Kuranda was lucky to survive Cyclone Justin relatively unscathed although several houses sustained some damage and the forest and most gardens are still a little tattered here and there. One of the most impressive effects of Justin was the massive swelling of the flow of the Barron River and Falls, captured by the above photograph and elsewhere in this edition of the Kuranda Paper. The wild conditions made the journey out to Barron Falls Road to view the Falls in all their glory an adventure in itself. There was electricity in the air, the roar and shudder of the Falls and the sharp fresh smell of rain and crushed vegetation which covered the whole area. It was truly exhilarating to see, feel and hear the power of the Barron River released in what is, these days, a rather rare occurance.

In the early years of this century, Kuranda was considered a place for rest and recuperation and was also known as the "Niagara Falls" of Australia - a favourite honeymoon spot. An early tourist promotion described the magic of a visit to Kuranda:

" there is reason for their wish that they shall never end their holidaying until they have rested a while beside the smoothly flowing Barron River, have stood in awed amazement before the cascading beauty of the Stoney Creek Falls on the rail-road to Kuranda, have wandered heedless of time along the romantic little Jum Rum Creek, or stood at the foot of the mighty, roaring volume of snow white water that pitches over the rocks into the gloom and grandeur of the Barron Gorge."

The Barron has undergone many changes since those times. It is well known that it already cannot meet the demands placed upon it by agriculture and the insatiable taps of Cairns. Changes to and increased production of commercial power generated from the Barron Gorge Power Station will create further demands. This month a meeting will be held in Kuranda. It has been organised by Member for Barron River Lyn Warwick to discuss the future of the Barron River at Kuranda. Also attending this meeting will be Minister for Energy Tom Gilmore and Mike Fewster of AUSTA, the power generating arm of the Queensland Electricity Generating Board and operator of the Barron Gorge Power Station. Recent low river levels, the environmental integrity of the River and the needs of the community will be discussed and you are urged to attend. This meeting will be held on Thursday May 15th 7pm at the Kuranda CWA Hall.

We need to protect the River in our area and to ensure it is properly managed.

Well, a lot of water under the bridge since the last ARK column, two public meetings and quite a number of committee and special meetings as well. And an election and a cyclone !!!

ELECTION RESULTS

A very disappointing result for Kuranda, with no resident councillor. Mayor Chris Lewis attended ARK's March 19th meeting and gave a personal commitment to ensure Kuranda receives its due attention. ARK has requested a review of the Shire electoral system to examine how the situation may be avoided in future elections. However, it needs to be pointed out that the same situation occurred in 1988 under a divisional voting system. In fact, the lack of a Kuranda councillor at that time was a catalyst for the formation in 1990 of ARK (known then as the Kuranda Consultative Group). Almost seven years and 90 monthly public meetings down the track our relationship with Council has steadily improved and become a more positive, co-operative partnership. Although we see that it will be a challenge to maintain a strong communication base in Council without a Kuranda councillor, ARK remains committed to working for a positive environmental, economic, social and cultural future for all in the Kuranda region.

ARK particulary wishes to thank former Councillor Oliver Gilkerson for his unflagging attendence at ARK meetings and assistance during his three years as Kuranda's council representative. Thanks also to former Division 4 councillor Dennis Rose, who worked for Kuranda on the Main Street program and who provided strong support to Oliver in Council.

In the current situation, ARK's value as a strong and aware resident's group has been highlighted, and a recent strong increase in membership reflects this. Welcome to all new members, we appreciate your support. ARK has now worked with four different Mareeba Shire Councils and there is a lot of experience and knowledge to draw upon: both from within the Management Committee and through the membership.

If you wish to be an active participant in the future of Kuranda please join us. Membership is \$10 per year (\$5 conc.) and forms are available at meetings (every third Wednesday 7pm Sports & Social Club, Fallon Rd), from the Management Committee or from The Green House Environment Shop 26 Coondoo St (Mon-Friday 10am-5pm). Our meetings are always open to the whole community, NEXT MEETING: Wednesday May 21st 7pm Kuranda Sports & Social Club.

PRIORITY ISSUES

As usual ARK is dealing with many issues of concern and interest to Kuranda residents. These are all covered in detail in the minutes sent to members. The following is an update of priority issues only.

BLACK MT RD CASSOWARY CONSERVATION

ARK's dedicated working group now has a title : CASS (Cassowary Alliance for Species Survival) which reflects the need for all concerned parties to work together and also the seriousness of the situation: we really are talking about the future survival of cassowaries in this area. Unbelievably, cassowaries although listed as endangered in Queensland are not listed as such Federally. With a lot of help from Lyn Warwick, Lesley Clark, Warren Entsch, Sen. Ian Macdonald, the Mareeba Shire Council and the Departments of Environment and Natural Resources and other community & environment groups, Federal listing appears imminent : at least it appears funding for the research to allow for this to occur has been identified. At the same time, negotiations regarding the future management of State reserves in the Black Mt Rd area is underway with a meeting of all interested parties to be held

LOW RIVER LEVELS at KURANDA

Have been exacerbated by deposits of sand caused by flooding generated by Cuyclone Justin. The effect of these will need to be examined.R5th public meeting (see notice this page)esidents are urged to attend the May 1

KISC DRUG AND ALCOHOL BULLETIN DRUG INFORMATION GUIDE FOR PARENTS

Parents in rural Queensland will find a wealth of practical information in a new guide to help cope with drug use by young people. The free booklet - entitled Coping With Drug Use: A Practical Guide for Parents - is one of a number of publications produced by Queensland Health's Alcohol and Drug Information Service. It provides helpful information and practical strategies to help parents deal with all levels of drug use, from experimentation to regular or heavy use. It also details how to access further help if required. Most young people are exposed to some form of drug use - usually involving alcohol, tobacco and marijuana - either through the media, peers or relatives and this often results in experimentation. This can result in problems for the user, their family or community generally. Queensland Health provides many counselling services for parents and young people experiencing problems relating to drug use. Its Alcohol and Drug Information Service, which last year received more than 3,300 calls from anxious parents, offers confidential and anonymous telephone counselling or referral to specialist treatment agencies. YOUR HEALTH IN YOUR HANDS

A NEW WHOOPING COUGH VACCINE:

Australia has a scandalously low level of childhood vaccination, particularly protection against whooping cough - a bacterial illness caused by the Bordetella pertussis germ. There has been a big jump in the incidence of pertussis in Australia, with almost 4,000 cases in 1993 and 5,600 in 1994, with quite a few of these on the Tablelands, including Kuranda. This prevalence is quite a worry since the illness is very unpleasant, particularly in infants and younger children. The "whoop" is an attempt to inhale some air after extended periods of repeated or "paroxysms" of cough, through swollen airways and thick secretions. The disease is associated with significant mortality which can be as high as 1% in infants. Protection against pertussis is provided by the pertussis component of the Triple Antigen vaccine (which also contains diphtheria and tetanus toxoids). The pertussis component is a "whole cell" vaccine which has minor but frequent side effects, particularly fever, swelling, redness and crying. Concerns about these side effects have certainly contributed to the lowering of the community's protection and general vaccination rates. The recent release of a new Triple Antigen vaccine with an "acellular" pertussis component sees the long awaited arrival of a much less "reactogenic", but equally effective alternative. The new vaccine has a much reduced incidence of side effects and will certainly be later adopted as a replacement (to the old Triple Antigen). Unfortunately this vaccine is not yet a free immunisation and cost around \$35.

Write to your Local M.P./Health Minister or the media to encourage its adoption.

ORGANIC GARDENING

The sun is shining and all my plants are rejoicing - flowering, fruiting and growing. Celery and Mignonette lettuce which I planted before the cyclone are very healthy. I planted the lettuce in 2 different places - the place with more fertility has lettuce ready to eat - the other plants with less compost are well behind.

My compost is made of fruit scraps and weeds (with no seeds) and some manure. Weeds that have seeded are pulled out put in heaps, some manure added and covered with black plastic. The black plastic should kill the seeds - but if the seeds are mature I cut them off, bag them and bag and seeds go into the wheelibin.

If you have questions or want some gardening knowledge do come to the Kuranda Gardening Group May 10th.

Cucumbers did not like the cyclonic weather and drizzle but my tomatoes elevated in boxes and drums are starting to bear. They are big cherry varieties.

Sucking moth time has arrived. I intend trying covering my citrus with colourless plastic shade cloth so the wretches can't get at the fruit.

OUR PETS ARE GETTING FAT WITH LOVE

Kuranda Veterinary Surgery

Unfortunately in the Western World at the present, obesity is one of the most common diseases affecting our pets and comes number one on the list of nutritional disorders. Few of us would leave a hungry puppy by the roadside but most of us are unaware of the potential risks to our pets' health of that extra tit-bit which we so lovingly give them as a sign of affection. Obesity is defined as the excessive accumulation of fat in the body. This over-accumulation usually leading to dysfunction, deterioration of health and a shortened lifespan. The main consequences of obesity are a decreased ability to exercise, difficulty in breathing, increased blood pressure, heart disease, lowered resistance to infection, diabetes, liver disease and joint disease. All of these things put together make an obese patient a much higher risk if surgery is necessary during their life.

What is the cause of obesity? In the majority of cases it is described as the HUMAN FACTOR - we simply feed our pet too much food i.e. their energy intake is greater than their expenditure.

CASSOWARY CONSERVATION

Residents have reported sightings of young cassowaries around the outer reaches of the Kuranda region, and there is a lot of interest in knowing more about their habits and their ecology. Guest speaker, Les Moore, addressed our April meeting and shared his wealth of knowledge on cassowary numbers, their range and interaction with each other and with humans, their dogs and guns. Residents who are hand feeding cassowaries need to be aware that their natural food is the truit of the rainforest. Cassowaries have little resistance to a fatal fungal disease called aespillogilosus. The fungus is carried in bread, cheese and prepared food. This fungus builds up in their systems when they are regularly fed unnatural food, and ultimately kills them. Hand feeding develops their dependence on unnatural, nutritionally deficient food and may introduce disease. The birds may become aggressive if the hand that feeds is empty, putting the well meaning feeder at risk. Hand feeding encourages familiarity with people, dogs and roads,

which threaten their very survival. If you insist on feeding them, please offer only fresh fruit, leave it out for them, move away and watch from a distance.

If a joint funding application by Kuranda Landcare and Kuranda Environment Association succeeds in securing funding from the Natural Heritage Trust, this rainforest community will have an opportunity contribute to cassowary recovery across the region.

THE SAGA OF THE VANISHING WEIR WATER

The drainage of the weir in early November 1996 was due to maintenance work being undertaken at Chalumbin substation (via Ravenshoe). This meant there was a shortfall in power to FNQ. This shortfall was met by the Barron Gorge power station. The drain on the water supply was longer and heavier than anticipated due to the heavy call on energy resulting from air conditioner use in the hot weather. Consequently, water was taken from the Weir faster than it was replenished from the reduced, dry season natural flows.

The delay in getting water from Tinaroo was in part due to Austa's delay in ordering the water and in part due to the four to five days it took for the released water to travel the distance from Tinaroo to Kuranda, filling water holes along its way

During construction of the new 275 kVA line from Chalumbin to Woree, the Barron Gorge power station will be heavily utilised. This will occur during May to October 1997 when marked fluctuations in the water level of the weir could be expected. Austa will try to maintain the welr level at 4.5m but it may reduce to 2.5m at any time Austa will notify Mareeba Shire Council when this is expected. Upon completion of the new line, the reliance on Barron Gorge will cease.

However, from September 1997, electricity supply will be deregulated and Austa will compete with other power providers for a market share, optimising its use of the Barron Gorge power station to achieve this. Austa is presently negotiating with the Dept. of Natural Resources for a supply of water to support its power generation.

Premature over allocation to any user before "environmental flows" are fully quantified is likely to result in the expectations of users falling short later in the dry season. This could have implications for the agticultural industry, Austa, tourism, Cairns City and the environment.

If Austa cannot secure the water it requires from existing supplies, it, along with Cairns City, will press for greater water storage along the Barron River. A large storage at Flaggy Creek or a series of smaller weirs between Flaggy and Kuranda are options being considered.

Bilwon Weir: DNR engineers have come up with a storage option which is a dam separate from the Barron River. This solution may enhance the environment and please everyone. More in EnviroNews.



While the pig trapping program is working well with our new portable traps, other options are being canvassed to augment the trapping program, including controlled shooting. The Kuranda Environment Association will be included in discus-

sions and trials concerning this option. Next meeting will be chaired by birthday septuagenarian, Cliff Stevens, so we'll be celebrating. Come and join us.





Remember if you change your address please let us known so that we are able to send your renewal to the correct address and thereby maintain the continuity of your subscription.


TREVORS TIP:

BLEEDING: - or haemorrhaging is the loss of blood from the blood vessels. Profuse bleeding may lead to collapse or even death depending on how much and how quickly it is lost. Bleeding may be external (visible from a wound) or internal (into tissues, organs or body cavities)

SIGNS: Bleeding from the wound - Coughing up blood or passing dark bowel motions - Pallor of the skin (may become cold and clammy if bleeding continues) - Rapid and feeble pulse - Sighing breathing - Patient may become dizzy, faint, or even unconscious. TREATMENT: * Sit or lie down as necessary. * Elevate the wounded part if on a limb and there is no fracture. * Remove any loose foreign bodies. * If possible press edges of the wound together and apply firm pressure tot he bleeding part. * Apply dressing and firm bandage, maintaining pressure. * If bleeding continues apply another pad and bandage firmly over the previous one. * If bleeding is serious seek URGENT AMBULANCE MEDICAL HELP - 000

CHAMAEDOREA ATROVIRENS 'CASCADE PALM'

Originating in Mexico it is found naturally growing as an understorey plant in damp mixed forests.

Unusually for a palm it only grows to about two meters in height, in a tight clump. The black trunk becomes multi headed, dividing just above soil level. Flowers are followed by 6mm black fruits.

Full sun has not been a deterrent in Kuranda, but a plentiful water supply is required to keep the dark green foliage looking lush

Ideal too as an indoor plant in a tub, but again regular watering is a must. The bottom fronds on all palms die off, so to keep your plant looking clean and healthy regularly remove dying fronds completely from the base.



SOME WILD NEWS

THE WILDLIFE PRESERVATION SOCIETY of QLD is currently reviewing its regional role in FNQ. A recent meeting in Cairns with Director Pat Comben (whom some may remember as Qld Minister for the Environment in a past life) attracted twenty people including several from Kuranda who are interested to see the Society taking a greater and more active role in the preservation of species and habitat. WPSQ is one of Qld's oldest, largest and most respected conservation groups started over 30 years ago by naturalist David Fleay, poet Judith Wright, artist Kathleen MacArthur and publisher Brian Clouston.

A slide presentation and discussion on BATS OF THE CAIRNS REGION by bat expert Chris Clague will be a part of the night. Refreshments supplied. BATS OF THE CAIRNS REGION

In the immediate Cairns region, more than thirty species of bats are found. These vary from the highly visible flying foxes to the out of-sight, out-of-mind Micro-bats. During 1994-5, the Australian Tropical Research Foundation (AUSTROP) conducted a widespread survey of the bats in this region. Chris Clague BSc (Hons) was employed as field researcher on this study and is currently conducting Doctoral research on a local bat colony. The bats in the region can be easily separated into two main divisions, the Mega-bats which include flying foxes and blossum bats, and the Micro-bats which are also known as insectivorous bats. After rodents, bats are the most numerous group of mammals in the region both in numbers of species and numbers of individuals. The Mega-bats are an important component of forest systems, acting as seed dispersers and pollinators. All the Micro-bats are primarily insectivorous with the exception of the Ghost Bat which is an animalvour. Both groups play an important ecological role in the region. This role will be discussed at the May 13th WPSQ meeting as well as the construction of bat boxes.

ARTIST'S PROFILE PETER THOMPSON - STUDIO POTTER

Newly elected chairman of the Kuranda Arts Co-op and affectionately known to all as "Potter"; Peter has matured in his practice along with this town. Since establishing his studio in Kuranda in 1975 as a self-taught potter, he has moved through formal training and study tours in Australia, USA and China to become widely acknowledged for his skills and aesthetic sense, particularly in the specialised field of wood fired ceramics.

Potter's work is strongly influenced by oriental aesthetics and explores the use of the most basic elements of wood fire and local clay bodies. These limitations are worked with, implicitly understood and thoroughly explored - ultimately allowing a spontaneity of expression in form and surface treatment.

The glaze effects are created naturally from ash falling on the pots and though these can be controlled by temperature, air circulation and wood type, there is always the opportunity for accidental effects - encouraged and hoped for but still an element of serendipity.

The pots are fired in a large tunnel-shaped 'anagama' kiln. Anyone who has witnessed the annual ritual of the 3-4 day firing, can sense in the pieces the aura of strength from the energy and sweat of nurturing the fire-breathing dragon.

The results of Potter's last firing were represented in the "View From Here" exhibition at the Cairns Regional Gallery recently and some of these pieces will be featured in the window space of the Kuranda Arts Co-op in Coondoo Street this coming month for those who missed it. Potter has also just completed a tour of the Cape as a tutor for the Flying Arts School.





Education views BOOST FOR SPECIALIST New lease of TEACHERS life for centres

QUEENSLAND'S top tertiary graduates will boost the state's teaching ranks in a scholarship scheme designed to address the shortage of specialist teachers.

The Department has offered 60 teaching scholarships to graduates in areas such as maths/science, English, business education and information technology in a bid to stem the shortage of specialist teachers in state schools.

Following its success in the tendering process held before Christmas, the Queensland University of Technology is offering the scholarships to students enrolled in its Preservice Graduate Diploma of Education (Secondary) course.

The scholarships will include a HECS-exempt place in the course and a cash benefit of

Human Resources director Jim McGowan said letters had been sent to selected students outlining the offer last week.

Students weren't required to apply for the scholarships, but were targeted based on their enrolment in a Graduate Diploma of Education at QUT in one of the four nominated discipline areas, and their excellent academic record, Mr McGowan

"We are hoping for a twoweek turnaround for them to decide if they want to take us up on the scholarship," he said.

'We expect to have all scholarships accepted by the end of

Education Minister Bob

to sign up students who had already completed the bulk of their tertiary studies, rather than recruit school-leavers and then wait four years for them to graduate.

Successful scholars who completed their courses would also enjoy the benefit of guaranteed employment with the Department for a minimum of two years.

That will mean we can confidently count on a significant injection of high quality graduate teachers into our priority subject areas by 1998," he said.

"Until now we've focused on our own school-leavers and experienced teachers interstate.

"These scholarships are an Australian first and will target our other major source of potential recruits - tertiary students who have already demonstrated academic excellence."

Mr McGowan said a major benefit of the scholarship scheme was that it recruited the top achievers now instead of waiting until the end of the year when they completed their studies. "I think what's happened in the past is that many of the top ones generally go to other job areas like non-state schools or they don't even go into teaching," he said.

The four discipline areas include: maths/science, English, business education, and information processing and technolOUFENSLAND'S Life Education Centres received almost \$400,000 in additional funding recently to continue their work with the state's primary school

At an official ceremony at Harris Fields State School, Education Minister Bob Quinn presented a cheque for \$390,000 as the first instalment of \$1.36 million allocated for Life Education over the next three years, subject to successful annual review.

Most of the funding will be used to provide specialist educators and programs in 22 classrooms around the state.

Delivered each year for Years 1-7 students, the programs cover aspects of health and self-esteem in the early primary years through to anti-drug abuse programs in the upper primary years.

"Earlier trials have shown it's possible to reduce smoking by as much as 50%," Mr Quinn said.

Life Education is based on the Gold Coast, with mobile vans at Brisbane, Logan, Pine Rivers, Redlands, Ipswich, Toowoomba, Caboolture, Sunshine Coast, Gympie/Noosa, Maryborough/Hervey Bay, Bundaberg, Gladstone, Rockhampton, Mackay. Townsville, Cairns and Mt Isa.

New preschool curriculum goes on trial

THE Preschool Curriculum Guidelines will be trialed by 30 teachers across the state during Semester 1. Teachers from state, independent, Catholic, community and child care settings will work with the trial version of the guidelines, developed last year by the Queensland School Curriculum Office.

They will operate in clusters located near Cairns, Emerald, Maryborough and Brishane

Project officer Nieke Groenenberg, said collaboration and consultation with earry childhood stakehold ers had been emphasised through the development phase of the project and would be an important part of the trial. "Claster group coordinators involved in the trial will be drawn from the variety of systems and sectors operating preschools."

An external research agency will help evaluate the trial and a research officer will work with OSCO officers and cluster coor-

dinators. "The data collected will focus on identifying expectations and responses of teachers, parents and administrators," project officer Elizabeth Kable said. "Final revisions prior to publication in late 1997 will be informed by the report from the trial evaluation and feedback from the consultative groups.

The guidelines will be available for implementation by school authorities and other sectors in 1998.



& FOLLOWING on from Heather Smart's tip (Kuranda Paper February edition) to use essential oils (such as peppermint, rosemary & eucalyptus: diluted in water) to keep surfaces clean and deter cockroaches: recent research has also shown that this will also help to mask and neutralise the effects of pheronomes (chemical signals) left on surfaces by cockroaches to mark territories and attract mates. These oils also are natural 'bacteria busters'. For a very comprehensive guide to the use of essential oils for this and other purposes around the house, garden, office and for family and pet care THE FRAGRANT PHARMACY by Valerie Ann Worwood can't be beaten (Bantam Books RRP\$19.95). Locally, its available from The Green House on Coondoo St.

& CAIRNS BIRDWING butterflies are among the most familiar to Kuranda residents and a joy to behold due to their impressive size and vivid green wings. The food plant for these butterflies is commonly known as DUTCHMAN'S PIPE vine - a common name used to describe a number of Aristolchia species. The common name refers to the impressive, rather sinister looking, flower. UNFORTUNATELY, most people will not be aware that many vines sold are an exotic introduced from places such as South America, the planting of which amounts to a DEATH WARRANT for our birdwing caterpillars. The exotics are indistinguishable from native species to the butterflies. In fact, egg counts in south eastern Qld (where the Richmond Birdwing, Australia's rarest birdwing, is facing extinction) show that butterflies lay more eggs on the exotic vine than on natives growing nearby. When the caterpillars hatch out they eat the leaves which are poisonous to them and die.

Recently a group was formed to raise awareness of issues regarding Australian insects, including butterflies. The Australian Insect Breeders Association can assist with queries and advice. Call the Secretary Sue Hasenbusch on 633 860. The advice regarding the dreaded Dutchman's Pipe is to pull it out NOW and replace with two native vines. If you use Windows 95 and you are in Windows Explorer. Right click on a file and you should see an item called "send to". On my machine I have the following options.

31/2 Floppy (A). Which copies the file or files to your disk in that drive.

Desktop

Printer (Your printer's name)

Same idea, your file goes to be printed.

Email (Email program's name) Same again, your file goes to your Email Program.

Will send a text file that may not be associated to Notepad, to Notepad. Use your imagination and try other things if you find you are doing something on a regular basis.

To set this up, find the file of the item you wish to use. Right click on that file and click Create shortcut. The new shortcut will appear, it will be highlighted and have the same name as the original but will show shortcut to the right of it, right click and drag the new shortcut to the "send to" Folder which is in your Windows directory then left click "move here" and you are in business, next time the new item will
