

The following is a brief outline of some issues discussed: full and comprehensive minutes are sent to members each month. Membership is \$10 per year (\$5 concession) and forms are available from the above address, at meetings or at the Green House Environment Shop; now at #9 Coondoo St (from July 9th).

NOTICE OF AGM

The Annual General Meeting of ARK will be held prior to the August ARK monthly meeting at 7pm Wednesday August 20th 1997. Positions to be filled are: President, Treasurer, Secretary and four Committee Members. All Kuranda residents are urged to join/ rejoin ARK and stand for Committee: especially if you consider your area needs more attention. ARK is a non profit community organisation with a strong regional focus and seeks to work for and with the people of the Kuranda region for a positive environmental, social, economic and cultural future for all. Nomination forms available from The Secretary, PO Box 573 Kuranda. NB: Only fully paid up members can nominate, second, stand or vote for positions.

The ARK June meeting was one person short of a quorum - an very unusual event for ARK- possibly because it was a freezing cold night [by Kuranda standards anywayl] [For those unfamiliar with 'quorums' this is the number of persons required for 'business' to be transacted: that is twice the number of the Committee plus one, in ARK's case this is fifteen people.] Nevertheless, the presence of Mareeba Shire Mayor Chris Lewis and Councillor Ned Brischetto was extremely valuable and helped with a number of questions and issues including:

* MAIN ROADS: ARK has been in contact with District Manager Bruce Ollison who has set a tentative date for late July for the promised second consultation meeting regarding the Black Mt Rd intersection, Myola/Kennedy Highway intersection and pedestrian & bike facilities from Top of Range to Kuranda (including Barron River Bridge). Greatest concern at the moment is for the safety of those traversing the Myola/Kennedy Highway intersection with significant increases in traffic expected due to the new High School coming on line in January. Special concerns for the safety of children crossing the Highway require urgent attention. Watch local media for actual date.

* BLACK MT RD BRIDGE: Council is considering postponing work required to allow for the reopening of the first bridge on Black Mt Rd for vehicular traffic for another year due to financial restraints. This is subject to the needs of Forestry as Council considers logging trucks should not be using the current detour through Green Lane & Butler Drive. Regardless, Council will be establising some sort of pedestrian access across this area at minimal cost & possibly temporary.

*FNQEB: Have contacted ARK to establish contact with the tree maintenance consultant they have commissioned to do an vegetation audit. They will be coming back to the community at a future ARK meeting to discuss the findings of the study and seek response to proposals for maintaining a balance between trees and reliable, safe

* CASSOWARY CONSERVATION: Dr Lesley Clark and members of the Working Group were able to give an update and thankfully some progress seems to be being made. The Wet Tropics Management Agency has undertaken to be the nominating body to allow for the process to have the Southern cassowary listed as Endangered on a Federal level to proceed. Unfortunately this is a complex process and listing is still a fair way off although moves to protect the remaining population will not wait for this and the establishment of a Management Strategy has begun with the need for all concerned to unite and work together for the survival of these magnificant birds.

* SIGNAGE: Ongoing concern and frustration was expressed regarding the apparent lack of enforcement of signage regulations. Of special concern is the overwhelming amount and type of corporate signage allowed for the recently redeveloped BP service station: so at odds with the sort of image which all Kuranda town planning instruments seek to promote. Mayor Chris Lewis and Cnr Brischetto promised to follow up on signage and the long awaited employment of an enforcement officer to deal with these and other issues such as dogs and littering.

* TRAFFIC STUDY: Residents queried why several recommendations seemed to go directly against the majority view as established over the past 5 or so years through a number of surveys and consultation exercises. The Mayor said that Council was only looking at options and urged residents to write with their views to allow Council to make a final decision. NB: The deadline for submissions is now Friday July 11th (before 12.30pm at the Kuranda Council Office and before 5pm at Mareeba.) HAVE YOUR SAY NOW!!!!!

Regrading of the steep hill from the Railway/Skyrail end of Coondoo Street up to the Police Station on the corner of Morong and Coondoo Streets continues, with wet weather delaying completion. When finished the walkway will be to wheelchair standard grade, landscaped and will eventually include a number of shelter structures. KURANDA WEIR Electricity and Water Matters

INFORMATION SHEET ISSUED BY BARRON GORGE POWER STATION

JUNE 1997

Why is a new feeder needed?

Cairns has experienced a high growth in electricity demand over the past 10 years. The existing southern electrical supply link needs reinforcement by 1997/98 to avoid an increase in the risk of loss of supply to the Cairns area. To achieve this, a new 275 000 volt (275 kV) powerline (otherwise known as a "feeder") is being installed.

When and where will it be built?

Powerlink Queensland is installing the 275 kV powerline between Chalumbin and Woree. The installation is expected to be carried out from the beginning of july until early next year.

Part of this new transmission line will be built along side the existing 132 000 volt (132 kV) Turkinje feeder.

During the construction period, the 132 kV feeder will be out of service while crews are working for safety reasons.

How does this Impact on Barron Gorge Power Station?

While the 132 kV feeder is out of service, the electrical power used in the northern region will be supplied by the two 132 kV Innisfail feeders and by Barron Gorge Power Station.

Over the last few years during the dry season, Barron Gorge Power Station has operated for two to three hours per day. Powerlink Queensland itas advised that during the construction period, the power station will be required to generate for about nine hours per day. This will compensate for the loss of power normally coming into the region via the 132 kV Turkinje foeder.

How much water will Barron Gorge Power Station need?

To operate at this level, Barron Gorge Power Station requires a flow of 610 million litres (ML) a day from the Barron River. This could result in a maximum requirement of 60 000 ML flowing through the station during the period.

Where will the water come from?

Water will be supplied through river regulation arrangements used previously to supply the power station. Flows in the Barron River will be managed according to a control curve based on the level of Tinaroo Falls Dam at the start of each month. Irrigator entitlements will be maintained and no releases will be made beyond those provided for by the control curve.

Tinaroo Falls Dam is currently overflowing, and an announced allocation of 100% is expected for irrigators for the 1997/8 water year.

River flows will be maintained as constant as possible and irrigators will be informed regarding any significant flow fluctuations.

What about the Kuranda Weir level?

The Kuranda Weir forms a regulating pond for water used to drive the turbines at Barron Gorge Power Station. The agreed community-requested operating level of the Kuranda Weir is between 6 and 4.5 metres. This is equivalent to a holding capacity of 600 ML.

During the planned nine-hours-per-day generating period, it is calculated that a regulated inflow of 229 ML should flow into the weir. Therefore, the lowest weir operation level, of 4.8 metres, would be between 6 and 7 pm daily. During the other 15 hours of the day (the non-generation period) the river inflows are expected to return the Weir level to 5.8 - 6 metres for the start of the next day.

Why does the welr level appear low?

The recent Cyclone Justin caused extra sand to deposit in the Kuranda Weir storage area. Therefore the visible sand banks in the weir are not an indication of a low water level.

Creatively Promoting Kuranda's Future

STRATEGIC CONSULTANCY ANNOUNCED

The Kuranda Village Promotion Program is sponsored by the Department of Tourism, Small Business and Industry, Mareeba Shire Council and the Mareeba Regional Development Organisation. The Program aims to revitalise the Village of Kuranda through community consultation and participation.

Just over twelve months ago as a result of a public meeting the Kuranda 'Main Street' program began. A management committee was elected comprising a mix of 60% business representation and 40% resident representation. The program was renamed as the Kuranda Village Promotion Program and a Strategic Plan established. Three working groups were formed: Built Environment, Business Development and Marketing & Promotion. A number of objectives were established from the public meeting and the work begun to achieve these. An objective of the Marketing & Promotions Working Group was to establish a long term Strategic Marketing & Promotion Plan for the Village.

As reported in February's edition of the Kuranda Paper, the Management Committee of the KVPP had sought tenders for the engagement of professional consultants to develop the Plan. The KVPP is now delighted to announce the appointment of Steven Le Page & Company and Tourism Strategies as consultants to prepare a marketing and promotion plan for Kuranda Village. The appointment of the consultants has been a result of several months concerted effort.

The consultancy team has a combined experience of over sixty years in the industry and pride themselves on providing a high level of personal attention and service. Past projects include developing a 3 year marketing plan for Brisbane as an international and domestic meeting and conventions venue, preparation of a regional tourism plan for the Suncoast Regional Tourism Association of Tasmania, the re-positioning of French Polynesia (Tahiti) as an affordable and value-formoney destination in the Australian market-place and concept development, feasibility and business plan for the International Antartic Centre (NZ).

Project Head, Stephen Le Page, said "Kuranda is very fortunate in that its intrinsic and natural features and location combine to give it excellent long term-prospects — provided it pursues a well conceived marketing and enhancement plan. Kuranda's protected and authentic 'identity' in the midst of a tourist strip fast approaching an international stereotype really does offer scope to consider new forms of promotion and development more in keeping with its rich tradition in arts and culture and the nature oriented lifestyle of residents."

Mr Le Page has indicated that it is not so much the number of tourists which is important, as the relative yield from tourism, and this needs to borne in mind all the time. He said "there is a need to return to basics, and to assess the potentials initially from a very fresh and market-experienced perspective. We need to look for and build upon, the differences as these are the very fundamentals of tourism. The last thing that Kuranda needs is more of the same! This will require a lateral approach with very innovative thinking."

This initative of the KVPP is one of many that is giving the people of Kuranda more control and direction over their future within the tourism industry while maintaining harmony between the environment, resident's wishes and the commercial sector. Program Co-ordinator, Michelle Bell-Turner, said "the development of the Marketing Plan will further help the Village focus on it's vision of "Providing the world with a unique experience of environmental, artistic and cultural integrity to inspire and delight all."

The consultants will commence work on Friday 27 June, with the project due for completion on August 31. According to Program Coordinator, Michelle Bell-Turner, "public consultation and review is paramount at various stages of the project and I look forward to keeping all informed of dates and details regarding this."



These leaves are sold in bunches. Fertilised regularly and cut frequently. They also sell small flowers to restaurants for decoration and use in salads. Lots of Mulch is used. On July 12th Sat at 2pm we shall visit the home of Mrs Barbara and Bill Wentworth on Jarawee Rd. We shall have smoko there so please bring a plate and your gardening questions. At 3.30 we shall move across the road to the Orchid Nursery of the Vivens. He is semi-retired but is a fund of knowledge and judges at orchid shows frequently. Organic Gardening

I have enjoyed gardening these cool winter days. The vegies are growing so well. The celery is luxuriant and some ready to eat. The chives are delicious chopped up and cooked in a little oil. You can scramble an egg with the chives and add cooked brown rice etc. My chives grow about 1 inch a day in good compost. The Greek Basil is delicious chopped up in this mixture or in other dishes. My vegies have been well mulched with all the leaves from the hundreds of Heliconias that have had their flowers. The soft tops of the leaves are mowed with a hand mower. It makes a soft healthy mulch, the stalky bottoms can be used as mulch for fruit trees. Heliconia and Torch Ginger roots are here for giving away if you dig them out.

STILL STRUGGLING WITH DAILY HEARTWORM TABLETS

Heartworm disease is caused by adult heartworms that develop in the dog's heart and adjacent blood vessels of the lungs. These warms are long and slender, measuring up to 35 cm in length. In cases of very high infestation, mare than 350 worms have been recovered from a single dog. although it is more common for just 10 to 50 worms to cause a critical condition in the dog. That's up to 17 metres of worms living in the dog is heart and adjacent blood vessels.

Treatment of Disease

Treatment of dogs infested with adult heartworm often requires intense and expensive therapy that involves multiple administrations of a strong endoparasiticidal drug and strict rest. Secondary complications of the disease and the death of large numbers of worms causes great distress to the dog.

Transmission of Heartworm

Natural transmission to and infestation of dogs by larval stages of the parasite living in circulation blood known as microfilaria, is near impassible to prevent. A single heartworm infested dog in an area can pass on microfilaria to many other dogs simply through mosquitoes drawing blood from that dog and at a later time, depositing the microfilaria onto other dogs when it feeds an

1 x infested dog + 1 x mosquito = dog population at risk

Prevention of Heartworm

Prevention of heartworm infestation has greatly advanced over the past 7 years. Prior to this time it was necessary to give the dog a bitter tasting, high dose tablet every day to prevent the microfilaria developing into adult heartworm, missing even a single treatment dose could result. in their irreversible development ta adult heartworms.

Now the preventative treatment of choice for all dogs is ProHeart tablets containing a new and mare effective compound. CASSOWARIES, CORRIDORS & COMMUNITY

There is a lot of talk in the air about vegetation corridors and cassowary management plans and money to back it, but what's it got to do with you, you might ask. The answer is: it's on your land, the cassowaries are in your back yard and we are appealing to you to save it for the rest of us.

We are now starting to build relationships with landowners whose land links the critical forest patches across Kuranda's wet tropical rainforests. Could you help us in this quest, please? Would you call in to see us sometime or phone, fax, write a letter or email us so you can lead us in the right direction. It is our common understanding, sharing of knowledge and cooperation which will save the cassowary and maintain biodiversity.

What's Biodiversity?

Biodiversity is the variety of all life forms. It includes animals, plants, fungi and micro-organisms, such as bacteria. It also includes the hereditary material of each organism (genes) and the ecosystems of which they are a part. We depend on biodiversity for our very survival and quality of life.

Why is Biodiversity Important?

Biodiversity underpins the processes that make life possible. Healthy ecosystems are necessary for maintaining air and water quality, climate, marine productivity, soil formation, cycling of nutrients and waste disposal.

Ethically, no species and no generation has the right to use the Earth's resources solely for its own benefit. Biodiversity is what makes the landscape beautiful and variable. Economically, we depend on plants and animals to attract tourists and to provide food, medicines, energy and building materials. The main threat to biodiversity is clearing vegetation.

WILL IT BE WATER OR WINE?

The team of poster designers, slogan inventers, messengers (to take the water saving messages to the streets), educators and organisers is growing. There's room if you want to be part of it - and get paid.

The 1-day summit will be in Cairns on Sunday 31st August 1997. It will be an opportunity for you to ask questions of the environmental experts, the dam builders and the politicians.

THE FERAL PIG TRAPPING PROGRAM



A problem with the pig trapping program has developed due to a slump in the European delicatessen market resulting in the lack of a 'chiller box' locally to store pig carcasses for shipment to Sydney and sale overseas. This

situation has revealed the dependency of the feral pig trapping program on this market and if the program is to continue, other means of disposing of carcasses needs to be found.

In the meantime, a trained shooter is available to shoot feral pigs on private property at the invitation of landowners. While this method is effective in eliminating feral pigs from properties, it does not reduce pig numbers in protected parks, or solve the problem of disposing of carcasses.

VEGETATION PROTECTION LAWS STALLED

Preparation of a draft model local law on vegetation protection had been halted until "discussions have been held with primary producer groups and others..", according to Di McCauley, Minister for Local Government & Planning. The government has decided to examine the full range of alternative to the local law to identify the regimes that will place vegetation management with the context of regional economic development, land and resource use strategies and sustainable primary production."

Local governments will have to demonstrate they have undertaken appropriate consultation with affected landowners, primary producer groups, conservation groups and the Local Government Association before the State Government is likely to approve any proposed local laws on vegetation protection.

Due to its inability to enforce protection, Mareeba Shire Council has reversed a previous decision which prevented destruction of a stand of magnificent Cadagi trees on the proposed Betagamma subdivision at Douglas Track, Speewah. The fate of the trees is now in the hands of the developer

SEWERAGE POLLUTION

Concern has been raised about the dependence of the sewerage plant and its pumping stations on the continuity of electricity to ensure no raw sewage flows into our waterways. We are seeking information from Council about the down time for the pumps before sewage overflows.

ENVIRONMENTAL DEFENDER'S OFFICE

EDO funding has been restricted to exclude expenditure on assisting the community to mount a litigious challenge against decisions made by the government. Clarification is being sought as to whether this applies to local councils. If so, then the EDO would not be able to assist the community to challenge any council decisions be they illegal, improper or environmentally negligent.



SELF HELP ABORIGINES

Today Mr Ron Richards, Chairman of KMKM Aboriginal Corporation signed the deed (as the settler) for the establishment of a public charitable trust fund to be known as Ngangdyin Walba Foundation (Our Money). He said the trust would be supported by contributions from the salaries paid to the CDEP workers in the Kuranda region which covers the communities of Mona Mona, Kowrowa, Koah, Mantaka and Kuranda. Mr Richards said that he believed this was the first such Aboriginal Foundation of its type in Australia. He said that once the deposits in the trust had reached sufficient magnitude, the interest earned would be available for the advancement of charitable purposes amongst Australian Aboriginal people in the Kuranda region. This would include the provision of relief from poverty, sickness, suffering etc in addition to the advancement and support of Aboriginal culture, education and general well being. He said this was another example of Aborigines endeavouring to establish self help situations in their long journey towards self reliance.

FIBRE CROP **OPPORTUNITIES**

EXAMINED IN NEW BOOK The potential for growing and utilising non-wood fibre crops in Australia is highlighted in a new book published by the Department of Primary Industries. Fibre Crops: opportunities for Australian agriculture by Ian Wood -Australia's foremost fibre crop agronomist - provides the reader with a worldwide perspective of the history, characteristics, uses and production statistics for: abaca, flax, industrial hemp, jute, kenaf, ramie, roselle, sisal, henequen, sugar can bagasse and sunn hemp. Cotton is excused, as it is already a well-established industry in Australia. The author also comments on Australian commercial prospects for the crops, and provides contact details for specialist advice and marketing information for each crop. Brief descriptions are also provided for 12 other minor fibre crops with limited modern commercial scope - although the author notes that the leguminous genus Sesbania is represented by ten species in tropical and subtropical Australia, and could have some potential for commercial development. Commenting on the new book, DPI's General Manager for Field Crops, Don McNee, said that the fibre crops discussed by the author have potential for a range of uses including paper, textiles, upholstery, rope, insulation and building boards. He said the seed of may fibre crops could also be crushed and the resulting oils used in cosmetics and soaps. "As well as being of great interest to Australian farmers and scientists, lan Wood's book will appeal to a wider audience," said Mr McNee. "It will encourage further study of the potential for the commercial production of new fibre crops in Australia, and it will stimulate discussion on processing and marketing strategies for those crops," he said. Prevent CD-ROM AutoRun.

Sometimes Windows 95 is just too automatic for some of us. Like when a CD-ROM is inserted into the CD-ROM drive and it automatically starts playing some welcome gizmo or running a Setup program. This makes it difficult to simply browse the content of the CD with Windows Explorer. For a one-time solution, press and hold the [Shift] key while inserting the CD (this could be a little awkward depending on which hand you use and where your CD-ROM drive is locatedl). If the CD-ROM AutoRun feature really bothers you, then for long-term fix, do this: right-click on My Computer, select Properties, then select the Device Manager tab. Double click on CDROM and select your CD-ROM drive. Click Properties, then the Settings tab. Turn off the "Auto insert notification" option. Click OK twice and restart Windows for the change to take effect.



EDUCATION VIEWS

QUEENSLAND'S maths and science education rates among the best five countries in the world, according to an international audy released this week.

Overall results in the Third International Maths and Science Study saw Queensland primary students ranked fourth in the world in science and fifth in mathematics.

In science only Western Australia. Korea and South Australia ranked ahead of Queensland students, while Queensland scored ahead of Japan. USA and the top European countries.

Only Singapore, Korea, Japan and Hong Kong scored higher than Queensland students in

The top Queensland students were on a par with the top Hong Kong students in maths, though there was a greater range of scores from Queensland students.

Oueensland's maths results were well ahead of those from USA, Canada, England, New Zealand and Thailand


The study, released by the Australian Council for Educational Research on Wednesday. sampled populations of nineyear-old students from 26 coun-

Director-General of Education Frank Peach said he was pleased with the findings of the study.

"These most recent results are confirmation of Queensland's high standing in the international education arena," Mr Peach said.

They are even better than the preliminary results released late last year which saw our Year 8 and 9 students finish in the top nine countries in the world in maths







The Burning Issue

Picture this scenario - a cold winters night. You have just returned home from a pleasant evening out, only to be confronted with your house on fire as you pull into the drive. You dial 000 and within minutes the Fire Service arrives. They immediately locate the yellow hydrant indicator marker on the bitumen, rush to where the hydrant should be and Lo and behold, it is missing. After several frantic minutes of searching the hydrant is located - under years of soil, grass, rubbish and dirt. It takes a good 10-15 minutes to dig it out and clear it to a functional state. Now nearly 1/2 an hour has elapsed and the house is beyond saving - the aim is no longer protecting the house but dampening down and cleaning up. Remember it only takes 5 minutes for a house to burn to the ground. All the while you keep thinking, if I had spent that 15 minutes last time I was doing the gardens, and cleaned the hydrant, I would still have a home. The above scenario is so unnecessary and completely avoidable. The Kuranda Fire Service spent several hours this month doing routine hydrant checks and it was disturbing to note that at least every 2nd hydrant was completely blocked or inaccessible to a certain degree. If you know you have a hydrant on your footpath please keep it clean - it doesn't take much and, in an emergency, could save lives or property. The hydrant checks were not all doom and gloom - some properties were very good with clean and accessible hydrants - good effort. Winter is here - so too is drier weather and an increased fire threat, not only in the yard but inside the home. Please take care using heaters, electric blankets and fires. HOME FIRE POISONING!!

A cosy fire at the end of a winter's day or to keep the damp at bay, can be a delight. But take care WHAT you burn: keep it natural. Don't burn treated off-cuts or building scraps with paint, glue etc, no ply or veneer. These all contain a lethal mixture of toxic substances including arsenic and cyanide.

And the ash resulting from the burning of these materials is also toxic to plants & would accumulate in your system if used on plants to be eaten.

TREVOR'S TIP:

FRACTURES:

Fracture is the term used when a bone is broken. Fractures may be

- Direct force (the bone is fractured at the point of impact)
- Indirect force (a fall on an outstretched hand can result in a fracture at the wrist, elbow, shoulder or collar bone)
- Abnormal muscle action (the kneecap can be fractured by a sudden contraction of the attached muscles)

Remember to handle the patient gently to lessen the nervous reaction and pain, and immobilise the injured part or limb in as natural a position as possible without using force.

SYMPTOMS:

Pain, swelling and tenderness at the site, later giving bruising and loss of function.

SIGNS:

Deformity, abnormal mobility (movement). Haemorrhage at the

TREATMENT:

- Control any haemorrhage (bleeding)
- Cover wound
- Support the injured limb in a natural position
- Splint the fracture immobilise the joint above and below the support site. Pad any bony prominences
- Handle the patient gently
- Reassure the patient
- Treat for shock
- Seek Ambulance medical aid on 000

A THOUGHT FOR JULY

This month we open our Bibles at St. Marks Gospel and we read Chapter 6 v 1 - 6. Familiarity often breeds contempt or so we are told. Familiarity can very easily blind us to the great gifts and resources available to us in another person. "Jesus comes to His own Country" It is not an easy thing to do; it takes courage. For our own lives the phrase "our own country" can mean those situations and places where we are very well known where we cannot impress people as we can when we are not known. It takes a certain security in us to return to such places. We have only to think of minor decisions in our lives, such a setting out for a school or college reunion after the passage of a few decades! Will we be recognised? Will we have to endure that hurtful or silly nickname we have succeeded in getting rid of in the intervening years? Such fears may sound minor and silly but then our vulnerability's are often focused on silly minor things. We read in the passage that "His Disciples followed Him", again it was courageous of Jesus to allow this. He did not know how He would be received. He did not know how He would be made to appear by these men who looked up to Him as teacher and leader. By having them come to Nazareth He was risking being stripped of these rules. We see here the immense personal courage and inner security of Jesus. "He began to teach in the Synagogue"; we often find Jesus at public worship. Anyone who tires to portray Jesus as distancing Himself from the Religious life of His time is faced with the fact that Jesus validated the Synagogue by His presence. Critical He certainly was but He did not live an isolated personal spiritual journey. "What is this wisdom given to Him? Is not this the carpenter?. What took place is sadly typical of such encounters. Jesus' words move people, but a strange thing happens. If He is a child of the community then how can He be exceptional? Quality is denied by familiarity. If this man grew up in Nazareth then He must be ordinary like everybody else, no matter what He does or says! Because there is a lack of trust, Jesus captivity to heal is limited. We can easily presume that great gifts cannot be among us, because if they were we would not recognise them! But often we do not. There is truth in the joke about an expert being someone more than 10 kilometres from the town they live in. After centuries Jesus' statement about Prophets being unrecognised in their own country is still a common expression, this indicates how true it is. We need to take care not to dismiss our Lord to-day when He tries to reach us through the mind or voice or work of someone well known to us. Someone whom we are tempted to dismiss as "only so and so".

St. Saviour's congregation joined many across Australia in Special Prayer during the Week of Reconciliation. One prayer had been especially composed by Bishop Arthur Malcolm of Yarrabah. The Weeks of Prayer and the Reconciliation Conference prepared the foundations for the road to full reconciliation and the renewal of the Nation, a united Australia which respects this land of ours, values the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage and provides Justice and equality to all. 



MARBEBA UNICA

Day Respite Centre


[This is the second of a series of articles on the services offered by Mareeba Unicare in Mareeba and Kuranda for the benefit of Mareeba Shire residents.]

Day Respite centres evolved to meet the needs of carers. Carers are people who spend much of their time looking after another person, someone who cannot care for his or her self. Often the carer is a relative - perhaps a daughter who cares for her mother who is aging and can no longer cope on her own, or perhaps a mother whose child is disabled. It might be a man whose partner has been incapacitated in an accident.

In each case the carer is tied to the one for whom they care. Sometimes this can become an almost intolerable burden. In the past, unless a friend or another relative was available to share the load, carers often found themselves isolated and worn out by the constant demands placed on them. In extreme cases, it was next to impossible to take normal care of themselves. Something as simple as getting a haircut could become a huge

Governments have become aware that the costs of caring for someone at home are much less than the cost of maintaining that person in an institution such as a Nursing Home. There are also many benefits for the client if a person can remain with their family. For these reasons there has been an attempt to care for carers to make it easier for people to remain in their own homes because the load on carers has been lightened.

Day Respite centres provide a safe and secure environment where people with disabilities can receive care, allowing the person who normally provides that care to have some time to do the sorts of things that the rest of us take for granted. In the process, it may be possible to also provide benefits for the person with a disability, either through providing social contact or experiences which they might otherwise miss. However, the main aim is to give the carers a break from their 24 hour a day responsibilities.

Several years ago the Mareeba Unicare Committee was approached by people in the caring services concerned that nothing was available for carers in Mareeba Shire. A public meeting was held and this further added to the concerns being expressed. When it became clear that no other group in Mareeba was interested or able to meet this need, Mareeba Unicare agreed to apply for funding to open a Day Respite Centre in Mareeba.

A house at 66 Rankin Street, next door to the Uniting Church and opposite the Shire offices, was renovated and became the headquarters for the new service. Government funds from the HACC program allowed a Co-ordinator and an assistant to be appointed, and provided a bus equippped to carry clients in wheelchairs.

From the beginning, it was anticipated that the service would operate on a part time basis in Kuranda. The CWA hall was chosen as the most suitable venue and has been used ever since on Thursdays as Kuranda's respite care

Those for whom care is provided are offered a meal, transport to and from the centre if required, and activities appropriate to their needs. The service is offered for a small charge of \$3.50 per day plus the cost of meals which are purchased from Meals on Wheels in Mareeba. Overnight respite is not yet available.

The service has changed little over the past few years. Des Lackey is the co ordinator, and she is assisted by two part time staff, one of whom is also the bus driver.

The Mareeba Unicare Committee was aware when it accepted this challenge that Government funding was barely adequate to meet the needs of the service. Indeed, it has had to be subsidised from Garden Settlement income, and funding remains a difficulty. While applications have been made for funds to build a purpose built centre in Mareeba, so far these have been unsuccessful.

The Day Respite Care Centre relies on the generosity of the community and assistance provided by volunteers from the community to allow it to offer the best possible service to its clients.

A bequest to the Blue Nursing Service in Kuranda may eventually lead to the establishment of a centre in Kuranda that will offer a purpose built Day Respite facility. Currently, the number of clients using the service in Kuranda is quite low. Alternative Medicine Also Means Eating in Balance

Natural healing and holistic medicine are ways of treating the human body based on the philosophy that symptoms of sickness are the signs of a body that is either—or both—chemically imbalanced and overloaded with toxins.

Treating a sick body is a matter of cleaning it up, and building it up. Accomplishing this is based on feeding the person a wholesome high fibre diet, and supplementing this diet with the particular minerals and vitamins that the individual seems deficient in based on their individual symptoms and body chemistry evaluation.

As an example, when someone comes to me suffering from frequent cold, bleeding gums, cuts that heal slowly, and bruises easily, it would suggest that they are lacking in vitamin C. A coated tongue is also a good indication of this condition (Note: the color of the tongue from a healthy pink to a grayish brown is also indicative of the livers overall health condition).

For those above, a recommendation would include an increase in their intake of fruit, and possibly a Vitamin C supplement (buffered if the person is acidic).

Of course, this would be on top of getting them to a balanced state with regular eating patterns high in fibre-which is the first step to getting well, or getting better, or both.

This basic emphasis on regular eating three to four small meals a day is because the body likes consistency, and skipping meals or eating at irregular intervals, causes the blood sugar levels to fluctuate up and down. This in turn causes periods of high and low energy, depression and emotional swings as the person's body is either full or starving.

Unexplained irritability, sudden weak spells, craving for sweets, frequent headaches and low energy in the afternoon are often signs of a poor eating pattern, and particularly characteristic of those who skip breakfast, as it is breakfast or brunch that carries us through the afternoon. And, without those carbohydrates in the morning, the body ends up out of fuel in early to mid-afternoon until the lunch meal kicks in.

So, when someone comes to me for advice, whatever the situation, my first directive is to get them to START EATING REGULARLY

That primarily they are to eat a high fibre (fruit, vegetables, cereals, rice and beans) diet, with some low fat dairy and moderate amounts of animal protein as a supplement to the poor quality produce we have today, containing less then 50% of it's normal nutritional value

And that they get some exercise (20-30min, 3-5 times a week) as a start. Walking is fine. By doing the above things they will be establishing a foundation for long-term health by giving the body the elements it needs to function, namely the minerals and vitamins.

And at the same time, it offers a means by which the body can cleanup and re-balance its own toxic and imbalanced body chemistry.

In addition, the immune system will be supplied with the nutrients it needs to combat disease. Holistic health and natural haling don't require exotic combinations of magical Herb's tinctures, and supplements, though they can be of assistance.

What they do require is cleaning up the body, and rebuilding it out of mostly simple foods. Start there, establish good habits most of the time, and give yourself time, and slowly but surely you should eventually feel better, function better, and avoid the countless symptoms resulting from too much fat, sugar, and grease, the worse "viruses" of all.


