# KUR-WORLD: YOUR FUTURE, YOUR SAY Last Chance for Public Submissions

The promise/threat of KUR-World has been a hot topic, dangling before/hanging over this community, for two and a half years. Now the time has finally come for anyone who has an opinion or concern to make your voice heard. Please also make heard, through your voice, the voices of those who will come after you, who deserve to have just as special a lifestyle as you now experience. Stand up for all the wild things which will disappear under the massive clearing and habitat destruction involved.

This project by first-time developer Mr Ken Lee, a Macau resident, is sited on the old Barnwell family property, several kilometres along Myola Road past the Kuranda School. In its

- A 12-hole Golf Course, Golf Clubhouse and Function Centre
- A Sporting Precinct
- A Produce Garden with a cafe and restaurant
- A Four Star Business and Leisure Hotel and Function Centre with 270 apartments
- 300 apartments on a KUR-World "campus" up to 5 stories high
- A Five Star Eco-Resort of **200 rooms** up to 5 stories high
- A Health and Well-Being Retreat with **60 accommodation suites**
- 25 Glamping tents
- A Farm Theme Park and Equestrian Centre with 110 homestay beds
- A Rainforest education centre with **350 beds in dormitories**.
- 21 Queenslander Lots of 800 Sq mtrs
- **56 Lifestyle Villas** on 2000 to 4000 Sq mtrs
- **288 Premium Villas** on 600 Sq mtrs.

This development, should it proceed in its proposed form and be fully realised, will create a **duplicate Kuranda Village**, privately owned and operated. And **double our current population**, drawing on already inadequate infrastructure including roads, power and most especially water. It will raise land costs and increase rates and rents in a community which already struggles to meet the existing cost of living.

Construction is planned, in three stages, over nine years. The five-star hotel, "university campus", health and wellbeing retreat and premium villas in the final stage are not due to be completed until 2026, at the earliest. During and after construction helicopter flights will increase — as many as 20 per day. Roads will be under increased pressure, especially the Kuranda Range Road (the developer's solution to increased congestion and accidents is to lower the speed limit to 40kph!)

NONE of what is promised is guaranteed to be delivered, including jobs for locals. Especially the fancy, perhaps fanciful, high end items slated for Stage Three, the least likely to materialise and also supposed to provide the majority of ongoing local jobs. First comes what the developer originally wanted, cutting up of rainforest into tiny, expensive



building lots, but could not achieve without the Integrated Resort Development tag, a strategy commonly used to bypass local scrutiny and development constraints. This project has already been forced to change. But not nearly enough to guarantee endangered species, including the Kuranda Treefrog (*Litoria myola*) and vulnerable cassowaries, will not be obliterated on this property, further threatening their very existence. And all that draws visitors to us, our unique natural setting and wildlife, our potential as a high value nature-based destination

will be compromised forever.

On-site sewerage works are proposed to be constructed and at least 500 tonnes per year of sludge is to be trucked off site for disposal – but to where the developer cannot say. In an extreme weather event such as we experienced this March, the overflowing waste from the plant will have nowhere to go but into the creeks.

Demand for water by the massive project cannot be serviced totally on site and will need an additional quantity taken from the Barron by the MSC and provided by an extension to the existing town-water supply to the Kuranda village. This will be supplemented by water from five bores on site, operated to their absolute limit of 14 hours pumping per day, then 10 hours rest for them to hopefully recharge. However, rainwater is to be "harvested" and stormwater intercepted, directed anywhere but into the aquifer, ultimately lowering the water table.

With or without your voice, at this crucial time, your future will be decided not in Kuranda, nor even Mareeba, but in Brisbane. Do not miss this final chance to safeguard your quality of life. The Environmental Impact Statement (the EIS) is with the Coordinator-General, who will make the final decision as to whether this development proceeds or not. It is worth noting that the C-G's office is established to streamline the process large developers must undergo and not necessarily to help localneighbourhoods, small businesses or wildlife. However, it must also assess credibility and worth against negative impacts and burdens. And to impose conditions, restrictions and direction.

There is not a person who currently opposes this development who would not welcome a truly sustainable, intelligent, world class "eco" resort, built and run with sensitivity and integrity, for the Kuranda region. KUR-World in its current form is NOT that. It is a looming environmental disaster and social time bomb. It is a cynical land grab. PLEASE do your bit to demand an appropriate and responsible development. It is in all our interests, even the developer's, to demand THE BEST.

Submissions in response to EIS must be received by the C-G before 30th November. THIS IS THE ONLY CHANCE WE HAVE TO MAKE OUR CONCERNS KNOWN AND TO INFLUENCE WHAT HAPPENS. Daunted? Please don't be put off by the idea of making a response. A community awareness strategy has been planned, to help all to be able to make their views known and considered. How to start:

#### **KUR-World EIS**

The KUR-World EIS Study is now out – about 4000 pages of it. Could take a while to read, however, a few little gems found in there so far:

- A. KUR-World to help fund a VSL system for the Kuranda Range Road that will reduce the speed limit at times down to 40 kph and add 37% travel time on to the trip.
- B. Twenty helicopter flights a day that's tranquility for you isn't it.
- C. Eco Resort/KUR-Village/KUR-World Campus and Business and Leisure Hotel and Function Centre will contain buildings up to five Storeys high - yet the Draft Plan of Development for the 5 Star resort and Campus say that Buildings and structures do not exceed a maximum height of two Storeys - Figure that one out if you can!
- D. Cuts that part of the wildlife corridor in two.
- E. Constructing a new access road through areas of nearly extinct flora and fauna.
- F. A Traffic Study that appears to me to contain incorrect information and computations – some of the assumptions look like sheer guesswork. How would they know that 41 people will work for KUR-World instead of working in Cairns and thus won't have to travel to Cairns every day, so that subtracts some 82 trips from the Range daily figures.
- G. Uses Thala Beach Resort for Study comparison figures -Thala is hardly a \$650 million resort example – why not use Sheraton Mirage Port Douglas which is more like it or would that produce unwanted results?
- H. Construction materials to be supplied from Mareeba and Tablelands. How does it get there in the first place? Perhaps Astral travel to avoid using the Range Road and suggesting that Cairns suppliers may be willing to transport their construction supplies via the Palmerston instead of up the Range Road holds no weight for me.
- I. Just about every subject touched on has a proviso written in: "more studies needed", "will be confirmed as the design progresses", "will need to be investigated", "should it be determined", "on the basis of further investigation", "further modelling to confirm", "no monitoring undertaken", "has the potential to", "will be considered" and the list just goes on and on.

# Save Our Kindy

**Kuranda Community Kindergarten** desperately needs your help! Over the past few years the number of enrolments at the kindy has declined considerably resulting in the kindy experiencing financial trouble – and the doors may have to be closed if this continues in 2019.

The C&K Kuranda Community Kindergarten is a community managed kindergarten which has been operating in Kuranda for over 25 years. Nestled amongst the rainforest in our quiet village, the play based kindy has established itself as a beautiful and creative alternative for our local community's children, away from the city mainstream options. The kindy offers quality education and care to children aged 3–5 years old and prepares children so that they are ready for the important start of schooling, the year of Prep.

The kindergarten relies on enrolments, fundraising and government assistance to remain financially viable. To increase enrolments we are offering a Free Kindy promotion for eligible aged children (must turn four by 30th June 2019), waiving all fees and levies for:

- Guardian or child who identify as being Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander;
- Guardian or child who holds a current Australian Government Health Care Card (or have a child who does)
- Foster family with a current Australian Government Health Care Card
- Guardian who holds a Department of Veterans' Affairs Gold Card or White Card
- or Guardian who have 3 or more children, of the same age, enrolled in the same year.

2019 will offer two alternate groups to kindy families across a five day fortnight for 40 weeks (School Terms)

Group 1 (DJAMA) – Monday, Tuesday and alternate Wednesday, 8:20am to 2:30pm Group 2 (BUNDARRA) – Thursday and Friday, 8:20am to 4:00pm.

Please note that the subsidy mentioned above can be claimed once only (for attendance in one group). Full time enrolments are subject to availability & additional fees apply.

Whilst support from the local community in the form of continued enrolments is the primary key to keeping the kindy open, the kindergarten also welcomes any donations or monetary aid that may assist. In addition if there are any local organisations that would like to discuss any fundraising support this will be greatly appreciated. Donations from businesses are tax deductible.

Our kindy has the vital job of caring and developing our young Kuranda regions children. Please help us to keep it operating.





The last treatment for YCA was during September - YCA numbers continue to be at an all-time low.

Currently the Bulmba Rangers are conducting a downstream delimitation from Russett Park all the way to the weir, to detect if any YCA have spread down the Barron River. Working closely with Biosecurity Queensland, the Rangers will be checking for Electric Ants also.

Monitoring of YCA continues with a new technique on the horizon – sticky traps will be used to lure, trap and therefore detect YCA density of an area. We are calling on volunteers to help with the construction of some 12,000 sticky traps.

### When Joh and the Shah Came to Visit: A Kuranda Snapshot

**IN SEPTEMBER 1974**, Kuranda's world famous railway station was included in the official State Tour of Queensland by the then Shah of Iran and his wife, Farah. Their proud guides were Queensland Premier Joh Bjelke-Petersen and his wife, Flo. Two more different couples it would be hard to imagine.

The Shah was riding high at the time but downfall was not far away. He had been feted by governments around the world, admired to an extraordinary degree by some including sections of the US government, and portrayed as a suave, clever moderniser but his increasingly authoritarian rule was creating a seedbed for resentment and rebellion amongst impoverished and repressed Iranian people. His fancy lifestyle rankled.

In addition, he had lobbied OPEC nations to further increase oil prices in 1973 despite pleas from US President Richard Nixon. World oil prices increased 470% over a 12-month period, also increasing Iran's GDP by 50%.

The State Visit by the Shah and Empress was at the invitation of the Australian Governor-General Sir John Kerr. The visit was not without controversy and protests occurred wherever the entourage appeared, though any protests against the royals in FNQ are not recorded and probably Joh himself would have been a more obvious target at that time.

General media coverage tended to treat the visit as a celebrity tour, focusing in particular on the sophisticated fashion choices of the Empress. FNQ was a picture perfect background. "Their two-day visit to Cairns was informal but marked by tight security. They travelled by train through the dense tropical rainforest to Kuranda, where they drank tea from thick railway cups, and ate railway sandwiches. On Green Island, holiday-makers sunbathing or swimming stared as the Shah and Empress walked along dampened sand paths." (Australian Womens Weekly October 1974)

However, the visit also had a serious purpose and no doubt a long train trip up the mountain and drive back down the Range would provide perfect opportunities to talk minerals, mutton and...uranium.

While in Australia the Shah signed a trade agreement with the federal government that opened the way for Iran to purchase Australian uranium. The Shah was dedicated to increasing Iran's military capacity and to extending his influence to the Indian Ocean.

"A new concept of Australian, Iranian and Japanese cooperation in a giant petro-chemical complex in the northwest of Australia is reported in *The Australian* newspaper. The plan is that ships should bring to a Pilbara complex oil that Japan has bought in the Middle-east, and that it should be refined there for the Japanese. On their return voyages, the vessels would take Pilbara iron ore to steel mills in Iran and Saudi Arabia, as well as to Japan. Refinery by-products would be combined with natural gas obtained from the sea off the north-west coast to make petro-chemicals for Australian use and for export. The Shah of Iran is said to have offered funds for the Pilbara concept in return for Australian ore for the Krupp steel works that he has bought in Germany, and also in return for uranium for atomic energy plants he is to build in Iran." (PNG Post Courier October 1974)

The uranium deal (modelled on a secret US-Iran deal) never eventuated for in many ways 1974 was the last of the "good" years for the Shah. Not only was his regime on the road to collapse which would force him into exile but he had been diagnosed with cancer. He would die in Egypt in July 1980. "Thanks to a massive gerrymander, Bjelke-Petersen won seven state elections. He then ran for prime minister, notwithstanding the absence of a federal poll. On his own recommendation, he was knighted for services to parliamentary democracy." (Shane Moloney, *The Monthly* September 2014)

It is said Joh admired the strong-handed Shah, who at one time had such enormous power that in 1976 he changed the Iranian calendar from Islamic to Imperial, marking the conquest of Babylon by Cyrus as the first day, instead of the migration of Muhammad from Mecca to Medina. This supposed date was designed so that the auspicious year 2500 would fall on 1941, the year when his own reign



started. Overnight, the year changed from 1355 to 2535. Joh, for his part, held firm against daylight savings ever being introduced in Queensland, safeguarding curtains and cows

An interesting "local" link to the wealth of the Shah, and Iran, is that the oil industry upon which it is built began in Far North Queensland with the lucky discovery of gold by two brothers, the Morgans, and an even luckier small time Rockhampton lawyer William Knox D'Arcy. The Morgan brothers chose D'Arcy just because they needed a lawyer. D'Arcy didn't have any expertise in mining or metals. A place called Ironstone Mountain twenty miles away, later renamed as Mt Morgan, would make D'Arcy a very wealthy man who was also given another lucky investment opportunity in 1901. He took a big gamble on oil prospecting in Persia (later Iran). He almost went bankrupt but once more his luck held, thanks to a timely investment by the British Government in his concession. In 1908 (under threat of closure) he finally struck "black gold". Britain had a secure supply of oil for its navy and the discovery of Persian oil formed the 'Anglo-Persian' oil company, which later became British Petroleum (BP). One wonders if at any point the Queensland Premier reminded His Highness of just what a fortunate connection there was between their two "kingdoms".

There is a video of the visit on Youtube (Shah of Iran Australia Visit - Part 1). The Kuranda Rail trip starts at the 3 minute point. It shows the royal couple and their hosts, railway staff and locals at the Kuranda Railway Station. It looks like a beautiful day, just like so many which millions of other visitors have experienced and continue to enjoy.

As to what the locals who turned out for a glimpse thought of the fuss there must be quite a few around who could tell us. This excerpt from a poem printed in the *Kuranda Village News* (likely penned by the editor, the late Peter Hohermuth) was probably written in response to news of the death of the "King of Kings", in 1980, some six years after Kuranda's day in the international spotlight. It is typically irreverent, in Peter's style.

#### The Sheik of Crude Oil Creek

"There was excitement at Kuranda, When the rumours spread about, That the Sheik of Crude-Oil Creek Was coming in ...

The Railway staff so busy, Tried to make the place look right, They worked from dawn to sunset And well into the night.

They shifted all the grass and weeds, And empty stubbies too, The station was a lovely sight – It looked as good as new.

They ran a special train Up the mountain from the cane, With an engine back and front And one to spare.

There were policemen by the dozen, And detectives by the score, Inspectors, spics and bodyguards galore.

There were guards at every tunnel And some around the bend, To make sure there were no terrorists, His Highness to offend ...

The Hydro boys were on the job. In suits and ties and all, Let three buckets of water go, To trickle down the Falls.

When at last His Highness did arrive, The shock was far too great – The train arrived on time for once, It usually comes in late.

He entered the Refreshment Rooms, And enjoyed young Rose's scones, Had a cup of tea as well And seemed to linger on ...

He ignored the barman and his ilk, 'Cause they offered him only beer, Perhaps he wanted camels milk Which is rather scarce round 'ere.

We were all a bit deflated, 'Cause we'd been taken in; He wasn't Someone Special Just an ordinary King.

This poem won't be famous And is signed by ... IGNORAMUS."

### "The view from here"

A monthly column by Michelle Murray-Beckman offering a glimpse into Kuranda's bespoke rainforest architecture along with interviews with residents who share with us why they have chosen to call Kuranda home.

**SUSAN DOHERTY** and I met quite by chance as we both walked along Weir Road early one morning. We chatted amicably as we ambled along parting ways as I set off to the Falls and she made her way back towards the village. Although I didn't know then that she was an artist, it was evident to me by our brief discussion that she was observant and thoughtful. I went on my way thinking what a lovely neighbour I have.

You can imagine then, how delighted I was to contact her recently, for this column.

Susan's sculpture practice pursues the re-purposing of found objects. The materials that she uses combine organic and manmade matter. She has collections of all sorts of objects. Bundles of prickly Pandanus, a stack of natural sea fans, hair both human and Poodle(!), bundles of cloth, dolls heads and even cassette tape. She describes herself as "an assemblage artist – always scouring through other people's mess and giving it new life". She is very resourceful, and her techniques are often unconventional and always evolving. She uses these disparate elements and blends them together by stitching, weaving and wrapping. Her art is inspired by and connected to the natural world, in particular, the variety and beauty of the Australian landscape.

Susan lives, like many of us, in the rainforest. Arriving at Susan's front door



is via her washing which is strung up at the front of the house - sensibly, to catch the sun. Along the pathway that passes around the laundry are artworks sturdy enough to weather the changing seasons - sculpture constructed from bones, weavings made from palm fronds and those that look as though they could be fish traps or perhaps totems guarding what lies within.

The entrance to the house is decorated with more art and through the open door I can see that the entire house is a work space. There are projects underway everywhere I look. Hallway, steps, coffee table, dining table, kitchen bench. Works in progress and a variety of natural materials cover most of the available space.

Susan makes tea and we sit on the sofa below the gallery above which showcases various works and the most darling installation of bird's nests constructed from hair (human, dog, and lamb's wool), all sorts of grasses, flowers, moss, leaves, bones, wire, string and cassette tape. The nests hang from wooden crutches, which sounds quite odd, but works terribly well.

I ask about the crutches and this gives Susan the opportunity to explain the philosophy behind her art practice and how she came about finding and using the crutches.

She explains that as an assemblage artist she sources materials from just about anywhere. She collects, up-cycles, is given material and re-uses anything that catches her eye. "I will spy something that speaks to me – I'll take it home and use it now or later" She has sent friends on missions to bring back a grass that is particular to an area they are visiting. She is intrepid enough herself to take an extension ladder to an 8m Palm, climb up with a saw and cut the inflorescence (which in itself is large enough) and make her way back down with her prize. No harness – just a bicycle helmet for protection!

If you are new to gardening like me, you may be wondering what an inflorescence is. It is such a beautiful word. The term inflorescence was introduced by Linnaeus, who also introduced many of the common terms for types of inflorescences such as raceme, spike and umbel. The inflorescence was defined by Bentham in 1892 as "the arrangement of the flowering branches and the flowers upon them". Susan uses the word so seamlessly – it is my chosen word of the week and I shall be attempting to use it as often as possible.

Back to the artist and her philosophy.

At the forefront of Susan's dialogue is consumerism within our society. By repurposing found objects, she brings attention to what we discard as rubbish and changes the useless to the meaningful thereby making comment on our disposable consumer world. That's where the crutches come into the story.

In addition to being a practising artist, with over 70 group and solo exhibitions to her credit, Susan is also a community health worker. She has worked in community nursing in the Cairns region and in the Cape, including several Indigenous communities for over 20 years. She has a Graduate Diploma in Women's Health



specialising in women and young children. After finishing a shift at Cairns Base Hospital, she noticed a skip filled with hand made timber crutches. She immediately knew that they could be put to better use than simply being thrown out in favour of aluminium and plastic alternatives.

The crutches were re-purposed beautifully (and cleverly) as frames to show off the birds' nests for an exhibition at Cairns Regional Gallery in 2014 titled "Intuit". In her Artist statement Susan writes "I am overwhelmed by art in nature and I am humbled by the immensity of this power. Birds, I believe, are artists themselves. My nests are a metaphor of imagination, a journey of collecting and I pay homage to pure play and the joy of making"

The Intuit exhibition was also a comment on the degradation of the natural environment and loss of habitat and species. According to Susan, these reimagined nests test the audience's ability to consider these objects and their structure from a new perspective. As I examine the nests up close, I can see the delicate weaving of different materials and I marvel at both the maker's ability and her inspiration – a bird's ability, to construct something so complex, delicate and sturdy.

The nest as a metaphor is powerful. It evokes a feeling of protection, hope and renewal. We refer to nesting in our homes, where we nurture ourselves and our families. It is also a powerful feminine symbol. Expanding on this thread I ask Susan if she identifies with ecofeminist art.

Ecofeminist art emerged in the 1970's in response to ecofeminist philosophy. Ecofeminist philosophy describes a feminist approach to understanding ecology. The term eco-feminism was coined in 1974 by French feminist Françoise d'Eaubonne to bring attention to women's potential in creating an ecological revolution. According to eco-feminists, questions of class, race and gender as well as the rights of trees, water and animals are all feminist issues because they delineate the interconnections between the domination of women and other subordinate groups of humans as well as the domination of non-human nature.

It all sounds a bit heavy and when I ask Susan the question she responds by saying that she is always concerned about the environment and has aligned with many feminist viewpoints and narratives over the years, both in her nursing and her art. She then goes on to say that she is "just a sheila who makes art and has many concerns regarding the neglect of our beautiful Australian environment". In her view the environment has been off the political agenda for far too long. She adds that her art is an extension of the woman's craft of making and she employs that skill to communicate her message.

Susan, like many female artists and scientists is humble and self-effacing. Her work is powerful, and one can feel the intent and the love that has been woven into the creation of the art works.

Another equally important aspect of Susan's work is the ephemeral and transient nature of her art. With the construction materials being organic or up-cycled there is the underlying knowledge that the works will eventually breakdown, making us reflect that we too will not be here forever. We must embrace and preserve, as best we can, ourselves, our relationships and our environment.

### Take part in your future

KUR-World's draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is now open for responses from the public. If you've been waiting to have your say, your wait is over. If not, a 650-million dollar resort complex on Barnwell Road will affect your future, so now's the time to take a stand.

We have until 30th November to read, understand and respond to a document that outlines a major change in our lives.

We are invited to:

- · clearly state matters of concern
- provide suggested solutions.

The EIS is a massive 4000 pages, but this isn't as daunting as it sounds (links to full document at kurandaregion.org/eis). There are two ways to become informed without trying to wade through this colossal document.

#### **Visit drop-in sessions**

These will be run by the Kuranda Region Planning Group beginning 3rd November (See front page of this issue of *The Kuranda Paper* for details). The sessions will offer streamlined, relevant information compiled from the EIS by a small army of professionals and volunteers. Template submissions that include possible concerns and solutions will be available, as will blank forms for you to write your own submissions. Those with a working knowledge of the EIS will be on hand to assist. This aims to prevent high levels of frustration and hair loss.

#### Read the executive summary

The executive summary (Chapter o in the EIS document) is 30 pages or so, but includes a comprehensive table of contents so you can zero in on what worries you most. Form your concerns by reading between the lines. This development will radically change our lives. We have the right to clear and honest responses. Remember, if this goes ahead, we will be affected.

A few examples:

#### From the Executive Summary:

KUR-World's vision is to '... complement the region's unique natural and cultural assets.'

#### Concern:

Quad bikes, resorts, shopping complexes, a golf course, sports facilities, and accommodation for over 2000 people will overwhelm our small community and sensitive area.

KUR-World has the opportunity to '...contribute to the sustainable growth of the

#### **Concern:**

Growth, by definition, is not sustainable unless we have infinite resources. We do

#### From the Executive Summary:

"... and to offer experience with diverse activities for a wide range of visitors."

#### Concern:

Kuranda and the surrounding area already offer diverse activities that suit the region. Also, the attractions proposed at KUR-World are already found in the Cairns and Tablelands Region. Our natural and unique assets will be bypassed or harmed for similar, existing attractions.

#### From the Executive Summary:

'KUR-World intends to become a hub for nature-based, cultural, educational and agricultural tourism on the Atherton Tablelands and beyond.

Businesses are most effective with a specific consumer target and brand. KUR-World's aims seem like a wide throw of the net and raises concerns as to the actual aim for the use of the land.

#### From the Executive Summary:

One of the KUR-World objectives is 'protecting, managing, and enhancing the site's environmental values for the wellbeing and enjoyment of the local community.'

#### **Concern:**

Historical actions of the developer and how they reflect on future actions:

- An illegal dam cut on this property in December 2015 has already destroyed one seasonal breeding habitat for the endangered Kuranda Tree Frog.
- There has been little consultation with the people of Kuranda. When invited to public information meetings, the developer has declined all but one.

The Executive Summary's table of contents will give you some triggers for other areas of concern: water usage, transport, sewage, waste, noise, cultural heritage and more.



The Baha'i Faith arrived in Australia in 1920. There are now Baha'is in all parts of the country.



At the heart of Baha'u'llah's teachings is the need for a personal spiritual transformation, followed by a commitment to serve others in striving to enact His vision of a world civilisation based on the principle of the oneness of humanity.

Baha'u'llah taught that there is one God, recognised by different names throughout the world. The diverse religions, He said, are expressions of a single underlying truth, related to one another by a common origin and a common purpose: to transform humanity's inner life and outer condition.

#### **Time for Real Climate Action**

In early October, yet another science report (http://report.ipcc.ch/sr15/pdf/sr15\_spm\_final.pdf) was released by the World's leading climate body, the IPCC, confirming that climate change is well underway, and that under current estimates warming will reach 1.5 degrees in the next few decades. An increase of 1.5 degrees Celsius will make the climate much more unstable; bigger storms and cyclones, harsher droughts and heat waves. However, 2.0 degrees hotter is much, much worse and would cause very serious social, economic, and environmental problems. Destruction of coral reefs, rising sea levels, collapsing food supplies are all real and happening now.

Limiting warming to 1.5 degrees would require a complete reduction of greenhouse gases to zero by 2050 or sooner. This requires fundamental change to energy, agriculture, transport systems and pretty much everything that humans do – and on a global scale. A few solar panels and wind farms is only a start.

But we all know this – scientists have been telling us with increasing alarm for decades that the planet is getting cooked – and we, its inhabitants, are facing a very uncertain and unstable future. The IPCC report is optimistic that governments across the world will see the light and quickly move to phase out fossil fuels and start planning to adapt to the uncertain future. Unfortunately, this optimism seems misguided. The Paris Climate Agreement signed in 2016 will not limit global warming to 1.5 degrees – actually it will do very little because the commitments are too weak and the United States has run away.

Most governments and industry either don't care or far worse are staging a huge deception campaign to undermine climate science, and any real efforts to limit greenhouse emissions. The public has been duped by the likes of the coal and oil industry, by their slick marketing companies, and by dodgy scientists and lobby groups funded by these interests. For example, Tony Abbott and his colleagues have happily pushed the coal industry's agenda, undermining energy reform and dumping real climate action. These people and the industries they support are a minority, holding humanity to ransom for their own political or financial gain.

Let's stop being hoodwinked by big industry and demand immediate and far reaching action to reduce greenhouse emissions to zero.

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

### **Constipated?**

This topic is a doozy! It's been a hard one to tackle without continual references to double entendres littered with expletives...but I gave it a red hot try!

If you find yourself going more than a couple of days without a bowel movement, chances are you're constipated. You might have a distended, bloated stomach, flatulence and a generally uncomfortable feeling in your gut. When you do pass a stool, it is commonly hard and dry or very large and painful. Maybe you don't feel like you've fully 'finished'. It can manifest itself in irritability and poor behaviour in kids. You're basically storing waste and that's not good! You need to flush that down the loo!

For those suffering chronic constipation you'll have heard these before but a little reminder never hurt anyone.

- Water I can't say this enough...drink more water! It is an excellent way to flush waste and hydrate stool. If we're dehydrated our bodies will pull the moisture out of our stool.
- Fibre we all know that eating more fibre is the key to being regular. But did you know that there are different types of fibre? Both of these are found in most foods just some are higher than others.
  - o Soluble fibre turns to a gel like substance in the bowel as it soaks up water which bulks up the stool and allows it to pass easily. Food with high levels of insoluble fibre include pulses/peas/beans (kidney beans, lentils, chickpeas etc), oats, nuts, seeds, broccoli, avocado, apricots, figs, pears, sweet potato and carrots. That's just a sample size list folks! But I think you get the picture.
- o Insoluble fibre is found in brown rice, wheat bran and vege peels (eat the skins when you can) and bulks stool up which can also keep you regular.

So do yourself a favour and ditch the commercial cereals that claim to keep you regular in favour of oats and natural muesli that are loaded with nuts and seeds and topped with fruit. Up your fruit and veg intake on a daily basis and get reacquainted with the throne.

- Gut health this is really a topic of its own but very briefly if the bacteria in our gut are out then our digestive system will not work properly. It may result in constipation (but also a host of other issues). Here's the basics. Eat more prebiotic foods like onion, garlic and asparagus as these feed the good bacteria. Fermented foods naturally contain prebiotics and probiotics which make them an ideal choice! Take naturally fermented sauerkraut. The cabbage contains soluble fibre plus it's a great prebiotic and the fermentation process gives it a probiotic kick. Nice!
- · General tips-
- o Take your time when you do go. Don't try and get it out the second you sit down. Get comfortable but no need to spend more than 15-20 minutes in there.
- o Go when the urge hits. If you ignore the cue the stool hangs around waiting and the body pinches the water from it for other bodily functions. You'll find the body is a fast learner and will stop reminding you after a while of ignoring it!
- o Exercise is crucial! If you want a movement you have to move! Get the digestive system moving with some exercise. If you do none at the moment start with a 10 minute walk every day.

If you are still struggling to get your stool to pass muster then consider a trip to a natural therapist to get to the bottom of the issue. There are so many reasons for constipation and a slew of natural remedies and supplements to get you and a small army going regularly.



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# Latest News from the Kuranda Community Precinct



### Kuranda Community Precinct





### Landscape Concept Plan

In 2017, the Kuranda Community Precinct Advisory Committee secured funding from the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) to engage a consultant to create a 'place-making plan' (Plan) for the future development of the Precinct. This culminated in a community workshop in October 2017, where 10 Kuranda community groups met at the Precinct to contribute to the vision for the precinct.

At the Workshop, the community agreed to a list of priority projects and the consultant utilised this information to develop the place-making plan. This inclusive approach ensures that the development of the Precinct will take place in a way that reflects the needs of the broader community.

#### The Plan

The Plan provides a long-term vision for the Precinct which incorporates a range of potential environmental and structural elements, including paths, to ensure that the space is opened by improving lines of sight through the Precinct. The potential projects identified by the Kuranda community include some short-term projects, through to very long-term aspirational projects.



#### **Works Underway**

The Kuranda Community Precinct Advisory Committee has started working with Kuranda Envirocare, RISE Ventures (Kuranda-based employment agency) and Djabugay to commence with the first project, which incorporates building the walkway throughout the precinct. This feature is a foundational element of the long-term vision for the precinct.

Envirocare has completed detailed vegetation mapping and has recommended plants which may be cleared to improve lines of sight through the precinct, and also identified trees which are significant to the area.

Envirocare representatives are finalising these recommendations which include the removal of exotic plants and vegetation in locations which are not conducive to opening the site up for community use. There are some native trees which Envirocare have identified for removal, mainly due to their location.

The clearing of this vegetation will allow the commencement of the pathway, with

a view to also incorporating a picnic setting soon. Initial plans are also underway with Djabugay Aboriginal Corporation and the Kuranda Garden Club to achieve other elements of the plan.

The significant contributions offered by these groups will ensure that the cost to complete these projects is more achievable by providing volunteer efforts, cultural knowledge, historical information and a workforce.

#### **Funding Sources**

The consultant provided preliminary cost estimates for the implementation of the plan which are significant, at almost \$500,000. This means that projects need to be very carefully prioritised and a strategic approach to securing funding is required.

Mareeba Shire Council has set aside approximately \$130,000 for the development of the Precinct. These funds will be used over the long-term to contribute to projects which will increase the community utilisation of the Precinct. As these funds are not sufficient to achieve the lofty vision in the Plan, the Committee will work closely with Council's staff to identify grant programs from the State and Federal Government, and other funding bodies. The Place-Making Plan is a valuable tool in applying for grant funds, and Council will consider allocating some funds as seed-funding for grant applications. A portion of Council's funding allocation will also be used to pay the material costs for projects with partner groups including Kuranda Envirocare, Djabugay Aboriginal Corporation and the Kuranda Garden Club; and fund some short-term projects to encourage immediate use of the precinct, by Kuranda residents.



The Precinct is a well-used and flexible community space which is available for the long-term enjoyment of all Kuranda residents for recreational, sporting, cultural and educational experiences and activities. The Precinct is integrated and connected with surrounding facilities and promotes the history of the site.






A stunning local Dragonfly. These insects have two pairs of wings and great aerobatic abilities.

# Masters of the Skies

Although we think our skies are busy now with aircraft flying constantly around the globe, these thousands of aircraft flights on a daily basis add little congestion compared to the millions of flights made by insects every second. Insects rule the sky and have done for around 300 million years. Taking to the sky was one of the most significant evolutionary events within the insect world, and within the animal world for that matter. With the ability to fly came great opportunities such as increased ability to hunt and forage for food, ability to escape predators, and a means to find mates and colonise new areas quickly.

Not all insects have wings, and those that do only develop them when they reach maturity. Their full wings appear after their final development stage, and at first are soft and delicate. Blood is pumped into the wing veins, which expand them rapidly to their full size before they harden in the air. Insect wings come in a multitude of shapes and sizes. Some are clear, while others have intricate patterns and colours on them.

Flies are one of the most frequently encountered flying insects and are accomplished fliers. They have a single pair of wings, and are counterbalanced with small organs called halteres. These gyrate in time with the beating wings, allowing the fly to control balance during flight. Most flies have the ability to take off quickly, to fly quite rapidly, and zoom though all number of obstacles with exact precision. Some of the masters in this group are the hoverflies, which have the ability to hover and fly backwards.

Butterflies and moths have wings which are covered with microscopic scales, and unlike the flies, they have two pairs of wings. Most butterflies fly by day and most moths fly by night, but there are exceptions. Their wing scales are an important part of their defence. Shedding scales is an excellent way for butterflies and moths to struggle free from a spider's web. This group includes not only some of the most beautiful flying insects but also some of the most accomplished. Some moths are extremely fast (60km/h) and can hover whilst feeding on flowers, while some butterflies have been observed flying at altitudes of 6000m. The largest wingspan of all flying insects is shared by members of this group; the Atlas Moth and Queen Alexandra Butterfly can measure up to 30cm across!

If there are true aerobatic champions within the insect world, the dragonflies would have to take the crown. With their two pairs of long wings and excellent flight control they have the ability to fly forward, backward, up, down, sideways and hover, much like a helicopter can. Unlike a helicopter, dragonflies can accelerate at an incredible rate and reach top speed in seconds which for some is close to 100km/h.

While these insects have the ability to fly very quickly to avoid danger, their wings are always exposed and vulnerable to damage. One group of insects, the beetles, evolved wing protection in that their forewings become hard armoured plates called elytra to protect their hind wings. Although the speed of take off is slower, beetles are able to protect their valuable assets when they are not in use, which allows them to burrow, climb and generally do things that other flying insects cannot. The heaviest flying insect in the world is the Goliath Beetle and weighs a mammoth 80-100gs. The flight of this beetle has to be seen to be believed.

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# CONTINUING THE SERIES ON KURANDA R.S.L. MEMBERS Graham Fowles

The suggestion was made for members of the Kuranda RSL to do a brief summary of their service life. This is mine. Please excuse any cynicism that may sneak in. My period of service covered some very significant changes in this country.

In 1969 I joined the Army with my new brother-in-law in Perth. We had been job hopping for a while, which was easy in 1969. Just so much work, but not all future based.

I think this came as a surprise for the women folk but "nothing ventured" as they say. We departed by air, bound for Melbourne in early October – landing, of course, in Launceston due to weather, nobody knew who the heck we were, and by the time we finally made it to Melbourne, the transport to Kapooka NSW had departed. So that was my introduction to military movements.

Kapooka, the sign on the gate still to this day says "The home of the Soldier" and so it was for 10 weeks. It was as perceived, quite tough. We were also called out to fight bush fires raging across the Riverina at the time.

The New Year saw both of us at Ingleburn, NSW, again doing more advanced training... in weapons, helicopters, gas, mines, booby traps and other pleasantries.

On march out, I was awarded "Best General-Purpose Machine Gun Shot in Australia". The fact that I came across a spare box of ammunition unattended, which I used, didn't seem to matter. The Brigadier was happy and so was I.

March saw both of us at Woodside in South Australia with the 3rd Battalion of the Royal Australian Regiment (3RAR). Me in Delta Company and Bro Andy in Alpha Company. I was joined in Adelaide by my wife and young son, and we lived in Adelaide in what passed for a married quarter.

The next year was all exercises. We were training for Vietnam whilst the era of moratorium marches and demonstrations was happening in Adelaide.

We were working with the tanks in Victoria, or the range in Murray Bridge or Shoalwater Bay, or the jungle training centre in Canungra. This was very divisive and


as we got better, read 'lethal', the demonstrations got more intense, culminating in one demonstration clashing with leave of some soldiers. Soldiers were charged, fines imposed, cheques flooded in from the community and bruises healed.

In 1971 3RAR deployed to South Vietnam. The Unions refused to move the Aircraft Carrier *HMAS Sydney*, dubbed the "Vung Tau Ferry" and there was talk of wharf-side demonstrations

The Navy used landing craft to push us on our way, and after some discussion on 'fixing bayonets' such was the degree of feeling in '71. Demonstrations did not occur. Strange way to farewell troops but that was nothing compared to the welcome we got at the other end of our 10-day Navy cruise.

The Navy was very good. They issued two cans of Fosters every day, for our good health I presume, but they were one litre cans.

We went directly to Nui Dat, the task force base, in time for the government to



announce the withdrawal of one Battalion.

There were three Battalions engaged, but now two. That was a good idea. It appeased those in Australia who were still demonstrating. Good win for them but Labor was for ending conscription, and indeed the war, and gaining popularity.

A good win for the Vietnamese who could also read the newspapers. So, between the devil and the deep blue sea, we went forth to win the hearts and minds of the locals; and those not so local, like the North Vietnamese Regulars.

By July, we had removed our adversaries, namely the 3/33 Viet Cong and the D445 North Vietnamese regiment from Phuc Tuy province and, with the help of the Americans, engaged and defeated them at the Battle of Long Khanh.

By October, the Battalion was withdrawn and responsibility given to 4RAR and New Zealand soldiers. The Vung Tau Ferry returned.

So, we marched through the streets of Adelaide. Some clapped, some jeered but it didn't matter anymore because we were winning when I left.

We were back, well most but not all of us.

The next year was a major reorganisation for the Army. Gough Whitlam became the Labor Prime Minister; conscription ended, and I was posted to Brisbane. Really enjoyed Brisbane.

Getting there in a petrol strike was challenging but managed to return to Adelaide in a beer strike to enjoy the birth of my daughter.

Now, joined by my wife, son and new baby daughter, we had a nice 'married quarter' in the burbs. All good until Cyclone Wanda flooded Brisbane and I was engaged in the CBD with sandbags. 16 people lost their lives in that small rain event.

I was posted to Darwin around Christmas. It was at my father-in-law's house when he told me I wasn't going. "Well", he said "Darwin isn't there anymore."

We deployed to Darwin post-Cyclone Tracy, so did the rest of the Defence Force. Pictures are all there nowadays in their Museum. We went fully armed. All Australian early warning systems were down. British Warships were off-

shore. From memory, 65 were killed but, to this day I think it was understated. Either that or a lot of people were missing bits.

General Stretton was in charge of evacuations and Darwin was evacuated. 35 000 people. A massive undertaking and I ponder to think if, or when, it happens again.

In my merry band, we took Casuarina and Nightcliffe to the tip. Not all in one go, but over the next three months.

Incidentally, as no water or sanitation was working, the southern breweries sent pallets of beer. Seriously, thanks but that was all that was available. In NT heat, by midday, some of the workers were not working to their full capacity, to say the least. This is before the popularity of bottled water.

Next posting was in the opposite direction. To Puckapunyal in Victoria.. also a great posting. Pucka had everything for families to do — clubs, activities, entertainment on the base or explore goldfields, snow country etc. We were soon on the Base and the kids learning to become army brats.

"What happened at school today?"

"Nothing much, just a paratrooper who got blown off-course landed in the playground."

"Oh, just normal stuff then..."

Leopard tanks arrived from Germany to replace the aging Centurions. The Wharfies refused to allow Army onto the docks to unload them. They had to be trained instead. But eventually the tanks arrived and we were often entertained by live firing after which we would collect firewood for our fireplaces, and the Army paid compensation to the local sheep farmer. More than one leg of lamb was forthcoming.

Melbourne was a fairly easy drive away and I was now promoted to Sergeant.

Life was getting better — so that was not allowed to happen — and I was posted back o Brisbane.

Brisbane is a good posting. Also, lots to do in a capital city. We had a married quarter next to an undertaker's assistant. Well, briefly. We bought a house, our first, and quickly.

Peacetime Army nowadays. Rumbles about postings again... "Just leave me be", I was thinking.

At this stage I had done 13 years. It should have been 12, being two 6-year terms, but 'they' lost the paperwork – no computers then.

I let the Army continue in their own way, bade them farewell and became an Ambulance Officer.

My son now is a Timor and Afghanistan veteran. My daughter-in-law has just returned from Iraq. One of 50 women over there.

Nowadays, it's coffee at the Speewah Tavern, and although there's a few Navy there, it's a great spot once or twice a week. The thing with the military is that nothing leaves... you join, you serve, you retain skills.

Mine is best general-purpose machine gun shot in Australia... but nowadays, no ammunition. Like those who have written before me, I am proud to have served.





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Tis the season of the zucch! I received a half a dozen in my local Growers Box last week – from little baby ones up to a couple of small truncheons. That much of one ingredient might be daunting for some but there are so many uses for them, and so many ways they can be stored and saved that I always say "Yes, please!" to any offerings.

I've included three recipes this month that have been tried and had the thumbs up. In addition to the many, many other recipes out there you can also dehydrate zucchini strips to increase flavour, or grate or dice and freeze to add to soups, cakes, breads, curries and homemade pasta sauces. They add bulk, fibre and flavour and cook down quickly.

Zucchinis are also great in salads – you might also want to invest in a spiraliser which makes "zoodles" – raw zucchini noodles.

### **Super Quick Choc, Banana, Date and Zucchini Muffins Makes** 9-12

*Ingredients:* 1 Choc Muffin mix (I use Orgran brands, which is both vegan and gluten free and so suits everyone), 1 large ripe banana, mashed, 8 fine diced pitted Medjool dates, 1 medium fine grated zucchini, half teaspoon each ground ginger and nutmeg spice (optional).

*Method:* Following the directions on pack, mix all ingredients into muffin batter (adjust amount of liquid if necessary). Bake and (if possible) allow to cool slightly before devouring.

#### **Zoodle Pad Thai**

(vegan, gluten free) via <u>onegreenplanet.org</u> Serves 4-6

Ingredients: For the Pad Thai: 3 zucchinis, spiralised or julienned, 3 carrots, spiralised or grated, 2 cup red cabbage finely sliced, handful radishes sliced, 1 whole bell pepper sliced, 1 whole tomato, chopped, ½ red onion, finely sliced, a handful coriander, chopped, handful green onions, sliced. Garnish: Roasted salt



peanuts (optional). For the dressing; ½ cup coconut milk, juice of 1 lime, 1 tblspoon apple cider vinegar, 4 tblspoon olive oil, 2 garlic clove minced, 1-inch piece ginger, minced, 2 teaspoons tamari, 2 teaspoon coconut sugar, 1 Thai red chili, ¼ tspoon sea salt.

*Method:* Toss together all the vegetables except the coriander and green onions. In a blender, food processor, or by hand combine all the ingredients for the dressing until smooth and creamy. Pour dressing over the vegetables and toss to combine, top with cilantro and green onion and serve. Optional garnish; crushed, roasted salt peanuts.

Spiralisers come in many versions, both handheld and battery or power operated.

#### **Zucchini Butter/Jam**


(vegan, gluten free) via <u>thekitchn.com</u> Makes about 2 cups.

*Ingredients:* 1 kg zucchini – more or less, 1/4 cup olive oil or Nuttelex (or combination) or (non-vegan) butter, 2 minced shallots, garlic, or combination of both. Herbs optional. Salt and pepper

**Method:** Coarsely grate the zucchini. Let it drain in a colander for 3 to 4 minutes or until you are ready to begin cooking. To hasten cooking time, squeeze the water out of the zucchini by wringing it in a clean cloth towel. In a deep skillet, heat the olive oil/Nuttelex. Sauté the shallots briefly. Add the zucchini and toss. Cook and stir over medium to medium-high heat until the zucchini reaches

a spreadable consistency. If you scorch the bottom, turn the flame down! (And scrape those delicious bits into the mix for added flavour.) To take it past "butter" stage keep reducing down, the zucchini will hold its bright green colour and slowly caramelize into a nice vegetable jam. Enjoy on toast, or as a side dish





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### **Sundowner** with writer and publisher Anne Summers

**AFTER MONTHS OF NEGOTIATION**, it is a coup that Cairns Tropical Writers Festival have managed to get the far north included in the national tour by prominent Australian Anne Summers AO to launch her ninth book. *Unfettered and Alive: a memoir* is a fascinating read from someone who won a Walkley in her first year of journalism.

Anne has since become an international best-selling author, editor, publisher and thought-leader with a long career in the media, politics and business in Australia, Europe and the United States.

As women's liberation took hold in the social ferment of the 1970s, she was instrumental in setting up the first women's shelter in Sydney. Many other support groups sprang up, including the Women's Electoral Lobby (WEL) and women's health services, while many middle-class women entered tertiary education and the workforce for the first time in increasing numbers.

Her famous first book, Damned Whores and God's Police, marked a turning point for women worldwide as the International Year of Women unfolded in 1975. The blockbuster, in continuous print ever since and selling over 100,000 copies, offered a new framework for understanding the narrow options open for Australian women as shaped by the brutality of the young colony.

Summers book identified two stereotypes that characterised Australian women as being either virtuous mothers, whose function was to civilise society as 'God's Police', or bad girls who failed to conform and were spurned and vilified as a result. Summers argues that as a consequence of women in the early colony being in extreme short supply, with the first women arrivals convicts, Australian society was profoundly shaped by the 'damned whores' female stereotype.

Anne wrote a controversial 'Letter to the next generation' in 1994 questioning why so few young women identified as feminists. She asked, 'Where are the books 'I was born into a world that expected very little of women like me. We were meant to tread lightly on the earth, influencina events through our husbands and children, if at all ... and fade into invisibility as we aged. I defied all of these expectations and so have millions of other women.'

In 2003 the book was voted one of the top ten books of the past 40 years, and in 2011 the Australia Day postage stamp featured Anne Summers AO in its Australian Legends series. The next reprint led to a three-day conference at the Sydney Opera House in 2013 titled Damned Whores and God's Police 40 Years On.

Anne's new book chronicles her early progress as a journalist through the ranks of Australia's major mastheads (The National Times, Australian Financial Review, Le Monde), and her work setting up the first federal Office of Women from 1983-1986. Then there are the years in New York as founding editor-in-chief of the landmark feminist magazines Ms and Sassy, and her return to Australia to helm Good Weekend magazine for Fairfax. She is currently living in NY where she is based with her husband, who is the director of the World Voices Festival for PEN America.




With cassowaries now in mating mood, parent birds are sending off last year's offspring, now 9-12 months old, to find their own home ranges. This is a distressing time for the young juveniles (brown feathers and maybe a trace of colour on their neck) as they must move away from familiar territory. We recently saw a young bird on Kennedy Hwy on the overtaking lanes as you leave Kuranda heading down the Range Road. The bird was hit (8okph) by a car but managed to pick itself up and run off into the bush. A

search did not find it but a few days later it was seen

again at the same place. Thanks to all those who posted pics on Facebook and reported the incident. We believe the bird is Ollie, offspring of Elvis who is once again interested in mating with Priscilla on the banks of the Barron. So Ollie is confused and disoriented looking for somewhere else to find food and safety. Tragic as it sounds, it's a natural cycle and they've been doing this long before we came

# Fresh purpose for agricultural waste

Agricultural waste can be used to rapidly filter lead from wastewater, new Edith Cowan University (ECU) research has found.

An ECU study found that canola stalks and lupin straw, which currently have no commercial use and are generally burnt after harvest, can strip up to 98.5 per cent of lead from wastewater.

Researchers collected canola stalk and lupin straw from a farm in WA, ground it into a fine powder and added it to water contaminated with lead.

Associate Professor Mehdi Khiadani from ECU's School of Engineering said the powder bound with the lead.

"So when contaminated water is in contact with the powder, it can remove up to 98.5 per cent of the lead in just 30 minutes," he said.

"This work could provide farmers with a way to turn what is currently agricultural waste into a viable and useful product.

"Western Australia currently produces just under 2 million tonnes of canola and about 750,000 tonnes of lupin each year. So this is potentially a huge untapped resource that could be put to use."

Professor Khiadani said one potential application of the technique would be to treat stormwater runoff from roads.

"Stormwater can be contaminated by lead after running over roads. With this technique, we could potentially use agricultural waste to treat this water, which could then be used for other purposes," he said.

#### **Cost benefits**

Professor Khiadani said using agricultural waste to treat wastewater compared favourably to current methods of filtering lead.

"Some existing methods, such as membrane filtration, are often prohibitively expensive or do not work with water that has high concentrations of lead," he said.

"In contrast, agricultural waste offers a cost-effective way to remove lead from wastewater."

Professor Khiadani said the next step was to examine if there were ways to further treat the agricultural waste to improve its lead-stripping capacity.

"We believe that by modification of the agricultural waste powder we may be able to improve its properties to remove other pollutants from wastewater, but this needs to be tested," he said.

The research was completed as part of Hanie Hashtroudi's PhD 'Using agricultural wastes to treat lead-contaminated water in Western Australia'.

#### **NGIRRMA EXPLANATION** AND BACKGROUND

The Bama (people) of this area (bulmba) shared a common ngirrma, language.

The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like the archaic English word

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have people been able to preside continuously in one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual world 'bulmba' has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of the year, the season and the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for help with selection of wordsearch words and to the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation for its work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

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### A Thought for November

**THIS** month we read from St Mark's Gospel Chapter 10. verses 46-52

St Mark has a great gift for contrast. We have just felt the disgust of Jesus and the other disciples for the mean request made by James and John for their self-advancement. Now comes another request, but how very different this is in many ways!

Jesus is heading south out of Jericho, preparatory to turning west up the mountain road to Jerusalem. He is heavy of heart because something tells him that he is heading into danger, and maybe worse. There are a thousand things on his mind. He may be only half aware of what is going on around him as the dusty road unwinds under his tired body. At the side of the road are the eternal lines of beggars of every description, some with terrible physical afflictions.

One of them is quite determined to contact Jesus of Nazareth, known all over the country as a healer. Those trying to protect Jesus are equally determined that he will be kept away. We can imagine the reaction to Bartimaeus by Mark's telling us that "many rebuked him." It is Jesus who breaks the impasse. He has every reason not to, every excuse to be so concerned with himself that there is neither time nor energy for anyone else. But Jesus reaches out to another in need.

Now we hear one of the great questions of Jesus. "What do you want me to do for you?" How would we answer that question if Our Lord were to ask it of us? The tremendous thing about Christian faith is that Jesus is asking it of us, again and again!

"Master, let me receive my sight," said Bartimaeus. What would it mean for us to say that to Jesus. What might you and I want clearer sight for? What are we blind to, without realizing it? To someone who loves us? To the needs of our family for more of our time? To the worth of a friend or an employee in our professional life? To the ways we are hurting someone without knowing it? There are all sorts of reasons why we would be wise to say to Jesus that we want our sight.

A small thing before we leave this scene. Mark recalls the detail of Bartimaeus "throwing off his mantle" before coming to Jesus. What things hanging around us do you and I need to throw off before approaching Jesus? To get one thing we usually have to let go of another. Only when we let it go, do we realize that what Jesus gives us in exchange is infinitely better.

Bartimaeus asks Jesus for his sight. We might consider in what way we need our own vision cleared to see around and inside ourselves.

### **Queensland Container Refund Scheme**

Queenslanders use close to 3 billion beverage containers every year.

These containers are the second most littered item in the state, despite the fact they can be easily recycled. Beverage container litter is largely associated with drink consumption in open air settings such as parks, beaches, shopping centres and car parks.

The introduction of a state-wide container refund scheme will give people an incentive to collect and return containers for recycling, in exchange for a 10 cent refund payment. This will help to:

- reduce the amount of drink containers that are littered and
- increase Queensland's recycling rate.

The scheme will also provide benefits to social enterprises, communities, and regional and remote areas by creating new job, recycling and fundraising opportunities.

Queensland's container refund scheme, known as Containers for Change, will commence on 1st November 2018, with more than 230 container refund points in operation across the state. The number of these sites will continue to grow as the scheme rolls out.

The Scheme is a product stewardship arrangement with the costs of operating the scheme and recovering the containers for recycling, paid for by drink manufacturers. This means that drink manufacturers will take responsibility for ensuring that the environmental impacts from the empty drink containers are reduced.

#### HOW WILL THE CONTAINER REFUND SCHEME WORK?

Queenslanders will be able to return eligible containers via a container refund point. Container refund points will be established across Queensland to collect eligible empty containers in exchange for the payment of a refund.

For Queenslanders who prefer to donate their drink container to a community group, sports club or another organisation, container return points can direct the 10c refund payment to a registered group. In addition, some groups will run their own container donation points at which the refund payment will be retained by them.

#### HOW WILL THIS WORK LOCALLY?

All refund points will be subject to changes in format and timing, depending on the number of containers brought in and when they are delivered.

In the Kuranda area, after a couple of months of monitoring usage of the Arara Street recycling bins it has been decided there will be one depot style refund point operating initially at the bins on Saturday and Sunday each week.

The refund amount may be paid as cash or cash-equivalent (e.g. voucher or electronic payment). We will publish the manner of payment when it becomes available, prior to the scheme starting.

The container refund scheme aims to reduce the amount of beverage container litter in the environment.

The containers that are eligible for a refund are those that are most commonly consumed away from home and make up the majority of container litter in the environment.

For example, beers stubbies are often drunk outside the home and become litter so are eligible, whereas containers that have held plain milk or wine are commonly consumed in the home, and can still be recycled either through existing kerbside collection or drop-off services, so are excluded.

If you are in doubt over what is or is not acceptable bring it along to the drop off point where the operator can advise and it can be recycled in the existing bins if necessary.

Metal containers may be crushed: they just need to be recognisable, but bottles need to be whole. No metal or plastic screwcaps please.

Most beverage containers between 150ml and 3litres in volume are eligible, with the exception of the following:

Any size or material type of containers for:

- Undiluted cordial
- Fruit or vegetable juice concentrate
- Registered health tonics Plain milk
- Glass bottles of any size for:
- Wine Pure spirits
