Think Beyond Today

This may sound like one of Aesop's Fables, but it is the story of a community centre.

In the early 90s, a group of enthusiasts, at a place called Agnes Waters (estimated then population of 300), managed to acquire, with the aid of the then Minister for Family Affairs, a government building, and have it transported to, and erected on a section of land, courtesy of the then Miriamvale Council.

This was a wooden building, more than served the local population for many years, and may have cost the local residents perhaps \$10,000 to complete – the writer was not there for the completion of the building.

Early this year, a new community centre was completed, with a donation of \$1.7 million from the government, with the balance of the \$3.5 million cost being picked up by the Gladstone Shire.

The moral of this story is "Think Beyond Today", and consider, what would be the cost to erect a building, such as B Block of the old school, in the future?

New Visitor Information Centre

I strongly disagree with Council's decision regarding this new centre and question the real motives behind it. I have asked Councillor Jensen over forty questions regarding this development and as yet have not received satisfactory answers. The following words are excerpts from a letter sent to TRC on 10th October 2012. The letter in its entirety can be read by contacting the writer.

In the book 'Tourist Shopping Villages – Forms and Functions' by Laurie Murphy, Pierre Benckendorff, Gianna Moscardo and Philip L.Pearce, Kuranda has been described as being in stagnation, in a state of 'advanced destruction' and as having a 'substantially weakened theme' amongst other things. The next stage is decline, post destruction.

How and what does this proposed new visitor information centre do to address this serious issue?

What are the projected future annual costs of the new 'Gateway to the Tablelands' Visitor Information centre?

Does the TRC believe that turning the current Kuranda Visitor Information Centre into an office for a TRC employee, Marc Sleeman, is an appropriate use of this community space? And if so why?

How much money or what percentage of the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund is set aside each year to maintain assets constructed with the fund and what percentage of the projected annual maintenance costs for the new centre does this money cover?

What other assets have been constructed with the Kuranda Infrastructure Fund since its inception Can you please list them?

Note: The views expressed in these letters are not necessarily held by the management committee of this paper.

How and in what way does increasing the \$1per head tourist levy involve the State Government? Isn't this a Local Government concern to be decided by TRC? If not can you please explain why it needs State Government approval to be increased and on what grounds an increase was rejected at the last round of negotiations?

The \$1 per head levy which is incorporated into every Skyrail/KSR ticket purchased has not increased since its inception, well over 10 years ago, why?

Having Kuranda described as being in stagnation, in a state of 'advanced destruction' and a 'substantially weakened theme' can't be positive for the future prospects of a town that relies on tourism to keep its economy moving.

What strategies is Council putting in place to address and reverse these fundamental issues? Or are the days of our 'Village in the Rainforest' numbered?

There are three ways people arrive in Kuranda – Skyrail, KSR and the Kennedy Highway with "the self drive market playing an ever increasing role" (JJ 27/9).

Hasn't Council noticed the state of the Kennedy Highway entrance to Kuranda?

What is Council proposing to do about re-vitalizing the entrance to Kuranda the 'Gateway to the Tablelands' to bring it up to an acceptable standard, in line with the new \$700,000 Gateway to the Tablelands Visitor Information Centre and when?

How does the TRC define what is and what isn't Tourism Infrastructure?

I do appreciate Council's decision to approve the Barron Falls Shuttle Bus Stop and I thank you for your support. I also thank Cathy Harvey for her letter of support as I believe having a designated bus stop will improve the visitor experience. However, I will speak out about decisions that I believe are not in the Kuranda community's best interests.

Kuranda Community Precinct

While I respect people's right to disagree with the Council's decisions, I would like to correct some of the misinformation and conspiracy theories that are circulating; it is important to listen to the facts (Cr Jenny Jensen).

What's my agenda? To do what I consider is best for the whole of the Kuranda community and to ensure that Council makes responsible financial decisions which don't place additional burdens on Kuranda ratepayers; to act as a local Councillor and as a regional Councillor; to represent residents honestly and openly without bias.

What's Council's agenda? To provide the Kuranda community with a Community Precinct at a sustainable cost to ratepayers; a purpose built, multi-use, attractive community space; a precinct that links in with other community assets and exists for the diverse interests of all the different parts of our community.

What does this mean? Council wants to create a community precinct that is a space for all to use; that is not territorial for any particular group; that will not see the other community facilities in Kuranda lose out.

Let's be clear about what Council's decisions **are:** The decision is to develop a community precinct. It is not about developers or commercial interests. The removal of the two older buildings is part of the long-term plan to create real "community spaces and facilities" at the Precinct. The plan is to do this without impacts on Kuranda Ratepayers. Council's job is to manage the long term future of the precinct and to make sound financial decisions. On three occasions (2010, 2011, 2012), Councillors have made the decision to remove the old buildings from the site. Each time, the decision has been made carefully and professionally after much discussion and deliberation; each time, Councillors have considered a very comprehensive amount of background detail, varying community opinions and submissions, and the findings of a number of different community consultation activities.

Let's remember that these buildings are old buildings: The estimated costs over 20 years for Council to maintain and depreciate the two older buildings total an estimated approximately 1.7 million. At the end of that period, the buildings will still be "old school buildings". *Continued on Page 8*

Big changes to The Kuranda Paper

Following a recent meeting between Garth Owen and David Gormley (*The Kuranda Paper*) and Peter Bull (Operations Manager, North Queensland Newspaper Company Ltd), some substantial changes will be made to the paper from the next issue (#239, December 2012/January 2013).

Firstly, the paper will no longer be printed in Cairns by *Cairns Post*. It will be printed in Townsville by the above company on a more modern press. This will ensure more consistency in colour representation and general overall print quality.

Secondly, the KMA committee has decided to increase the print run of the paper from 2400 to 3000. Copies of the paper will be distributed to additional outlets in Cairns, Mareeba and elsewhere.

Thirdly, the paper will now be printed in full colour, ie all 32 pages (most likely 40 for the December/January issue) will feature colour.

This means that all advertisers will now have the opportunity to insert their advertising in colour for a surcharge of 20%. For example, a current B&W \$60-size ad will now be \$72 for colour.

Pricing for normal B&W ads will remain unchanged for the foreseeable future.

AND in what would have to be a WORLD'S FIRST, the cost of advertising for existing colour advertisers on centre and back pages will actually DECREASE from next edition.

Under the *Cairns Post* printing prices, we had to charge advertisers a 50% surcharge for colour, eg a \$60-size ad was charged as \$90 but now with the printing prices negotiated with the new printer, will be \$72 as from next edition.

All existing advertisers will receive individual notification of the above in the near future.

The Kuranda Paper is able to continually offer the cheapest advertising rates in North Queensland only through the loyalty of its advertisers, and the dedication of its volunteers — artwork, administration, contributions, proofreaders, paper folders etc.



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Gardening Kuranda





OVEMBER and the garden holds its breath for rain with a slow start to the growth season as many "sleepers" like Globba (Dancing Ladies), Kaempferia (Peacock Plant) and some of the more tender Alocasias are only just emerging and some trees and shrubs still budding, although Tabernaemontana longiflora already holds its upright buds with promise of its stunning white perfumed flowers to come.

A great plant show recently at Malanda with outstanding shows of orchids. This garden show, alternating venue each other year with Atherton, is well worth the travelling for and if, like me, you are a plantaholic, you will probably have the DTs for a month after.

The plantaholic will have their addiction well satisfied this coming week-end (27th-28th October) at the two Kuranda Open Gardens - Kuranda Palms and **The Retreat**, both gardens chock-full of plant treasures and great planting ideas.

The beauty of both gardens is that, with passionate gardeners, they are everchanging and improving as time passes.

Mulching is the primary task presently, not only to conserve moisture and keep down weeds but serves to prevent soil compaction and run-off when the Wet arrives.



Plant of the Month: Bolusanthus speciosus or Tree wisteria (Family: Fabaceae) with its drooping clusters of fragrant, blue-mauve pea-like flowers hanging from the branches and its trunk deeply fissured, greyish-brown is worth considering as a specimen tree in drier, open sunny situations. Coming from South African grasslands, full excellent drainage considerations.

With Spring to early Summer flowering, Bolusanthus comes easy from seed pre-soaked overnight and although slow to get away, growth is rapid when established and is drought tolerant. Flowering time is spring to early summer.

While described as a small to medium-sized tree, an excellent specimen in Centenary Park, Mareeba (site of the Mareeba Markets) puts the lie to this. Presently in flower, this tree is covering the ground with its fallen sky-blue flowers. The tree is

sometimes used for Bonsai.

In South Africa, its very hard, termite resistant wood is used for fencing posts and valued for woodwork and turning.

Q @A. Dear Alexia, You asked what plants might become weedy if introduced into your garden. My experience is that any exotic introduction, given the right conditions, may prove a pest. Unfortunately, a considerable number of plants available at your friendly local nurseries are proving troublesome.

Top of the threat list should be any Syngonium, including the colourful pink and white forms, which, reverting, already threatens to take over tracts of local rainforest. The glorious Flame of the Forest or Red Jade Vine (Mucuna bennettii) is potentially another threat as are the yellow Allamanda, red flowering passionfruit and most any of the Convulvulae family and several Clerodendrum species. Even the humble substitute Asian coriander may now be seen as a weed in some local lawns.

The responsible gardener carefully watches each new introduction to their garden, its seed set, method of seed dispersal whether by wind or wild-life, seed germination rate and/or ease of propagation and never ever, ever dumps garden waste on verge or in bushland. Particular attention should be given to plantings along water courses as providing potential carriage in the Wet and remember that nearly all pond plants are potentially invasive.

Unfortunately, the great Australian plant scourges of Prickly Pear and Lantana started as carefully tended treasures in some early settler's garden as did the stunning Miconia and blue Ipomea.

Dear Ross, Yes, Caladiums in their kaleidoscope of leaf patternings and various leaf forms make a stunning seasonal garden or potted display. If planting out, protection is needed as bulbs are much beloved by Scrub turkeys. Remember caladiums go dormant in the cooler months so think about positioning and marking when they disappear to avoid damage. Good feeding increases leaf size and colouring.

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

will be a fantastic event and another short period of time during these upgrades but it will be well worth the wait.





All our members are now fully trained in chainsaw and Heights & Safety, so we are all set for the coming wet season. Remember it is never too early to prepare for the cyclone season.


We still need members so come along on Tuesday nights 7.30pm start in Fallon Road, next to the Ambulance Station.

Certainly Block B is a younger building; however verified reports from Council's professional officers indicate that there are significant long term costs. Q Build Reports evidence that there is asbestos in Block B. The structures at the site are professionally valued at approximately \$400,000; these old buildings are located in the central part of the whole of the precinct area and compromise whatever else might be established there alongside the Community Library and community hub.

Let's also be clear about what the Men's Shed submission has asked of Council: to provide the group with a very large, ageing building, to provide approx \$55,000 to the group to do initial repairs to the building, to allow the group to exclusively manage and decide on the use of the old building and to collect any rental income from any users (in competition with any other facilities in the community), to require Council to underwrite any unforseen major costs and to sign a long term lease at no annual cost to the group, while other facilities have to cover their own costs. Certainly the group's submission outlined its plans for the building, although some of Council's questions to the group were not responded to. However, Council had to consider the question of what would happen if the plans did not continue over the long term and ratepayers were left with the need to cover the costs. Council carefully considered the longer term possibilities and capacity of the group and felt that there were financial risks in agreeing to the proposal.

The other main reason for the Council decision is



We can all argue infinitum about reports, estimates, consultants, different dollar figures, asbestos, opinions, rumours, costs etc etc...but it is time to move forward. The Council decision is about the precinct; it not about whether or not Council wants a Men's Shed in Kuranda; it is not about personalities; it is not about hidden agendas. Kuranda Visitor Information Centre Wins Award

At the 2012 TTNQ Tourism Awards held recently in Cairns, Kuranda Visitor Information Centre won the category for TNQ Tafe Visitor Information & Services – a well deserved win for everyone at the Centre.

This is the first time Kuranda Visitor Information Centre has entered the awards, and they are all very excited by their success.

Kuranda Visitor Information Centre is the smallest and busiest information centre in Far North Queensland outside Cairns, with more than 50,000 visitors a year.

I catch some much needed sleep and then the next day it starts all over again" "Oh, Bob are you in Heaven?" "No... I'm a rabbit in Norfolk!"

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Are You Too Sweet?

Carbohydrates (sugars) play an important role within our diets and are an easy way to fuel the body to boost energy. It can, however, affect us negatively if not consumed in moderation. There are different types of sugar. We all know that cakes and fizzy drinks are sweet, but where else do we consume sugar? To make it easy let's break sugar down into two groups: simple sugars and complex carbohydrates.

Simple sugars:

found in honey, alcohol, juice, lollies etc, are the worst as they breakdown into the blood stream quickly. This spike in blood sugar can lead to hyperactivity, irritability and low concentration level.

It causes the blood sugar to drop afterward and so we end up on a 'sugar wheel' of ups and downs; craving and reliant on sugar to boost us back up. If we look at the ingredients of most processed foods, sugar is a high component. Whilst fruit is natural, it still contains fructose. Most orange fruits are higher in sugar content in comparison to others.

Complex carbohydrates:

take longer for the body to break down and are often

packed with fibre, vitamins and minerals. They are present within grains ie rice, oats, wheat. Wholegrain's always have a lower *GI than white refined grains. Ideally the daily consumption is two serves per day. Portion size is the equivalent of your closed fist.

*GI refers to the Glycaemic Index of foods. This is based on how quickly the sugar in foods is released into the blood stream. Low GI means it is released gradually. High GI means it is released quickly and therefore spikes blood sugar ie simple sugars.

Sugar alternatives:

Stevia: is a plant used for sweetening. It contains no carbohydrates or calories and therefore doesn't affect blood sugar. It can be used in cooking, drinks etc as it comes in liquid/tablet and powder. Watch out for artificial sweeteners ie aspartame that can cause major health issues.

Whilst **honey** is natural with little processing it still has a relatively high GI. Natural sugars with a far lower GI include; agave syrup, coconut palm sugar or

Most healthfood stores will stock both the sugar alternatives and lower GI

Excessive sugar is the gateway to many more disease states, sending the body acidic and eventually lead to more serious conditions such as hypoglycaemia, diabetes

I see most commonly Candida rashes (fungal rash) which is fed and exacerbated by sugar.

Could sugar be the cause to your skin rash, headaches, lack of energy, sore throat or weight issue?

If the body is craving sugar then there is most likely an imbalance. Chromium is the main mineral for balancing blood sugar, aiding weightloss by reducing cravings and great for diabetics.

Eat low GI foods and protein with every meal. This will facilitate weight control, provide consistent energy and improve concentration levels by keeping your blood sugar balanced. Protein is an excellent way to fuel the body without effecting blood sugar and essential for brain function.

Whilst fat is bad for the heart, it is actually sugar that makes us gain weight. When too much sugar is released into the blood stream and not utilised; it is stored for later as adipose tissue (fat).

Reduce your sugar consumption and feel the benefits immediately. For more dietary suggestions speak with your local health practitioner to find out if your diet is too sweet for you.

Rocky Creek Falls

The following article appeared in The Cairns Post on 15 February 1888. As can be seen the mode of writing in those days was quite effusive.

ORTH Queensland, admittedly the most picturesque division of all Australia, boasts few more beautiful spots than that portion of the second section of the Cairns-Herberton railway known as Rocky Creek Falls. Possessing the charm always apparent to lovers of the beautiful in Nature, it combines the effects produced by the abundant richness of tropical verdure with the sublimity inseparable from lofty mountain scenery. The Falls themselves, though not equaling in volume or grandeur the now famous torrent of the Barron, are indescribably lovely: and during the rainy season recall to the memory those celebrated lines that describe with such original rhythm,

"How the water comes down in Ladore."

Truly the horny handed sons of toil labouring on the scene of No. 9 tunnel, on the verge of the cataract, have their lines cast in beautiful, if not always pleasant places, and those nomadic tourists who devote so much of their time and incur so much danger and arduous toil in their search of the beautiful amongst the European Alps, would find much more gratification and far less risk in exploring such scenes as those we now speak of. It was a Sunday on which we visited this romantic scene, when the workmen were busily engaged in their ablutions and washing their clay and toil-stained clothing. We observed to one brawny individual that it was a great blessing to have one day on which to attend to their own requirements. He was evidently a bit of a cynic, and observed in nautical phrase:

Six days shal't thou labour, And do all that thou art able; On the seventh holystone the deck, And coil down the cable.

To meet the wants of the times and to provide creature comforts for the inner working man, Mr. G. Lee has erected a comfortable and substantial hostel, and despite the great cost of bringing all his wares from the level plains below by means of pack horses, contrives to keep a good table and well supplied bar (to the qualities of both of which we are in a position to testify), and charges but moderate rates. From this desirable and charmingly situated establishment is to be seen a view that could not by any means be excelled if equaled, the silver sheen at the Barron River glinting in the sunlight below, and in the back ground the waters of Trinity Harbour with Cape Grafton blue-tinted by distances are clearly observable. In the time to

come when the line shall be open to this favored retreat there is little doubt but that the merchants and well-to-do residents of Cairns, together with inhabitants of more distant localities, will resort to Rocky Creek to renew their health and vigor in the beautiful and bracing climate afforded by the lofty elevation. In addition to George Lee's establishment there is another licensed house kept by a Mr. Gardiner, and innumerable tents occupied by men working on the line while giving the population of a small township in no way detract from the picturesqueness of the scene.

Of the tunnel itself, which is 9 chains long, it may be said that it is the hardest of any on the section, being entirely of solid rock, and is worked by two shifts of twelve hammer and drill men. This tunnel is only worked at one end, the material excavated being required for forming an embankment across the creek, and we could not help thinking with regret of this lavish use of the metal so much needed in poor sandy Cairns. As an outlet for the water of the Falls a culvert 8 feet in diameter has been carefully built with cement through the embankment, and the rush of water thundering and foaming through during the wet season, is a sight once seen would not readily be forgotten.

At present about 100 men are camped at Rocky Creek, and as soon as the wet season is over probably fully 200 will have pitched their tents on the spot. It is somewhat surprising that so few comparatively of the people of Cairns have visited this delightful and busy scene, and it is with the object of advising the public that such beauties exist near at hand that we have devoted so much space to their description.

(The mention of twelve hammer and drill men referred to the practice of drilling holes in the rock to place explosives. The drill man held a drill bar and turned it in the hole while the hammer man struck the drill repeatedly. The drill man gave hand signals to the hammer man with the hand holding the top of the drill, and unfortunately sometimes his finger was caught between hammer and drill. It was not unusual for a drill man to have "short" fingers. It was an extremely hard job, and expert drillers were highly respected. Most of the tunnels on the Kuranda Range were excavated from both ends and sometimes there were also tunnels dug into the river side so spoils could be tipped over into the gorge. When the spoil was not needed for filling embankments it was tipped over the side into the gorge.)

Wikipedia confirms a 'Diva' is a celebrated female singer; a term used to describe a woman of outstanding talent. Joon Graham certainly ticks all the boxes. Joon came to live in Kuranda in 1980 and is a regular busker in the village and on the Cairns Esplanade. Her exceptional voice caresses the words with a distinct vocal style. It is powerful to a wide range of audiences. Joon has incomparable skills in sweet jazz and ballads and is a musician of extraordinary abilities. It was such a pleasure to sit with Joon on her rainforest deck, to sip cool 'nariyal pani' (coconut water) and become engrossed in her stories and share her warmth and laughter.

Where is your current studio?

On the edge of my bed. I do the biggest percentage of my practice there. After that it is everywhere; wherever I can make music and sing. Visiting musicians use my lounge room.

Do you work alone or with others?

I busk alone and with others. I am delighted that musicians want to busk with me. Local bass player Dave Hart and I also busk together. We play on the Esplanade in Cairns regularly.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Peace mainly. When I record in a natural environment, for my own use with my practising, I sometimes ask "What is that background noise in the recording?" I found it was the evening crickets in my rainforest garden. I also need a small cushion to put under my feet as I tap my feet in time to my music. It is automatic for me. In deference to the neighbours the cushion is essential. I also need electricity for my amplifiers and guitar when I am busking.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

I used to play every morning, sometimes for four hours at a time. Lately it seems to be around 2 hours. I need my music in my life. It is like a tonic. It is a healing thing. It is part of my life. I have sung all my life. I don't understand how people can go through their daily lives without music.

Describe the work you do in your studio.

Just singing and playing my guitar.

Why is music your chosen medium?

In the 30s and 40s everyone sang around the piano. It was a very common practice. We all did it, usually with the whole family involved. I went to a Catholic school and I sang with my late sister Rose. She was a soprano and I sing in a lower register. We sang together a lot over many years. I played and sang with a band in Hong Kong - blues, folk and jazz. We played on TV. I did not play again in public until I came back to Australia. Then I started to busk. In 1974 I approached my then local council about busking and I was told to "write us a letter dear"!! I then sought advice from a cop and he said "just go to a shopping centre and ask them to turn their canned music off and start playing". I played in the Blue Mountains and by 1980 I was doing a lot of busking and playing and singing regularly in restaurants.

List three things you listen to while working.


My voice, my guitar and my foot tapping. The tapping does not interfere but adds to the tempo. Most musicians tap their feet, it is such an automatic thing to do.

Your favourite tool?

My guitar and my voice. They are 'joined at the hip'. They are one.

How do you identify your work?

I play under my own name, Joon Graham. I changed the spelling from 'June' a long

time ago. My father was the Secretary of the Spelling Action Society and he believed spelling should be phonetic, that it made more sense and it was easier to learn. He would have approved of the change I made.

How do you sell your work?

I have copies of my CD on display when I busk which people are kind enough to buy when they hear me singing.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No. Teaching is an art and I believe I play very simply. I don't read music. Many musicians can't. But we have 'an ear'. Some musicians have said that being restricted to sheet music hinders them to be spontaneous.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

Nothing. I wouldn't change anything. It is just perfect sitting on the side of my bed. It is the right height, the right everything and the acoustics in that room are perfect for my needs.

If you were not working with music what would you be doing?

I would be riding a horse through the waves near the shore. Riding, of course, on a horse that loved waves. Years ago I would take my horse into the surf, he loved it. We both did. It was such a rich and invigorating thing to do and I have lovely memories of this.

Otherwise I would like to continue working with creative people. Kuranda is full of many talented artists and musicians and we are not using them - and over the years Mareeba has been telling us what we can and can't do. I very recently returned from the annual festival at Wallaby Creek (out of Cooktown) where I performed with Dave Hart. People come from all over the world and there is very high standard of music. The organisers are so helpful to the visiting musicians. It is the most wonderful venue.

I would like to see the artists in Kuranda given the opportunity to have their own festivals again.

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Farmers of the Insect World

While we hold ourselves in high esteem for domesticating animals and using them to aid us in the production of food, we certainly aren't the only species utilising another in this way. Insects have been doing it for millions of years, and it happens in our own gardens on a daily basis.

Ants are the most common farmers in the insect world, and 'farm' a variety of other species in order to gain food rewards. For ants, the food that they most desire is sugars and there are some other insects that reward ants with droplets of sugary liquids in exchange for their protection.

Aphids produce sugary secretions called honeydew as a by-product of their sapsucking diet. Ants know only too well that if they protect groups of aphids, this energy rich food will be plentiful. The ants mill around clusters of aphids and attack any threats to their precious aphid herd. In the case of tiny aphids, the big bad wolf can come in many forms. Ladybirds and lacewing larvae are two of the most common aphid predators and should these insects appear, the ants go into attack mode to drive them off as quickly as possible. Thus the relationship the ants have with aphids is extremely beneficial to both parties.

There are a number of other insects 'farmed' by ants. Various species of planthoppers offer the ants similar sugary treats to that provided by aphids, and are protected in the same manner. This amazing insect interaction is quite easy to see if you know what you are looking for. Locally there are a number of common planthoppers that cluster in numbers on branches of gum and wattle trees, with numerous ants fussing around drinking honeydew while providing protective services.


Some ants have taken the protection process a step further with caterpillars. Green tree ants protect species of Lycaenid caterpillars during the day by sheltering them within retreats made of leaves and silk. At night the ants herd them up into the tree to feed on the tender leaf tips. The ants obtain sugary secretions from the caterpillars by tickling special glands on the caterpillars with their antennae. This again benefits both parties as the caterpillars are protected from their predators, and the ant colony gains a precious source of sugars.



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Jill Melody - from Hippie to Businesswoman

It is nice to tell of success stories, and our profile for this month is one of these. Jill Melody is well known in Kuranda, having first come to Cairns in 1980, and not long after that having begun to sell her wares through both Rusty's Market and the original Kuranda Market. The story of how she ended up in Kuranda is an interesting one.

Born in Boston, Massachusetts in the USA, she was schooled in that country, completing a Bachelor of Science degree in Education in 1975. After that the wander-bug found a way into her thinking. She travelled across the USA with a girlfriend. In California she reunited with her future husband, Luke, whom she had had a summer romance two years earlier on Cape Cod. She and Luke travelled to Mexico, and when they returned to the US they then went their separate ways. Jill earnt money waitressing and then moved on through Europe and parts of north Africa, travelling very cheaply. From there she moved east to Asia.

She found a teaching job in Kabul, Afghanistan at an international school. At that time, in 1977, Afghanistan was quite peaceful, being prior to the Russian invasion. Travelling around the country, she enjoyed the scenery, including the seven great lakes in Band-e Amir and the great Buddhas of Bamiyan carved in rock (since destroyed by Islamic extremists). She found it exotic, and began her long-time collecting activities. She also enjoyed the people and their hospitality. She was in one village which was cut off by a landslide for some time and lived with the local people.

From there she moved on to Nepal and then

India for nine months. In Poona she came across the Bhagwan Shree Rajneesh and became a Sanyasan (devotee). He gave her a new name "Veet Varjana" ("beyond commandments"). A bout of ill health forced her to return to her parents in Massachusetts. There she was reunited with Luke again in 1979. He was working on yachts and together they worked delivering a charter boat to the West Indies.

In Antigua they decided to marry, the marriage subsequently taking place in Massachusetts. From there they travelled to Malaysia to build a boat. Jill became pregnant. A friend told them a good place to move to was Cairns, so they moved there to have her baby, and their son Pira (Aboriginal for "moon") was born in a one room flat on the Esplanade. They loved the place and successfully applied for permanent residency in 1980. Jill is now an Australian citizen.

Jill had brought many artefacts and craft items with her from Asia so it was decided to have a stall both at Rusty's Market and the original Kuranda markets. They did this for a while, broken only by a short trip back to the USA. On return



to Sydney, they brought an old "Sun Herald" delivery van, fitted it out for accommodation, and travelled north to Cairns again. It was a casual style of life, and they rejoined the Cairns/ Kuranda hippie culture. Jill continued selling at Rusty's Market and at the original Kuranda market. But again they felt the pull of the family in USA, returning home for some nine months. Then Kuranda attracted them back, only to find their garaged van in a sad state on their return. Having little money, they lived for a while in a shed in Kuranda, then rented a house. Together they scraped up enough money to buy a block of land in the area, on which Luke gradually constructed a house. Jill, in addition to selling through her stalls, was busy in the community, running aerobics at the Amphitheatre for some 12 years as well as serving on the Committee in the booking office for a while and in the community theatre and ladies' choir.

About 20 years ago Jill decided to set up her own shop in the main street of Kuranda with Luke's help, "New to You", selling all sorts of interesting bric-a-brac, jewellery, clothes and accessories and collectables. From their initial venue, they moved to and restored the old Ngoonbi house on the other side of the road. When this lease was not renewed, they purchased a house opposite and with Luke's hard labour and design, converted it into a shop. It became "Just Gorgeous". Jill says that this has worked well despite being on the less busy side of the road and notwithstanding the tourist downturn. Jill works in the shop about four days a week

and on other days does the book work as well as the ordering, buying both within Australia and overseas. She has a number of employees. In her spare time she walks, rides a bike, does stretching yoga and reads a lot. She enjoys singing in the Kuranda acapella group.

Jill is upbeat and positive about Kuranda and its future. Negativity breeds negativity, she says. She feels Kuranda's character is returning after a bit of a decline. She supports The Kuranda Paper as an important community-building medium. In life she follows the golden rule and believes in karma. Although not religious, she is tolerant of all religions and beliefs except those that are fanatical or bigoted. A happy, generous, outgoing person, she extends a very friendly welcome to customers, friends and visitors alike.

Di's Farewell

The last month was tragic for our Friends of the Earth Kuranda group. Di Horsburgh, a founder member and past Secretary, passed away after a brief struggle with a highly invasive cancer. We'll all miss her energy, dedication, friendship and sense of fun. Along with many people in this community however, we rejoice in her memory.

Di was an inspiring activist, campaigning with many organisations

including previously being President of CAFNEC. She also worked for the Wilderness Society as community campaigner. (see http://www.wilderness.org.au/regions/queensland/farewell-to-a-wilderness-warrior).

Barron River Water Quality Community Confidence Project

Friends of the Earth in Melbourne have just released a study into the drinking water supplied to greater Melbourne. [1] The results are disturbing to say the least.

The study may well have relevance to our own situation as several key factors are similar: a wide diversity of pesticides used in an agricultural catchment, patchy data, reluctance to test for the comprehensive range of potential pollutants, official evasiveness over the adequacy of testing, lack of elaborate filtering that might remove pesticides from drinking water.

The author, Anthony Amis also raises another issue: the potential for chemical reactions between chlorine added to the water supply, as done in Kuranda, and some of the pesticides, fungicides and herbicides that find their way into that water. There's evidence some of these 'Disinfection By-Products' (DCPs) may be more toxic than the original pesticides.

The International Agency for Research on Cancer has classified Bromodichloromethane [BDCM] in Group 2B (possibly carcinogenic to humans). What this could indicate is that many other communities across Australia may have none or low numbers of breaches for Trihalomethanes's (THMs), yet could be consuming potentially dangerous levels of individual Disinfection By-Product's (DBPs) and these results are not made public by water authorities.

Some DBP's have been linked to bladder cancer and adverse reproductive outcomes. Water authorities test for a handful of DBP's, yet 700 have been discovered. DBP's are created when chlorine used as a disinfectant, combines with organic molecules in the water distribution process.

Friends of the Earth Kuranda have now applied for a \$13,500 State Government grant titled Barron River Water Quality Community Confidence Project as part of the LNP Governments Everyone's Environment Grant program.

This will allow us to commission the expensive and sophisticated testing needed to help inform this debate. We aim to determine if the drinking water supply for Kuranda and Mareeba meets national water quality guidelines in relation to the wide range of chemicals used historically and now in the Barron catchment. The study will take over 12 months.

We need real information out in the public domain where it can be scrutinised by the community as a whole, so we can have informed debate and outcomes that are seen to be satisfactory.

We're grateful our application has already received wide endorsement, from diverse quarters including Djabugay Tribal Council, Kuranda Envirocare, the Community Action Network and the Member for Barron River, Michael Trout.

More about "What are we drinking?"

FOE Kuranda's article 'What are we drinking?' (Kuranda Paper, September edition) has sparked debate over the issue of the quality of our town water supply (letters, October edition).

The letter from Keith Treadwell was extraordinary. He was told by Council he may not provide his household with an alternative drinking supply to the mains supply such a rainwater tanks. Such policies make it all the more essential that the safety of our town water supply is beyond question.

A second letter from John Goss, an apparent advocate for the weed killer glyphosate suggested as we have no test results our credibility is about zero. We don't agree. We have been looking for evidence of credible, regular, specific testing for traces of the hundreds of complex chemicals that drain every year into the Barron from agriculture and mining on the Tableland and for Disinfection By-Products.

In the absence of this, can we be confident the water is safe? If not, is it wise to use this water for drinking (as well as for irrigation, bathing and fishing)?

The safety of our drinking water is an urgent public health issue and deserves the support and cooperation of the Tableland Council and the involvement of the Federal and State politicians representing the people of Mareeba and Kuranda.

"The Secret of **Divine Civilization**"

by Abdu'l-Baha (1st pocket size edition) ISBN 0-87743-219-8, RRP \$9.50

This book was first written by the author in 1875 and printed in Persian text. It was not translated into English until 1910 under the title "Mysterious Forces of Civilization". This newer translation, undertaken by a

person fluent in both Persian and English, is said to be an improvement on the earlier translation. The book is in the form of a message to the 19th century rulers and people of Persia, at a time when that country had fallen into a very backward state, a plaything of contending Western powers. It was a place of ignorance, superstition, with a frightening lack of education and under development. And all this despite the past glories of the ancient Persian Empire. The book sought to awaken the country and its government and people from its lethargy and backwardness.

So what is the relevance of this book to today, you might well ask? The answer seems to have two aspects. One is that the modern state of Iran, formerly known as Persia, has, despite its material development and the exploitation of its vast resources, again fallen into a very backward state. It is ruled by a fundamentalist theocratic elite in a tyrannical way, where true liberty does not exist, corruption is widespread and human rights abuses of the worst kind are common place. Superstition and ignorance still have a great hold on the population. That country is in constant state of belligerence with not only the West, but also with some of its Middle Eastern neighbours, so much so that it is said to be a threat to international peace and security. The Iranian Government increasingly rules only by resort to threats, fear and violence.

Given this situation, this book still relevantly addresses the primary issues of concern today in Iran in much the same way as it did in the 19th century.

But more than this, the book addresses many of the contemporary issues of concern in the wider modern world. It is really a book addressed to the rulers and peoples of the world as a collective whole. It considers the essential requirements

of a civilised state; that is, the basic elements of what we call "civilization". It is a book that lauds the achievements of modern science and technology, but demands that these be combined with holistic universal education, wisdom, vision, ethics and spirituality. Contrary to the views of many, it exalts true religion, and not the worn out creeds and dogmas used as a tool by some governments, up to an elevated place in this process.

Let's have a look at some quotes from the book:

"This fairest of lands was once a lamp, streaming with the rays of Divine knowledge, of science and art, of nobility and high achievement, of wisdom and valor. Today, because of the idleness and lethargy of her people, their torpor, their undisciplined way of life, their lack of pride, lack of ambition – her bright fortune has been totally eclipsed, her light has turned to darkness."

"The primary, the most urgent requirement is the promotion of education. It is inconceivable that any nation should achieve prosperity and success unless this paramount, this fundamental concern is carried forward. The principal reason for the decline and fall of peoples is ignorance."

"Again, is there any deed in the world that would be nobler than service to the common good? Is there any greater blessing conceivable for man, than that he should become the cause of the education, the development, the prosperity and honor of his fellow-creatures?"

"It is certain that the greatest of instrumentalities for achieving the advancement and the glory of man, the supreme agency for the enlightenment and the redemption of the world, is love and fellowship and unity among all the members of the human race."

Here are resounding words that point the way to a future globalised world, a world of security, peace and prosperity. This ancient vision is given new life in this book. In a contemporary world in which we are obsessed with the negatives of life and the divisions in society, this book is a call to a new and much more positive and united form of civilization on this one small, fragile planet. And it is a call to individual effort and commitment in bringing this about.

How to Get Your Kids to Eat More Fruit and Vegetables

From now until January, if you love tropical fruit, you'll think all your Christmas's have come at once. Perfect for kids too with such a wide range of local exotic fruit, organic and GM free!

A healthy filling breakfast is vital for kids and a banana smoothie, pancake or sandwich is a healthier swap for commercially produced cereals.

Endless possibilities with smoothies for breakfast:

To make a creamy non-dairy smoothie use banana as the base fruit. Then just add any fruit in season plus ice, juice or milks of any kind. Freeze the fruit first and the drink will be colder and creamy when blended.

Place fruit, banana, ice cubes in blender. Blend at high speed until ingredients are combined and ice cubes are dissolved.

Try a substitute:

coconut, almond, oat, rice milk instead of dairy, or use lactose free milk. Honey, mango, lime and candied ginger are a great combination! If you ever need to buy frozen fruit, buy unsweetened and Australian product only. Green smoothies, fresh fruit juice and protein shakes

make excellent breakfasts. • The juicer pulp makes great pancakes, muffins, and

- cereal toppings. • Add fruit to your porridge, top hot cereal with a smiley face made out of dried and fresh fruit and
- · Serve a yoghurt dip with a fresh fruit salad or
- cereals. · For savoury options, hash browns, and savoury pancakes and eggs.

Make eating vegetables fun!

Have your child help prepare the fruit or vegetables. Using a plastic pizza cutter and potato peeler, kids can easily cut capsicums, or add peeled or grate apples and carrot together.

Beans easily snap off, peas carefully removed from a fresh green pod. Make funny faces or animals on pita, or mountain bread, by using an assortment of veggie toppings.

Create fun names for foods-applesauce soup, carrot pennies, broccoli trees. Buy bananas of different kinds and get them to chop them up and try each one. Boys prefer the fruit already cut up. If they have to peel, slice or fuss, they won't eat it. Though, if they are hungry they will.

If texture is an issue, limit the amount you offer to a picky eater. Give them one to two teaspoons only and they'll be more likely to finish and try again or serve vegetables in a very smooth puree.

Shapes & Colours

• Serve a meal made of meatballs, cherry tomatoes,

peas or grapes

- Cut sausage, ham carrots and cheese into sticks or
- Make rainbow meals traffic light capsicums, orange or purple carrots, cherry red tomatoes, green honeydew melons, purple grapes, blueberries, orange slices, slice of pink watermelon
- Add vegetables and beans to bulk out meals
- Make a zucchini or pumpkin impossible pie
- · Add any shredded vegetable but especially carrots or zucchini to minced beef burgers or stir fries

· Add pureed roasted capsicum to a jar of pre-made pizza sauce or salsa

> Instead of mayonnaise on a BLT, use mashed avocado mix in a dash of milk to the mash.

Sandwiches & snacks

• Use fresh fruit instead of jam in sandwiches. Mashed banana sandwiches, sliced apple and cheese, mango sandwiches

· Always keep a bowl of fresh fruit on the counter or keep a personalised sealed container in the fridge of cut, sliced, cubed salad veg in the fridge for snacks.

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Snake Warning For Kuranda Pet Owners

VETERINARY EXPERTS are urging Kuranda pet owners to be on the lookout for snakes this spring following predications of an extreme snake season.

Queensland animal hospital BVSC, located in Brisbane, has treated ten pets suffering from snake bites this month, a rise of 20 percent from the same time last year.

Dr Rod Straw, founder of BVSC and veterinary specialist, said he is expecting to see a spike in snake cases during October and November due to ideal weather conditions including warmer temperatures.

"Early detection will make a big difference to the severity of the injury caused to pets by snakes.

"Snake bite symptoms vary depending on the type of snake, number of bites and size of the animal bitten, however there are key symptoms pet owners should be aware of," he said.

To help pet owners identify if their beloved pet has been bitten by a snake, they should look out for the following symptoms:

- 1. Weakness or wobbly walking
- 2. Unexplained bleeding
- 3. Discoloured urine
- 4. Loss of blink reflect
- 5. Change in (or loss of) voice
- 6. Altered breathing pattern
- 7. Pale or purple gums

Dr Straw said checking your pet for snake bite symptoms is more effective than trying to find the bite wound.

"It is much more common not to find the bite wound, than to find it.

"If you suspect a snake bite, take your pet to the vet immediately - even if the signs are mild. Animals can rapidly deteriorate and the pre-paralytic improvement can be a sign of a fatal dose of venom," he said.

Recently BVSC treated Wags, an eight-year-old Jack Russell Terrier, who arrived at the Centre showing signs of weakness.

"Fortunately for Wags her owners quickly noticed lameness and shaking, with weakness that was rapidly getting worse."

Wags' owners brought her into BVSC for urgent treatment and by the time she got to the Centre, she was unable to lift her head.

"In a very short space of time the emergency crew at BVSC identified, with the help of a snake bite detection test, that Wags had been bitten by a brown snake.

"Antivenin was given but despite repeated doses she remained critical with mechanical ventilator support and 24 hour intensive care.

"After six days in hospital she made a full recovery.

"If you suspect your pet has been bitten by a snake you should contact a veterinarian immediately," Dr Straw concluded.



Men's Shed Update

On 11th October 2012, between 11.45 and 12.15, in the company of Nicko Djeric, I was invited to a meeting at the Mareeba Shire Council chambers with Councillor Jenny Jensen and acting CEO, Matthew Hyde.

We were informed of the following –

- B Block will be destroyed.
- Council will not rescind their decision.
- Council are unable to rescind their decision because the matter cannot be re-considered by Council for a period of 3 months.
- · In any event, the building will be destroyed prior to that time period.
- The Men's Shed proposal was considered but in a closed meeting.
- The meeting was closed because Council was considering a contractual basis with Men's Shed and such considerations are secret from Men's Shed as
- As a result, all correspondence and reasoning dealing with their deliberations are secret also.
- · Council will not release the rationale for their decision.
- · Councillor Jensen stated that her reasons were made apparent.
- We were informed that Council has no plans for what, if any, facilities will replace the building. It will be a Community Precinct but there is no notion of what that will be.
- Council is aware that there is no State or Federal funding available to replace the buildings nor for any other redevelopment of the site.
- · Council's new Community Advisory Committee will not meet until after the building is destroyed and will then decide what the future should entail.
- Council has appointed their Grants Officer to seek funding for a Kuranda Men's Shed.
- Council is not aware of any available large funding for such a Men's Shed building.
- · Council is aware that start-up grant funding for a Men's Shed is \$6,000 – maximum.
- · Council would appreciate it if Kuranda Men's Shed stopped their lobbying as there is no point.
- Council suggested that our continued resistance to the destruction of B Block could result in depression in some of our members to their personal cost.
- The petition from the Kuranda Community has no weight because Council has rejected its requests.

Nicko Djeric and I left the meeting with quietly restrained ire.

It is planned to hold a series of meetings across the state in coming weeks as part of this review, with the aim of gathering important information towards making recommendations on revitalising the RFS. 



New social housing units for Kuranda

KURANDA will get four new, one-bedroom units to help with social housing needs following a Tablelands Regional Council decision.

The council, at its meeting of October 4, voted to award a tender for \$979,622 to SJ Wilson builder, for construction of two units in Harriman Street and two in Thooree Street.

The approval was subject to Department of Housing and Public Works permission to use surplus funds to address a shortfall of \$61,602 in the project budget.

A report to council on the tender process identified the wining firm as having completed several previous projects for council, including social housing developments at Yungaburra and Kuranda.

Tablelands Regional Council Mayor Rosa Lee Long welcomed the project.

"Somewhere to call home is a very basic thing and I am delighted that the TRC in combination with the State Government is able to move forward with projects such as this," she said.

Divisional Councillor Jenny Jensen said: "Aged housing is a major need in our community and I am delighted that there will soon be four more people with a new

TRC makes detailed de-amalgamation costings publicly available

FULLER figures detailing Tablelands Regional Council's assessment of deamalgamation are now publicly available and they show how significant changes in several vital areas of local government, will impact on any new council.

The material made up the TRC submission to the Queensland Treasury Corporation and the Boundaries Commissioner. Both agencies are charged with assessing the prospects of a proposed separation of the former Mareeba Shire from

"The estimated one-off costs for Mareeba ratepayers could be more than \$10 million. All of these expected expenses are detailed so everyone can see how that figure has been calculated", Mayor Rosa Lee Long said.

"Which rainforest neighbours will visit first and will they all come to look and to stay?" In the rainforests of Queensland, the percentage of plants with fleshy fruits has been recorded at about 85% (Wilson et al 1989). With a greater variety of bird species visiting our revegetation sites, as trees start seeding and start down that 500-600 year long road back to mature rainforest, we can expect additional tree species to grow as birds feed in the nearby

quality rainforest and expel the seeds, with a convenient dollop of fertilizer, as they pause and perch in our revegetated sites.

One of our Envirocare members, Dr Ray Pierce, is setting up bird monitoring in these revegetation areas. Already he has detected over 90 species in the control sites, including a cassowary on the Kuranda State School side of the river, about 500 metres downstream of Little Road, We are hoping members of the community with an interest in bird spotting will join us in monitoring the succession of birds into these areas along the Barron over the next few years. It'll involve walking a flat cleared transect. Ray plans to monitor once a month so there'll be lots of opportunities for people to join as a small group of recorders and spotters each month or to walk on their own and report sightings of a specific list of birds. . Weed spotting - Syngonium

Have you seen this in your garden or forest? Try to get rid of it if you have, because it will smother tree growth, taking over the canopy in the competition for light. A lovely pot plants when small, Syngonium is an aggressive, rapid-growing vine. Juvenile leaves are simply arrows, while mature leaves can be up to a foot long and have five or more lobes. Variegated plants tend to lose their variegation as they age. Try growing a Cairns Brird Wing vine instead. It'll attract other butterflies besides the Cairns Bird wing, loves its roots in the cool and its leaves in the sun.

De-amalgamation Update:

I am presenting the following information to residents. I am urging you to consider all the information before you form your opinion on whether or not you support de-amalgamation to a new Mareeba Shire.

The Boundaries Commissioner again met with both the TRC and the De-amalgamation group in early October. The full details of the TRC presentation are available on the TRC website.

In summary, the estimated costs to Mareeba Shire residents would be approx \$10 million plus approximately \$7 million re-adjustment of assets and costs, plus over \$20 million for the upgrade of the Mareeba Sewerage Plant. These figures were developed by TRC staff; however the figures have been verified by independent forensic accounting assessment by the firm BDO.

The figures will be further scrutinised by Qld Treasury before the Commissioner makes his decision on whether or not the residents of the former MSC will vote on the de-amalgamation.

In the meantime, the Council of the TRC is intent on getting on with the business of running the TRC.

Congratulations Kuranda VIC:

Well done to Cathy Harvey, Trainee Earl Hobbler and the large team of volunteers at the Kuranda Visitors Centre. Recently the Centre was awarded by TTNQ as best Visitors Centre in the region. A real credit to all involved!

River Walk Stairs:

Construction has started on the riverwalk. This project is funded by Kuranda Infrastructure Fund. There will be new stairs to the river esplanade area and a new walking track along the river towards the Barron River bridge.

Kuranda Community Precinct:

Council recently reconfirmed the Council decision of October 2011. The full resolution is available on the TRC website.

There are a number of parts to the resolution, including moving the Library to the site, sale of the Old Pre-School, removal of Block A and B and future planning for the community facilities at the site.

The Advisory Committee will be re-formed very soon. (Please see my Letter to Editor in this edition).

RADF Grants: Congratulations to Kara Ross and Piers Freeman who recently received Regional Arts Development Grants from Council. The funds are state funds administered by Council and applications for grants are open twice per year.

FIKS Grants: Not for Profit Community groups and individuals are eligible for Council's FIKS (Financial and In-Kind Support) grants of up to \$2000 per year.

Young people who excel in sports, cultural activities are also eligible for grants. Application details are on the TRC website or by contacting Council.

New Staff at Kuranda Library:

Welcome to new Co-ordinator, Wendy and Assistant Natasha. Thanks also to Ros and Kristy who have left recently. Kuranda Library is a great little Library and I am still working to have the Opening Hours extended.

Four new Aged Housing Units:

Construction starts soon on four new one bedroom aged housing units in Kuranda. (Two units in Harriman Street and two units in Thoree Street).

Anyone wishing to apply for aged housing will need to contact Council's Aged Housing Officer or have a chat with Marg at the Neighbourhood Centre who will be able to assist you with the process.

Council has also approved a policy change to allow residents of Aged Housing to have a small pet in their unit.

Recycling:

Community consultation regarding the TRC Waste and Recycling Strategy has concluded and the results will be available soon. Preliminary comments indicate that a large number of people are in support of kerbside recycling.

Speewah Digital Television:

Some residents (mostly in Boonooloo and Hidden Valley areas) should by now have received notification that further signal testing will be carried out on Wednesday 31 October by NComm technical staff.

This may mean that some residents will receive a rebate on the charges. Contact is Tracey Cuthberston at TRC.

Road Projects:

Current works are occurring on reconstruction/upgrade of sections of Ganyan Drive; Contractors commence soon on Black Mt Road and Mona Mona Road; design work is completed for Fallon Road causeway; design work on the safety upgrade to the Morton Street/Rob Veivers Drive intersection is underway.

Kuranda Traffic, Parking and Pedestrian Study:

The implementation of the 62 recommendations of the study (completed 2011) has been considered for funding. Some of these are long term and the major projects (such as the Therwine Street upgrade) will be subject to further consultation.

Kuranda Day and Tourism Kuranda:



A Thought for November

This month we open our Bible at the Gospel of Mark and read Chapter 10 verses 35-45.

What's in it for me? It's a common phrase these days. And even if we don't actually say it, we very often think it. None of us can climb out of our human skin. "Greed is good," says a character in a movie of the late eighties about the world of stock and bond markets. This passage in this month's reading has that kind of phrase hovering in the background.

The disciples have been together with Our Jesus for over two years. Things seem to be getting to a point of decision. They are on their way south from Galilee to Jerusalem. Though they don't yet know it, this will be their master's last journey to Jerusalem. Jesus is trying once again to get them to realize what may be ahead of him. Perhaps fearing that they may not have another chance, two of the disciples decide to make a bid for special treatment.

"Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." There is an unattractive childishness about their approach. They want guarantees before they even ask. Jesus, knowing them by now, is very wary. He demands they become specific. He probably senses the worst, and he is correct.

Their request is a sleazy and self-seeking concern about getting ahead of the others. They want special privileges. They think a grand kingdom is coming, and they want some payoff. Our Lord is disgusted, angry, and frustrated. We can hear this in every word of his response. He begins by sarcasm. He shows that they do not have the remotest idea of what they are asking.

They have not heard a word about the terrible cost of the immediate future. Their only agenda is selfadvancement and greed. Nothing stays private in a small group. The others hear of it and are appalled. Jesus is so concerned that he calls them all together. As always he penetrates to the underlying principle.

What the two disciples really want is power. This most subtle human desire of all presents itself in an infinite variety of ways. It can be a person's agenda without their realizing it! Our Lord points out that in human society authority is based on power and position. In his followers Jesus demands another basis for authority. Among Christians authority is based not on position and power, but on servanthood. It is perhaps the hardest lesson for us to learn. To the degree that we learn it, we become like Jesus.

Jesus tells us that authority is not based on power and position but on servanthood. Having told us this, he himself lives it.

News from St Saviour's Church

During October we celebrated three very special occasions at St Saviour's.

On 7th October, we held our St Francis Day service with the Blessing of the Animals. Big dogs and small dogs came and even ankle biters; dogs noisy and lovable; a bird that had been rescued and numerous other animals small and large. All the animals behaved very well.

The service was held at the back of the church so everyone, mostly the owners of the pets, was able to relax. It was great to have such a wonderful large enthusiastic gathering.



For the first time, the Association is paying rent for premises, and this additional expense was catered for by the slight increase in advertising rates from the August 2012 edition.



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
