

# COMMUNITY CONSULTATION SOUGHT FOR PLAYGROUND PROJECT

Mareeba Shire Council has secured funding through the Kuranda Infrastructure Agreement Kuranda Community Precinct - Future Plans Fund to build a playground at the Kuranda Community Precinct (KCP), within the site of the Old Kuranda State School, on Arara Street, Kuranda.

This project provides the opportunity to also plan for a multi-age recreational space for the community to enjoy, that can be funded over time. The proximity of the old school site lends itself to catering for multiple age groups.

Council is gathering community input to ensure the new playground and multi-age recreational space incorporate the elements residents would most like to see and looks forward to receiving feedback about the development of this community space.

It is anticipated the new playground construction will commence during 2026 but the time to plan is now. And Council wants the community to help shape those plans.

MSC Mayor Angela Toppin urges the Kuranda community to assist council in planning

for this project: "We are inviting the Kuranda community to have their say about the future of the Kuranda Community Precinct.

The work done by the former Community Precinct Committee has driven the development of the proposed plan. It is now up to the broader community to have their say on what they see as the way forward. This feedback will help set short-term objectives based on the funding currently available and identify key elements for future development when suitable grants become available.

Unfortunately, Council was recently unsuccessful in its grant application for new lights at adjacent Bartley Park. This round was highly competitive; however, Council will continue to apply for suitable grants to fund the lights for that important recreational space".

# 2025 Mareeba & District Lions Champion Garden Award won by Kuranda garden.

Presentations of Award winners for the 2025 Mareeba & District Lions Gardens Awards was held on Saturday 13 September at the Cedric Davies Library & Functions Rooms in Mareeba. It was a beautifully organised event by the Lions Club of Mareeba and Lion Norma Maloney and included a lovely afternoon tea, videos of gardens, presentations of award ribbons and a fundraising cent sale.

The top award, Champion Garden, carries a special legacy in honour of Joy Paterson. Gardeners will know of the wonderful Mareeba ANZA garden centre which was closed last year after 30 plus years supplying plants and garden goodies to the area. Joy Paterson was the owner of Mareeba Garden Centre and has been a long-standing voluntary judge for the awards which have been running continuously for 56 years in the Shire. Joy drove many hundreds of kilometres over many days to visit gardens and to do the judging each year.

In past years, garden award winners opened their gardens to the public for visitors, however this activity is no longer included with entrants being visited by the judges in the week before presentations and photos taken for the award ceremony.

The 2025 Champion Garden Award was won by Kuranda local gardeners, Kathryn and John Edwards, for their rural residential acreage garden. Whilst the competition is open

to all gardeners in the Mareeba Shire area and was well advertised in newspapers and on Facebook, they were the only entrants from the Kuranda region. The Ngoonbi 50th Anniversary celebration was held on Thursday 25 September, marking another significant event in Ngoonbi's rich history. Over 200 guests attended including Elders, community members, Ngoonbi staff, partners and sister organisations and various other stakeholders. The formal event was held in the Kuranda and Mossman Ballroom at the Pullmans International Hotel, Cairns.

Throughout the night historical and cultural presentations celebrated the heart and soul of Ngoonbi. Presentations by Miriki and Djabugay dance groups were touching performances encapsulating the resilience of our predecessors and Ngoonbi's foundational values of caring for community.

Inspiring speeches from Gimuy Yidinji Elder Neville Reys, local Member of Parliament Bree James, Mareeba Shire Councillor Amy Braes, Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Housing Qld (ATSIHQ), Deputy Chair Angie Ahkee and ATSIHQ Director Donna O'Chin, Ngoonbi Chair Kelvin Coleman and CEO Judi Enoch highlighted the strength of organisations that are leading and shaping community for better outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, and all peoples across this nation.

The night's entertainment was a line up of local and national talents. Master of Ceremonies and Comedian Sean Choolburra from the Yalanji nation and local Yalanji Comedian Leon Filewood engaged the audience with lots of laughter. Participants commented that the night was filled with good spirit and they needed this night of laughter and goodwill. One comment made; "You mob was deadly! Brought people together the right way --- strong, warm and full of respect, with lots of laughter from Seanie and Leon. It was deadly to be a part of it, honouring the legacy and showed what's still to come."





Kuranda Range Update:

Ongoing reconstruction works on the Kuranda Range Road continue to progress with additional funding being allocated this month through the Betterment Fund.

The betterment works will be delivered along with current reconstruction projects and aim to minimise future damage from severe weather and reduce road closures during and after disasters.

The betterment projects are targeted to commence from late-2025/early 2026 and will be completed simultaneously with the ongoing reconstruction works.

Geotechnical investigations and detailed design have been completed across many of the 100-plus damage sites on Kuranda Range Road and Captain Cook Highway, to allow construction to commence.

Eight sites have been repaired, including two major downslope slip sites on Kuranda Range Road, and work is now underway on another 10 sites.

Our exhibition "Gathered" will open on Tuesday 7th October at 10am at the Tableland Regional Gallery, showcasing a diverse selection of works, including glass, ceramics, textiles, watercolour and sculpture, to celebrate local craftmanship and the connection between art, nature and the community.

### Our artist profile this month is Kate Prynne, jeweller and glass artist.

Can you describe your artistic style? What is your preferred medium and why? The mediums I work in are glass and metals, mainly silver, both very different but both enjoyable. I would think my artistic style is more classical if it is



anything, however I like to break out into more adventurous work at times.

What motivates you as an artist? I have been motivated by art from a very young age. I was in a family that moved frequently. From the Middle East to Africa, a Van Gogh Print came everywhere with us, it was the only piece of art in the house apart from the beautiful Persian carpet. School allowed me to express my early interest and my grandmother's jewellery fascinated me. Being able to make beautiful things is what has motivated me for a long time.

Describe the best piece of art you have created. I think my best piece of art to date has been the simply lovely large bowl 'Voyage' with metal inclusions which I made a couple of years ago. I will be making more such bowls using metals, challenging but rewarding.

What artists inspire you and where do you find your inspiration? It always seems a cliche to say that my surroundings are my inspiration, but they are. I'm inspired by the landscapes and the colours of landscape, which shows in much of my work: the greens of the rainforest, the ambers of the arid lands and the blues of the Coral Sea

As to artists who I admire, Dante Gabriel Rossetti collected amazing jewellery which he painted on his models. Great Inspiration there! I have now found interesting glass artists whose work I admire, who are open to experimentation and who I am encouraged by. I will continue to learn for many years to come.

How do you learn new skills and/or new techniques? A lot of my learning is done on-line by enrolling in courses that are of interest to me. I attended a Glass School in the UK for 5 days, one on one with a UK glass artist, it was both rewarding and fun and I made a great friend. Although there are glass schools in Australia, such as in Canberra and Victoria, we have the tyranny of distance to cope with! I will continue with on-line learning.

What has been the most challenging and rewarding part of being an artist? I think art




is always a challenge, I have experienced lots of errors while learning new techniques, but when you get something right, it's very rewarding indeed. I have to make test tiles to check how one colour will react with another.





Learning to use my kiln was another challenge!

What do you like doing when you're not creating art? When I'm not creating art I like to be in my garden where I lose myself entirely or I spend time reading, where I again, lose myself again! Not long ago I built a street library large enough to put many of my books which I no longer had room for in my house. It's great to see it so used! So there is another thing I do when not creating art, I make things in the men's Shed!

Can you describe your studio/workspace and your favourite time of day to create. My studio space, under

my veranda, is small but compact. Because I work in two completely different mediums, I have segregated my space, one side is glass and the other metal/silver work. I usually work in the afternoons and on into the evenings but have been known to be in there as soon as

What is your favourite tool that you can't do without? There isn't one tool I would call a favourite as I have to use many tools for all I make; one is no more important to the next. Glass takes 4 main tools plus the grinder and the kiln. Silversmithing demands dozens of tools: pliers, files, hammers, my saw, my bench pin and the butane torch, a jump ring maker, just to name a few. it has taken many years to accumulate the tools of my trade.

Do you think art is important to society? Art has always been important to society, going back hundreds of thousands of years. It is no less important today - it has given meaning and expression to all cultures. Art expresses our time and our environment, who we are as a people. We can date art to various periods in history, in fact historians learn a lot from the art that was created in the past. Cultures around the world now have galleries showcasing past and present art. Art will always be important to mankind.

This month we farewelled Willian Wakefield who has decided to move back to Melbourne. Williams' landscapes and artworks are inspired by his studies in Florence and we will be sorry to lose him and wish him luck down south.

### **GIG FOR GAZA 2025**

Kuranda made history with the Gig For Gaza held on Saturday 6 September at The Kuranda Amphitheatre. A total of 822 attendees were counted, making it one of the largest fundraiser concerts for Gaza in Australia, and the biggest event in Kuranda in the last two years.

This is the second year that the Gig for Gaza has been hosted in Kuranda, and it is the only fundraiser concert for Gaza in all of Far North Queensland.

This year, the event drew four times as many people as last time, and while organisers are still counting all the donations, the concert has definitely raised more than \$10,000 (but probably closer to \$12,000). Organisers are still processing all the takings, as all 3 food stalls and 2 drinks stalls donated all or parts of their profits to the cause.

All the proceeds will be donated to PANZMA, an Australian and New Zealand registered charity that has consistently been sending doctors from Australia and NZ straight to the front

Gig for Gaza organiser and mother of two, April Petitpays said:

"Not only funds were raised, but awareness too, which is just as important. We had the privilege of listening to 3 Palestinian speakers talk in depth about the history and current situation in Gaza, and many people signed petitions at the Amnesty International stall.

"This was the second year we've put on a Gig for Gaza. We're hoping that we won't have to put on a third one. But until Palestine is free, we will be here, year after year, and we will stand with Palestinians in their fight until the ends.

"As the organisers, we would like to thank everyone who attended this fundraiser concert - you have saved lives with your presence.

"This was an historical day of solidarity to be remembered. But the fight continues, until Palestine and all occupied territories in the world are freed."

Renowned Hip-hop artist, Mau Power said:

"I support this cause because I believe that all people deserve their basic human rights. My journey has always been to represent the freedom of all people. I come from a culture that experienced genocide, discrimination, and hate. This is why I understand and support this cause".

# KURANDA WASTE-BUSTERS

### **Food storage** to minimise waste

This month's challenge: Ditch clingwrap!

When I lived in a house with a big kitchen, I had a pantry full of staples (purchased in bulk package-free) stored in my collection of large coffee jars. This inspired pantry envy from a few visitors, who liked the "naked" pantry look.

By storing food in glass jars, you can see what it is and how much you have left and monitor its condition. Branded packets create visual noise and may not seal or re-fill as well.

Nowadays we live more simply and my pantry has just enough jars, cans and boxes to fit into a large esky! Instead of storing oats and muesli in multiple jars, I now store them in bags in the fridge.

Dry goods are supposed to be stored "in a cool, dry place". In the tropics, such places can be elusive, but be sure to keep food in a sealed container, out of the sun. Condiments stored in the cupboard are likely to go mouldy from the humidity or attract ants. Once open, we find that honey and peanut butter and Vegemite all keep best in the fridge. Store bread and spices in the fridge so they don't get mouldy.

Likewise, storing fresh produce correctly can extend its life considerably. In the tropics, a fruit bowl on the table attracts bugs and sends the fruit ripe quickly. I store all fruit and most vegetables in the fridge, unless I want them to ripen. Uncut potatoes, sweet potatoes, pumpkins, garlic and ginger don't need to be stored in the fridge. Onions must be kept out of the fridge but away from potatoes.

Mushrooms and greens need to be able to breathe, so don't store them in plastic packets. Mushrooms are best stored in paper bags, greens in a moist cloth. Cut the toxic green tops off your carrots and they will keep longer. Eggs stay fresher stored in the fridge

(if necessary, use the egg safety test: don't eat an egg that floats when placed in water).

Store wrapped bread, overripe bananas, and cooled leftover roast vegetables, stews and soups (in sealed containers) in the freezer to extend their life.

Keeping your pantry and fridge contents on active rotation will help avoid food waste, which will save you money. Blogger and author Lindsay Miles suggests setting up an "eat me first" tray or shelf in the fridge so everybody knows what needs using up. It may help to label containers with names and dates.

Try to take stock of your pantry regularly, checking for signs of spoilage or pests and making sure you're using up items purchased a while ago. Move older items to the front of the pantry so you are more likely to use them up.

This month, challenge yourself to reduce plastic waste in food storage by giving up clingwrap. I discovered that I didn't need clingwrap because food can be covered in other ways: with a plate, with a reusable beeswax wrap or washable food cover, or by storing leftovers in a reusable container or in the pot with the lid on.

Store best, waste less!

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# National Electric Ant Eradication Program (Neep) Update

### **NEWS FROM THE FIELD**

From 1 June 2025 – 31 August 2025, we have:

- treated approximately 1,333 hectares (ha), including 573.7 ha using a drone
- responded to 488 yard check requests and suspect ant reports across 103 suburbs
- conducted surveillance on about 461 ha across 118 suburbs and
- monitored 327 sentinel sites, including 7.6 ha using our odour detection dogs
- found 7 new infestations and
- cleared 7 operational areas

The completion of clearance activities at 7 operational areas means that movement restrictions will be lifted on 176 properties in an amendment to the electric ant restricted zone, effective 2 September 2025

This amendment removes 5 restricted zones:

- Mossman 1
- · Kuranda 20
- Manoora 5
- Manoora 5Manoora 7
- Port Douglas 11
- and reduces 2 others:
- · Smithfield cane paddock
- Brinsmead 4

This removes approximately 60 ha of the electric ant restricted zone and clears 41.7 ha of operational area (including 12.8 ha of infestation).



### A SSSUPER-SIZED SURPRISE AT KOAH

The electric ant teams encounter all kinds of wildlife in their daily work, but this impressive find in the Koah region was particularly striking.

Our field officers are well trained in snake awareness and follow best practice methods to ensure their safety. On this occasion, they came across a discarded snake skin rather than the reptile itself and judging by it's length, the original owner was a very sizable creature. A remarkable reminder of the diverse wildlife our teams cross paths with every day.

What a beauty!







### **NEW BOOK SHINES LIGHT ON KURANDA MOTHS**

Frederick Parkhurst Dodd came to Kuranda with his family in 1905 to escape his boring bank job. He then spent the rest of his life studying and displaying the amazing moths and butterflies he found here. Touring the nation in 1918 and 1923 with his specimens, he became known as the Butterfly Man of Kuranda. His extensive collection is now housed at the Queensland Museum in Brisbane.

In the mid 1980s butterfly collector Paul Wright arrived in town, developing the largest walk-in butterfly house in the southern hemisphere. Known as The Australian Butterfly Sanctuary, it attracts hundreds of tourists a day to Kuranda and is well worth a visit.

Buck Richardson escaped an engineering background in 1980 and with his partner, Eve Stafford, they handbuilt a wonderful home in the tropical Kuranda rainforest.

Around 2004 Buck discovered moths coming to his houselights as not only items of great beauty but also as design elements for what became his award-winning digital art.

Buck says, "Moths have a common reputation as dull, colourless and boring but once you immerse yourself into their extraordinary beauty and magnify their gorgeous colours and wing patterns, you'll realise that they are anything but!"

"People often ask me the difference between butterflies and moths. In short, while there are exceptions, butterflies are seen by day and moths by night. Secondly, butterflies have 'knobs' on the end of their antennae, while those of moths are 'feathery'.



Affectionally known locally as the Moth Man of Kuranda, Buck extended his focus to butterflies. While his Butterflies of Kuranda book has been out for some months, his new Moths of Kuranda booklet featuring his photographs has just been released, and is now available at the Kuranda Arts Coop, Australian Butterfly Sanctuary Kuranda, **Kuranda Visirtor Information** Centre or from the artist. www.leapfrogoz.com.au

# THE REAL ALIENS

Science fiction movies often draw much of their alien inspiration from real life by using features from some of the most intriguing animals to roam this planet: the invertebrates. Even though these animals are around us every day, most people do not see them up close, so the Hollywood creatures appear alien and new to audiences.

Look at a bug. Most likely you will see only what you have seen every other time before – a flash of something skittering by, a hairy body, legs or pincers or shining body segments. However, the human eye can detect only so much detail, and there is a whole other alien world to be seen on the next level down. Insect eyes, for instance, are often bulbous and made up of hundreds of tiny lenses. When magnified, these are remarkable and have been used as models for a multitude of creatures in films over the years.

Bug mouthparts are another element that Hollywood feature films often use with artistic licence. Creatures in classic science fiction films such as 'Alien' (1979) and 'Predator' (1987) are both somewhat modelled on real invertebrate mouths. The complex mouth-parts of praying mantids, and extendable jaws of mudeyes (dragonfly larvae) become terrifying when humans are the prey.

Some films have not tried to hide the use of buggy models for their on-screen creations. 'Starship Troopers' (1997) uses oversized invertebrates as bloodthirsty aliens. 'The Mist' (2007) has several species of other-dimensional monsters based very closely on wasps, spiders and even magnified snail mouths, many of which are nocturnal. These plus-size versions of almostreal animals are scary enough to audiences with very few modifications, simply because they are unfamiliar (and normally bloodthirsty).

Without a doubt, the use of our own Earthling bugs to pose as aliens and terrify movie-goers over decades has been a Hollywood staple. Who would have thought that the frightening, bizarre creature from 'Alien' closely resembled something you could find in your flower garden? If there is a motto by which alien designers live, it is almost certainly that truth is much, much stranger than fiction.

### Working with the Kuranda community to preserve our history and tell our stories

### **Ron Edwards Retrospective**

The Kuranda Historical Society is investigating the history and stories behind two Australian stock saddles made by a long time Kuranda resident, the late Ron Edwards OAM.

Ron Edwards was well known across Australia and indeed internationally, for his many books instructing on bushcraft skills as well as his folklore and ballad collections. Ron was also acknowledged as a superb painter, particularly for his horse paintings, working in water colours, oils and acrylics. At the time of his death the Sydney Morning Herald published his obituary saying he was for more than 50 years Australia's most prolific collector and publisher of folk songs, varns and bushcraft.

In recognition of his singular contribution to Australian bush craft and his valuable artistic work, the Cairns Tanks held a posthumous watercolour exhibition in 2013 accompanied by these words:

"Ron Edwards (1930 – 2008) was an artist, craftsman and publisher of over 300 books. For over 50 years he learned and preserved bushcraft skills such as saddlery, leather weaving of whips and belts, mud brick making, toolmaking, Chinese medicine and Indigenous crafts. He wrote and illustrated 10 volumes of books on bush craft alone. Ron was also one of the pioneers of the Australian folk song and bush yarn revival. He was a major collector of Australian folk stories and also of Torres Strait Island songs. His 12-volume work Australian Folk Song, lists 4,680 entries of bush songs, recitations, children's rhymes, very rude verses, convict broadsides and sea shanties. He was President of the Australian Folklore Society, editor and publisher of the quarterly magazine, Australian Folklore Society Journal and founder of Rams Skull Press" (Source: Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities, 2013, Wordpress).

From Melbourne originally, Ron and his family arrived in Cairns in 1959, where he began to collect songs and also write books on yarns and traditional bushcrafts. Every few months he escaped to the Torres Strait Islands to collect songs and stories and managed to make an annual appearance at the Woodford Folk Festival where he presented workshops. Ron moved the family to Fairyland, near Myola in Kuranda in the early 80s where he built a mud brick house, pool and workshop - with no running water! It was from here that Ron ran the Rams Skull Press, publishing his many books. His wife Anne ran an art gallery and the Craft Shop Saddlery on Grafton Street in Cairns, supplying art and craft materials and guidance to local artists and craftsmen and women. We believe Ron made the two leather saddles, while writing the book 'The stock saddle, making, repairing and counterlining' in 1981, which was published in 1984 as 'Making a Stock Saddle' by his own publishing house.

These books can still be purchased online and 'Making a Stock Saddle' is held in the National Library of Australia and Queensland State Library.

In order to deal fittingly with these saddles and indeed Ron's legacy, KHS is investigating the historical significance of the saddles, particularly to the local community. We are interested in whether Kuranda residents would support having Ron's saddles on public display as a noteworthy part of the history of Kuranda. Accordingly, we would really like to hear from those who remember Ron and his family, perhaps riding around the district on two grey horses; remember reading his book to make and repair saddles, or are interested in the art of bushcraft, whip making and saddlery. Your recollections can feed into our Kuranda Artists project, where we are formally documenting the lives and contributions of the many outstanding creative people who have chosen to call Kuranda home. 

### PNG community helps uncover stories behind artefacts on display at Cairns Museum

Cairns' Papua New Guinea community has helped bring new life to a collection of more than 160 artefacts dating from the 19th and 20th centuries, now on display at Cairns Museum. Han Mak Belong Tumbuna: Made by the Hands of the Ancestors opened on 27 September, reconnecting objects with the stories, memories and knowledge that shaped them, and beginning the journey to re-gift these treasures to their homeland.

From finely decorated arrows never intended to fly, to kina shells once used as currency, each piece carries layered meanings of use, ritual and status. Displays are presented in both Tok Pisin and English, ensuring multiple voices and perspectives are heard.

The exhibition also takes place in the same year that Papua New Guinea celebrates 50 years of independence, a reminder of the country's proud

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

### TRACKING CASSOWARIES

During September, we hosted a PhD student from University of Queensland, focussing on cassowary research. She was looking to set cameras across the Wet Tropics to try and measure co-abundance relationships between cassowaries and invasive species, namely, pigs, cattle and cats, and also between cassowaries and dingos.

She had already set up 40 cameras in Barron Gorge National Park/Dinden National Park and wanted to expand into the Kuranda region. Her camera deployment strategy was to set cameras in paired deployments, one camera on a trail or road, then the second camera 50 metres into the bush to capture animals that use trails as well as those that may avoid them.

This information may well contribute to expanding our cassowary sightings data, so we were excited to help in any way we could. Our student will return in November to retrieve her cameras and the data.

### SPRING FLOWERS AND NEW GROWTH

The native Hoya is in bloom. We have the Hoya australis in our nursery. It is an attractive creeper with white bunches of flowers with subtle pink centres and a gentle perfume. We're potting many of our plants into larger pots because they are putting on such a spurt of growth. A most sought-after hedging is the Syzygium fibrosum. It is one of the lillypillies. It is a bush or small tree, with apricot coloured blooms and densely pink cherries. The plant is very trainable into a hedge. The fruit is not spectacular to eat but they are edible, so safe in a garden with children.

We know that when we start to get heavy rain, our lomandras will be in high demand so we are ahead of the game with a healthy supply of this grass bush. Its claim to fame is its ability to hold banks and embankments from erosion.


# THE COMMUNITY NURSERY

the right sort of food. The students loved their time with us and we loved having them – two exchange students from Norway and two Australians. We can't wait for their return. We learn as much from them as they from us.







### Man I Love Frogs – by Sylvia Conway

Since our last update back in April, the long term frog monitoring project is changing. We are fortunate enough to have such great volunteers who have stepped up to monitor the sites when the end of funding was announced. A huge thanks to all of you.

Welcome to Chloe Grant our newest volunteer coordinator who stepped into the position in July 2025. Chloe showed great interest in the program after volunteering for the monthly frog surveys. Chloe has strong knowledge and good ear on Rainforest frogs and their calls and was a must for the position. Chloe is currently a wildlife keeper at The Habitat in Port Douglas and is a deeply passionate Conservationist. She has a BSc in Wildlife Conservation/Zoology and a Masters in Primate Conservation. Chloe has worked and volunteered in many different countries supporting conservation actions. Community conservation

initiatives is what fuels Chloe's passion and we are grateful to have her leading the long term frog monitoring project.

The frog monitoring data from the past 10 years has been reviewed by Dr Conrad Hoskin and the KEC Committee. A decision was made to reduce the monitoring from an expanded 16 back to 6 key creeks, reducing volunteer effort and re focusing the ongoing program. The review also identified the best months to survey for maximum. frogs calling. The surveys will continue monthly during the breeding season, October to March inclusive. April to September we will visit sites bimonthly. Continued focus will be on priorities such as the Kuranda tree frog habitat protection and repair and defining the range of the Kuranda tree frog. This will likely be done by periodic presence/ absence surveys using acoustic monitoring devices across creeks in the Kuranda region.

We are all responsible for caring for Country and protecting our natural areas. Rainforest frogs are under threat not only from invasive species and natural disasters but humans who have the biggest impact on all of our native wildlife. Humans destroy and threaten native frog habitats through badly

managed land clearing for housing developments, erosion issues causing sediment to wipe out breeding sites, road kill and all forms of water pollution. With a little more awareness we can all do our bit to protect frog habitat.

### **Plant of the Month Grey Bollywood - Neolitsea dealbata**

Grey Bollywood will attract many birds and butterflies to your garden; Brown Cuckoo Dove, Topknot and White-headed pigeons, Catbirds and flying foxes are attracted to the fruit. It is host plant to the Blue Triangle butterfly, Graphium sarpedon. A small tree with distinctive foliage suitable for rainforest and wet sclerophyll areas, young foliage may be coppery and hang limply. Leaves are typically white underneath.

### YELLOW CRAZY ANT COMMUNITY ACTION

### We are the invasive resist-ants

### Here comes the rain!

If you're like me, the increasing humidity has triggered a rush to get all those projects finished outside before the rains return. Don't forget to add a free yard check to your 'To Do' list. Electric ants in particular don't forage when it's raining, so it's important to get your annual yard check completed before December. Both electric ants and yellow crazy ants can spread during the wet season by 'rafting' down creeks and rivers in huge groups.

In preparation for the wet season, I've recently done some house repairs which involved the delivery of building materials like timber and gravel. This increases the risk of invasive ants being introduced to my yard. For this reason, I booked a yard check after the tradies finished their work and the skip bin was removed. If you've had building or landscape materials delivered to your house recently, it's a good idea to get your yard checked. Just phone 13 25 23 or email electricantinfo@dpi.qld.gov.au.



### **Sentinel sites**

Did you know that both the yellow crazy ant and electric ant eradication programs have 'sentinel sites' that get checked 3-4 times a year? These are sites which are at higher risk of invasive ants because they have a lot of materials moving in and out. For example, the Kuranda EnviroCare native plant nursery is a sentinel site, along with the waste transfer station near Speewah. By regularly checking these sites, we are more likely to quickly pick up new infestations. The sooner we detect them, the easier they are to eradicate.

### Out & about

We recently had information stalls at the Koah Monthly Markets (August) and the Kuranda Community Market (September). We plan to be back at both markets in October, so come along and get the latest updates. If you have a group or event and would like us to come and share about invasive ants, please get in touch. This is a free community service. We can also arrange for hands-on learning activities such as ant surveys and identification.

Prince Peter's heart pummels his chest, his breath tears at this throat. He pounds down the hallway and bursts into the kitchen.

Rich broth bubbles in a copper pot on the black cast iron stove. Bunches of carrots, parsnips and celery lie beside a dark grey bowl on a wooden bench while herbs swing in clumps above, adding their spicy scent to the room's meaty aroma. The bench has been well used, scarred by years of chopping and slicing. The floor is a puzzle of slate slabs and the steps on the other side of the kitchen lead down to a closed door.

Can you see it? Good. Now where were we?

Oh ves. Peter was about to be eaten by a long-necked monster and stopped to appreciate the ambiance in the kitchen.

The blistering pace came to a screeching halt as soon as the door to the kitchen slammed open and Peter, instead of running for his life, seemed to have stopped to look around. The fiend grabbed him as he stared at the pot on the stove.

Poor Prince Peter.

But setting is important, right? We use sensory imagery to enrich our scenes and invite the reader to feel part of it all. Setting is also vital when details are needed to move the plot along. So how do you encourage your reader to step into the scene armed with the necessary details - without slowing the pace?

### The following three steps may help.

First, design your setting. Visualise this place, incorporating as much sensory detail as possible. Sight, sound, touch, smell and even taste add depth and realism to your setting. Add tiny touches that may never be used but knowing them will help you convey the atmosphere of the setting.

### **Prioritise**

Prioritise the props. How can you manipulate your main character's surroundings to heighten the tension or offer an escape route? Peter is running for his life and blasts into the kitchen. What can he use? Choose the necessary details. Prince Peter's quick thinking may have a use for the veggies,

and a hot pot of stew can always come in handy. The door at the bottom of the steps? This could be an escape route or hiding place or play another critical role. Sweep a glance across the room and highlight your necessary props.

### **Integrate**

You have created your setting and know the props Peter will need to keep him out of the clutches of the fiend. Now it's time to weave the setting into the story. Prince Peter is your viewpoint character. We can see, hear, feel, smell and taste only what he does. We know only his thoughts. When he hears the gnashing of teeth and feels the swish of talons as they whip past the nape of his neck, he will not be sniffing the spicy scent of dried herbs. Neither will his breathless readers.

It's time to pull it all together. Prince Peter needs us. ... his breath tears at this throat. He pounds down the hallway and bursts into the kitchen.

Peter skids across the slate tiles. Whump. His chest hits the edge of a wooden bench and he gasps for air, hands scrabbling across the rough surface. He knocks a pile of vegetables to the floor, but his fingers curl around a fat stalk of celery. A fishy stench envelopes the prince and sharp teeth clack close to his ear

Peter whirls around. The fiend stands between him and the stove, steam from a large iron pot rising behind the hideous head. Peter shoots a glance to his left. Shallow steps lead down to the larder. Can he make it? The thick door might slow the creature down. A slow grin reveals glistening fangs as an icy talon traces a line down his arm. Peter shudders and makes his move. He thrusts his celery deep into the fiend's left nostril and leaps toward the larder. The heavy door creaks open and Prince Peter turns around.

The celery worked. The fiend falls backwards, knocking over the steaming pot and slipping in its greasy contents. It slides towards the larder. Peter steps aside, opening the door wider as the fiend thumps down the steps and whips past, disappearing into the darkness of the larder.

Prince Peter slams the door and pulls the heavy iron bolt across. Agapanthaland is safe ... for now.

If you design your setting, prioritise your props and integrate description, your scenes will be rich with imagery without slowing the pace. Don't let Prince Peter fall into the clutches of the fishy fiend as he examines his surroundings. Keep him moving.

The afternoon session will in with a series of short warm-up poses, followed by several 10 minute poses, After a short break we will finish with two 20 minute poses.


Easels, chairs and tables are provided but artists must provide their own drawing materials. Artists progress at their own pace.

### All welcome!

"An Uncomfortable Perspective" as the writing prompt for the September meeting of Kuranda Writers Group proved to be very apt.

While the bookish world of libraries and literary events may look calm on the surface, there's lately been turbulence below causing more than ripples. A last-minute code of conduct sent to authors for Bendigo Writers Festival 2025 resulted in more than 50 authors (representing more than half of the program) withdrawing over concerns about censorship.

The email said authors should "avoid language or topics that could be considered inflammatory, divisive, or disrespectful". But authors said this restricted their free speech. Targeting of Australian-Palestinian author Dr Randa Abdel-Fattah was of particular concern. So far, it's unknown whether the festival, founded in 2012, will ever go ahead again.

This follows a string of controversies at Melbourne Writers' Festival, Perth's Writers' Weekend, Sydney Opera House's All About Women and Adelaide Writers Week.

The 2023 Adelaide Writers' Festival featuring four Palestinian-background authors, including the international guest, Palestinian-American Susan Abulhawa, led to calls for all to be ditched. But the festival stood firm, mostly thanks to the efforts of its director, Louise Adler, herself a Jewish daughter of Holocaust survivors.

The 2024 Melbourne Writers Festival hit trouble after the promotion of a single poetry session featuring Aboriginal and Palestinian poets guest-curated by Koori-Lebanese writer Mykaela Saunders. This incident eventually precipitated the resignation of the chair, deputy chair, and artistic director.

In Perth, an open letter of over 500 signatures objected to the inclusion of Jewish singersongwriter Deborah Conway on opening night over her online comments on the Gaza war.

At Sydney's 2024 Opera House's All About Women festival, a 6,700 signatured petition protested feminist author Clementine Ford about her social media comments on Gaza, calling for all her events to be withdrawn. Again a month later, director of Adelaide Writers' Week, Louise Adler, resisted calls to remove Ford from her program, saying "I chose her because of her writing on contemporary Australian sexual politics and about her current book about marriage", calling her views on "other issues" on social media "immaterial". You can read more about these cases online.

The Australian Society of Authors (ASA) spoke on codes of conduct being increasingly used across library, university and other speaking events. ASA's deputy chair Jennifer Mills said the documents were designed to make authors "fearful and nervous," going on to state that "festivals should not be playing the role of policing what writers can and can't say".

In different ways, each case presents a challenge to freedom of speech. And they differ from social media platforms in that they are live events. As public forums they provide opportunities to listen to people who have thought deeply about their topics enough to write books that challenge, while authors are also there to be challenged in person on their views. Witnessing such live debates is what makes these events exciting for audiences.

Our Kuranda Writers' Group continues to discuss recent controversies about how much recent book My Father Bryce by middle-son Adam about his dad, Bryce Courtenay, best-selling author and a household name since his first book, The Power of One. In his recent memoir, Adam has had to confront and process how many of the stories Bryce told his own family and the wider public about his own life, were lies.

Toni's own writing on the topic concerned the discombobulating reality of life in the early days of Covid, recalling the us-and-them divide that opened up for front-line workers and others to become the Covid police to check vaccination status at the entry to public events and buildings. Her second uncomfortable perspective was about navigating footpaths without suffering collisions or injury nowadays while oncoming pedestrians walk while engrossed behind their smartphones.

Anna's uncomfortable perspective piece was both a lament and a plea for some of the youth of Kuranda who are both troubled and troubling. What can be done, she asked? Much uncomfortable discussion later, that included the role of various services, we didn't have the answers, but thought that there must be successful models of intervention from other places to research about what works, and what doesn't.

"Threads" is the writing prompt for the next meeting 10.00am - 12.00 noon on Monday 14 October 2025 at Kuranda Library. This prompt could be taken literally as in weaving, or in other ways such as networks between people, or even the cosmos. Newcomers will be welcomed.



### Book Review - Drive Your Plow Over the Bones of the Dead

by Olga Tokarczuk, translated from the Polish by Antonia Lloyd-Jones.

Publisher's Blurb: Drive Your Plow Over the Bones of the Dead takes place in a remote Polish village, where Duszejko, an eccentric woman in her sixties, recounts the events surrounding the disappearance of her two dogs. When members of a local hunting club are found murdered, she becomes involved in the investigation.

This book caught my attention with its title—and it didn't let me go until I had read the final page. It is a compelling novel that blends a murder mystery with profound philosophical themes. The lead character is a radical early feminist and environmentalist, an outcast in her village, and often dismissed as eccentric for her deep connection to nature and her strong beliefs in the rights of animals.

Her convictions, however, are not just passive beliefs; she takes them to extremes, acting outside of

social norms and challenging the patriarchal structure of the village. This refusal to conform and her single-minded pursuit of justice for animals at any cost leads to a series of escalating events, culminating in disasters that shake the tiny town. Duszejko's actions force the community to confront their acceptance of the destruction of the natural

A central element of the narrative is the pervasive influence of William Blake and his poetry, which serves as a crucial narrative device reflecting the interconnectedness of all life and the destructive nature of reason when untempered by compassion. The poetry acts as her moral and philosophical compass. The book title itself is a direct quote from Blake's "Proverbs of Hell".

I love reading World Stories, they offer surprising points of view, unexpected character reactions and fresh, unexplored plot twists.

I hope you give this title a try and enjoy it as much as I did.

### Landholders to connect with peers and conservation experts

Landholders from across Queensland and beyond will Office, Biodiversity Legacy, alongside landholders from gather in Cairns on 7th October for the Our Natural Legacy: 2025 Landholder Forum—part of the Australian Land Conservation Alliance (ALCA) Conference-to share experiences, build connections, and explore how conservation can become more viable and better supported.

Among the presenters is Mount Pleasant grazier Garlone Moulin, who with partner James Gordon has set aside ten per cent of their 13,500-hectare property as a nature refuge—a legal mechanism that permanently safeguards nature on private land.

Ms Moulin said she'll be sharing insights on the intersection of production and conservation. "The more I learn by observing the changes in our landscape as a response to the way we manage the livestock, the more the lines between grazing, ecology and conservation become blurred. I think our grazing and farming lands have huge potential for growth in biodiversity and ecological resilience with no negative impact on food production or economic profitability."

With around 60% of Australia's land privately owned or managed, landholders are central to the country's conservation story. The forum will explore practical support and funding options for protecting nature on private land, succession and legacy planning, and firsthand accounts from landholders about their choices, challenges, and motivations.

Participants can also build storytelling-for-influence skills with the Nature Media Centre, or join an 'Ask an Expert' session on ecology, policy, and protection mechanisms.

Speakers include representatives from The Nature Conservancy Australia, the Environmental Defenders

Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland.

ALCA CEO Jody Gunn said, "Protecting nature isn't just 'set and forget'. It takes time, effort, and money-and it can sometimes feel isolating. This forum provides space for landholders to connect with peers, and confidence to navigate the challenges and opportunities of private land conservation, no matter the size or use of the property."





### St Saviour's is gearing up for a very busy October

To celebrate the birthday of the patron saint of animals, St Francis of Assisi, a special Blessing of the Pets service will be held this Sunday, October 5th at St Saviour's Church.

In the year 1206 Francis, the wealthy son of a cloth merchant, decided to forsake all his worldly possessions and founded the order of Franciscan monks. He claimed he found his affinity with God through animals, and would often call birds, animals and even flowers, his brothers and sisters.

Blessing of the Pets coordinator, Chris Wright, said people can bring pets of all shapes, sizes and species - as long as they are on a leash or in a box or cage. "You don't have to belong to any church to come and join in the fun. Events like this connect people in the community who don't normally see each other or have things in common, and that's fantastic. The event gives the community an opportunity to meet together, share their common love of animals and make new friendships. It's really about shared humanity."

St Saviour's Church was designed by Mr Harvey Draper and built by Mr Arthur Newman, Mr W Moule and Mr A De Graf. The Church was dedicated on the 22nd October 1915 by the Rt Rev'd John Oliver Feetham, Bishop of North Queensland.

The Cairns Post of 22nd October 1915 printed the following about the dedication of St Saviour's

"An event of some interest will take place in Kuranda today where the Bishop of North Queensland will dedicate the new church of St Saviour. The ceremony, will take 'place at 8 pm, and on Saturday morning the Bishop will celebrate the Holy Communion at 7 a.m. The building has been talked of for many years, but was only put in hand and completed during the last few months. The plans and design were prepared by Mr. Harvey Draper and the work was done locally by Messrs. T. A. Newman, Moule and de Graf. The cost has been about £900. "

### St Saviour's Thought for October

The Reading this month is from the Gospel according to St Luke, Chapter 15 verses 1 to 10. It asks us if we are ready.

In the early centuries Christian communities really were communities-places where one could get help, support, and friendship, particularly in the big cities of the eastern Mediterranean. Some say that this was the biggest factor in the emergence of Christianity as the religion of the later Roman Empire. This view is not given merely to begin a history lesson. Today we are very conscious of the same need. Our cities are places of deep and widespread loneliness among many people longing for friendship and support. Today that community spirit is often hidden beneath the surface but is often still there, as we all would have seen on the streets of many cities around the world.

Every Christian group and community needs to be sensitive to this longing and to ensure that its life is a welcoming one, not merely to those whom it considers to be its own familiar supporters but to those who come to it seeking community. On any given Sunday that may well be a family newly transferred to the area from another, a person going through crisis who tries the church in his or her great need, a person who may be giving the church another chance after having left many years ago, or people who have for some reason found another Christian tradition unable to serve their need.


Each situation is a kind of lostness. The moment we say that word we realise that we have made the connection with the two stories, which Jesus tells in our reading. "The tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him." These are the people in that long-ago society who felt themselves to be outsiders. On the other hand, the Pharisees, whom Luke shows as resenting Jesus' mixing with the outsiders, were very much on the inside.

Luke's image of two mutually wary groups demonstrates another demand that is made of Christian communities and groups in today's world. How do these people reach out beyond themselves in ways that are not patronising and

even insulting? How do we support people without making demands on them, at least initially, to conform to the life of the Christian community or group and its many responsibilities? There is a searching for lost things. A shepherd goes after the sheep, which is lost; a woman sweeps diligently until she finds the coin. People wander the streets of New York carrying photos of loved ones. In the life of the Christian community or group we should not merely wait for needs to appear on our doorstep and then respond to them out of a sense of duty. There should also be a searching for ways in which the resources we are given can reach out into the lostness to which Luke refers. When we are prepared to reach out in this way we are obeying Jesus. The degree to which a Christian group can become a community of hospitality and outreach is the degree to which it is obeying its Lord.




