

## The Kid Who Conquered The Kuranda Range

for being "lazy, fickle and irresponsible". Sometimes the criticism is warranted, but those "lazy, fickle and irresponsible" youngsters probably grow up to be lazy and irresponsible adults who criticise the next generation. The majority of our youth are quite energetic, serious and responsible. After all, it is the youth who rush to protect

our society in times of war, not the adults who criticise them.

One great example of responsible youth of the 1930s, Ernie May, recently passed away in Atherton, aged 85. Kuranda owes much to this youth of the 1930s. Alan Hudson recently wrote an article in The Cairns Post on Ernie May's exploits. A short précis of Ernie's work on the Kuranda Range road seems relevant for the Kuranda Paper.

Ernie May was just 16 years old when he drove the first dozer in the Cairns area to form the Kuranda Range road in 1939. Until this time the only road access to the Atherton Tableland from the coast was by the single-lane Gillies Range from Gordonvale to Yungaburra. This road was then known as the Cairns Range road.

In the 1930s the Queensland Government was reluctant to spend funds on opening up new roads like a range road through Kuranda. It owned and operated the railway system and discouraged

Our young people are frequently under attack from their elders rejected all entreaties to construct an alternative road to the Tablelands. However, in 1939 the Government changed its tune, and the decision was made to construct a road through to Kuranda from Cairns. It is possible that those who were perceptive enough to recognise the Japanese threat to Australia's security persuaded the Government of the necessity for defence roads in the area.

> The Main Roads Department encouraged Ernie May's father to buy a dozer and take on the contract to form the range road. Even though Ernie had never even seen a dozer before this, he was appointed operator. He had to take a crash course before he could even shift the machine, but to his credit he soon became adept at operating the machine. Originally the road was to be single lane, but the job went so well that the engineer decided to construct it wide enough

to allow two-way traffic. The dozer, and its teenaged operator, proved so economical that the road was completed at double the planned width for well under the original cost. We owe much to this youth of the 1930s.

#### FOREST FORUM by The Fossils

You probably received notice of the public meeting to be held 4.30pm on February 4th at the QWCA Hall to discuss potential uses of the old Primary School site. However did you know that nominations had been called for and are now closed for community representation on the proposed Kuranda Advisory Committee? Interesting this advice was not as widely circulated or given on the same notice of meeting.

The previous long-serving KAC representatives are to be commended for their unreserved and often unrecognised commitment to ensuring that Kuranda's development achieved some balance between commercial and residents' interests. However this may be set to change!

It would be somewhat idealistic imagine that commercial and residents' interests necessarily coincide on all aspects of Village development. One has only to look at the previous Kuranda Town Plan and the striking failures to follow/implement many of its recommendations, particularly those relating to the preservation and enhancement of Kuranda's unique features. It will be interesting to note whether the new town plan, partly paid for by you and presently under development, will suffer the same neglect.

Well, who will represent Kuranda on the new KAC? It is proposed that this body is chaired by the State Member, Steve Wettenhall, with the Mayor, divisional councillor and one representative from KVPP, Chamber of Commerce, a tourist operator and a sole community representative.

While recognising many residents wear two or more hats - business operator/resident, it would seem that the proposed KAC is dominated by commercial interests business interests already represented by the Chamber of Commerce. A possible worst case scenario could be that every member of the proposed KAC has commercial interests in or connections to the tourist industry and no member may actually reside in Kuranda.

More disturbingly, the proposed committee to make recommendations on the Old Primary School site is again overrepresented by business and commercial interests despite this site being purchased and developed for resident/community needs. Again the same wheel-out of KVPP and Chamber of Commerce representatives on a development that has nothing to do with tourism/business and everything to do with community needs

Pushing scenarios further and with no apparent selection guidelines available, is it possible that the "community representative" could also be a member of KVPP, a member of the Chamber of Commerce and a tourist operator - giving rise to possible and serious conflicts of interest where the best interests of the town and its residents and not the individual's business interests are in contention...

It could well be asked whether KVPP and the Chamber of Commerce already have too much input into what and how development takes place in the Village. The proposed memberships of KAC and the Primary School site development really do little to open up decision making to residents and the wider community.

The tourist industry and its commercial spin-offs symbiotically entwine with the intrinsic natural beauties and charm of Kuranda and its environs. They cannot be separated. However, unlike businesses which come and go, the superstructure of Kuranda and its development intrinsically combine to present the visitor with the experience of "more than a village in the rainforest". Development will continue but balance must be achieved between the environment, residents' needs, sensibilities and aspirations for their town and the continued growth and development of its businesses.

With future possible scenarios deriving from downturn in economy, peak oil and global warming giving projections of reef degradation and long term tourist downturn, Kuranda must seek to retain and develop its own unique charms and character to continue to attract and hold its tourist visitors. This can only be achieved if KAC truly becomes representative of Kuranda - its residents and businesses with transparent, open and consultative processes marking its operations. Unfortunately, these processes seem somewhat lacking in the inception of the new KAC and do not bode well for open community access to recommendations that will affect the future of Kuranda. The whole process seems very much KAC handed!

Likewise the proposed membership of the Primary School site committee flies directly in the face of the stated aims of its purchase. Why the unseemly rush to closure? With the Mareeba Shire Council in caretaker mode and any decisions made having to receive ratification from the new Tablelands Council, are the powers that be and the movers and shakers concerned with their own retention of power? Surely both bodies need at the least, parity of business and resident representation.

mother Anne was very good about this and either slept on or got up and attended to her own writing. My parents did not believe in

The death of a parent is an expected part of the cycle of life and we humans are programmed to accept this event, but now it has happened I feel bereft. The last few nights have been filled with dreams of my mother standing small and vulnerable in a dark empty space. After a lifetime of being a couple she finds herself having to carry on

Ron achieved a fair amount of fame for the son of a teamster. He worked his way through art school in Melbourne and founded The Rams Skull Press then moved to North Queensland becoming an artist and writer of note. He received the Order of Australia Medal in 1992 for his documentation of Australian Folklore and Crafts, and received a Doctorate from Swinbourne University in 2000. #### CHANGES TO TABLELAND BUS SERVICE

Whitecars Bus Service, operating from Cairns to Atherton since 1926, "switched off the engines' on this route at the end of 2007. Increased financial costs and Government red tape have been cited as contributing factors for the closure. Whitecars served Kuranda well over the years.

Due to concerns of the travelling public, Trans North has been requested by Queensland Transport to continue with the operation of this service for as yet an undetermined time.

However, it is expected the period to be approximately three months. Trans North will continue to take passengers to the Cairns Airport, Trinity Wharf and hospitals and doctor surgeries in Cairns on request.

Trans North and Queensland Transport have entered an agreement to ensure continuation of vital passenger services and the State Government will now subsidise the service. A firm timetable is yet to be set.

#### TABLELANDS REGIONAL COUNCIL UPDATE

Confirmation received on official commencement of new Council and election preparations.

Information from the State Government presented to the Tablelands Regional Council Local Transition Committee (LTC) at its meeting on Friday 7 December confirms their commitment to have a new amalgamated Council operational in 2008.

"The Local Government Minister Warren Pitt has advised that the Councils of Atherton, Eacham, Herberton and Mareeba will officially close on midnight 14 March 2008. This is also the time the Tablelands Regional Council will commence and the Interim Chief Executive Officer Ian Church will officially become the Acting CEO of the new Council," said Committee Chair, Cr Ray Byrnes.

Cr Ray Byrnes encouraged potential candidates to become informed of the scope of the Tablelands Regional Council and let the public know of their interest in representation as early as possible.

Under the Local Government (Internal Boundaries) Regulation 2007, Internal Divisional Boundary Maps have now also been confirmed and are available on the Tablelands Regional Council Local Transition Committee website at www.tablelandsltc.qld.gov.au.

"The Electoral Commission of Queensland (ECQ) has announced that the 2008 Quadrennial Local Government Elections will be held on Saturday 15 March, with the electoral roll closing on Thursday 31 January 2008. Candidate nominations will close at 12.00 noon on Tuesday 19 February 2008," added Cr Byrnes.

Information for prospective candidates and voters will be available on the ECQ website at www.ecq. qld.gov.au. During the election period, the Commission will also be operating a Call Centre to assist with queries – phone 1300 881 665.

In a report by the Local Government Remuneration Tribunal, the Tablelands Regional Council has been classed as a category 5 Council, with the following range of remuneration recommended: Mayor \$101,250 to \$120,230 Deputy Mayor \$69,610 to \$85,430 Councillors \$60,120 to \$75,940

The LTC and Interim CEO are on track to provide a progress report on the amalgamation of the Tablelands Councils to the Director General by the end of this month, with extensive work achieved so far on ensuring minimal disruption to services for residents during the amalgamation process.

"A dedicated project team is working with staff of all four Shires to identify transition issues and how the new Council can achieve operational capability by March," said Interim CEO Ian Church.

"The commitment of staff to work collaboratively to achieve the best service levels and outcomes for our communities has been highlighted during recent workshops on how the new organisation will function," added Mr Church.

So far three Directors have been appointed as part of the new Organizational Structure endorsed by the LTC from existing Council managers.

The LTC are recommending that each Council contribute towards the purchase of microwave infrastructure to enable network connectivity between existing Council facilities so that the Tablelands Regional Council can operate as a decentralized organization for an initial period.

"The connectivity is essential to enable the new Council to operate one common business system and ensure appropriate communications between staff," stated Mr Church.

#### Updates now available on website

Updated Divisional Maps for the Tablelands Regional Council which will replace the Shires of Atherton, Eacham, Heberton and Mareeba following the 15 March elections are now available on the Local Transition Committee (LTC) website at www. tablelandsltc.qld.gov.au and at Council offices.

Produced by the Atherton Tableland Geographical Information Services (ATGIS), the eight Divisional Maps include road networks.

"With interest being shown from potential candidates, useful information is also available on the website for people interested in running for a position in the new Local Government," said LTC Chairperson

If you're too busy to be involved, at least you'd know that important decisions are open to review by interested members of this local community.





#### Garden Jottings by Alectura

ebuary should see the rains and the wise gardener will have fertilized and mulched, made sure of adequate drainage and secured against possible damage from water run-off. It is the time to prepare for cyclone activity with removal of trees and dead palm fronds posing possible damage and any other material likely to become airborne in strong winds. Now is the time to check ponds and other receptacles providing breeding grounds for mosquitoes. Also advised is a torchlight sweep of the garden for Cane toads which, if you are a frog breeder. can make damaging inroads into your frog population. Remember that the cane toad lays its eggs in rafts rather than a frothy mass and its young have pointed heads and rounded tails whereas most frog tadpoles are characterized by

rounded heads and pointed tails.

Plant of the Month: Cordyline
(Agavaceae formerly Liliaceae) – the
great tropical standby along with Crotons
to introduce colour and verve to your
ornamental garden The word Cordyline
comes from the Greek 'kordyle' meaning
a club, referring to the club-like roots of
some species.

Widely distributed with at least 15 species, from Hawaii through New Zealand, east coast of Australia, Indonesia to India, this large family and its many exciting hybrids gives a great choice in colour, leaf forms and textual punctuation. Of the easiest cultivation, forms are suitable for full-sun to dappled shade and a little homework before purchase will provide the best choice for situation. Easily grown from top cutting or from mature wood laid horizontally, the old adage applicable to both cordyline and croton striking holds: Take cuts when you put away the doona and stop when you replace.

While remarkably hardy once established, cordylines respond well to regular watering and feeding. Eight species occur naturally in Australia. These are C. cannifolia, C. congestalisted as rare, C. fruticosa, C. manners-suttoniae, C. murchisoniae, C. petiolaris, C. rubra and C. stricta. Although these are mainly all green foliaged plants, some highly prized variegated forms have been found.

Q. & A. Dear Graham, The purple flowering "ginger" is Dichorisandra thyrsiflora, not strictly a "ginger" but belonging to the vast family Commelinaceae. Easily grown in most situations although preferring afternoon shade, Dischordia is very amenable to pot cultivation. Readily stuck from

cutting, it prefers semi shade, adequate moisture and good feeding to produce multiple canes and good flowering. There is another species sometimes available D. regina with pronounced and striking markings on the juvenile growth, with mature leaves showing a very faint silver spotting. Flowering is the same. Another harder to obtain "blue ginger: is D. pendula, possibly not as vigorous, with a pendant flower spike in a rather washed-out blue.

Dear Lottie, Thank you for your letter. Securing of freshly cut banks requires thought and careful planting to avoid soil erosion and slippage. Hopefully the batter or angle of slope is not too steep and you might wish to consider one of the newer spray-on mulch covers in which to plant. I would advise heavy mulching held with temporary wire netting to cover and secure the raw earth until planting is established. Depending on aspect, banks with their usually good drainage can provide excellent spots for cultivation of many native shrubs and ground covers. Don't be too much of a purist in initial planting, using quick growing and easily propagated material which can be removed selectively when the bank is secured. Also think of maintenance. While many heliconias will do well on the slope, they will require regular cleanups and possible risk of accident when working the slope. Grassing the bank is also problematical in terms of its maintenance.

Dear Ilse, Anthuriums are easily propagated from seed and while initially slow growing give an excellent opportunity to increase stock. When seed is ripe, usually characterised by change from green to colour and lower fruit come away to touch, remove seed from fruit and plant on spaghnum moss as soon as possible. Keep moist and in shaded position and you should see germination in 14 - 30 days. Prick out when reaching 3 leaf stage into individual pots and grown on, moving along with fortnightly 1/2 strength liquid fertiliser. Remember that Anthuriums are essentially epiphytic so require very open and well drained medium.

Gardenia cuts up to 40cm of mature wood may be taken now and planted directly in ground. Strike is remarkably good.

Why is 'Art Process' Important

At many venues in the region during December, playgroups, childcare centres and primary schools displayed the end of year artworks of their little ones. At the Novatel Daycare, Palm Cove exhibition, an accompanying explanation sheet was provided to parents and grandparents to assist with understanding the Art Process of the displayed works created by their very young artists.

"Young children do art for the experience, the exploration, and the experimentation. In the 'process' of doing art, they discover creativity, mystery, joy and frustration which are all important pieces in the puzzle of learning. Whatever the resulting masterpiece - be it a bright sticky glob or a gallery worth piece - it is only a result to a young child, not the reason for doing art in the first place.

Art Process allows children to explore, discover, and manipulate their worlds. Sometimes the process is sensory, such as feeling slippery, cool paint on bare fingers. Other times it is a mystery of colours blending unexpectedly or the surprise of seeing a realistic picture evolve from a random blob of paint."

The experimentation and learning process continues throughout the life of an artist. It is not exclusive to the very young. New products and new techniques require our artists to keep abreast of the conceptual possibilities of their selected art mediums, and many artists continue to attend hands-on workshops of varying kinds for most of their working life. Working with a group will stimulate, exercise and feed the creative impulses. However, the passion for art and an ability to work independently are also important, as is the desire to develop your own ideas, experience and relationship with contemporary art and craft.

The Arts Co-op members were very sad to lose one of their longest and active members. Artist Jan Fowell died in Kuranda unexpectedly just before Christmas.

Jan was born and educated in Sydney. She travelled extensively in Europe and Africa for seven years before settling in Kuranda in 1983. Jan attended Cairns TAFE College for 3 years undertaking courses in introductory art and design, printmaking and fine arts.

Jan last exhibited with Arts Co-operative group at the Cairns Regional Gallery in 2005. In that 'Growth' exhibition Jan featured a 3 metre beautiful, elongated wall scroll on a pine batten. It was entitled 'Wallerdown' and was a patchwork 'fall' of silk fabrics and handmade rice and abaca papers, with her highly regarded hand and machine stitching techniques and transfer prints.

Jan was also extremely artistic with the written word. Her letters, poetry and short stories were regular features in the Kuranda paper. Jan loved the verdancy and rich diversity of the tropical rainforest and she was very much influenced by these factors in her artwork and her daily life. Jan expressed publicly her concerns for the future of this unique and fragile Wet Tropics region.

Jan will be long remembered by the Kuranda community for the Mareeba Shire Council's permanent collection of her framed pen and ink drawings of Kuranda's historical buildings currently hanging in the Kuranda Library. This collection is a very befitting legacy of Jan's fine draughtsmanship and art integrity.





#### 2008 – THE VIEW FROM THE STARS

Let's cast a birthchart for the starting point of 2008: on the international date line; at the equator on the stroke of midnight 1st January 2008. It's a very exciting birthchart. On three of the 'angles' or powerpoints of the chart we have planets sitting: the moon on the ascendant; Mars on the midheaven and the sun on the Nadir. Immediately we can see that this is no ordinary year. An exact three quarter moon sitting right on the Libran ascent at the centre of the world. This speaks strongly of balance. Feeling the need to create balance on and with the earth; with each other and within ourselves.

The sun sits right on the deepest foundation point of the chart in Capricorn, indicating the emerging of a vital force to lay strong foundations, bring order and look to the future with a patient, long term perspective. And Mars, culminating at the high point of the chart right on the 0 degree Cancer point, exactly opposite Pluto and Jupiter. Mars culminating is always a winner, Pluto and Jupiter drive very hard and the Cancer points represents tribe, community, family and all that nourishes, nurtures and protects. The star, Murzam, sits right on the midheaven. Tradition has it that this meaning of Murzam is "carrying a message" so, what's the message of the chart? Well, astrologically Mercury

is the messenger (and the magician!) and Mercury is conjunct the Sun and part of an aspect pattern called a "mystic rectangle" involving for planets and the midheaven. Applied to the skin the Essential oils have a great influence in regulating the activity of the capillaries and restoring vitality to the tissue. Their influence on the psychic and mental states are also very important.

During the First World War a distinguished chemist R.H. Gatefosse made a lot of experiments on soldiers and found out that through the skin it was possible to get these oils to the extra cellular liquids which in their turn carried them to the blood and lymph then to the organs. This process takes 3 – 6 hours in a healthy individual, 6 – 12 otherwise.

Having burnt his hand during experimentation in his laboratory Gatefosse plunged it into a container of lavender essence, in a few hours the burns had disappeared.

The essential oils help tissues to repair quickly, in his book "Aromatherapic" Doctor Jean Valnet tells the story of a young patient of his whose neck was very scarred following an application of a very hot poultice when a child. After using the essential oils in compresses the scarring was so much improved as to be hardly noticeable.

In cosmetology the essential oil preparations are mixed with vegetable oil (hazelnut oil, avocado, and pear oil for example). They act on the different organs which can be responsible for the skin condition. Dermatitis, eczema, acne, diffused redness are treated with aromatic compositions (a cutaneous lesion is the result after all of an organic deficiency).

They act as regulators in ageing skins, tired tissues, vary dry and dehydrated skins, oedematic conditions, The skin is the greatest organ of the body, and to allow the essential oils to penetrate well it must be in good condition,

A Thought for February

This month we read a short passage from St Matthew's Gospel Chapter 4 verse 13-16.

One of the most wonderful things we can do for someone is to affirm them. We can help them to become aware that we think a great deal of them and therefore expect much from them. It is not enough just to feel this; we have to express it. This is where we often fail. Sometimes we fail most with those who are closest to us and whom we love the most.

Failing to affirm others can also cost a great deal in the workplace. In both family life and with our colleagues or employees we can for a long time assume that they are fully aware of our appreciation of their performance, so we fail to mention it. They do not feel they can ask us and keep wondering until the relationship is damaged.

Jesus was careful again and again to affirm people, making it clear that he thought they had a great deal to give if they only chose to do so. He was equally ready to question their motives and actions if he felt it necessary, just as, we must if relationships are to be honest and real.

In this Gospel passage Jesus is surrounded by a crowd on a hillside near the Sea of Galilee. He turns to them and says something so affirming and generous that we use it to this day. Jesus says simply, "You are the salt of the earth". But immediately he emphasizes that being the salt of the earth, being gifted, being useful, being creative, brings with it responsibility. The question then is how we use and offer what we have been given [v 13].

Again Jesus affirms his listeners. He says-You are the light of the world." Once more he immediately asks us to be accountable to God for the gifts and qualities that may entail [v 14]. We may be the salt of the earth and the light of the world, but we will be so only if our gifts are directed out from ourselves towards others. If they are all directed into our selves and our own interests, then that which makes us salt and light is useless to God. The whole value of salt is its effect beyond itself. The whole point of light is to reach out and to guide.





Schools News

The school year recommences on Tuesday 29 January 2008 and for all new and returning students and their parents I would like to wish you a very rewarding educational experience at your chosen school.

I am very pleased that Education Queensland has designated 2008 as the "Year of Physical Activity in Queensland Schools". Teachers will incorporate physical activity into each student's school days. Throughout the year, the department will also be promoting related events to look out for like Walk to School Day. More information is available on the website www.education.qld.gov/au/schools/healthy/physicalactivity.

Kuranda District State College achieved outstanding results in 2007 with all applicants for a university place receiving an offer. This is a credit to the students and their teachers at KDSC. As well, student achievements were recognised at the Wet Tropics Management Authority Cassowary awards in late December 2007.

Congratulations to students from the Bama Dayal Dance group for receiving the young cassowary award for communicating their culture through song, dance and art and to Ben Spahr for receiving the encouragement award for studying water quality in the Barron River.

Expected enrolments for 2008 are 433 with ten primary school classes at capacity so it is great that the local community is showing such confidence in the excellent new facilities and, most importantly, the standard of education being offered at Kuranda. Kuranda Range Road Update

Since the introduction of the 60 km/h limit on December 15 last year there have been no accidents on the range which is a credit to the patience and attitude of all drivers. Let's hope we can maintain that over the rest of the wet season.

Following a spate of serious incidents on the range road last year, I requested Main Roads to review safety on the road and I am pleased that a comprehensive package of measures is being implemented including:

-The installation of a new section of 120 meters of the guardrail in mid December 2007. A further 880 meters of additional guard rail is expected to take place after the 2008 wet season. -Improvement of signage and line marking for the pull-off areas to make it easier for motorists to safely use these areas. Expected completion date of April 08.

-Re-design of road line marking in the vicinity of Henry Ross Lookout, including the entry and exit, to improve safety to motorists stopping at this location. Expected completion date, end of March 08.

-Establishment of two pull-off bays for commercial bus operators at Saddle Mountain and Black Mountain Road. These sites currently actas informal drop-off points by bus companies, including for school children. Expected completion date, end of February 08.

Removal of shoulder drop-offs.
 This will be carried out in conjunction with the next asphalt resurfacing program on the range road. Expected completion date is end of February 08.

-Replacement of all worn and damaged road signage on range road including the upgrading of signage at curves. To be carried out over the 2008 wet season.

-Replacement of all damaged and missing Road Edge Guide Posts. To be carried out over the 08 wet season.

-Provision of audible linemarking on the centre and edge lines for the length of the range road. Programmed to take place in July 08.

-Continued use of temporary variables (VMS) at the top and bottom of the range road, while permanent VMS are being procured, to alert motorists to road hazards and changed traffic conditions particularly due to periods of wet weather.

I am particularly pleased that Main Roads has agreed to my request to trial a SMS messaging system for motorists on Kuranda Range Road. This commenced on January 2, 2008. To date, over 200 people have registered.

I strongly urge road users to take advantage of this free trial service. The more people that register, the more likely it is that the service will become permanent. To register, phone Main Roads during business hours on 4050 5425. I'll have more to report on future developments on the KRR in my next column. Until then, take care and have a great 2008.

#### TAEKWONDO More than just a Martial Art

What makes Taekwondo so popular throughout the world? Let us look to linking the positive aspects of regular training and how this benefits the participant within their personal lives.

The student who has dedicated considerable time and energy into developing their knowledge and ability in the Art of Taekwondo will develop an inner strength that will be of great benefit to them when interacting with others. A competent Taekwondo practitioner will demonstrate a high level of control and understanding, while being compassionate with their peers. He/she will have the conviction to stand up for what is known to be right, yet be humble enough to accept responsibility when they are wrong.

A devoted Taekwondo student will have the motivation to get things done. Not only will they be focused on their training, but equally as important they will maintain focus on personal matters. This could be within the family circle, ensuring those close to them are provided with support and understanding. It could be keeping motivated with work or study commitments. Motivation is about setting small achievable goals and following through, never losing sight of where the path will lead. Without motivation we lack the drive to succeed.

The benefits of Taekwondo encompass the body, mind and spirit. As one trains, the physical fitness, coordination and balance of the student is soon recognized. More subtly though, the mental or rather, emotional disposition of the student can be strengthened. A dedicated student will be courteous, respectful, humble, and yet confident in their demeanor. Once more this will be reflected not only within the dojang, but also in the mainstream society. Without asking, this type of person will be acknowledged for these admirable traits and I believe this often leads to great opportunities for that person.

It has been established that people who train regularly are noticeably fit, both mentally and physically. Therefore, when translated into the workforce or academic arena, these people are often better prepared to cope with the stresses and strains sometimes encountered in day to day living.

Taekwondo is the link pin to maintaining a healthy balanced life, one where the stresses associated with external influences are minimized.

It is clear to see the overall benefits of those who choose to study and train in the Art of Taekwondo, as developed and documented by the late General Choi Hong Hi, will follow the stepping stones of promotion not only within the Taekwondo curriculum, but also on a personal level within their communities.



Nursery stock at our temporary nursery site has grown from 5,000 to 13,000 seedlings, mostly ready for planting out by Envirocare and the Green Corridor team this wet season. Trees are also available for local residents; just give us a call to make sure we're around to help with your selection.

Envirocare has succeeded in having conditions imposed on a major development in cassowary habitat at Speewah, and led community opposition to the urbanization of Myola. We have also greatly improved our website – visit us at envirocare.org.au

Myola Plan - update

Kuranda Envirocare has been very busy with planning issues, particularly since Mareeba Shire released the new Myola Plan in September. Community opposition to the urbanisation of Myola has led us to work together with other environment groups under the Save Myola banner to oppose the proposed plan. Over 750 signatures have been collected on our petition.

John Beasley and Cathy Retter attended the Mareeba Shire Council meeting of 4th December on behalf of Kuranda Envirocare and the Save Myola working group, presenting the case for not proceeding with the Myola Plan. Since then the Council has sent a survey to Myola land owners. Concerned and confused survey recipients phoned council and Save Myola group members to voice their concerns about the two limited options being provided. A third option was devised by the Save Myola group and suggested in a survey form, hand delivered to Myola residents. Council did not make a decision at their January 15th meeting as anticipated, and are studying submissions.

#### Rainforest tree identification workshop

Kuranda Envirocare will be running a couple of free rainforest tree identification workshops this year, one on a weekend and one during the week. Seeds we'd love to get

Bring in seeds for identification (some leaves as well if you can reach them). Watch out for Candlenut, Damson Plum and Northern Silky Oak seeds. We'd love to propagate more in the nursery so bring them in or we'll come and collect them. Remember we'll always swap seeds we need now for plants whenever you're ready to plant.

Tree of the month - By Druce Horton

"Willows whiten, aspens quiver, Little breezes dusk and shiver Through the wave that runs for ever By the island in the river Flowing down to Camelot."

These lines from Tennyson's "Lady of Shalott" could apply to our tree of the month - Mallotus paniculatus. I am not usually enamoured with common names but the common name for this tree - "turn-in-the-wind" is a good one. Like the willows whitening in Tennyson, this Mallotus has a white underside which is revealed when there is a wind blowing. The leaf is heart shaped and has a long leaf stem. It is a member of the Euphorbia family and many species in this family are pioneer species. The Euphorbias often have a pair of glands where the leaf stem joins the leaf blade. These glands produce a secretion which attracts ants which then defend the tree against attack by other insects.

Veivers Dr. with pink flagging tape on their trunks:

1) When going in to town, on the left - about 15 metres back from the 'Aged on side road' sign just before Barang St, and 2) When going out of town, on the left -about 50 metres back from the Veivers St.

These trees have just completed flowering and the fruit are developing. Like many other rainforest trees, the flowers are fairly inconspicuous. The fruit has three valves and is covered with rubbery bristles. They contain 2-3 seeds which are a shiny brown or black when ripe.

intersection. This one is partly overhanging the road.

Mallotus paniculatus is very fast growing and is an excellent species for revegetation in Kuranda. However, a botanic garden near Byron Bay renamed this Mallotus "grows-too- well" as it escaped from the botanic garden into the surrounding forest.

Remember, the definition of a weed is 'a plant growing in the wrong place'. A tree which is native to Australia may still be a weed if it is not native to your area. So, when planting trees for revegetation, try to use species which are not only native, but are also known to naturally occur in your local area.

#### First Primary Industries Ministerial Forum to be held in Cairns

Hon. ## PlatypusThe Greek

Did you know that the word "platypus" is actually a Greek word meaning "flat-footed"? This therefore means that the correct plural of platypus is platypus or platypuses.

Because the word "Platypus" had already been used by the scientific community to name a group of beetles, the scientific name of our favourite local monotreme (egglaying mammal) became the Latin: Ornithorhynchus anatinus, meaning "bird-like snout similar to a duck". For everyday purposes of course, we still refer to this animal as the duck-billed platypus.

Right, that's the academic bit done with.... some questions you may have...?

Where can I see platypus?

Locally, try the creek and billabong in the



Boonooloo Reserve at the bottom of Kelly Road in Speewah; local dams and creeks on private properties around Kuranda and Speewah; Atherton Platypus Park; Tarzali Lakes (south of Malanda); Lake Tinnaroo; Yungaburra platypus viewing platform, to name just a few. Taronga Park Zoo in Sydney has platypus and the platypussary at Healesville Sanctuary (an hour's drive out of Melbourne in the Yarra Valley) is also a "must-see" (and they were also the first successful breeders of a young platypus in captivity). What do I look for?

Air bubbles and a large circular ripple(s), or a bow wave as the animal moves torpedo-like through the water, before "rounding out" or turning its body as it dives. Platypus are very active feeders at dawn and dusk (and through the night too). Contrary to common belief, they are frequently seen around midday, plopping between lilly pads looking for food, and especially if it's a bright sunny day. They tend to float low in the water, but may sometimes just float to the surface and surprise you, like a crocodile!

What do platypus like to eat? Tropical freshwater crayfish-"red claws", freshwater shrimp, small snails and worms are their favourite food. Happy platypus spotting – patience and quietness could be rewarded.




