

Bi-Centenary Edition

HIS is the 200th edition of The Kuranda Paper, and it seems appropriate to have a look at the history of community newspapers in Kuranda. It appears from the evidence available that the first newspaper produced in Kuranda appeared in April 1979. This paper was called Kuranda Village News, and was a monthly publication. There is no evidence to indicate if this was a community paper or a commercial venture.

The paper was edited and published by Peter Hohermuth. Art work was by Graeme Bailey, Ann Fitzpatrick and Bruce Zielinski. Advertising rates were: Display 50 cents per column/centimeter; Classified 20 cents per line; "Classy" classifieds 25 cents per line. The paper sold initially for 30 cents, but later the rate rose to 50 cents.

The paper was rather scathing of the treatment of Kuranda by the Mareeba Shire Council. It seems that in some ways little has changed in Kuranda, especially the relations between the locals and the Council. The editorial set the tone of the paper:

"What's in a name?"


"At times we feel like "Ma Reeba's illegitimate child. (Poor little bastard; no doubt "Pa Reeba" shot through long ago, skipping maintenance.")

The front page of the first issue of the Kuranda Village News carried the story about Kuranda finally getting a public toilet. Whether Kuranda had a public toilet before this facility was provided is not clear, but it was obviously a "cause celebre" at the time. This edifice was built by Mareeba contractor Jack Byrnes for the Shire Council at a cost of between \$6,000 and \$7,000. Local wags christened "The Little House that Jack Built".

The President of the Kuranda Tourist Association said the toilet block was a giant step

for mankind (and womenkind) of Kuranda. "While other towns and cities concentrated on the frills and fancies of the tourist industry, Kuranda maintained its down to earth approach. "Give them the necessities and let nature do the rest."

Apparently the saga of the toilet block had a long history. Funds previously allocated to build the toilet block had been redirected to Mount Molloy for some purpose more urgent? The Kuranda Tourist Association took the project under its wing and came up with a plan for the community to construct the toilet block. "With shades of Clochmerle, members planned to sell bricks for \$1, which could be signed by the donor. For an extra dollar the donor could print his own graffiti on the reverse side." (The "Clochmerle" referred to was a French village in a TV comedy of the early 1970s. The communist council in Clochmerle built a urinal in the main street in front of the Catholic Cathedral, which led to open warfare between the supporters of both sides.)



Kuranda Village News was a broadsheet paper until issue No 23 in October 1981, when the format changed to A3 folded and stapled, with higher quality paper. It became more like a booklet than a newspaper. The cover

> was sponsored by the Kuranda Honey house. One interesting advertisement was for "Mrs Miller's Hostel". The charge was only \$3 per night! (Eat your heart out backpackers!) "More than just a hostel. The hostel in the village in the rainforest. Truly tropical atmospheres – only 2 minutes from the Kuranda Railway Station. Hot showers. Cooking facilities. Washing machines. TV & games."

The present newspaper, The Kuranda Paper, first appeared on 26 July 1991 as Kuranda Community News. The first issue consisted of eight pages. The paper was a nonprofit community project operated

The first issue of Kuranda Community News was much


more subdued than the first issue of its predecessor. Instead of bagging the Council, the first page was devoted to a story of a steam train service returning to Kuranda. While the residents of Kuranda in April 1979 were relieved to have access to a public toilet, in July 1991 they were given the opportunity to take a trip back in time by traveling on a steam train. Short excursions were available each day at 12.45 and 2.00 p.m., and at 11.30 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. The steam train project had only a short life.

In his first editorial Shep Humston introduced the newspaper to the community:

Welcome to the "Kuranda Community News", a first in many ways and we believe an outline of what you can expect in the future.

The paper, your voice, to remain permanent and viable, will need your contributions and financial support. After all, a newspaper must be adequately financed to survive and therefore advertising will be vital. More than just an advertising sheet, a bulletin board or someone's hobby horse, the balanced presentation should be straight

Violence No Way March: Kuranda hosted the Violence No Way March this year for the Tablelands District. The turnout was fantastic, with approximately 80 marching through town with positive messages coming from the crowd and on lookers. There were a further 20 or so in the park and this made for a great crowd. Considering that the rain was pretty steady all afternoon, the attendance demonstrated a strong show of support from the community about finding alternatives to violence. The message was very clear – Violence No Way!

KNC Questionnaire: We are gearing up for our Strategic Planning Review and are working at getting in-put and participation from the community, service providers, clients, volunteers and staff. Family Support Items Needed: We have an informal way of linking up families and individuals with different items of furniture and household goods etc that they need. Right now we know families who need: 2 x washing machines, 1 x fridge and 1 x double or queen bed. If you have any of those items that you no longer need, please give us a call.

Laughter Yoga: Is currently being held on Tuesday afternoons at 2pm for 20-30 minutes – cost is \$2 per session. Laughter really is the best medicine.

Numeracy and Literacy Course: Outcomes (based in Atherton) are delivering a numeracy and literacy program through Ngoonbi Cooperative Society. Contact Ngoonbi for more info on 40937177.

With cooler weather, the gardener has good opportunity to begin judicious clearing of the rampant growth of summer gone. Flowered stems of Costus, most gingers and Heliconias can be cut out. Also a good time to clean up fish ponds and water gardens, resettling plants with new mix ready for spring re-growth. More people are complaining about Turkey mayhem - welcome to the club! Remember these are a protected species and the odd thrown object and shouted imprecations may momentarily delay but not destroy, as the Dry sets in, their avid appetite for any corm, bulb or luscious shoot. Fencing, netting or other barricade is the only remedy to preventing loss of treasures. Now is the time for planting many greens, less inclined to bolt, likewise Coriander.

Plant of the Month: The Jewel Orchids. For the woman met in Smithfield



Kmart, buying a Cyclamen in flower for her elderly mother. We both lamented their passing beauty and our inability to carry them over as in colder climes. I promised I would write of a tropical challenger of equal beauty that her mother could enjoy longer at the window of her nursing home. Jewel orchids, as a grouping, are so called because of their extraordinarily beautiful foliage, often velvety with stunning contrasting crystalline venations. Most are terrestrial plants, requiring open

humus-rich mediums with constant moistness, good drainage and fairly high humidity, best grown in shallow planters and encouraged with light monthly fertilizing. The best known, most

readily available, easiest



and least expensive is Ludisia discolor (syn. Haemaria discolor) with dark vinous velvety leaves with reddish veins. From Southeast Asia, this easily roots from surface offcuts.

Less well known is the Goodyera genus of orchids found in tropical and temperate areas around the world. A nice example is Goodyera hispida which has a lovely light green leaf with white veins. The species is found in Vietnam and India. Another genus generally included in the jewel category is Macodes. Macodes sanderiana has lovely dark green, velvety leaves with golden veins and also Macodes petola with bright green shiny leaves with light veining.


Further "jewel orchids" in this certainly addictive grouping come from Anoectochilus, Cheirostylis, Cranichis, Dossinia, Sarcoglottis and Zeuxine, Certainly an A to Z of plant treasures to rival any Cyclamen and certainly more longer lasting and more rewarding on our window ledges.

Dear Wendy, As promised, you asked me about Radium Weed, Euphorbia peplus (Petty spurge, cancer weed, Milkweed, Wart-weed) and Bloodroot, Sanguinaria candensis, (Indian Paint. Tetterwort. Red Root, Coon Root, Snakebite, Sweet Slumber).

Radium Weed is a small growing annual to 30cm with simple or branched stems. bearing alternate, obovate to roundish petioled leaves. A member of the family Euphorbiaceae, usually characterized by the milky sap. Euphorbia peplus is native to Europe, temperate Asia and North Africa and is now a weed throughout temperate and subtropic regions of the world, often found on waste ground and in pavements. (I recently pulled a plant growing in KNC gardens).

Bloodroot, family *Papaveraceae* is a woodland plant of United States of America and Canada preferring shaded humus-rich soil and often cultivated as a rock garden plant for its very attractive foliage and pristine white flowers. The root when broken exudes a red sap which was used as an Indian paint and dye.





Kuranda Swimming Pool News

Kuranda has the cleanest swimming pool water in the world. As the first large commercial pool in Australia to be cleaned by Magnesium Salts a lot of new factors came into play that are groundbreaking in terms of the environmental and the individual personal health benefits. 

Confessions of a Trainee Potter

HE writer of this regular column does not normally make the column personal, however, this month the temptation is too great. I am not a potter, and have no wish to be so, but I have admired Mollie Bosworth's fine and fragile ceramics for so long, and was intrigued by her advertised beginners' classes for a number of months. I decided to go along, join the class and see what she could do with my skills, or lack of them. I commenced making a hand coiled bowl. The finished product could not be applied to the normal sense of usability but it can be said it serves as a symbol or representation of a familiar utensil which is functional. My wheel thrown plates and bowls were more successful, glazed in a blue hue, "a nice balanced shape but a bit thick" said Mollie. Some say that in use the ceramic object is only a 'thing', but if placed on a pedestal in a gallery it can be transformed into an art object. I think, however, I will give the pedestal theory a miss, but these 'masterpieces' now have pride of place in my cupboard and my family can look forward to some personalised pieces for birthdays and Christmas.

I have now learnt how to make a plate that stands level on the table and will survive the dishwashing machine. Although my bowls and plates are small and subtle in colour, it is said they radiate an attractive, vital energy. What more could a trainee ask for?

In just a few weeks I have progressed under Mollie's patient guidance and now work 'outside the square'. I have made a series of my 'Jacob's Rods' in white clay with different glazes and stains, and have extended my new found skills into other extremely liberating shapes and objects. I see ceramic art as not only mental stimulation but by composing abstract ideas or idealistic shapes, they will continue as a marker for humanistic and spiritual values.

I would thoroughly recommend any interested beginner to join these fun classes and work with this master craftsperson. Mollie has inspired and encouraged me to experiment. I find the few hours each week refreshing, exhilarating and certainly continuously creative. Most pieces, where even something as simple and as absolute as a plate, become something more through completion and use; they become transformed and provide more meaningful functions at one and the same time.

At just the right moment he drops the loz-

enge, weighing in around 20kgs, onto a forming table and wrestles it into a shape resembling an over fed rain-

forest python.

All this is an art in itself but then he feeds the candy into the wrapping machine, also an antique and then wraps the candy

into bite size pieces in the 'Kiss

style' wrapping.

The design of the machinery itself is an art form but the real art is the entire process, wholly designed and crafted by one of Kuranda's sugarsmiths, Kim Karrigan.



A Thought for June

This month we read from St Johns Gospel chapter 15 verses 9 to 17

Without the Gospel according to John there would be a great gap in Christian teaching. John gives us statements at the very heart of Christian faith which we might never have heard, statements such as "God so loved the world that he gave" and "Peace I leave with you" and many more. In this passage we are listening to Jesus speaking about his hopes for those who would follow after him. Jesus is also speaking to us. Jesus sees his ability to love his disciples as coming from his certainty that he himself is loved by the Father.

That says something to us about how we are able to love. We become loving human beings only if we ourselves have been loved. Parents, Grandparents, Great Grandparents, and God-Parents come to realize that if we wish to make the best of all possible contributions to society, we try to send into it a human being, our child, who has learned that he or she is indeed loved, and who therefore can become in turn a loving human being.

"Abide in my love," says Jesus. The challenge for love is constancy. Our humanity is anything but constant. Love must face change. Love must face change in challenges of relationships - particularly in parent-child relationships. Indeed to live in any relationship is to experience something constantly changing. Love takes effort.

In the nineteen-sixties, when I was a kid amid all the euphorictalk of love, there was a very wise button one saw from time to time. It said simply, "Love is damned hard work." How will we abide in Jesus' love, knowing that we receive it and can therefore share it? On this Jesus is clear and simple and very direct. We abide in love if we keep his commandments.

There is no sentimentality in Jesus' concept of loving. Love is absolutely linked to obedience. Love is a disciplined thing. Love does not happen by accident. It needs intention. Jesus speaks of a person laying down life itself for friends. It is too easy to think of that statement as applying only to Jesus and the terrible actuality of his sacrifice on the cross. We can say there are many ways of laying down one's life.

They are deserving of life, just as we want to live they share this common value.



In India, sleep is called the "wet nurse of the world" because it is nurturing, nourishing, and regenerating. There are two types of sleep: deep dreamless sleep that restores the physical body and active dreaming sleep, called REM (Rapid Eye Movement) sleep, that helps clear the mind of conflicting emotions.

GENERAL ADVICE FOR PEACEFUL SLEEP

- Wash your hands, face, and feet and clean your mouth and teeth before sleeping.
- Do not eat or drink for two hours before bedtime, especially very spicy or greasy foods, or caffeinated soft drinks, black tea, or coffee. Caffeine not only keeps you awake, but makes sleep more restless. Also, avoid alcoholic beverages before bedtime. Although they may initially help one to get to sleep, it often makes one rouse in the early hours and reduces the quality of rest the remainder of the night.
- Meditate briefly to clear the cares of the day before you close your eyes.
- Sleep in a quiet, slightly cool, well ventilated space away from smoke or the smell of food. These smells keep your nervous system on alert at a time when it should be totally relaxed.
- Lay on your right side to promote the most restful sleep. Breathing mostly through your left nostril naturally calms and cools the body. You may even close your right nostril to help with this.
- Sleep with your head in the east for the most meditative sleep and pleasant dreams. Sleeping with your head in the west evokes disturbing dreams and restless sleep. Sleeping with your head in the south works with the polarity of the earth to charge and heal the body. Your head in the north can be draining of energy. If you are ill, never sleep this way as it is considered to make recovery much slower and more difficult.
- To feel more naturally relaxed and secure, try to sleep facing the main bedroom door and next to a wall. A sleeping companion, human or animal, is also helpful for nervous Vata people.

AYURVEDIC RECEIPE

ASPARAGUS CREAM SAUCE

23grams fresh asparagus

3 tablespoons ghee

2 tablespoons barley flour

2 ½ cups buttermilk

1/2 teaspoon sea salt

Paprika as garnish

Wash asparagus and chop into ½ to 3cm pieces. Warm ghee in heavy saucepan or skillet; sauté asparagus in ghee until tender. Stir barley flour into ghee, pushing the asparagus aside as you do. Add buttermilk slowly, stirring well into the flour-ghee mixture to avoid creating lumps. Cook over low heat until thick. Add salt. Sprinkle paprika over sauce on serving.

COMMENTS: Good over rice, toast, or eggs, used like a Hollandaise sauce. Barley flour and buttermilk were an ancient way to calm and tonify the digestion. Together they make a light tangy, lemonflavoured sauce.






Building Kuranda's Education Revolution

Students in Kuranda will soon benefit from a \$2 million project that will see the construction of a new Resource Centre and Undercover area. This project is part of Stage 1 of the \$14.7 billion nation-wide Building the Education Revolution program, and Member for Barron River Steve Wettenhall and Kuranda District College Principal Gary Toshach will be on hand to witness the first turning of the sod on the site.

Member for Leichhardt Jim Turnour said "Two-thirds of the Rudd Government's \$42 billion Nation Building and Jobs Plan will be spent on long term infrastructure such as schools, roads and housing. It is great to see local school projects get off the ground so quickly. These infrastructure projects provide the local economy with an immediate boost which helps to support jobs, particularly in the construction industry.

"I am really pleased to see work starting so quickly - it was only in February this year the Federal Government announced the BER project and for Kuranda to be one of the first schools to benefit is a great boost to the local area. Importantly, the funding will help create jobs for local tradespeople bringing economic benefits to communities throughout the state," Mr Wettenhall said. "By working together with the federal government we can continue to meet the needs of Queensland students now and into the future."

Australia has never seen such a massive investment in school infrastructure in such a short time - and although the funding is federal, it is the responsibility of the Bligh Government to deliver this program on the ground.

Kuranda Chamber of Commerce and Tourism

As you may be aware the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce and Tourism, in partnership with the Kuranda Police, are working on a proposal to have a system of Closed Circuit Security Cameras (CCTV) in place to make our streets safer. We want to improve the level of public safety and security for our village. Tourists come to our village for perhaps one day of their lives. It is in all of our interests that these visitors have the best possible experience and leave with pleasant memories of Kuranda.

This proposal would allow the local Police to conduct proactive patrols in order to reduce the instances of public drunkenness and anti-social behaviour that occurs in our village. Secondly, the cameras would provide Police with an excellent investigative tool to start an investigation in the event a vehicle is stolen, property is damaged, an assault occurs or heaven forbid a child or someone goes missing from the CBD.

Essentially, what we wish to do is to improve public safety and visitor satisfaction within the Village. Questions raised so far are as follows:-

Can the camera footage be misused?

The system will give Police the ability to view the footage from the Kuranda Police Station as it is occurring. The Police however would not be able to record any of that footage. The recorded footage will be owned, recorded and stored by the Tablelands Regional Council in a separate building. The recorded footage will not be accessible to any individual person. It would only be accessible by designated officers within the Tablelands Regional Council for official purposes such as Police investigations. Any access to recorded footage will require a hard copy report outlining the reasons why.

For example, recently there was a serious assault on a resident, which occurred in the main street involving at least three attackers. He was kicked and punched to the point he had to be hospitalised. In future with CCTV Police may be able to identify a potential situation unfolding and respond before an offence occurs. The footage from cameras in that area would also assist in identifying witnesses, victims and suspects.

Who will pay for it?

Our aim is to have the proposal financed by public monies including various levels of government. It would be possible to apply to the State Government Security Improvement Program whereby successful applications receive 60% of the total cost of their project. It may be possible to apply for the other 40% to be funded through the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund.

• Where will the cameras be positioned?

There will be cameras monitoring Centenary Park and three locations along Coondoo Street.

Is it Worth It?

Ask yourself if you would feel safer walking through the streets at night with security monitoring. The Mayor of Ipswich Paul Pisasale stated last year that 'Crime has fallen by 78% in the decade since CCTV has been installed.

We are currently in the public consultation phase of this proposal and would like to hear the Community's thoughts and ideas on it. TOWNS right across the Tablelands are set to benefit from 16 community projects, funded by the Federal Government's one-off infrastructure grant.

From Atherton to Millaa Millaa, from Dimbulah to Irvinebank, the projects will be funded with Tablelands Regional Council's \$1.3 million slice of the \$250 million Regional and Local Community Infrastructure Program.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said the money was going where it was needed most. "We have 16 projects that will be spread across the region, and we will be using local services, products and materials where possible to ensure that the communities get the maximum benefit from this timely injection of funds from the Federal Government," he said.

The following projects will be funded: **Atherton Chinatown**, \$15,000-this project will involve expanding the public amenities of the facility to accommodate a disabled toilet for the Old Post Office Art Gallery.

Chillagoe Hall, \$80,000 - this project involves adding insulation and a colourbond lining to the hall to improve temperature effects and improve the aesthetics of the building.

Dimbulah Caravan Park, \$130,000 - this project involves the purchase and installation of two transportable buildings (dongas), each consisting of five individual cabins. This will increase accommodation facilities at the Dimbulah Caravan Park which will greatly benefit the Dimbulah community by giving relief to current accommodation problems.

Herberton Mining Centre, \$150,000 - this project involves an extension to the centre to accommodate a community archive including the largest collection of mining documents held in private hands.

Irvinebank School of Arts Building, \$60,000 - Works identified for this facility include stabilisation of walls, removal of curved verandah roofing, re-curving of iron,

repairs to curved rafters, repairs to gutters, and internal floor replacement.

Julatten Hall, \$80,000 - this project involves stage extensions and rewiring of electricals in order to further accommodate community events.

Kuranda Old Primary School, \$200,000-funds will be used to commence refurbishment of the Old Kuranda Primary School to provide the Kuranda Community and surrounding areas with a community centre.

Malanda Show Pavilion, \$120,000 - this project involves replacing the entire ceiling with Imperial Batts to improve acoustics, redesigning the entrance, painting the facility and installing a new commercial stove.

Malanda Falls Pool, \$30,000 - this project involves reconstructing the pathway and retaining walls in order to improve safety for all users.

Mary Andrews Park, \$100,000 - this funding will be used for playground equipment for children of various ages, a walking track through the park and along Granite Creek, a bike track, a fitness trail, picnic tables, park seating and shade protection.

Millaa Millaa RSL Hall, \$30,000 - this project involves upgrading the entrance to the facility, ceiling works, upgrading the kitchen and bar area and addressing security and fire lighting requirements.

Millaa Millaa Falls Circuit, \$30,000 - works to be done with this funding include upgrading the entry statement to all falls with signage, fencing and landscaping, new roofing at the Zillie Falls Shelter shed, and landscaping at the Zillie Falls viewing platform.

Mt Garnet Hall, \$58,000 - the project involves a new ceiling and it is also proposed to insulate the hall to moderate summer heat and improve acoustics.

Tarzali public toilets, \$55,000 - this project involves erecting a single multiuse toilet within the park. Tarzali currently has no public amenities within the town. **Small or rural parks**, \$50,000 - Funds will be used to upgrade various parks in the form of new seating, shade covers and playground equipment.

Yungaburra Library and Visitor Information Centre, \$120,000 - this involves the extension of the existing library to the north by 7m. This extension will incorporate a visitor's information centre, an access point for Tablelands Regional Council's services and a meeting room for local organisations.

Council received the funds on 23 April 2009, and some projects have already begun, while others will commence in the next few months.

TRC Bursary on Offer for Young Sportspeople

The call has gone out to young people all over the region who are seeking to excel in their chosen sport.

Tablelands Regional Council will be nominating two aspiring young sportspeople from the region to the North Queensland Sports Foundation for the 2009 BHP Billiton North Queensland Sport Development Bursary.

The \$500 bursaries, as well as a unique embroidered track suit jacket

for each successful applicant, will be awarded to two recipients to enable them to pursue their chosen sport.

Applications must be submitted through member Councils of the NQ Sports Foundation.

So, now Council needs to hear from people in the community to be able to determine the two nominations to go forward.


Applicants must be under the age of 18 during the year the Bursary is awarded (that is, they must be still 17 years of age on 31 December 2009). The applicants must also live in the Tablelands Regional Council area.

The Village was an oasis for the weary traveller, it was an opportunity for the downbeaten, it was a door between one life and the next, it was a morass for the unwary. It could provide a platform for progress, it could expand on a theme, it could cause a vision of paradise to swing into view, it could trap you in a vortex till the sound of your own wheels drove you crazy.

If we could peel back the village layer by layer like an onion, if we could look into the centre of each life and if we could understand the totality of what we were viewing, would it breed compassion or disgust.

In a village as small as this village no man, or woman, was truly separate from those around him, or her. There was no way to isolate your daily activities from those of other people, from your neighbours or from visitors, from tradesmen from outside the village precinct, from family or friends, purveyors or idlers, professionals or labourers. And the upshot of this was a homogenous blend that transformed lives from strict distinctions into a variegated pattern that shifted and warped with each new sunrise.

Were the villagers aware of the process? For the most part no. Would it have mattered if they were? Probably not. Does it matter to a Platypus that he isn't aware of the 'beingness' of being a Platypus? Does it stop him from being a Platypus and doing the 'being of being a Platypus'?

A village is just a village. But the 'beingness' of a village makes it more than just a word. Being is a word and 'am, is, are, be, being and been are words of action. We talk of being; either this or that or something other. We try to express what "I am, she is, it is to be, we are being or we all have been", but what is it about the word being that is almost dismissive of the wondrous reality and the magnificent totality of our every day existence, *our being*. Why have scholars and philosophers made the study of 'things that are' a search without end?

In the village there were people of substance, capable of deep thought, able to discuss this enigma of being. As you pass the outside pavement cafe tables you might hear discussions that today are the same as those in the days of Plato, it is true that the language is different and each language brings its own semiotics, its own images in the context of the time, the locality, the people involved, but let us argue that these people are involved in thoughts as profound as that of more ancient days.

There were other people too, and just as vital to the ongoings of the daily beingness of the village. And these people seemed to exist, to be, just as full and replete in their daily lives as any Aristotle, Plato or Pluto for that matter, without angst, free of doubt, hmm.

So this village is rather like a soup, like a collation of flavours and colours and textures that combine in some ineffable way to create life, being, existence, esse, humanity. Remember "being is being where being is" and this is...to be cont...



SM: Oh, dear! What did you do? SL: The only logical thing to do. I lifted my dress up.


SM : Oh, Sister! What did the man do?

KURANDA VILLAGE TAX TIP

END OF YEAR TIPS TO MAXIMISE YOUR REFUND

It's almost that time of year again to do your tax return. There are some steps you may be able to take to maximise your tax refund. Some of these are outlined below.

Super Co-contributions – If you are eligible and make personal super contributions to your super fund by the 30th June the Government will match your contribution up to \$1,500. Your total income needs to be less than \$60,342 and is reduced by 5 cents for each \$1 of your total income over \$30,342. 10% or more of your total income must be from eligible employment, running a business or a combination of both. Please contact your accountant to ensure you are eligible before contributing.

Education Tax Refund – If you are eligible for this refund you could get 50% back on a range of primary and secondary school education expenses. You may be eligible if you receive Family Tax Benefit Part A for your child. You can claim 50% of eligible expenses up to \$1,500 for secondary school children (refund of \$750) and \$750 for primary school children (refund of \$375). You will need to gather together all of your receipts for items purchased from 1st July 2008.

Small Business Investment Allowance – Businesses with a turnover of less than \$2 million a year are eligible for an investment allowance. You may be eligible for an additional tax deduction of 50 per cent of the cost of eligible new tangible depreciating assets purchased between 13 December 2008 and 31 December 2009. To take advantage of this investment allowance this year you will need to purchase the asset and have it ready for use before 30th June 2009.

Superannuation Deductions – Do you have a profit problem? You may be able to claim a superannuation deduction if the amount you earn as an employee is less than 10% of your combined assessable income and reportable fringe benefits for that income year. This can be an effective way to minimise your profit if you are in business. Remember that if you want control over your superannuation you can contribute to your own Self Managed Superannuation Fund.

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
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
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


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
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
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Congratulations: Thanks to Marg Yandell and her team at the Neighbourhood Centre for the successful "Tablelands March against Violence" which was held in Kuranda on May 6th to mark Domestic Violence Week. A large number of people participated in the march and the candle lighting ceremony which recognised the importance for all communities to stand up against violence.

Rates and Budget: Council will be bringing down its second budget during June. General Rates are expected to rise by 6%. This has been a difficult budget process and Council has trimmed spending in many areas, whilst still ensuring services are maintained.

Old Primary School: Planning for the upgrade of one classroom block is now progressing. Architects and Building Inspectors will be onsite this week to commence design work for the refurbishment of the two storey block on the Arara St side of the site. This building will be upgraded to house a new and expanded Library. Council will also be submitting a grant application to fund refurbishment of the other buildings. Late applications for rental of the old pre school site will be accepted.

Roads: Council has approved upgrading of the Bolton Rd intersection on Koah Rd. Works on widening Koah Road are expected to commence before the end of June. A small section of Speewah Rd has been resealed.

Pest and Weed Management: Following more reports of feral pigs in residential areas, Kuranda Conservation is working with Council and State Government Agencies to set up a program for removal of feral pigs. In the interim, any reports of feral pigs should be directed to Council. Parks and Gardens: Recently Parks and Gardens staff have remulched gardens in the Kuranda Village area. The current review of all parks in the TRC region is now underway. There are over 400 parks in the region and Council is seeking to establish priorities for service levels in maintaining parks.

KIAC: The Kuranda Infrastructure Committee met in May and will be considering new projects once the review of the Strategic Plan is finalised. Projects are funded through the contributions of Skyrail and Kuranda Scenic Rail. Committee members (Fay Allen, Kim Forde, Melanie Wicks, Cathy Retter, Terry Pates, Peter Thomson) welcome your feedback at any time.

Playing Field at School: The new oval at the Kuranda District College will soon be available for community use. A Management Committee will be responsible for ensuring joint use of the field (the construction was jointly funded by Council and the school). Anyone interested in being a member of the Committee can contact Penny Curran Ph 40434144

Pet Microchipping: Dog Registration notices will be mailed soon. Council is also conducting a "Microchipping Day" on Saturday 20 June at the Mareeba Pound (Hickling Rd Mareeba) Any dog and cat owner may access the service at the discounted price of \$25. Enquiries Ph 40434366 Housing Forum: Council hosted a very successful "Housing Forum" recently and Community Services staff are working on developing programs to access funding for additional affordable housing across the Tablelands region. Kowrowa Sewerage Project: Council and State Government have committed to providing sewerage to Kowrowa. Tenders will be called soon and the project will provide opportunities for connections to the Kuranda District College, the Welcome Pocket Development and some residences on Myola Rd.

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Social Housing

I have decided to convene a social housing mini summit in Kuranda to review existing social housing options in the area and assess the need for new stock. If you either live in social housing in the Kuranda area, or would like to live in Kuranda but are unable to because of a shortage of stock, please contact my office to register your interest in attending the mini summit so you can put forward your views. Details of time and location are yet to be decided.

Public Safety in Kuranda

I would welcome feedback on a proposal by the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce and Tourism to have surveillance cameras installed in the Kuranda main street. Video monitoring of public spaces can be a useful investigative tool for police, and can sometimes yield strong evidence for use in Court. The mere presence of a camera can deter crime. Real time monitoring of images can also aid police to arrive quickly at the location of an offence.

But camera monitoring has the potential to infringe on people's privacy so needs to be accompanied by strong safeguards.

Ultimately, it is up to Tablelands Regional Council whether to support such a project but as the Queensland government may be asked to contribute to the funding, I am keen to hear your views.

Whilst there have been no cases in Kuranda, please remain vigilant for tiny golden-brown electric ants (1.5mm long) as a new infestation was found in Trinity Beach this month. Restricted plant material movement areas now include suburbs of Trinity Beach, Kewarra Beach, Smithfield and Caravonica. Please advise Biosecurity Queensland on 132 523 if you suspect seeing slow-moving ants which congregate under rocks, leaves or litter, forks of trees and tropical garden plants
– causing a sting like a stabbing pain if

This month's plant is a vine, Adenia heterophylla, commonly known as the Lacewing Vine. It is currently fruiting in the area, and can be seen above the Kuranda Range Road just below the big bend, where there are a number of vines in tall trees.

This vine belongs to the Passionfruit family (Passifloraceae) and can be found across SE Asia. It occurs in West Australia, the Northern Territory and in Queensland, where it grows in lowland rainforest between Cape York and Mackay. Vines can reach 30 metres in length, and have tendrils to attach to the trees they climb over. The leaves have two prominent glands at their base.

The Lacewing Vine gets its common name from the Red Lace-wing Butterfly, the larvae of which feed on the leaves before pupating. The hairy caterpillars are quite striking, with contrasting black and yellow stripes. The adult butterfly has a large red area near the centre of the wings, and a white stripe crossing the black border near the tips. It is one of the area's most attractive butterflies.

The fruits of the vine are bright red and shiny when ripe, but the whitish seeds inside are not edible. Unlike passionfruits, these fruits split into three segments when ripe. This plant makes a great butterfly host plant and an attractive addition in a larger garden.

WHAT'S COMING UP

Plant identification Walkway

The plant i.d. walkway from the Kuranda lights to the Kuranda Resort and Spa will be officially opened next month.

This walkway was originally planted by local residents as part of the Wet Tropics Tree Planting scheme around 1990 at the request of the former Mareeba Shire Council to remove guinea grass and beautify the area. It displays more than 50 species of trees and shrubs, most of which grow in the surrounding Kuranda rainforest.

Two plant lists are downloadable from our website and paper copies available at the Kuranda Information Centre and Kuranda Resort and Spa. These lists contains information to assist with recognising these trees with similar "family" characteristics and contain interesting information about the individual species.

Our regular plant i.d. courses in July and August will make use of the walkway. So if you're interested and not yet booked, could you please contact Margaret on 40 938393.

Compact Composting

While living on a suburban house block and moving house a number of times over 15 years, I discovered what I think is the "perfect" neat composting unit for one or two people. It's called a Can O Worms and I like it because it's compact, has several layers of trays through which worms and worm juice can travel so that the juice is captured neatly in a reservoir at the bottom and castings can easily be removed by trays, without removing worms and half composted material. It's small enough to fit neatly under the eaves by the kitchen door. By moving veggie waste into the next layer above the one that's full the worms are encouraged to move upwards and the full tray can easily be removed with its load of "black gold". The worm "juice" needs to be used within a few days as the live microorganisms will tend to die off. Available from various hardware and gardening places, including Enviromart, Cairns where it retails for around \$135.

THE SWEET AND SOUR OF (feral) PORK



This photo was taken at Punch Close (off Warril Drive) a week ago. It's a similar story in backyards all around Kuranda. The feral pig problem has exploded lately. And we're on to it!

Kuranda Conservation (KCons) met with Dept Environment & Resourse Management (DERM, the new name for EPA), Tablelands Regional Council (TRC), pig trappers and shooters, and local landholders last week in a bid to deal with the problem.

It's not up to any one agency to fix the problem; there is a role for each of them and ourselves. There are a number of issues we have to deal with to rid the environment of feral pigs without causing the animal undue stress. With Kuranda being largely rural residential, trapping is the only acceptable method of catching the pest and a quick, well placed bullet under controlled conditions is the most humane way of dispatching it.

To undertake the sequence of events from capture to disposing of the carcass, a range of qualified people need to be involved.

KCons is taking on a coordinating role.

We are taking calls from residents who report pig activity, organising the placement of traps and training of landholders in how to manage their traps and bait them with the correct food. Once a pig is trapped, we'll notify the DERM, TRC, shooters and police in a timely way to bring the exercise to a successful conclusion.

This will take money, time and effort. So far, the willingness of all parties to cooperate collectively is falling into place nicely.

We'll be issuing a survey very soon to find out where the hot spots are and what resources are needed.

CASSOWARY SCAT COLLECTION FOR DNA TESTING

In the coming weeks CSIRO scientists will train us in collecting Casso poo in a scientifically rigorous way. Then we'll be properly equipped to collect scat material for CSIRO to test the DNA to identify who's who. This will help us to better understand genetic diversity, how far a bird might rangeand how ranges overlap. We'll also collect seeds to propagate so we can return food plants back into Cassowary habitat.

When we put all this together, we'll know better how to protect their habitat, i.e. how we subdivide for human housing, where we locate roads etc., so that we can co-exist to our mutual advantage.


Skyrail Closures for May and June



Everyone agreed that Kuranda needed a communication medium to keep the community informed of the many and varied issues which we'll be bringing to you in the months ahead.

A newspaper is a place to present your artistic and creative talent, to articulate and express your views and opinions and a tool to facilitate your ideas. So to anyone and all of you who would be writers, artists, painters, poets, journalists and politicians, or who simply have something to say, you can now say it in your own newspaper.

How did the *Kuranda Community News* come into being? This is how the process was described in the first issue by Krishna Buhler:

"We have no soul, say the residents of Kuranda. That is; no voice, no means of sharing and communicating ideas and information."

This was certainly the verdict reached by 15 community minded people who met in the CWA Hall for four weeks in January 1991. Between them these folks were involved in at least 27 different groups and organizations in Kuranda. They had been invited to meet together at the invitation of the Far North Uniting Church "Search Conference", whose objective was to encourage its members to relook at themselves and their community in order to "Search" out future goals and directions.

Voices spoke from areas such as Koah, Kennedy Highway, Freedom County, Saddle Mt. Rd., Korowa, Myola, Mason's Rd., and the Village. Many issues were raised, such as; the alarming potential for rapid development, lack of teenage facilities, no Community Centre, and a diminishing community service (even the hairdresser has had to close!). All agreed that little could be achieved without a form of communication. A Directory and a Newspaper were recommended, and an advertisement was put out for a person to volunteer to coordinate the newspaper.

The Kuranda Primary School has produced a Directory and now your very own *Kuranda News* is about to arrive.

It will need both your financial support and your contributions to maintain its viability. It's YOUR paper, YOUR voice, let's show ourselves and our visitors our soul."

Kuranda Community News had a name change to *The Kuranda Paper* on 20 December 1991.
