To inform people about our rainforest creatures, WILD ART supplied information about each painting. An excerpt on the Green Possum: -The Green Possum has the most beautiful pelt of all the possums. The yellow and black hairs give an overall appearance of green, hence the name. It is the only possum in Australia whose eye has a vertical iris. This possum was at one time fairly common in Kuranda rainforest but is now found mainly in denser inland forests. A reminder to cherish and protect our native life.

I would like to express my concerns about the proposed placement of the Regional Rubbish Dump in the Lamb Range State Forest (Cairns Post, 23.4.92) sited between Davies Creek and Clohesy River and in a large catchment area for both streams.

All residents downstream from this site drawing water from Davies Creek, Clohesy River and Barron River; including underground bores and dams must now seriously consider the future quality of their water supply should the dump become a reality.

Rainfall (average 44") and runoff from hills in this area must create ponding and leachate build-up despite promises of a "safe dump" of clay and plastic liners.

A consideration to all residents is the dozens of garbage trucks transporting rubbish each day using the range which is already very dangerous with the numerous trucks, buses and other traffic.

This proposed dump presents serious consequences to our community's health and lifestyle. Les Mills, Clohesy.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

I'm on a visit here in Kuranda from Howick in the North Island of New Zeeland.

Howick is an outer suburb of Manukau City, and is by the sea. Like Kuranda, it is of old colonial origins, a small town where some of the first settlers arrived. It, too, is green and leafy and has its own distinctive character

However the differences are more apparent than the similarities, mostly I suppose, because of the difference in climate. Kuranda has a sub-tropical climate, and Howick is definitely in a temperate zone. Here, I find myself very close to nature, with snakes in the grass, kangaroos or wallables hopping along the road, and a profusion of growth of many varieties. Colourful birds dart among the trees, and silences are broken by many cries of birds, insects and animals. The weather is strange to me as well. The heat is hotter, the rain heavier than I have felt before

I find, too, that the people here are relaxed and friendly. I have had great pleasure in meeting and talking to several of the Aboriginal people who live here. I find the markets quaint and interesting.

I have had occasion to make use of some of the services available in the city of Cairns, and I can assure the people here that the service they get is friendlier and more personal than is available in many bigger cities in Australia as well as in New Zealand. People definitely take a lot of trouble to assist those in difficulties.

Thank you, Kuranda, for your friendly welcome to a stranger.

SKYRAIL UPDATE

On Monday evening May 18th the delegation of Kuranda residents nominated at the March 18th Consultative Committee meeting to take the community's concerns about the Skyrail cableway project to the developers and relevant departments, attended a meeting in the Wet Tropics Boardroom in Cairns. Dr Lesley Clarke MLA, member for Barron River chaired the meeting.

The delegation consisted of Gayle Hannah, Cathy Flambo, Liz Inuce, Ashley Peake, Joan Dods, Jean Anderson, Linekke Salmeron, June Rees. Gayle was spokesperson for the delegation. Arch Mc Arthur took notes.

Also present were Professor Peter Hitchcock, director of the Wet Tropics Agency, Mr Greg Wellard, regional director National Parks & Wildlife Service., Chairman Chris Lewis and Councillor Wally Gray

(Mareeba Shire Council) and the developers George and Ken Chapman.

The delegation took a list of approx, 60 questions to the meeting. These were questions felt to have not been answered adequately or at all in the written responses recieved to the original (collated) 84 questions sent to all concerned.

Following a detailed description of the tests being conducted (environmental, geotechnical and technical) by the Dept of Environment and Heritage and Prof Wiltshire's description of a project similar to Skyrail in Venezuela which did not require clearing for construction it was agreed to suspend debate over whether Skyrail could in fact be built without clearing of the rainforest until all studies were completed and examined. The delegation was promised they would be given the opportunity to do so as soon as possible

The all important social impact study into the affects of the project on Kuranda was agreed to as being necessary although the Dept of Env.& Heritage is puzzling as to how this can be done within the 'approval process' It seems it is not appropriate to ask the developer to conduct a study outside the actual project yet it was agreed that a detailed study into the future impacts of tourism and development in Kuranda, including the possiblity of Skyrail being established, is urgently required. Dr Lesley Clark supports Kuranda in this and is investigating possible strategies for such a study to be undertaken. It was stressed that the community is frustrated and angry at decisions being made from outside of Kuranda about Kuranda's future and Dr Clark agreed that community consultation was vital to a successful study.

The process for assessment was explained by Greg Wellard and although the release of all studies and plans supplementary to the 1989 Impact Assessment Report was not guaranteed he said it was standard procedure and he would be "very surprised " if they were not made available for public response. Once again it was stressed that all plans and studies must be made available to the public as soon as possible. The Mareeba Shire Council representatives stated that if the project takes place either on freehold land or on leased land it will require a rezoning application. if it goes shead under an agreement with a government dept e.g. railways without sale

It was established that the cableway project will not reduce the number of buses in town. It will half the rapid growth in bus traffic not reduce the actual number of buses. How long it will halt or slow this growth was not established. The problems of the buses and other traffic problems were the focus for heated discussion. The surprise of the night was the statement that the developers want to see the buses removed from town. After the delegation recovered from this the remaining concerns were distilled into the possible deterioration of Kuranda as a community, environment and tourist destination.

CONTINUING CONCERNS are

- 1. Appropriateness of project in relation to the World Heritage areas through which it
- 2 Impact on Deans Lookout area: environmental, visual, pollution.
- 3. Impact on the river esplanade area of Kuranda. Visual, noise, loss of natural character, loss of 'community' recreational amenity.
- 4. Impact on Kuranda of ever increasing visitors: traffic, parking, noise, pollution, loss of privacy and 'community' identity.
- 4 Impact on Kuranda State School.

Another meeting is planned as soon as the studies are completed and the Dept. of Transport will be invited to attend. This is, of course, a very distilled outine of the events from March 18th The questions, answers (written & from the May 18th meet) and minutes are being collated and from mid June will be available to read at the Greenhouse Environment Shop on Coondoo St and the library at the CWA Hall.

If you are concerned about this or other issues please attend the public meeting section of the Consultative Committee monthly meetings, 7.30pm CWA third Wednesday every month.

I.AMBULANCE, Last year I arranged for Council land to be set aside on Reserve No 127 fronting the Kennedy Highway for the future Kuranda Ambulance Station. The Department of Transport refuses access to this and many other properties in the planning process of the new sections of the Limited Access Highway.

I have selected a new site fronting Rob Veivers Drive on Reserve No 126. This site's entry now requires the Department of Transports approval.

A Kuranda Ambulance Station will be a benefit to the whole community Please support this very small band of dedicated voluntary workers in their Fund-raising Activities toward this goal. Meets: 2nd Thursday night of each month in Fire Brigade building, Coondoo Street.

2. INDOOR AMUSEMENT CENTRES. KURANDA TOWN PLAN

a) Village Zone - Consent from Council required

b) Business Zone - Use permitted without Consent.

Until recently, responsible owners of such establishments have barred children during school hours, and this is one of the usual conditions required on a Consent Application.

It is hoped I'm sure by both parents and educators that any business not requiring Consent with Conditions would act in a responsible manner.

4. KURANDA SIGNAGE POLICY.

All perpetrators of illegal signs, banners and sandwich boards have been advised to remove

There will be no further warning prior to confiscation by Council.

5. EXEMPTION FROM POOL FENCING REQUIREMENT.

Council has resolved to adopt the following policy:

That Council not approve applications lodged in accordance with S.49H(9B) of the Local Government Act for Exemption of the Requirement to fence a swimming pool where the area of land is over 4000 sq metres."

New Fencing Regulations require liason with the Council building inspector to ensure that the correct type of fencing is erected.

6. REFUSE COLLECTION CONTRACT.

The successful Tender was awarded to Cleanaway Pty. Ltd. for a period of five years. 7.TO ALL KURANDA KIDS.

I will be doing a Survey soon as to whether you would like to have a skate board ramp installed and also a special bus service to Cairns on Friday and/or Saturday nights to the movies.

B. SPEEWAH.

Many inaccuracies have been printed in various media lately regarding the name Speewah, both the history of the area and the origin of the word.

The official naming of the areas Freedom County and Hidden Valley to Speewah was democratically voted on by the Ratepayers Association of that area and put to Council.

It is not illegal for those residents to continue to use the developers naming nor has the Post Office in Kuranda any problems with same. The Association is constructive in its attitude to achieve benefits for all residents of the Speewah area. A positive move for any dissenters, would be to get involved and join the Association.

Have your input heard and make use of your vote - hopefully toward the betterment of this beautiful area.

Post Office staff for offering assistance but for now rates will NOT be payable at the Kuranda Post Office.



SPORTS INJURIES

Unfortunately sport injuries do occur despite good training and warm ups. Sprains, strains and bruises are the most common injuries.

Sprains refer to torn ligaments (which attach bone to bone at a joint).

Strains refer to tern muscles or tendons (which attach muscle to bone).

Tears can range from microscopic (accounting for muscle screness a day or so after starting exercise) to a complete rupture.


Sprains and strains result in bleeding just as a cut on the skin does. This is the bruising sometimes seen. Any blood not reabsorbed into the body will become involved in the healing process resulting in scar tissue, again similar to cut skin. Scar tissue is thicker and less elastic and is therefore prone to reinjury. The immediate treatment aims to reduce bleeding and scar tissue formation. Following the R.I.C.E. and H.A.R.M. programme in the first 24-72 hours will aid recovery. DO : REST, ICE, COMPRESS and ELEVATE. DBN'T : Heat, Alcohol, Running/exercise, Massage.



ORGANIC GROWING

Pawpaw trees have been growing well and are heavily laden with little disease but very few fruit ripening. It has been a strange season for fruit Usually in March and April I have heaps of gorgeous golden passionfruit : but not this year. Like the pawpaws they have stayed green and are now at last ripening slowly But strangely my Macadamia trees have droppeed thousands of nuts. Why? Though mature for years, I have enjoyed poor crops due to massive insect attacks on the flowers. Being organic I use no poisons and harmless sprays are a waste of effort. I get exhausted gathering the nuts. Don't be tempted to leave the very small nuts on the ground. Any nuts you leave on the ground will germinate and, having a tap root, can be very difficult to pull out. Seedling Macadamias are not reliable bearers. I recommend grafted trees of a selected variety.

My Mandarin trees were loaded with fruit and 1 did not have to do any thinning Why? The fruit fly and sucking moth have attacked the sweetening fruit despite my baited plastic bottles ligung in the trees. Every week I have replenished the baits in the containers. I have caught some 'horrors' but many have left their sting. The fruit then yellows prematurely and falls off. I have been picking the fruit before it falls. With just a little colour, the juice is very pleasant. I have given away dozens ... better than letting them drop because they have to be picked up and composted. If not caterpillars will develop in the fruit and breed a few thousand more for next year. There are no caterpillars in the fruit when I pick them. The white cockatoos are enjoying a daily feast of those I don't pick and what a mess under the trees. They enjoy the thin skinned variety and love the seeds. Thank you to those nice people who tell me they enjoy my articles.


Our own Mantaka performed superbly. A real highlight was the presence of Archies wife Ruby, who wrote about four of the songs performed. What a treat.



THE TENTH MUSE -

AND I WANTED THE REST OF THE PARTY OF THE PERSON OF THE PE

An occasional article devoted to Food & Wine. And I would like to hear from all the "little Vegemites". Just drop your entries into FROGS AT NIGHT. Recently I was asked a perfectly sensible question, which had never before occurred to me.

I wonder what your reaction would have been and how you would have replied? An American visitor asked me: "Do you really like Vegemite?" Well, do you? Vegemite is as Australian as 'the back of beyond', but do we really like it or is it just part of our way of life.

When I first came to Australia my mother made me sandwiches with fried eggs, or thick slices of sausage with tomato sauce. They were far from those elegant triangles which my friends brought for their school lunch. But my friends had this other stuff: Two Sao biscuits stuck together with thick exle-grease and when you squeezed them, these black worms oozed out through the many holes. Do today's "little vegemites" do that too? Anyway, to become 'true blue' I learned to eat this stuff and now I can say that I actually do like it. And I know why.

Have you actually looked at today's Vegemite lable? So on the front we have: "KRAFT" "Concentrated Yeast Extract" ... "All Natural". But the original lable in the early '20s proudly boasted: "Pure Vegetable Extract" and "Fred Walker & Co Pty. Ltd. - Melbourne". Well Fred Walker was an Aussie who started a business in Melbourne in 1908. He was responsible for "Red Feather" canned butter, canned dripping, potted cheese, camp pies and liver pastes for export for wartime rations and for the outback. In 1919 walker introduced Bonox. In the meantime Carlton & United Brewery tried an extract from spent yeast which they called "Cubex". It failed. And so in 1923 Walker & Co negotiated to buy the spent yeast from which to make a version of English Marmite. The actual man behind this was a foodchemist named C.P Callister and in a small room in Albert Park (Melbourne) he developed this unique spread... Vegemite. Consider this: It was going to be called "Parwill" because the English counter part was " Marmite" (Ma might). And so Vegemite hit the market as: "The Vitamine vegetable paste for use in sandwiches, soups, stews and gravies. It is full of vitamins and very nourishing." But what irony - spread which epitomised "family goodness" was made from Brewery yeast wastel It was not a run-away success. The early advertising campaigns emphasised its scientific benefit for growing children and it was referred to as the "World's Wonder Food".

Kraft and Walker amalgamated and one way to promote Vegemite was to include a free gift coupon for Vegemite with other Kraft products. So Vegemite and cheese have been 'hand in hand' from the beginning. In 1937 a limerick contest had a Pontiac car as it's prize. Just before the war the Company gained authorisation to advertise in the 'Australian Medical Journal', which became "in effect, offical endorsement of the product to the medical practitioners throughout Australia".


The post-war baby boom created a huge new market and in 1954 the wellknown "Happy Little Vegemites" Jingle was born. During the fiftles the advertising heavily stressed the medical and health authorities' recognition and acceptance of Vegemite as a family health food and one of the themes was "put Vegemite next to the pepper and sait whenever you set the table." The marketing campaign continued in the sixties with "you had Vegemite when you were young, continue to have it during your teens and into your adult years." From 1972 until 1977 we were subjected to, "Pass the Vegemite please, Mum", and in 1978, "Happy Little Vegemites" was tried so that the nostalgia would remind today's mothers of how good Vegemite was for them when they were children.

And so, processed and flavoured brewing waste continues to nourish generation after generation. Now I have a theory why the Americans don't like Vegemite. They did not 'invent' It. The Aussies did! You see we, in Australia, were socially advanced. Vegemite would have been impossible in the United States between 1918 and 1933 because Prohibition made Brewing Illegal.





SPEEWAH FOUND

by Karl L. Frazor

I have been researching the name Speewah for many months . Mr. Jim Walder gave that name to the farm when he leased it for a short time in the late 1800's, having brought the name with him when he travelled from the original Speewah station which was situated on the banks of the Murray River some kilometers west of Swan

The name Speewah was bestowed on that area in the 1840's by a German botanist Professor Von Muller who spent some time in the area studying, naming and documenting flora.

As it was the practice in those times to give the name of an area some Aboriginal content, the professor chose the Aboriginal name Wha sometimes spelt Wa or Was and the name of his predecessor Professor Frederick Spee, hence Speewa.

Professor Von Muller later became curator of the Melbourne Botanical Gardens. About that time the Beveridge family leased a large amount of land in the area to run sheep and cattle and used Speewa as their property name.

The Speewa station was a huge property by Victorian standards, stretching for some 45 miles along the Murray River thus giving birth to the tall stories related by Bill Wannan in his book Crooked Mick of the Speewah.

ORIGINS OF PLACE NAMES SPEEWAH

Submitted by John Beasley THEY WERE TOUGH MEN ON THE SPEEW AH

"Where the Speewah is, no one knows. The men from the Darling said it was back o'Bourke and the men of Bourke said it was out West and the men of the West pointed to Queensland and in Queensland they told you the Speewah was in the Kimberleys.

Tom Ronan, a bushman of Katherine, N.T., told me in a letter:

'It was, I think, originally, the place a bit "farther out", "over the next range" where cattle were a bit wilder, horses a bit rougher and men a bit smarter than they were anywhere else. With the growth of backblocks folklore, its position in the scheme of things became more definite: It was the land of running creeks and shady trees and good, green horse feed, the bushman's "Field of Asphodel", the place where all good bagmen - and some weren't so good - went when they died.

In the early years of this century an old drover named Jim Dillon settled down on a bit of country out sou'-west from Wyndham, W.A., and called it the Speewah and it still appears on the map as such, thus giving rise to some argument as to whether it was not the original Speewah from which all outlandish places and events took theuir origin

Stories of the Speewah are our folklore. While there is still time we should collect and treasure them. They are more than just tall stories of the bush. They are the unwritten literature of men who never had the opportunity to read books and who became tellers of tales instead. They are the stories of the Australian people." From The Complete Stories of Alan Marshall, Nelson, 1977.

TANGO AT THE SHED !!!!

Shed Theatre are currently working on their production of Polish playwright Slawomir Mrozek's TANGO.

Mrozek, born in 1930, is chiefly known for his short plays, POLICE (1958), A HAPPY EVENT (1971). THE EMIGRES (1974) and SLAUGHTERHOUSE (1975). Mrozek's work clearly shows the influence of lonesco and Beckett, it also owes much to the rich tradition of surrealist and experimental art indigenous in Poland, especially that of Stanislaw Witkiewicz.

TANGO is a parable about the decay of values, which has become so complete that only brute force is truly effective; consequently those who are most willing to exercise power, ruthlessly and without regard for humanistic principles, become the rulers.

To create this parable, Mrozek has set his play within the framework of a traditional family comedy, and uses this to deal with what amounts to an anatomy, a dialectic, of the process of revolution itself.

The result is a very funny piece of satire. Directed by Ricardo Rusch, who also directed CAN'T PAY? WON'T PAY! by Dario Fo, TANGO is set to be another succesful production for Shed Theatre.



AS THE BARRON FALLS....

Episode 10

Charlie Dancer chose the night of the murder to take an extended holiday to the Far North border country. He had planned to be away from Barron for several months at the least but when a month had passed without word of the discovery of a body or an investigation into the disappearance of Dick Condon, curiousity drew him back. He found himself walking the streets of the small town with the same caution he would use in turning over a log out in the dry country.

The will sapping heat of summer passed into what would normally be the Wet. But the Wet had yet to arrive.

At the school, in the pub, around the mail boxes and on the streets the locals dissected the 'drought' while tourists pale as house geckos baked themselves into fashionable agony on the parched lawns of Waterloo Park.

Charlie wondered himself, remembering that the last rain to fall in Barron had been on the day he had ended Dick Condon's life with three fast hard pulls of the trigger. He pushed away his panic with the thought that it had had to be done. But although this kind of thinking worked with the putting down of a mongrel dog, killing a man was another thing altogether and the strain worked on Charlie. The image of the man's dark head snapping forward as his life force blew out plucked and plucked at his heart, until just as the weather turned from the subtle autumn of the tropics into the giorious perfection of tropical winter, it plucked for the last time. The overflow trickled in a network of crimson veins down the bitumened drive and out to the highway where, diluted by the ever increasing torrent, they found their way into the muddy swollen river.

Set back from the danger of flooding on the last bend before the Falls was the Barron Police Station. Insulated against the pounding rain by thick concrete walls Sergeant Michael Sweet was at his desk settling into his first day at a new post. He spread four Items in a fan before him. To his right he placed a thick mug of hot black coffee then at equal intervals to the left, a black plastic document folder marked 'confidential', a large battered notebook and a passport in a clear plastic cover, dark blue with the crest of the United States of America embossed on the front cover.

Sergeant Sweet phoned in his media release to district headquarters at 1.43 pm. * At 8.15am this morning a body in a state of decomposition compatible with death being no more than three months previous was found in a rainforest gully Skms west of Barron. No conclusions regarding cause of death are being made and forensic testing will be carried out on the body today".

He replaced the receiver and opened the notebook to a page blank save for a boldly scrawled " PHILADELPHIA ????". He placed the passport beside this and turned it to read the inside cover. The photograph was of a young woman. The passport identified her as Marion MacMillan. Her place of birth was listed as Philadelphia USA. He smiled at that, then opened the folder and dialed a number listed under a heading of 'URGENT ACTION'.

First news of the discovery came on the evening news and set the superstitious to rattling their teaspoons and murmuring about * death coming in threes". Being unaware of Dick Condon's death and the already completed fulfilment of their prophecy they waited for the third ball to drop. They did not have long to wait




Only once since 1851 has the cup been carried away to foreign shores. In 1983, "Australia II", skippered by John Bertrand defeated "Liberty" skippered by Dennis Conner 4 races to 3. Conner thus became the only American skipper to ever lose the cup. He won it back next time out.


Todays yachts are far smaller than the mighty J boats of the pre-war years. Those mighty 135 ft racing machines carried 7500 sq ft of sail. The greatest of the J boats, and the last one built, was the "Ranger". She carried an 18000 sq ft spinnaker, the largest sail ever

Later the great expensive J boats ("If you have to ask the cost you can't afford it", remarked J.P Morgan) were replaced with the smaller 12 metre boats.

Perhaps the most famous challenger was the English tea king, Sir Thomas Lipton, who built 5 sloops all named "Shamrock", and tried 5 times to lift "the ould mug" from the Americans. When "Shamrock V" sailed over for the 1930 challenge, all America wanted the 80 year old "our Tommy" to win - all except Harold Vanderbuilt of the defender "Enterprise". He did not want the distinction of being the first American America's Cup loser and "Enterprise" defeated "Shamrock V". Americans so loved Tommy Lipton that they gave him a \$16,000 gold cup with a picture of "the ould mug" engraved on it.

The Italian boat had no chance this year, even though the Italians were very heavy favourites to win the cup. They should have known that you cannot win the cup with a red boat. No red boat has ever won the cup. Ask Dennis Conner who sailed the red hulled "Liberty" in








SOME GOOD NEWS!



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
