Affectionately known as Grandma, Mrs. Kenny or Aunty Grace, Grace Veivers (nee Cleland) was born at Clermont (Qld) on the 20th November 1898. Grace was the 2nd of 7 children, 6 girls and 1 boy. Grandma moved to Irvinebank with the rest of the family when she was a toddler. She attended school there and was a student in a concert staged for Gladys Moncrief whose career was just starting. Grandma and her family saw Haley's Comet in 1910 when her Father came home from work to wake them. Grandma came to Kuranda when she was about 16 years old because of health reasons. She lived with Mr & Mrs Thompson and worked for Mrs Thompson at the Railway Refreshment Rooms. The Thompsons also owned a Hotel on Barang Street. Grandma met her husband Kenneth here in Kuranda and they were married when she was about 17. When Grandma first came to Kuranda she travelled on the train from Irvinebank with the boys from that town who were going away to join up for the First World War. She had 2 of her own children, Marjory and Gordon who saw active service during World War Two. Grandma is a Foundation Member of the Kuranda Branch of the C.W.A. Grandma and her family lived at Myola and Kuranda and is now a resident of The Freemasons Home at Whitfield. Grandma is the last surviving member of the original Cleland family and the last surviving spouse of the original Pioneering Veivers family of Speewah. Best wishes Grace!

Congratulations also to Georgia Bruce. At the Australian Championships at Doonan Georgia Bruce and her horse Crystal were in magnificent form. Georgia won the Canter 1 and Canter 3 events and was placed 3rd in the Grade 4 Freestyle. At the final presentation she also walked away with the Grade 4 Australian Champion, Australian Junior Freestyle Champion, Queensland State Champion and was a member of the Qld state team which won the teams event. Georgia and Crystal were up against retired Grand Prix horses, international riders, the Australian elite riders, Warmbloods, saddlery that we would all die for and she and the horse came through. It was a dream come true, the story of the kid from the bush on the bush pony going to the big smoke and beating the best in Australia and a few Internationals as well. Bravol

Association for Regional Kuranda

As there has been no Association meeting held recently it was thought appropriate to report to members and residents on some matters involving Kuranda that are part of the minutes of the Council meetings of 6th, 8th, 20th and 22nd October 1998.

Signage for Kuranda: The Manager-Environmental Services to work with Ms Anja Bakker, as representative of Kuranda businesses, in consultation with Michelle Bell-Turner of Kuranda Village Promotions Program to facilitate business directional signage for Kuranda.

Kuranda Cemetery: Awaiting advice from the Ngoonbi Cooperative Society before commencing further investigations into the proposal that part of Ngoonbi Farm in Kuranda could be used for the Kuranda Cemetery.

Application for Change of Use - AL & PA Greene: A Development Permit to be issued for the Application for Material Change of Use made for a Caretaker's Residence on land described as Lot 28 on RP49646, Parish of Smithfield, situated on Black Mountain Road, Kuranda, subject to certain conditions.

Queensland Rail - Proposed Subdivision & Redevelopment of Kuranda Railway Station: Advise Queensland Rail that the proposed subdivision of the Kuranda Railway Reserve as indicated on Plan Kuranda 1, Sheets 1 and 2 does conform with Council's Transitional Planning Scheme and Subdivision Local Laws and the following is submitted by way of advice:

1. The zoning of proposed Lot 45 should be changed to Special Use (Parking) to facilitate its redevelopment as bus parking.

2. Lot 46 is located within Precinct 1 - Green Belt of the Kuranda Village D.C.P. No. 2 and should not be used for private residential or commercial activities as this is contrary to the intent of the DCP. Council would support the development of this lot by other Govt, Depts. or public purposes.

3. Council has no objection to the creation of Lots 47 or its sale to Skyrail. The zoning of this lot should be amended to reflect Skyrail's usage. A Special Use (Skyrail) Zone would be appropriate.

Breach of Integrated Planning Act - The Ark, Kuranda: Negotiations are continuing between the Council and legal representatives of Mr Laghaifar regarding the perceived development breaches.

Goods for Sale on Footpaths: that Council, in accordance with Local Law No. 38, direct the Manager-Environmental Services to act to remove all offending goods found to be stored on Council's footpaths in front of those properties where Council has previously issued a Notice to the owners/occupants.

"that Council, resolved to write to Mr Falvo of Base Camp Disposals advising him that Council is in the process of reviewing its Local Law regarding Goods for Sale on Footpaths, but until such time as a new Local Law is passed no goods can be placed on the footpath."

Civil Works:

1. Council resolved that a 60 kph speed limit be placed on the Barron Falls Road from Jumrum Creek Bridge to Barron Falls Lookout.

2. Long Term Coach Parking in Kuranda, the minutes noted that Lesley Clark stated that she would be behind any move to fund the permanent Coach Parking facility and it was further noted that funds are to be provided from the Kuranda Tourist Levy. Council resolved to prepare a detailed design and costing for providing parking for 15 buses in Arara Street, to be funded out of the Kuranda Tourist Levy.

Kuranda Toilet Facilities - Centenary Park: Following a serious accident where a female tourist tripped on the step of the toilet and split her head open. Council resolved to proceed with all necessary works to repair noted defects, and that the works be charged against the Kuranda

Kuranda Land - Morton Street: Council resolved to put in a bid for the two blocks of land in Morton Street with funds from the Pensioner Reserve for Kuranda.

Minutes from 5 November

Rural Addressing: Resolve to confirm decision of 20 October 1998 to adopt the Australian and New Zealand Land Information Council (ANZLIC) model for rural addressing for the Mareeba Shire and proceed with rural for the whole of the shire, Manager Environmental Services to report to Council on how best to implement the system.

Lighting - Kuranda Skateboard Facility: To proceed with installing a light at the Kuranda Amphitheatre for skateboard facility at a cost of \$355.00.

Proposed Memorial for the late Maggie Donahue: Approval of the expenditure of up to \$500 from Kuranda Parklands developers Contributions towards the memorial for Maggie Donahue, Djabuguy Queen. Welcome to the Kuranda Library regular column. My name is Kath Raward and each month I will be highlighting aspects of the library's service or collection that you may find interesting.

The new library in Thooree Street opened its doors on the 3rd of November and so ended an era. For the past 14 years the Kuranda community benefited from a library service operated through the generosity of the Kuranda CWA. Knowing what is involved in these ventures I would like to extend my appreciation and admiration to the hardworking volunteers who provided the original service for so long. Thank you and I look forward to meeting you all at the Grand Opening.

This new library will be offering a greater variety of resources including Videos, CDs, Books on Tape, Large Print books and the Fiction and Non Fiction titles for all ages and interests. We will also have access to collections in Mareeba and elsewhere in Australia. Remember to bring along some proof of permanent residency when you come to join for the first time. Reservations can be made for any other titles that are on loan or in other libraries.

Title Review.

From the Reference Collection (to be used in the library) there is an outstanding title. "The Book of Art" series is an 8 volume encyclopaedia of painting, drawing and sculpture. With contributions from recognized authorities and prestigious institutions it explores art through primitive to modern society, across cultural and geographical boundaries. Beautiful illustrated in colour it provides not only informative analysis but also thought-provoking dialogue. Well worth a look during your next visit.

For loan from the non-fiction collection is "Riversleigh: A story of animals in Ancient Rainforest of Inland Australia". A beautifully illustrated, award winning book it unravels the mysteries of Australia's prehistoric fauna. Tales of marsupial lions and carnivorous kangaroos are intertwined with explanations of the unique techniques used to search for and reconstruct the fossilized remains. This is an impressive book and a fascinating read.

My Adult fiction choice for December is "Doctor Zhivago" the classic by Boris Pasternak. This ageless masterpiece is tailor made to wet season reading. Classic reading deserves classic music. The library CD collection boasts Handel, Mozart, Bach etc, however this month I am recommending Natalie Cole's modern classic "Unforgettable". For the under 18's mature reader there is "Heartease" by Lee Harding. A well written Australian novel and one with which many will relate.

The junior under 18 readers will be pleased to hear "The Chronicles of Narnia" series Book One "The Magician's Nephew" is this month's choice. For those Namia fans or for those young and old yet to discover Narnia this is the first of the series, "The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe" being the second. The very young and their readers will enjoy Pamela Mann's treatment of "The Frog Prince" illustrated with silk paintings, the story has an unusual twist to the original. "Read it! Read it!" and discover for yourself. For the Library Holiday activities see me for details. Thanks again those Kuranda folk who have welcomed me so warmly. I look forward to meeting many more of you over the festive season and into 1999. Happy reading and let me know if you have any interesting ideas for the library and it's collection.



The jungle covered ruins of Copan slowly being restored caused one to stare in awe, a civilisation had once been there, the genius, creativity, dreams of a people long gone. Questions are still asked as to what happened? Now another wipe out! Nicaragua and Honduras have been devastated. Again and again it was the severity of the landscape that left one wondering just as to how a nation could possible prosper. Admittedly 1986 saw the results of the destructiveness of war. Ghost towns, weary, poverty stricken people. We wanted to just keep moving on.

The first night in Nicaragua my husband, our two children and I perched our VW camper van over a mechanic's trench on the side of the main road. We had driven until it was dark, would stop just for the night and leave early - hoping to miss the mechanic. Directly in front of us was a deep gully with a puddle of stagnant water. On the far side shacks were precariously attached to the banks one above the other. One child came with a few friends to practise his English (American) and asked for a toothbrush.

I'm sure I saw that gully on TV the other night, there was a torrent of muddy water thundering along way above the road level and not a hut in sight!

These are people who know devastation. But even in bleakness one saw shafts of hope, the only postcard to buy in the capital Managua had brilliantly coloured flowers set against a backdrop of forbidding mountains, drawn by a child. A fantastic modern theatre had just been completed in Managua right by the lake with high walkways to enter it. From these walkways one looked out on the barren waste of what had been a city, flattened by bombs and earthquakes. Now they hoped to build something for pleasure - park lands. The sunrises were so pretty, creeping up over the rice paddy ponds. At each stop a staple diet of "Pescado (fish) - y - tortillas" was to be had, along with some fruit such as granadilla (giant passion fruit) and vegetables from road side stalls or the numerous markets. Even this subsistence existence would be non existent now with the land washed out and the diverted rivers depleted of fish. For us it was a relief to cross the border into modern, prosperous Costa Rica. What relief could the people of Nicaragua and Honduras possibly have now? ORGANIC GARDENING

It is wonderful weather for the birds and butterflies to enjoy my organic blossoms and fruit. The Jade Vine is now blossoming and the SARACH is having a rest till next Autumn-Winter. Vegetables appreciate some shade in the hot Nov. Dec. days. Mint and parsley are picked daily - but orthodox parsley does not thrive. The Japanese green "senposai" is doing well and survives the cabbage butterflies.

Lots of weed - free mulch is very useful - lots of citrus kept my stomach and me happy. Late Valencia oranges are still ripening. Black star apple are a juicy joy and easy to pick if you keep the trees trimmed back. Yellow passion fruit have started to ripen and so have pawpaws. Lots of jackfruit and bananas have fruited after the rain.

Take care that the Allamanda vine does not spread too much - it is lovely but beware. I love the delicate Gloriosa Superba vine - it dies down early autumn and the delicate orange plus flowers last well in water. It is growing up now and can be tied up or trimmed - it has no pests. If any reader wants Heliconia or Torch Ginger roots you are welcome to dig them from my garden. Phone 4093 7205 to arrange time etc.

Fangs Babies

The students named her Fang. No she's not a pitbull terrier - Fang is a large centipede. A colleague found her in his garden and brought her in to my lab, where we housed her in a tank alongside Chainsaw, a large, swift-running, rainforest centipede. Fang settled in quickly. She spent most of the day in burrows she constructed, but came out soon after dark to forage around her tank for the cockroaches, crickets and grasshoppers we gave her every week or so. Returning from a field trip, we found a student peering worriedly into Fang's tank. Our favourite centipede had eaten nothing for a week and was hanging by her rear legs from the water dish -not a good look for any species. However on closer inspection Fang looked fine and had forty or so fat, round eggs tucked under her belly. Over the next week or so Fang moved to the floor of the tank and dug herself a depression along side the water dish, where she lay wrapped around her egg mass. She stayed in her nursery for weeks still not eating, and moving only to groom and clean the eggs. Fang had been without male companionship for six months, but many female insects store sperm after mating, so there was still a chance the eggs would prove fertile. When they hatched the baby centipedes were pure white and totally helpless. Fang remained the devoted mother, only moving to threaten us when we photographed her and her mass of babies. Later, when the babies were becoming more independent and it was more than ten weeks since Fang's last meal, the students presented her with a small piece of mince. She zipped over and grabbed it, only to abandon it in the nursery where it was eaten by several of the babies. Mum and the kids remained in the nursery for a few more days until the cluster of babies broke up one night and then the tank bottom was filled with scurrying burrowing little centipedes. We tried to repeat

the feeding observations, but by now Fang had an appetite and ate all the crickets and cockroaches we gave her. Now that her appetite had returned, it was time to

remove the babies -just one nights' hungry hunting and she could easily have

recycled all the youngsters. The babies are now all in their own tanks as we

investigate the development of predatory behaviour in these cryptic, effective,

and very important predators. Maternal care occurs in many different kinds of

animals, but few mothers are more self-sacrificing and devoted than female



HYDROPONICS - GETTING STARTED

CONTAINERS: They are as extensive as your imagination, it also depends on how much money you want to spend. Plastic buckets, polystyrene containers, plastic pipes, 25L drums, flower pots, any container can be used as long as the surface is enert. There are also any number of automated systems which can be purchased from your hydroponics supplier. Metal containers can't be used unless they are painted with bitumen or similar so as the metal doesn't leach out.

A good container to <u>start</u> with is a polystyrene broccoli box obtainable from supermarkets erc. Usually they cost about \$2 or \$3 dollars.

The next item you will need is some media. A variety of materials can be used for example: Gravel, Scoria, Perlite, Vermiculite, Kitty Litter, Expanded Clay, coarse sand etc. The media's sole function is to support the plant and provide moisture. The box will need to have a couple of holes put in about 4cm from the bottom at one end for drainage. The box can then be filled with whatever media you decide on. A broccoli box will be large enough to grow six or eight lettuce, pak choy or similar. Seedlings can be purchased from your local nursery or you can grow your own which is the preferred way as you don't have to worry about bugs in the soil and there is less shock to the plant when transplanting. If seedlings are purchased from the nursery they will need to have the soil washed off. Then they can be planted into the media. The next step is the nutrient; the container is flooded until the nutrient comes out the drainage holes. This will need to be done at least once daily. The plant feeds by capillary action drawing the nutrient from the reservoir in the bottom of the box. The next article will be on nutrients and other containers that can be used.





FIFE : are you prepared?

Because our homes are familiar places we may not see fire hazards, but they are generally there. These may include fuel containers, rubbish in garages and underneath the house, pieces of timber, piles of leaves, oily rags and old paint tins. These items left around a house can be a recipe for disaster. If you live in a rural or rural-residential area observe some basic fire safety rules around homes:

- * Rubbish should be removed regularly.
- * Undergrowth, grass and weeds dshould be kept low.
- * Never allow timber or weed heaps to be stacked against the house
- * Fuel containers should be kept away from the house
- * Clear leaves and small branches from gutters regularly.

Brochures, posters, booklets and videos outlining a series of fire safety tips for these areas are available from fire wardens, rural fire district inspectors and from your local fire brigade. Captain Ray Wintour at the Kuranda Station said that if householders followed these simple steps and kept general fire safety in mind this would go a long way towards avoiding fire hazards. TABLELAND HOUSING INFORMATION SERVICE

The Tableland Housing Information Service (THIS - also known as the Housing Resource Service) is a free service which offers assistance to people with housing and tenancy problems. Set up in 1989 THIS has over 8 years experience in tenancy law and advocacy and has successfully assisted many of its clients in the Small Claims Tribunal.

THIS assists clients who are seeking: accommodation (both in the private rental market and through housing commission), Crisis Housing, ATSI housing, Bond Load and Rental Grant information and referrals to other housing organisations.

THIS also provides community education and outreach to other service providers, community and government organisations and institutions on the Tablelands. As of December 1st 1998 Amendments to the Residential Tenancies Act will come into effect. These changes will concern most people renting in Queensland and some of these relate to - eviction notices for rent arrears, excess water charges, condition of the rental premises, key deposits, just to name a few things. Artist Profile Ed Pratt - Woodworker

English born Ed Pratt has lived in far north Queensland for more than thirty years. Raised in the Blue Mountains Ed found himself in constant awe of the massive Mountain Ash, the worlds largest hardwood tree. It was here he developed a deep love for the Australian bush and his first taste of working with timber, felling and snigging ironbark logs. Having moved north Ed was inspired to work with timber after becoming friends with well known sculptor Noel Risley in the early 1970's. Every piece of timber used by Ed is seasoned for several years before being meticulously shaped and finished by hand into one-off pieces of furniture. Ed uses a chainsaw mill to cut slabs from felled timber. He mostly works from the raw log, because he likes the ethic of working from a tree to the finished product. Ed prefers to make functional items with our wonderful native timbers. He is a perfectionist, all joints are hand cut then shaped to become an integral part of the whole piece. Steel plugs are also used to ensure strength and are cleverly hidden under wooden plugs, without taking away from the flowing lines. Ed's design furniture is displayed in Kuranda Arts Co-op, Coondoo Street and Candlenut Gallery in Port Douglas. A popular piece on display is his "Rocker" made in various timbers, designed two years ago as heirloom furniture to be passed on to generations to come.







NEW ENTHUSIASM FOR POLITICS
