A Concerned Local Diner.

Dear Kuranda Paper.

I would like to inform readers about recent developments re: the children's playground for Centenary Park. I wholeheartedly support MSC's decision to purchase and install a new playground for Kuranda's children. However, council have purchased and planned to install a 9x11m facility with no community consultation. I attended a community meeting on Wednesday May 23 with a representative of Parks and Gardens (MSC). To my knowledge, this was the first opportunity for residents to view the plans.

Council had intended to begin construction of the proposed playground on Thurs 24th May. It was only due to the efforts of a few residents and local organisations that construction has been delayed until 'some' consultation can take place.

Having viewed the plans, I would like to raise some concerns in this public forum,

I question the safety of the a) proposed location.1 am concerned due to the proximity to Therwine Street traffic & parking bays. Children run fast, and faster when pursued by anxious parents. I am loathe to imagine the consequences should a child cover the twelve metres to the curb before their carer can catch them. I believe that an un-fenced facility in this area poses great risk to small children.

The proportions the playground is not in keeping with the proportions of the village green. The village green works because it can facilitate many uses simultaneously. (to urists, locals, ball players, dog walkers, public celebrations (Spring Fair, Sorry Day), community meetings, children, picnics, war memorial.) I feel that such a large playground will excessively dominate the space and suggest to users that the green is a 'children's only'

Aesthetically, the design c) the playground is not in keeping with the unique rainforest experience that Kuranda is supposed to provide. The proposed playground is far from unique and is at odds with the 'hand-made' nature of the village

and it's existing public art. As a resident who also happens to be a parent, I propose that

the previous location, (by the tree) was both aesthetically pleasing, comfortable and most importantly, further away from the parking bays.

My suggestions re the new playground are as follows

I propose that the facility be located on the opposite side of the park. (Nearer to the fig tree) The alternate location will give parents the best chance of protecting our children. A smaller sized playground would limit the impact on other park users and leave 'open-space' for public celebrations but as the facility has already been purchased we have little choice in this matter.

A lesser option is to fence the proposed Therwine Street location in a style that is inkeeping with other steel-works in the village. Rather than a standard pool fence, the addition of sculptural forest animals as found in the public art pieces elsewhere would help to improve the aesthetic appeal and to unify the facility with existing village structures.

Some may argue that it is up to the parents and care-givers to keep children safe. I fully agree. It is because of my commitment to my child's, and all children's safety that I take this matter very seriously. A healthy community needs to support parents and care givers wherever possible. Council, as community representatives ought to be utterly convinced of the safety of this project before they proceed.

Plans of the playground can be viewed at the Tourist Information Centre. Or, take a look at the large orange rectangle sprayed on the grass in front of the info centre... that shape represents the proposed location and size of the playground. Interested persons are invited to attend a community meeting at the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre, Monday 4th June, 11.30am. Please phone the KNC to confirm meeting time 40938933.



A Thought for June

This month we read from St Luke's Gospel Chapter 24 verses 46-53. Reading the end of this Gospel of Saint Luke's is not actually an ending, it's really a beginning. Although it marks the end of Jesus being among the disciples in a visible, objective way, it also shows them being called to the beginning of a new responsibility.

They had seen Jesus die, and had scattered, demoralised and defeated. Then the unbelievable had happened: he came among them again. Although he was changed, the disciples were quite sure it was Jesus whom they had known and followed for the last few years. From time to time he reappeared: to all of them in Jerusalem, to Mary in the garden, to a group fishing in Galilee, to a couple on the road to Emmaus. It is just after this last encounter that this Gospel passage begins. The two disciples have just come running back from Emmaus. They have gasped out the story of their encounter with what they had thought was a stranger. In the simple action of his breaking a piece of bread they realized that the person with them was far from being a stranger. It was their Lord!

The news electrifies the rest of the disciples into all sorts of thoughts and hopes and plans. Suddenly, Jesus is among them. Once again, he explains the meaning of all that has happened and is happening. He reassures them that the world is not

falling apart. The ghastly cross was part of a great plan, and his coming from the tomb was the climax and triumph of that plan. Now something new must begin in and through them.

What has happened has to be communicated, and that task is in their hands. This Gospel's point is that we are those whom Jesus calls disciples. Whatever was said in that long-ago encounter after the resurrection is being said again to-day and will be said in every age. Ours are the ears that hear him - or choose not to hear him - today.

Jesus was asking for his disciples' commitment, and he asks the same of us. If we commit ourselves to him he promises us what he promised those men and women. He promises his Spirit, the Spirit we call the Holy Spirit, in our deepest being. It's a real promise which millions of men and women have found to be true. If we say Yes to him giving him our spirit, poor and limited though it may be, he gives us his. We get much the better side of the bargain!

Jesus ended this last encounter by gathering the disciples, blessing them, and going from them. As people have discovered in every generation since, he went away only to return into every one of their lives. He has already returned to yours and mine; all we need to do is to realize it. When Jesus left his disciples he did so only to return into every one of their lives. He can return to our lives as well.

National Baha'i Delegate Returns Home with Plan for Neighbourhood Harmony

16 May 2007

Mr Nasser Saeedi from Cairns has just returned from representing this local area at the national convention of the Baha'is of Australia in Sydney. A major focus of the convention was the ability of every person to help create a peaceful and harmonious community, through their interaction with their neighbours.

"The Baha'i community sees positive interaction within the local community as very important" said a community spokesperson from Kuranda. "All Baha'i activities are focused on building unity and mutual understanding between people of all backgrounds and beliefs. Our activities range from adult study circles and prayer and meditation meetings to education programs for children and youth. They are open to the whole community".

Attended by 95 delegates from around the country, the core component of the annual convention is the election of 9 members of the National Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is of Australia, the religion's peak governing body in this country.

"The Baha'i Faith is unusual among religions in that its affairs are governed by democratically elected institutions of lay believers", he explained . "There is no priesthood".

"Baha'i elections are also distinctive because putting forward candidates, nominations, and electioneering are strictly forbidden. We see the election as a spiritual process which should be conducted in a prayerful atmosphere".

All adult members of the community, women and men, are eligible to be voted for at the elections, which are held in almost every country around the world at this time.

The national convention is also an opportunity for delegates to exchange ideas and experiences.

The Baha'i Faith was founded in the 19th century by Baha'u'llah (1817-1892), who dedicated his life to the promotion of religious teachings such as the oneness of God, elimination of all forms of prejudice, equality between the sexes, and the establishment of world peace. The Baha'i Faith has been present in Australia since 1920, and the National Spiritual Assembly has been elected every year since 1934.

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

These figures are for offences attended by Kuranda police, in & around the Kuranda area. Also bear in mind that 'break & enter' is a term covering all similar offences (for instance, jumping over the wall of the pub & then over the bar, after it's shut & stealing a bottle of spirits, is a break & enter).

Unofficially, I believe these figures are down on last year. And that's not counting the fact that most statistics are made up on the spot.

Fast becoming known as The Moth Man of Kuranda, a versatile Buck Richardson has had full houses for his one-man theatrical performance combined with an exhibition of his artworks on Friday nights in an intimate supper show since the season opened on 11 May.

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


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


From January through to August this year the brightest 'star', the planet Jupiter, is traveling forward, retrograding back and moving forward


FOR TIRED FEET -

BATREACH NEWS

Rambling Reptiles.



Tuesday the 20th March, 2007 was not a favourable day for one young Kuranda resident. Deciding a change of scenery was in order, this young man began to cross the range road without due assessment of traffic conditions. The young turtle was haplessly skittled by an oncoming car, but with a small stroke of fortune, the turtle was detected by a Kuranda local. Realizing that he had sustained serious injuries, the compassionate woman transported the turtle to Batreach, Wildlife Rescue and Rehabilitation. From here the turtle was transferred to the Kuranda Veterinary Surgery where he was attended to.

"Turtle" as he is aptly referred to, a juvenile, male, saw-shelled turtle, Elseya latisternum, sustained a cracked shell. The shell of a turtle is living tissue, it is bone covered by scales. Any crack to the shell must be treated by a veterinarian who will clean the wound and remove any dead or infected tissue. The crack may be sealed with fiberglass and antibiotics administered to ensure no infection occurs. After several weeks of treatment the young turtle was declared clear of infection. Sporting a partly pink, fiberglass shell he was handed back to the Wildlife Rescue Carers at Batreach, Kuranda.

"Turtle" is recovering quickly. He possesses a good appetite, with a particular taste for white-bait. He remains a wild animal and has a healthy apprehension for his carers. "Turtle" will be re-released into a safe dam with others of his kind once it is felt that there is no risk of infection. I do worry how a male turtle with a pink shell will be perceived by his counterparts! Though, like our skin, the shell constantly replaces itself, the small scales shed away with new growth formed underneath. Once the crack in the shall has healed over

the fiberglass will pare away.

Turtles that require to cross a road often freeze in the middle. Overcome by fear they will retreat into a defense position (head and legs tucked under the shell). They may remain in this vulnerable position for some time. If you encounter a turtle in the road, pick the animal up carefully with two hands around the body, holding it at arms length. Be wary of powerful claws. Walk to the edge of the road in the direction the animal was facing. Release the animal, preferably in nearby water. If this is not possible, release the turtle 20-30 meters from the road. If you are aware that no bodies of water exist in that direction, place the turtle in a cardboard box and take it to the nearest body of water.

Turtle populations continue to suffer due to human activities. Water pollution, introduced predators and habitat loss are all major threats. These precious species deserve our respect and diligence in their

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ARVEDIC RECEIPE

CURRIED POTATO PATTIES WITH CARROTS

6 large or 8 small potatoes

- 2 large carrots (2cups grated) 1 1/2 tablespoons sun flower oil
- 1 tablespoon curry powder
- 1 to 1 1/2 teaspoons sea salt (to taste)
- 2/3 cup green onions, finely chopped 1/2 cup fresh coriander leaves, finely chopped (optional)

Put water in a large pot to boil for the potatoes. Wash the potatoes well and leave on their skins. Put them in the water to boil until tender, about 1/2 hour. While they are cooking, wash and finely grate the carrots. Wash and finely chop the green onions. Put the oil in a large skillet and add the mustard seeds. When they pop, add the grated carrot and cook just long enough to wilt them slightly. Stir in the curry powder and salt. When the potatoes are done, drain them and let them cool enough to

Mash them well, with a fork or with your hands, and stir or mash in the rest of the ingredients, including the uncooked green onion and coriander leaves. Form the mixture into patties and cook on a skillet, browning them 1 to 2 minutes on each side. Serve hot.

If you need to cut down the oil, cook pattles on a non-stick pan with no oil.

Bullrout (Notesthes robustus)

The Bullrout, or freshwater Stonefish, is a venomous fish that inhabits slow moving, weed infested streams and rivers from the Daintree to Clyde River in NSW and across to Western Australia. They need the brackish water to complete part of their lifecycle. It has dorsal and ventral spines that are attached to twin venom glands. Envenomation usually occurs by standing on the bottom-dwelling, ambush predator. The spines are like hypodermic needles, the harder you stand on them, the more venom is injected.

What will happen?

Envenomation from the Bullrout causes intense pain. Envenomation intensity is dependant on the depth and number of spines that penetrate the skin. The pain is sharp and intense at the wound site. There will be bruising and inflammation, but little bleeding. One person reported that the pain started to subside in 2 hours, but the inflammation lasted for a week. Everyone is affected differently.

What should I do if I stand on a Bullrout?

Relief can be provided by applying heat to the area. Heat can be applied by immersing the site in hot water or through the use of heat packs. You should then go directly to hospital for treatment.

Diet

The Bullrout predates on small fish, prawns, crustaceans and polychaete worms. Whilst sedentary for most of the time they can dart out very quickly to catch their prey as they are ambush predators.



Wettenhall's Watch

In Parliament in April, I drew attention to the \$2.5 billion contribution tourism makes to our local economy. The Queensland government's \$48 million tourism strategy includes some components that I believe will be of real benefit to tourism in Kuranda.

Fundinghasbeen allocated to undertake visitor satisfaction surveys in Cairns, the beaches and the Tablelands which will help Kuranda businesses plan for the future and tailor and improve their products. Funding has also been provided to develop a tourism park management strategy which will identify opportunities to analyse, develop and improve tourism operations in highly visited protected

areas like Barron Gorge National Park.

A Japanese ranger exchange program will be introduced and funds will be provided to complete the Indigenous Tourism Strategy which I hope will lead to more opportunities for indigenous people to participate in and benefit from tourism. I think there is a strong demand from visitors to learn about and experience indigenous culture and great potential to build on the success of existing enterprises and grow this product in Kuranda and Far North Queensland.

On other matters, work is now well underway on renovations to the new Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre. I would like to offer a sincere welcome to Marg Yandell who has taken over the position for Vicki Donovan. I thank Vicki for all her hard work skills and dedication to KNC and wish her well in her new position in Cairns. I am very pleased that my representations to the Minister for funding for a fulltime co-ordinator for the center were successful and as a result the new center will reach its full potential.

Progress on the new swimming pool in Kuranda is well underway – with construction due to be completed by early January 2008.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

If you go down to Centenary Park today you're in for a big surprise – just take a look at the big orange spray painted rectangle! This is Council's preferred location for Kuranda's new playground.

It's a huge 9m x 11m with shade sails. It will be unfenced and the location is extremely unsafe with only 12m to Therwine St's car parks and vehicles. It will infringe on our village green. And it's already purchased with a contractor ready to go.

Heard about it? No, I didn't think so. No community consultation has happened prior to a small community meeting on Wednesday 23 May, which Council didn't organise. The plans can now be viewed at the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre and the Library.

Thankfully Council has stopped work on the project until they meet on Tuesday 5 June. Many people and community organisations have already voiced their opposition to this location. Council has not said if they will consult the community in the interim. Everyone is invited to a community meeting at 11.30am Monday 4 June at the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre.

The best location for the new equipment is parallel to Coondoo St near the existing playground area beside the fig tree. This shady playground location is in keeping with Kuranda. A quick fix and no doubt not perfect, but a much better outcome for child safety and the Park's amenity than their location. Council's location flies in the face of previous Park consultation, planning and logic. If they pursue this location then a child safety fence in keeping with Kuranda will need to be installed.

But the whole process begs the question of why does Council hold the community's views in such contempt it won't consult with us in the first place? They are extremely naive to imagine that we will be happy with a "Council knows best" approach. Surely improving community involvement processes in future projects will result in better supported outcomes?

At least our kids will be happy with a playground at last.

For the **safety of the children**, parents are not allowed to park on the school grounds inside the gates at the primary campus. In addition, everyone must turn into the car park at the Myola end of the car park, not the primary campus end. People who continue to ignore this request are accidents just waiting to happen.

Presently, there are a number of parents parking on Myola Road near the school buildings. As a part of the defect and design fault process, I signed off (on behalf of the community) to extend the fence another 70 metres along Myola Road. Is this still the parent opinion? After the fence is built, I do not want a parent group that is angry that I have cut off the access to the school directly off Myola Road.

Dare to Lead

The college underwent a critical examination of its ability to cater for indigenous students and its indigenous curriculum through the Dare to Lead organization. I am pleased to report that we were "culturally aware and appropriate."

OECD Visit

The world conference of Education Minister's and Director Generals is being held in Cairns in two weeks time. Kuranda District State College will be hosting the delegates for half a day. The delegates will be visiting the Families as First Teachers program and also having lunch as prepared by the Senior School Hospitality Students

International Study Tour

We will be hosting our annual study tour group of students from Japan on July 28 to August 7. This year we are hosting 20 children from 16 to 18 years of age. We will be sending home information to families who can help the school home stay the students in the very near future. The Misuse of Evolutionary Conflict.

To illustrate the direction of this article I will introduce a quote by Albert Einstein (1819-1955) German born American Physicist.

"During the last century, and of the one before, it was widely held that there was an irreconcilable conflict between knowledge and belief." Einstein's quote indicates the existing controversy between theology and investigative science. What the effects of these conceptual challenges have on personal conflict will be showing incoming chapters.

Fist let's begin at the beginning with a quote from Carl Sagan - "We are the stuff of the stars" (1980 Cosmos) his hypothesis that life on this planet owes its existence to amino acids that were part of a meteorite impacting the Earth, thus "Star stuff contemplating star stuff". However he was not alone with this concept.

This hypothesis was first postulated in 1871 by William Thomson, 1st Barron Kelvin (mathematical physicist, engineer) on the Origin of Life report to the 41st meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science.

Further to attest to this hypothesis in 1969 Murchison, a town in Victoria, sonic booms were heard as a meteorite broke up in flaming descent across the sky. The Murchison meteorite was dated to 4.5 billion years old and was composed of carbonaceous chondrite, (a very rare from of chondritic meteorite, with high levels of water and organic compounds) containing amino acids, 74 types in all, of which 8 are involved in the formation of proteins (Bill Bryson from "A Short History of Almost Nearly Everything" 2003.

A quote from Nobel Laureate Christian de Duve appears to support this view "an obligatory manifestation of matter, bound to arise wherever conditions are appropriate. De Duve thought it likely that such conditions would be encountered perhaps a million times in every galaxy". (Bill Bryson, 2003).

How, what and why? Rational thoughts as opposed to a nonlinear belief that something exists in its own accord. In this case questions are still asked but only in theological abstract which doesn't develop into a rational belief, but into a non-directional concept, with no possible way of developing the questions (how, what, and why). They are conceived by the individual's personality. That is to say his belief on the subject, in this case life was created.

That's it! No further discourse, no further hypothesis, which could lead to research. No possible way forward.

Once again in support of investigative science, another quote by Carl Sagan. "The method of science is tried and true it is not perfect, it's just the best we have and to abandon it with skeptical protocols is the pathway to a dark age". (Committee for Skeptical inquiry).

An outcome of belief that is not structured around the principles of research into possible cause and effect, by its own right becomes a means to an attitude that contributes to self conflict. It is observable the outcome of conflict in the cultures of differing societies. History itself whether rewritten or not defines the process of individual conflict. For example the Crusades, first launched in 1095 under auspices of Pope Urban 11 (Catholic Encyclopedia) the effects of that Crusade and others since have been compounding up to the 21st century.

It can be shown that personal conflict has a source, also it has an influence on the mind and our behaviour.

We make our own reality and in the course of doing so, conflict in the mind will influence any decisions and course of action taken. Internal self conflict is a precursor to fear complex or phobia, and as seen in the crusades and other theatres of war when this phobia becomes international we have the modern day equivalent of the results, with ongoing conflict in the world arena. On analyses off the individual and international mind it is apparent that the wrong actions lead only to compounding the original status. We need to return to the individual. The solution in world events begins in solving the individual's internal conflict.

I must remind you that this conflict is only of the mind, does not exist outside of the mind. Although it may appear so, we are reacting to external stimuli; it is the stimulus that triggers a reaction in the brain and acting on the storage-retrieval system an emotive response is then transformed to action. It

can be argued that the instincts for survival of the species in their evolutionary process have created in the mind an autonomous reaction to possible threats to life, an event that may be the root cause to perpetual self conflict. More on that later, but now let's return to mental conflict what the hell is it?

From early childhood we have grown up with the impact of varying experiences which good or bad help form our personality and leave an impression on the mind. Accumulated and stored in the subconscious they are involuntarily recalled from the implicit memory by an indirect trigger, such as smell, touch, environment, etc and bring about a recollection of prior events, either good or otherwise. It is our reaction to these events that produces emotion which in turn involuntarily become our self imposed complexes, administering to our conflicts.

The anxieties induced then cause the physical body to undergo chemical changes. All the glands influenced by the process of anxiety; the adrenaline secretions, the parathyroid, thyroid, sex hormones and pituitary all bring about a flight or fight syndrome. If we are unable to do either then our stress level increases symptoms, including shortness of breath, perspiration, twitching of muscles, and an increased blood flow with subsequent increase of adrenalin. These chemical changes in the blood effect our behaviour and our interaction with the environment.

Periodically the term consciousness has been alluded to, therefore let's turn our attention to the meaning of consciousness. How does neurobiological process cause consciousness? Consciousness as defined in the dictionary; state of being, totality of a person's thoughts and feelings. However, it should not be confused with self-referential which ascribes as self-consciousness. "Conscious states are caused by lower levels of neurobiological processes in the brain and are themselves a higher level feature of the brain". (John R. Searl).

Stimuli (as mentioned in this article) are received from the external world and are converted by the nervous system into variable rates of neuron firing at synapses that, recalled from stored memories, are the lower level of biological processes. (Lower level neuronal process in the brain causes consciousness and consciousness is simply a higher level feature of the system. But as to how the brain processes cause conscious states is not yet known.

J. Searl - "It is astounding that consciousness could be produced by electro-biochemical terms and to attempt to explain it in neurobiological terms at this point in time would be near impossible. A century ago it seemed extremely mysterious, puzzling to some people and metaphysically impossible that life should be accounted for in terms of mechanical, biological or chemical processes. But now we know that we can give such an account, and the problem of how life arises from biochemistry has been solved to the point that we find it difficult to understand why it seemed such an impossibility at one time. But once we recognize the fact that conscious states are caused by neurobiological processes, we automatically convert the issue into one for theoretical scientific investigation. It has been removed from the realm of philosophical or metaphysical impossibility".

In this article I have attempted to show the relevance of conceptual thought and the progression of such towards a hypothesis for further research, whilst still maintaining the flow from one concept to another. The term conflict is laced within the article portraying a plausibility of conceptual conflict, and all brought together to the interpretation of consciousness.

After all it's all in the mind! Allan Denny.

NEW KURANDA PLAYGROUND LOCATION UNSAFE?

Is Mareeba Shire Council gambling with our kids lives?

It only takes a split second for a young child to run onto a road and be hit by a vehicle. The consequences are devastating.

Bouquets to Mareeba Shire Council for deciding to replace the children's playground in Centenary Park - Kuranda needs a playground.

Brick bats for doing it without community consultation!

Council has chosen to install a 9 x 11 meter playground with shade sails and soft fall, to a new location beside the Kuranda Visitor Centre and toilets, and adjacent to carparks on busy Therwine St (opposite Annabel's Pies) - see orange spray painted rectangle in the Park. Only a very narrow, poorly vegetated garden bed and pathway stand between our kids and Therwine St's tourist traffic, buses etc - 12 meters to be exact.

Council already has the equipment and contractors ready to install the playground over a ten week period. Thankfully Council has stopped work on the project until they meet on Tuesday 5 June. The plans can now be viewed at the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre and the Library.

However, "Location, location" as the saying goes. Many of us think that the new equipment should be located parallel to Coondoo St near the existing playground area beside the fig tree. This shady playground location is in keeping with Kuranda.

The equipment will fit in this location and there are no engineering or environmental impediments. Previous Park consultation and planning determined this as the logical location for play equipment. If Council pursues their location then a child safety fence in keeping with Kuranda will need to be installed.

Council is considering this issue at their next meeting on Tuesday 5 June. We need to make sure that this time they take on board the community's views on child safety and the Park's amenity.

A VOICE FOR KURANDA

RESULTS OF POLL OPTIONS FOR KURANDA'S FUTURE conducted in Kuranda in March 2004

During the month of March 2004, a poli of Kuranda's residents was undertaken to determine the range of attitudes regarding our voicelessness in Mareeba Shire and what options we might pursue to remedy the situation. The poll was open to people over 18, who live in Kuranda be they voting or non-voting residents or ratepayers. Every polling form was initialled by an issuing officer during the poll to ensure only one person submitted one vote.

The results are summarised in the table below

64.2% want to leave Mareeba Shire. 88.4% are not happy with existing "no voice"

These figures are consistent with the Local Government election results of 27/3/04 in which I, standing for a voice for Kuranda, won two-thirds of the Kuranda vote but did badly in the rest of the shire. This, too, is consistent with how each of the population centres within the shire voted for the candidates they knew in their own areas.

Kuranda generally gave high support for the independent candidates and low support for the sitting council. This was contrary to how the rest of the shire voted generally. The fact that Kuranda voted differently from the rest of the shire illustrates that the vast majority of residents in Kuranda see their Wet Tropics place and tourist industry as different from Mareeba's Dry Tropics and farming communities.

We proved what we set out to prove. that no amount of support for a Kuranda person will gain a voice for Kuranda within Mareeba Shire's current no-divisions system. This is the first set of figures that gives us an idea of how Kuranda feels about its existing and future situation.

There is an electoral boundary review scheduled for March 2007, in time for the next election. We, as a community, should now feel confident to press to be included in the electoral boundary review to achieve a voice in our destiny, either within the Mareeba Shire or without it

So that the push for a community voice does not get gobbled up in a committee, but remains with the community at large, I am offering to be the secretariat/coordinator of the project - A Voice for Kuranda - and keep in touch with all of you who want to proceed to investigate ways of improving our situation through a dedicated column in the Kuranda From time to time it will also be necessary to send questionnaires to all residents when choices arise so that I am given direction from the community as to how to proceed.

It should be made clear that the project is to push for a voice for Kuranda, not to debate whether we want one or not. That has been done and the results are clear. Those who are satisfied with the current arrangements in the Mareeba Shire should form their own group if they feel the need to do so.

To date, I have aired our case with the new Minister for Local Government & Planning, Desley Boyle, and spoken to a number of Local Council mayors and officers. There is no doubt our plight is recognised and appreciated. Out of courtesy. I have reported to Mareeba Shire Council the results of the public poil and asked for its cooperation in achieving a voice for Kuranda. I will publish the response when one is received.

Please don't hesitate to let me know if you would like to be more involved in the tasks of the secretariat, in calling meetings, in framing up questionnaires and so on.



Kuranda -An ecotourism centre but why not an ecotown too!

Isn't this just a wonderful place to live! We are a community of great diversity, many talents and skills, and have come from all over the country, all over the world to live here. It is so easy to get absorbed in working in this environment, in building our houses, making our gardens and protecting our natural environment. However the madness of the world is getting madder out there! It is easy to get depressed and feel a sense of hopelessness, but we are not powerless, we can do something.. This could be an exciting time!!

About 15 years ago, longer term residents will remember when we were faced with the destruction of our lifestyle, our village in the rainforest. Some would say that the old ways have been destroyed, but rather I think there has been an evolution, a balancing of the ecological and the commercial requirements of our community. Back then we were seeing swathes of forest destruction by road construction, Telstra cabling, Ergon overhead cabling, and our roadsides were rapidly being converted from soft natural buffers to urbanised curb and channelling, and streetlights. Back then we had an unsympathetic shire council who seemed to want nothing more than to cut down trees and convert Kuranda into a parking lot! There was much talk about doing something..."somebody should do something", but then we acted! We got together as a community, and eventually we got our council on side. Things were discussed in "Vision workshops", plans were made and organisations such as Landcare (now Envirocare) were established. Kuranda became promoted as an ecotourism centre.

People have been complaining that our local paper has recently been full of petty squabbles and conflicts between individuals and groups. Some of this is inevitable in any community, but now that we are not just facing the destruction of our village, but rather of our world, it would be wonderful if we could unite and show how a small community can make a difference. Human beings often show their greatest abilities under threat. Again it is time for action...not just talk!! Reducing our use of fossil fuels (before we become fossils ourselves!), can easily be done here, now. Groups of us have been discussing the importance of installing solar hot water systems immediately, as heating is one of the major uses of domestic energy. However for this to be successful it needs to be cheap and easily installed. We don't need those expensive full systems that are currently available, we need solar collectors that we can link to our existing systems, but currently there doesn't appear to be anything suitable. Perhaps some local inventors could come up with something simple and cheap. After all, even a coil of poly pipe on the roof will heat water!! Perhaps cheap collectors could be made in Mareeba, providing more job prospects. Some of us are interested in electric cars and bikes...relatively low tech, not rocket science...ideally suited to local industry, community made vehicles which can be serviced locally too. In Kenthurst, in NSW, the community has been developing and using electric vehicles for several years now, and even has re-charge outlets at their major stores and public buildings, according to a recent article I read. Detractors say that this is not the answer, but there is no one answer, but rather the need for people interested in various aspects of energy conservation to work together to have a mass effect. Although they are still using electricity, they are using electric engines of around 90% efficiency compared with the old internal combustion engine, that would be lucky to be 20% efficient. Installation of water tanks, solar electricity generation and perhaps even converting our sewerage works into a methane generator for biogas. (Some have been wondering for years what to do with all the hot air from Kuranda!) We also have existing, some hydro power from the Barron river. As a community we could negotiate with power companies to sell solar home-generated power to the grid. We could try to negotiate with the producers of the 'sliver cell panels' to have a test community of solar electricity generation...a good marketing ploy for them. Our eco tourism status would increase substantially and people would come here to learn what they could do in their own communities...more sales and education opportunities for community employment.


If, as a community, we got together again and did some 'brainstorming", many other suggestions would come forth. It would be rewarding, instructive, community building, and a great opportunity to spawn new environmentally sensitive industries, benefitting all. With the industrial ability of Mareeba "just 28 minutes down the road", we could become the Shire of innovation for the future!! In this community, we have the ability to promote technical innovation, ecological education, and lifestyle skills such as yoga and relaxation, as well as ecotourism. CHEAP, CLEAN ENERGY SOON

Let's work together to negotiate a better deal with the energy companies

Many of you would have received a recent mailing offering a choice in choosing our energy provider. What if we tried negotiating as a whole community to get a better deal? We are being held to ransom by the big coal and energy companies. Ergon claims to offer green power to those who are prepared to pay an extra premium, but it seems this is just a big con....they won't guarantee that you will get green power or that your extra money will go into the development of



future green energy projects! It is just more money into their coffers. You may have recently seen the ABC's Catalyst program. They showed what is being done in Europe where people who put photovoltaic solar generating panels on their roofs, can sell electricity into the grid for four times what they pay to take from the grid!! What a great idea! Governments there are serious about promoting green power. They give people an incentive to do something for the environment and get a return on their investment as well! But even in NSW, in Tathra, north of Sydney, the community has got together to develop solar electricity generation themselves. This approach of 'micro generation' reduces the concentration of power generation in large polluting power stations and gives some control and some financial incentive back to the people.



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THE ATLAS CARRIES NOT ONLY THE HEAD



Rainforest Trees of Kuranda (1)

This is the first of a regular monthly column which aims to introduce you to some of the rainforest trees of Kuranda.

Our lesson for this month is a simple one - How to distinguish between a tree and potato gnocchi? Easy peasy. When dropped into boiling water, gnocchi will initially sink to the bottom of the saucepan and then after a minute or so they will rise up and float whereas a tree will float immediately upon being immersed in water.

OK, armed with that useful information, it is time to go out and look at some trees. Head off from Kuranda to the traffic lights at the highway. Continue along Myola Road for about 1.8 -1.9 k. Look across to your right and you should see several trees marked with white flagging tape and numbers. DON'T stop. Continue to the Jarawee Rd intersection and do a U-turn.

The big tree with the number 1 is a Flindersia ifflaiana (Cairns Hickory). Flindersias have an easily recognised seed pod which has 5 valves and a spiny surface. If you have a good look around you may find some empty pods under the tree. (Also number 4). Number 2 is Pandanus monticola, Pandans look as if they would make great garden plants but think twice! - They are forever dropping leaves and the leaves have edges of sharp spines.

Number 3 is Polyscias australianum. This is a pioneer species. Pioneers are the first to regrow on cleared land so they are often seen on road verges.

Number 4 is a Flindersia ifflaiana (No.1) sapling. Rainforest tree identification can be a nightmare. When you are beginning with tree identification, it is best to work with small trees where the leaves are accessible rather than trying to i.d. forest giants.

Number 5 is a Garcinia warrenii. This tree is closely related to the mangosteen. Feel its leaves. They are very stiff and thick. This makes it harder for insects to chew. It takes a lot of energy to make thick fibrous leaves so the tree wants to keep them for as long as possible. Some rainforest leaves have a lifespan of up to 5 years.

And that concludes our tree tour for May.

One participant was over heard to say "I'll look at leaves in a whole different way now". We hope to run another later this year and several 1/2 day workshops specialising in plant identification. In the meantime, to aid self learning we're establishing a plant identification walk along one of the first Landcare plantings in Kuranda. Watch the paper next month for details on where and how to access the id information.

This month I would like to mention our tendency to put things off until the last minute, I am often called to folk who will sit at home and wait and hope that the malaise they are feeling will subside or go away. However more often than not the sensation or illness worsens and what may have been just a routine visit to the local GP, is now a several hour wait at the Cairns Base Hospital to achieve the same outcome.

This puts pressure on an already over stretched and under resourced public health system, and, also will often inconvenience family members for return journeys to Kuranda once the doctor has done what they can. Please be aware that the QAS does not routinely wait and return people home.

While I am not advocating that you put off seeing the Doctor because it is out of hours, I know that I am often told that a patient has had the same symptoms for the entire day, and now the possibility of a poor nights rest has made the need to consult a doctor more urgent. I know that Dr Dave Cumming and his team are more than willing for you to consult with them and often this is the most efficient way to be seen by a Doctor. Should you require further treatment or admission to hospital, then the Kuranda Medical Service team are adept at getting the ball rolling for all of your health care needs.

So don't put things off, get things seen to in a timely manner and avoid if possible, going to hospital. If however you need transport or ambulance attention please call 000 24 hours a day and we will be happy to service your needs.

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

Garden Jottings by Alectura P. nummularitiolia with 1

Things to consider this month: June 2007.

With cooler weather and welcome recent rains, the keen garden will already be turning their mind to the months ahead, preparing their gardens to best deal with the coming Dry and replacing nutrients leached during the long Wet. Compost and mulchings are the answer to all soil problems opening up clays and building body in sandy soils.

Kuranda with its great showing of Open Gardens, its many ardent gardeners and plant collectors and well as several resident world authorities on different plant genera is developing as an attraction for interstate and overseas garden lovers. With the town's gardens newly top-dressed, it is to be hoped that any civic plantings made will reflect the colour and vibrancy possible in tropical gardens. Yes we can do better than Cairns! Maybe KVPP and the Chamber of Commerce will get behind more exciting and eye-catching displays around town. Probably as many visitors are to be seen taking pics of the little gardens outside St. Saviours and the big Figs as of any other town attraction.

For new comers, the Kuranda Garden Club offers a perfect way to learn about the differences faced in gardening in FNQ. As well as information and the opportunity to see other gardens, the garden group offers a warm welcome and support.

Remember the time to prepare for and order/plant citrus and other fruit trees.

Plant of the month: Pilea -(Urticaceae -the nettle family) A large family with near 600 members distributed in warm and tropical regions throughout the world except Australia, Probably the best known member is Pilea microphylla, also known as the artillery fern from it habit of shooting out pollen in clouds from its tiny flowers. This is that ubiquitous plant coming up everywhere in cracks in paving and potted plants. Never growing more than 15cm high and with its soft almost succulent stems and finely divided foliage it can be useful as a filler or edging with a larger leafed similar but deeper green plant P. serpyllacaea sometimes also available.

Other more highly ornamental species include P. cardierei, sometimes known as the Aluminium plant from its silvery grey markings on its 2" slightly margined leaves. With its smaller and more compact cultivar P. cardierei 'Minima', both plants of the easiest propagation make excellent under-storey groundcover.

P. nummulariifolia with its creeping, trailing habit, rooting at the nodes and growing to about 15cms is the commonly known "Creeping Charlie". An excellent shade loving ground cover.

More exotica are P. involucrate, P. nigrescens and the more frequently seen cultivar 'Moon Valley'. All these species are highly desirable giving a subtlety and colour at ground level. Of the easiest cultivation, all require semi-shade, good soil moisture and avoidance of wet feet. Of the easiest propagation from stem cutting struck in sand with rooting taking about three weeks in warmer weather. Care should be taken in disposing of any plants as some forms may have feral potential.

Native:

C. cooperi, the Lacy Tree Fern, derives this name from its delicate fronds. It is also known as the Australian Tree Fern as it is one of the most commonly grown Australian tree-ferns.

C. cooperi is quite distinctive from C. australis in that it has a more slender trunk with distinctive "coin spots" where old fronds have broken off the trunk. C. cooperi fronds are bright green and lacy and tend to be very fast growing. There are several major horticultural varieties of this fern including Cyathea "Brentwood" which has paler fronds and scales and C. "Robusta" which tends to be darker in both characters. C. cooperi is the one of the most popular tree ferns, along with Dicksonia antarctica due to its rapid growth form, hardiness and aesthetic appeal.

Tree-ferns grow best in high humidity and high soil moisture conditions. It is therefore important to use good-quality mulches and to top them up regularly as this will not only keep the soil moist but also provide nutrients to the shallow root system. Tree-ferns usually respond well to organic fertilizers and well-rotted animal manures, *C. cooperi* especially as it tends to display particularly vigorous growth.

Though a wide range of pests attack ferns they rarely cause significant damage. If outbreaks do occur tree-ferns can be treated with the standard array of organic and non-organic pesticides. It has been found that the use of fertilizers can reduce a tree-ferns susceptibility to attack. Thus by providing adequate food, water and shelter you will be able to grow beautiful and healthy tree-ferns in your own garden!

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Dreaming Rail

A recent report in the Tablelands newspaper suggests that the 4-Lane Highway from Smithfield to Kuranda may prove too expensive to construct.

As projected costs for the proposed Kuranda Range Highway escalate up, up and away, heading towards the billion dollar zone and beyond - and opposition to this environmental monstrosity continues to grow - it's worth considering an alternative future for the Kuranda area that isn't based on the Los Angeles recipe for the good life: blast and build, slash and sprawl, clear and consume.

Does that mean no change at all? Shall our children - and theirs - still be driving daily up and down a busy two-lane Kuranda Range Road in 10, 20, 30 years time?

I hope not - even though no change would be a better outcome than current plans to build a Highway and a car-dependent urban sprawl in the Kuranda area, Yet what we have at present is far from the best possible outcome.

Surely our generation should try to build a better future for our kids - not just patch up the same unsustainable way of life? In that optimistic spirit, this short article considers, for once, a best case scenario.

I think it would be a great shame if debate over new transport infrastructure for this part of FNQ ends with a decision not to build the Highway. We can - and should - do better.

I'd base an alternative vision on developing sustainable communities connected by modern, efficient rail links, supplemented (not over-shadowed) by the road network.

How about upgrading existing public transport corridors between Cairns and the Tablelands to serve the needs of the 21st century? After all, the substantial network of rail easements is one great asset that this area inherited from the first European settlers - purchased at the time with much sweat and tears on the part of both invaders and the indigenous people. We might as well use it - and use it well!

The Kuranda area already has a rail corridor linking Kuranda with Cairns and Mareeba. We don't need to invent it: it's there! It doesn't have to be purchased: the public already owns it. What we need now is the wisdom to use it imaginatively.

At present, this rail corridor is chronically under-utilized. It runs vehicles that owe more to the 19th century than today's needs or possibilities. This allows skeptics to claim that rail is irrelevant to our needs. Simplistically projecting what happened in recent decades into the future, they claim "no-one would ever use rail". Investment in rail is limited to patching up existing infrastructure and tourist shows. The failure of rail to play a significant role in our lives has become a self-fulfilling prophecy.

We need to break out of this cycle. The rail network is so grossly underused at present it may as well not be used at all by the current generation of trains. Let's put these corridors to real use - not to display antiques, but to service actual transport needs!

At this point, I confess, I'm not a railway engineer. Like 99.99% of the rest of the population, I'm an amateur in this highly specialized field of human knowledge. So, absent authentic, detailed knowledge about what's currently

possible, I'd like to run a simple argument from first principles. We should start by identifying - as a broad planning decision - what we need and what we'd like to make happen. Once we have some consensus about broader goals, it should become easier to find transport technologies to do their job. At least we'll know what we're looking for!

At minimum, we already know we'll need a transport system to move people and goods efficiently around this region, while generating MUCH lower emissions of greenhouse gases and imposing a lighter load on the environment in general.

Speaking personally, I'd also like a transport system that encourages and supports a different style of settlement in FNQ - a settlement pattern more European (as opposed to North American) in overall design, reversing previous trends to the proliferation of car-dependent suburban sprawls.

I'd prefer a more nodal Cairns, with village-style settlements of attractive medium density housing efficiently interconnected by rapid public transport - and lot's more open space and bush land in between.

A similar model should be extended outside Cairns - including the tablelands -although these more rural areas would support much lower overall residential densities. Even so, the basic formula would be the same: village-style nodes, interconnected by rapid, efficient public transport.

The Kuranda area is already endowed with a rail corridor that runs from Cairns, through Kuranda village and along the Myola valley to Koah and Mareeba. It would make sense to have village-style development consolidating nodes already serviced by existing rail easements. Some additional spurs might also be worthwhile (a branch line to Speewah?). It goes without saying that any new residental developments should meet the strictest environmental controls, guided by the overall goal of developing a sustainable way of life.

For residents of these village-style settlements to see rail as their preferred transport mode - preferable in most cases to using the road network - rail services would need to be frequent, fast and cheap. Is that possible in rural areas with relatively small populations?

This question heads inescapably back into the realm of transport engineering and economics. The simple answer is that I don't know. But surely these are at least the right questions to be asking. At present, it's not clear we're asking appropriate questions about transport infrastructure - let alone coming up with the best solutions!

A final point. Getting visionary long-term transport infrastructure in place is important. It's a task appropriate to a time of high economic activity and wealth. But this need not - and should not - be at the expense of immediate initiatives to make better use of existing infrastructure and resources.

In the case of Kuranda, whatever the long-term future may hold, for the next few years at minimum there will be no major new transport infrastructure completed and ready to use.

For this reason, Friends of the Earth Kuranda is seeking funds to carry out a 'demand management' transport project. The goal is to encourage better sharing and more efficient use of existing transport facilities in the Mareeba Shire. Details are available on the FoE Kuranda website at www.foekuranda.org

1/4 Pound Fruit Cake Microwaved

750g mixed fruit soaked o/n in ¼ cup of sherry
125g of butter
1 cup brown sugar

½ teaspoon vanilla 3 eggs

1 tablespoon marmalade 1.1/4 cups of plain flour

pinch of salt

1 teaspoon cinnamon ½ teaspoon mixed spice ½ teaspoon nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon ginger 1 teaspoon Parisian essence 2 tablespoons sherry extra Grease and line with double thickness of greaseproof paper microwave container 18cm round and 7.5 cm deep extending paper 4 cms above rim. Cream butter and sugar adding vanilla Mix in eggs one at a time, beating well Stir in marmalade. Sift dry ingredients and add alternatively with sherry/fruit and Parisian essence. Spoon into greased dish. Smooth and microwave on MEDIUM

Power for 15 minutes. Reduce to LOW Power and cook a further 20 minutes.

Fold over paper extension and cover with foil to stand 10 minutes. Test with skewer in several places. Pour on extra sherry and replace foil. Wrap well and allow to cool. More sherry can be added when removed from dish. Wrap well for longer keeping.

Note: wider container will require shorter cooking time – a tasty forgiving recipie!

HYDROPONIC GARDENING

by Jan Coulter

With all the fuss over recycling materials, water conservation etc, I am amazed that there is not more hydroponic gardening. I started hydroponic gardening about 20 years ago when I lived on the beachfront. There was no nourishment in the sandy soil so instead of just using fertilizer I investigated Hydroponic Formula. A lot of people say it is not natural, is not organic etc. But soil is not a vital ingredient for growing plants, its actual role is to support the plant and to hold a reserve of nutrients for it's growth. What makes the plant grow is the nourishment in the soil. When compost and manures are added to soil the matter takes time to decompose into inorganic elements necessary for plant growth. In hydroponics the same inorganic elements are supplied to the plants directly. The calcium, magnesium etc is extracted from the soil in the first place. I grow all my own greens, cucumbers, tomatoes, strawberries, herbs etc.

Media.

The medium can be any number of things as long as it is inert.

I use river gravel and to open it up I add a bit of scoria. If the material is too fine it remains wet and the oxygen cannot penetrate it.

Containers.


You can if you like spend quite a lot of money, but I have always used recycled containers. Polystyrene boxes, 251 containers. Plastic pipes etc. Commercial growers require pumps to recycle the nutrient but for the hobby grower mostly it is run to waste. It drips into a container and then is recovered and used again.

Lettuce can be grown in channels similar to guttering. I grow tomatoes in cut down 25L containers. Herbs can be grown in polystyrene boxes or any container with a reservoir in the bottom.

It is easier and less expensive to grow your own seeds. As they are raised in a medium similar to seed raising mix they come up very quickly.

Actually the plants grow so quickly it is very exciting to watch.

Hydroponics has other advantages including having your
containers at bench height so there is no bending and there are very
few weeds.

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
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PETROL PRICE COMPARISON

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


