

POPULAR SPEEWAH CHARITY WALK SEEKS TO HIT NEW HEIGHTS

To mark the 10th anniversary of the **Speewah to the Hat** another way to support this event is to donate prizes." - Walk for a Cause (the 'Hat' being the Red Beret Hotel at Redlynch) organisers have set themselves an ambitious fundraising target of \$10,000 for this event, almost twice as much as usual.

Co-founder Mick Dowling says, "The Walk has run for nine years, but for the first five years it was just a social event before becoming a charity focused event four years ago. Over the past four years we have raised around \$20,000. This year's Walk will take place on Saturday 2 September and I am hoping we can raise a minimum of \$10,000 this year for locals in need. We have been averaging around 100 entrants each year with the number of walkers for this year's event capped at 120 - therefore people will need to get in quick to secure their spots!"

Entry to the event is \$35 per person which includes bus transport from the Red Beret Hotel up to Speewah in the morning to commence the walk (for people in Cairns) and a bus back up to Speewah after the event (for people living up the hill). All entrants will also receive a free beer, wine or soft drink upon arrival at the Red Beret Hotel.

This 13km scenic walk with a big heart begins at the Speewah Camping Ground and continues down the Douglas Track to Stoney Creek, through some beautiful country, and on to the Red Beret Hotel at Redlynch for lunch and some refreshing and well-deserved ales.

Each person walks at their own pace and everyone is encouraged to take the time to visit Glacier Rock along the way, to hang out and admire the views. Bring your cameras too.

Mick says, "We also encourage friends and family, or those who are unable to participate in the actual Walk, to join us for lunch at the Red Beret from 11.30am onwards and help us by purchasing raffle tickets and supporting us that way. It's always a fun afternoon with an opportunity to get your share of thousands of dollars in prizes! Speaking of raffles,

Funds raised through the Walk and raffles will go to support locals who are in need of a 'hand up'. Another unique feature of the Walk is that locals not only support locals, but can nominate individuals or organisations who would be worthy recipients.

In its first year as a charity event, funds went to drought stricken farmers in south-west Queensland before the Walk became a locally focused fundraising event.

Since then recipients have included a charity organisation called Stay in the Fight, for children with a rare cancer, BACA (Bikers Against Child Abuse), the Kuranda Men's Shed, Tigerlodge Wildlife Rescue, and support for the Speewah Residents Association by paying for the Bob Madden memorial plaque now displayed in the Speewah Rural Fire Brigade shed.

Meaningful support for individuals has included funeral expenses for a Kuranda child, assistance with the cost of flights and accomodation for a local woman requiring brain surgery, assistance with costs for a local woman in need of urgent hip surgery, and help for a family that took on two orphaned children after their mother (only parent) suddenly died of a heart attack.

Nominations are now open! Written submissions from people who are nominating families, individuals, charities etc in our local 4881 postcode area who are in need of a 'hand up' at this time are welcomed. There will be three recipients chosen and announced on the day.

So how to support this great annual event? Participate as a walker, donate items or services for raffles, join in the fun of raffles on the day. And don't forget to nominate recipients for funds raised.



Elders have played, and continue to play, an important role and hold a prominent place in our communities and families. They are cultural knowledge holders, trailblazers, nurturers, advocates, teachers, survivors, leaders, hard workers and our loved ones.

WHERE IS DUTY OF CARE FOR OUR LAND?

I'm a Buluwai Kuranda–ite, who from the early 1960s with my family, lived on Thongon Street next to where Cornetts IGA is now. Back then, mostly after wet season, Chinese and pioneer artefacts were found in the creek bed behind our house.

Months of constant rain, creeks connecting the Barron River flooded and at night, the roar of Din Din was loud. The 'hippies' showed how to build beautiful houses that didn't shock everything in sight. From Thongon to Kullaroo Close, walking over Jumrum bridge for me, Duck Pond way, had an eerie, foreboding vibe. Buluwai country has a long history.

Better work opportunities in Cairns, I resided there for 40 years. Home ownership in two different suburbs. I'm aware Cairns Regional Council has a 'Duty of Care' include abiding by the *Cultural Heritage Act 2003*.

Front page of *The Kuranda Paper* June issue, wow, a citified suburb in a rainforest. Without respect, knowledge, consent or compensation, should any Traditional landowner or European landowner be happy, seeing deliberate destruction of their land?

Cover Masthead



The visual aspect of the branding will remain very similar, but simplified. Potential logo designs will be presented to the public for feedback soon.

Visit from the Kuranda Police - Thank you to Senior Sergeant Matt Harling for taking the time to attend our KTA General Meeting on 22 June. Thanks also to Mareeba Shire Council (MSC) CEO Peter Franks, Councillor Lenore Wyatt, and MSC Manager of Assets and Projects, Jacqui Perkowicz.

Many issues were discussed at the meeting including safety and crime prevention in the village centre as well as CCTV possibilities, cleaning up our parks, parking issues and creating a well-lit streetscape for safer access in the village CBD.

MSC Consultation on Parks and Open Spaces – At the meeting, Jacqui Perkowicz also briefed us on a potential grant funding opportunity with the Federal Government. If funding is successful, this project would see improvements to the footpaths and lighting on Coondoo Street. Another project will be the refresh of Anzac Park (adjacent to Heritage Markets and opposite the Original Markets) creating additional on-street parking and opening up of the space. Council will be holding two information and public consultation sessions outside Kuranda Visitor Information Centre (see page 6 of this paper for more details):

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
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Councillor Column

TENDER AWARDED FOR NEW KURANDA CEMETERY



At the Ordinary Meeting of Mareeba Shire Council on Wednesday, 21 June 2023, it was reported that Council has awarded the tender to build a new cemetery in Kuranda.

Four submissions were received, with the tender being awarded to Mareeba based company Ikin Civil for \$678,408.70 (excluding GST).

The existing Kuranda Cemetery is close to reaching capacity and Council has purchased an adjacent property on Kuranda Heights Road for the expansion of the cemetery.

Stage One of the new Kuranda Cemetery will have space for 100 monumental memorials and 250 lawn-level memorials which should secure enough space to meet the needs for the community for the next 25 years.

The tendered scope of works includes earthworks, roadworks, stormwater drainage, water supply and carparking, as well as landscaping, a toilet block and concrete works.

Council is looking forward to this important project going ahead to ensure the long-term needs of the Kuranda community are met.



Crawford's Corner

Dear Kuranda residents (and Happy Birthday to The Kuranda Paper),

Earlier this month the Queensland Government handed down it's 2023-2024 budget - with a particular focus on tackling cost-of-living pressures - more than \$8 billion.

Further to last month's agreement to work in partnership with the Federal Government to deliver \$550 in cost-of-living relief for eligible Queensland households and \$650 for eligible small businesses in the form of energy rebates, other eligible households, those on seniors or pension cards, will be contacted by Services Australia with information on how to apply for a further rebate, bringing total rebates for this group up to \$1,072.

We're introducing free kindy for all four year olds, increasing the Patient Travel Subsidy Scheme to assist regional patients, providing up to \$150 for 0-4 years for learn to swim activities, expanding the school breakfast program, and \$315,000 for Foodbank to deliver critical food relief.

Closer to home you may notice the long awaited ITS variable speed signs going up on the Kuranda Range Road, meanwhile further inspection and maintenance will be undertaken on the Barron River Bridge during August this year. \$8.89 million has been committed for an options analysis and evaluation, with a business case due in 2024.



I hope you are all enjoying the cooler weather, getting outdoors and appreciating Kuranda.


I wanted to touch on a few things, mostly around property security and traffic matters. Firstly, please ensure you watch your speed along Myloa Road. There are numerous families with young children living along this road (including a school) who don't appreciate vehicles driving at excessive speeds. This goes for the Kuranda Range too. We still see far too many accidents and near misses and inconsiderate drivers travelling on the Range every day. Remember you need at least a two second gap between vehicles otherwise you will have no time to stop.

Regarding property security, please ensure your houses, businesses and vehicles are locked and secured at all times. Please get into the habit of locking your vehicle keys away or at least keeping them on your bedside table when you sleep. Property offenders are usually after alcohol, money and vehicles.

You may find leaving outside lights on helps too. The cost to run a light bulb is quite cheap and deters would be offenders as they prefer the dark where they can hide and do as they wish undetected.

Lastly I want to advise we have a new phone system at the Kuranda Police Station that doesn't allow callers to leave voice messages. This may be frustrating, but it puts Kuranda Station in line with the standard for Police Stations around the State. If we are in the office the call will go through. However, if we are out of the office you will hear an automated message telling you to call **000 for emergencies** and **Policelink 131 444** for non-urgent matters. Stay safe

Book Review

Stolen - a spellbinding Swedish novel that follows a young indigenous woman as she struggles to defend her family's reindeer herd and culture amidst xenophobia, climate change, and a devious hunter whose targeted kills are considered mere theft in the eyes of the law.

On a winter day north of the Arctic Circle, nine-year-old Elsa—daughter of Sámi reind herders-sees a man brutally kill her beloved reindeer calf and threaten her into silence.

This is a very insightful novel about the intricacies and struggles of Sami life in the beautiful but harsh lands to the North of Scandinavia. Theirs is a constant struggle against not only these harsh conditions, but also against the xenophobia and jealousy of their neighbours.


Elsa has her own struggles as she fights to be accepted in what historically has been a man's world. The Sámi's way of life is imperilled as government and police force do nothing to protect their reindeer or their traditional lands and rights. The reader can feel their anguish as their reindeer are 'murdered' and tortured.


We can also see their anguish as they grow up and have to decide where their future lies. There are those whose whole life revolves around the spirituality of their way of life and those who can see that this way of life is doomed. It's a heart-breaking choice. You want to cry out "Look what you will be losing!"

This novel just captures your heart. The author describes Sámi, the landscape and the animals with such vividness and such empathy. It's a lesson in geography, history and society, emphasising why we need to value and protect our indigenous cultures. This book is very moving and quite a revelation of a way of life barely known to most readers. It really is fascinating and highly recommended.

Just when you think the world couldn't get anymore ridiculous, something happens to give that concept a rebirth. I was in Cooktown, Far North Queensland, a place that still has the vibe of being the last town on the frontier. The clouds hung dark and heavy, the heat and humidity was like warm soup, sticky and oppressive. I could feel a trickle of sweat running down my back.

I could also feel rumblings in the stomach and thought a cold beer and a counter lunch was needed. I entered the nearest pub and its air conditioning was a blessing so I headed straight to the bar. It wasn't overly busy but there were a few people around. I had just sat on a bar stool when I realised that I was sitting next to a couple of slurring drunks.

One seemed to be relishing biting his fingernails. The other one was watching him intently and said "I bet you a hundred dollars, you couldn't bite yer finger off" and put a hundred dollar note on the bar to tempt him.

Second drunk said "Ah yah", and took the challenge on and bit the top of his index finger off. The bite was to the first joint. The sound of crunch, then wrench, was stomach churning. He spat it onto the bar, where it sat in a puddle of beer

The first drunk put his hundred dollar back in his pocket refusing to pay. Saying "It was not the whole finger, it was only a part." It was easy to sense that hell was about to erupt. As both their voices reached aggro pitch they both began swinging punches and the fight quickly ensued.

you want a beer?"

I said, "Yes" and added a polite "Please". She stood waiting for the request "VB please". She wiped the beer and diluted blood from the bar and placed a beer mat on it. Another beer mat for me and my beer request was quickly in front of me.

I said, "I was about to have a counter lunch but I've gone off that idea."

"There's always fish and chips if you don't fancy a T-bone" she said with a wry smile.

"No thanks" I said.

The place almost emptied after the fracas. I could hear thunder threatening outside, so I downed the liquid amber and thought I'd order another. She seemed cheery and chatty and a person that would have seen many things.

So I asked, "Is that sort of thing usual?'

She said "No, but this town is a crazy place."

I asked "How do you mean?'

"Well" she said leaning slightly forward and there was a definite glint in her eyes. "I got a phone call from the morgue of all places. When I picked up the phone they asked, 'Who is this please?"

"I said 'Why? Who are you?' And they said 'It's the morgue.' I said 'The who?' 'The morgue. We have some information for you. Well, it's a question really.'"

And I said, "Is this a joke?"

They said "No, this is serious." They went on to explain. "You know when there's always a surprise when you clean out the freezer? Well this one has your telephone number tied to his toe. It seems the info tag didn't get finished. The reason for that is unclear. There is only your phone number for a reference. "This is a joke!" she said. Their reply was "Definitely not! Please call the hospital and ask to be put through to the morgue and you'll find out. We think it may have happened when we had a sudden rush, like a bus crash and somehow, he got pushed to the back of the freezer where he has remained till now. I understand your surprise. Do you know of anyone that's missing because we're hoping you could identify this man who died?" I told them "Surprised!!!!! I'm horrified. I can't think of anyone who hasn't been around for a while. I rarely go out or get about, except for work. How long ago was this? "Sorry. We have had a few staff changes since then and those that are here now, don't know."

They said "No you can be rest assured that we will deal with any expense, unless he's your family of course."

"What? No! No one in my family has disappeared."

"Could I trouble you for your name please? You see our problem is you're our only contact."

"It's Sandra, Sandra Kelling."

"Well Sandra, if you could pop down to identify the body please we would be most grateful.'

Well I was on the edge of my seat and asked "What did you say Sandra?"

She said "I asked, can't you send me a photo?"

"Sorry that's not the policy, we need a personal viewing." "Can I do this in the AM? Not the PM because that's too close to the evening and bed."

"Yes of course, we can offer a cup of tea and a biscuit."

"Oh really," she said "How can I resist it then?" Adding "This will be the first time I've witnessed anyone dead. Other than on film or TV.'

She said she'd spent the night wondering who it could be? Then when morning came she thought "This is going to be interesting."

"Oh shit," she recognised him straight away saying "That's Henry Devalue, the man from hell!!'

"What can you tell us about him?"

"Well nothing really, he's a bit of a drunk, who drank XXXX. He wasn't very appealing, his nickname was the Flirty Herpe. He always seemed to be in a war with cold sores. He lived in the bubble of laziness, basically he was someone who couldn't care less. He was one of life's cretins who claimed to suffer from vacuum cleaner anxiety. He always said his near enough was always good enough. We didn't get on. You don't think he put the tag on himself do you. Just to spite?" The nurse looked perplexed, "I doubt it. Do you know where he lived?"

The barmaid, who had been busy at the kitchen counter, was lightning quick to call for a bouncer. I stood to the side to get out of everyone's way. They both were efficiently and quickly thrown out, left to roll around on the street.

I asked the barmaid if she knew them. She said "No, they're probably a couple of tin scratchers or fishermen, they were the best of mates when they came in.'

"What's next?" she asked. "Everyone's going troppo. Do

Whilst happy hour conjures images of good company enjoying wine, beer and nibblies, for me it is also that time of the day when the shadows lengthen and the landscape is bathed in a yellow glow as the sun sets. The heat of the day wanes and a welcome coolness arrives that might see you reaching for your flannelette shirt with the next refill of your glass.

This is me musing from Talaroo Hot Springs 338 kilometres from my home in Kuranda. I have spent the afternoon exploring the Einasleigh River with my dog wading in knee deep water from one sand bank to another and beyond to that next rocky outcrop just to see what is there. The Einasleigh is still flowing swiftly in places and the sound of running water is always a drawcard.


But the real reason we are here is to revisit Talaroo's hot springs. It is approximately 20 years since I was last here, and as we drove in, the only thing I recognised was the homestead on the left of the road leading to the campground. The original wooden rangers building was destroyed by fire years ago and has been replaced with a modern reception and café with ample seating covered by a huge shade sail. There is an inground pool adjacent which is in the process of receiving the final paving touches to its surrounds. Lyn Baily welcomed us at check-in and assigned us a shady site.

Talaroo is no longer a working cattle station having been purchased by the Indigenous Land Council on behalf of the Ewamian people in 2012. Since then, the Ewamian people have worked to develop the Talaroo Hot Springs visitor experience and restore the land. Their rangers are based at Talaroo Station and they welcomed their first visitors in June 2021.

We had the pleasure of being guided by ranger Michell Kapteyn, who just happens to

be a Kuranda local, on our tour of the hot springs which ended with a long soak in the warm waters that flow into the pool. Michell welcomed us to country at the edge of a boardwalk that now takes you over the steaming landscape and gives you views from above of the changing pools and waterflows below. There are private soaking pools that you can book on your own or with up to three others. Healing and contemplation in the geothermal waters at sunset, romantic with someone special, or four friends just chilling out. You choose, and if you need a comfy bed there are Eco Tents for accommodation with queen bed and veranda out the front.

There are firepits scattered throughout the campgrounds and to our surprise these were lit by Lyn and Michell on dusk with firewood supplied to keep us cosy in our camp chairs all evening. It was a relaxing two days and good to sit under a sky uninterrupted by the lights of civilisation.



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Melicope rubra (Little Evodia)

We have exciting new arrivals in stock: Melicope rubra, food plant of the iconic Ulysses Swallowtail Butterfly. These trees are small (up to 4-8 m but can be trimmed smaller) and produce showers of delicate pink blossoms along their stems, in addition to attracting butterflies. This lovely little tree prefers lots of sun and is the perfect addition to almost any garden. Drop by the nursery to pick yours up before we sell out.

Aristolochia acuminata or tagala (Native Dutchman's Pipe)

This creeper is the food plant for the Cairns Birdwing butterfly. There are other non-native vines that have a much larger, more attractive pitcher-shaped flower but this look-alike vine will poison your Birdwing caterpillars even though the female butterfly may lay her eggs on the leaves. Don't make a mistake and buy the wrong plant. We've got heaps of the right plant in the nursery. The season is right for planting this creeper.

ECOFIESTA

This was probably the best festival we've ever attended. It was well organised, well laid out and our tent was constantly humming. We even ran out of stickers. We attribute this to the influx of young people into our ranks. They bring with them a new energy and enthusiasm. For us oldies, it's like surfing a great wave.

CASSOWARY SIGHTINGS

Cassowaries are well into their breeding cycle. Lots of

flirting going on. Some of the juveniles are hanging on to dad's apron strings for as long as he'll have them, but they will inevitably wander off to find their own habitat (home range) or dad and mum will throw them out. This can be distressing for a youngster who doesn't want to go.

Elvis, with Archie in tow, and Priscilla close by are seen crossing the highway near the bus depot on a daily basis, between about 3.30pm and 5pm. With the speed limit reduced to 60kph and the removal of the overtaking lanes, it is much safer for these animals. Please be patient. Enjoy the show, if you're lucky enough to see them crossing. Elvis will soon be sitting on eggs and we'll do it all over again for another year.

PROTECTING THE JUMRUM VALLEY

Those of us who were active during the period of the threatening Kur-World development are again pushing for the best environmental outcomes possible with the Jumrum subdivision. The protection of our fragile environment including cassowaries and platypus, is often not a high priority when money is involved.

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A Grinter's Tale

It's a Dog's Life

This week, I left my dogs at home for exactly one day. Actually, I lie, it was about six hours, which for me is akin to taking a fortnight's holiday in the Bahamas.

You may laugh, but for yours truly, a trip to Gordonvale is akin to most people's trips to Longreach or Alice Springs. It's a road trip worthy of a refreshment break, it gives the car a bit of a battery boost and there's usually a new suburb or two to view on the way.

And it is self-respite for me. After all, it's difficult dealing with the assorted personalities of three dogs, one deaf, one an airhead, and the other just always busy. They do say animals grow like their owners, but thankfully for them it's a case of divide and conquer.

Then of course there are three horses and two felines all with different needs and personalities needing attention at least twice a day if not more.

Sometimes I feel like a tenant.

When I lived in Abu Dhabi, one of the mothers in our toddler group, a very wise Scottish lass, said to me, with the conviction of a seasoned mother of three to my one, and the true grit of her fellow countryman William Wallace, "As mothers, we always feel guilty. Never forget that". I didn't, but I didn't expect it to run to three dogs, three horses and two cats and whatever else ventures into my yard.

Hoisted by my own petard, my dogs think they have control of my life, which in fact they do. The horses are a little less controlling, and once they realise I am not going to let them in the garden to eat my heliconias, passion fruit vines, dracaena and bird food, they go off to their centimetre long winter grass to harbour resentment and plot my downfall. Occasionally one will kick the gate, or another reach over the fence to eat the passion fruit the cockatoos missed, just to annoy me, but they forget revenge when they have their dinner. The dogs know when I am revving up to go out. You can't dry your hair or put make up on

of his mouth and pasted on the tiles, which I have to say is somewhat disconcerting. I need to point out that Harry is in fact a dog, and that the tongue hanging out so far it lolls on the ground, is merely the result of a stroke, that is, a transient ischaemic attack, not a rub on his belly.

Then the conversation goes like this. And bear in mind, the verbal discourse is accompanied by sign language for Harry, being the deaf one. Poor Harry, as you can see, he got the short end of the straw when it comes to canine health.

"Okay you lot. I have to go and buy food for you. I work my little butt off every day to provide for you (that one is hard in sign language), and I honestly don't think you appreciate that (actually, that one is too)."

Of course, there is no reply, but I sense them thinking "Why can't you order stuff from Woolworths and have it delivered like others do?" I can't say of course that I need to leave the property once in a while for my own sanity. Not only would that be impossible in dog sign language, but would hurt their feelings.

The other day, as I flew around the house looking for my watch, the three droopy drawers sat on the couch together looking like they had all just been made redundant. That made me mad. After all, they do nothing to contribute to the household except to exercise me, taking me for a 4km walk every morning and making me retrieve their ball in the paddock for 20 minutes every evening. At least the horses provide fertiliser.

"Get off your hairy butts and go and do something useful," I said today, realising what a ridiculous statement that was, and telling myself so. But that's what happens when you live with animals.

I swear I heard "Whateverrrrrr", but perhaps it was the fridge thermostat clocking in.

There is some new work on display so please take a moment to drop in and say hello to the artist on duty. We have also updated our video screen with the addition of Lisa Capon at work in her studio.

This month we focus on our Glass Artists

Some new additions to the Gallery include miniature glass flowers in handmade glass vases. **Cathy Harvey** took a one-day glass-blowing workshop in Brighton, UK, in May to learn how to blow glass. With this technique, so far she has produced miniature vases and flowers. The first experimental vases were just 10cm tall, but she is working on producing bigger vessels daily. Spending over 20 hobby years 'on the torch', Cathy has attended workshops in Brisbane and on the island of Murano as well as taking online tutorials held by international glass artists during COVID. Due to an inability to create a straight line, or find a central point, her work can be a little skewed, but for her, it is the colour and movement of the glass that is more important than straight even sides.

There are four other glass artists in the Gallery –

- **Terry Eager** with her creative fusing and slumped glass art she also uses recycled TV glass for large decorative pieces. If you are walking around Kuranda you will see her formed glass tiles in the footpath along Coondoo Street.
- Kate Prynne, also a silversmith, focuses on slumped dishes and wind chimes.
- Klaus Brucksch, master of lead lighting, opals and dichroic glass pendants.
- **Judy Davies**, lampworker and jewelsmith also combining precious stones and silver with her handmade beads.

From Queensland Government Indigenous Languages Grants program, Buluwai traditional owners have now printed, BULUWAI LANGUAGE DICTIONARY Handbook Guide – The Language of Our Ancestors and our first Cultural Activity Series – Booklet One, titled Bibi Talk. Both educational tools have been very well received from local schools. Booklet internet Scan Code is accessible in classrooms or at home, where learners will see and hear Buluwai Elder pronounce the related word. Cultural Activity Series – Booklet Two is now in progress.

Looking After Country Grant Program (LACGP) 2023

Also courtesy of Queensland Government, the Looking After Country Grant Program, had Buluwai Cultural Rangers over the last 10 weeks, laying groundwork for ongoing preservation of our Rock-Art. Bare Hill is Wet Tropics' most graffitied site, our crew worked with archaeologists, compared 'heat signature' satellite and drone imagery, worked alongside QPWS with fire management for gradual restoration encouraging wildlife species.

Northern Bettong Breeding & Translocation Program








Although this years' wet-season (bug season) is apparently behind us, the recent rains are still stimulating some insect activity. Moths are one such group, still appearing in numbers on warmer nights. One local moth is the Northern Emperor Moth (Syntherata escarlata), which is spectacular in both the larval (caterpillar) and adult stages.


The Northern Emperor Moth is one of the larger moths in this region. These moths feed on a variety of plants, including gum leaves, guava leaves and Melicope leaves, but they only do so at the caterpillar stage. Their oval-shaped eggs are laid on the leaves, and are yellow to white in colour. Usually, these are laid in batches of 10 to 20, in lines or clusters that are glued to the leaf or each other, hatching seven to 10 days later. Once hatched, the caterpillars are black and bristly in appearance. After feeding and growing for a couple of weeks, they change to the familiar green colour. The caterpillars continue to grow until they are about 80mm long, at which point they are finger-thick, bright green with a pale stripe down the length of their body, and studded with red and yellow protective bristles. This growth occurs via a number of stages, whereby the caterpillar sheds its skin (exoskeleton) to move to the next stage. Once it is ready to pupate, the caterpillar produces a tough cocoon from brown silk. Pupation can take anywhere from four months to several years, and is dependant on temperature.

Adult Northern Emperor Moths emerge from their cocoons during the warmer months of the year. They are quite large moths, and their colour varies immensely between individuals, with some being bright yellow, some orange, some tan brown and some even a dusky pink colour. They also have some striking patterns on their wings, with a zigzag running along all four wings. The fore-wings have a small clear 'window' in the middle of them.

Adult Northern Emperor Moths do not feed. They instead rely on the stored energy they built up during their ravenous caterpillar stage, and as a result, only live for a few weeks as adults. The females are usually larger than males with heavyset abdomens for housing eggs. The males are more lightly built and have the sole mission to seek out and mate. To aid them in finding the females, they are equipped with much more sensitive antennae than the females. The males have extensive, feather-like antennae which pick up the chemical signals (pheromones) released by female moths.

Whether it be on your trees or under the porch light, keep an eye out just in case an Emperor comes to visit.

Photos of graves, names, dates etc. can be found on www.austcemindex.com. This site unfortunately has no reference to plot numbers that we are aware of. A booklet containing lists of graves 1910–1988 has been unearthed from the Cairns Historical Society giving site references (key shaped metal grave markers - found around the top and middle section of the cemetery).

To find specific graves has become an adventure. Mareeba Shire Council has found some maps of grave layouts, which will be interesting to explore as many of the graves have now lost their headstones. Communities across Australia trying to come to grips with feral cats and foxes will be better equipped with the release of two new planning guides by the Centre for Invasive Species Solutions.

"Recent research shows that feral cats and foxes kill and eat 697 million birds, 510 million reptiles, 1.4 billion mammals and well over 1.1 billion invertebrates every year", said Ms Gillian Basnett, National Feral Cat and Fox Management Coordinator with the Centre for **Invasive Species Solutions**

"Their populations are huge: it's estimated that the number of feral cats ranges seasonally from 1.4 and 5.6 million, and the number of foxes is steady at about 1.7 million. Fox and cat numbers vary across landscapes, with higher numbers in agricultural, peri urban and urban areas where there is more food.

Feral cats kill huge numbers of native animals and spread disease to other animals.

"These invasive animals threaten our native animals with extinction: at least 140 species are threatened by feral cats; 95 species are threatened by foxes. They also spread disease: feral cats spread toxoplasmosis which can infect any animal or bird, it doesn't discriminate between wallabies, bandicoots or sheep. Together with another disease, Sarcocystis, toxoplasmosis spread by feral cats is estimated to cost farmers more than \$12 million a year. Throw in predation by foxes and you add a further \$28 million in costs a year", said Ms Basnett.

Ms Basnett has found that there is huge community interest in controlling feral cats and foxes but often the first question she is asked is, 'what can we do about it?'. The new Planning Guide for Feral Cat Management in Australia and its companion, the Planning Guide for Fox Management in Australia have been written to help land managers, community groups, pest control professional, biosecurity organisations and others ask the right questions and find the right answers that suit their circumstances and resources.

"Many people are daunted by planning — it's a bit dull, it's a bit dry, it seems too complex - and they just want to hook in and start controlling feral cats and foxes from day one", said Ms Basnett. "A useful plan doesn't need to be long and complicated – a map to get you started, a list of everyone involved, details about why you want to control the pests, and a calendar of who is doing what and when. What I would say, is that you want your plan to be purposeful: to quote Dr Peter Fleming from NSW Department of Primary Industries, who spoke at a recent strategic planning forum we hosted, "You don't want to just do something, you want to do something useful and if you fail to plan, you plan to fail".

The new planning guides provide a framework for people to make decisions and to select management options that suit their circumstances.

"People might want to bait, shoot and trap, or invest in exclusion fencing, or habitat improvements and rabbit control. It depends on what they can commit to and what works for them", said Ms Basnett.

NOTE: Foxes have been seen as far north as Lakeland Downs, 80km west of Cooktown and occasionally on properties in the gulf savannah country near Normanton (J. Mitchell [NRW] 2004, pers. comm.), but these sightings are rare. The northern limit of fox distribution probably reflects climatic preferences, since foxes do not favour humid, tropical regions (Wilson et al. 1992). The northern limit of their distribution probably fluctuates with seasonal conditions (Jarman 1986; Saunders et al. 1995).

What can you see in the creek?

Healthy waterways is an aim we could all aspire to, given our dependence on good quality water to keep flowing to our precious Great Barrier Reef. In the Kuranda district we could check out our local creeks. But how would we know if we're having an impact?

The health of a freshwater creek can be monitored through a combination of physical, chemical, and biological assessments which are often considered the most comprehensive way to monitor the health of a creek. This is because they reflect the current and historical conditions. While chemical and physical assessments can provide snapshots of the creek's health at a given moment, biological assessments can capture the cumulative impacts of various environmental factors over a longer period.

their inability to easily escape unfavourable conditions, reflect the immediate health of their habitats. Species such as stoneflies, mayflies, and caddisflies are sensitive to pollutants and thrive in clean, oxygen-rich water, suggesting good water quality. Conversely, midges and certain worms can survive in lower oxygen conditions and their abundance can indicate pollution or degraded habitats.

Macroinvertebrates can also indicate physical creek changes, such as sedimentation, temperature variations, or altered flow patterns. Monitoring these creek bugs is a great part of freshwater conservation and pollution control, helping assess water quality over time. This valuable information helps with creek management and reduction of human impact efforts on these precious ecosystems that support our creek breeding creatures of the Wet Tropics including the Kuranda Tree frog.

There are no known yellow crazy ant infestations in the Mareeba area, so this was a fantastic opportunity to speak to locals about being aware of yellow crazy ants, in the hope that they will recognise and report any suspect ants.

As always, the Protect Your Patch display showed residents what they can do themselves to protect their yards from invasive ants by quarantining pot plants via water bath or bare rooting. Our new Community Taskforce stickers were also a hit.

A big thanks to our Taskforce volunteers, Chelsea Scanlan and Tim Brown for helping us get the yellow crazy ant message out to our wider community. And a huge thank you to Cairns Regional Council for putting on another awesome Ecofiesta event.

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Biological assessments involve examining the organisms that live in the creek. Macroinvertebrates, fish, and algae are often the focus of these assessments. Macroinvertebrates, namely insects, crustaceans, molluscs, and worms large enough to be seen with the naked eye, are crucial biological indicators of water quality. Their sensitivity to environmental changes, and Plant of the Month Lime Berry – *Micromelum minutum*

This small shrub of 2–4m is an attractive nectar source for many butterflies and the host plant for the Orchard, the Ambrax and Fuscous Swallowtail butterflies. It has attractive showy white scented flowers which are held upright, followed by bright orange/red fruit. It prefers full sun and can tolerate drier lowland forest conditions, but will also grow

on rainforest margins and in part shade. It flowers in its second year makes and attractive edge plant with its light green leaves. It's suitable for screening and can be trimmed for hedging.

By now normally gone, that way always planned, their decision to end it, had forced the girl's hand. As the money as lure, was too great to leave She decided the plan was now to bereave.


her strength and her life, now all but spent.

Who will stand for the seeds of nature as gene-tech runs unchecked?

Life these days has most people wound up in survival mode, doing all the many details required to keep everything working and food on the table. How did we end up in this situation and are we heading in the right direction? Many people are feeling busier than ever, though are their 'busier' efforts producing more family and leisure time? Most are saying 'no', so what is going on?

Surely these things are worth looking into, as what sort of a world are we creating for our children if we already feel that things are 'too busy' now?

Many people are 'too busy' to look into what is happening with our food, for instance. While we are 'too busy', large multinational gene-tech corporations are being given the go-ahead in Australia to do all sorts of 'gene-technology' on seeds, plants, humans, soil biology and much more, and the technologies being unleashed are untested for safety and largely unregulated. How is this even possible? It seems these days the corporate investment power trumps any level of concern over natural integrity, and most people have far too much information pouring through their devices to be able to detect areas that may hold a sense of urgency for their own or their children's health.

The main 'benefit' of gene-technology is the capacity to patent and therefore profit out of 'novel' laboratory 'creations' and of course, unleashed on an unsuspecting, uninformed population, much profit can be made, and these corporations are renowned for hiding safety concerns and burying evidence of harm, leaving the 'consumer' to take up the fight to bring justice where harm occurs. One example of this is Bayer/ Monsanto paying out more than 19 billion dollars to settle cancer claims for their product Roundup, which is still sold today and used around schools and neighbourhoods where children walk and play. It is also used on food-crops and is causing untold damage to gut microbiology which causes all sorts of health issues into the future.

Genetically modified bananas (and much more) are planned to be released to Australian markets this year, why? It is all about control of profits for food products, and definitely nothing to do with health.

The big lie used to sell their wares, their concepts, constructs and conartistry, is that genetically modified organisms (GMOs) will 'feed the world', though the truth is that more, not less harmful chemicals are used on the GMO crops, doing untold damage to pollinators and soil biology, and more water not less is used due to the lack of living soils and human care. The same profiteers of the GMO industry are the profiteers of the chemicals that go with them, leaving the land less viable and farmers in such debt that they are forced to walk from their family farms, leaving the land itself in the hands of the debt-creators.

Please take the time to look at the Genethics website. With our 'busy-ness' we are being trained to not see the legislation changes happening beneath our noses to allow these frankenstein technologies to be unleashed unchecked through previously respected and now compromised scientific research and development agencies. What is the cost of this with multiple laboratory 'leaks' already evident. Look at Vandana Shiva's work, and Andre Leu's too.

Of course growing our own food organically from non-GMO/non-hybrid seeds for our families stands us in good stead, and supporting other growers in the region who are doing this too, and seeking out truly organic food helps avoid the traps caused by lack of GMO labelling in Australia. There is an assumption of organic food being more expensive, though with higher nutritional content and less health concerns surely this would be considered a good investment for our families.



The atmosphere at our Open Day was magical, thanks to the hard work of our staff, families, and students.



The Bama (people) of this area (bulmba) shared a common ngirrma, language.

The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like the archaic English word 'aye' for yes.

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji

believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have people been able to preside continuously in one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual word 'bulmba' has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of the year, the season and the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for help with selection of wordsearch words and to the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporations for their work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

St Saviour's Thought for July

This month we read from St Matthews's Gospel Chapter 13 verse 1 to 23.

There are all sorts of ways by which we come to faith. One person cannot point to a moment when Jesus became their Lord because they have never known a period when Jesus was not part of their consciousness. Someone else may have had a totally different experience. Through some event, some book, some relationship, some conversation, they may have been brought to deciding that Jesus was their Lord. The sad thing is that sometimes the latter person will think the former person's way to be not quite the real thing. Of course it is the real thing. It may be gradual, even lifelong, but it can be profoundly real.

Jesus told a story about the many kinds of faith journeys people experience. His image of God is that of a sower striding along a stretch of ground. In long regular sweeps of his arm he throws the seed far and wide. That seed represents all the myriad ways in which God communicates with us and gives grace to us.

A seed falls on the roadway beyond the soil line. A bird comes and the seed is gone. A seed falls among rocks where there is just a sprinkling of earth. It grows but it has no nourishment, so it dies. A seed falls among thorns, struggles to grow, succeeds partially, and is overcome. Finally a seed falls in good rich earth and there are magnificent results.

In a sense the whole story is true of each of our lives. From birth to death God communicates with us, fostering our growth, guiding, inspiring, and calling. Because we are human we go through periods and circumstances when we become each of those places in the story where the seed of God tries to grow. We can be the path beyond the soil line. That may be a stage in our lives when other influences, some of them actually evil, can snatch from us any link with Our Lord. We can become the rocky ground, a person full of initial enthusiasm, but if there comes a time when our allegiance to Our Lord becomes costly in any way, we fade out. We can be the place of thorns. We encounter Our Lord. It affects us deeply, but something more attractive comes and we go in that direction. There are a host of shiny options in today's world to make us do just that. Finally we can become good soil. We encounter Our Lord. We grow in him and we respond to Him. He becomes the foundation of our lives. We find that life with him can be far more satisfying than the other shiny options. God sows the seed. We are the ground which receives it. What kind of ground do we decide to be?






