

# What A Wild Wet



MARCH 2018 will be remembered for delivering the kind of Wet Season we long for, or dread, according to taste and experience. Early March saw days of relentless rain which swelled creeks, filled dams and turned on Din Din (Barron Falls), eliciting local and world wide attention.

When Kuranda local Richard Gilmore took a little video of the pumping Falls on the morning of March 9th and posted it to his Facebook timeline he had no idea it would picked up by The Cairns Post and Daily Mail, among many others, and eventually be viewed just over a million times and shared over 20,000 times. Even less likely was that he would be posting Din Din pumping again and even harder before the month was out.

Locals and visitors flocked to Kuranda, braving the wet and wild conditions to experience the roar and rumble of Din Din and to be refreshed and invigorated by the clouds of mist thrown up by the water crashing down into the Gorge on its way to the coast, and sea.

It's a truly wonderful privilege to be so lucky to experience a real wet season where Nature is unleashed, and Kuranda-ites count themselves lucky to have both the mostly tranquil beauty of the Barron River all year round and then magnificent spectacle of the Falls when we are blessed with heavy rain.

March departed as it arrived, wet and wild and wonderful, with a huge dumping of rain pulled in from the Coral Sea by Cyclone Nora which crossed the western Cape on the night of March 25th. But the final flourish was a staggering amount of rain dumped across the Barron River catchment on the night of March 26th. The Bureau of Meteorology reported rainfall totals of 100mm an hour in areas west of Cairns, including the Kuranda District. Creeks, paddocks, bridges all disappeared under an inland sea of water.


The Kuranda Railway station recorded an official total of 166mm overnight for March 26th, making the total for March, as this Paper goes to press, a staggering 1170mm.

# **Watch Out Warril Drive** - Here They Come!

At the MSC meeting of 26th April 2016, Reever and Ocean applied for several permanent road closures on the Barnwell property. The Council had no objections for the following reasons:

"While these unused road reserves ultimately could form a link from Barnwell Road to the Kennedy Highway via the Warril Drive Estate, the link is not considered to be appropriate now or in the future.

Warril Drive has been designed as a low volume rural residential road access and all lots fronting it are fully developed which does not allow much opportunity for any upgrade works to handle the greatly increased traffic flows likely to be generated by this link.

Therefore, as the formed section of Barnwell Road currently stops at the property and no future linkages are considered appropriate, it is recommended that Council approve the application for the road closures."

By agreeing to this, MSC effectively gifted some 26 hectares to the proponent!

The **Initial Advice Statement** for KUR-World from Reever and Ocean stated:

"The southern portion of the site also has lawful access from unformed road reserves, albeit not necessarily practical access via Mt Haren Road and Warril Drive, both of which are accessed from The Kennedy Highway. These accesses are not yet constructed and it is intended that NO substantial traffic will use them, other than for maintenance and infrastructure requirements."

Now the developer has had the audacity to submit a plan that is in direct conflict with both the MSC's stated position and their own Initial Advice Statement. They have named Warril Drive as a main access point to their proposed sub division.

Is this yet another example of the sheer contempt this developer holds for both the MSC and the residents of Kuranda?

#### **Increase in Flights**

The Koah airstrip application for increasing the current approval of 52 flights a year to 365 and the number of pilots from one to thirteen has been passed by Council. This is despite 169 submissions being recorded against the application, expressing their concerns about safety, loss of privacy and sound level. An amendment moved by Councillor Angela Toppin reduced the maximum flights allowed from six to one a day, a flight being one take off and one landing. This is still a huge increase on the 52 flights a year that are currently approved.

The Council decision was not unanimous. Councillors Mary Graham, Alan Pedersen, Angela Toppin and Mayor Tom Gilmore voted for the increase in flights. Councillors Lenore Wyatt, Kevin Davis and Nipper Brown voted against the increase in flights, highlighting the widespread community concern and the change in amenity. After a huge effort by the Koah community, it is good to know that at least three Councillors have been listening. We can only hope the pilot has heard us too.

Computer Courses Survey request to enable me to apply for a Community Grant for (older) residents to know more about the use of their computers and or electronic notepads.



# RSL Profile

# A.F.M. GOOGE, RAN

LCDR Ange Googe, RAN, was born in Ipswich, Queensland. From a military family, she was educated in various schools in Queensland and the Australian Capital Territory before completing her registered nurse training at Ipswich General Hospital in 1985.

Joining the Royal Australian Navy as a Nursing Officer she graduated from the Royal Australian Navy College at HMAS Creswell in 1987 as a probationary Sub-Lieutenant.

Promoted to Lieutenant in January 1987, between 1987 and 1995 she served in a variety of clinical nursing roles in RAN health centres throughout New South Wales and the Northern Territory, completing a Bachelor of Nursing in the process. During the first Gulf War (1990-91) she deployed with the Australian Task Group Medical Support Element on United States Navy Ship *Comfort* and was subsequently awarded a United States Navy Unit Commendation.

Transferring to the RAN Reserves in 1995 allowed her to accompany her husband on a posting to the United Kingdom where she worked as a registered nurse in the National Health Service. On her return to

Australia in 1998 her work at *HMAS Cerberus* Health Centre and Medical Training School was coupled with clinical placements at both Rosebud and Frankston Hospitals. Studies towards a Master of Nursing Studies – Midwifery, was successfully completed in 1999.

Her operational experience outside the Health Services branch was achieved through postings as Staff Officer Commander Northern Command and then as Staff Officer Special Projects for Commander Australian Patrol Boats (2000-2001). During the latter posting Lieut. Googe was responsible for relocating the final four southern-based Fremantle Class Patrol Boats from Sydney to Cairns and *HMAS Stirling* to Darwin. Her performance in this role was recognised with a Maritime Commander's Commendation.

In 2004, following two years living in the Republic of Palau, Lieut. Googe joined *HMAS Kuttabul* as the First Lieutenant and re-entered the Permanent Navy. She then assumed the role of *HMAS Kuttabul* Executive Officer for several months prior to taking on the duties as Kuttabul Security Officer responsible for security oversight of all Navy assets under the *HMAS Kuttabul* command. As OIC Environmental Medicine Unit in 2005 LEUT Googe completely restructured and rebadged the unit to reflect the contemporaneous requirements driving both efficiencies and focussed effectiveness for which she received another Maritime Commander Commendation. This experience ultimately drove her studies, culminating in a Master of Public Health in 2008.

A posting as Primary Casualty Receiving Facility Manager on *HMAS Manoora* late 2005 finally secured her a sea posting, Harbour Watchkeeping Certificate, and participation in Operation Acolyte, Operation Astute, Exercise Croix du Sud and Exercise RIMPAC.

Promotion to LCDR followed with a posting to *HMAS Coonawarra* as OIC *HMAS Coonawarra* Health Centre in 2007. A short tenure writing health service delivery concept papers was followed by a posting as the Navy's first dedicated Aeromedical Evacuation Nursing Officer (2010-11) prior to taking up the position as Deputy Director Navy Occupational and Environmental Health. 2012 was spent at the Australian Defence College graduating with a Master of Military Studies. Work as the Global Health Planner at HQJOC preceded LCDR Googe's 2014 posting as the Executive Officer *HMAS Cairns*, a posting she completed in January this year.

Passionate about health and fitness, LCDR Googe's lifelong partner is Bob. They currently reside in Far North Queensland with their loyal Labrador 'Pirate' and blonde Golden Retriever 'Boo'.

Any individual or groups are welcome and encouraged to lay a wreath or flowers etc at any of the ceremonies.


Again this year Father Chris Wright will officiate at both services.



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


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# **FEEDING CASSOWARIES**

# How To, When To, When Not To and Why

The purpose of this article is to elicit discussion on the issues surrounding the feeding of cassowaries, or any wildlife for that matter. For many years there has been an absolute attitude that to feed cassowaries was forbidden – "a fed bird is a dead bird". But, over the past decade or two things have changed, and I believe there is a need, even an imperative, to reconsider the matter.

WHY should we reconsider? We're taking their habitat, pushing wildlife into tighter ranges/habitat. We're invading the territory of all wildlife with the space we take for our houses and roads. If you live in Kuranda you are living in cassowary habitat. Then we have our dogs, cats, horses and domestic stock. We clear the scrub (habitat) to grow grass for our stock and all manner of non-native vegetation — because we like it. We build fences to keep our stock in and to keep wildlife out. We cut through wildlife corridors as an "as of right". We urbanise. It's all about us.

We can't continually push wildlife further and further into smaller and smaller areas and expect them to carry on as normal. Today there is a new "normal". Normal has moved from being "before us" to being "now". We need to acknowledge this and make adjustments accordingly. This is one good argument for feeding the wildlife. It's a bit of compensation for what we've taken. I'd go as far as to say it's our obligation. BUT, and there are a few buts we must take into account.

It's appropriate to acknowledge our human impulse to foster and nurture. It's natural. We go out of our way

to rescue an animal in distress; to give milk to a lost kitten; to befriend a stray dog and to care for sick or injured birds and other animals. It's also a great honour to be visited by an awesome cassowary and his chicks. Don't you want to make them like you? Don't you want them to stay for a while? To think that people won't feed cassowaries because it is unlawful or you shouldn't do it, is putting your head in the sand and expecting that therefore they won't do it. They will and are doing so right now. It's more important to ensure that backyarders who are bound to feed wildlife, will do so correctly.

#### The WHAT and HOW of Feeding Cassowaries

Feeding wildlife has to be on their terms, not ours. You must ask yourself "what's right for every different species we've displaced?" Let's pick cassowaries. Here follows a very basic list of WHAT cassowaries eat and what will make them sick or kill them. BUT, before you rush out with unbridled enthusiasm, the equally important issue is HOW to feed wildlife. The answer to that is it's got to be the RIGHT FOOD delivered the RIGHT WAY, and the right way is that it simply appears (food from heaven) with



absolutely no evidence that it came from a human hand. So, do NOT feed with buckets or bowls or any container and do NOT allow the animals to see that you have put the food out for them. Finally, feed only occasionally and NOT regularly.

WHAT CASSOWARIES CAN EAT: Most importantly, native fruits and fungi in their natural environment. They appear to do well on fruits such as grapes, apples, pears, palm fruits, watermelon, kiwifruit, nectarines, peaches and bananas. They'll also eat protein foods such as mice, rats and dead animals.

WHAT CASSOWARIES MUST NOT EAT: These things may make them sick or kill them. Processed meat, food scraps from pizzas, pasta, cheese dishes, bread, biscuits, any processed food or dog food. Avocados are toxic to them.

It's always best not to feed wildlife. But sometimes things are tough out there and their natural food is scant. Remember, DON'T feed wildlife regularly. You're doing them no favours by making them dependent on you. In fact, you'll be killing them slowly. After devastating cyclones, QPWS and local conservation groups will spring into action in a coordinated effort to tide over needful wildlife.

Cassowaries are the only animals which are able to distribute large seeds throughout the forest. They can eat a large cassowary plum whole, strip off the nutritious pulp, walk a kilometre or two and deposit the seed, complete with fertiliser. This goes for native walnuts,

candlenuts and quandong to mention but a few. If they don't do this because you are feeding them regularly, the forest diversity will suffer over time – and it'll be your fault.


Conversely, by feeding cassowaries non-native fruit including seeds, you can be contributing to the spread of weeds (a plant that does not belong in a certain place). Just because a bird likes a certain fruit is not a good enough reason to feed it to them. In fact, it's irresponsible.

Some other considerations: DON'T entice wildlife into unsafe areas, i.e. across roads or into conflict with dogs. DON'T you be responsible for training a cassowary to become aggressive because you fed it regularly and it learnt that food comes from people. The next person it comes across may be a child which could turn out badly for the child!

DON'T you be the one that kills one of our precious birds because you fed it with bad food.

Consider all the pros and cons and you may find it's not appropriate to feed a cassowary, however tempting that may be. DO be responsible.





A KEYSTONE SPECIES and major tourism icon of Far North Queensland, cassowaries live in the Wet Tropics – a small area compared to their original habitat. This land was set aside to protect species from threats, whilst enabling them to access diverse habitats and forage on a variety of seasonal rainforest fruits.

As Australia has no primates to disperse seeds across the landscape, this important role is achieved by cassowaries. This is vital to the diversity and health of the rainforest, creeks and water quality, entering the reef catchment therefore the health of the Great Barrier Reef. A prehistoric apex species, it is important to

note as an adult, "Queen of the Jungle" has no natural predators and can survive cyclones. And yet they are on the brink of extinction.

## **Key Threatening Processes**

- Loss of habitat significant community goodwill and in-kind philanthropic support, has been invested to ensure healthy landscapes, with community and NRM groups achieving good outcomes with buybacks and revegetation projects. However stronger land protection laws are needed urgently.
- Car strikes Many community groups across the Wet Tropics are working with DMR to reduce speed limits and other identified hazards in known hot spots. Generally <70km strike will result in the bird being brought to the Garners Beach Rehab Facility to be nursed back to health. Over >70km the bird generally will be killed or require euthanizing.
- Domestic dog attack are a persistent and increasing threat, to cassowaries and in particular juveniles no longer in their father's lengthy parental care. Cassowaries are solitary, long-lived (approx 50 years), slow-reproducing animals. Studies suggest cassowaries are breeding but that most birds die when leaving father's care, before recruitment to adult populations
- The 2014 review of the Cassowary Recovery Plan (2007) stated "the disappearance of many sub-adult cassowaries for reasons unclear is of concern".
- A monitoring program in Mission Beach between 1990-92 found sub-adult cassowaries to be the age most vulnerable to dog attack. Of the 24 reported dog attacks on cassowaries recorded 2003, 82% were fatal.
- A juvenile cassowary released from care and radio tracked by Dr Hamish Campbell
  on the Basilisk range in 2013 was found killed by dogs within 48 hrs of release.
  Another juvenile was found killed by dogs in the same area by Dr Campbell in
  2012.
- My research clearly highlights the laws entrusted with protecting cassowaries is ineffective with ambiguous wording. No data is currently being recorded, and

as these attacks happen within the rainforest, the birds die out of sight, with the evidence decomposing on the forest floor.

# Let me take you down a rabbit hole of how the laws and policies are failing.

- Local Councils are responsible to enforce the Animal Management Act AMA (dogs and cats) ensuring dogs are kept in a fenced property and under effective control at all times, microchipped and registered.
- Many Councils say they are under resourced to do the management, and yet they don't require rural dog owners to pay registration. This loses revenue to enforce the AMA. resulting in many rural dog owners not bothering to comply to the AMA of fencing, registering or microchipping their dog. Councils have no data on dog numbers within each Shire. It is estimated only one-third of dogs are registered, so how can you manage a problem if you don't know how big the issue is? If a dog attacks, kills or causes an accident and the dog is not registered or micro-chipped, the owner can escape all responsibility and liability for their dogs actions.
- This highlights the problem that rural dog owners generally live adjoining rainforests and protected areas, own large bodied dogs, frequently own more than one dog and these dogs can often be taught to hunt and kill. When you look at a regional map you can see the Wet Tropics is surround by domestic predatory animals (dogs) or roads cassowaries are trapped.
- QPWS have insufficient resources and legislation to adequately enforce the existing laws to keep dogs out of protected areas the offences generally occur after hours and weekends.

Regional Councils are aware of the issues posed by roaming dogs on cassowary conservation, and the bio-security threats to farmers livelihood from Panama Disease, are now increasing enforcement of the AMA, working with QPWS and farmers to crack down on irresponsible dog owners and pig hunters who illegally enter protected areas or trespass on farms which by law is considered poaching.

We need to apply the precautionary principle of prevention. Cassowaries that

are habituated to humans or pushed into marginal habitats are statistically more vulnerable to dog attack and road mortality as they move through rural and semi-urban landscapes looking for food and territories. I believe by engaging and listening to the vital undervalued asset in cassowary conservation, the many regional Community and Conservation groups, if recognised and funded as key stakeholders in research, monitoring and habitat rehabilitation, could be the future of best practice for wildlife conservation.

**PRIL**, and some welcome rains, although combined with sometimes high wind gusts, has seen localised flooding and tree falls with blackouts and road closures. Potted plants and hanging baskets have benefitted greatly with exposure to rain although it is important to ensure that they do not become waterlogged or are caught out in strong sunlight.

Both the passionate gardener and the beginner can learn and share together their knowledge and skills in joining the Kuranda Garden Club. In meeting and sharing, it is always surprising what one learns from others' experiences and the social interchange gives opportunity to visit other gardens and share often hard to obtain plant material. Remember also that The Friends of the Botanic Gardens Cairns, <a href="https://www.botanicfriendscairns.com.au/">https://www.botanicfriendscairns.com.au/</a> also hold meetings and very informative lectures and activities.

Given the unique and privileged environment in which we live, it is incumbent on all gardeners to carefully watch the careless dispersal and disposal of introduced plants by seed or waste disposal. Already too many exotics have escaped cultivation and threaten rainforest or rural land holdings. One such example is the purple morning glory, *Ipomoea indica*, allegedly bought to the Tablelands as seeds given by a Scottish Laird from his conservatory to an emigrating estate worker.



**PLANT OF THE MONTH:** Anthurium chamberlainianum is a personal choice from the estimated near 800 species of Anthurium for an easily grown and spectacular leafed plant for garden or pot culture. Noticeable for its large heart-shaped persistent purplish-red new foliage finally turning to a dull green, once established it is remarkably hardy. Bright, indirect light and a sheltered position sees it thriving with minimum attention. It is important soil be free draining and, if potted, a half and half mix of potting soil and orchid mix or perlite is suitable and will provide the kind of open soil anthuriums prefer. Outdoors, plant in a well-drained location, again in a light, open humus rich soil.

Ensure regular watering when soil is dry to the touch but don't overwater as Anthurium plants don't like continually moist soil. To optimize

growth, the plant only needs to be fertilised with a one-quarter strength fertiliser once every three to four months. Very seldom troubled with pests, the occasional aphid maybe hosed off new growth.

Propagation is usually by division as seed may often prove unreliable if open set.

**Q&A** *Dear Tricia*, From your description, I would suggest that the destruction at the tender base of your recently planted golden-leafed Colocasia and the loss of its corm is due to the depredation of a bush turkey. Even large mature plants may be totally destroyed. Bear in mind that C. antiquorum, eddoe, and C. esculenta, taro, are widely cultivated for their edible corms which have to be carefully prepared for human consumption. I have found that Heliconia stricta 'Jamaica Dwarf' is also sometimes taken in a similar manner.

**Dear Stephen**, Abelmoschus manihot is your tororo aoi encountered in Japanese cuisine. It also goes by the names Aibika, hibiscus manihot, hibiscus spinach, bele, pele, and others. A short-lived perennial shrub in the tropics, it is frost tender. It prefers at least morning sun and rich fertile soil and good moisture supply and grows 2 - 3 m high with large, nearly round, soft green leaves which can be used like spinach, cooked or eaten fresh. Young leaves and shoots may be eaten raw, steamed, boiled, stir-fried or added to soups. The leaves cook quickly and contain mucilage giving a slightly slimy feel in the mouth. It is a very nutritious vegetable high in vitamins A and C, and iron. With various types, the annual types flower and self-sow readily and have the potential to become quite weedy.

Dear Helen, The plant is Christia vespertilionis (syn: Lourea vespertilionis)

commonly known as the Moth plant, Red Butterfly Wing or Bat Grass. Belonging to the Family Leguminosae, it grows as a small shrublet to 120 cm and prefers full sun for best colouring. Easily grown, it needs well drained loamy soil and regular watering. Easily propagated from hardened stem cutting or by seed. It is a somewhat spindly plant, bearing inconspicuous whitish




flowers on slender racemes. Although having seen this plant growing luxuriantly from self-seeding in Darwin and Gordonvale, I have had very limited success in maintaining the plant, as have other keen gardeners in the area.

# **Herbicide Complacency**

Our Kuranda property was recently sprayed with the herbicide Roundup by Council workers without our authorisation. Our property adjoins Jumrum Creek which ultimately flows to the Great Barrier Reef via the Barron River. Due to the ecological sensitivity of our property and region, we initiated a formal complaint through the Queensland Ombudsman. Mareeba Shire Council's actions and subsequent dismissive response reveals a common belief that *Roundup* is innocuous. While this complacency has been fostered through decades of aggressive marketing by agrochemical company *Monsanto*, there is mounting research suggesting *Roundup* is toxic not only to the environment, but to human health.

In 2015, the International Agency for Research on Cancer classified Roundup's declared principle ingredient 'glyphosate' as "probably carcinogenic to humans". The European Chemicals Agency has classified it "a substance causing serious eye damage and being toxic to aquatic life with long-lasting effects". After bitter division in 2017 the European Union approved a limited 5-year licence for glyphosate, with France declaring a ban within 3 years. Currently, more than 700 US farmers, landscapers and gardeners are involved in a lawsuit against Monsanto claiming that exposure to glyphosate caused their cancers.

Tests for glyphosate routinely find traces in soil, water, food and human urine. A long-term US study indicated a 1200% increase in glyphosate levels in urine over a 20-year period since the mid-1990s. As glyphosate is the declared "active principle" in Roundup, it's the only one tested for regulatory purposes. However, research suggests that the so-called "inert" substances in Roundup are around 1,000 times more toxic. Monsanto's lead toxicologist acknowledged that "you cannot say that Roundup is not a carcinogen...we have not done the necessary testing on the formulation to make that statement".

Since our experience with Roundup we've noticed Council workers (themselves unprotected) spraying in public spaces – around playgrounds, waterways, nature strips and footpaths. While we all appreciate Council's work in maintaining our public spaces, we need to prioritise the health of our community and future generations. In 2015 Byron Shire Council resolved to be chemical-free by late-2018 and now use steam weeders as part of the solution. Mareeba Shire Council owns one of these steam weeders, though hasn't yet introduced policies to transition away from poisons.

As we know from asbestos and cigarettes, our regulatory processes lag tragically behind research. We invite you to join us in initiating a planned transition in partnership with our local council – from poisons to sustainable weed management. Wet Tropics Rainforest "The most extraordinary place on earth"

Early in March, Sir David Attenborough, OM, CH, CVO, CBE, FRS, FLS, FZS, FSA, veteran English broadcaster and naturalist, was awarded the 2017 Britain-Australia Society Award at Australia House in London. He was honoured for showcasing Australia's natural wonders. In his acceptance speech he explained that he is often asked by children to name his favourite place on earth. He responded:

"I have no hesitation in answering that question. My favourite place is North Queensland. It has for a naturalist everything. It has an amazing rainforest which is quite unlike any other rainforest in the

"In Australia's Tropical North, there's a tiny pocket of tropical rainforest that has survived for millions of years, from the time dinosaurs wandered the Earth. It's quite unlike any other place on the

Previously Sir David has expressed his concern for the fate of the natural world if we do not as a species take responsibility for our actions, and their consequences for the planet and all who live on it.

"The future of life on earth depends on our ability to take action. Many individuals are doing what they can, but real success can only come if there's a change in our societies and our economics and in our politics. I've been lucky in my lifetime to see some of the greatest spectacles that the natural world has to offer. Surely we have a responsibility to leave for future generations a planet that is healthy, inhabitable by all species."

The enormous responsibility of making sure that future generations, and the peoples of the world, can continue to experience this truly extraordinary place falls heavily on we who live here. And on our elected representatives. Our council, our State members, our Federal members. Sadly, none seem to take the threat to this place of unique natural value seriously.

Another eminent voice has also spoken up in regards to a very unique and vital part of the Wet Tropics—and close to our hearts. James Cook University's Distinguished Research Professor Bill Laurance, PhD, FAA, FAAAS, FRSQ, Distinguished Research Professor & Australian Laureate Prince Bernhard Chair in International Nature Conservation. Director, Centre for Tropical Environmental and Sustainability Science has called for the Barnwell property (slated for development by KUR-World and in imminent danger of widespread clearing) to be acquired for permanent conservation.

Presently, the Kuranda community is mobilising to find a suitable conservation buyer for the controversial 'Barnwell Estate', in the event Macao-based developer Mr Ken Lee loses interest and wishes to on-sell the rural-zoned land at a fair price. Several letters of support have been received from relevant stakeholders, backing the principle of acquiring land for conservation in the biodiverse Myola Valley. A support letter from JCU's Distinguished Research Professor Bill Laurance is of key interest.

Professor Laurance, who works as a conservation biologist in native and damaged forests all over the tropical world, puts the region in global context:

"I can say with complete confidence that the Wet Tropics region is among the

most ancient, most biologically unique, and most small and imperilled ecosystems on the planet. It literally leaps off the global map as a hotspot of vital conservation importance."

**Professor Laurance continues:** 

"It is fundamentally important, 30 years on from World Heritage listing of the Wet Tropics of Queensland, to ensure what remains is protected and that further incursions into the bioregion are tightly restrained. In this region, most (70%) of

the lowland forests have already been destroyed. Much of the upland forests on the Atherton Tablelands and Windsor Tableland have also been cleared and fragmented.

"Government support for improving protection outcomes for remaining critical habitat on freehold land is the first vital step to protecting the bioregion for the

Lending his support for conserving the Barnwell property, Professor Laurance added:

"Without doubt, the best possible outcome for this land parcel is to support the Kuranda community's desire to restore the land to its natural state, and for it to be held in trust for nature conservation in perpetuity."

Such an outcome would be a wise investment in the future of Kuranda, whose very lifeblood

rests on being framed by such extraordinary natural values, and the connection of community to them.

A little over forty years ago, you could stand on the bridge at Jum Rum Creek and see platypus (from whom Kuranda's traditional name "Ngoonbi" came) but no more... in another forty years, but probably even less, the same could be the fate of other iconic, endangered species.

Imagine no more cassowaries in the wild. Imagine the only relatively recently discovered "Kuranda frog" becoming extinct, a terrible possibility as its only tiny habitat sits right in the bulls eye of Kur-World. But this land has much greater importance than just in a local development sense.

Professor Laurance explains:

"The Barnwell land on which I am focusing here is centrally located in the Myola Valley and spans a large and critical portion (626 hectares) of the ecological north-south corridor for the Wet Tropics bioregion. In a landscape setting this biogeographic context is critical."

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# **Traditional Indigenous Games** on the Esplanade April 4th, 7th, 10th, 12th & 14th 2018



# **Kuranda Water** a Creative Cocktail?

Biologist Dr April Furrst is seeking to discover just what is causing an unusually high percentage of creativity in the Kuranda population and has narrowed it down to ... something in the water.

It's a cliche of course, but in this case it may have some truth to it, although research is still in the very early stages.

Dr Furrst has taken numerous samples from various watercourses throughout the Kuranda district weekly over a three year period and is now compiling her findings. The implications should she be able to narrow down the specific agent could be very wide ranging and include commercial applications for the less "naturally creative", which in turn could have positive effects for mental health.

Dr Furrst said that although she was very confident of the existence of some kind of causative link between consumption of water from Kuranda watercourses and elevated creative expression, the hard work of pinpointing just how this creative stimulation occurs was extremely daunting and she felt she could not put a time frame on it. "The Wet Tropics rainforests of Far North Queensland are a giant open air laboratory just full of the unknown and undiscovered," she

"Who knows what is out there to be discovered, and how it might be utilised. This is why it is so important to keep this ecosystem full of potential as pristine as possible. We just don't know what great scientific discoveries are waiting for

Once the challenge of identifying the active agent in this creative cocktail is achieved it is hoped human studies will begin. This will involve both subjects already creatively endowed and those who don't exhibit the same qualities. A sizeable number of Kuranda artists have already been coopted by Dr Furrst. "There is no problem finding creative types in Kuranda," she laughed. "The problem is finding someone who isn't!"





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
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

# Identifying Australian Spiders

An encounter with a spider often evokes a unique response, emulated by very few other types of animal encounters. While many people are fascinated with spiders, for others such an encounter can cause anything from grave concern to outright terror. Although some of the extreme forms of arachnophobia may have complex psychological roots, many of the negative reactions to spiders are simply the result of misinformation and myths. Uncertainty of what the species of spider is and what it is capable of also plays a big role in how people perceive these important animals.

Over the years we have received thousands of requests for spider identifications via our Kuranda-based business Minibeast Wildlife. In recent years the number of requests has grown with an ever-increasing flow of them coming at us via social media. We seemed to be repeating ourselves over and over and it became very apparent that there were a handful of 'usual suspects' that were causing concern all throughout Australia – even in Kuranda.

About three years ago we decided to address this and embarked on the production of Australia's first dedicated spider identification app. While there are many field guide books on Australian spiders, they generally appeal to biologically minded people, and the price usually excludes those who would only have occasional and random use for them.

Introducing 'Spidentify'. Our app is aimed at anyone who encounters spiders in Australia and needs assistance identifying them. We have made it very simple to use for those with no biological background and have included a great deal of detail for those who have.

For Spidentify we wanted to the images to be crystal clear with no distractions, so we decided to photograph all the spiders on white backgrounds. This has been a style we have used on our website for many years, and for the purposes of the app seemed not only a logical choice to maintain our 'style', but one which made the identification process much easier. While we already had a massive catalogue of spider images in our collection, not all were on white backgrounds, so we needed to start clicking away.

Early in the project we drove from Melbourne to Kuranda, travelling 3600km photographing spiders all along the route. We stayed on the beaten track deliberately as we wanted to encounter the species that the majority of people do when travelling. This meant poking around park benches and even in public toilets we did get some strange looks! That one trip alone added over 100 species to the Spidentify app.

Spidentify was produced completely in-house by our family team at Minibeast Wildlife, which includes everything from the imagery, graphic design and the unique app programming. It has taken an immense amount of work and was completed and released on the 19th of March. Within hours of release we were receiving glowing reviews and attention from throughout Australia and even from overseas. The response has been quite overwhelming. It even reached the number 1 position on the Google Play Top Selling Chart!

While the app allows users to browse through images based on various criteria, the unique part is the ID tool. It guides users through a series of simple questions about the spider they have encountered and delivers a set of likely matches. This makes the identification process very simple for everyone. Each species of spider has a colour-coded 'bite rating', the vast majority of which are at the low end of the scale. The app also contains a wealth of information about spiders including sections on popular spider myths, many of which circulate Australia as 'truths'.



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
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# Missing Inland Route Holding Back Northern Australia

**FAR NORTH QUEENSLAND** was brought to a standstill once again after the Bruce Highway was inundated by flood waters causing the north's only road access to be cut for several days.

Mareeba Shire Mayor Tom Gilmore is calling on the State and Federal Governments to make a commitment to invest and develop northern Australia by filling in the missing links of the inland highway.

"It seems to me that in Queensland to the greater part, the Bruce Highway is where we get a majority of our goods and services from," Cr Gilmore said.

"When you get a catastrophic flooding event as we had in Ingham, all of this stops — no food comes north, no product goes south. Far North Queensland is isolated from the rest of the world, simply by one road."

Councillor Gilmore said "It's simple. If we had a clean sheet of paper and we were starting from day one, surely we would look to ensuring we had resilient, robust and reliable access to and from the south to ensure the free flow of commerce and goods and services into and out of our region."

The latest push is to essentially weather proof and secure access to and from the region, generating immediate productivity efficiencies for agriculture, beef, mining and tourism industries and their suppliers. The inland freight route is free from extreme tropical weather risks including flooding, cyclones and climate change.

An inland route that connects through to the Hann Highway, servicing eastern seaboard markets and ports increases would be more cost-effective infrastructure.

The State and Federal Governments have spent billions of dollars upgrading the Bruce Highway which Councillor Gilmore says is not where people necessarily want to go. "It takes us to the southeast corner of Queensland then down to Sydney and Melbourne—the long way around," he said.

"Not only have we got a road which is currently monumentally incapable, it blocks the free flow of traffic and commerce, but to the greater extent for the free flow of traffic and commerce to the southern states, it takes them 1000km out of their way," he said.

He said it was just not about running out of fruit and vegetables. "It is about the development of northern Australia, that is where we are at, and the Bruce Highway isolating us from the rest of Queensland, our capital and the functions of Government," Cr Gilmore said.

These impacts hold back the capacity of the region to contribute to the State and national economies. "It's time we resolved that by ensuring that the inland route beginning from Weipa, coming down through Mareeba, Ootann, the Hann and

further south—that has got to be a very high priority for Government both State and Federal," Cr Gilmore said.

Councillor Gilmore said he was pleased the Government has recognised the importance of the completion of the sealing of the Hann Highway. "It's like links in a chain. That link will be sealed, and that section of the road will be good. But the Ootann Road and the section from Torrance Creek south are the weak links," he said.

"We have to focus on those, so we have a complete chain."

"It's a fairly simple formula but needs the Government's attention. The Government needs to start focussing their minds on what is important to people in far north Queensland," he concluded.

# **Keeping Our Community Litter Free**

MANY community volunteers across the Mareeba Shire are constantly seen collecting rubbish from public places, helping keep the community litter free.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said their contribution is valued and they do a wonderful service for their community. "There are people out there picking up rubbish, not for recognition but because they have a sense of pride in where they live," he said.

"Every day you can see these people beautifying our towns and the work they do is certainly recognised and appreciated."

Councillor Gilmore also said the community should be conscious of the generous efforts of these volunteers and all do their bit to help keep the Shire clean and tidy. "People should think twice before they throw their litter out the car window or leave their rubbish for someone else to pick up."

"Let's all have a sense of responsibility and pride in our community and put our rubbish in the bin," Cr Gilmore concluded.



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
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## BBC Documentary - Great Continental Railway Journeys - Kuranda History

In September 2017 I was contacted by BBC (British Broadcasting Corporation) from the BBC travel and history documentary series and are currently producing in London a documentary series called Great Continental Railway Journeys. The program sees presenter, Michael Portillo, follow a travel guidebook from 1913 to explore various countries and continents by rail. He stops off in places mentioned by the guidebook to see what remains of places mentioned in the book and how they have developed today. To give you a little overview, they are filming six one-hour programs on Australia next year. This will be the first time in Australia for this documentary and Kuranda is now so lucky to be in it!

After many phone calls with producers which I explained Kuranda's brief History, 1920s Paradise walk, Kuranda Hotel, Historic Railway and the local Djabugay people, they became so very interested in wanting to film here and wanted to talk to local historians of the area. After calling the Cairns Historical Society I gave the BBC two people which are Kuranda's very own Dug Stratford and Peter Ryle.

Peter Ryle has been selected to be the Historian to be filmed on the BBC documentary.

The BBC were going to simply do train and drive to Cape Tribulation for the history/rainforest segment (not stopping in Kuranda!). I was able to convince them (with all those phone calls) to stay in Kuranda. (Now not going to Cape Trib. YAY!)

BBC are filming the Kuranda Scenic Railway heritage train from Cairns and then filming a story on Kuranda History in the 1920s. Skyrail down in the afternoon about preserving the rainforest now and ending the night at Tjapuaki about what the indigenous culture is doing now.

Filming dates are:

Recce Shoot: Saturday 24th March Main Shoot: Saturday 28th April

They will be fully escorted and hosted by Tourism Kuranda.

Works out to be around 15 to 20 min of airtime on the documentary about Kuranda.

Even if it's only 15min of film time on the Documentary series I believe this will lead to significant and ongoing international exposure for Kuranda. I have watched this show on the ABC and it does some great indirect destination marketing. Kuranda has some fascinating and significant history which no doubt would interest any viewer. Fingers crossed!

# R Grinter's Tale

# Our Cup Runneth Over...

Yesssss, we have lift off. We actually have a real Far Not again!" look, the same look I get now if I dare stop North Queensland wet season!

Oh, how good it feels to see Tinaroo Dam at nearly 77% as I write; the Barron Falls showcasing Kuranda, and our own dams filling or overflowing.

I've just come in from digging trenches to stop the water running in my back door followed by further digging behind the stables before moving 14 barrowloads of tree mulch into the stables to keep the horses' feet dry. There's something about digging trenches in the mud with a mattock that brings out the kid in me. But I rejoice at that, it is the first time I have seen such rain since building here seven years ago, with the house completed just after Cyclone Yasi in 2011. It's funny how we forget, but it was a good wet season that year, in fact soaking the roots of the trees so extensively the winds around Yasi caused otherwise stable trees to topple.

Like a lot of people of my vintage, I think of the Eighties as the benchmark for real wet seasons; the late afternoon build up in November, entertaining thunderstorms as evening drew in, then heavy rain during the night, with the mornings fine and fresh from the overnight cleanse. Living at Clifton in those days, and being young and irresponsible, we prayed for torrential rain, as the Barron River and Thomatis Creek would close the highway, providing guilt free abstention from work and excitement as the helicopter delivered the essentials to the little shop in the caravan park on the highway.

No empty supermarket shelves in those daysthere was no supermarket at Smithfield, in fact there were no shops. And you just got on with it, or maybe we were just prepared all year-a few batteries and candles, and something to do when the lights went off. For many, that meant stocking up on Bundy of course, but it's hard to stick a tarp over your roof when you're pie-eyed.

I drove a Kombi in those days (who in Cairns didn't?). Those were the days when most Cairns residents lived in sarongs and thongs of the footwear type, and some guys still wore safari suits and long socks, and horror of horrors, leather sandals with the socks. Nancy the Kombi was a pain in the proverbial, despite her fuel injected, air cooled 2000cc engine. She constantly overheated, the reason baffling numerous mechanics and I frequently ended up in the middle of nowhere with an Irish Setter and German Shepherd sitting at the roadside with me, giving me that "Argh!

to talk on a dog walk.

When the Cook Highway was being extended to four lanes, driving in the monsoon was a nightmare of mud, diversions and confusion. The works seemingly went on forever, and Nancy's wipers gave up the ghost one day just before I set off for work in the evening. Using a squidgee mop with my arm out of the window, I struggled through the roadworks and managed to get to work in one piece. I can't begin to imagine what kind of punishment would be meted for such an offence now, but I was desperate. There weren't too many ethnic restaurants in those days, but I helped a friend out at Thuggee Bill's Indian Restaurant a few days a week, and needs must as it was a busy week, so I drove in that fashion three nights in a row, arriving with a very wet arm and shattered nerves from the confusion of dusk, temporary traffic lights and orange cones, mud, steamed-up windows and torrential rain. The gutters of



Aplin Street, the site of the restaurant, would go several feet under water in heavy rain, so parking was always a challenge, but nothing compared to the drive.

Today is one of those days when you have no excuse but to do those things you've put off, oh, and write your column late once again. Two sets of meeting minutes, and a stack of client work here, but I'd really rather be digging more trenches in the mud, in truth. This is the kind of weather that used to cause us to declare we were 'going troppo', although to classify for that state of mind, the rain really had to be persistent for two weeks on end. The last time I remember that was Cyclone Steve in 2000, a mere Category 2, but the rain was torrential and unrelenting-Cairns recorded 237mm in one 12 hour period. There was extensive damage from falling trees around Kuranda, and several houses damaged.

Flooding around Lake Placid and Caravonica saw a herd of cattle swept out to sea, many of which amazingly survived. I remember being told at the time that cattle's stomachs bloat in such situations, allowing them to float. The tide washed these live joints of corned beef, highly stressed and beyond exhaustion, up on to Cairns northern beaches, where they were picked up in horse floats and such over the next few days and hopefully, survived their ordeal. A local Clifton Beach man tried to feed a bullock stranded on a narrow strip of sand at high tide at the southern end of Clifton Beach. My daughter and I watched in fascinated horror as it lowered its head and bowled him over. I think his pride was hurt more than anything, so once we witnessed him get to his feet and walk away, we pretended we hadn't seen.


It's that kind of weather where we all want to say 'Okay, enough, tap off thanks', but it's a sensitive issue. I'm guilty of putting a virtual hand in people's face when they say they've had enough of the rain when we spend months bemoaning the fact that it is so dry. For those of us with livestock, it spells a nitrogen fix for our pasture, and beloved green grass. For the farmers, it's life or death, in some very sad cases, the latter being in human terms.

I was always fascinated by the harbingers of weather, particularly in relation to the heralding of rain, for instance when black cockatoos call, when ants build up high, a ring around the moon, cows or horses lying down or arthritic joints playing up.

The protracted drought of the late nineties to 2010 saw significant decrease in numerous native bird species. Early in this period, bird breeders around the region remarked that their caged birds were not breeding, which at time struck me as reflecting their inherent ability to sense the foolhardiness of creation in a time of risk to survival. Animals haven't lost touch with Mother Earth as we humans have. They don't have the interference of mobile phones, the omnipresent hum of electricity, constant entertainment noise, and stupor induced by drugs and alcohol. We have a lot to learn from the heightened perception that accompanies stillness and silence.

Meanwhile, thanking the Universe. It's very quiet and I can hear the grass growing...

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

# How your modem and wi-fi choices can affect the quality of your home internet connection

For many, a modem is just a modem. A simple piece of hardware that connects your home devices to the world wide web. However, modems come in various forms, often packed with different features. Some of which most consumers will never use. However, this month I'm going to focus on one simple yet very important feature all of us use... Wi-Fi. And how it affects your home internet connection and quality.

Firstly, there are two different 'bands' of Wi-Fi signals which are used on a consumer level. You may have heard of 2.4GHz and 5GHz. The primary difference

between the two bands is the bandwidth (how much data capacity it can handle at once), and the number of individual frequencies data can travel along.

Additionally, each band is subject to different types of interference, and interference is a big problem when dealing with Wi-Fi.

Lets start by looking at the 2.4Ghz band. Almost every modem you see runs in this band... a pretty crowded space because it is used by more than just Wi-Fi. Old Cordless phones, garage door and gate remotes, baby monitors, microwaves, and of course your neighbours' modem, and many other electronic devices tend to use the 2.4GHz band, and a quick look around the home, I can guarantee that there is at least two of these devices near your modem.

Devices share this band because the longer wavelength of the 2.4GHz band is better suited for transmission through walls and solid objects, and its ability to cover further distance makes it arguably better if you need better range on your devices, or have lots of walls or other objects in your building. However because so many devices use the 2.4GHz band, the resulting congestion and the limited channels available can result in dropped connections and much slower than expected speeds, making it a poorer choice for a quality service. Typically one can expect around 60 to 70% of theoretical internet speeds when using 2.4GHz Wi-Fi.

The 5GHz band is far less congested which therefore means you will likely get a more stable connection. This will result in higher speeds, and near to no drop in connection. On the other hand because the 5GHz band uses shorter wavelengths, it has far lesser ability to penetrate walls and solid objects. It also offers a shorter effective range than a 2.4Ghz band.

There are no other items that utilise the 5GHz band other than Wi-Fi related products so interference is not a problem unless there are multiple 5Ghz modems nearby on the same frequency. And there are far more channels in a 5GHz band to combat this.

On the downside its biggest pitfall is that not all devices (particularly older smart phones and tablets) are capable of 5Ghz Wi-Fi. Although most modern devices made

within the past 2-3years will be fine.

Most entry level modems will only offer a 2.4Ghz band option, however stepping up a level will offer you dual band modems, allowing you to select what band you want for your device.

So which band should you select? In the first instance if you have a device that supports ethernet (network cable connection), and it is within reasonable reach of your modem, the preferred method is to use a cabled connection over a wireless one. Ethernet cabled connections offer lower latency, no interference whatsoever, and simply dedicated and faster, higher quality connection.

That said, as we are talking about Wi-FI, if you currently use 2.4 GHz Wi-Fi and are wondering whether you need to upgrade to 5 GHz, it's really all about what you need to do with it. If you're experiencing dropped connections or if you need more speed for watching videos or playing games, then you probably need to move to 5

There's only so much speed you can get out of a 2.4 GHz network even under ideal conditions. If you live in a crowded apartment complex with dozens of wireless routers, baby monitors, and other 2.4Ghz band devices, then you should consider switching to the 5Ghz band.

If you're already using a dual band router and have both the 2.4 GHz and 5 GHz bands available, you'll have to make some decisions about which one to use for your devices. It's tempting to just go ahead and use 5 GHz Wi-Fi for any device that

> supports it and use 2.4 GHz for the rest, and you can certainly do that. But it's not always the best strategy.

> Instead, think about how you use each device. If a device only supports 2.4 GHz, then your decision is already made for that device. If a device supports both, think about whether you really need to use 5 GHz.


> Does that device need the higher speed or are you mostly checking email and browsing the web? Is the device experiencing dropped connections on the 2.4 GHz network and do you need it to be more reliable? Are you okay with the device having the shorter effective range that comes along with using the 5 GHz band? In short, we recommend using 2.4 GHz unless a

device has a specific need for the 5 GHz band. This will help low-use devices from competing on the 5 GHz band and keep congestion down.





# FREDERICK PARKHURST DODD The Butterfly Man of Kuranda

Born 11th March 1861, died 1937, FPD was an Australian entomologist, known as the Butterfly Man of Kuranda. He and his family lived on Coondoo Street,



near where the Bendigo Bank is now. His garden and insect collections were world famous and eagerly visited.

Born in Victoria, Dodd worked in a bank in Townsville for ten years before taking up entomology full-time. A number of species are named after him and his collection of insects was of importance. He undertook collecting expeditions in New Guinea as well as Australia. A collection of his beautifully arranged specimen cases are in the collection of the Queensland Museum.

His grave in the Kuranda cemetery is the subject of respectful visits by entomologists to this day.

Revel in the avocado season, Queen obeans

**Avocado Vegan Naan:** Indian flatbread, dairy-free via <a href="www.veganricha.com">www.veganricha.com</a>

10 servings

**Ingredients:** 120 ml warm water, 2 tsp sugar, 1 tbsp active dry yeast, 5 cups bread flour or unbleached white flour, 1½ tsp salt, 1 tsp baking powder, ¼ tsp baking soda, 60 ml organic vegetable (canola, safflower or coconut) oil, ¾ cup very well mashed very ripe avocado. Approximately 2 tbsp canola or coconut oil for cooking and some nigella seeds for garnish.



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Method: In a large mixing bowl, pour warm water and stir in the sugar. Sprinkle yeast on the water and let sit for 10 minutes or until frothy. In another bowl, combine, the flour with salt, baking powder and baking soda. Add 3 cups of the flour mixture, 3 the poil and mashed avocado to yeast bowl. Mix well to combine. Add more flour a few tablespoons at a time to make a soft smooth dough (add a tiny bit of water as you go if needed). Knead in the bowl or on a floured surface for 3 to 4 minutes. Place the dough in the bowl. Drizzle a tablespoon of oil on the dough. Roll the dough to coat in oil. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap or heavy kitchen towel and let sit to rise for 1½ hours or until it doubles. Punch the dough down and use a tablespoon or more flour if needed to work for half a minute. Divide the dough into 10 pieces. Roll the dough balls lightly in flour and place on parchment. Cover with towel or another parchment and let sit for 20 to 30 minutes. Take each piece of dough, and roll/shape into 8 to 9 inch oval shape. Roll and handle lightly to keep the dough airy. Dust lightly with flour to help with the rolling. Spritz the top of the naan with water. Sprinkle Nigella seeds. Brush or spray oil.

**To Cook:** Oven Method: Pre-heat the oven to 230°C. Place a pizza stone in the oven and let heat for half an hour. Place as many breads as the stone can accommodate. Bake 2-3 minutes till the breads puffs and top gets golden. Carefully watch for a minute until surface crisps. Stove Top Method: Use a pan or griddle which can withstand high heat. Heat it on medium high until heated evenly. Place the naan with bottom on the pan.

Cover with a lid (optional) till it starts to puff (2 to 3 minutes). Flip and cook for another minute. To char naan, hold directly over a gas flame with tongs for a few seconds. Serve hot, topped with vegan butter or canola oil. To keep for a short time wrap in a clean kitchen towel. To store for longer, cool completely and place in an airtight bag.

**Method:** Combine all the ingredients into a bowl, toss to coat and mix.

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

#### From the wilds of Patagonia

Philanthropic organisations and individuals across the world are focusing on repairing and protecting our remaining unique natural spaces. We have just visited Chile and something wondrous in conservation terms has just come to fruition there after more than 25 years of negotiation and 50 years of dreaming.

More than one million acres of wildlife habitat has been conserved for the future. From the Patagonian steppe, vast open treeless spaces grazed by a camelid species, the guanaco, constantly caressed by a foehn wind, rainless after its climb over the cordillera of the Andes, to the ancient Arucarian forests surrounding the volcanic cones of the Chilean Lakes districts, with endemic birds, otters and huemul deer, wild mountain peaks, intermontage meadows and steppe lands are being handed to the government, extending existing or creating new Chilean National Parks and forming a corridor of bio regions the length of Chile.

This is thanks to the legacy of many people working together for conservation and enabled by two Chilean Presidents, immediately previous and current, both of whom have admired the ethic of the late Doug Tompkins (adventurer, philanthropist and mountaineer, founder of The North Face label) and his wife.

Chile, a rapidly developing country, has understood, at a political and a personal level, what natural wonders it possesses and how they must find sustainable solutions for their conservation, and providing jobs in their remote regions. More than 60% of Chileans live in the capital city Santiago and the regions are lagging behind. Even the current President, supported by an extreme right wing agenda, has bought and placed 250,000 acres into conservation.

Something for us to aspire to in Australia?

This eye-opening workshop led us through emerging research, finding unnamed specimens here in Kuranda, photographing fungi for inclusion in a future field guide and using microscopes for identification. Our thanks go to the enthusiastic scientists who came from Perth, Melbourne, Cairns and Brisbane, sharing their knowledge and introducing us to this fascinating world.

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# NGIRRMA BULMBA-BARRA Language belonging to the place

The Bama of this area shared a common ngirrma, language. The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have a people been able to reside continuously in the one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

Today we Gadja (non-Aboriginal/ "ghosts") are lucky to share this bulmba, this place, with its incredible history of human settlement and its rich linguistic heritage, not to forget its unique landscapes and bio-diversity.

This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of year, the season, the

The actual word "bulmba" has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the world itself, time, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law.

Thank you to Michael Quinn for assisting in realising this wordsearch in ngirrma and to DTAC (Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation) for their oversight. Michael would like to dedicate this work to the memory of Gindan, Lalfie Thompson, and the Gurragurra, ancestors, of this bulmba.

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# A Thought for April

**HIS** month we read from St Johns Gospel chapter 20 verses 1 to 20. Mary returns to the tomb alone in the early dawn. By doing so she becomes the voice which announces the unbelievable event to all succeeding centuries. She tells the others. Two of them run from their hiding place. John, the writer, was with them, and he remembers in great detail. How could one ever forget? John even recalls the head-cloth being a little distance from the other cloths. Somehow John knew. He didn't understand, but he knew.

It is important for us to realize that. We are tempted to try to understand the resurrection of Jesus, to seek explanations. Our Western culture is mesmerized by the how and why of life. But even those who were closest to Jesus, who witnessed all this, who actually touched him after it — they never claimed to understand. They just knew. And how do we know they knew? Because it utterly transformed them.

John tells us that they "went back to their own homes." Why is that important? Because that is where we have to live out faith in Jesus. We live it out wherever "home" is, the familiar places of our lives — the home itself, the office, the market.

"They have taken away my Lord," cried Mary. Many people feel this today as they try to find faith in a changing world and a changing church. There can be fear, resentment, confusion, and anger in that cry. But Mary turned and Jesus was there. We who feel alienated and discouraged need to know that. Jesus is in his

church and in his world. It is difficult to find him in much of what is happening, but he is

We might assume that he is saying to our resentment and regret for past things, "Why are you weeping?" It's a good question. Why am I angry? Why can I not accept this or that

certain thing? What is really going on in me? Are these difficulties only symptoms of deeper things inside myself which I have never dealt with? Once such things are admitted, Jesus can help us deal with them.

"Do not hold me," said Jesus to Mary, "but go to my brethren and say to them, I am ascending. " Our Lord says to us in many ways that we cannot hold him. We cannot keep things as they used to be. We know it, but we find it very difficult to accept. Only when Mary accepted the fact that she couldn't hold Jesus for herself, and turned to tell the others of his risen life - only then was she able to say, "I have seen the Lord." When you and I can say those words, we will have to own our Christian faith. Christ will have risen in us. Mary said, 'I have seen the Lord." Have we? What would that mean for us today?
