

KURANDA MEDICAL CENTRE GP SHORTAGES

I thought it would be helpful for me to write to The Kuranda Paper and hence to the people of Kuranda to update the situation at the Kuranda Medical Centre. Many patients will be aware that it is difficult to see a General Practitioner (GP) at present with long waiting times for an appointment. My sincere apologies for that, but please allow me to give you some background.

Deloitte Access Economic survey written in 2020 reported that there would be a lack of some 30,000 GPs in Australia by the year 2030. Unfortunately, because of COVID causing restrictions on new doctors moving to Australia, that date has been brought forward and is now manifesting in many rural practices, including Kuranda Medical Centre. In order to provide the numbers of GPs needed in Australia it requires some 45% of all medical graduates to opt into general practice as a career choice. Currently the percentage sits at some 14%. This low number of new GPs is compounded by an ageing GP population with many looking to retire in the next five years.

Kuranda Medical Centre like many rural medical centres is just struggling to recruit and retain GPs.

This medical centre, like any business, has to make money in order to cover its costs. This income is generated largely by the work of the doctors and if there are a few or no doctors then there is a little or no income. There are no plans the Kuranda Medical Centre will close in the immediate future, but the current state of affairs is certainly threatening the viability of this medical practice. We have a very dedicated team of doctors, nurses and reception staff who are all committed to the Kuranda Medical Centre and its patients, and it breaks our heart to see the current dwindling numbers of doctors and the threat to the long-term viability of

For a European doctor to move and work in general practice in New

Zealand or Canada takes roughly three months and would cost them some \$5000. That same move to Australia, to negotiate all the visa and registration hurdles, will often take some 18 months and cost that doctor \$25,000. Doctors are voting with their feet.

I, and senior colleagues in the Independent Practitioner Network, will lobby state and federal politicians to explain fully the dilemma of Kuranda Medical Centre and seek ongoing state and federal support to maintain the viability of the practice. Sometimes these requests fall on deaf ears.

So please do not blame the reception staff if you can't get an appointment. It is a problem in many, many, general practices across the country and we are working as hard as we can to try and ensure the viability of this medical centre.

Kuranda Medical Centre would like to thank the community for their patience whilst we are again experiencing a shortage of doctors. We hope to remedy this situation in the coming months.

The Kuranda Medical Centre is also looking for a casual Enrolled Nurse (EN) or Registered Nurse (RN) for a minimum of one permanent day per week, holiday and sick leave cover and a block period of 12 weeks in May to cover our RN who will be away. COVID BOOSTERS NOT AVAILABLE IN KURANDA

While older people are most at risk of severe COVID-19 disease, Chief Health Officers both state and federal are urging people aged over 75 years to have the new booster targeting the latest Omnicron variant. But these are not available locally in Kuranda.

On inquiry, Kuranda Medical Centre as part of the national IPN network, confirm they are not participating in COVID boosters, while Kuranda Pharmacy advise they have nobody trained to give boosters. Mulunga Aboriginal Primary Health Care Service on Thongon Street say that Cyclone Jasper blackouts caused the loss of all local vaccine stocks, and it's unknown how long Kuranda will be without.

In response to queries, the office of local Member for Barron River, Craig Crawford MP, revealed that Alive Pharmacy at Smithfield Shopping Centre is the nearest place to get the new booster, though it's noticeably difficult to get to for some who already find it difficult to even get into Kuranda township. To get a booster if elderly or immune-suppressed, you must book ahead for this free service at Alive Pharmacy 3038 1385 or online www.healthdirect.gov.au/australian-health-services

Kuranda District State College Student Council



As a Solicitor, I will bring to the role as Councillor experienced advocacy and governance.



FIRE MANAGEMENT – WET TROPICS BIOREGION NATIVE FORESTS

Fire management of wet sclerophyll and open woodlands occurs every year on State owned land around our communities. Adjoining landowners are encouraged to learn about the program and participate to ensure full coverage of the broader landscape areas.

Forests that require fire management are divided to form a mosaic effect across the landscape. This effect also creates fire breaks between areas recently burned and those areas with more fuel; thereby reducing the overall risk of an out of control wildfire at the wrong time of the year.

The fire regime on the open woodland areas is over a cycle of 2 to 3 years and only conducted when local conditions are moist and cool with low wind. Tall wet forests (or wet sclerophyll) take longer to cure for ignition as they are higher in the landscape and up against the rainforest.

Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service (QPWS) and Buluwai Rangers are tasked with the following considerations every year during the fire season: when the country was last burned, current fuel loads, ground moisture, temperature and relative humidity.

"Monitoring over the last 20 years shows the Lamb Range population of northern bettongs is stable and healthy. One of the main reasons for this is a fire regime has been implemented that promotes grassy understoreys, and a mosaic of fire ages designed to improve habitat quality and ensures adequate vegetation cover to limit predation by cats." Dr Alexander Watson, Regional Ecologist, Australian Wildlife Conservancy

IGNITION TYPES

The type of ignition for fire management can be ground or aerial. Both types of ignition are conducted by qualified rangers either: on the ground driving and

A Grinter's Tale

Peter, his pride.

On February 25 in 1972, my convent school experienced its third bomb hoax in as many days.

I remember thinking how inconsiderate the culprit was for choosing lunchtime when, probably because of the freezing cold February temperatures, we were inside playing cat's cradle, swapping lunchbox items or gossiping. It would have been better if it was mid-afternoon, during physics, although I probably would have got the blame if there had been an ensuing explosion, as that branch of science was definitely not my forté and everyone knew it.

We were all evacuated into the icy cold playground, about 450 girls in blue tunics atop white shirts and stripey ties, bare thighed above long grey socks and lace-up shoes, teeth chattering uncontrollably as we attempted to follow Sister Mary Joseph in prayer.

The uninhabited (that was my word for teachers not wearing nuns' habits) were in conflab with the police, while a clutch of other nuns, including the big boss, Reverend Mother Therese, swarmed around us like a pack of black and white working collies herding sheep. Every now and then, one would stop and cross herself (nun that is, not sheep), before turning back to her flock and taking up on the prayer.

I don't think we were praying for our safety,
I somehow recall it was for the redemption of
the perpetrator, and the protection of the nuns'
stash of alcohol in their dining room behind the
school canteen that we girls had discovered when made
to clean the school and convent in the school holidays.

I reckon we were all pretty confident no-one would blow up a school load of good girls, that would be too great a loss to the world, although at least we would depart this world as budding angels, not yet scarred by life on the outside. My mother might well contest that point though.

There was no workplace health and safety in place in those days, and I am surprised that we weren't sent back in for our rosaries. I would have gone back in for my coat without a second thought.

So you see, bomb hoaxes did happen in prehistoric times. I had forgotten all about it, but this is the joy of keeping a diary for most of your life.

Looking back to the 21st February 1972, the day of the first call, I had entered, "Jennifer's friend, Derek, phoned the school with a bomb hoax at 2.25pm". Eeek, I knew the perpetrator! Jennifer Constable was a schoolfriend and fellow horse rider, and she was more than a bit odd. But I suppose who am I to talk?

From memory Derek was some blow-in boyfriend who was a heck of a lot older than Jennifer and maybe caught the 'odd virus' while stalking her. I vaguely recall she told us later that it was him, and that he told her he would do it for a joke. So hopefully that doesn't make me complicit.

On the 23rd though, I wrote "Another bomb hoax today – nothing to do with Derek this time". How did I know that? Heaven knows.

Was there some indication the voice was different? I vaguely remember someone saying the subsequent calls were from

The following day it seems we had a fire drill. A bit late really. On the 25th I recorded "Another bomb hoax at lunch time".

Funnily enough Jennifer became a police officer, known of course, as Constable Constable.

I'm eager for more memories now, so I am flicking back through my five year diary from the 1970s.

Now here's a fairly normal diary entry from the 1970s... "School. Chucked Mark. Went to Sal's to see baby rabbits. Saw Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid". Poor Mark, although he'll never know how lucky he is. I didn't meet Robert Redford and Paul Newman either, sadly. The movie was released in 1969, but there followed a TV series in the 1970s.

There are so many complete understatements, but I suppose I only had four lines to account for each day.

"After work, went to Peter's. Went for a drive in the country near Braintree and crashed into a ditch." In fact, the burgundy coloured Mini, Peter's pride and joy, skidded off a corner into a ditch. We maintained what felt like terminal velocity along the ditch at a 45 degree angle, until a large tree branch at the end of the ditch stabbed the windscreen, spearing the car from front to back like a kebab skewer, bringing it to a halt inches away from a big duck pond.

By some miracle, the branch went straight between us, and although covered and scratched by glass and smaller branches and twigs, and still at an angle with me on the lower side, we both got out, no glass in our eyes, or broken limbs. The only injury was a huge scratch on my nose, and for

But the lesson there is, if you put the basics in your diary, the whole scene comes flooding back in amazing detail like a series of photos. I can remember the yellow jumper Peter had on, his too-short trousers and pale coloured socks. I even recall studying Peter's long fingers as he lifted his hand to the radio dial the moment before we left the road. I never got in a Mini after that and the too short trousers and pale socks spelled the end of a teenage 'romance'.

Just saw this as I was closing the diary. March 3, 1973 "Ruth and her mother came in the afternoon (sicked up my Chinese meal from last night)."

That's a forgettable, though unerasable entry. I wonder if I made both mother and daughter sick after cooking a Chinese meal the night before, or I was sick in front of them? I have to say, the images from that one don't immediately come to mind, but I think maybe that might be a case of dissociative amnesia. I don't know who Ruth was, so I probably didn't make a good impression. Anyway, I hope she has dissociative amnesia too.

- to raise awareness of this invasive species within the wider local and regional community





Buck Richardson

This month we are introducing digital artist, Buck Richardson.

Not many people have the privilege of experiencing the night wildlife of Tropical Queensland firsthand as Buck Richardson has. His passion for moths began with his first digital camera and the moths of Kuranda. This culminated with the publication, in 2008, of his first book Mothology Discover the Magic – Moths and Moth Art from the World Heritagelisted Wet Tropics of Queensland Australia. This led to him meeting Dr David Rentz AM, entomologist extraordinaire, and an invitation to go on 'collecting' trips. Dave and Buck became firm friends and have been doing 30-40 trips each year ever since.

From the beginning, Buck was fascinated with the colour and patterns of our moths in particular, but also found bugs, beetles, and other night wildlife to tweak his artistic leanings.

Buck's digital art, based on his original photographs, has won numerous awards over the years.

Moth Mosaic, his latest offering, was chosen as a finalist in the Cairns Society's Annual Awards, recently hanging in the Cairns Gallery. Not surprisingly, he was awarded a Highly Commended for this work.

Buck also creates beautiful butterfly fridge magnets and cards which are available, as well as his digital wall art and books, at the Kuranda Arts Cooperative.



Caring for Kuranda's environment "by standing on the shoulders of those who have gone before"

What can you see in the creek?

Kuranda Envirocare has been conducting surveys in local catchment creeks to assess water quality and ecological values, specifically targeting the habitat of the Kuranda Tree Frog (Litoria myola). The project aims to identify potential threats to the frogs' survival, evaluate habitat conditions, and involve the Kuranda community in conservation efforts. Engaging local landowners and residents enhances awareness of creek habitats and their significance. The project's outcomes will guide further research and conservation initiatives. So far we have trialled our sampling methods and new equipment and found a range of water bugs indicating moderate water quality in Jumrum and Warril Creeks.

Macroinvertebrates, defined as visible animals without backbones found in waterways, are essential indicators of aquatic ecosystem health. Their presence and abundance reflect environmental changes often unnoticed by humans. Declines in frog populations worldwide highlight the interconnectedness between amphibian health and environmental conditions. Macroinvertebrate surveys provide valuable insights into waterway health, complementing chemical and physical analyses and vegetation assessments. Sensitivity scores derived from macroinvertebrate data offer diagnostic value for waterway health comparisons.

Macroinvertebrate surveys serve multiple purposes, especially in the context of recent flooding events that underscore the role of rivers in transporting materials. While visible impacts are evident, unseen factors can affect local ecology, detected through changes in macroinvertebrate populations. These organisms act as

indicators of environmental disturbances, revealing issues, like pollution, not captured by conventional testing methods. Consequently, macroinvertebrate analysis informs habitat management, educational initiatives, and community engagement, fostering connections between people and their local ecosystems.

Examples of macroinvertebrate survey projects include the discovery of new natural artesian springs in Queensland's Channel Country and the Environmental Protection Agency's compilation of macroinvertebrate data for Irish waterways. These initiatives demonstrate the utility of macroinvertebrate surveys in informing management decisions and promoting environmental stewardship on a global scale.

Surveys will restart in approximately mid-April and run every Sunday afternoon till late June. Kids are welcome and all training and gear is provided. This project is made possible by funding from the Office of the Chief Scientist, through Engaging Science Program 2023.

Plant of the Month Perfume Tree - Cananga odorata

A fast growing, spreading, medium tree with beautifully perfumed flowers. The large flowers are pale yellow with long petals. Distilled oils from the flowers are used in the perfume industry to make Ylang-ylang perfume and Macassar oil. The fragrance is strongest early

morning and at night. Ideally it should be planted in a position where the perfume can waft into living areas. It has a reputation for brittleness and so needs to be in a protected position, not too close to buildings. Regular pruning can maintain it as a bush. The black, aromatic fruits are eaten by cassowaries and fruit pigeons.

Kuranda yellow crazy ant infestations update

Russett Park - Russett Park is receiving its next annual survey in March 2024 to check for the presence or absence of yellow crazy ants. In the last annual survey in March 2023, a small patch of yellow crazy ants was detected, which has been spot treated.

Green Forest - Yellow crazy ants were detected in January 2024 at a complex rainforest site in the Green Forest area. The persistent patch of yellow crazy ants was thankfully reported to the Authority by the property owner, highlighting the importance of reporting suspect sightings. This site is an existing infestation area and spot treatment has already been completed. A full annual survey of this site will be going ahead in March 2024,

Myola - No yellow crazy ants were detected during limited survey efforts at the Myola site in December 2023. Surveys were started in December 2023 but were interrupted by the wet season. The next full survey of this site will go ahead in April 2024.

Forest Solutions FNQ - Toolbox Talk

The Taskforce teamed up with Forest Solutions FNQ on 25 January in Kuranda to talk about invasive ants. Gary Morton from Biosecurity Queensland presented live electric ants and Taskforce coordinator Ciara Bridgland presented live yellow crazy ants at the toolbox presentation.

The 15-20min talk covered live ants, infestation areas in Kuranda, approved waste transfer stations, permits to move carriers in restriction zones, who to report to, and the environmental, social and economic impacts of yellow crazy ants and electric ants.

Monthly survey takes a new direction

For the past two years, we have been undertaking a monthly survey along the banks of Kuranda creeks to check for both invasive yellow crazy ants and electric ants in Kuranda Tree frog habitat.

The great news is we didn't find any invasive ants, so we are moving in another direction: toward street surveys. You can expect to see our pink flags along your street. The flags mark ant lures of cat food and jam, and sausage, which are used to detect the presence or absence of yellow crazy ants and electric ants.

These surveys will give us greater opportunity to engage with more of you local folks, and you are all invited to join in on the fun. Keep an eye out for our first street survey announcement in April 2024.

With dangerous and invasive electric ants on the move, the most important message right now is: if you plan to swap, sell or give away pot plants or cuttings PLEASE get them checked first. You can also get a FREE yard check and do your bit to protect our precious Wet Tropics World Heritage Area.






Big thank you to the Kuranda Traders Association

Wolf spiders are prowlers of the grasses; wandering ground dwelling hunters that, like their namesake, run down their prey and overpower it. Unlike true wolves though, wolf spiders are solitary and hunt alone. They do not use a web to trap their food, but do produce silk to line their retreats and burrows. There are a huge number of species found throughout Australia and occupy habitats from the deserts to sub-alpine regions. They are well represented in the Wet Tropics but are more common in dryer open habitats rather than closed rainforest.

Size varies greatly within this group of spiders. Some only grow to 5mm long while the largest species can measure 35mm with a leg-span of 80mm. Most people will have encountered wolf spiders at some point. If you have a lawn you will most likely have a plethora of small species running through the miniature jungle on any given day.

Wolf spiders are very easy to identify because of the distinctive layout of their eyes. They have eight eyes; six of which face forward and two face the rear. Two of their forward facing eyes and the two at the rear are very large and provide these spiders with very good eyesight. These eyes make them easy to spot at night if you have a head torch (or shine any torch around from your eye-line). You will pick up the shine of wolf spiders' eyes from 30 metres away or more. It is a distinct pinpoint silver/blue reflection. They are also equipped with sensory hairs known as trichobothria. These hairs are sensitive to the tiny air currents that insects create when they move. This allows these spiders to hunt under the cover of darkness and still know exactly what is going on around it – whether it is the presence of prey or predators.

Wolf spiders are also known for their maternal care. Females carry their round egg sacs around with them until they hatch. The mother attaches the silken sac to her spinnerets at the tip of her abdomen and is then able to go about her normal activities relatively unhindered. These doting arachnid mothers even go so far as to carefully expose their eggs to sunshine to optimise the hatching time of their offspring. Most will hatch after about 30 days, and when the spiderlings emerge, they immediately climb upon their mother's back and hitch a ride. They may stay on their mum's back for several weeks before dispersing and beginning life on their own.

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Public health warning follows rise in stomach bug cases

Stomach bug cases are rising in the Far North, with public health officials urging residents to take precautions – particularly with swimming pools.

Cryptosporidiosis is a gastrointestinal disease caused by the microscopic parasite Cryptosporidium and is a common cause of acute diarrhoea in young children.

As well as infecting humans, Cryptosporidium occurs in a variety of animals including cattle, sheep, dogs and cats.

Since the start of 2024, 25 cryptosporidiosis cases have been reported in the Cairns region. A rise in cryptosporidiosis cases has been reported nationwide across Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria in recent weeks, with many of the cases being diagnosed in children aged nine years and under.

Tropical Public Health Services Cairns director Dr Richard Gair said Cryptosporidium was usually acquired through the ingestion of contaminated water or food, or through contact with infected individuals or animals.

"Drinking or accidentally swallowing water contaminated with Cryptosporidium parasites is a common mode of transmission. This can occur in places such as swimming pools, water parks, and other recreational water facilities where water may be contaminated with faecal matter," Dr Gair said.

"The most common symptom of cryptosporidiosis is diarrhoea, especially in young children. Other symptoms include nausea, vomiting, fever, headache, and loss of appetite.

He said people should avoid swimming in pools, water parks or other recreational water facilities for at least 14 days after diarrhoea has ceased.

"Swimming pool operators also need to make sure that their swimming pools are properly maintained," he said. "This includes ensuring water quality is well maintained alongside good filtration, and disinfection processes.'

Dr Gair said Queenslanders should also adhere to good hygiene to prevent the spread of

"It's important to wash hands thoroughly after going to the toilet, changing nappies, and after cleaning up animal faeces to minimise transmission of disease," Dr Gair said.

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

CATERPILLARS AND BUTTERFLIES

We're noticing the leaves of some trees being stripped and trees appearing to die. One reason may be caterpillars. We've been having extraordinary weather with prolonged rain. It's reasonable to expect some changes to our forests and gardens as a consequence. An imbalance in weather can cause an imbalance in how the natural environment responds. It seems that one noticeable imbalance is an invasion of some caterpillars, thriving in these conditions.

We have noticed a lot of our plants have been eaten by caterpillars. We try not to use insecticides on our plants because we also have a healthy frog population which we don't want to hurt. It's healthy to have grubs eating the plants. It's part of the cycle. The grubs are food for birds. And, from the grubs come fantastic butterflies. Many trees are in flower at the moment and we're enjoying an amazing display of butterflies.

Caterpillars and insects which eat your plants are doing a natural prune. Most of the time, the trees and plants will recover. At least, we hope

THE \$1 PLANT SALE

We don't think many people missed the \$1 plant sale in mid-February because it felt like everyone came to the nursery at some time over that weekend. We were run off our feet. It was a great outcome - our benches were cleared, over 1000 native plants will soon show up in local gardens, people visited the nursery for the first time and many regulars came back to pick up a bargain.

The benches are filling up fast again with new stock.

The Little Evodia (Mellicope rubra) pictured,

NEW IN THE NURSERY

Just a month ago we harvested the fruit from our Antidesma erostre, or Native Currant. This low-growing bush produces clusters of eyecatching bright red, sour fruit, feeding native birds and other wildlife. We've sown the seeds, so watch this space, and in several months we'll let you know when the young plants are ready for sale. This is a great plant for attracting wildlife and filling in a partly shady garden corner.

A MUST-HAVE - BLUE UMBRELLA

The handsome Blue Umbrella (Mackinlaya macrosciadia) bush brings birds and butterflies to your property. This small, sprawling plant rarely grows over 2m in height. It is excellent in shady, moist forest edges. Clusters of numerous flowers and colourful fruit add to the ecological value of this great understory filler.

CASSOWARY ART TRAIL

Support continues to grow for this marvellous idea of Jurg Jutzi. The Trail is now mapped to start at Mission Beach, with painted cassowary statues spotted throughout the Wet Tropics. They can be found at the Mamu Tropical Skywalk (Palmerston Hwy),

Hartley's Crocodile Adventures (Wangetti), Wildlife Habitat (Port Douglas), Rainforestation Nature Park (Kennedy Hwy, Kuranda) and there are five located in Kuranda - The Heritage Markets, Terra Nova Gallery, Kuranda Village Centre and the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre.

CASSOWARY UPDATE

Many reports and photos are coming in of sightings of cassowaries on their own. It's that time of the year. If you are lucky enough to see a cassowary around your place, please try to get a photo and let us know. We've identified around 40 cassowaries in the greater Kuranda and we think there are more to be counted.





Cape Gooseberry

The Cape Gooseberry, or Inca/Incan Berry, Goldenberry, Peruvian ground-cherry, poha-berry, husk-cherry (Physalis peruviana), is in the same family as the tomato, eggplant, potato, tomatillo and many others, the 'nightshade' or Solanaceae family.

This delicious sweet and tangy floral fruit comes from the mountains of Peru, Chile, Ecuador, Colombia region, where it is called uchuva, aguaymanto, uvilla, topotopo and many local names, though also grows very well here in the tropics. It has been said that the earliest recorded fossil of *Physalis* dates back around 52 million years, and estimates of the earliest evidence of human consumption is between 5000 and 900BCE, including cultivation by the Incans for the past 4000 years. The plant made its way via colonial conquest to England, Cape Horn, Asia, the Pacific and other regions from the early 1700s, and was grown in many more coloniser gardens in Australia back in the day. Hopefully people are getting back to having an abundant food-source garden growing around them and their families, and this is an easy, tasty, healthy addition to include. There was an excellent gooseberry bush thriving for years in the garden at the back of the original markets, with large glorious juicy gooseberries, I wonder if this plant has been planted on and is on-growing from seed or cuttings and still exists somewhere? If anyone knows please let us know too, and share some seeds with us if you can.

Meanwhile there are some other good bushes growing around the place, though no-one seems to have taken them on as a more commercially available crop. They grow easily organically, and can be grown in with other crops syntropically or in permaculture guilds, and so could easily be added to what is already growing in the garden, marketgarden or on the farm. A growing awareness and market may encourage more growers.

It is a rambling perennial bush which can be cut back to spur new growth. A healthy bush can have many flowers, green fruits (do not eat!) and the brightly coloured orange sweet treat shining thru the dry husk around the fruit, which can be visually stunning. As mentioned, do not eat - and let all around know not to eat — the green unripe fruit, which can be toxic, so wait for the fruit to colour up and the husk/ calyx to dry and enjoy the natural sweetness.

In areas where they are more familiar, people harvest them and make pies and tarts, jams, chutneys, sauces and other preserves, juices, smoothies, or just eat them by the handful or bowl or in salads or desserts, as well as drying them for the goldenberry/incaberry which is gaining popularity as a nutritious 'superfood', with twice the vitamin C as a lemon in each little fruit and many other vitamins and minerals. Nutritionists and dieticians have found good amounts of vitamins A, C, B (including thiamine, riboflavin, niacin, B12), E, K, beta-carotene, fibre, phosphorous,

protein, zinc, magnesium, iron and potassium, antioxidants, with anti-inflammatory, blood-sugar-regulatory qualities, and more. They are said to be detoxing, diuretic, immuneboosting, helpful for diabetes, bone and eye health, what a handy (and yummy) storehouse of goodness to have growing in the garden!


The metre or so high bushes seem to grow in a variety of conditions, in full sun and in shade, and are traditionally an understory plant, though can be seen to be hardy all round, so perhaps plant them in a few areas to ensure a good harvest.

There are many seeds in each fruit and so it is easy to propagate more once you start off with a good-size, beautiful colour, juicy and tasty fruit to grow from. Spread out on paper and dry thoroughly much like you would a tomato, and save/share/propagate seeds.

The Club also has an air conditioned training room for hire. Our beautiful Club grounds are also available for hire to approved applicants.


