Reference meeting of Consultative Group (Ratepayers and Residents) at Kuranda RSL and Bowls Sports and Social Centre, Fallon Road, Kuranda, Wednesday, 17/2/93.

I congratulate Cr June Rees on her composure during the repeated demands by a belligerent Chairman Cr Chris Lewis and an embarrassed Cr Wally Gray that she "Shut Up".

Dear Kuranda Paper,

The Consultative Group meeting at the Sports Club on Feb 17th made me optimistic. For years most Kuranda residents have taken little interest in our local government affairs. Over 60 people attended on the 17th to know more of how badly the Shire Council is treating Kuranda ratepayers. We are never consulted, and seven of the eight councillors live far from us.

Local government policy says Councils should work with ratepayers not against them. In todays news the Cairns City Council is in the headlines as three councillors have spoken out against the disregard of

people's wants. On the 17th we were told how the strategic plan was altered at Council's dictates (not our wishes). All hush hush till now.

Council's decision to invest Grant money in a Mareeba Sporting complex is a shocker. This money is Kuranda's allocation for roads, etc. You will read more about this elsewhere in the paper and about decisions taken at the meeting.

I hope ratepayers enthusiasm for our environment will bring them often to C.G. meetings, on the 3rd Wed of each month. Let's make our voice heard. You can ask questions and make comments but no long speeches. All residents can attend. Ring me on 937205 if you need more info. We must fight against Council's desires to ruin our environment by allowing thousands of trees to be cut down and hundreds of homes built and re-zoning into small blocks. The Strategic Plan is our safeguard.

For 25 years I have taken a keen interest in our Mareeba Council. I was chairman of Ratepayers and Residents Association in the mid-seventies. The Kuranda Consultative Group includes the role of a ratepayers association.

CAIRNS, MULGRAVE PROPOSED AND MAREEBA SHIRE DUMP

Kuranda resident should be aware of plans to establish a regional land fill dump to cater for Cairns and Mulgrave Shires' rubbish. These Shire Councils in conjunction with Mareeba Council have identified an area of State Forest land in the Lamb Range adjacent to Kennedy Highway as the preferred site to the dump.

The site is situated between two major tributaries of the Barron River, the Clohesy River and Davies Creek and the future risk of pollution to these streams and underground water supplies is a real threat. Residents of Speewah, Koah, and the Kuranda reticulated supply draw water from

It is understood that it is intended to truck the waste up the range and approximately 20


truck loads a day would be involved. How many could this lead to in the future.


A public meeting of concerned residents of the Koah/Speewah areas held in September resulted in the formation of a volunteer group, The Barron River Catchment Dump Watch Network, whose main objectives are a. to stop any land fill dump from being established in the catchment area of the Barron and b. to encourage our elected Council to look at alternative systems of waste disposal eg. recycling/composting. A Geotechnical survey and Risk Assessment of the site is reported to begin in the near future.

There is no provision for public participation in this process despite Council advice that community consultation would be involved in the process.

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AROUND THE RIDGES

Every year each division in the Shire has set down a three year road works programme in accord with funding available (separate to maintenance and reseals). Basically in Div.4 the practice has been for Councillor Gray, myself and the deputy engineer together to inspect as many of the roads (Kuranda to Carbine) as possible, to jointly deliberate priorities for future works inclusive to current listings. We heed advice from foremen, overseers and the engineer and try to fairly distribute funding available (40%/60%). The priorities can change with various circumstances.

It has been estimated to cost approx. \$60,000 to seal 1/4 km of an average rural road. Cuttings and drainage problems in steep or floodprone areas naturally increase the cost. Mason Road

was on the 1992/3 priority list.

After heated discussions with Mason Road representatives, a developer and the public in general at the People's Meeting last Wednesday night, without any consultation with me at the Council's general meeting the following day Councillor Gray advised the deputy engineer to cancel the existing road works programme. I have not been advised further. Reactions such as this cannot be seen to be helpful toward road problems in the Kuranda area.

Apology: On behalf of the Mareeba Shire Council, my deepest regrets to Mr Wentworth for the manner in which he was treated and spoken to at the public meeting Wed night. I have received many phone calls regarding the lack of respect and decorum delivered publicly to you. Please accept this apology.

CONSENT / SUB DIV./ TOWN PLANNING APPLICATIONS. Answers to concerns.

- 1. All residents are entitled to forward their individual objections to their local authority (M.S.C.) on the above within the advertised time.
- 2. Objections should be valid and reasonable and relate to the current gazetted Town Planning documents. - ie:
- a. The Town Planning Scheme for the Shire.
- b. The Development Control Plan Village and environs (still current.)
- c. The Draft Strategic Plan (Not gazetted.)
- d. The Bylaws of M. S.C. (Town Planning section.)
- e. The Planning and Environment Act.
- f. Advertised Council Policies.
- 3. Your letters of objection cannot at a later date be used by an applicant to sue you. (Threaten nor harrass - see other laws.) 4. An applicant is not privy to objections until after they have been tabled at the Council meeting on the date the application is decided upon. Recently an application was made to Council stating a certain proposed use, one week before Council considered this application the applicant informed me in detail that the proposed use was quite different and not truly set out in the application. It is my duty to make these facts known to Council. I could not make a consideration in Council knowing this. Threatened litigation did not sway me. I put it to the electorate - if your neighbour was setting up a prohibited use in your zoning - would you expect me to carry out my duty as your councillor?
- 5. The local authority will file your objection and have no further use for it after the application referred to has completed its course through the system.
- The above documents can be purchased from the M.S.C. government Printer Brisbane or borrowed for perusal from me. (maps at Council counter - Engineering section.)
- 7. Applications on display for public perusal are in a box on the counter rates section.

LEAGUES CLUB COMPLEX.

The Shire Chairman, Councillor Lewis has had equal opportunity in all published articles plus a half front page of a local paper with no adverse comments plus three radio broadcasts to put across to the Shire the facts and figures of this public investment of \$1.400,000 on behalf of the M.S.C. A fair deal for impressionable publicity and opportunity to negate omissions or reasonable usual errors throughout all articles.


At a public meeting in Kuranda both Cr. Lewis and Cr. Gray were given the opportunity to give it their best- all this prior to the vote taken - 100% against. I believe the Mareeba residents are following suit.

If you mess up, don't worry - just ask for another paper. Most important is just CAST YOUR VOTE !!



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THE SPEEWAH DISTRICT RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION INC:

Held it's second annual general meeting on Sunday 7th February. Outgoing chairman John Beasley spoke of the work done in the previous year, with increasing involvement of the Association and it's members with broader Community issues including the Cairns Mulgrave Traffic Study and the Barron River Catchment workshop. Concern over inappropriate approvals by Council of park residential development had lead to a deputation meeting with a representative of the Department of Local Government in Cairns, communication with the Minister on the issue and cooperation with other groups in the area concerned with this issue.

The meeting was outraged to learn that Mareeba Shire Council had made major changes to the proposed Strategic Plan of the Kuranda area and that the amended plan would be sent to the Minister for approval without further consultation with the community. The Association has written to Council expressing it's concern, and is calling for the retention of existing Development Control Plan for Kuranda environs, which offers some protection to the area. There is doubt whether the Strategic Plan actually offers any security, even in it's modified form, as it appears Council may ignore it at it's discretion.

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KURANDA CONSULTATIVE GROUP

As you may have read in the Cairns Post or heard on the street, this months meeting was a very interesting meeting with approx. 70 people attending. Council came in for some stiff criticism and a number of motions were passed.

*Terry Pates requested details re: \$1.3 million labour intensive program with Commonwealth funding for projects. Some work has already commenced and will include sewerage, footpaths, footbridge in jungle walk. June will furnish breakdown for next meeting.

*Marjorie Spear questioned whether the 1985 DCP Plan needs to be retained along with the Strategic Plan, as written about in a letter to the Kuranda Paper by Jax Bergerson. Chris Lewis said the town planner feels the Strategic Plan overrides the DCP. June Rees explained that the DCP (1985) is in 2 parts- covering 1 the village and 2 the environs. The overall view for the whole Shire is covered very broadly by the Strategic Plan, whilst the DCP involves more localised, detailed controls. June tabled the minutes of a recent council meeting where the Strategic Plan was amended before being sent to the Minister.

June felt it was absolutely essential to retain DCP until a new DCP comes in. She said that residents have complained about the amendments. Brian Edwards representing the Speewah District said the complaints from the Speewah District Residents Assoc bear witness to this. The Strategic plan with amendments will now go to the Minister.

* A landowner has cut down trees right to the riverbank at Black Mountain. June said that Water Resources was investigating, there is terrible erosion and it posed a worrying precedent. The area along the river should be declared a recreation reserve. Photographs detailing the damage were circulated. Motion moved by Paul Fisk.

"That the Consultative Group write on behalf of Kuranda residents and encourage the Dept of Forestry, Water Resources Commission and Dept of Lands to investigate and prosecute the individual/s responsible for the illegal clearing of public land next to the Barron River at Black Mountain Rd, Kuranda and that the area be revegetated to its original condition at the expense of the individual/s. M.Spear seconded. Passed. Motion by Jim Mealing:

"That we ask the Mareeba Shire Council to investigate the range and extent of infestation of the noxious climber Thunbergia Grandiflrora in the Mareeba Shire and set in place a program to eliminate it ASAP." Seconded Terry Pates. Carried.

Ms Jax Bergerson, Greenhills- tabled minutes of MSC meeting re amendments to Strategic Plan and a copy of her presentation re same, which she then read. She moved that: "those electors here present this evening representing the public voice of this community CENSURE Councillor Wally Gray for his action taken on the 4th of February, in overriding the wishes of the residents of Kuranda, and in moving the amendment to the draft

Strategic Plan as mentioned .. and .. that Council move to REVOKE THE MOTION carried at its meeting on the 4th of February to amend the draft Strategic Plan" seconded by June Crooke, Mason Road.

Chris Lewis complained at what he considered a personal attack on Wally Gray. Bob Colefax, Mason Rd then addressed the meeting, introducing himself as a long term resident involved in the Park Residential developments proposed for Mason Rd. Chris Lewis said the example of testing being inadequate at Top Of The Range development related to not testing every block. This would be rectified and no block which did not pass test would be sold.

John Beasley, Speewah, said he feels conned by the amendments and changes. Marjorie Spear asked Chris Lewis- why can't people be directed to move into land beyond Kuranda, towards Mareeba. Chris said the Kuranda area was one of the fastest growing in North Queensland and residents would have to face up to the real world and accept the changes coming. Gayle Hannah said that taking that to its logical (illogical) conclusion if we are to attempt to house the overflow from the coast in Kuranda we will have houseboats on the Barron to cope with influx and what are needed are guidelines for appropriate land use. June Crooke, Mason Rd asked why development was not being directed to the massive proposal at Southedge? John Beasley said this discussion did not address the key issue which was that Kuranda was fortunate to have such great natural beauty and that it was Council's responsibility to set guidelines for the preservation of its natural resources and assetts and to make sure that all development was carefully undertaken and in consultation with residents. Better areas should be protected by such guidelines as in the original DCP and preserved as scenic areas not carved up for intensive residential developments which could go elsewhere. The motion was passed 21 to 9. More discussion at next meeting.

Mason Road roadworks- Barry Wright, Mason Rd said that the road was in terrible condition with the corner of Mason Rd and Fallon Rd was an "accident waiting to happen". On a lighter note he asked if it was true that council was going to donate potatos for planting in deep trenches and ruts caused by traffic and rain. June Rees said that in her opinion Mason Rd is number one priority road but she is also beset by residents from other areas.

Barry Wright then moved "We the residents urge council to upgrade Mason Road immediately to a standard comparable with other roads in the Kuranda area and not languish whilst council waits for the developer to take action."This was seconded by Wally Gray, who added however that the residents of Mason Road would have to bear the wrath of residents from other areas whose road maintenance would be severely affected by the decision if accepted by council. Carried.

Mareeba Shire Council proposal to build a LEAGUES CLUB in Mareeba: Chris Lewis said the funds were mostly from the Commonwealth grants commission-to use as councils see fit- as well as partly funded by sale of land and other sources. He said that Council was going into the profit-making scheme because every year there were so many requests for sporting facilities. The assessment of the possible returns of the scheme suggested that in 3-5 years there would be enough money to put back into the community. Gayle Hannah asked what was the amount that Division 4 would contribute and what were the

benefits to the people of Kuranda? Chris could not be specific saying the sources of funding were complex. Greg Wallace slammed the council for creating more facilities in Mareeba while Kuranda had none. He said youth was feeling the pain with 'break and enter' the new game for young people with no sporting or recreational facilities. Krishna Buhler said that since council recognised that Kuranda was such a fast growing area, perhaps council could recognise that it has special needs. Jim Mealing moved the motion: "that this meeting advise MSC that we insist that no money available for projects in Division 4 be invested in the Davies Park extension project" seconded by Barry Wright, Mason Rd.

Carried unanimously.

Bill Nichols- spoke on the Koah Road Landfill Dump. He said council could not guarantee nothing will go wrong and that the Dept Local Gov asks them to state what machinery you have to fix mistakes. He asked that we all object to a dump anywhere on the Barron river (Catchment System). Chris Lewis suggested Koah area nominate ONE person as a contact to liase with the council ASAP and send name to council.

Next meeting Wednesday 17th March at Sports & Social at 7.30pm. This will be a very important meeting and will include election of a new committee and proposed changes to the structure of the Consultative Group - with the aim of creating a more effective community representative group. There will be an election and discussion re incorporation, change of name, membership etc. THIS WILL BE A VERY IMPORTANT MEETING __DON"T MISS IT

THE BLUE NURSES' RAPPORT

PHYSIO

Have you ever wondered what that Infamous "dise" in your back is? The discs in the back are known as intervertebral discs because they form the joints between all the vertebral bodies along the length of the spine. The discs are made of concentric rings of fibro-cartilage surrounding a central mass of pulpy tissues called the nucleus pulposis.

I find it a useful analogy to view the nucleus as a small water-filled balloon as it is compressed evenly between the vertebral bodies the "balloon" will tend to bulge evenly outwards. If it is compressed on one side only, as in bending forwards, backwards or sideways, it will tend to bulge away from the pressure. If there is a tear in the concentric rings of the disc the nucleus will bulge into the tear. In a "slipped disc" the tear in the rings is extensive enough that the nucleus spreading into the tear either causes the fibrous part of the disc to bulge out and hit surrounding structures or the disc tears completely allowing the nucleus to spill out and hit the surrounding tissues and this is what causes pain.

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
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CHANGE COMES TO POST OFFICE

SWIMMING NDA OL'55 MAST

MALANDA OL'55 MASTERS

On Saturday, 30th January, three intrepid Kuranda swimmers, Gerda Williams, Pam and Ron Elgar, set off to compete in the Masters swimming at Malanda. A good crowd and a pleasantly warm pool, but during the day approximately 6 inches of rain fell.

We all froze waiting for our various events; some competitors went quite blue! No medals this time, but an esky donated by the sponsors, Malanda Milk, containing various dairy product goodies was given to the winner of each age group. Gerda Williams was the star of the carnival, winning two National and five State records. She was the outright winner of her new age group 50-54. Gerda broke the previous Australian best in the 100m breaststroke with a time of 1.37.3, slashing more than one second off the old mark of 1.38.4. But her win in the 100m individual medley was even more convincing: her time of 1.28.34 sliced four seconds off the old mark of 1.32.45.

The State records for a short course pool which fell in her wake were the 50m backstroke, 50m breaststroke and 25m breaststroke. She is expected to re-write the record books in her new age group from now on.

In my Feb article about delicious yellow passion fruits I was quoted as saying they have harder skins than the purple passion. An unfortunate printing error. --- Yellow passions have thinner skins than the purple -- that is why they have a shorter shelf life.

Tropical fruits are at their best in the wet summer months but it important to pick them for their best flavour at the peak time. Too soon, little taste - too late, too soft, or the birds etc have got there first.

As many tropical fruits remain green in colour when ripe, the following hints may help new growers. On April 7th the Cairns Rare Fruits have Mike Fabian, expert horticulturalist, as guest speaker, and he will answer all queries on What When and How to grow. Time 7.30pm at the Cairns Library Hall, phone me 937205.

Q. When are these fruits at the correct maturity for picking?

- 1. BLACK SAPOTE (Chocolate pudding fruit) Like many fruits the size varies, but usually the fruits on any one tree are about the same size. The main crop ripens in the cooler months but with plenty of moisture two crops a year can be expected. This is a green fruit but the green turns to a pale green towards maturity. At the apex of the fruit (where attached to the tree) is a circular frilled calyx. Pick the fruit when the calyx curves upwards and the colour is pale green. Store carefully and check daily for softness. This fruit can soften completely overnight. When soft put in fridge to delay ripening but not for a long period.
- 2. SOURSOP. A truly delicious fruit, it is also a green fruit which lightens to pale green on maturity. The fruit skin is covered with raised soft short spines. These subside on maturity. The fruit when picked will not be soft but it will soften ready for eating in a day or so after picking depending on the warmth of the weather. If picked too soon the flavour is bitter. Soursops usually fruit in early spring in Kuranda but with a dry winter mine fruited Jan/Feb as we had lots of rain and I do not irrigate. If you rub the pulp through a metal colander the extracted juice is delicious for

drinks or ice cream.


3. CARAMBOLAS... (Five-cornered fruit) When to pick depends on the variety. All must be well filled out which happens quickly in the summer when they ripen. Fruit fly love them, so pick as soon as possible (unless you have them netted). Some varieties always remain green but turn a light green. Some turn yellow. Best to pick before fully mature and let them ripen for a few days under cover. If your tree has a big crop pick off all small immature fruit for compost. It is like thinning grapes. It is important to pick up all fruit that drops and obviously contains fruit flies. Thinning the fruit makes less dropped fruit.

LEAFY VEGETABLES can be a problem in the wet, but travellers to the Pacific know that many so-called weeds are eaten by the indigenous people. We have many in our gardens, eg the leaves of the black-fruited nightshade. The berries are delicious and make a super jam. NEVER eat the red-berried nightshade; it is poisonous. All chilli bush leaves are edible.

There are many tropical fruit trees that produce edible leaves eg your mulberry and soursop leaves. Some people like the Durian and Jak fruit leaves. I like the very young leaves and tendrils of the choko vine and also of wing beans. Pumpkin tips are favoured by some, and are a good way of controlling the plant.

There are many other, all very hardy and never eaten by insects. My favourite remains the sweet leaf bush Sauropus. Just strip off the young leaves and they grow again in two days. Eat them raw or lightly cooked. Sauropus grows from a cutting and is perennial.

During this wet season my Heliconias and ginger flowers are spreading. Anyone wanting some roots can have some for free, dug by you with your own spade. Phone me 937205. It is good weather for striking cuttings. I can give hardy and pretty striking material.


MIGO O MOMENTS.

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

It is known that his parents were Christians. His father might have been a deacon and civil official. In his youth Patrick was carried off by Irish raiders and spent six years as a slave, devoting himself in prayer and meditation to God. He then escaped, returned to his family and later travelled to Gaul for training and ordination to the priesthood.

Young Patrick though had a calling. It kept saying "Return to Ireland". So Patrick set sail back to Ireland. Tradition tells us it was the year

There were some Christians in Ireland. They had a Bishop "Pallanius" yet they had made no impression among the common folk.

When Patrick arrived he preached and taught with zeal, far and wide, north and south.

He confronted the High King Laohaire. He silenced the Druids. Legend has it he also expelled the snakes. In 444 he established the Episcopal See of Armagh.

He was also a great encourager of the monastic life. Towards this life he spent 40 days in retreat at Crachan in Mayo. Even to this day Croagh-Patrick pilgrimages are still made.

The best known story of Patrick was told to me one Trinity Sunday, Patrick was trying to teach the Irish about the Trinity.

Three Gods in One God

Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

He had been getting nowhere. He hung his head in exasperation with eyes closed. As he opened them he saw the shamrock, three leaves in one. A trinity of creation. His pupils quickly understood.

What stands out is Patrick's sense of being called by God and his answering of the call with vigor, determination and modesty.





What a little imagination can do to a plain wall and window! One of the units in Barang Street has had attractive window boxes and shutters added, and the garden landscaped, creating the individual touch that makes the difference.



KURANDA PROFILES



INGE-LISE NARUP has been living in Kuranda since September, 1987. She arrived in Rockhampton from Denmark in June of that year, bought a car, and drove alone up the coast looking at houses and towns, until she "fell in love with Kuranda" and here she stayed.

Born in Malaya of Danish parents where her father managed a coconut and rubber plantation for a Danish company. Her mother wanted her to have a Danish education, so they returned in 1939, leaving her father in Malaya. One month later war started, and they were cut off from him for the whole war, only hearing a few words once a year through the Red Cross. Inge-Lise remembers the hardship and food shortages of the years of German occupation; most of the food for the German Army and the German people was extracted from Denmark. Her brother was a member of the Danish resistance, and was captured and sent to a German camp.

After the war Inge-Lise was a secretary, and met her husband, an officer in the Danish Merchant Navy. Later he and his brother bought a fishing boat, and with Inge-Lise doing the cooking, the three sailed on a six-day voyage to Greenland where they stayed for a year. The idea had been to use the boat for fishing, but fish were scarce, so they carted sand and gravel for road-making.

During this time they lived in a town called Nuuk, on the western coast of Greenland, and when the wife of a Faroe Island fisherman was taken to hospital with gall problems, and her twelve children fostered out to anyone who could take them, Inge-Lise took the youngest, a 9month-old girl. Water was extremely scarce, as rain was infrequent, and the only supply was deliveries by bucket twice a week - eighty buckets for three adults and a baby. The need for clean nappies took precedence over many other requirements! The alternative was to chip ice from the glacier, and melt it.

When they returned to Denmark her husband joined an expedition ship going around the world via Australia, and he was away for twenty months. Then he became a sea-pilot - one of the most sought-after jobs for seamen. For the next eighteen years they were based in Denmark, until his death from a heart attack.

Her two boys were educated by now and independent, so Inge-Lise remembering the warm climate of her early childhood days, set off for northern Australia. Kuranda is now her home, and she spends a lot of her time helping with charities, such as Amnesty International, Meals on Wheels, Blue Nurses functions, and the like. This year on Australia Day, she became a naturalised Australian.





About 30,000 teachers went back to State schools this month, committed to the basics: Numeracy (Maths) and Literacy (Reading and Writing).

One hundred schools in Queensland will be trialling new Performance Standards, and Kuranda is one of about a dozen in the Peninsular Region chosen.

An extra 475 new teacher positions have been created, including 88 for L.O.T.E. (Languages Other Than English).

Almost 14,000 children with disabilities will be celebrating the Centenary of Special Educational (Special Ed.) Services in Queensland. More next month.






An infestation of HEAD LICE is not a sign of being unclean — anyone can catch lice. There has always been a stigma associated with head lice, "Only dirty people get head lice!" NONSENSE! Even you can contract them. Children are more likely to bring these parasites home. They exchange hats, combs, and clothing, and are often seen with their heads close together. LICE do not jump as in the case of fleas.

RECOGNISING SYMPTOMS: Lice, being animal parasites, live by piercing the skin, then sucking the blood for survival. This accounts for the itchiness, which is often the first sign that lice are present. The female louse lays up to 60 eggs at one time, along the hair shaft. These adhere to the hair by a sticky substance. These eggs are called nits,

and are found close to the scalp, where warmth needed for incubation is found. The nape area, and around the ears are where most nits are found. Incubation period is one week, then the nit becomes a louse, or lice, in the plural, and they begin sucking blood for survival.

TREATMENT: These days treatment is very simple, with commercial shampoos especially designed to kill the nit and the lice. One application is not sufficient, you must repeat the treatment 7 days after the first application. All the nits must be removed, if not, a re-infestation would not be noticed until the itching became apparent. The cycle must be broken! All the bed linen, hats, clothing, etc. must be washed in the commercial shampoo at the same time. DISINFECTANT WILL NOT KILL THE PARASITE. If you do contract Head Lice, see your Hairdresser or Chemist for advice.





So with a pad and pen in hand, this 'raving' reporter set off to find some willing and unsuspecting victims among my junior fellow suffers


