Dear Kuranda Paper,

I would like to respond to the letter from Keila Waksvik regarding the allocation of three parking bays in Coondoo Street. As representatives of the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce on the Kuranda Advisory Committee, Rod Lewis and myself were asked to review the parking plan in the Village and put the issue before the Chamber of Commerce for approval. Extensive consultation took place with local business owners, hotel owners, bank manager, doctors surgery and local courier drivers to try to accommodate everyone's needs including ample time for visitors/tourists. The area mentioned was allocated for parking bays of 20 minute duration to accommodate local needs, especially the elderly. The current parking plan was put to the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce for approval, bearing in mind that a lot of members are also residents of this area and the Chamber does have the interest of the residents in their charter. This review was done over twelve months ago and two persons have since lodged objections to the bays concerned, these being business operators at this location and the fact that they had paid for permits to put goods on their footpaths was mentioned in their objection. I personally would rather see the elderly catered for. With regard to areas being used by local artists for entertainment, if goods displayed on footpaths are controlled in a proper manner we will still have ample space for our local aboriginal dancing and artists.



WE NEED THEM

Mareeba Shire Council Weed Alert

The Mareeba Shire Council, and the Department of Natural Resources and Mines are carrying out a weed eradication project in the Kuranda area.

This work is almost complete. We are asking for assistance from ratepayers, and the general public in locating any remaining infestations of this plant, so that we can assist with destroying these pest plants.


No off target damage is permitted to occur while carrying out this work, as most of the plants are hand pulled or grubbed out. Where herbicide must be used, there are no spills or contamination of the soil or water because the chemical is injected directly into the tree.

The pest plant in question is Annona glabra Pond Apple. It is a "Declared Plant" under the Lands Protection Act and is listed as a weed of national significance. All infestations are required under these laws to be destroyed. Pond Apple is a serious threat to wetlands and riparian ecosystems of wet tropics and world heritage areas. It is necessary to remove all plants from the Barron River catchment as it can form a dense under story that suppresses the growth of native vegetation, and will replace mature stands of paperbarks with a monoculture of Pond Apple trees.  Julatten Transfer Station 8 Iuly 9 am - 5 pm Kuranda Transfer Station 10 July 9 mm - 5 pm Marceba Landfill 11 & 12 July 9 am - 5 pm Dimbulah Transfer Station 15 July 9 am - 4 pm

A few precautions should be taken when transporting chemicals:

- Take chemicals to the collection points in their original containers with labels attached whenever
- Chemicals should not be mixed even if they are the same type;
- Transport chemicals in a well ventilated vehicle, eg, in the tray of a utility;
- When transporting chemicals, leave stock feed, foodstuffs and pets at home;
- Make sure the chemicals are well secured to avoid any spills; and
- Take a direct route to the collection point to avoid any unnecessary delays or exposure.

Work For the Dole Working for Kuranda

The latest round of Work for the Dole projects will benefit two unemployed people as well as the community of Kuranda, Federal Member for Leichhardt Warren Entsch, said today.

Mr Entsch said the six-month project will see them upgrade the Kuranda R.S.L. Memorial Bowls and Services Club.

"The sports and social club is used by just about the entire Kuranda population for numerous purposes and I'm sure the community appreciates the facelift it will receive thanks to the Work for the Dole program," Mr Entsch said.

"And that's what the program is all about, creating projects that benefit both the community and the job seekers.

"It doesn't take an expensive survey or report to tell you that one of the best ways for unemployed people to secure employment is to have good work experience behind you and a demonstrated strong work ethic."

Project organiser Vicki Pates of Quality Industry Training and Employment said the two Kuranda participants will be enhancing the club's facilities by improving access, paving and conducting general landscaping and maintenance.

"The access ramp at the club is too steep at the moment so one of the things the participants will be rebuilding a more user-friendly ramp with a gentler grade, which will make it much easier for people, particularly older residents, to use the facility," Ms Pates said.

"The range of skills the job seekers will acquire is quite diverse and even includes green keeping theory. The supervisor overseeing the project has taught TAFE classes in the past and is sure to provide some very professional training."

Ms Pates said finding willing participants is proving the hardest part of the project. She invites anyone interested in joining the team to call Quality Industry Training and Employment on 4092 4414.

THE POWER OF NOW ECKHART TOLLE




SOFTBALL Yes, Softball season is upon us again and



Gudjugudju Walking Track

A signed walking track to guide people around the school is now complete. Ian Bosen and Mark Lawson with the help of Errol Hunter and teacher Sue Elias have used the Gudjugudju (rainbow serpent) to provide form for the track. The Gudjugudju winds around the buildings to include the totem poles erected around the school to name in both Djabugay and English significant points of interest.

The totem poles were the result of a community project from 2001. Students worked with community elders and Djabugay language speakers to give appropriate Djabugay names to school areas and then worked in the Korowa workshop to carve and paint the poles. The timber was supplied by the late Finlay Grogan.

A Thought for June


This month we open our bibles and read from St Matthews Gospel Chapter 28.verses 16-20. There is a wonderful old story told of Jesus returning to heaven after being with us on earth. Gabriel welcomes him and says "Lord, your work on earth is finished?" Jesus says "No Gabriel, far from it. My work has only begun." The surprised archangel says "Then what means have you left on the earth for concluding your work!" Jesus says "I have left a community of men and women." Gabriel looks rather doubtful and concerned, and says, "But, Lord, what if they should fail?" Jesus answers, "Then, Gabriel, I have no other way".\par\tab Try now to imagine ourselves standing a little apart from the group of disciples clustered around Jesus in this passage We become aware that there are only eleven of them. Matthew recalls this very fact as he prepares to bring his version of the Gospel to an end. Why! Sometimes as we read scripture a single word can communicate a great deal to us. Look carefully at the word "eleven" in verse 28. As we read the four Gospels we are always aware of the twelve disciples. But, as we know, something happened to break that complete circle. Judas betrayed Jesus and went from the community That means that by the time Our Lord's ascension comes, the moment Matthew is sharing with us here, the community has been wounded. But Jesus stands within this damaged group and still gives them his great commission. He assigns them his work for the rest of time [vv 18-20]. Think of the level of trust that entailed.\par\tab We begin to realize the really Good News for us all in this. In many senses we Christians today are "the eleven." Each one of us, as well as the whole Christian community, has many and obvious weaknesses. Great differences and tensions abound. But look again at the Gospel. See how Matthew points out in v 17] the presence of doubts and differences and tensions in the phrase "they worshipped him but some doubted." We see that it has always been this way and it always will be. There will never come the perfect time or the perfect church. Always there will be rea sons for doubt and differences. Our Lord knows this well, just as he knew it on that long-ago hilltop in Galilee. But, as on that day with that pathetic little group, Jesus does not hesitate a moment in giving us his work to do in our time. He accepts the reality of each of us and that of the whole church. He takes our strengths, our gifts, our in dividual abilities, as well as all the potential there is among us when we work together. He looks at us, understands us, accepts us. Then he calls us to do his work. That is the Good News.

Words of Wisdom from 0550 Ro. 86 Music

Music, in a sense, is absolutely silent. Even song is not pure music, because a song has. words in it. It is a compromise with language, it is halfway to music. It is better than ordinary language. Poetry is better than prose, poetry is a little closer to music; and the closer the poetry is to music the more poetic it is. Hence the highest form of poetry comes very close to music. It does not have much meaning but it contains much silence; it provokes silence.





TRAPPER'S TALES

"An Early Mark" By Steve Larkin

Mist swirled and steamed past the rainforest giants, sieving its way through the limbs and leaves of lesser plants, saturating everything, including the heavy drill jacket and leggings the trapper wore.

It was an uncomfortably frosty August morning. The sun was still half an hour from fully rising, and a good few hours more before it began to burn off the layers of low clouds from the soaking tropical blanket folds of tableland jungle valleys and ridge lines.

The going was slow. A soft and muddy, lawyer vine entangled and barely recognisable track, which suddenly rose and then fell away steeply before beginning again in a surprisingly cold creek, six inches deep. Just deep enough to ebb over the ankle tops of leather boots.

The quiet was almost respectable at that time of day. A few choice insults slung half heartedly from lone insects, frogs and itinerant night birds. He could still hear his own laboured breathing as he hefted the necessary pack, full of tools, water and other useful knick knacks. His "old mate", the Berretta single round shot gun, was held in his good hand, clear of any foliage entanglements and above any possibility of being pushed into the mud. It was critical the internal mechanisms were kept free from fouling, rendering the most useful tool of all useless when it was most needed.

It seemed to take hours. A few hundred metres of this landscape would compare to a flat few kilometres in the open! Where was that yellow surveyor's tape? It was almost impossible to match the unrecognisable surrounds with the way he remembered it the day before without a mark of some kind. At least he could see where he was going yesterday in the dim shade of dense and ancient Gondwana Land canopy.

He and his offsider Di had carried in the bulky mesh, cumbersome posts, bait and wire makings of a boar trap. All the useful part of a working day was spent on driving, reconnaissance, sighting, hauling gear and building the four metre diameter trap in tangled undergrowth near, but not on, the most recent pad marks and signs of pigs foraging.

A perverse smile turned one corner of the trapper's mouth at the idea of the word "foraging". More like "earthworks" was the image of a tinkling jungle stream ploughed into an empty two-lane highway of mire.

Rule of thumb had taught him that each centimetre of cloven hoof print meant ten kilograms of boar, or thereabouts. There were the creeping tentacles of severe anticipation when Di had found an easy nine centimetre hoof mark imprinted deep into the stream bed slurry. He knew there was little food about this time of year, and the boars would take the bait greedily. He knew he would have to return before dawn to prevent a panicked escape brought on by daylight.

Hardly discernible in the dark, the yellow tape leaned half expectantly from a branch at head height not more than an arm's length away. Reaching out to touch it for reassurance, the trapper realised there was only 50 metres to go. Now which way?

He needn't have worried about his heading then, for a shift in the mist's tide had floated a raft of alarming scents to the trapped boar. The boar's as yet unheard irritated grunts and confused pushing at the mesh walls of an unseen trap, instantly boiled into furious barking and roaring. Forced charges crashed into metal and threatened to heave the trap's very anchor posts from the ground. The way to the trap suddenly became obvious.

Instinctively pulling the release pins, the trapper let the backpack fall to ground and leapt forward, weightless with the effects of adrennalin. "Pack off! Mag off! Fuck off!" he laughed to himself at the expression from another lifetime. Time was of the essence, for he felt sure from the din there would be a trophy-sized boar, and he couldn't afford the time to rebuild the trap later. Some of those boomers could really wreck a trap before escaping and, any way; he didn't relish the thought of losing a beast after all that effort. Plus, he presumed the smarter ones tended to be trap shy afterwards. It didn't occur to him then that several welding would be infinitely preferable to having to confront a freshly escaped, angry, charging wild boar in the semi dark, with one lucky shot between them.

Down the track he tore, disregarding the possibility of lawyer vines, suddenly breaking into the creek bed clearing and almost slipping over on the muddy highway. Arms out he steadled his balance just as he saw the boar real about to face him. In the same moment he began to pat down his jacket pockets for the familiar outline feel of a cartridge with one hand, and deftly broke the rifle action with the other.

It was as if he were moving in treacle, so slowly he felt his movements. The boar now trapped only several paces away returned to demolishing the trap with renewed vigour, alternately crashing from side to buckling side and pausing only to charge directly at the trapper. Save for some thin mesh, the boar's trajectory would have taken its jaws directly to the trapper's throat.

At last, two cylinders were reefed from the tangled seaweed of his pocket. One casing was pushed brass end first between his teeth, in the event a hasty reload was required he would know exactly where it was. The other casing was driven into the breach with an audible "pomp". The rifle jack knifed straight again and levelled at the boar's dark centre of shape. It was almost through the mesh on the left side, and the trapper closed the distance to the trap with a few quick paces.

The by now livid beast, sensing more a change in the odds than the closeness of the trapper, wheeled about and stood stock still, staring with pure and primeval hatred. The rifle was sighted between those fearful beams, the first pad of the trapper's index finger tensed on the trigger, his heaving lungs uncontrollably lifting the aim to rise and fall off the sweet spot. He held the intensity of the boar's glare and his breath for a split second. It was a moment in time, the "moment of truth" some call it, where all senses stand still, save for the white noise of the trapper's now pressurised blood in his own ears.

The muzzle flash was almost blinding in the half dark, momentarily igniting the surrounding great Gothic trees into chapel arches. The blast felt as if it could be heard

all the way down in Cairns, although he knew the sound would only travel a hundred metres. Like a sin muffled by the confessional box of dense jungle. Rapidly breaking the rifle he fumbled to pull the wasted casing from the breach, the spare round from his mouth, and began to reload. Glancing up before the drill was complete it was evident through the clearing smoke and mist that another shot would not be required.

The intensity of the moment filtered away with the light of dawn, and the trapper closed the rifle, easing the safety catch over.

As it turned out the boar was a "not unrespectable" 60 kg three year old which, when field dressed half an hour later, would provide a lean 25 kg for the freezer.

Somewhere down the track as the trapper struggled with the terrain and his new load. He was reminded the trap would also have to be hauled out one day soon.

Satellite Phone Subsidies

People living in rural and remote parts of the Far North, beyond mobile phone coverage, can now apply for a grant of up to \$1,100 to purchase mobile satellite phone handsets. The Federal Government's Satellite Phone Subsidy was part of the response to the Telecommunications

"Unfortunately there were small communities in the Torres Strait, Cape York Peninsula and Tablelands that missed out on mobile coverage available through previous programs. These are the communities this Satellite Phone Subsidy will target because all Australians, especially those who are a fair distance from help, deserve to have top quality communications at their fingertips." Said Warren Entsch.

The subsidy is available for satellite phone handsets purchased by people in areas without terrestrial CDMA or GSM mobile coverage and that are unlikely to get coverage in the near future. It will also be available to community groups, small business, and emergency services operating in these areas.

The application-based scheme will provide up to 50% of the purchase price of a satellite mobile handset with financial assistance of up to \$1,100 (including GST) per handset. It is available for all mobile satellite systems and all telephone companies.

WEATHER'S GREAT

IF YOU ARE NOT TRYING TO PLANT TREES

At last check the SOI was plumetting, pretty well ensuring we're in for an El Nino. If this is so, we're likely to have a long dry spell and possibly a late start to next year's wet season or a repeat of the dry wet just past. We're probably going to be doing a lot of hand watering in the next few months. However, who knows, it might not turn out like that at all.

NEWCOMERS COMPENDIUM

In the meantime, we're getting on with our projects. We have submitted an application for funding under Envirofund to produce a compendium for newcomers. It will contain information on Local Laws (rules about keeping domestic pets, clearing of land, wildlife protection and rescue, weeds identification, native species to plant, and exotic species to avoid. It will also contain a directory of which government department to contact for a particular issue. We are hoping to get the information out to all our members and to new people coming into the area, who may inadvertantly cause environmental damage out of ignorance of their new environment.

THE 4Ss (what on earth is this?!)

We are waiting on news as to whether we've been successful with another funding application under Sustainable Regions program. The project is called Sustainable Society, Schools and Sawmills (4Ss). Its purpose is to kickstart having our Kuranda schools become schools of excellence in environmental studies (using native forestry as the practical way to achieve this). The idea is to take students through the whole cycle of growth of timber trees from seeds to sawdust - that is, from planting trees right through to cutting them down and using them for just about everything we do. Every school subject could hang off this, from carpentry and craft to architecture and engineering.

ANOTHER 500 TREES INTO THE GROUND AT BOONOOLOO

With the lure of chocolate cake for morning tea, a good crowd helped with May's event at Boonooloo, assisted by the Cairns Green Corps team.

THE FOREST WALK

This Green Corps team is also doing a great deal of work on the Forest Walk, between Thoree Street and the markets (behind The Aviary). The steps and bridges have been designed and fabricated by Hugh Crowther, demonstrating a simple and effective way to put together the components of walking tracks.

LAND FOR WILDLIFE FIELD DAY

This was a most interesting day of snakes and lizards. But we weren't worried because these animals were well handled by Lyall Naylor and we came to appreciate the beauty of these critters and their vital role in the ecology. Some 70 people attended throughout the day, which included a walk through Andrew Horn's and Sarah Austin's property - right in the middle of the EnviroLink Wildlife Corridor. We were able to see the progress of reafforestation over a number of years. It's amazing what you see when it's pointed out to you.

AMBULANCE QUIZ NIGHT - Our Treasurer David Harris was the star The EnviroCare table scored the best score, thanks to Whiz Kid David Harris. We had also donated native trees as prizes, which we had to be careful not to win back!

ERGON - GOT TO GET BETTER

We are keeping the lines of communication open with Ergon in the hope of achieving a better environmental result following clearing under powerlines. While Ergon is happy to see only low growing vegetation under the power lines, this vegetation is guinea grass and wild raspberry for the most part, and is not a satisfactory environmental outcome from our point of view. We are working together to see how we can better meet in the middle.

ChemCollect - A one-off opportunity is being co-ordinated by the Environment Protection Agency to dispose of unwanted chemicals. These include banned organochlorine pesticides including DDT, chlordane, dieldrin, Aldrin, heptachlor, lindane and pentachlorophenol. Arsenic based compounds and herbicides such as 2-4D are also included. These chemicals can be disposed of at the Groves Creek transfer station between gam and 5pm on Wednesday 10 July.

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 5th June at 7pm at the Fallon Road Sports Club.

We'll be sharpening our knowledge on town planning issues (subdivisions, etc) under the Integrated Planning Act. There are a number of applications coming to Council and we need to know how to deal with them




Enclosed for additional information is a copy of the covers, and chapter headings. Our personal stories relate some losses which include suicide of a family member, serious illness and divorce.

Despite the number of changes each of us has dealt with by adulthood, the majority of people continue to find change daunting.

However, most of us have heard of at least one individual who has responded to a major life change in a seemingly unusual way. Following the event, such individuals may describe a

horrific experience in terms such as "a blessing", or express the view that, given the choice, they would accept it over again because of the positive benefits that have resulted.

Two Kuranda residents hold the view that such an outcome from major change is possible

for everyone. Drawing on research and their professional and personal experience, including their individual experiences of loss, Annabel Muis and Lesley Moseley have developed a model of personal change management. Their book published in 2001, "Turning Points, Regaining joy after loss", introduces their approach for achieving a positive outcome. "Turning Points" describes the steps involved, and includes many tools and strategies for managing change and for bringing about helpful mental and emotional adjustment at each stage of the journey. The authors describe the final stage, "Success", as "a point where life is more joyous than before the change".




KURANDA MUD SLINGERS



ChemCollect coming to North Queensland

The collection of unwanted farm chemicals will soon begin in north Queensland as the State Government introduces ChemCollect to centres between Sarina and Daintree Village

The one-of program, co-ordinated by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), targets banned organochlorine including DDT, chlodane, deldrin, aldrin, heptachor, lindane and penta chlorphenal. Also included are arsenic based compounds and herbicides such as 2-4D.

ChemCollect is free for all primary producers. It is jointly funded by the Queensland and Commonwealth governments and will, over time, visit regional

centres in all local government areas throughout the State.

EPA ChemCollect project manager Stuart Cameron said that since the program started in Queensland more than 252 tonnes of unwanted farm chemicals had been collected and scheduled for environmentally friendly destruction. He said by the time ChemCollect completed collections across north Queensland, the unwanted chemical tally was likely to reach about 400 tonnes. Primary producers are invited to deliver unwanted agricultural and vetinary chemicals to their nearest temporary collection site. Specific site details are listed on the attached sheet, and on the EPA website: www.epa.qld.gov.au/ sustainable_industries.

"Where possible, primary producers should take unwanted chemicals to the collection points in their original containers with labels attached," Mr. Cam-

"However, people should not worry if there is no label on the container. The chemical will still be accepted. In addition, if the container is in poor condition or if transportation is a concern, the ChemCollect contractors will provide pack-

A few precautions should be observed when transporting unwanted chemicals.

- Chemicals should not be mixed, even if they are the same kind of
- Transport chemicals in well-ventilated vehicle such as the tray of a ute.
- When transporting chemicals, leave stock feed, foodstuffs and pets at

- When transporting chemicals, leave stock feed, foodstuffs and pets at home;
- Make sure the chemicals are well secured to avoid any spills; and


Student Council Meets School Parliament



COMPUTER CLUB

You use the SHIFT key to open multiple items in your Start Menu without losing your position. Now, let's say you don't want to lose your foreground

app's focus. While double-clicking on a desktop shortcut icon to launch the associated target, hold down the CTRL key. It'll load it behind all other open windows. Be it a document or be it a program, it should hide behind everything else on the screen. Why would you want to do this? Well, if what you're currently working on is super important, or if opening the second application is necessary (and it doesn't need your full attention), this will help. If you want to keep programs from stealing foreground focus, consider using X-Setup (available from XTEQ.COM). The plug-in is currently located in: Appearance \ Desktop \ Options \ Taskb

While surfing the Web, I came across a small selection of nicely displayed information that I wanted to keep for future reference and share with others. I puzzled over which application would best retain all of the page's formatting (without spending much time on editing). A thought passed: flip over to my email program - which was already open. Create a new (HTML) message, select the text on the Web page, copy it, then paste the data into this new message. Fill the Subject field with a title then save it to a folder (or close it, sending a copy to the Drafts folder). Outlook Express users might go as far as to mail the message back to themselves so that the hyperlinks would work

The BIOS is an important part of your computer. How else could you be aware of stuck key failures? Don't forget about the classic memory parity errors. If you ever get an I/O channel error, you better break out the coffee - 'cause you're in for an all-nighter. Did you know that your BIOS information may actually be sitting in the Registry. It's true! If you have no other way of uncovering this

information without a reboot, try this tip. The data can be found in HKEY LOCAL MACHINE \ HARDWARE \ DESCRIPTION \ System. 'SystemBiosDate' is the date of the installed revision's release. 'SystemBiosVersion' is, naturally, the revision number. Heck, you might even have a 'VideoBiosDate' value, which will provide you with even more sometimes-obscure information. 'VideoBiosVersion' falls into the same category. I wouldn't suggest changing any of these entries - let your system do that. If you have the System Information tool installed, it may pull in this data in a safer environment and

easier-to-interpret format. Find out by entering

"MSInfo32" through the Run applet in your Start Menu (sans quotes).

I copy text frequently: from the Web, e-mail messages, or other rich-text documents. Sometimes I just want to keep the text - not all its fancy-schmancy formatting. So here's a workaround for when you're dealing with formatted text: after copying, open up Notepad and 'Paste' the text in there. From there, you may save the text as a new file, or 'Copy' it again to the clipboard and paste it in another document. All the formatting will have been stripped from it at that point. Is "Text Document" not descriptive enough for you? Would you rather refer to a TXT file as a "Shiny Happy Text Thing"? Open the Windows Explorer, click 'View,' then 'Folder Options,' select the 'File Types' tab, then look for whatever file type you'd like to change. When you've found one, select it and click the 'Edit' button. At that point, you can put just about whatever it is your little heart desires in the 'Description of type' field.



Sharing our Schools?

Our two Kuranda Schools are discussing the possibilities of sharing their resources and curriculums. In the light of the latest Reforms proposed for the Queensland Education system, both our local schools are looking at ways of "joining forces" to make Kuranda schools even better.

There is a Proposal on the table for the formation of a Kuranda District College which would cater for the learning needs of all ages in Kuranda...right through from Pre-School ages to young adults and even adults. There are many new possibilities that an alliance between the two schools could bring about.

The Proposed Kuranda District College would operate at TWO separate campuses;

The proposed Kuranda "Town Campus" would be at the Primary School catering for Early Childhood education from Pre-School to Year 6

The proposed Kuranda "Myola Campus" would be at the High School catering for Middle School education for Years 7, 8 and 9 as well as Senior School education for Years 10, 11, 12 and beyond.

The new model is being suggested as a better way of offering education in our community and is based on the belief that it will provide better opportunities for students in Kuranda.

The Proposal is only in Draft form and is up for discussion over the next few months. All interested persons are invited to attend one of the forthcoming Public Forums where opinions and questions will be shared.

Kuranda Information Centre Volunteer's "famil" to Yungaburra

Part of the privilege and responsibility of volunteers working at the Tourist Information Centre is to know about the products we are advising our tourists about in Kuranda, the Tablelands and outer regions. This includes knowledge about restaurants, accommodation and attractions. Wisely, the businesses involved in these kinds of pursuits realizing that it is hard for us to talked about and recommend something that we have never seen nor experienced, extend invitations to the people working at information centre from all over the area to view their establishments. On such an invitation we spent the day at Yungaburra.

To enter Heritage-listed Yungaburra, an old, tiny village in the Tablelands, is like entering a fairyland that I read about when I was a child. Yet, although real, it still magically maintains its dreamlike quality. Everywhere there is flowers and greenery. Although the sun was out the light is soft and gentle on the eyes, unlike the hot, harsh, diamond light of the coast. The buildings are picturesque in keeping with their surrounds. It is only insides these buildings that we see the astute business acumen of the owners.

QUINCAN GALLERY. A new business opened in August 2001, sells products from local artists, including works in wood: tables; sculptures, aboriginal painting and pottery, local jams, clothes, face creams, oils and books about Australia. Behind the store is a licensed eatery catering to breakfast for the early riser [they open from 7am to Sunset] extending to light lunch. All the food is home made and the covered but open seating area is beautifully set out. The tables and chairs of local woods are of a quality of workmanship that we are to see again and again in other establishments all over the area. The complex has double access, and it is easy for coaches to pull up at the back, where it is equally easy for people in wheel chairs to use their special toilet.

Staying open until sunset allows the "day trippers" the opportunity to wonder into the shop and browse as they walk around enjoying the village after being out touring all day.

RAINFOREST GALLERY. Is an establishment that has been opened in Yungaburra for a long time. Upstairs in the building is the place where the fairies actually reside during the day when they are not out in the area entrancing both the locals and visitors. Thousands of people come to the area just to see these remarkable, enchanting, diminutive models of fairies of all shapes and sizes grouped in family settings. Many people fall in love with them and want to buy them and take them home. But they are never, never for sale. In other rooms on this floor are large local products carved out of wood, equally as beautiful to see, which, unlike the fairies, are for sale.

Downstairs in the main store there are more local products for sale: oils; soaps; bronze pieces; timber fruit and smaller woodworks and much more, as well as a selection of photographs to choose

from of the different fairies to take home as your memory of the unique display upstairs. Each of the volunteers was lucky enough to be able to select their own favorite photograph as a gift.

Now it was time to view the accommodation in the

CURTAIN FIG MOTEL. Unusual for the Tablelands where the weather is mainly delightfully cool, this motel has air conditioning for the summer. There are two bed apartments which can sleep up to six, plus six motel rooms. A swimming pool to enjoy in the warmer months and lovely grounds to wander in or sit in. Across the road are ten more non smoking motel rooms with a quaint Gazebo outside. This too is surrounded by a beautiful garden.

ALLUMBAH POCKET. We accommodation complex through a gallery where there is a display of beautiful local wood articles

Inside the accommodation is everything you would need to look after to yourself without leaving your room, microwave, or if you want to really cook, hotplates. Here you will be able to snuggle down and enjoy the warmth and comfort of a wood fire during the chill of the night. Whilst outside you can indulge yourself in the spa, or cook your sausages on the gas barbie.

EDEN HOUSE is a family business operated by

Gordon, Susie and their ten staff, Here the rooms are truly hidden in the gardens, separate each and distinctly different in its interior decor colouring. and Eden House has become the place where the

cooperate employees working in the area come to relax. An on site restaurant where functions are held, can not only supply you meals in the dining room, but you can eat in an outside all-weatherflood-lit area or have your meals brought to your room at no extra cost. For those that find it hard to get started in the morning, a breakfast basket can also be supplied. Gordon and Susie pride themselves on their personal touch, everything that they can do to make your stay special will willingly be done.

KOOKABURRA LODGE. Breakfast with the birds in the fragrant gardens is the highlight of this establishment. You can stay in your room, and enjoy the roses that are delivered daily, but if you want to get out a large community lounge room is available for people who are staying to get together and swap their travel stories, or go for a dip in the pool. Breakfast can be had in your rooms and each day a "what"s for dinner" menu of a three course meal at a set price of \$37.50 is displayed on the notice board. Lunch can also be supplied on request. If you are looking for a beautiful place to stay where the tariff is less then others, this is the place for you. Nick had invited us to his restaurant for a discount

lunch. NICK"S Swiss Italian RESTAURANT and Yodeller"s Bar has been serving the public lunch, dinner and entertainment for the last sixteen years. Here is a man who really enjoys interacting with his patrons on all levels, from feeding them to entertaining them, or just having simple fun, as well as showing them his unusual fruit trees out the back. His staff too, are "people, people" and obviously enjoy their chosen job as much as their

Nick's is only closed on a Monday, opening at 6pm for dinner on Tuesday night. Into these other days he tries to cram as much fun as his imagination can think of by having special celebrations and festival every month. Just read his "Calendar of Events" for the year and you will see that there is a fun filled, prize giving, hoot of a celebration from "spoil your Mum" day to a "beard and moustache" competition, in fact something for everyone to have a happy, laughing time out no matter what your taste.

If you want to enjoy night walks, there are torches to take so you don't trip, umbrellas if it rains, and on your return, sensor lights show you the way. Nothing that could be thought of or planned for has been spared either in safety, beauty or comfort in fitting out the cottages, most of the products have been bought from business on the Tablelands as part of Nick's and Gina's deep belief that business in the area should support other business in the area, where and whenever possible.

As visitors to the area we were all not only impressed by the quality of the products presented, but by the people themselves. Yungaburra is a village where the people in business support each other and pull together. 

My exciting and challenging role is to coordinate between all parties to ensure that our objectives are achieved. After just 6 weeks into the programme I am confident to say that the Headstart Project is being well received by the community and the students and their families. To date we have achieved the following:

 Networking with various industry and community organizations including Tafe, New Apprenticeship Centres, Cairns Region Group Training, Indigenous Advisory Bodies (including Ariginisle, Ngoombi, KMKM & FNQ Employment), Mareeba Shire Council, Kuranda Chamber of Commerce, Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre etc.

 Information sessions with parents where the objectives of the Headstart Programme were discussed. Parents have given valuable feedback at these sessions which will help to influence the programme. I encourage all parents to become involved with these information sessions so that you are able to encourage and support your children in their directions for training and employment.
