a 'dinner-plate', as the newspapers usually say, advancing on an innocent human, its fangs dripping with lethal venom as it scurries to its hapless victim at the speed of light...

Such ideas played up since the dawn of time by the media, horror films and neighbourhood gossip, are of course vastly inaccurate. In Australia, for instance, no-one has died from a spider bite for over thirty years - since the invention of the antivenom for the Sydney Funnel-web. For the only other dangerous spider in Australia – the Red-back – this count is over sixty years. In fact, there have been only twenty-six Australian deaths from spider-bites in the last *one-hundred* years. If we compare this to the Australian road toll – averaging around 2,000 deaths per year – one must begin to wonder why one does not feel the rising urge to squeal every time a car approaches from around a corner.

There are other inaccuracies in the nightmarish perception of spider behaviour apart from the likelihood of a lethal bite. Something important to be noted is that human is very much not on the menu. Spiders will not pursue a human, even in defence. Even a spider in a terribly bad temper – perhaps rearing up in an aggressive display – would only bite if someone was silly enough to stick their hand in the spider's face. The only time a person will be bitten is if the spider has been caught in their clothes, or almost squashed by a hand or foot appearing out of nowhere to disturb their quiet sanctuary. Then, one would have to be terribly unfortunate if the spider actually broke the skin – and even then, still much better off than if it had been a dog bite.

So, what can be done about such a common but irrational fear? In a book called *Spiders: Learning to Love them*, Australian author Lynne Kelly talks about her journey



from Arachnophobia to Arachnophilia, which was an undertaking beginning with simply giving spiders names to see them as individuals – and progressing through self-education to a love of the tiny creatures large enough to dedicate a book to them. Melbourne, Taronga and London Zoos have run programs to cure Arachnophobia through education, with much success. It therefore appears to be a behaviour that lends itself to being unlearned through a bit more of an understanding of the misunderstood animals that are spiders.

The most important thing to remember is that people around you will learn from your own behaviour. This is particularly evident from parents to children. Children learn to react to spiders in a specific manner reflective of what their parents have shown them. Spiders are an integral part of their ecosystems, and keep many more disruptive household visitors such as flies at bay – and should be treated with as much importance as a Koala, or a butterfly. If you treat spiders with consideration and respect, you will have taken an important step to extending compassion to every aspect of our environment, and ensuring the future of our beautiful Earth for the generations of life to come - and that is something worth thinking about.



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

# Inside My Studio Interview and Photographs by Toni Rogers

My visit to Kuranda's singer/songwriter **Rebeka Rain**'s studio this month was indeed timely. Her album **Question** had just recently been launched; a CD with a heart and built on honesty and first hand experiences. It truly expresses Rebeka as a writer/lyricist, who she is, her personality, her memories, her needs and how she sees the world. Wearing her trademark smile and distinctive style, we wandered casually through her garden on a sunny Kuranda tropical morning on the way to her studio. Rebeka is in a positive and uplifting frame of mind and we will see her more front and centre on her musical journey. It is Kuranda's gain that Rebeka has returned to this rainforest village to share her music.

### Where is your current studio?

I will not steal the title of "Underhouse" but my studio is under my Queenslander home in Kuranda. My husband built the room especially for me. It is very personal to my life – the pictures on the wall are such an inspiration to my life and my work.

### Do you work alone or with others?

I always work alone in my studio when I am writing lyrics. However, I work very closely with Mick Evans who does all my recording at MEL productions in Cairns. We have worked on my album "Question" for the past seven months. It has been an amazing musical journey which we have shared together. I also worked collaboratively with Les Hall from Newcastle on this recording.

My West Highland terrier Lucky is always with me, my shadow, my little mate. So really, I am never alone.

### What are the essential features your studio has to have?

My guitar, air conditioning and my Kurzweil keyboard work station.

### Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

When I am recording I am in Cairns at the production studio most days. When I am at home I tend to be in my studio around 9.00am and sometimes I am still there at 9.00pm. Time really gets away from me.

### Describe the works you do in your studio.

I write lyrics – some get used, some don't, but they are never discarded. Some merge into one completed song – most songs just grow. I am still learning to use my Kurzweil and I am really enjoying that process. I get absorbed in sounds. This instrument offers me 4,000 plus sounds.

### Why is music your chosen medium?

I have always had a deep love of music but did not make it my career. I have found it extremely healing since the tragic loss of my son. Music brought me out of a very dark place and gives me solace and peace. Once I started songwriting and singing there was no stopping me.

# List three things you listen to while working.

I listen to the sounds of my Kurzweil in my studio and get absorbed. I make a lot of noise myself but not all the time. There are times during each day when I need the peace and tranquillity my environment provides. When I am sitting writing or walking around my garden I am listening to the sounds of nature. I sometimes listen to a Natalie Merchant CD; she supplies a soulful and gentle touch to my listening.

# Your favourite tool?

I am totally in love with my Kurzweil keyboard work station. It is my biggest piece of equipment with all the bells and whistles – my microphone, guitar and mixing desk, all work like a family. My Kurzweil has influenced my songwriting so much, it has given me the freedom to expand. It supplies over 4,000 different sounds. It is portable and I can take it to gigs. It has wheels on the bottom of the long case,

just like a suitcase, and it fits in my car which is a blessing. Although bulky, it is not 'unliftable' and I can lift it on my own.

### How do you identify your work?

My name Rebeka Rain appears on my CD. I am still finding myself and my CD has many genres included. I call it a play list rather than an album. The songs are about compassion and feelings, love and remembering what is important in life. A common theme is easy to identify rather than a musical style. My songs are also under copyright.

### How do you sell your work?

I sell directly from my website: <a href="www.rebekarain.com.au">www.rebekarain.com.au</a>, through itunes, Googleplay and I have my CD selling in Just Gorgeous (Kuranda), Talk to the Mac in Smithfield shopping centre, and Talk to the Mac, Grafton Street, Cairns where MEL Productions, the recording studio is located.

### Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No, I do not teach. Yes, I do sell directly from my website.



### Do you have any other paid or unpaid work?

Yes, I am paid when I do some gigs. For example, I was at the Salthouse on the Pier last weekend. I also do charity work. I recently performed at JCU 'RUOK Day', and Lifeline. I will be performing at Billabong in Kuranda "Rock This Country Blue" on 5th October.

# If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I would like my studio to be bigger. I do all my groundwork in this studio. I would love to work in an all glass studio, which is not very practical at all but I don't do 'inside' very well. I am definitely an 'outside' person. But, I am daydreaming. My current studio meets all my requirements and I am so grateful to my husband for giving me this special space.

# If you were not working with visual art what would you be doing?

I have worked extensively with horses most of my life and the international travelling I did with them has given me the bug to see more of the world. I would now like to travel and meet people and share with them love and fun my son gave me so much of during his lifetime. Skydiving would be exciting and it is on my wish list. I love exciting things and throwing caution to the wind, fear does not have a place in my life anymore.

# **Paradise Road**

The story is based on the testimony of Betty Jeffrey, as written in her 1954 book White Coolies. The 1965 book Song of Survival by Helen Colijn (granddaughter of Hendrikus Colijn), another camp survivor, is not listed in the film's credits as being a source for this film, although Colijn is thanked for her help in the credits.

The film represents an alternative take on female imprisonment by the Japanese during World War II compared with BBC's dramatic offering from the early 1980s, Tenko. Some criticism of the film's historical accuracy is discussed in an article by Professor Hank

Irish sailor Michael O'Hara (Orson Welles) meets the beautiful blonde Elsa (Rita Hayworth) as she rides a horse-drawn coach in Central Park. Three hooligans waylay the coach. Michael rescues Elsa and escorts her home. Michael reveals he is a seaman and learns Elsa and her husband, disabled criminal defense attorney Arthur Bannister (Everett Sloane), are newly arrived in New York City from Shanghai. They are on their way to San Francisco via the Panama Canal. Michael, attracted to Elsa despite misgivings, agrees to sign on as an able seaman aboard Bannister's yacht.

Now follows what is probably the world's most convoluted cinematic plot, with more twists and turns than a politician's apology. Those who long for

a happy and unambiguous end to their movies will unfortunately remain unsatisfied but those who enjoy watching Orson Welles in action will not be disappointed.

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# El Nino System Expected Late Spring/Early Summer

The change of season is noticeable now. It's hot, windy and dry. Last month's mud is now as hard as rock, leaves are shedding fast and the garden has suddenly changed to autumn colours as everything dries out. The garden looks dry even though it's been watered. 50% chance of a hot and dry El Nino system expected late in Spring or even Summer, so expect to keep watering your gardens until the wet season begins.

CONSERVE WATER OUTSIDE: Reduce your lawn size, or choose drought-tolerant xeriscapes, recycle town water and on-site greywater, harvest rainwater, fix water leaks, repair equipment or purchase retrofit kits for more water efficiency.

**REUSING GREYWATER:** Recycling water from your laundry, shower, bath, basin and kitchen can be used and will save our precious fresh water supplies. Manual bucketing - No council approval required for small quantities of greywater collected in a bucket or siphoned for re-use outside on gardens or lawns.

**Diversion** – greywater diversion devices redirect greywater for use outside the home on gardens or lawns using sub-surface irrigation. No council approval required but some require a plumber to install.

**Treatment** – commercial greywater treatment systems for reuse inside the home & outdoors do require council approval and a plumber to install. Contact your local council for regulations regarding recycling of swimming pool backwash wastewater. Recycling greywater can save between 50,000 and 100,000 litres of drinking water a year. Choice http://www.choice.com.au/reviews-and-tests/ household/energy-and-water/saving-water/ greywater-systems/page.aspx. Not interested in that? Then collect the free water in any container, barrel or tank from roof catchments.

Surprisingly, household water consumption for toilets, laundry, showering, cooking etc., is not the major area for water wastage. It's actually outdoors usage: lawn and garden irrigation, swimming pools, washing and cleaning.

# **OUTDOOR WATER SAVING IDEAS**

Plant selection: For a low maintenance and water efficient garden, ask your local nursery about plant selection and site placement. Choose shrubs and groundcovers instead of grass or turf for hard-to-water areas such as steep slopes and isolated strips. Reduce the amount of lawn by planting shrubs, ground covers or vegetable gardens appropriate to your site and region.

**Soil & plant preparation:** Plant when seasonal conditions are cooler or when rainfall is more plentiful. Leave lower branches on trees and shrubs to help minimise weed growth, keep the soil cooler, retain moisture, reduce evaporation and release nutrients to the soil. Compacted soil

can't hold water. Allow leaf litter to accumulate on the soil; this natural material will slowly decompose. A layer of mature compost that looks, feels and smells like rich, dark earth not rotting vegetables will keep your plants healthy during dry conditions. Watering: Group plants with the same watering needs together to avoid over watering some while under watering others. Apply water only as fast as the soil can absorb it. Water, stop, wait five minutes then repeat a few times. This will reduce wasted water especially on sloping areas and will help prevent erosion. If water runs off your ground, initially water more frequently but for shorter periods to allow for better absorption. Water will penetrate more deeply into the soil, will encourage deeper root growth and eventually become more drought tolerant. To minimize evaporation, water early morning when the temperatures are cooler, it's better than dusk since it helps prevent the growth of fungus.

For larger areas of ground cover, use sprinklers that deliver big drops of water close to the ground, not soft mist. Mist will evaporate or blow away in windy conditions. Use underground self watering drip irrigation directly to plant roots where it's needed. Very good for cucurbits who don't survive well with overhead sprinklers. Adjust sprinklers so only your lawn is watered and not the house, the driveway or paved areas. Set a kitchen timer when watering your lawn or garden to remind you when to stop. A running hose can discharge up to 40 litres a minute. Always use a trigger nozzle.

Water indoor plants only when necessary; more plants die from over-watering than from under-watering. Let your lawn go dormant during the 'dry' summer, it will soon return when the wet season arrives.

# Other water saving ideas:

A taller grassed lawn shades roots and holds soil moisture better than if it is closely clipped. Adjust your lawn mower to a higher setting and keep the blades sharp.

Rotate the position of play areas and outdoor furniture to ensure even wear on your garden to avoid compaction. If your lawn needs watering wash your vehicles, boat, or animals outdoors, or have the kids cool off under a sprinkler. Use a hose nozzle or turn off the water while you wash your vehicles or building structures.

Don't waste fresh water to wash away leaves off your roof, driveway, walkways or paved areas, use a broom or leaf blower or pressure washer instead. Pressure washers with a suction hose can draw water from a water bucket, check them out.

Cleaning out fresh water fish tanks, give the nutrient-rich water to your plants, don't waste it. Make sure swimming pools, fountains, and ponds are equipped with re-circulating pumps. Trickling or cascading fountains lose less water to evaporation than those spraying water into the air. Install a pool cover to reduce evaporation. If collecting and recycling grey water, instead of carting buckets, siphon it out using a long garden hose and a pump.


Meanwhile, to keep your garden growing, collect water from your roof or HVAC systems (heating, ventilating, and air conditioning systems). Save our rainwater: 97.5% of all water on earth is salt water. 2.5% is fresh water, 70% of that is not accessible to human use (frozen in the icecaps etc). Our fresh water supplies needs to be regularly renewed by rain and snowfall. Sustainable solutions are needed to support the earth. Water is our life source, not a commodity. A roof catchment area of only 93sqm x average annual rainfall of 50cm has the potential to collect 91,000 litres water annually—the equivalent to 13 African households yearly water usage. Australia must find new sources of water unless there are significant improvements in water conservation. Recent water costs have increased 33% and will continue to rise.

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# The Big Mama

What would be the last thing anyone would dream of meeting coming towards them as they drove up the Kuranda Range. Obviously a large concrete boat would have to be high on the list of "No! I must be dreaming" responses. But this is exactly what happened over two days in 1978. On August 7th and 8th that year a large concrete boat was transported down the Kuranda Range from Speewah to Cairns. And this was at a time when the range was a bit narrower than it is now. Admittedly the traffic was a tad less congested then, and this made the task a bit less onerous than it would be at the present time.

The boat was the Big Mama, and it was constructed

were involved in the task. There were twelve professional plasterers employed on the actual plastering, with others mixing the plaster and helping to keep the job rolling. Another twelve people kept up a supply of food and drinks to the busy workers. The outside coat took six hours of intense work to complete. The inside skin, which was applied a few days later, took less time to complete.

The Big Mama was a reasonably large vessel, 57 feet (17.5 metres) long, and weighed 40 tons. The task of transporting it from Speewah to the harbour in Cairns was a logistical nightmare. A large crane had to be brought up to lift the boat onto a semi-trailer. Because of

> the size of the load a police escort had to be provided to regulate the traffic around the boat. Several men rode on top of the boat with chainsaws to trim any branches that might become entangled, and men were employed by the Cairns Regional Electricity Board to ride on top of the boat to lift any


wires that could be a hazard. Progress was so slow that the semi-trailer had to be parked off

the road at a point just below the look-out for the night, and the journey was completed next day.

The boat was taken to the main wharves at Cairns

for launching. A large crane was supplied by N.Q.E.A. to lift the boat and lower it into the inlet. The task of fitting it out then began. The owners had hoped to use the Big Mama for commercial purposes, but it did not pass survey. It was taken north and moored in the Bloomfield River and used for private purposes. The owners later built a steel vessel, which was also named the Big Mama, and this vessel was used commercially. This vessel was later sold and is still operating as a commercial enterprise.

The original concrete Big Mama changed hands on about five occasions since it was built, and is now at Port Douglas.



workers constructing the steel framework to get it ready for plastering, with many other people helping out on a more casual basis. The basic frame was formed of reinforcing bars tied together, and this was covered with ten layers of chicken mesh. The deck was reinforced with arc mesh and chicken mesh. About 80,000 wire ties were used to fasten the mesh to the reinforcing bars.

The job of plastering the vessel was a major event. The outside skin had to be laid first, and entailed forcing the cement render through the layers of mesh, making sure there were no voids. About 36 people

**Kuranda Community Precinct**: The Advisory Committee has been working hard to progress Stage 1 of the development of the Precinct. The plans for the Library move are finalised and it is expected that the move will occur within the next 6 months. It has not yet been decided what the current Library building will be used for. As well, the old Pre-School and the small block behind it are currently listed for sale and the funds from the sale will go

into a special Reserve Fund to be used for further development at the Precinct.

**Road Safety:** At times, Council places Traffic Counters on local roads for short periods to provide information on road use and to inform future planning. These devices measure a number of things; the number of traffic movements, the times of greatest/ least use, the types of vehicles using the road, the speeds of vehicles using the road. No, these are not speed cameras, but they do indicate that quite a number of vehicles are speeding on local roads. One recent deployment revealed that on one street (in a residential area) over 40% of vehicles were above the speed limit with a number more than 20 kms above the speed limit. These results are not uncommon. This is definitely a safety issue!

Are You prepared? It's that time of year to start getting ready for the cyclone and fire season. Every household needs to have a "plan" and an emergency kit. Know what you will do in the event of an emergency or an evacuation. The time to get ready is now. Council now has a comprehensive Disaster Management Plan and staff have been trained in readiness. Really important to remember that there are no official "evacuation centres" and everyone needs to consider where you would go if your home was not safe or you were asked to leave your home before a cyclone.

Improvements to Therwine Street: You may have noticed that Tenders have been called for the design work for the upgrade

of Therwine Street. This will involve improvements to the street, footpaths and the undergrounding of the power. This work will be funded from the Kuranda Infrastructure fund.

"Kuranda Day" Celebrations (Saturday 11 and Sunday 12 October): The event is organised by Tourism Kuranda for visitors and locals. Community members are needed to assist. If this sounds hard to understand, there will be signage to indicate the changes.

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

# **Trout On Line**

In Kuranda on 19th September, I finally had a chance to see the new Visitors Centre in operation. Unfortunately I was unable to make it to the official opening as it coincided with another opening to which I was already committed – the new Australian Armour and

Artillery Museum next to Tjapukai at Smithfield, another drawcard bringing tourists in close proximity to Skyrail and easy access to tropical paradise.

I also missed the Kuranda Showcase event on 10th September, being in Parliament on that day, but my electorate officer, Suzy, attended and reported there was a great turnout.

What a great addition to an ever-improving village. The opening of this attractive and interactive information centre precedes the great news that Kuranda may be welcoming Kuranda Heritage Rail as an addition to the existing Kuranda Scenic Rail. By next year, passengers from cruise ships will be able to take advantage of the new cruise ship infrastructure at Yorkeys Knob, which will allow far greater time to be spent enjoying the region's attractions.

More good news since I last wrote: Cairns builders Vis Constructions will commence construction of 6 buildings, yielding 9 social housing dwellings over the next 2 years at Mantaka. The \$2 million project includes upgrades to infrastructure, some of which have already taken place.

Last month, concerns were expressed in this paper about logging in Kuranda, which I conveyed to Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Minister John McVeigh.

The Minister subsequently confirmed that no Kuranda rainforests will be harvested for commercial timber.

He said that timber harvesting operations in rainforest areas or in any patches of rainforest in forested areas was not allowed, but some open eucalypt areas of state forests west of Kuranda could be selectively harvested.

However, this is unlikely to occur for at least five years and certainly not before checks are undertaken to determine if any threatened flora and fauna species are present in proposed harvest areas, and what measures should be taken to minimise impacts.

Any scheduled harvesting in the open eucalypt forests will be relatively small-scale and will be well away from the township of Kuranda. Harvesting will be on a selective basis with individual trees identified either for harvesting or retention.

The Minister said the state forest management system is certified to the Australian Standard for Sustainable Forest Management, which specifies criteria for the protection of biodiversity and consultation with stakeholders so that their views and all issues of concern are considered in harvest planning.

He said, "In short, before any harvesting of proposed areas occurs, consultation with local stakeholders will be undertaken to hear all issues of concern."

Pine plantations in Kuranda State Forest have been harvested on and off over the years since the commencement of the initial harvesting in the mid to late 1980s.

HQ Plantations Pty Ltd (HQP) hold a plantation licence on more than 4,200 hectares of Kuranda State Forest, with plantation softwood species being planted on most of this area. They have held that licence since 2010.

On the subject of the roadworks on the Kuranda Range Road, we have received the following advice from Department of Transport and Main Roads

"Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) has been carrying out slope stabilisation works on the Kuranda Range Road. These were due to be completed at the end of August 2014 but wet weather and site conditions pushed the completion date out to mid to late September 2014.

These works are funded under Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA) where the federal government provides 75% of the funding and the state government 25%.

Works have started on a new project to widen one of the curves on the Kuranda Range. This is funded under the Federal Government's Black Spot program and is due to be completed at the end of November 2014, weather permitting."

# PLANT OF THE MONTH Licuala ramsayi – (Australian Fan Palm)

You see these palms on Rod Vievers Drive entrance to Kuranda, rescued from a Top of the Range road clearing. They have grown slowly over the years, not in ideal conditions, preferring river banks, and swamps within the rainforests.

A very beautiful palm, with a single trunk up to 15 metres, and large (to 2 metres across) almost circular leaves. These silhouetted leaves against the sky are an iconic image used in regional marketing. Being a tropical/ sub-tropical plant, not frost hardy, it prefers quite heavy shade when younger, but as an emergent plant it's sun-hardy as an adult. Very slow growing, they can last for years in a patio pot, in a warm shady nook, making them an ideal gift for that (don't mention it) family celebration time. # **A Thought for October**

**▼HIS** month we read a passage from the Gospel according to St Matthew Chapter 21 verse 33-43. Jesus during his earthly ministry offered the people of his time a vision. Today in our time Jesus offers the same vision to us. The vision is of a kingdom, what he always calls the kingdom of heaven. It is another way of living life, a kind of alternate universe. Jesus didn't just talk of that vision, he was the vision. He didn't just speak of the demands of that kingdom, he did them!

So why didn't it all work out in a wonderfully successful way? Why didn't everybody think that Jesus and his vision were just what the world needed? It's difficult to frame a simple answer to this but we can try. In his Gospel John has two phrases which express the tragedy without necessarily explaining it. He says: ... The world knew Him not... his own people received Him not... Why? John later reports a statement of Jesus which seems to answer that question. Jesus says, "This is the judgement, that the light has come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light" [John 3.19]. There it is in the starkest and simplest of words - the tragic heart of the human condition. The Bible's word for this condition, itself simple and stark, is Sin.

This is what this parable of Jesus is about. In it he tells his own destiny. Jesus had no illusions about the consequences of his words and actions. He knew the dark depths of the human nature which surrounded him. The ironic contradiction in human behaviour and experience is to reject that which is utterly in our interest to accept. Our judgement is deeply flawed, and our choices are apt to be terribly wrong. The kingdom that Jesus offers us is not taken from us by some grudging God; we ourselves choose something else. But even as we paint that grim portrait of our human nature another face shines through it, that of Our Lord. The face is a promise that in him our humanity is also capable of a shining glory. Through Jesus we can if we choose set foot from time to time in the very kingdom we refuse most of the time. We sometimes have to make tough choices about the kingdom God offers us and the kingdom we ourselves want.

# **NEWS FROM ST SAVIOUR'S CHURCH**


St Saviour's is gearing up for the Blessing of the Animals Service on Sunday 5th October.

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
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
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
