Can Someone Please Help Me Understand?

Do you remember the public outrage following the Four Corners program showing how cattle are treated in Indonesian slaughter houses? I joined those who cared and made my horror known to Julia Gillard and many other politicians. It's now five months later and I continue to follow the progress the government said it would make to improve (at least) the torture our animals endure at the end of a very harrowing journey overseas.

I have discovered so much in these past few months. Firstly, that many people don't care and sadly even if they do, they aren't interested in doing anything about it (and we all have busy lives). I have discovered that the government and most politicians are too scared or gutless to rock the boat of those making millions from this industry, and although they say "I am against animal cruelty" their actions do not support this statement. Shamefully where money is involved many people have no morals or ethics.

Many politicians are so arrogant to believe we who keep asking questions are a nuisance and should not be interfering in something that does not concern us. They have made their decision and that's the end of it! They forget that democracy means they act on OUR behalf.

Ask yourself...Is the transportation of millions of animals who feel pain and terror and end up in a destination that has no respect or concern for the welfare of these animals cruel?

Through my concern I have done much research. There are so many facts that we are not aware of. During this research I have discovered so much more about other industries. Did you know...?

700,000 baby calves are born to keep their mothers producing milk continually and they are sent for slaughter in the first week of their lives. The dairy industry is pushing to make it legal to not feed these poor babies for the last 30 hours of their lives.

300,000 mother pigs are kept inside, and continually pregnant producing pigs for ham and bacon. During some of their pregnancy they are kept in tiny metal stalls where they are unable to turn around, and there is much more to this story.

Chickens in the egg industry spend their life in a cage the size of an A4 piece of paper. There are 11 million of them. 12 million day old chicks per year, are gassed or ground up alive, they are the unwanted "waste product" of all egg production systems.

Animals (dogs, cats, rabbits and others) used for fur are often skinned alive. An estimated 2 million are killed each year in China alone.

I have come to conclude many people see animals, especially farm animals, as something similar to a bag of wheat. But an animal is an animal, so would you accept your puppy dog or pussy cat be treated this way? Well, why not? All animals feel the same pain and terror and they are unable to stop whatever we humans choose to do to them.

As we have grown more intelligent and knowlegable we have become less compassionate. What does that say about us as a species? Are humans so self consumed that they can't see the world beyond their own needs and opinions? I honestly don't understand.

Old Primary School Site

The decisions by Council in respect of the old Kuranda Primary School site have been made and the community knows what we will have left after their decision. Council has decided to sell Lots 1 and 2 of the site with the funds put to some unknown future community development. It has decided to declare Lot 5 for community retention and seek expressions of interest for community use of the upstairs of C Block. Their flyer distributed to Kuranda made much of "Endorse the following recommendations ..."

What the flyer did not say was their decisions not to endorse several key recommendations – and these are important. They have not decided to rezone the existing Lots 3 and 4 as community use but to use them at a later date. Why not zone it now? They declined their own staff recommendation that B block be retained and that more information was required for a solid decision process. They did not endorse the findings of the Community Consultation process, and their decision bears little relevance to the community opinions gained in that consultative process.

We also get \$80,000 for future use on the site. Is this for fit out for the Council's use; or for what? Who of us remember the half of a swimming pool that we had to buy for ourselves. Do you recall the Mareeba Leagues Club and how it was for the whole Shire and of course Kuranda had to pay our fair share? Have you found the Kuranda Shire Hall yet, or the Kuranda Showground, etc., etc?

A and B blocks will be gone in January, before any possibility of being overturned by the new Council elected in March. B block could have been a brilliant 'dirty floor' venue for community activities like pottery, painting, wood-working, dance, sculpture, etc. It is a million dollar building that probably needs \$200,000. That is not going to happen. Of the six rooms retained in C block, four will be used by Council. The outside community gets two.

When Steve Wettenhall and other local residents went out to bat and got us a one million dollar gift from the Queensland Government, we had 5 buildings, 26 plus rooms and 3½ acres of land. After the expenditure of over \$200,000 we have 11/2 (maybe 21/2) acres, one building and only two rooms for the wider community use. And this is supposed to be a good result for the Kuranda community.

I must have forgotten to take my happy pills – because I feel diminished, and so sad.

Beetle Greetings

Summer in Australia is signified by all sorts of occurrences in nature, but one which many people identify with is the appearance of Christmas beetles. These lovers of eucalypt leaves often emerge in early summer, coinciding with Christmas, and are frequently seen together in large numbers, decorating gum trees in their own unique way.

Christmas beetles belong to the scarab family of beetles. We have over thirty species of Christmas beetles living in Australia. Many are found along the east coast, and in some regions have become more abundant where land clearing has provided extra grasslands for them to reproduce in.

The life cycle of these beetles is the same basic cycle as most beetles. In this case, eggs are laid underground in grasslands adjacent to eucalypt trees or forests. The grubs (larvae) feed upon grass roots and their growth is dependant on soil temperature. Those in warmer climates may emerge a year later, whilst those in cooler regions may spend two years underground. The larvae are crescent-shaped with a pale, reddish-brown head and three pairs of legs, but can be quite difficult to distinguish from other beetle larvae.

After pupating, the adults time their emergence with warmer conditions and are also stimulated by rainfall. Different species will emerge at different times throughout the summer; perhaps to avoid direct competition. Other factors can influence the exact timing of their emergence, such as seasonal variations in weather patterns. Most Christmas beetles emerge from November to February, but as we know, many appear in late December.

Christmas beetles are good flyers and can cover distances of several kilometres. Many fly at dusk, but they are often attracted to lights after dark and can end up buzzing around the front porch.

Adult beetles are voracious leaf-feeders and often congregate in groups to feed and find mates in a wide variety of gum trees. Such is their tendency to cluster that hundreds can be found in a single tree, while an identical adjacent tree can be empty. While on occasions these beetles can cause damage to trees, most will usually recover. As is repeatedly the case, the increasing severity of the impact of the beetles on some trees is the result of human ecological disturbance – the depletion of forests and the increase in grasslands as Christmas beetle breeding sites.


THE NAME CHANGE

Formerly known as Tavern Fitzpatrick or the TOP PUB, the current owners of the hotel have decided to change the name of the hotel back to its original name, the "Barron Falls Hotel". This was the name used for the hotel back in early 1900's. It was felt that this name had more association to the local area and would be the first of many changes the hotel will undergo over the next eighteen months.



THE HISTORY

Newspaper reports give a little insight into the history of the hotel. The earliest one found was dated 1st April 1909 from the Cairns Morning Post which details a lawn tennis match to be played at Easter between teams representing Cairns, Mareeba and Atherton to be played on the Barron Falls Hotel courts at Kuranda. By 1911 the hotel became known as Hunter's Barron Falls Hotel (Cairns Post 8th June 1911) and was described as one the best appointed hotels in Queensland. There were splendid balconies, a roof garden, cool, and airy and comfortable bedrooms and a dining saloon of large dimensions. Tennis and croquet courts were attached and a well appointed



billardroom was a feature. There was a hairdressing saloon and the hotel was in all respects a high class health and pleasure resort in a very charming locality. At this time the hotel was owned and operated by Ernest C J Hunter, a local real estate agent, councillor, and politician. In 1918 after the death of his wife, Mr Hunter sold the hotel at auction and the licence was transferred to Mr Carl Karius.

The next important milestone for the hotel was in 1933 when on 13th February of that year the Cairns Post reported that the Barron Falls Hotel had been completely destroyed by fire. The fire was started when the husband of the licensee attempted to light the lighting system which

operated on benzene. The fire quickly spread throughout the building and within 35 minutes the entire two storey building was destroyed.

It would appear shortly after this, when the hotel was rebuilt, it became Fitzpatrick's Tavern.

THE FUTURE

Due to the rundown state of the current hotel premises the new owners of the property propose a complete renovation of the building. This will commence with the rebuilding of the beergarden to include a weatherproof roof. The beergarden will also be extended and will include a verandah that runs nearly halfway along the rear of the building. Following this, the rest of the hotel building will be upgraded to include a new walk in bottle shop, new male, female and disabled toilets, a new gaming room, a new kitchen, and updated facilities in the public bar.



The facade of the hotel fronting Coondoo Street will be remodelled and include a covering over the footpath. The new owners hope that these changes will be completed without closing the hotel, however, they want to apologise in advance for any inconvienence that may be caused by the building work. At the end of the renovations it is envisaged that Kuranda will have a modern up-to-date venue that can be enjoyed by all the residents.

The owners are also mindful that with the updated facilities there will be increased opportunities for employment. In fact, since taking over the running of the hotel, the number of employees has increased from 12 to 21. This doesn't include the musicians that play at the hotel on Friday nights and Sunday afternoons.

Gardening in Kuranda



December already and another year almost gone. A good time to take stock and think about new plants put in over the past year and what did well and what proved a failure. Time is running out to prepare the garden for the Wet with checking any trees that may prove hazardous in their coming down, dead palm fronds removed and mulching to prevent run-off and soil compaction. Check pond levels for overflow issues so that any introduced fish species are not carried off and enter waterways.

I was very impressed recently with the brilliant display of annual Phlox in the display bed at Green's Landscaping and Supplies. I was told that this was a third year self-sown display and certainly gives thought to trying plants often considered outside their normal growth range.

Presently trialling Mintia (Hesperozygis hybrid), a recent release by Colourwave With a tight compact and fully clothed to ground habit to 30cm, the plant may prove, in its form, a good substitute for miniature conifers that don't do well in our heat and humidity. Added advantages are a distinct mint fragrance to the foliage and a long flowering season. Be interesting to see whether the outlay is warranted.

Plant of the Month: Licuala mattenensis var 'Mapu', Mapu palm. Considered by many to be the gem of palms, this small (rarely to 2.5 metres) and extremely slow growing understorey palm hails from the rainforests of south-eastern Sarawak, Borneo. Its beauty lies in the gold mottling of its dark green divided circular leaves. The striking elegance of this solitary stemmed palm is absolutely compelling and makes it most desirable for a well chosen warm shaded and sheltered spot where its need for moisture but



good drainage may be met. This palm also makes an excellent potted subject which, considering the price for a well established specimen, may assuage fears of loss to forest critters. Definitely one for your "want list" with prices slowly falling as seed becomes more readily available.

There are many small understorey palm treasures in the Licuala family and a local resident featuring in the 2012 Australian Open Garden scheme is building up a most impressive collection. With its 30th anniversary year in 2012, the Open Garden scheme provides an excellent opportunity for local gardeners to see some wonderful gardens and pick the brains of dedicated and successful plant fanatics.

Personally, my favourite Licuala is L. orbicularis with entire heavily pleated circular leaves clothing its trunk to ground level, slow but strong growth and definitely making a statement in any understorey planting. Again, expect to pay for a well established specimen although seedlings are becoming more readily available. Equatorial Exotics is a good place to start with excellent illustrations of plants available and pricing: http://equatorialexotics.com/

While your suggestion of Moth Orchids (Phalaenopsis) is a possible and certainly graceful, you would probably get more bang for your bucks with the new Sun Impatiens, bred in Japan by the famous flower breeding company



Sakata Seed. These could be planted out in a sunny spot after the festivities and would be less fiddley to maintain than the orchids. With outstanding vigour from the New Guinea Impatiens and another wild species cross, these almost constantly in-flower sun loving Impatiens absolutely zing. The plants to 30cm +, an outstanding display in their entrance garden bed is featured by Anza Nursery, Mareeba. Well worth a visit!

The Healthy Kuranda-ite

Avoiding Bali Belly?

As I sit on the balcony of my private bungalow overlooking the rice paddies of Bali I feel confident within my surroundings. Armed with everything necessary to enjoy a risk-free holiday.

I am comforted by my olive leaf extract which protects me from major infections and other bacterials, viruses and parasites. I have been eating from the local street vendors and trust my olive leaf will effectively eliminate any bacteria in the food. I am also prepared with good bacteria (probiotics), which is the body's natural defense against such invaders. These defenses can be decreased by pharmaceutical drugs, alcohol or poor diet. I am yet to get sick and have confidence to try all the local cuisine. I still carry colloidal silver to wash around my mouth and hands, especially when in air conditioning (eg on planes), which can significantly increase my exposure to germs as the air gets circulated. Colloidal silver can also help skin, eye and ear infections.

Unfortunately, despite having adequate vitamin B1 levels, I am also prone to mosquito bites. I am not a fan of DEET having once melted the straps of my backpack with it. Whilst there is little malaria in Bali, there is dengue fever, like in Australia. Even having travelled in over 30 countries, many in areas with high risk, I always trust my homemade insect repellent. I have never taken anything for malaria and know it works well. The only drawback is you must apply it every 3 hours. The recipe is simple; mix 150ml of almond, coconut, or macadamia as a carrier oil. Add 15 drops citronella essential oil and 50ml neem seed oil. This is an ample insect repellant. I then include 15 drops of lavender because it stops itching. Then some lemongrass or your

This won't protect you from monkeys though. Whilst in the monkey forest in Ubud, a monkey took a liking to my straw hat. In the process of retrieval and escape, I scratched my arm on the metal fence. Being concerned of the high risk of infection, I quickly reached for my Manuka honey. This not only kills infection, but also accelerates the healing process.

With the change of diet I always carry slippery elm, just to be on the safe side. It assists with diarrhea which is not much fun when you have a Beno (bus) to catch. Also helps with constipation, reflux, and vomiting.

Tomorrow I am planning a morning 'walk' up a volcano and am anticipating sore muscles as I have not done much trekking for some time. Magnesium is the main mineral for relaxing muscles. Deficiency signs include muscle cramps, muscle twitches, tension headaches and sleeping problems. Magnesium comes in many forms eg tablets, powder but I will be carrying it in oil form for rapid absorption.

I worry about getting stranded or lost when travelling and being in need of clean water. An example of this is when I came off my bike in Thailand and needed to flush my wounds. Being offered local water to do so, I quickly added grapefruit seed extract to purify. This combined with Manuka honey saw me clear of a local hospital visit.

Because Bali is only a hop, skip and a jump away, it was not necessary to take melatonin for jet lag, but great for those long trips. I get sea sick and ginger or homeopathic nux vomica helps (for cars and planes too). To help quieten down the kids I suggest cammomila for calming. Rescue remedy or travel bush flower essence can also help, as well as calming the nerves associated with the anxieties of travel and the unknown (or for the separation anxiety I feel for my dog, having left her behind). Valerian can also help you sleep if faced with noisy hotels or uncomfortable beds, and won't leave you drowsy or at risk of not waking in an emergency.

If you have a trip planned these holidays, don't forget to be prepared so that you can get the most out of your holiday and enjoy a happy, healthy, risk-free adventure. - Kim Stedman

Book Review

"Ivory's Ghosts"

by John F Walker (Grove Press, New York, 2009) ISBN 9780 80214 4522 RRP \$14.95

For those readers who are concerned about the conservation of wildlife, in particular that of the elephant, or simply for those interested in the debate between the conservation of wildlife and preservation of wildlife diversity on the one hand, and the importance of trade and commerce on the other including in under-developed countries, in the quest to achieve a balanced outcome, the book for review this month offers considerable insight.

Walker has sought to trace the history of the elephant and its use by humanity right up to the time of writing, and in doing so has put the various points of view on this debate. There can be little doubt that within the contemporary global conservation controversy, the place of the elephant and its future as a wild animal has come to occupy an iconic status. The debate is ongoing.

As the book points out, the elephant has had an important role in human society for thousands of years. To early hunter-gatherers it had an importance, together with the mammoth until it became extinct, for meat, hides and its ivory.

Walker records early examples of ivory carving. But primitive hunting was hazardous and there was no threat to elephant numbers. Then with the growth of early human civilizations and ancient cities, the trade in elephant products expanded, particularly in ivory. This was often undertaken in association with the slave trade.

Ivory began its long history as a very valuable article of art and commerce. But the stocks of wild elephants were so great that no major detrimental impact was felt on numbers for a long time.

The real impact began to be felt with European expansion and colonization into Asia and Africa, coupled with the industrial revolution. Stocks of wild elephants began to fall as demand in the west increased.

The book records that this was exacerbated by the invention of tools that mechanized carving of ivory for such things as combs, billiard balls and piano keys. Ivory became affordable to the upper middle classes for the first time.

Poaching of elephants increased considerably as did the international trade in elephant products, particularly in ivory. New industries arose in Asia to deal in the trade

By the second half of the 20th century, the book records that wild populations of elephants had plummeted and there was real concern mounting as to their long-term survival. Poaching had become a serious problem even in areas where there were some controls. Other areas had no controls. The rise of the conservation movement worldwide saw a new focus on preserving elephants as a species.

The book deals with the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (CITES) and how the first ban on the trade in ivory came about in 1990. By that time more than one half of elephant stocks in Africa had disappeared. Although CITES has real teeth and most countries were and still are a party to it, CITES was not successful in curbing all trade in the product.

Poaching continued and policing was found to be a problem. The numbers of wild elephants has continued to decline overall. Notwithstanding this, attempts were made by some countries to continue limited legal trade in the product because of their particular circumstances.

Thus some years ago a few countries with larger stocks in the wild were given CITES permission to have a once only sale of their ivory stockpiles apparently legitimately built up from natural deaths in the wild and from culling.

The book only records the position in this respect up to the CITES international conference in 2007. But it is worth noting that at the 2010 conference in Doha, an attempt by several countries to have a further such sale of their stockpiles was rejected.

The debate continues between those who would advocate no killing of any elephants and a total worldwide ban on all trade in their products, and those who see scope for limited trade opportunities.

In this regard the book notes that some tribes have traditionally relied on elephants as part of their way of life, even up to recent times. There is also the question of what to do with ivory legitimately acquired, both from the wild and in the form of older artifacts acquired when the trade was legal. It notes the difficulty this causes in policing the CITES ban at national frontiers. Walker states:

"The heart of the issue remains how to reconcile worldwide concern for the magnificent, beloved elephant with the rights of nations to benefit from their natural resources."

The book makes an important contribution to this debate. And in the process it makes excellent reading.

2011 Mayor's Christmas Appeal now open

Inside My Studio

Shona Ballantyne's paintings really reflect her personality. They are bright, colourful and many are filled with Shona's infectious sense of humour. I photographed Shona with her exhibited work at the Claire Souter Studio/ Gallery in Kuranda where Shona whiles away much of her time producing these fine works. Her concentration on painting animals, in particular her 'camels with attitude' on canvas have become signatorius. However, it was Shona's lovely Asian-styled diptych of magnolias in this exhibition which were sporting the red spots.

Where is your current studio?

On my verandah at my house on the Barron River. I also do a lot of my painting at the Claire Souter Studio/Gallery in Rob Veivers Drive. But, my 'studio' can be anywhere, painting is so portable. I have a purpose-

built studio at home, but I prefer to be in the open and on the verandah.



Both, but mainly with others. I gain a lot from working with other artists and really enjoy it. Painters can work together, 'separately together' you might say, as we each get focused on our own work but our concentration meets up again together. I love the synergy created when working with a group.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Lots of light, natural light. I also need to, and enjoy, looking into my garden when I take a break, and I listen to the birds and frogs. They unify me. My verandah offers me all these essential features.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

I am not terribly disciplined in terms of organising my time but once I get going at home I am hard to stop. In fact, I hate stopping. However, there are set days and times when I paint at Claire's and I put a lot of emphasis on this discipline.



Describe the works you do in your studio. Mainly oil paintings now, or working with

mixed medium, ie acrylic and embellishing my canvases with beads, ribbons, threads and buttons.

Why is painting your chosen medium?

In the past I have done a lot of hand built clay sculptures and I studied Melanisian coil built bowls and sculpture. I love the Asian influences. Many of these sculptures are now in residence in my garden. My nickname is 'Bones' or 'Grannie Bones' to my grandchildren. Over recent years my bones have suffered, sculpture is heavy work, and for health reasons I now choose to paint. With the animal portraits I paint the eyes first and then get lost in the personalities of the creatures I am creating on the canvas.

List three things you listen to while working.

Birds, frogs and light classical music. I try to avoid listening to my husband's interruptions "where is the screwdriver?" or "can you help me lift the mower to change the blades". I find it an occupational hazard and most artists working at home experience it.

Your favourite tool?

Paintbrushes, of many variations. I bought some special fox fur brushes in Japan and I particularly like the textures they produce when painting fur or feathers.

How do you identify your work?

Some paintings with a calligraphy style, a distinctive character, or just with 'Shona'. My signature style varies according to the subject. Years ago I made a pottery stamp to use on clay pieces, with yin and yang. It now lives in a jar on a shelf.

How do you sell your work?

Like most artists, with great difficulty. I do have my paintings in a number of venues in Kuranda but I sell mainly through word of mouth or by commissions.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

I sell mainly where my paintings are exhibited. I do not teach but when I am painting with a group there is always an exchange of ideas, designs and techniques. Painters are learning all the time.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

No, I don't. Paid? I wish.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? Better lighting to enable me to work indoors at home. Rainy windy days can be a problem on the verandah but I do and can work around that problem.

If you were not working with visual art what would you be doing?

I think I would be singing. My singing is currently restricted to the shower but I would return to participating in structured groups. I would also be walking and I am looking forward to my next Himalayan walk. It will probably be my last after having walked in these Nepalese mountains on seven previous occasions.

The Three Sides of Judith Enoch

In the profile this month, readers are introduced to a truly remarkable indigenous Kuranda woman. I am talking of **Judith Enoch.** As soon as she walked into my shop, I felt a certain presence surrounding her, impressive yet humble, dynamic yet courteous and respectful, businesslike yet compassionate and caring. This is a balanced woman with three essential sides to her life - her faith, her family and her services to humanity centering on but not exclusive to the indigenous people of the north. These three are really interwoven in her life, although she proclaims that God always comes first and then her family.

Born in Kuranda from the distinguished Grogan family, she was the third youngest of nine children, all of which are still alive plus her Mum. She is married to Brian and has had two children Brianna and Brian Jr plus now two grandchildren. She treasured her parents and believes in strong families. Her schooling was in Kuranda and then in Cairns to year 12. She then attended JCU and obtained a Bachelor of Education. She started her masters but has never had time to finish it.

She began employment whilst in High School in short stints with Ngoonbi Cooperative in Kuranda. She was

also very active in various programs run in the Seventh Day Adventist Church in Kuranda, particularly in those programs and activities involving youth. But from here she has branched out into a wide range of activities that now consume most of her waking hours, all related to her three sides mentioned previously. She keeps up a phenomenal pace which is hard to break into.

Currently, she is chairperson of the Ngoonbi Board and is heavily involved in its various activities. She is a director of the Western Yalangi Board, an Aboriginal Corporation. She is a teacher at the Cairns Adventist School, teaching a composite class of years 5, 6 and 7. This takes two days a week. She is the Coordinator of an education program Parents & Community Engagement Program (PACE) for three days a week. She is the Church Clerk of the Seventh Day Adventist Church in Kuranda as well as other positions and has preached on occasions. She is involved in some health programs in the Church. She is a director of the Mona Mona Bulmba Aboriginal Corporation and is involved with plans to develop Mona Mona, now held under Aboriginal lease. She acts as a facilitator in the collaboration for Indigenous Outcomes in Mareeba through the Mulungu Aboriginal Corporation (CIOM) and chairs the meetings. Now that her daughter Brianna has opened

Din Din Arts in Kuranda and is doing well, Judith plans to help out with the youth program within the Church next year to further coordinate and develop its activities for youth.

She still finds quality time for her family and does not work on the Sabbath (Saturdays). She leads a largely vegetarian life but is not fanatic about it. She does get tired at times but is sustained by her faith.

Previously, apart from her youth work, Judith has been on the Kuranda Social Justice Committee and has been a leader in the Kuranda Pathfinder Club. She was engaged by the TRC to facilitate an Indigenous Community Plan for Kuranda and nearby towns, the work on which is ongoing. She was the only indigenous person on the Australian Committee of the Australian Union Conference of Seventh Day Adventist Churches for five years. She has also travelled widely, in 2000 as a Church delegate to a Toronto, Canada Conference, and in 2003 on a reformation tour of Europe. She has also been to Fiji, Cook Islands, New Caledonia, New Hebrides (Vanuatu) and New Zealand, as well as many places in Australia.

She has a particular interest in the work of Ngoonbi, providing housing to needy Aboriginal and TI people in the Kuranda area. They have some 33 houses and units at present, mostly for those who can least afford it. The organisation is largely self-supporting financially, as a result of which it falls far short of actual needs. And it now has to compete with the Cairns and Districts Regional Housing body, which is also active in Kuranda and does not necessarily favour locals. Judith points out that indigenous people need to connect with their own land. Ngoonbi is looking to develop more housing on its own land as well as to improve repairs and maintenance and to encourage indigenous apprenticeships in the process. It can't build on the old Kuranda farm as that has been vested in the Indigenous Land Corporation. And Mona Mona is not yet Aboriginal freehold. It also runs other programs in partnership with others such as an accredited HACC program for the elderly and community support services that provides meals and other support for those sleeping rough. It plans new accommodation such as quarters for singles, couples and the elderly. Judith is active in Kuranda planning for this reason.

On Anna Bligh's recent visit to Kuranda, the Premier was most impressed with the work of Ngoonbi and its leadership skills. Judith also notes the excellent support of local State parliamentary members as well as the TRC Mayor and its local representative.

Judith's vision for the future involves healthy, educated people, living without overcrowding. Longer term she has a vision of a healing centre and a school that delivers appropriate cultural, academic and industrial training in Mona Mona. She believes every person deserves respect, acceptance, opportunity and a fair go, irrespective of colour, race, religious background, etc. We are all children of the one God. She is working towards this and sets both high standards and challenging goals. She is living proof that words of faith without deeds are worth nothing.





Local Support for Human Rights Day

The official **United Nations Day for Human Rights** falls on **Saturday 10 December** this year.

It is a day commemorated around the world to celebrate the achievements in international human rights.

It is supported locally by the Baha'i community in Kuranda as part of their belief in minimum and universal standards of human rights for all people on the planet.

The Day is not without controversy. With so many contemporary and serious breaches on human rights in so many countries it is easy to be critical.

But this view overlooks the success of the international community in firstly, defining these minimum universal standards, and secondly, in establishing mechanisms to observe, monitor and publicise the implementation of these standards, good or bad.

This is a new situation in human history.

What is lacking is the mechanism to ensure that such standards are properly observed in all countries. The present international order, based on "sovereign" nation-states, is not yet strong enough to ensure this.

The result continues to be many gross abuses, restrained only to a limited extent by international public opinion and the rise of new international and regional institutions.

The Baha'is have a particular reason to support human rights. On 21 November 2011, the United Nations General Assembly, using some of its strongest language to date, roundly condemned Iran for its "serious ongoing and recurring human rights violations."

The Reports of the Special Rapporteur to the UN that lead to this resolution noted continuing violations and discrimination against ethnic and religious minorities, in particular the problems facing Arabs, Azeris, Baluchis and Kurds, as well as discrimination against Baha'is, Christians, Jews, Sufis, Sunni Muslims and Zoroastrians.

"Escalating attacks on Baha'is and their defenders," are reported, "including

in State sponsored media, a significant increase in the number of Baha'is arrested and detained, including the targeted attack on the Baha'i educational institutions, the reinstatement of twenty-year sentences against seven Baha'i leaders following deeply flawed legal proceedings, and renewed measures to deny Baha'is employment in the public and private sectors."

And yet the Baha'i Faith, which was founded in Persia (Iran) in the 19th century, is a peaceful world religion that teaches obedience to the laws of the land and respect for governments and for all the great religions.

There are many Iranian Baha'is, refugees in Australia, who must risk their lives if they wish to return to Iran because of these continuing human rights abuses.



SUMMER SWIM SCHOOL HOLIDAY INTENSIVES: Four or five day Learn To Swim programs will run for three separate weeks of the Summer School Holiday period. Come along Monday, Tuesday and the rest of the week, at the same time slot each day and the youngsters pick up a lot of Swimming and Water Safety Skills.

The intensives will run as one week, (12-16 December) before Christmas and two weeks after New Year, (9-13 January and 16-20 January). To book, ring us on 4093 7109. Payments for these programs are by block of 5, 10 or 15 days offered through the Summer School break. These programs are predominantly aimed at 4 to 7 or 8 year olds who have limited experience in the water. However, they can work for any age group.

Intensive classes will start at 10.15pm sharp each morning of the weeks they are conducted and will be finished by 11.00am.

As well, for our babies and toddlers, a 6 or 7 week break can be a long time, so weekly classes can continue for our regular littlest clients over the school break, if parents so desire. With water temperature conditions at their best at New Year it is a very logical time to get the younger ones started. Depending on numbers we will host babies at 9.00am any Tuesday, Thursday or Friday and Toddlers Classes at 9.30am and again check details before booking.

Finally, not forgetting our students in Stroke Development classes, the opportunity to maintain recently taught technical skills will happen each day as well after the intensive classes. To book these, for middle of the day sessions, simply book the estimated number of sessions for the week so our teachers have estimates of numbers for the groups. In these classes there is no obligation to come each day but are a great way to keep up the skills and fitness for swimming. No formal swimming instruction will happen after lunch this Summer break.

Also we are now taking bookings for Term 1 classes next year. This will be a 9-week block commencing 30 January through to 31 March.

Extra shelter is being created near to our shade sails over the Toddler Pool. Through Queensland Health Department funding the Council has been able to erect a 6 metre x 6 metre covered shelter with seating benches for spectators and patrons to be covered while enjoying recreation time at the pool. Once the facility is finished it will be the logical place to put a permanent barbeque setup for families to host family and friends' functions. Steadily, a few plans for the patrons are coming together.

Have a happy Christmas, please be safe throughout the Festive Season and remember when you are in or near water make sure there is a designated person supervising non-swimmers and able swimmers.



A Thought for Christmas

What does the word 'wonder' mean to you? There is a Christmas hymn that speaks of 'A great and mighty wonder'; we speak of the 'wonder' of Christmastide, and how 'wonderful' it is to see the faces of the children light up, when the tree lights come on and the presents are revealed. Delight, surprise, something beyond what we expected! But there is another aspect, that of 'uncertainty', or question, even 'doubt'. We wonder what is going to happen to us; we wonder whether we have passed our exam, or if we are to be made redundant or have we got our pay rise. Both senses of 'wonder' fit into the Christmas scene.

Imagine what the parents of Jesus went through. There were the angelic messages – dreams, perhaps we would say, but dreams with very important results on the lives of Mary and Joseph. There was that long journey to Bethlehem, hard for a pregnant mother; the birth itself in far from ideal conditions – a stable, smelly, but what a delight after all! Then the visitors – shepherds, hotfoot and panting, with their stories of angels, visions, messages. All who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them.

Yes, they were astonished, and no one questioned the shepherds' account of what had happened. But also the wondering is in the other sense - what is going to happen next? What is the future for this child? What is the future for themselves? What is the future for us? So, at Christmas we rejoice with the carols, all the decorations and the trees, the presents and the gathering of the family, the joyful church services and the happy faces of

Yet we must also be aware of questions for the future. Think of what is going on. Already the Wise Men are journeying to Jerusalem, led by their star; soon they will be at Herod's court, and having heard them, the cruel and frightened king will be planning the massacre that he believes will make sure there is no threat to his throne and his power. It was soon indeed after the joy of Christmas, the coming of the Child, that there was to come the brutality and sorrow of a callous act that would leave so many mothers desolate, so many families bereft. The first Christmas was to be, for many, the last Christmas.

In our own time we look ahead at uncertainties. The constant violence and brutality, the killings and unrest in Somalia and the Syria, the terrible violence in Africa between rival tribes, and the murder of innocent people in Libya. All this adds up to an outlook, in so many places, which no one can say is settled or certain. Yet there is one great certainty - it was into just the same kind of world as our own, full of crises and problems, anger and violence, that the Lord chose to be born. In full knowledge he took the step of coming to our uncertain planet, our all-too-easily-upset little earth, our tiny lifeboat floating in the vastness of inter-stellar space. It was certainly not into any kind of certain future that Jesus was born, nor that he grew up in, nor in which he began his mighty work of reconciliation.

Out of sorrow comes joy: the sense of wonder at the crib contains in itself the shadow of sorrows to come. Yet out of those sorrows comes the final joy. In the Birth we see foreshadowed the Death; yet also foreshadowed is the Triumph, the New and Risen Life, the Saviour. "Behold I bring you Good News of a great joy; to you is born today the Saviour, who is Christ the Lord!" And so our wonder is swept up into joy, and with the angels we say, 'Glory

Wet Season Greens

The cold nights of last Winter meant a very good cropping garden for me. As usual, at this time of year with the weather heating up, the lettuce and broccolini have "bolted" and gone to seed. The Blue Lake and Purple King beans are still hanging in there giving hope they may last until Christmas.

There is a simple and easy way you can enjoy fresh greens right through the Wet season. To start yourself off, you need two (2) seed trays, a bag of Coles sunflower bird seed and a bag of organic potting mix.

Soak three (3) teacups of seed in a bowl of water for approximately 24 hours. Change the water two or three times, not allowing the water to become smelly.

Fill one of the seed tray with soils and water well. Spread the soaked seeds thickly on top of the soil. A plastic spray bottle is ideal for keeping the seeds moist until they grow into sturdy thick seedlings. Semi-shade is ideal for your planting.

At 2.5 – 3cms, you can harvest with a scissors to be eaten fresh with salads, juiced or steamed with other vegetables.

Half way through the tray, start another tray off to keep up a regular supply.

An old plant pot is good to empty your used soil into and after a few weeks can be recycled.

For those of you (like me) who have to battle brush turkeys, scrub hens, bandicoots, rats, mice etc., an old bird cage placed over the trays keeps then safe and easy to water. Once you set up your gear, it can be used for years.

(Thanks to Mary Von Keyserlingk – Mary is renowned for her small area but highly productive vegetable garden. If you ever have some heirloom vegetable seeds, Mary is someone to trial a few for the challenges of the Kuranda climate.)

Don't be scared - be prepared

With the approaching wet and cyclone season

we need to prepare ourselves, family, pets and home. I am finding the public are getting quite blasé, quite often I hear people say, "It will never hit Kuranda".

The fact is that there has previously been a cyclone come up through the gorge and cause significant destruction in the township of Kuranda. If we are unfortunate enough to have a repeat of history, the outcome would be far worse this time, due to the ever increasing housing developments and infrastructure around our district. On top of this, the wonderful rainforest we love can at times be quiet dangerous in severe winds and storms.

When cyclone "Yasi" hit Mission Beach area, Kuranda SES had to use cranes to remove two large trees from houses. There were also twenty driveways where fallen trees were preventing the owner's access to their homes. Imagine if you had a medical emergency and this happened to you, preventing you from being able to get help!

Kuranda also has to prepare for flooding, the Kennedy Highway Range Road gets cut off with mud slides all too often and the creeks on the Mareeba road have been known to flood to such an extent that vehicle access is restricted.

My question to you as a local resident is: Are you prepared for this?

Remember, if you can't get out of the town, then the trucks possibly can't get into the town. Foodworks is very prepared and have stocks available but leaving it until the last minute may mean that stocks are depleted quickly and unable to be replenished within the time frame needed. Also, remember to buy your fuel for your cars and generators early so you don't miss out if Kuranda can't get a delivery of fuel.

Take the time now to prepare for emergencies:

- Prepare your Household Emergency Plan
- Prepare your Home
- Prepare your Pets Emergency Plan and Kit
- Prepare your Household for Evacuation and your Evacuation Kit and locate your nearest local evacuation centre
- Remember to tune into Warnings via battery operated radio.

Tips for preparing your home

- Make sure your insurances are up-to-date before a cyclone is named as most insurance companies will not provide insurance once this occurs
- Trim trees and branches close to your house and out buildings
- Secure loose items in your backyard or property, by either storing away under shelter or tying down
- Clear gutters, downpipes and drains, check your roof for damage or corrosion and repair before wet season
- Make sure all shades, sails and awnings are properly fitted and secured
- Learn how to safely turn off your power, water and gas
- Test your generator, stale fuel can cause them to not start, test run for approx. 15-30mins. Make sure you have enough fuel to run the generator for one week
- Organize an evacuation Plan with the kids and practice regularly so they understand and know what to do in an Emergency
- Organize the best room/closet for bunking down and prepare this room, make sure the children all know what this area will be for. This room should be in the strongest part of the house usually in the middle of your house away from windows and glass doors
- Buy extra masking tape and rope before wet season starts
- Prepare or check the contents of your Emergency kit to ensure items are in working order and have not expired. Ensure everyone in the house is aware of the location of your Emergency Kit. Store your Emergency Kit in a safe, dry accessible place.

Everyone has been informed on what to pack in their emergency kits, so I will not go into that, but an **Evacuation Kit should hold a few extra things:**

- Prepaid phone cards and coins for phone calls
- Games, playing cards etc
- Warm jumper, waterproof jacket, hat and gloves for everyone
- Closed-toed shoes or boots for everyone
- Whistle, utility knife, duct/masking tape

- Plastic garbage bags, ties
- Safety glasses and sun glasses
- Special Items for Infants (nappies, formula etc)
- Special items needed by elderly or people with special needs
- Spare house and car keys
- Pet food, water and other animal needs
- First Aid Kit and manual
- Essential medications, prescriptions and dosage
- Important documents keep original or certified copies of the following documents in your Emergency Kit. Scan copies of these documents and save on a USB memory stick or CD to include in your kit. Keep all these items in sealed plastic bags
- Insurance papers for your house and contents, cars, and for valuable items
- Inventory of valuable household goods
- Wills and life insurance documents
- House deeds/mortgage documents
- Birth and marriage certificates
- Passports/visa details
- Stocks and bonds
- Medicare, pension cards, immunisation records
- Bank account and credit card details
- A back-up copy of important computer files, photographs
- Emergency contact phone numbers
- A children's wallet card to put into your child bags including: Mum and Dad's phone number; neighbours or another relative that doesn't live with you; any medication your child may need or if they

have allergies; an arranged place to meet in the event you get separated; emergency numbers - 000 (112 from mobile).

Good idea to get the kids involved with making these and also a bracelet or locket that they can wear, with this information included in case of an evacuation.

Pet Emergency Kit

Ensure your Pet Emergency Kit is easily accessible and includes:

- Pet medications (for up to two weeks), medical and vaccination records and veterinarian details
- Sufficient food (including treats) and water (e.g. bottled) for each animal for up to a two week period don't forget the can opener for tinned food.
- A familiar pet blanket or bedding, toys, grooming equipment
- A secure pet carrier, leash or harness to move any animals to safety
- Consider your animal's sanitation needs, which is important for their (and your) health; e.g. newspaper, paper towels disinfectant, rubbish bags
- Birds must eat daily put special food and water dispensers in bird cages and have a cover for the cage
- Important telephone numbers; e.g. your veterinarian, pet information and advisory services
- Details of identification methods
- A current photograph for identification purposes.

Be Pet Prepared

If considering moving animals to a safer place, do so early to avoid unnecessary risk. It may not be possible to take your pet with you to a temporary evacuation shelter – plan ahead and be prepared.

- Secure animals inside before an emergency event, so that they do not take flight or run away.
- Use a secure pet carrier/cage, leash or harness to move any animals to safety.
- Ensure all vaccinations remain current.
- It may be possible for your pet to be boarded in a safe environment away from the emergency zone.
- If you are able to house your animal in a temporary foster home, ensure your pet's medical and feeding information, food, medicine and other supplies accompany them to the foster home.
- Ensure all pets are properly identified. Remember

 during times of disaster, telephones may not be
 available and it is important any registered method
 includes your current address.

In most cases, trained assistance dogs will be allowed to stay in emergency shelters with their owners. Those that are accepted may require proper identification and proof of vaccination. Check with local council for more information.

Emergency alert: "Be warned, be informed"

It is now time to get prepared for Cyclone Season. Are your details up to date on the National Emergency Alert Register?

Australia's national telephone based warning system – Emergency Alert – sends messages to mobile phones and landlines within an affected geographical area, to let people know about a disaster or local emergency.

Warnings are sent using customer street address information as supplied to ensure you receive messages, it is vital that your service provider has your correct physical address. If you have moved recently, contact your service provider to register your new details.

Emergency Alert is a telephone warning system that authorities can use to provide warnings to communities. Emergency Alert can be used to send voice alerts via landline telephones based on the location of the handset, and text alerts to mobile phones based on the billing address. It is for use in a range of emergency situations, including extreme weather events and bushfires. You are not charged and will not have to pay for the alert. Importantly, you cannot opt out of receiving emergency alerts. If you receive an Emergency Alert, you need to listen carefully to the advice provided and act immediately. Voice messages will be repeated if you hold the line. You may be directed to finalise preparations, secure items around your home, shelter in place or commence evacuation to your predetermined safer location Act immediately on the advice provided

- Ensure all householders are aware of the warning and advice provided.
- Check on neighbours and friends who may need special assistance
- Activate your Household Emergency Plan
- Locate and collect your Emergency Kit
- Activate your evacuation arrangements if required.

If you are visiting or holidaying in Queensland from out of State, and do not have family or friends to shelter with, contact your accommodation manager to identify options for evacuation. For further information go to: www.disaster.qld.gov.au/ea/emergencyalert. asp

Helpful hints:

- 1. Windows/Glass Doors: the weakest link in protecting your house. If you tape the window all you are doing is holding the window together if it gets broken. The most effective way is to use a chess board pattern of tape across the windows. You do not stop the window from breaking, just holds it together. The best option for this is window tint as it holds the window in one piece. However, for the best protection consider installing a secure cover over the window to stop it from breaking. Plywood or boards across the windows will help considerably.
- 2. If your louvres get broken you can short time fix these by cutting a piece of heavy cardboard or thin timber the same size as the louver and place in the area concerned.
- 3. Roller doors: the best way to secure these are to place a board across the width of the door and screw through the roller door and using a large washer and a wing nut, secure the board into place. Depending on how large your door is you can place three boards on one at head height, one at waist level and the other lower near knee level.
- 4. Remember if you need sandbags ring the SES (132 500) early and they can bring some around or supply you with some if they are busy with other more pressing matters.
- 5. After the event if you can throw a tarp up yourself safely, call 132 500 or drop into Kuranda SES in Fallon Road and pick up a tarp. Please remember though to make sure power is off at the mains before climbing on your roof, because with Solar panels now, your roof could be live.
- 6. You can ask the council or energy company to check trees on your street that may pose a threat to your property or power lines.

- 7. Even if you've cleared your gutters recently, they can soon fill up with leaves and other debris, especially after a downpour. On average you should check they're clear every couple of weeks.
- 8. If you don't already know your neighbours, go and introduce yourself. They might need a hand getting storm ready. Plus, when bad weather strikes it's important to be able to tell the SES who lives nearby.
- 9. Make sure everyone in your household knows what to do in severe weather.
- 10. Remember to take your precious photos that can't be

Financials

Emergencies can cause obvious financial burden if you have to replace lost property. There might be financial assistance available from governments and other agencies after an emergency; however, this assistance is usually minor and targeted at immediate needs. It won't be enough to rebuild your home or replace valuables, so you will need to plan to cover financial losses caused by an emergency.

On a day-to-day basis, it makes good sense to have a personal or household financial plan. Centrelink also provides Financial Information Seminars, and can be contacted on 13 63 57 for further information. Make sure your household insurance policy covers you for all hazards you have identified. In some cases, insurance policies do not cover flooding or acts of terrorism. The Insurance Council of Australia has guides to help you choose household insurance. Seek the advice of a financial planner on how to best protect yourself. Think about life insurance to protect your family. If you receive benefits from Centrelink, talk to them about how they can assist if an emergency occurs. Record all insurance details in your financial plan.

Before the storm or cyclone

- Remove loose objects that might get broken or cause damage if blown around
- Tie down (or fill with water) large, relatively light things like wheelie bins and boats
- Chain down your industrial bins or larger objects
- Shelter and secure your pets
- Shelter vehicles or cover them; do not park them under a tree; make sure you have a full tank of fuel in case you need, and are able to, evacuate
- If floods are likely, move outdoor equipment, cardboard boxes, garbage, chemicals and poisons to somewhere up high
- Fill your sinks and bath and buckets with fresh drinking water. (Don't rely on your tank – it may not be there afterwards)
- Identify indoor items you'll need to raise or empty if flood threatens
- · Tape up your windows with diagonal stripping, if available put mattresses against large windows or
- · Check your emergency kit is easily accessible.

During the storm or cyclone

- Stay safe when the storm or cyclone hits; it is no time for a drunken cyclone party

- electrical appliances it's dangerous if there's lightning
- Don't shelter under a tree if you're outside, find solid shelter
- Don't lie down if you're caught outside without shelter, crouch down low with your feet together. (You want as little of your body touching the ground as possible to reduce the risk of being struck by lightning).

Do not use portable generators in enclosed spaces. They produce carbon monoxide - a colourless and odourless gas that can cause incapacitation or death.

After the storm or cyclone

- 1. Check your home for damage to windows, walls or roof
- 2. Beware of fallen power lines, damaged trees and flooded creeks
- 3. If returning to your home, make sure electricity and gas is off before going inside. Use only a torch until you're sure there's no gas around
- 4. For emergency assistance call your local State Emergency Service on 132 500
- 5. Check your neighbours are OK 6. Look out for spiders and snakes that may have moved in to escape the flood
- 7. Don't eat food that's been in contact with floodwater and boil water until supplies have been declared safe
- 8. If you must enter flood waters, wear solid shoes, not thongs or bare feet, and check the depth and current with a stick
- 9. Have gas appliances inspected and cleaned to prevent an explosion or fire
- 10. Check your smoke detectors are still working
- 11. Don't use electrical items that got wet; have them professionally tested
- 12. Remove what excess water you can and mop sodden
- 13. Stay away from drains, culverts and water that's more than knee-deep
- 14. Don't drive until you know it's safe
- 15. Don't let children play in or near floodwaters
- 16. Always follow flood warning signs
- 17. Keep safe while driving Never drive through flood water.



Off the Map

Based on the play by Joan Ackermann (and adapted by Ackermann for the screen), Off the Map recalls one summer in the life of an offbeat family living off the land in rural New Mexico. It's essentially a series of dialogue-driven scenarios that actors like Joan Allen and Sam Elliott can sink their teeth into; Scott guides them there while avoiding any unnecessary scene-chewing or melodrama that could come with the subject matter. That's an accomplishment in itself - but the visual dreaminess and charm that Scott weaves into, and wraps around, his performances elevate the film into a poignant and thoughtful work of art.

Off the Map exists in the mind of Bo Groden (Valentina de Angelis), a bold, inquisitive 12-year-old girl, the only child of Arlene (Allen), an earthy no-nonsense family stronghold, and Charley (Elliott), a secretive, silent man suffering from unbearable depression. Bo tells of the one summer (presumably in the late 1960s) that served as the best – and maybe also the worst – of her life, during months of Dad's unstoppable crying and an audit from the IRS.

House of Bamboo

An American military policeman infiltrates a Japanese-based crime organisation which is responsible for the robbery of a munitions train outside Tokyo. The policeman assumes the identity of a gangster while the gang is a para-military organisation recruiting only ex-GIs. Fuller's intention was to show that the only difference between the police and the gangsters is a tin badge. There are also overtones of the ugly American in Asia.

The actress Shirley Yamaguchi is Japanese, born in China and is a singer, actor and diplomat.



Wishing you all a very Happy Christmas: It's that time of year again. I hope that you enjoy a happy, safe and relaxing Christmas. Thank you to the Kuranda community for your support throughout 2011 and Best Wishes for the New Year.

Kuranda Community Precinct: The latest newsletter was distributed to mailboxes last week. The newsletter shows details on the next steps for the Kuranda Community Precinct as well as the complete Council Resolution.

- Retain the site as a community facility (shared use/ multi use)
- Relocate Library and Council Office to Building C
- Remove buildings A and B (Tenders will be called soon)
- Offer old Pre-School site and one small block for sale in order to fund development of the community facility
- Make part of Building C available for community use without compromising current facilities in Kuranda (Expressions of Interest for community groups to use the facility will be advertised after Christmas).

I am pleased that we now have a plan for the future of the facility and the site. As I have always said, this is a complex and costly project and it will take some time until the site is able to be used to the full potential. However, the Kuranda community will soon be able to benefit with some additional community facilities.

Mayor's Christmas Appeal: The annual Christmas Appeal is still open. The appeal supports Kuranda families in need of a little extra help at Christmas. Any families or individuals can apply at the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre or through the Anglican Church Kuranda. Anyone who wishes to make a cash donation can do so at Council offices or at the Kuranda Library.

Australia Day Awards: Nominations for awards in a number of categories are now open. Full details are on the Council website and in this paper. I would like to encourage Kuranda residents to submit some nominations as there are many deserving people in our community.

TRC Planning Scheme: The draft Planning Scheme is almost complete and now ready to be sent to the state government for state interest checks. Public consultation will occur in the first part of 2012. Contact at Council is Paul Want Ph 1300 362 242.

New Aged Housing Units: Building on the units in Harriman St and Thoree St will commence during the next 12 months. Allocation of places in these units is made by Council in conjunction with Qld Housing. Contact at Council is Bob Graham Ph 1300 362 242.

Local Laws: The period for public comment/ feedback on the new Draft Local Laws has now closed. These Local Laws cover a whole range of matters, including matters such as animal management, goods on footpaths and environmental management. Every Council in Qld. is required by the state to update their Local Laws and all current Local Laws will expire on Dec 31st 2011. Contact at Council is Julie Buckley. Ph 1300 362 242.

Works at Barang Street: Works on repairs to Barang Street are progressing well. A local company, HEH, is undertaking the works at a total cost of approx. \$523,730.40 (funded by the Queensland Reconstruction Authority). The amount of earthworks and drainage is significant and the project is hoped to be completed by early January.

Pedestrian, Traffic and Parking Study: The first phase of the study has been completed. Senior Traffic Engineer, Andrew Eke, has a full report in this edition of the Kuranda Paper. Council recently received a briefing on the issues identified and the final report

will be made to Council in early 2012. Most importantly, the study is focussed on the needs of both local residents and tourism operations. I must also add that despite "rumours", no proposals for any changes have yet been decided. There is more consultation yet to occur and Council has not made any decisions about the study. Thanks to all residents and business operators who have provided comments to the consultants. Please take a look at the updates/ maps displayed at the Library and other sites around the village. The study covers all issues related to parking and traffic and pedestrian movement within the Kuranda Village. The study and any resulting works will be subject to Council decision and will be funded from developer contributions (not from general rates).

Budget Review: Council will be doing a 3 month Budget Review this month. Some of the projects for consideration include further works at the Kuranda Community Precinct, toilets at Ros Common Speewah and additional seating in Centenary Park. At the time of writing full details of the outcome are not available.

Congratulations: Well done to the *Kuranda coots* who recently celebrated their first birthday with a stunning series of performances of "*The Beast*". It is great to see these talented Kuranda performers doing so well.

Council Meetings: Council Meetings in November will be held on Wednesday November 2nd in Mareeba and Wednesday November 16th in Atherton. Anyone is welcome to attend meetings. Housing Boost to meet the needs of Kuranda residents: On October 31, I met with community members in Kuranda to discuss housing needs and announced a further \$11.8 million for new homes in the Kuranda area.

The breakdown of the funding is:

- \$5 million to construct up to 10 dwellings at Mantaka. Seven sites have been identified at Mantaka for the dwellings and construction is expected to start after the wet season. When completed, these new dwellings at Mantaka will house approximately 25 people.
- \$6.8 million to provide up to 17 additional homes to help families find suitable accommodation in the Kuranda area.

The funding follows my announcement (mentioned in my November column), of \$7 million dollars for the construction of 16 new homes on land owned by Ngoonbi and the renovation of 24 existing Ngoonbi dwellings in Kuranda. In total, this historic housing investment will provide up to 43 new homes in Kuranda.

The Department of Communities will continue to work closely with the community on the detail of these

important projects.

New Community Sports Fields Opened: On November 10, I officially opened the new community sports field located at Kuranda District State College. The state government contributed \$260,000 towards installing a bore, irrigation system, topsoil and turf. Sports such as rugby league, cricket, and soccer can now enjoy the fields and I expect many more sports and activities will take place there. A lot of hard work has gone into developing these sports fields and thanks must go to the College P&C for their contribution of \$20,000. If you or your club or organisation would like to use the fields, please contact the school or Tableland Regional Council.

Old Kuranda Primary School: I am very disappointed to learn that the Tablelands Regional Council is pressing ahead with its decision to carve up and sell off part of the old primary school site. This is against the wishes of the majority of the Kuranda community. The site was made available to the former Mareeba Shire on the basis that it would be kept and developed for community purposes. To do otherwise is

a breach of faith with the state and the community. I would like to see no action taken on Council's decision until after the Council elections in March 2012 to give the people of Kuranda an opportunity to have their say on this decision.

SMS Service: As the wet season approaches, take care on the roads and consider registering for the free Kuranda Range SMS service on 4050 5425. Work will continue next year on further safety upgrades on the Kuranda Range Road.



As this will be my final column for 2011, I would like to thank everyone in the community who has worked with me this year and I wish all the residents of the Kuranda, Koah and Speewah district a very merry Christmas and happy new year. I look forward to seeing you again early in 2012.

Finally, a big thank you to the team at the Kuranda Paper who do such a great job keeping the community informed and entertained by locals on local issues.

KURANDA PEDESTRIAN, TRAFFIC AND PARKING STUDY

STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT STAGE

Thank you to all that have contributed to the study to date. We have completed our assessment of the 'Existing Situation' and now entering into developing potential strategies to cater for identified transport shortcomings around the village. This process will involve increased consultation with the public to gather input and reactions to potential improvements to the traffic, pedestrians and parking configurations around Kuranda.

STUDY PHASES
