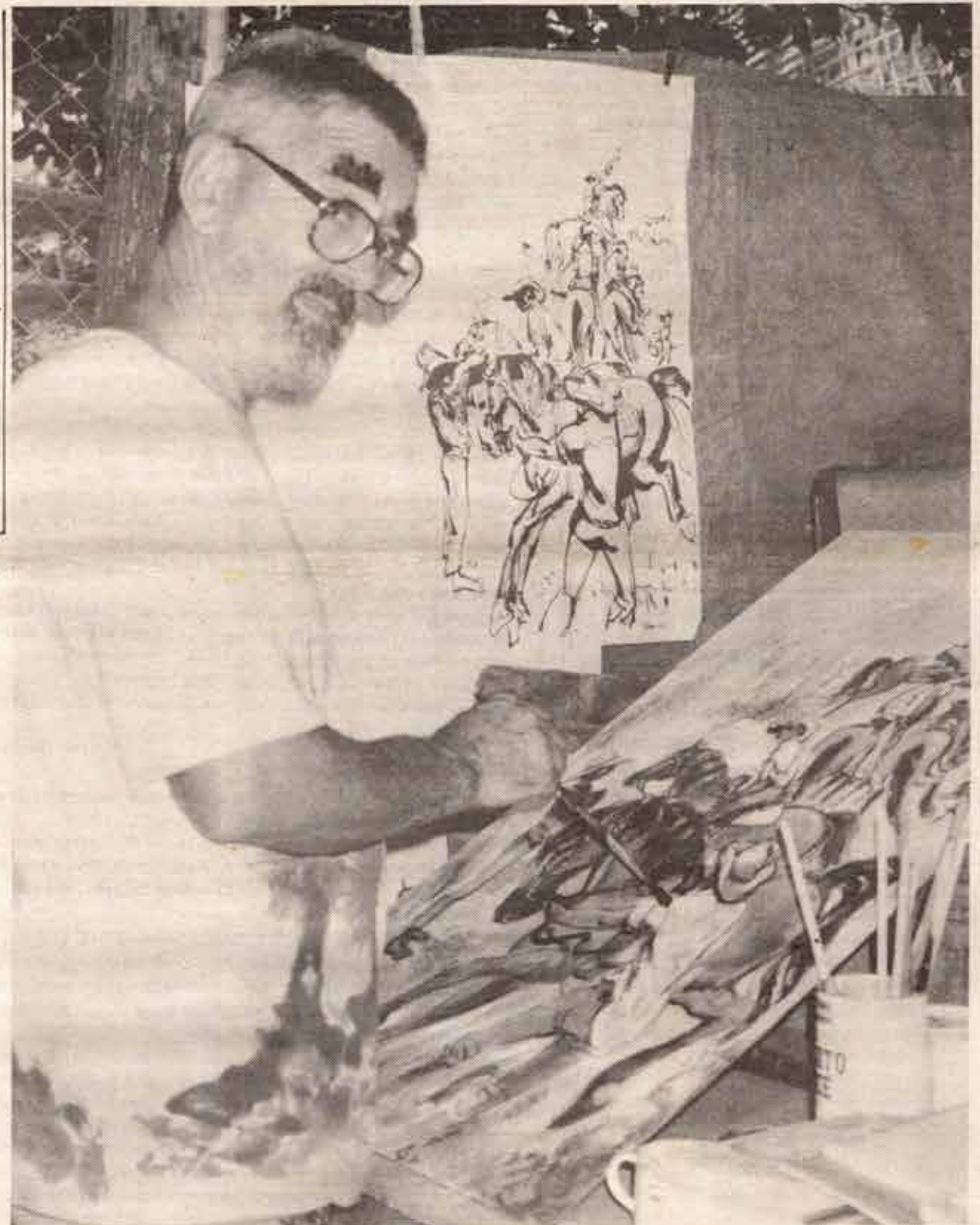

Kuranda artist and author Ron Edwards was awarded the Order of Australia Medal in the Queen's Birthday Honours for his lifetime's work in the field of Australian folklore.

"Folklore is not just songs about shearing sheep" said Ron " But something that concerns every aspect of our lives, it is in fact the very essence of what makes us Australian. It concerns bush crafts, yarns, and a variety of customs and superstitions that we all carry around with us."

"At present I am on the Committee of the Australian Folklife Centre, and we have rooms in the Australian Museum in Canberra, we hope in time to set up a display of all aspects of our folklife. My present research is into all those little books that people acquire and then throw away later. These are the items that are important to preserve as part of our folklore."

"Old machinery catalogues, engineers, saddlers and farmer's catalogues are very important, as these are the things that get dirty through use and then are thrown out. Other interesting items that seem to always get thrown away are roneoed collections of bawdy ballads, the sort of things that a lot of servicemen collected during the war. These seem to be always being destroyed."

Dear Kuranda Paper,

The following is a plea to my fellow Kuranda residents:

A group of concerned Kuranda residents are joining forces in a challenge in the Lands and Environment Court to overturn Mareeba Shire Council's "development at any cost" approach to residential development in the Kuranda district. How much development can Kuranda sustain and still keep its character and quality of life for residents and visitors alike?

I am spearheading a group of residents concerned with proposed intensive development in the Masons Rd area. Our concerns include loss of quality of life for residents and environmental pressures such as erosion and pollution of Jum Rum Creek (including run off and septic seepage). In the wet season, sewerage lying in septic trenches can be flushed out and flow over the top of the ground. This has already happened in the Kuranda Village and it will happen across the countryside if intensive development is allowed to continue unchecked.

If you think this has nothing to do with you, please think again.

Regulated development, as set out in Kuranda's 1985 Development Control Plan by the MSC is in everybody's interest. It allows for a gentle absorption of population into our environment, aids a healthy commercial growth and also allows our environment to recover in the course of time as houses replace trees. Unfortunately it is only a guideline and the Council can disregard it at its discretion: even against residents' wishes!

If Council continues to allow Rural Residential land to be carved into small blocks, setting precedents for next developer and then the next: the next could be your neighbour!

It's time for residents to set the precedent, and by overthrowing Council's decision on intensive residential development force Council and developers to consider residents' objections in the future. It will halt the unregulated push to fundamentally change the character of Kuranda.

We have a nucleus of resident professionals who are offering their advice and expertise without charge. But we need your financial support to help pay for those parts of the court appeal not covered by the expertise available through residents. We expect the total cost to be around \$10,000. We need 100 people to donate \$100, 200 people with \$50, 300 people with \$33 and so on, to raise the money to fund this fight. The more people the less money each will need to contribute and the stronger our case will be in terms of people power. We have already had significant offers of funds. All contributions will be receipted and placed in a trust fund. Not all the money is required immediately or in a lump sum. It will be required over the period of the next few months. Please help.

**KURANDA CONSULTATIVE GROUP.**

Please note the change of name (minor) from Committee to Group. We resolved to do this at our May 20th meeting as the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce shortens to KCC as did we... very confusing.

We meet on the third Wednesday of each month at the CWA hall. The 'committee representatives' meet at 6.30pm and the regular public meeting begins at 7.30pm. Division Four councillors and MSC Chairman Chris Lewis attend.

The KCG was initiated by the Mareeba Shire Council to address the problems of lack of sufficient dialogue between Council and Kuranda residents, leading to sometimes heated misunderstandings and frustration.

At a public meeting held in July 1990 two area representatives were voted in by residents of their respective areas: Kuranda and Myola. It was proposed by Council that Speewah and Koah also have representatives but this did not eventuate at that time. These two people formed the nucleus of the 'Community Consultative Committee'.

Council also proposed a separate committee be set up comprising three representatives from the "Benefitted Area" (roughly the area serviced by sewerage) where residents pay an extra rate. The purpose of this committee was to set priorities for the use of this then \$25000 of benefitted area money.

However the Community reps refused to serve if there were two separate committees saying that although priorities could be set for the Benefitted Area funds this did not mean that the Benefitted Area residents 'owned' the Village and the community had a right to know and be consulted on the planning and running of its own town. This was agreed to although it did prove cumbersome.

This year a second round of Area Representative elections took place. Unfortunately apathy meant that few people turned up to vote for their area reps. However several new people volunteered their efforts to keeping informed on what's happening in and around Kuranda. Speewah has of course established its own residents group and Koah seems to be heading the same way. Unfortunately too much as always seems to fall on too few and there is some burn out of those few individuals who can't help themselves when it comes to caring for their community. This has led to a lightening up of meeting procedure and the setting of some long term positive goals.

At the May 20th meeting it was decided to publish Area Representatives names and phone numbers and to advise as how best to use the KCG when you have a problem. First off if you have a concern or problem: start by using the proper channels. That is:

1. Write to Council (and send a copy to Councillor June Rees, P.O.Box 63 Kuranda). This is vital as written correspondence is your only evidence of dialogue. Phone calls are not good enough.
2. Discuss it with your Division Four Councillors June Rees and Wally Gray.
3. Contact (phone or write) your Area Representative. If you wish the matter discussed at the KCG meeting (with you present or not) contact by the Friday before the meeting to have it placed on the agenda.
4. Or attend the public meeting at 7.30pm. Be prompt, if there is no one for the meeting - we are all going home. After all we are all busy people.

**PLEASE NOTE:** Some of us have been meeting once a month for two years and we have some specific items we discuss many times e.g. Skyrail, Buses, Planning etc. This is because we feel they have enormous impact. The one hour allotted to us (shared between Community Consult. and Benefitted Area) means we have to be quick. Items on the agenda, sometimes carried over, take up almost all that hour sometimes. Anything else has to carry over into the public meeting time at 7.30 when general business can be discussed. Some people who are not Area Representatives have started attending the Committee meeting at 6.30. This is fine but they must be patient and act as observers only until the committee agenda is finished. One hour is not long at all.

Out of all this meeting and discussion some good things have happened. Recently Gayle Hannah (Kuranda) and Arch McArthur (Barron Falls) compiled a project application called "Kuranda: Everybody's Place" seeking funds for a pilot study into conflict resolution and sustainable development in the Kuranda area. It has been forwarded to the Office of Local Government in Canberra and we are awaiting assessment. We have received support for the application from the Mareeba Shire Council and Dr Lesley Clarke MLA for Barron River as well as other FNQ politicians. We see this as a first step towards the desperately needed planning studies to allow for an environmentally, economically and culturally healthy future for all. Over and over again all members of both committees express concern and frustration at the lack of proper planning and development control in Kuranda.

Councillor June Rees has committed herself to appraising residents, through these meetings, of anything of impact on Kuranda. However, we can all understand she has a dog's job keeping up with all that happens. Therefore she makes council minutes available through the library at the CWA hall for residents to peruse. Remember she's your councillor not your mother... it's up to each and every one of us to keep our eyes and ears open and not blame anyone else for our ignorance of what's happening around us.

**AROUND THE RIDGES**

1. **RECREATION AREA: SPEEWAH:** Due to the efforts of the Speewah District Residents Assoc. a park for the area has been purchased by council this financial year. A plan has been forwarded showing proposed use: hall, bush fire brigade, playground, tennis court, open area & landscaping. The park has been officially named "ROSCOMMON" (meaning common meeting place) appropriately in recognition of an historic pioneer homestead (prior to Speewah).
2. **MANTAKA:** Council is proceeding with the provision of water to the Mantaka Sports Ground (Pony Club)
3. **HUNTER PARK:** Work has commenced on the large fill area in preparation for levelling to accommodate a public sports oval.
4. **KURANDA CEMETARY:** There are no gravesites remaining in the monumental section and only 22 sites left in the lawn section (no headstones). The question is now whether council purchase land for a new cemetery (min 20 acres) in the Kuranda area - or all future burials be carried out in Mareeba or Cairns! This shortage has been reported for many years and council now has to make an urgent decision. The availability of a suitable site and the cost of land purchase to ratepayers is a real headache. Any constructive suggestions or donation of land would be most welcome.
5. **ILLEGAL SIGNAGE:** Council considered a report dated 3rd June from the Town Planner regarding removal of illegal signs in the Kuranda Village resulting from numerous complaints received from the business sector and residents. Council resolved to direct the owners of signs which have been unlawfully fixed to buildings to remove or legitimize within 30 days (to policy) or council will take action under the provision of the by-laws to have them removed. The same will apply to all other signage - banners, sandwich boards, etc. with no exceptions as per previous council minutes. Council has noted that one premise alone shows 55 illegal signs.
6. **VANDALISM:** To date Kuranda Village has been fairly free of gross vandalism. Unfortunately this has changed. It appears a new group of low life has hit town intent on venting their spleen on all and sundry. Most devastating was the sabotaging under darkness of Yvonne Carrick's long hours of voluntary art work in Centenary Park - black spray paint and computer print out slogans. Its apparent they neither pay rates or rents (inadvertant rates) and surely should know that such costly restoration for this rampage comes straight back to the residents' pockets. With only 4500 people paying for the total costs for Division 4, from Kuranda to Mt Carbine - roads, maintenance, parks & gardens, water, garbage & on costs to name but a few of the items budgeted for annually one would have to be somewhat short of the quid not to realize that such costs would shortfall funding for much needed facilities around Kuranda in the following budget. I am personally offering a substantial reward for any information regarding the identification of this pro - pollution group.



**KEEP AUSTRALIA BEAUTIFUL**  
COUNCIL Executive Director **Glenys Anderson** has high praise for Kuranda as a naturally beautiful place. However, litter under and around the landmark Coondoo Street figs attracted her attention during her recent Tidy Towns visit. Although there is a temptation to blame it all on tourists, locals are also to blame. If visitors see locals discarding rubbish on the streeyts with an I couldn't care less attitude (as happens) why should they bother to look for that bin? It was Wednesday evening and the aerobics class had just finished. One of my students exclaimed "I'm so full of energy I could just go for a jog". Now I knew she doesn't jog, preferring low impact exercise, so I suggested she stay for the next class - a stretch, strength, tone and relax class. She decided she would, sending a message to her husband via one of the other students asking him to please start dinner. Bravo Judith!

I find this kind of enthusiasm most rewarding especially when I see women taking the time to do something for themselves. In the end their families benefit from it, as the woman gains more energy and self esteem thus making them happier and better people, wives and mothers.

Judith was 'energised' after the first class because she has learned to work at her 'target heart rate' and by being aware of this and maintaining it her muscles receive oxygen during exercise via her circulatory system. The result is an overall good feeling with high energy. Often people, including myself, come to class feeling tired, especially having worked all day. As they learn to work aerobically they can actually use the class to give them the energy they need to get through the rest of the day.

If people work too hard at exercising, either through inexperience or in trying to keep up with someone who's a gold medal winning triathlete, they will feel exhausted at the end of a class. They have not worked aerobically and the result is fatigue. It is important to know when we are no longer working aerobically, whether running, walking or cycling so that we get the most out of our exercising.

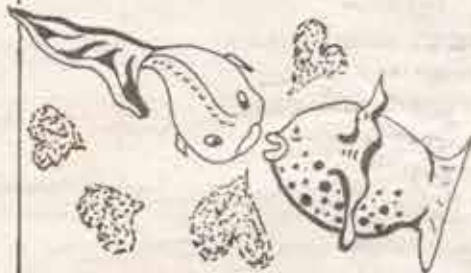

**ORGANIC GROWING**  
by Marjorie Spear

My macadamia nut crop this year was good. If you leave the nuts too long on the ground, some minute insect (ant?) gets in and you will find the nut is horrible to eat. I have recently been told of a super way to crack the nuts if you grow them or buy them in the shell. Freshly shelled nuts have a much better flavour than the pre-packed shelled nuts, which have little flavour. You soak the nuts for about a week in water; then you keep them in a shady spot covered with wet sack or cloth until you notice that the nut has started to split. You can then open the shell easily, remove the nut and enjoy the delicious flavour -- much easier than a laborious nut cracker or a vice or a hammer.

My salad vegies are growing fine; water very early afternoon, some seaweed liquid or fish emulsion once a week makes the lettuce accelerate. Varieties are most important, Webbs Wonderful is excellent for the winter months.

The recent weather is great for growing vegies, but a little derris dust in the heart of young cabbages is necessary if they are being nibbled. You then have to water round the roots - overhead watering washes out the derris dust. Garlic sprays are weakened by the lovely heavy dews we are enjoying.

Many shrubs are now needing a good prune - these prunings can be stacked in a corner of your garden and will decompose for mulch.

Pawpaws have been ripening well with the good sunshine - don't water them too often - some liquid manure is helpful - so is mulch, but never near the pawpaw trunk - thinning out excess leaves and some small fruit has made my pawpaws ripen better. Yellow Passion Fruit are ripening well. If you have the original yellow gold you may find it sour. The newer African yellow bears a large egg-shaped fruit and is very sweet and tasty.

**KURANDA RESIDENTS HELP CELEBRATE INAUGURAL GRADUATION OF Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander HEALTH WORKERS**

The night of June 18th saw many locals at the Kunjal Theatre Restaurant for a very special occasion. They were there to celebrate and congratulate 23 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health workers who were graduating from the certificate course in primary health care: the very first of its kind in Queensland.

Many of these Kuranda people have had involvement with the course since 1983. The graduates came from Cairns, Yarrabah, Mareeba, Mossman, Remote Cape York communities and Torres Strait islands and commenced the course in May 1991. These graduates are now more equipped to help improve the health status of their people.

The course (designed by A & I people) involves: clinical skills, political and cultural issues, environmental health, maternal and child health, womens/ mens business, pharmacy, respiratory, eye and heart diseases: as well as mental health, diabetes, STDs and HIV/AIDS.

The third intake to the course will see at least one Kuranda Murrrie enrolled who has worked for the Wuchopperin Health Service for 8 years, also serving the Murrrie population of Kuranda and Mona Mona.

Among the 300 people present at the graduation ceremony were Mrs Rose Richards and niece Leila Grogan, Clarrie Grogan, Esme and her daughter Eselyn, Ali and Louise Ramzan, Joyce Jelley, Bruce and Hilary McKay, Peter McCabe, Mary MacDonald and James T.

Bruce McKay, the on campus co-ordinator for the course said "This is a very special night.. historic I wouldn't wear this bow tie for Her Maj or Keating but I am for these students".

And the secret of the course's success? "The strength, determination and motivation of the students and all the murrrie people involved. Four of the students have had a baby during the one year course and all are graduating: that says a lot about commitment"

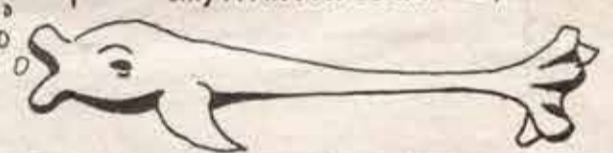

**NECTAMBROSIA  
THE TENTH MUSE**

An occasional article devoted to Food and Wine.

If I say, "Breakfast", do you immediately think of bacon and eggs on toast or perhaps even croissants?  
If I say, "Onion Soup" do you automatically think of French Onion soup?  
Well, here are a couple of suggestions to overcome such responses.

Let me suggest that the following is probably more suitable as a late 'brunch' dish which should be served with a glass of Rose Champagne.

**CREPES FILLED WITH PAPAYA AND BANANA.**

I have no doubt that you have your favourite Crepe recipe and I shall only give you the filling and final assembly of this breakfast delight.

**FILLING**

- Ripe papaya
- 2 ripe bananas
- 1 tbsp unsalted butter
- 2 tbsp sugar
- 3 tsp lemon juice

**TOPPING**

- Castor sugar
- Icing sugar



So you will have prepared your favourite crepes and allowed them to cool. Now peel the fruits and cut into small pieces. Melt the butter in a small pan and lightly saute the fruit. Remove the fruit to a bowl and sprinkle with the sugar and lemon juice. Stir gently without breaking up the fruit. Place the crepes on a flat work surface. Fill with a teaspoon of fruit filling placed near the bottom edge of the crepe. Fold in the sides and roll into shapes resembling dim sims. Transfer the filled crepes to a buttered baking tray. Sprinkle the crepes with castor sugar and heat in an oven at 200 oC until warmed through. Remove from oven, sprinkle with icing sugar and arrange on a serving platter. Now all that you'll need is that Rose Champagne!

**ONION SOUP WITH MUSCAT**

- 550gm Onions, finely chopped
- 65g of unsalted butter
- 75g Fennel, chopped
- 75g Leek, chopped
- 1 Ltr Chicken stock (vegetable stock if you prefer)
- 100 ml double cream
- 50ml Muscat
- salt and freshly ground pepper



Stew the onions in the butter until transparent. Add the fennel, leek, stock, salt and pepper. Simmer slowly for about 25 minutes until all ingredients are well cooked. Liquidise in food processor or pass through a sieve. Return to the heat and stir in the cream. Add Muscat and season to taste. Ladle the soup into plates and garnish with a spoonful of Muscat, if you like. Serve with croutons.  
I like this soup with toast and blue cheese. I know that when you are serving this soup you will have to explain that it is nothing like the French onion soup, but on cool nights it is exactly right!

Converting a raw concept into a production reality involves more than just rehearsing the play. Flats need painting, props must be found and made, and lighting and sound gear rigged and programmed.

Shed Theatre's policy of keeping involved members to a minimum means many of the crew are doubling up on different jobs, so the lighting operator could also be the set painter or even the director. This approach leads we hope, to a smoother production in which everyone takes responsibility for the final event.

Of course the proof of the pudding is in the eating, and the essential elements to all theatre, that even the best crew in the world cannot provide us with an audience. So treat yourself to a night out at the theatre and join us in making Tango a memorable performance.

**THE MYSTERY AND GLAMOUR OF GLASS**

by Jim Francis

In prehistoric days the first shining beads were moulded from silica, sand, potash and lime were made. Crude glass objects have been unearthed in Egypt from circa 3,000 years ago, perhaps even earlier from Asia.

Blown glass was a major achievement prior to the Christian era, when glass became more available, not only for the wealthy and high born.

Emperor Tiberius brought Egyptian glass workers to Rome. Tiberius was so enamored with glass he learned to make it himself. Both Caligula and Seneca mention glazed windows, one of the luxuries of the times. Remains of windows were found in the ruins of Pompeii.

The first coloured glass used may have been in St Sophia, Istanbul, and the church of St Martin in Tours, France, 6th Century.

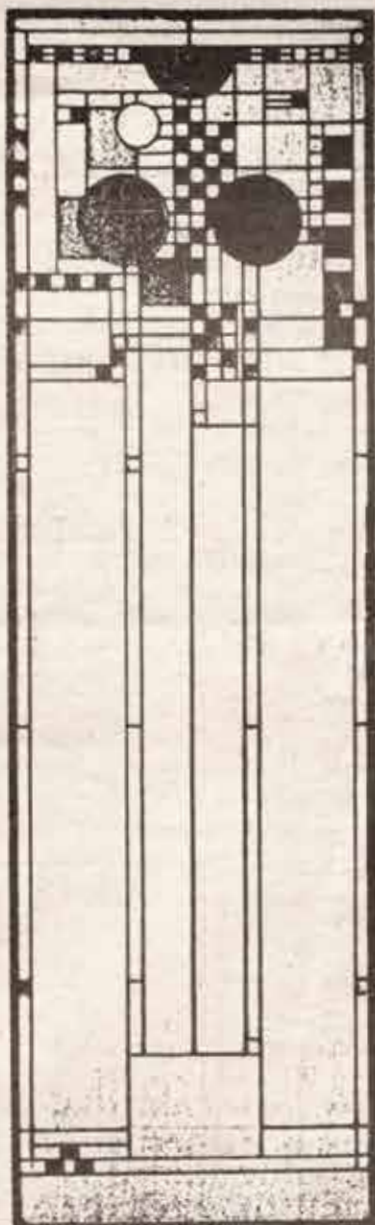
The secrets of glassmaking did not perish when the savage hordes ravaged Europe. The city of Venice was founded by refugees from plundered Rome. Venice later replaced Constantinople and the monasteries as the centre of glass work.

In Australia, most stained glass and leadlight windows were imported until 1890, for business and public buildings. A frequent crime of early 1800 was theft of glass from existing windows, the penalty was severe.

The 1880 - early 90's saw a boom in glass work, mainly Victorian and Gothic revival styles. With the Federation period 1900 of Architecture, came Art Nouveau and Art Deco. Australian native plants, magpies, kookaburras and parrots featured in early Australian leadlights.

A new interest in leadlights started about 1960.

This design of Frank Lloyd Wright, in New York Metropolitan Museum, helped inspire a new interest in leadlights.



**REGIONAL ARTS DEVELOPMENT FUNDING**

Grants for the second round of applications have been accepted by Council for funding and have been forwarded to Brisbane for approval. This is a system of matched funding. The MSC will give \$1 and the State will match it with \$1.50 to fund Arts & Cultural activities in the Mareeba Shire. Thus far the system has worked well with all but two projects being granted funding statewide.

First round applications were approved and funded. Those with applications on the drawingboard at the moment should be aware that the closing date for the next funding round is November 15th 1992 at the MSC office.

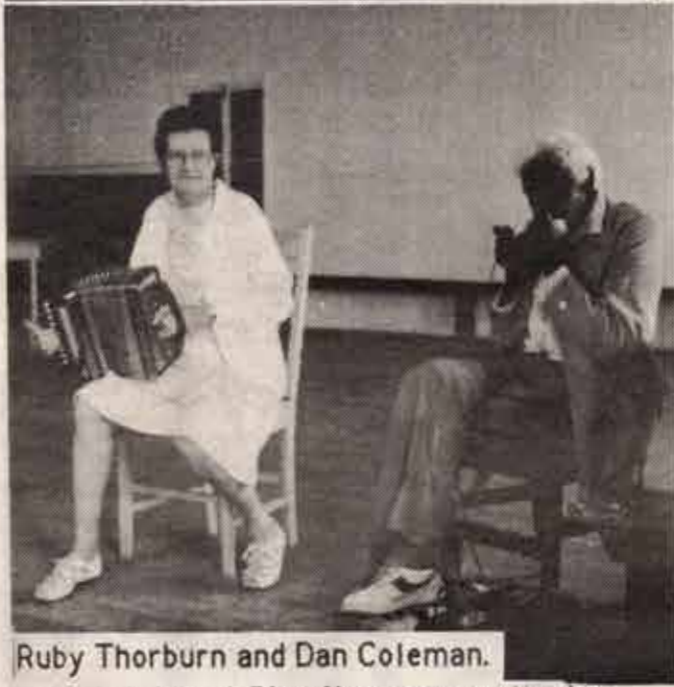

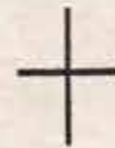
