Kuranda Rally says

to Kur-World!

SUNDAY 26TH MARCH saw a large rally against the proposed Kurworld development within Kuranda village. More than 250 people marched up Coondoo Street and listened in Centenary Park to a variety of speakers, including local elder Willie Brim, who gave a well received Welcome to Country and whose band entertained visitors long after the speakers had finished.

The main rally organiser, Steven Nowakowski, said: "The large and colourful turnout shows the depth of opposition within the Kuranda region to the so-called 'Kur-World' proposal".

Mr Nowakwski noted: "Speakers made it plain that widespread opposition to Kur-World is not based on xenophobia. Chinese tourism – and Chinese investment – is welcome in Kuranda and in Australia in general. We are a highly multicultural community and proud of it. But NO development should be to the detriment of our unique environment and culture".

Greens candidate for Barron River, Cameron Boyd, caught the mood of the crowd when he explained the Greens support sustainable development, but not development at any cost. Federal member for Leichhardt Warren Entsch, Barron River MP, Craig Crawford and his LNP opponent Michael Trout were all invited to speak as were the MSC Mayor and Councillors, but none of these attended.

With Kur-World the largest development ever proposed for the Kuranda region and within the Wet Tropics World Heritage area, with major earthworks already undertaken and the subject of environmental censure by State authorities, with the Federal Government involved through the threats to endangered species, why were no elected representatives there to speak to the people of Kuranda who came out on a hot Sunday to express their concerns?

Shopping in Kuranda after Kur-World

Channel 7 news reported two Kuranda shop owners as being concerned about local repercussions due to their support of the proposed Kur World eco-resort. I believe local Kuranda business owners have reasons to be concerned but not from those in the STOP Kur-World camp.

I ask local shopowners: what picture is in your mind about the predicted wave of (mostly Chinese) inbound tourists we hear is coming and which a Kur-World (K-W) consultant stated they are catering for? How will the logistics pan out? Kur-World's stated capacity is 4,000 plus people (from K-W Initial Advice Statement, supplied by them to the State Government). Also stated – hotels and a **shopping precinct**. So unless you intend to get a shop at Kur-World, I see you being sidelined. I see package night stay tour groups arriving on Skyrail or QRail or by the bus. Bringing their luggage up the range, they marshall onto their transfer bus and are off to K-W for their accommodation, adventure park, demo farm and **shopping**. I see package day tripper tourists to K-W doing the same, a la Rainforestation. I see the non package tourists (Chinese and non-Chinese), arriving by Qrail and Skyrail, being offered a free transit minibus trip from the bottom of town to K-W by some enterprising local bus operator, a la Heritage markets. I see fly/drive tourists (maybe 25% of current market) arriving at the Kuranda traffic lights and turning right to K-W instead of left to Kuranda, after encountering the beautiful Kur-World billboard (a la K-W website) as they approach the Kuranda road bridge. Is this what you see? Look again. Start listening and reading. Don't assume; become informed.

Barron River Tranquil Water Threatened UPDATE

In regards to the story in last month's *The Kuranda Paper* which alerted residents to proposed changes to the use of the Barron River at Kuranda.

The Barron River Water Ski Club (BRWSC) had last month approached Maritime Safety Queensland (MSQ) expressing an intention to lodge an application to establish a water ski slalom course and boat ramp between the bridge and weir.

The Kuranda Paper was informed after going to press (not by MSQ from whom we have had no further response despite our query regarding who constitutes "local stakeholders" when such an impactful change of use is being considered) that the application has been "suspended".

The Kuranda Paper intends to pursue MSQ in regards to what the process would be, and who would be consulted, should the proposal be re-activated.










Down Memory Lane



Night works noise notice – Koah to Cairns

To improve the safety and reliability of our service and as part of an ongoing maintenance program, Queensland Rail will carry out rail replacement works between Koah and Cairns stations, including along the Kuranda range.



The rail replacement team will be starting from Koah station and progressively moving towards Cairns station. There will be intermittent intervals of noise at locations along the rail corridor during this period. Some locations will need to be visited on more than one occasion.

This work involves the removal and replacement of existing rail sleepers and therefore the use of loud, heavy machinery including on-track vehicles with horns, bright flashing lights, and reversing beepers. Lighting and generators may also be used at each works location and there may be some dust caused by these activities.

Due to the use of on-track machinery, there may be some minor disruption to the level crossings located between Redlynch and Cairns throughout this period.

Queensland Rail will make every effort to minimise these impacts on our valued neighbours and we apologise for any inconvenience.



Gardening in Kuranda with Alectura





PRIL, the autumnal equinox passed and the Wet continues to drizzle along. As the days draw in and slowly cool, the garden changes, with thinning foliage and some plants retiring altogether for their winter rest. A good idea is to mark resting gems rather than accidently dig them up or cut them through with fork or spade. The magic happenstances of stray seedling or foliage against foliage with innumerable shapes, textures and patterning or maps

of moss and lichen on rock or branch provide ongoing joys and learnings from Nature's psalter. For the keen-eyed observer, there is a world of discovery and beauty awaiting to refresh one's spirit.

PLANT OF THE MONTH: Alocasias and *Colacasias* provide the tropical gardener with a range of leaf textures and patterning as well as plant size. These range from the beautiful Colocasia Fallax, the silver-leaf dwarf elephant ear, growing to 1/2 m with bright green leaves with silver reflective centres and the dwarf A. longiloba forms of Bebe/Bambino, to the giant Alocasia Portadora and even larger Alocasia Borneo Giant.

Colocasia esculenta, Taro, is the most widely cultivated species of several plants in the Araceae family which are used as vegetables for their corms and leaves, as is another variety of taro known as eddoe or Colocasia antiquorum. However it is to be noted that care should be taken in the selection of cultivated, edible varieties and careful preparation is necessary. Some persons may have an allergic reaction to the sap of alocasias and colacasias.





U&A Dear Peter and Rosie, Thank you for the Pic and ID confirmation. Nothing worse than seeing a plant or flower one cannot identify with any certainty. We seem to have reached agreement that the flower is a Lagerstroemia and possibly a hybrid between the L.indica and L.fauriei species resulting in varieties of crepe myrtle that are resistant a fungal disease known to powdery mildew: a major as problem afflicting the older varieties of the crepe myrtle. Now with extensive hybridising,



there is an extended range in growth habit and colour, so some research will pay off. It is ideally suited to drier areas and you may propagate crepe myrtles from hardwood cuttings taken in winter.



Dear Stephen, Your plant is Dracaena goldieana, a beautifully patterned foliage plant with long, cane-like growths, that should be trimmed to promote bushiness, not forgetting to use cuttings for propagation, which may be somewhat slow. Very hardy and tolerating low light levels and dry conditions, it makes an excellent indoor plant or garden feature. Regular feeding and watering certainly promotes growth. The occasional grasshoppers and caterpillar may be removed by hand

or sprayed with Carbaryl. Mealy Bug may be controlled with Confidor insecticide.



Cassowary Keystone Conservation (CKC)

One of Friends of the Earth FNQ's campaign groups established by Ingrid Marker, CKC works with and supports other local groups

- · planting trees to restore habitat connectivity
- working with Main Roads on design to reduce car strike and roads that fragment landscapes
- running a system of First Response Cassowary Rescue.

Most importantly CKC has a specific campaign to reduce the threats of roaming dogs. CKC proposes

changes to existing legislation to hold dog owners accountable (see the petition at <u>www.foefnq.org.au</u> for details). The changes address the number and size of uncontrolled roaming dogs.

Dog attacks are one of the key threats to the cassowary's survival along with road kill and loss of habitat. The threat extends into the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area that all our iconic endangered species call home including the Southern Cassowary. We have a billion dollar Tourism Industry which employs thousands showcasing this precious and fragile ecosystem to a domestic and global audience.

Dog attacks are also a threat to our community's safety on our streets, beaches and in towns and parks. People can no longer exercise without fear of being attacked. Nuisance dogs break down neighbourly relationships causing division within the community. Many people are the silent victims afraid of reprisals from abusive dog owners. This can cause stress and mental illness. CKC has received around 7000 letters from throughout the State detailing incidents of intimidation and attacks by dogs on people.

Roaming dogs are also the cause of our "Wild Dog" problem. This is a major agricultural problem leading to farmers' financial and emotional despair with thousands of livestock mauled to death. 1080 poison used to control wild dogs is also killing our native wildlife.

This campaign aims to educate the community about the various threats that roaming dogs create to our lifestyle, economy – and of our moral and international obligations to protect endangered species within the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area. "If you own a dog you are 100% responsible".

The Private Members Bill the "Domestic Predatory Animal Act" seeks changes to tighten and enforce the Animal Management Act on State and Shire levels. Locally, CKC has been very impressed with Mareeba Shire's actions about irresponsible dog ownership and its support and welcoming of the Act.





Wovenhand : Star Treatment

By all appearances, Wovenhand is a native American and the artwork here is all feathers, tipis and traditional designs. Our copy is an American import. Produced by Glitterhouse Records. It's worth tracking down.



Chuck Berry made it to 90! The father of Rock 'n' Roll, Rock guitar riffs, and interesting lyrics. **Chuck** was the man: cool black guy singing to white kids in their own language and laying the foundations for the *Stones, The Beatles* and all that followed. **Johnny B Goode** is imbedded in our D.N.A. and has travelled, via the 1977 Voyager I probe, in a time capsule into deep space. "**Saturday Night Live**" reported that the space probe had been intercepted by another galactic community and they have sent back the message "**Thank you, please send more Chuck Berry**"! Ha!

Vale Chuck Berry

Well Charles Edward Berry has now

embarked on the great journey. Go Go Johnny and thanks for the music.

The eleven tracks are deep into tribal symbolism, "Come Brave", "The Quiver", "Go Ye Light" and "Swaying Reed" to name a few, and here's a sample of the lyrics from "The Quiver":

"Who my mother who my brother who am I sister Suffer them unto him, man after God's own heart Surely goodness and mercy they stalk me lion and prey. Sowing tears reaping song..."

And they don't lighten up at all. Deep, intense, rich in image and evocative... And the music? Pounding tribal spirit of place – American version of our "**Great Southern Land**" rhythmic groove. Some very close to *Nick Cave*'s uncompromising dark confrontations. The *Bad Seeds* on Peyote. And the ghost of *Bowie* hovers. The KUR-World project team was outside Kuranda Foodworks on Thursday 9th March to share the revised Master Plan.

The team will be available in Kuranda on a regular basis to answer questions and receive feedback on community issues, concerns and ideas for the proposed development.

BARNWELL FARM

History

The Barnwell Farm has had a varied and somewhat sad history of agricultural production.

In 1899, the young Scotsman, James Hamilton was one of the first coffee growers in the Myola area. Two years later, he took his own life, leaving a note on his kitchen table, saying that he intended to 'destroy himself' and indicated in that letter where his body could be located. His property was put up for reselection in 1903 and was described as having a good house and a large area of cleared land. His grave is still on the property not far from the homestead.

The Barnwell's then took up residence at the property in 1936 when they started dairy farming, buying a dairy herd in the same year. They later changed over to beef cattle and tried a few different crops such as molasses grass seed production and sugar cane. There were four siblings who were very private and rarely ventured out except for one sister, Dawn who visited the Kuranda town via her tractor on a regular basis.

Further research on the history of the property is continuing and if anyone has any photosfrom the early European history of Kuranda and Myola these would be greatly appreciated.



Community Urged to Rethink the War on Drugs

"can anything change if nothing changes?"

On March 20th 2017, the Australia21 (independent, not for profit, think tank) report 'Can Australia respond to drugs more effectively and safely?' was launched by Jeff Kennett, founder of BeyondBlue and former Liberal Premier of Victoria, and Bob Carr, former Labor Minister for Foreign Affairs and former Premier of New South Wales.

This remarkable Australia21 report does something that has never been done before: it tables solutions backed by the very people who were enforcing drug laws until recently.

It comes out of an unprecedented round-table convened by Mick Palmer, who has served as Commissioner of both the Australian Federal Police and Northern Territory Police.

'What we now have is badly broken, ineffective and even counterproductive to the harm minimisation aims of Australia's national illicit drugs policy," said Mr Palmer. "We must be courageous enough to consider a new and different approach.'

Drug users and their families have welcomed the stand.

"If I had been given support instead of being jailed I would have spent 20 years as a productive member of the community instead of succumbing to my heroin habit that repeatedly ended me up in prison," said Kat Armstrong.

"I don't want more kids or anyone to die, or to ruin their lives like I did - we must intervene and help them now, before it's too late," she said. "I know, because I lived it.'

Drug use is a health and social issue. The report recognises the weight of evidence from Australia and overseas that proves policing is singularly unsuccessful in reducing harms or changing drug use habits.

"The threshold step is to redefine drugs as primarily a health and social issue rather than one of criminal justice," said Dr Alex Wodak, Director of the Alcohol and Drug Service at St Vincent's Hospital Sydney from 1982 to 2012 and current President of the Australian Drug Law Reform Foundation.

The report makes 13 key recommendations aimed at minimising harms for drug users and those around them, reducing the use of untested, unregulated drugs in unsafe environments, providing health and social programs to reduce drug-related problems, reducing and even eliminating criminal control of the drug market, reducing the prison population and its associated progress to hard drug use, supporting police and the judicial system to focus law enforcement more usefully.

The report calls for an approach that distinguishes between high-end production and trafficking on the one hand, and personal use and possession on the other. It does not recommend open-slather legalisation of all drugs; instead, it supports incremental, robustly evaluated steps towards a national policy of decriminalisation, standardising the discretionary approach to personal use and possession of cannabis and other substances that is already being adopted by front line law enforcers at the State and Territory level.

Advertising of any legalised and regulated drugs would not be permitted and some harder substances would require stringent controls, such as prescription by a doctor.

Recognition of the disconnect between harm minimisation and arrests for use or possession has already led to decriminalisation in many countries, including the USA (11 states), Netherlands, Switzerland, France, Germany, Austria, Spain, Portugal, Belgium, Italy, the Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Ecuador, Armenia, India, Brazil, Peru, Colombia, Argentina, Mexico, Paraguay, Uruguay, Costa Rica and Jamaica.

The Australia21 recommendations have not been made lightly. They have been carefully considered after rigorous debate among the diverse group of Roundtable participants and it has taken more than a year to reach consensus on the details and sign off the text. The report is the third in a series of Australia21 reports examining drug law reform.

Some answers to FAQs from Australia21 Director Dr Alex Wodak (more at Australia21 website): Why does Australia need to change its drug policy?

Australia's approach to illicit drugs is seriously broken. It cannot be fixed by some minor tweaking. For over half a century our governments have relied heavily on law enforcement to curb the drug trade.

But in that time the illicit drug trade in Australia has just kept getting bigger and bigger and more and more dangerous.

We now have many more different types of drugs and more dangerous drugs than we ever had. During the last half-century we have had increasing drug-related deaths, disease, crime, corruption and violence.

Senior police now warn that Australia cannot arrest and imprison its way out of our serious drug problems.

Isn't liberalising our drug laws just going to mean skyrocketing drug use?

Despite what many people think intuitively, the evidence from numerous studies is that drug laws have minimal or no effect on levels of illicit drug use. Punitive laws do not reduce drug use and liberal approaches do not increase drug use. But even if liberalising our drug laws did slightly increase illicit drug use, this might still be worth accepting if at the same time there was a huge decrease in some of the collateral damage from our drug laws.

We should primarily focus on the harm that drugs do rather than just concentrate on reducing or eliminating their use.

What are the first steps needed in drug law reform?

The threshold step for drug law reform is re-defining drugs as primarily a health and social issue. This means that a major investment is required in health and social interventions if we are to reduce deaths, disease, crime, corruption and violence.

People with drug problems need help, not punishment. They also need help to reintegrate back into the community.

Some will need education and training with the aim of getting a job. Many will need drug treatment. Marginalised and homeless people using drugs may need a drug consumption room where they can start a process of engagement that leads to drug treatment and healthcare.

Young people attending music dance events should be able to have their pills tested.

Law enforcement should keep its budget but be offered the opportunity to invest in areas where the public gets a much better return on the investment. Australia has to stop seeing this issue through the lens of law enforcement.

For decades Australia has been debating its drug policy. There is now growing recognition that our current approach has been a dismal failure. An increasing number of Australians now look for vision and leadership on this issue from our politicians. We know that change is more likely and more sustainable if there is support across political parties. Standing still is no longer an option.

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Skyrail Closing For a Month

SKYRAIL is preparing to temporarily shut down for an important upgrade. It is closing from 8th May to 5th June for its longest period of scheduled maintenance since the rainforest cableway opened 22 years ago.

The time will be spent upgrading the cableway's original lift technology and changing their main communications pathway from old copper technology to fibre optics.

However, there has been some criticism from local tourism operators and local Kuranda businesses, with some saying there had been a lack of communication with the local tourism industry about the month-long closure, particularly operators who were still taking bookings during the period.

"I don't mind when it's off for two days, but when it comes a month of no Skyrail, that's different," he said. "How do the people in Kuranda operate with two trains, and that's it?" Cairns luxury Coaches owner Peter Hodgkinson was reported as saying in a recent *Cairns Post* article.

Such a long shutdown is a matter of concern for Kuranda businesses which rely so heavily on Skyrail and QRail to maximise visitors to the village.

For Kuranda and Far North Queensland residents who might have family or friends planning a visit from 8th May to 5th June, we print this to give you a heads up that you may have to alter holiday plans around this extended close down period.



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

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Hang on, it's windy!

With a potential cyclone looming off the coast, we may experience a barrage of high winds. Although we have the choice to shelter inside, for many animals this isn't an option. Some will literally have to stick it out in the trees until conditions improve. Many species of invertebrates are literally light enough to be picked up and whisked away by the wind should they lose their grip, but for such small animals, they have some perfect equipment for staying put. The foot of an insect is something that we would normally not see with the degree of magnification required to see the true detail of the 'footwear' they sport. This varies of course with the type of lifestyle they lead. Ground dwelling and burrowing species have completely different needs than those making their homes within the trees and have their own specific modifications.

The foot (tarsus) of a typical tree dwelling insect has two sharp hooked claws and some form of broad pad. Insects such as grasshoppers and stick insects have a smooth soft pad which aids grip whilst the claws dig into the branch or leaves. When moving, they disengage the claws and walk upon the pad, akin to us having both our palms plus movable grappling hooks.


Some invertebrates have further modifications to their feet; beetles are one such group. They too have claws on the tips of their feet, but instead of a soft pad, they have a pad covered in fine hairs known as setae. Setae increase the gripping power of the foot, and are also present on the feet of climbing spiders such as huntsman. The dense brush of fine hair optimises the contact the insect has with the surface, as such a high density of small structures can produce a larger contact area. It creates bonding on a molecular level through a force known as van der Waals force. This type of footwear also works quite well on dusty surfaces.

Scientists are so impressed by the clinging qualities of these animals that they have tried to duplicate their methods. A high-tech reusable (washable) sticky tape has been developed which is based on the setae of insect feet. During test phases, it was applied to the feet of a 120g robot and enabled the robot to climb glass walls! This tape probably won't be available in the local stationery shop, but will have many technological applications.

So when it comes to withstanding cyclonic conditions, most tree dwelling invertebrates do it with ease, as their climbing equipment has been refined and tested over millions of years.

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
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A huntsman spider's foot. The masses of fine hairs provide the spider with grip at a molecular level.







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The Worst Day of My Life

All names have been changed, including mine as author, but this is a true and factual account in every other way. - Donna

I thought the worst day of my life was when my son was seriously injured in a car accident. A midnight phone call came from a friend who lived across the road from the accident who helped the injured before emergency services arrived.

"Your son's been in an accident. I have him here on the phone. Do you want to talk with him?" the caller, who is a mate of mine, asked.

"Yes, please. Put him on."

"How bad is it, Pete?" I asked. "Pretty bad, mum," he said.

"I'll come straight away," I said.

So I scrambled. I woke my young daughter. I took her next door. I hammered on the door. My startled neighbour opened. I asked: "Can you mind her till I come home sometime tomorrow, love? Pete's had an accident. He's being choppered out."

Then I took off at a fast waddle, through the school grounds to the accident scene, my torch lighting the way in the dark, my car at that time out of action. The police ushered me through. I climbed on board the ambulance, just in the nick of time. We headed to where the helicopter was waiting.

When we arrived, Pete was fussing. The nurse on board the ambulance was trying to find things. I realised she need to irrigate the wound with saline quickly to wash the muck out of it from the accident to give the hospital a flying chance to save the leg.

However, just one look at that leg and I knew it would most likely come off below the knee. I also realised if Pete didn't stop fussing it would delay his medi-vac to hospital. He was at risk of bleeding out.

"Pete, it's time now to let the nurse concentrate and do her work," I said gently. "You need a rapid transfer here." He's a wonderful son, my Pete, in so many ways. Praise the Lord, he got that straight away.

During the hour that followed our arrival 20 minutes later at A&E, the triage nurse in hospital prioritised his care. He brought us the office phone, allowing first me, then Pete to speak to his fiancee, Deidre, who was overseas working, perhaps realising it may have been their last conversation, perhaps wanting to bolster his spirits for what lay ahead. I never asked his rationale. I was simply grateful he was perhaps bending the rules.

The phone call was the most difficult I'd ever made. It was the hardest one Deidre ever received in her life, too, up to that point. But it helped him to settle. Pete went through 5 bags of blood while being stabilised for surgery. He was operated on at 9.30am. The accident was about 12.30am. The surgeon lost him on the table with a reaction, to begin with, to the anaesthetic.

Mum arrived from a 3 hour drive from south of us to keep me company. I was in the chapel where I'd been since ringing her at 7.00am and ringing Pete's dad at 6.30am and farewelling Pete as he went off to surgery. Pete's dad would be on the morning train next day from further north. Both my Mum and Pete's dad were in their 70s. I was grateful they were each robust and spry.

As we waited in the chapel for those long, torturous hours, wondering if Pete's leg would come off during that first operation, or indeed if he would survive the surgery, we prayed and we quietly talked, mum and I, gaining heart from visitors who dropped in – my Minister, my doctor, her sister and a social worker friend. What a supportive place we live in. We do community really well here.

Friends and family from Kuranda to Melbourne were sending text messages of support. It helped that so many people were praying for our Pete.

Finally the nurse (or was it the doctor?) came out of surgery to see us in the chapel. I can't remember. It was such a blur. We were told all was finished for the time being.



Pete was in recovery. He would be on the ward soon. They lost him on the operating table, we were told, but he had responded to the jump-start they'd had to give him. He was strong. He would be fine. Surgery had taken so many hours I lost count. We cried tears of relief and joy.

Family and mates rallied around Pete in the days that followed. He had two long rails inside the femur screwed in position to try and save it so it would be strong enough to support the leg. There was a muck extraction bag on the lower half of his left leg. But he was alive and he still had the bottom half of his leg. The man in the front passenger seat was dead. I asked one of our local policemen, Brian, to go to the hospital and take a statement. Pete, at Deidre's instigation, was going to Brisbane for a 2nd opinion on whether or not to take the bottom half of the leg off, or to go through the many operations necessary to save it. There was a window of opportunity, as Pete had not lost consciousness until the operation, for the police to take down the statement necessary to convict the driver of excessive speeding, dangerous driving causing death and dangerous driving causing grievous bodily harm. In the years that followed it finally went to court. The driver pleaded guilty and was sentenced to about seven year's jail.

Pete rang me at 3.30am the day after S/C Brian took the statement. Pete was on the Royal Flying Doctor transfer flight to Brisbane, on the tarmac at a pick up for another passenger along the way, I think in Rockhampton.

"Mum my leg's blown up. I think it will need to come off as soon as I arrive in Brisbane. They're transferring me now. Can you come down straight away?"

"Yes, son! You hang in there mate!" I said. "I organised money from the church yesterday. I will

be on the first flight possible. I'll be there before lunch. You're in all our prayers. Family and friends from Kuranda to Melbourne are praying for you at the moment. You will be ok."

Two nights later, Pete was assessed by the plastic surgeon. He said that leg would always be weak and Pete would be disabled permanently. It would require up to 20 operations to save it. What did he want to do? Pete replied: "Well take it off! I'd rather a prosthetic and be able to get about properly without a gammy leg!" I was prepared to back whatever he decided. He'd earlier been assessed by a trauma psychologist that he was in his right mind to be making such a decision. He was scheduled for surgery the next afternoon/evening, with fiancee Deidre incoming from her high paying job overseas just in the nick of time to scoop him up on angel wings as he came out of theatre.

Now you might ask – and well you might – was this the worst day of my life? Perhaps this was it, as I'd sat for hours, with no one to talk with while he was in the operating theatre, knowing at that point that his leg was coming off. But no. This was not to be the worst day either.

Perhaps the next few days were the worst days of Pete's life, as he struggled, without a nerve block, which he'd opted not to have because he was frightened of becoming addicted to hard drugs.

On day 2, Pete was prescribed so many oral opiates, the pain management team could give him no more or else they'd have killed him. Yet he was still climbing the walls with pain. I called the doctor from that team aside.

"Pete is frightened of becoming addicted to opiates. His father was gut shot in Vietnam and became addicted to morphine while in hospital and reckoned getting off that was the worst thing of all.

"Can you please explain to him that the nerve block will mean the need to take oral opiates is reduced because he will be in more comfort after he has the nerve block during his wash-out operation tomorrow if he's prepared to consent to it?"

The doctor helped Pete to understand this. While he still went through the roof with pain after every wash-out in the weeks that followed, he may well have reached the worst day of his life at that point, waiting for that first nerve block and the oral opiates not holding the pain at bay. However, I had certainly not reached the worst day of my life. Nor had Pete, as it turned out.

The worst day for me came, I think, during a time when Pete was in jail after he got a pay out after his accident. I thought I'd lost him again as he turned to ice to help him cope. I became aware of this after he threatened to kill me, his face not 4 inches from mine and his fist raised.

Two burly policemen visited me to beg me to get a Domestic Violence Order on my son. So I did. I described the problem that he was on the ice and had threatened

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The magistrate put through the order uncontested. Two former partners had each threatened to kill me, too, some years earlier. One had even had a red hot go and been jailed for burglary and assault for that. Yet here I was traumatised again, and I'd had to throw Pete and his dad out over traumatising me further.

However, this was only part of the build up to the worst day of my life. A few years after this Pete received a \$250,000 compensation payout for the loss of his leg. More than \$10,000 went on bills for Centrelink Disability Support Pension he'd received in the interim, and on his RFDS transfer flight and solicitor's fees.

The next \$150,000 Pete then used variously to buy 3 cars, a boat, to gamble on the pokies, on living expenses and to put up his arm.

He was shooting up heroin to bring him down off the ice and shooting morphine for the pain he was in with his leg, all of it bought off drug dealers. So much for his worries about ever being addicted.

He was a full-blown, arguably manic and delusional addict.

During this time you might imagine Pete had a lot of hangers on as his "mates" were all happy to help him spend that money on drugs. Now, 12 months later, he's got no money, no cars, no boat and only a few mates left from those days and his new girlfriend, Meredith, is supporting him.

Before he got his payout I paid the bond and rent up front on a house for he and his elderly father to live in. I visited after his payout to get that money back, as he was rolling in dough, some of which I got, the rest of which I was told to "whistle Dixie for", as he wasn't paying it back.

Hummm. Still not quite the worst day of my life. That day came, after all of this and, while he was in jail for several driving while unlicensed offences, when my daughter and Pete's new girlfriend, Meredith, visited and stayed the night.

My daughter was going well, having been to see the psychologist who said she was "gold dust" and using all the strategies I had taught her to help her not take any nonsense from her brother or step father. We sat outside yarning up over a few drinks before I cooked dinner.

Meredith told me just how bad Pete had become on the drugs. She said: "I had to revive him a few times. He turned blue with a needle up his arm more than once! I had to revive him and call the ambulance!"

That was my lowest point – picturing Pete as an addict, hellbent on dying – with a needle in his arm. I cried buckets. She said: "He was on the heroin to get to sleep after the ice and on the morphine for the pain because he was neglecting his leg so badly. I was throwing him in the shower to get him cleaned up. His leg was so 'manky'."

I cried some more. Then I said, "I am grateful to you that you were there to get him through this and save his life. Lucky you were with him and know first aid. But how much of this do you want to take if he's still going downhill?"

"I love him," she said simply.

Then, about a year later, came a wonderful moment in amongst the anguish of Pete's ongoing drug use. Meredith revealed, after taking a break from Pete to get a few things straight in her life with him before Christmas, that she was starting next week with an ATODS (Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Dependent Substances) government-funded support group and was going to go on outings with them and meet other people in recovery from drugs to help bolster her determination to stay clear of drugs.

I was and am still so very proud of her. I am sad that Pete lost the lovely Deidre who opted out, down the track, having returned overseas to her job once she got Pete home to us after his amputation. I am so very grateful for her support during this difficult time in Brisbane and to family – and family of local friends - who accommodated us at short notice in Brisbane. However, Meredith is a trained youth worker. She knows how to turn her life around and re-engage with the community and is doing so. She has reinvigorated us with her love for Pete and brings to the relationship life saving and recovery tools that I pray will help not just her but ultimately help him and many other people, too

Hopefully this recovery journey will be the making of both of them and an inspiration to others and all who know them. There can be a life after drugs. If Pete hasn't reached his rock bottom vet, we need to pray that, when he does, he gets through it and will, like Meredith, also begin to rise again. My favourite poem is Maya Angelou's And Still I *Rise*. It is a mantra for some among my friends who, like Pete, have also gone down the road to ruin. They have recovered and give me hope that, he, too, can do so. Praise the Lord for his blessings and His lessons! And prayers for Pete that he find the lessons in all of this and make a wonderful life for himself! May God give Meredith strength to endure and Pete a determination to turn his life around!

A World of Pain Goes Largely Unnoticed

There would not be a community in Australia, it seems, which has not felt the sting of drug abuse and its many consequences. Those who become caught up, for whatever reason, are lost – sometimes forever. Kuranda and environs are not exempt from this problem. Many families need help and need it now.

Recently there has been much discussion in online community forums by Kuranda residents anxious for some breakthrough.

This month *The Kuranda Paper* is seeking to assist in opening up a wider community discussion on drug use and abuse in this community, and on a wider national level.

We have been entrusted with a mother's firsthand account of the impacts drugs have had on her family in her story 'The Worst Day of My Life". Ordinary people in ordinary families are being caught up in this terrible health emergency, smashing any preconceptions about what an addict looks like or how they got to such a point.

Kuranda is far from being unique in facing these problems. Communities all over the country (and indeed world-wide) are in similar (many far worse) situations. We are not alone. Which can be both sad but also hopeful, if we can come together in a non-judgemental, constructive way to look for solutions which will benefit everyone in the community.

Recently those who have been involved on both sides of the illicit drug issue, from former police heads, judges, medical practitioners and politicians to addicts, ex-addicts and their families have come together to welcome a new report 'Can Australia respond to drugs more effectively and safely?' commissioned and conducted by Australia21 (an independent not for profit think tank established in 2001.)

Australia21 commissions, conducts and reviews new research into complex social issues confronting Australia in a rapidly changing global environment. Its aim is to "foster fresh thinking about public policy and provide evidence-based solutions to difficult problems, shaping the best possible future for our nation."

We have published excerpts from the media releases about the report (on Page 16) to encourage wider community discussion about what changes we may need in the manner in which we regulate drugs and how we may be able to get politicians to tackle this urgent community issue. There is much more to be found on the Australia21 website for those interested (https://australia21.org.au)

So what can we do as individuals and as a community?

Firstly, we need to recognise that we have a problem. Secondly we need to help those struggling to beat it. And we must look at what resources we have (sadly it is widely agreed that Kuranda has little in the way of support resources). We also need to hear the voices of those who are directly affected and to do that they must be able to not be judged. This paper would welcome any input from local residents, as letters or submissions, which would contribute to a better understanding.

There have recently been calls from within the community for some kind of a forum. And it appears that the call has been heard. We have been advised through the MSC that "A community working group of community services and other interested parties is willing to organise a community education forum in Kuranda to provide information about the impacts of Ice on individuals, families and the wider community".

A date is yet to be set, but it's likely to be sometime in July, depending on the availability of specialist guest speakers. Please watch this space in the next edition and further details will be provided about the forum and the working group.

Our local police are calling on us to not see them as the enemy. They cannot respond to concerns if they don't know about them. They ask everyone who has seen drug-related activity they are concerned about to get in touch with the police by phone, by message or by calling Crime Stoppers on 1300 333 000.

It can be done completely anonymously and the police state that even if someone identifies themselves they won't be "outed". Only when the police have actual instances reported can they act.

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

The smallest macropod of all, the Musky Rat-Kangaroo, is found only up here in the northern rainforest. You might be lucky enough to have some in your backyard - whether you know it or not. Some experts claim that there is an average of only about two Musky Rat-Kangaroos per hectare throughout their limited range.

(reatures of Kuranda

They are one of the few marsupials that favour venturing out only in daylight, usually dawn and dusk. The animal was originally named "Rat" presumably because of misconceptions by the original European observers. They are in no way related to rodents, and some experts argue that they are not a kangaroo either, and actually have ancestry to possums.

You may see them on the edge of the rainforest feeding upon fallen berries, seeds, insects and some barks. In motion they will hop off on all fours, somewhat like a rabbit, rather than the more usual 'bound' associated with macropods. Their gait results in them often being mistaken for bandicoots.

They have a semi-prehensile tail which is used as a 'wrap around' tool and can carry twigs and other nesting items, and isn't used for balance as with other macropods. They are also unlike other macropods by having five toes on the rear feet, enabling limited climbing abilities.

They are usually a solitary animal, but small groups may congregate together where a certain food source is abundant. The Musky Rat-Kangaroo has been referred to as 'the forest gardener' because of its ritual of turning over the litter on the forest floor in search of insects and worms, and also it has been observed burying seeds away in the 'months of plenty' for later use as a food source in leaner times.


As would be expected of such a small marsupial, it is preyed upon by many predators including dingos, foxes, pythons, monitors, raptors, quolls - and of course the domestic cat and dog is responsible for many deaths. Naturally, rainforest clearing is a big threat, depriving them of foraging in forest litter for their food source. Only a limited area of North Queensland remains the sole habitat for this unique creature.

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Inside My Studio

Her history is rooted in both Australian and Hungary and local Kuranda artist Judit Sztraka is a meditation of her history.

Judit's artworks are not quiet. They have a voice and demand comment. Her alcohol ink paintings are powerful. Judit is fascinated with the properties of her materials. They give her an understanding of making and building. Her imaginative mind is certainly not limited and she takes inspiration from her rainforest environment.

Where is your current studio?

I work in my home in the rainforest in Kuranda. I have a few designated areas in the house for my artwork. I paint on the verandah when doing large canvases and I have a special room where I paint smaller works and my alcohol ink paintings.

Do you work alone or with others?

I work alone but I do not regard painting as 'work'. I enjoy it so much; the music I play and my own company.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

I need my CD player and a table, the table large enough to work on my ceramic tiles.

Describe your work pattern. (h/d/wks)

My work pattern is not consistent. I have a large family living nearby and I spend a lot of time with them. I grab 'my time' whenever I can. Sometimes I am doing more than one thing at once and I have been told that my Hungarian goulash could be smelt in the painting I was also working on.

Describe the work you do in your studio.

I paint, mainly on canvas, using bright acrylic paints. However, in the past year I have mastered the technique of alcohol ink painting on smooth ceramic tiles. The ink mixes with the paint and provides me with an extremely high colour subject. I am enjoying the results.

Why is painting your favourite medium?

I love colour and have always included it in my life in many different forms. In my alcohol ink paintings, however, I love to see the colours mixing. I am not controlling the mix in the process, the combination takes shape and talks to me. Each painted tile tells a story.

List three things you listen to while working.

I love jazz, classical, in fact any type of music. I have it wrapping around me while I paint. If someone is doing something else in the house at the time, I just put on the headphones. When I have


my smaller grandchildren in my care it is important that I can hear them. Together we like to listen to the calls of the rainforest birds.

Your favourite tool?

I have a special brush with chisel shaped bristles. I favour also a small sponge sometimes I apply the paint directly onto the sponge, other times I create a texture by dabbing the clean sponge on my artwork.

How do you identify your work?

On the bottom right-hand corner I paint 'Judit'. I paint it with a very fine brush and black ink.



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How do you sell your work?

I currently exhibit my work in the Kuranda Arts Co-op gallery in Kuranda. I have, in the past, always painted for my own enjoyment and the Co-operative inclusion has given me confidence and sales.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No, I do not sell from my studio. In regard to teaching, I teach my grandchildren the fun and benefits of colour, and the simplified techniques of painting with alcohol ink. One of my granddaughters shares time with the granddaughter of another Arts Co-op artist and together they paint on the verandah.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid work?

I had fulltime work for eight years in a shop in Kuranda but family commitments became a priority. I am now a volunteer at the Arts Co-op gallery each month.

If you could change one thing about your studio, what would it be?

I love it the way it is. I would not change anything. I am producing the most colourful artworks and I am enjoying painting them. Why would I want to change anything?

If you were not painting, what would you be doing?

I would like to travel. I came to Australia when I was very young and I would like to go back to Budapest and find my roots. I would like to take my children and grandchildren to see where their family came from - but I would always come back to Kuranda.

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Tech Talk

WITH THOMAS

Dear Thomas,

I've been advised to get a UPS for my office. Can you explain what this is and if it is worth the investment? Dorothy, Kuranda Village.

Hi, and thanks for the question. Well firstly, what is a UPS? A UPS, or officially known as an Uninterruptable Power Supply, is essentially a battery backup unit which is capable of providing short term clean power to connected equipment while your main power source is unavailable such as a random power failure, or circuit trip.

The UPS plugs into the mains power and then equipment such as your computer, monitor and other devices like your modem plug directly into the UPS. This way when the main power goes out, the UPS will quickly swap over to battery power within a few milliseconds preventing anything that you have plugged into it and running from experiencing a problem and turning off. This way you will be able to continue operating for some time on emergency battery power.

The UPS is also capable of protecting against other power instability problems such as brown outs and voltage spikes, as the UPS will fall over to the stable battery power when it detects any such problems – very handy in areas like Kuranda!

Many UPS' on the market are also capable of being connected to your computer via a USB cable, so that in the event you are not at your home or office at the time of a complete power failure, the UPS can send a message to the computer once the battery level inside the UPS is at critical level, and tell your computer to save anything currently open, and safely shut down.

Other features of UPS' are phone line surge protection, and non-battery surge protection for other

devices not critical such as printers. Over time, UPS batteries will degrade, and require replacement too. Most UPS to my knowledge will use a sealed lead-acid battery or two, and these are readily available at most battery outlets at quite affordable prices. UPS batteries will generally require replacement every 3 to 5 years.

What are the benefits of a UPS?

Having a UPS at your home or office can provide you with the following benefits:

• Avoid Data Loss: If the power goes out there is the potential for significant data loss unless you have recently saved everything. With a UPS you will be notified when you are running on battery power,





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- **Reduced Down Time:** This may or may not be important to you depending on what you're doing on your computer. The UPS is only a stop gap but can provide a minimum 30 minutes of power while using a PC. However, it is possible to get more out of it.
- Additional Equipment Protection: By protecting against random power anomalies, your equipment that is plugged in to the UPS will typically protected from unexpected power surges, voltage spikes and brownouts.
- Small and Affordable: Most UPS units that you will be looking to purchase for the home or small office environment are generally quite small and do not take up much space allowing you to easily hide it with your other power cables / power boards. They are also priced pretty well, for under a couple of hundred dollars you can get a decent UPS that will provide you with plenty of battery power. The amount of power will depend on the particular battery in the model you're looking at, however in my case my UPS will typically last for at least 20 minutes with the computer and monitor plugged in for about \$175. Considering the equipment that it's protecting is worth many times more than this, it's well worth it.

Selecting a UPS

UPS systems come in all sorts of shapes and sizes with different size batteries capable of lasting for different periods of time under certain levels of load. Space doesn't permit me to go into all the details. If in doubt don't hesitate to call me for advice.

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


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A FOOL is an English dessert, traditionally made by folding pureed Passionfruit Fool stewed fruit (classically gooseberries) into sweet custard. Foole is first mentioned as via bbc.co.uk (Recipe by Antony Worrall Thompson) a dessert in 1598.

Modern fool recipes often skip traditional custard and use whipped cream or crème fresh – if using whipping cream (or heavy cream), beat to double in volume. For best results, choose a deep bowl with straight sides. Chill the cream, beaters and bowl at least two hours before beating. Beat at medium-high speed until the cream begins to thicken. Then turn to medium speed and beat only until the cream holds soft peaks and is still glossy. Vegan options also exist with plant based creams/ custards and there are also rawfood options using creamed nuts.

Cream-of-the-crop fruits make the best fools, for the sweeter the fruit, the less sugar needed. Ripe berries are the most common fruits for fools, but mangos, bananas, apples, dried fruits and rhubarb work. Harder fruits should be cooked before they're pureed. You can also make a "mock" fool by mixing equal parts of pureed fruit and softened vanilla ice cream or frozen yoghurt.

A stemmed parfait or sherbet glass is traditional. Garnish your fool with fresh berries and mint sprigs or sprinkle them with toasted almonds or crumbled macaroons.

Fruit fools are best served within 24 hours of preparation.

Blueberry Fool (Rawfood, Vegan)

via Raw on \$10 a Day - http://www.rawon10.com serves 4

Ingredients 1 cup cashews

2 ripe bananas juice of 1 lemon pinch of salt 1/2 cup water for blending, as needed 4 ounces blueberries, frozen and thawed Plus some whole blueberries, walnuts and agave syrup for garnish

Directions

In a blender, puree the bananas until very smooth. Add the nuts (I used cashews) and lemon juice and about a half cup water for blending. Puree on high for several minutes, until smooth and creamy. Refrigerate for at least a few hours. It will thicken quite a bit as it chills. THIS becomes your "nut" yoghurt. To make the "fool", take half the nut yoghurt you have made and puree with a handful of frozen blueberries. In each serving bowl, put a spoon of plain nut yoghurt and another of blueberry yoghurt, add a few whole blueberries to the top. Garnish with a couple chopped walnuts and a drizzle of agave, if desired.

Ingredients

12 passionfruits

280ml double cream (or coconut or other vegan yoghurt)

100g icing sugar

1 lemon, juice only

2 tsp Malibu or coconut rum (optional)

Directions

Cut the passion fruits in half, scoop out the pulp with a spoon and place in a bowl. Gently whisk the cream in a large bowl and place in the fridge, along with four glasses. Sieve the icing sugar into a bowl, and set aside.

When you wish to eat, whisk the icing sugar into the cream with the lemon juice and coconut rum.

Fold in the passion fruit pulp and pour the fool into the chilled glasses. Serve with biscuits of your choice.

Mango Fool

via deliaonline.com

Ingredients

1 medium ripe mango

55 ml double cream (or coconut or other vegan yoghurt)

1 level teaspoon caster sugar

Directions

Slice the mango in half lengthways around the stone and pull the two halves apart.

With mangoes the flesh does tend to cling hard to the stone, but the beauty of this recipe is that is doesn't matter. Pull the two halves apart then, using a teaspoon, scrape flesh out of the two shells into a nylon sieve. Then scrape off any flesh left clinging to the stone, too. Set the sieve over a bowl then take a wooden spoon and press all the fruit through the sieve until all the purée is in the bowl and only any fibrous bits left in the sieve. Then, using an electric whisk, whip the cream until thickened. Stir the sugar into the mango purée then, with a metal spoon, fold the purée into the cream. Pour the whole lot into a stemmed glass, cover the glass with cling film then leave the fool to chill in the fridge for at least a couple of hours.





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Library Lines

The official launch of the Kuranda Library's new guided reading resources was held on Monday 20th March with representatives from local schools, Department of Education and Training, Nelson Publishing and interested community members attending. The concept of having sets of guided readers in the library as borrowable resources came about when library staff identified the need for a quality early literacy resource after many requests for help and suggestions from parents who were interested in continuing their children's reading progress over the school holidays. While there are many misconceptions about levels for guided reading, the underlying principal is simple - levelled books are organised according to a continuum of increasing difficulty. The libraries presentation of the readers was well received by both the Nelson and Department of Education and Training, each level has a numbered card identifying the key outcomes needed to be achieved on that particular level. Carrie Smith – Early Years Program Officer from DET, said it was a great initiative and she is looking into how she can incorporate the cards into the 3s programs (abecedarian approach) in Kuranda and Mareeba. The books are now available to borrow in both Kuranda and Mareeba libraries.

April Library Events



I am pleased to announce that I have been successful in securing \$4.5 million to build a new school hall at Caravonica State School as part of the \$200 million Advancing Queensland Schools funding package. After meeting with the school Principal, Business Manager and P&C President we were able to present a compelling case to secure the funding.

The new hall will allow for full assemblies instead of the existing practice of dividing the school in two and holding separate gatherings. It will give students an area for all weather physical education classes (including Cairns Taipans basketball clinics) as well as provide a space to hold end of year concerts.

Clifton Beach residents have recently raised safety concerns with a 400 metre section of the Captain Cook Highway at Clifton Beach including pedestrian safety. I have taken Main Roads and Road Safety Minister Mark Bailey, along with the department Director General and Regional Director to visit the site. All agreed that safety can be improved and I will be working with the Minister and the department to progress safety measures and road improvements.

As the wet season draws to a close, the project to duplicate Bill Fulton Bridge on Cairns Western Arterial Road (CWAR) is progressing well, and is now about onethird complete. Crews have completed driving all 82 piles to a combined depth of 1783 metres. These piles support five headstocks and two abutments, which make up the bridge's sub-structure. Contractors are currently manufacturing 108 concrete deck units (weighing a combined 2150 tonnes), which will be lifted into place during April and May.

Stage two of major earthworks will commence in late March. This involves moving about 3,000m3 for surcharge material, 6,000m3 of embankment and 2,000m3 of fill for construction and access purposes. That's enough dirt to fill about 41/2 Olympic-sized swimming pools!

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

CASSOWARY **IDENTIFICATION**

A well attended meeting early last month generated many questions and discussion. We also had a snake segment which was of great interest to some but saw others taking a distant back seat. Thanks to Greg Watson for his most informative lecture and demonstration. Hopefully, everyone now feels comfortable with snakes!!

We chose to keep the cassowary ID segment uncomplicated, focussing on the main differences between males and females rather than the many finer points that distinguish one individual from another.

Main points are:

- Colours on both adult males and females is the same:
- Male is a little smaller than the female:
- Female wears a fairly straight skirt (to show her sexy legs) while the male has a markedly bushy tail (which he needs to cover all the eggs he sits on).


FERAL PIGS

Ecology of the Kuranda Tree Frog

Kuranda Tree Frog, Litoria myola, was the talk of the town last week when JCU Ecologist, Dr Conrad Hoskins shared his research and genetics behind describing the frog as a new species. He was working on the Green eyed tree frog Litoria serrata but later through extensive research, the population in Myola showed differences in appearance and distinct mating calls. Some people around Kuranda believe they have this frog on their property. Give us a ring so we can help you check this for sure or come out on one of our frog monitoring nights to check out the calls with us. Plant of the Month: Lime Berry

Micromelum minutum Attractive rainforest shrub

to 8m with masses of multi coloured fruit and large clusters of sweetly perfumed white flowers can occur at the same time. Easy to propagate, comes up in large numbers. Attracts many bird species. Host plant for Orchard Swallowtail, Swallowtail, Fuscous and Ambrax butterflies. The flowers are generally attractive to many butterflies, not just those whose caterpillars feed on the leaves.



Yellow Crazy Ant Taskforce: Volunteers Needed

The Yellow Crazy Ant infestation in Russett Park continues to be contained with intensive management by the Kuranda YCA Taskforce & support from Wet Tropics Management Authority and project partners. Fortnightly monitoring results show a slow increase in numbers since the baiting last year so immediate action is required. Recently tracks have been cleared by Green Army teams, volunteers & Envirocare casuals, for ease of access to bait across the 27 ha infestation area. The yearly delimitation survey to determine the boundary of containment by placing jam lures to attract the ants is set for 22nd April. This will be followed by a baiting activity on 29 April. We need all hands on deck so if you can spare some of your time please contact us on the details below. Your help is greatly appreciated. We must win this battle for the cake of our



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

A Thought for Easter

I often get told: "Oh, you don't know what it feels like. You have never experienced anything like what I have being going through" is a not an uncommon reaction from people who have been facing up to tragedy in some shape or form. We can try to sympathise. We can try to draw on our own experiences or observations but sometimes they just don't connect with the experience someone is facing. What they need is someone who can draw alongside them who will be able to sympathise and to fully understand. Even as a Priest I sometimes find myself at a loss in such situations. I know, however, that I can point them to God as someone who will understand and with whom they can share their feelings.

Jesus is at the right hand of God interceding for us, St Paul reminds us in Romans 8, and he is someone who in his life here on earth experienced suffering in many of its forms. At his birth, he was a refugee, as his family fled to Egypt. He faced up to temptation in all its forms — and faced that temptation to the full, because, unlike us, he did not give in to it.

During his ministry he experienced misunderstanding and persecution. His followers were slow to understand him, his enemies quick to attack him. He was even rejected by his own family who labelled him a mad-man. He experienced hunger and thirst, poverty and homelessness; He knew grief as he wept at the death of his friend Lazarus. There's quite a few of the pressures we face in that list.

It is his 'Passion' that we see Jesus plumb the depths of human suffering, however. Over the next few weeks we turn our eyes upon the cross of Jesus and the arrest and trials which led up to it. There he experienced betrayal by one of his followers. All his friends ran away, leaving him to face the music alone. He was falsely arrested, accused and condemned after a rigged trial. He was abused, mocked and mistreated.

He faced physical agonies — beaten and scourged, nailed to a cross — his mobility taken away, feet and hands nailed to a cross, fighting for every last breath as he hung there, until his heart gave up. He even experienced the spiritual pain of feeling deserted by God. (He was bearing the judgement of God on our sin, a judgement that came between him and the Father with whom he had always lived in perfect fellowship.) Physical, mental, spiritual, emotional pain — Jesus experienced them all.

Whatever our problem we can take it to Jesus. We can be assured of his understanding and of his love. His death and resurrection enable us to know God's love and presence in our lives. Having dealt with the judgement on our sin, the barriers between us and God have been broken down. God can come into our lives. Jesus is Risen from the dead, he is alive for evermore. He has overcome all the evils of this world. There is hope for the future where sin, sickness and sorrow will all be done away. That gives us hope for the future but now we can know He is there for us. It is to this Jesus that we can turn in prayer. We can be sure that he understands and cares. Those around us may not understand our troubles but Jesus can. His life, death and resurrection are a guarantee of that.

Baha'i Thought for the Month

On March 20th Baha'is around the world celebrated Naw-Ruz (New Year)

Did you know that this is the world's oldest holiday? March 20 marks the Vernal Equinox in the Earth's Northern Hemisphere and the Autumnal Equinox in the South—that day when the sun's light strikes the Equator directly and illuminates every continent equally.

Naw-Ruz, Nowruz or New Year's is celebrated by Zoroastrians, Alewites, Sufis, some Muslims, and Baha'is, this secular holiday has been observed around the world for more than three thousand years. (In Farsi, the Persian language, Naw-Ruz means "new year" or "new day.") Naw-Ruz probably originated with Zoroaster the monotheistic messenger who founded Zoroastrianism ten centuries before Christ.

The United Nations also now recognises March 20 as World Happiness Day.

For Baha'is, Naw-Ruz isn't only a celebration – it serves as a symbolic reminder of the oneness of all the messengers of God, and the spiritual springtime they each brought to humanity. Abdu'l-Baha explains that Naw-Ruz represents the return of the Sun of Reality, when a re-awakening of the spirit occurs and the light of a new revelation shines equally upon the entirety of God's creation:

"...just as the solar cycle has its four seasons, the cycle of the Sun of Reality has its distinct and successive

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periods. Each brings its vernal season or springtime. When the Sun of Reality returns to quicken the world of mankind a divine bounty descends from the heaven of generosity. The realm of thoughts and ideals is set in motion and blessed with new life. Minds are developed, hopes brighten, aspirations become spiritual, the virtues of the human world appear with freshened power of growth and the image and likeness of God become visible in man. It is the springtime of the inner world..."

In it the former springtime has returned, the world is resuscitated, illumined and attains spirituality; religion is renewed and reorganised, hearts are turned to God, the summons of God is heard and life is again bestowed upon man. -Abdu'l-Baha

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
