



Community Mourns Loss

**Final Tribute** 

Tribute by Lesley Clark MLA Member for Barron River - 'Hansard' extract of speech to the Queensland Parliament.' 15 September 1999



The late Esme Hudson, who was presented with the 1999 Queensland Premier's Award being congratulated by L. Lesley Clark (MLA) & R. Premier Peter Beattle.

The Aboriginal community of the Cairns region is mourning the loss of three much-loved and respected people, all gone within the space of just seven days.

Tiger O'Shane was the first, followed by Esme Hudson but then as relatives were preparing to bury dear Aunty Es, her brother-in-law, Lionel Levers, suddenly died, dealing a double blow to the Kuranda Aboriginal community.

Attending the funerals and sharing the grief of their children, amongst them friends I have known for many years, it made me appreciate even more the strength and courage that Aboriginal people demonstrate in the face of adversity and the close family ties that support them through difficult times. I would like to pay my respects to these three special people, and extend my deepest sympathies to their extended families. In particular, to Sonny, Sandra and Dawn who lost both their father Lionel and their Aunty Esme and to Rose who lost her dearest sister and former husband Lionel.

Both Lionel Levers and Esme Hudson were born in the 1920s on the Mona Mona Mission outside Kuranda. While both had fond childhood memories of the mission, they applied for exemption certificates leaving to accept the challenge of making their way in the outside world. They moved with their families to Kuranda, working hard at whatever jobs were available, raising their families but also dealing with racism and discrimination.

In documenting Esme's achievements I would like to acknowledge the assistance of her niece, Sandra Tanna. Continued on page 2.

Recognising that equity was not a reality for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, Esme became involved in social justice issues and developed her personal motto "There is no such thing as can't". Aunty Es ( as she is affectionately known by many people) and others were instrumental in forming very important Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations in the Cairns area. Organisations that she was involved in at their formation included Woompera-Muralug Housing Society, the Wuchopperen Medical Service, Boopa-Werem Kindergarten, Njiku Jowan Aboriginal Legal Service and the original Mona Mona Co-operative.

But Esme Hudson's most important contribution to her community came as a co-cook, co-carer of Mookai Rosie-Bi-Bayan and with Bonnie Simpson lived on site meeting the needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women who would come to stay at the house to await the arrival of their child or to visit a specialist at the Cairns Base Hospital. Funds were scarce and Esme and Bonnie would sacrifice their Aged Pensions to ensure nutritious food was on the table, fuel was in her own vehicle to take any client or patient to the hospital, and that there was always plenty of love and laughter on the premises. She has also been the greatest influence in her sons' career and performer and entertainer. David Hudson was a co-founder of Tjapukai Dance Theatre and his mother was often seen delivering brochures and pamphlets for the company. When David was little his mother could be seen doubling him on her bicycle taking him to drum, singing or dancing practice. Her dedication has paid off because now David has gone on to bigger and better things, performing in many of the world's most famous venues.

I first met Esme when we worked together at the Cairns TAFE College in 1982 where I also came to know her son David who was studying there. I was very privileged to be present in Brisbane last month when Esme's work for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people was recognised and she received the 1999 Premier's Award for Queensland service from Peter Beattie and Anna Blight. (Our photo with Premier Beattie is one that I will treasure.) Mookai Rosie's other two founders, her sister Rose and friend Bonnie Simpson, were recipients of the Premier's Award in 1997 and 1998 so last month's ceremony was particularly timely to honour this trio of exceptional women. Lionel Levers, like Esme, experienced discrimination and he fought it in his various work places because he was a man who stood his ground when he knew he was right. After working in the cane industry he became a respected and valued employee of Queensland Rail where he worked till his retirement in 1994. Lionel loved his family and their deep love for him was expressed in an account of his life and in moving tributes given in song, poetry and on paintings on his casket by his children and grandchildren. and both his auntie and Father and supporting other family members and friends in

I seek leave to table a poem written by Nicky Dorante in memory of her grandfather, Lionel, as I'm sure it will bring comfort to others grieving for lost loved ones.

Tiger O'Shane was a larger than life Irishman who travelled to Australia as a 14-year-old and was also renowned as a worker- shearer, seaman, wharfie, boxer, cane cutter, and a man with a passion for life. He married Gladys Dawn, an Aboriginal woman from Mossman, and lived in Freshwater - my home - before settling at Holloways Beach in 1947 where they raised their five children, Pat, Terry, Margaret, Danny and Tim. I never had the privilege of knowing Tiger well, but he instilled into his children the same values as did Lionel and Esme because, according to his daughter Pat, he taught them that all human beings are the same and that they were as good as anyone else at a time when prejudice and ignorance prevailed.

The legacy of these three special people lives on in their children and while the community may have lost three of its elders, their children will undoubtedly become the elders of tomorrow demonstrating as they do the intelligence, passion, commitment and courage of their parents to make a better tomorrow and serve as role models for the next generation and who are living testament to Aunty Es's motto, "There is no such thing as can't". God bless you for that gift and may you rest in peace.



They say that if you can last five years together, then you're in with a good chance to make the long haul. For a band with members younger than 21, Kuranda's the Pad Boys are innocent veterans. Yet doing the hard yards has proven a reliable formula, and the band are now recognised as one Queenslands hardest working indigenous acts. William Duffin (guitars, vocals), Timmy Wason (bass, vocals) and Dennis Hunter (drums, vocals), with the assistance of Andy Duffin (didgeridoo), have evolved as a dynamic new force. Their recent performance at the Laura Festival was testament to the growing recognition the band has garnered through solid live gigging. After a long anticipated wait, the band have finally recorded professionally, with the assistance of a successful RADF grant through the Mareeba Shire Council! They have recently recorded three tracks at Nigel Pegrum's Select Sound Studio, songs for their debut EP "Tell me why?", to be released in October. They are

also producing an accompanying music video with emerging film hotshot, Rhys Day. Playing live, is of course the Pad Boys' forte'. They induce dancing through infectious rhythms, and their heart felt passion for music. They constantly ignite crowds, and at many a festival you might find the Pad Boys playing. ### WAIT-A-WHILE

#### REPORT BY DR LESLEY CLARK MEMBER FOR BARRON RIVER

The long-awaited transport options report of Stage 2 of the integrated Transport Study for the Kuranda Range was released in late August. The public information evening at the Kuranda Rainforest Resort attracted only a handful of people. The presentation by the Consultants was excellent and included a computer simulation of driving and flying over the range road as a four lane road with short tunnels and bridges. I hope that the lack of response means that people have enough information from other sources, including last month's Kuranda Paper rather than a lack of interest because it is important that the Kuranda community is well informed about this issue. Copies of the full report are available for viewing at the Kuranda Library and at my office and executive summaries are available free of charge. Submissions close on 27th September and I would like to know your views. For any queries about the study or how to make submissions, phone freecall 1800 661188. The next stage of the study will be a detailed impact assessment of four options within the central corridor route between Smithfield and Kuranda. These options include short and long tunnels, bridges and divided carriage-ways, Routes C2 and C5 incorporate two short tunnels under ridges and bridges over gullies to improve fauna crossings and preserve riparian vegetation. These options are considered to be the most environmentally sensitive and cost between \$362 million and \$397 million. My support for a tunnel was based on a belief that it would be the best on environmental grounds but the need to retain the existing road with a tunnel option means that wildlife still face the hazard of crossing the Kennedy Highway, whereas with both the C2 and C5 options, road crossings can be totally avoided near the top of the range, giving cassowaries the ability to move safely across their territory. The huge cost of all of the options to upgrade the range road and the impact of increased urbanisation at Myola are still of great concern to me and I will be keeping in close contact with members of the Community Reference Group as the next stage of the study proceeds.

Good news this week for the young people in Kuranda with the commencement of the extension of the library to create a special "youth space". This \$55,000 joint State and local government project has been made possible by a State Library Innovation grant to Mareeba Shire Council of \$22,156. I congratulate library staff for putting together an excellent submission and the Council for contributing the matching funding needed to make the project possible. There were 67 entries from 32 local authorities which confirms the quality of the Kuranda submission, which was judged on degree of creativity, benefit to the community, social impact and cooperative arrangements. I know that young people in Kuranda will enjoy being involved in planning the activities for their 'youth space' and making best use of the opportunities it provides for fun, friendships and learning. I will be meeting soon with the Rotary Club to discuss their proposal for a youth centre in Kuranda. This idea has lots of merit and it has my full support. Any projects that provide constructive, enjoyable youth activities should be encouraged because they all help to prevent young people getting caught up in crime, drugs or alcohol abuse out of sheer boredom or frustration.

Last week Peter Beattie presented the budget to the State Parliament. This responsible \$16.8 billion budget will see only a modest increase in overall spending of 1.3% and no new taxes. However it was a landmark budget in so far as it lays the foundation for Queensland to become the 'Smart State' by providing strategic investment in education and in exciting, new industries like information technology and bio-technology. The number one government priority remains job creation and the allocation of \$359 million for capital works in Far North Queensland will generate significant employment and confirms the government's commitment to our region. While most of the major local capital works projects like the Cairns Base Hospital and the Convention Centre are in Cairns City, Barron Gorge National Park's additional visitor infrastructure projects, worth in excess of \$1 million will proceed this year and the Barron Gorge power station will have a major maintenance upgrade worth \$782,000 overall. I am also hoping that public housing and police resources in Kuranda will be improved as a result of the budget. Road funds will also flow to Mareeba Shire Council for its nominated road projects under the Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme. # **Outcomes Of Kuranda Cemetery Meeting**

About 36 residents were present at the meeting called by the Kuranda's Cemetery Committee to discuss the present and future situation regarding Kuranda's cemetery. Mark Freeman gave an overview of the history going back some 17 years when it was first advised that the cemetery would be full and that action needed to be taken. The reports prepared by Council and their advisers were discussed. The meeting also heard of the distress caused to our local families when the Council closed the cemetery and family members had to be buried outside of our town. Fortunately, after presentations by the Cemetery committee, the Council subsequently reopened the cemetery on land not previously utilised.

Mayor Chris Lewis then outlined the outcome of an inspection made by the council and the cemetery committee and advised that there was a chance of a successful outcome in the future - but that the details were of necessity confidential at present. Questions from those present were addressed to the Mayor and there was a general feeling that the Council's actions in the past were deficient, and in some cases defective. Comments from those in attendance included -

- \* Kuranda Environment Assn There is no environmental reason why the cemetery could not be extended on its present location.
- \* Djabugai The culture and needs of the Djabugai people had been ignored.
- \* Cemetery Committee Some of the Council's report gave an erroneous slant to the facts.

The meeting moved a motion that requested the Council move to solve the existing problem as soon as possible and that the cemetery be located near the existing cemetery and that it be within walking distance of town. A regional cemetery at Lamb Range was not acceptable to the community and the Council's inaction in the past did not match their responsibilities to Kuranda.

A further motion was moved to thank the Cemetery committee for their work. Report by Mark Freeman.




#### News from St Saviour's Church

A busy time for all at St Saviour's with it, now becoming a separate Parish within the Diocese of North Queensland from the 1st of September 1999: having its own Church wardens and Parish council. It has also been a time for historical reflection as on the 15th September we celebrated 110 years of continual Anglican (Church of England) worship in Kuranda. The first service was held on Sunday the 15th September 1889. The Rev'd Thomas Regg came up from Cairns to officiate: his sermon text was from St Matthews Gospel chapter 8.verses 2-3 and the collection amounted to 14 shillings. To celebrate this milestone an open-air service was held on Sunday the 19th at 5.00pm followed by a fellowship meal. It has also been busy with other activities with practice for the Spring fair Billy's Billy cart time trials and scarecrow making for the Greenhouse Environmental Shops Scarecrow Competition. On Sunday the 26th of September the annual animals blessing service will be held as part of the 9.30am family Eucharist. This service is usually held on the Sunday nearest St Francis day but has been moved forward a week, due to the visit by Bishop Arthur Malcolm for confirmation. All types of pets may be brought along. In the past we have had dogs, cats, cockatoos, guinea pigs, and white mice. On Sunday the 3rd October, Bishop Arthur Malcolm will again visit St. Saviour's for Confirmation at 9.30am. The next Sunday, October the 10th is Harvest festival. This year the church will be decorated with flowers, fruit and vegetables and there will be special Harvest Services at 8.00am 9.30am and at 5.00pm when Bishop Tony hall - Matthews will be the guest preacher. Following the service at 6.00pm the produce will be sold in aid of Anglican Board of Mission - Australia. Fr. Chris Wright.

# HYDROPONIC GARDENING

By Jan Coulter

I was talking to somebody down south and mentioned that August was a wonderful month in the garden. They thought how come as it was winter, but August in Cairns is different. Everything takes off. My tomatoes were a beautiful rich red just like somebody had added colour to them. They also are a taste sensation. This year also has been the best ever for strawberries. Once again they taste beautiful. The right nutrient makes a lot of difference to strawberries. I bought a huge capsicum form the supermarket and thought I would like to grow one like that. I kept the seeds and inside a couple of weeks I had capsicum plants. They grew just like those in the supermarket. I grow them in a 20 litre container with part of the top cut out and put a length of 1" plastic pipe in the filler hole to tie the plants to for support. This container will support two capsicum or tomato plants. I have just planted some cucumber. I plant them in a box on a bench and let them hang over. I have tried them on the fence surrounding the garden but the wallabies eat them. Growing them up off the ground also keeps them away from the bugs. I grow them right through the summer I just have the reservoir underneath them a little higher so that they have more nutrient available in the hot weather. For information -Jan Coulter 40930394

The orchids which I grow on my trees are very very lovely and get no attention. They dislike hot afternoon sun and are a joy to look at when I sit on a verandah that surrounds my high set house - a good rail and very low steps make walking upstairs possible. When I designed my house 32 years ago I had Dachsund dogs with short legs so the staircase had to have low steps - what a blessing now for me in old age.



I have a large vacant furnished caravan if anyone (with no children) would like a comfortable home in return for some help in my organic garden. Phone me 4093 7205 if interested. Yellow Poinsettia cuttings are available free - NOW! Red poinsettias (double) are a mass of flowers and cuttings ready in late October. Poinsettias do better if cut back annually to about 3 ft from ground level - these tips are left in the shade to dry off (maybe 2 weeks or more) and then planted out - yours for the taking.



### Feeding Stations for Cassowaries

In conjunction with the Queensland Parks & Wildlife Service, we are planning to collect suitable fruit and put it out for Cassowanes to short-circuit their journey to the road side. The Cassowaries are coming to the roads either to access food trees on the other side or to pick up litter thrown out of cars (the worst sort of food imaginable). The birds are on the move at this time because of the seasonal shortage of their natural food. The purpose of the feeding stations is to provide enough of the right sort of food to tide them over temporarily.

We don't want the birds to become dependent upon the feeding stations, nor do we want them to associate this food with people. It may be necessary to place the food at some point along their track at night when they are not around.

You can assist in several ways by collecting or allowing fruit to be collected from trees on your property, by being a fruit collector, and/or being one of the people to take the food to the feeding stations. Please add your name to the growing list phone 4093 7570.

#### A Thought for October By Fr. Chris Wright

This month open your bible to St Matthew gospel Chapter 18 verses 1-25 read the passage through. All of us have problems with forgiveness, I do and will admit it openly I am human. There are little things in life, which are easy to forgive because they don't really test us, but all of us can experience deep hurts and betrayals, which really do. I suspect that most of us know at least one person who carries the grim burden of not being able to forgive. The subject came up one day between Jesus and his disciples. Jesus had just been chatting about the handling of hurts and disagreements, the ways to try to reopen communication between people. If we look back at the verse 20 in chapter 19 just before this passage, we see Jesus saying that wherever two or three are gathered in his name he is there in their midst. Jesus seems to be saying that when we succeed in finding reconciliation or oneness between us he is actually there! It was Peter who responded to the theme of looking for reconciliation. He asked a very human question. How many times should one forgive? To answer his own question he suggests the standards he grew up with. The law suggested seven times; by human standards that is most gracious. But Jesus rather takes the wind out of our sails by demanding that we have no limit to our forgiving. In effect that is what "seventy times seven" means. To illustrate it, Jesus tells the story of the man who, forgiven a large debt, went out and forced someone to repay him an outstanding tiny debt. What Jesus is teaching us is the devastating truth that we should be perpetually forgiving because we ourselves are perpetually in need of forgiveness by other people and most certainly by God! Our Lord is trying to get us to understand that forgiving and being forgiven is a mysterious and complex process. The whole point of the story is that the man who refuses to forgive someone else cannot really accept and benefit from the forgiveness he has received in the first place. When we are hurt or betrayed how are we at forgiving? How high do we rate its importance? At first sight it doesn't seem too vital an ability; many others seem more important. (Very few professional questionnaires ask us to rate our capacity for forgiveness!) Yet forgiving is so important for Jesus that he places it right at the very heart of the prayer he taught us. (The Lords prayer- the Our Father) That clause is also the only conditional one in the prayer, it says that we can receive forgiveness only if we give it. Nothing could be more understandable. Can we forgive? Can we reconcile?

# HOW TO KEEP HEALTHY THOUGH ELDERLY by Marjorie Spear

Life has been difficult since my bad falls. I do gentle exercises several times a day. These are prescribed by a physiotherapist. I also use an electric massager all round my back between spine and hips. My walking stick is a necessity. My eyesight is very poor and a magnifying glass makes reading possible but difficult even with a good light. Getting to Cairns for medical appointments or shopping is a nightmare. My organic herbs and vegies are a great help in keeping healthy.

#### EAT YOURSELF TO GREAT HEALTH

There is considerable public interest in ways of eating a more healthy diet. Many people have been shifting toward a low fat, high-fibre diet, often achieved by the substitution of vegetable and cereal foods for meat products. All diets need to contain nutrients from a wide variety of food sources, and this applies equally to Vegan and any other 'dietary' pattern. Enough of the rave, and now for the

Slice Base: Exotic Kiwi fruit tahini custard Vegan slice.

1 cup of freshly ground almonds 1 cup of rolled oats 1 cup of organic rice flour I tsp ground cinnamon 2 tablespoons rice malt Half a cup of macadamia oil 1 quarter cup of apple juice (approx)

Method: Mix together all the dry ingredients with your fingers. Mix in the rice malt and add macadamia oil until well combined. Pour the apple juice a tablespoon at a time until the mixture binds into a pastry ball. Press into the flan tin and bake at 100degrees C for ten minutes until beginning to brown.

Remove from oven and cool. Slice Custard Filling:

2 and a half cups of apple juice 1 and a quarter tsp of agar agar

3 tablespoons of rice malt

1 tablespoon of arrowroot 2 tablespoons of tahini

2 tsp of pure vanilla essence Method: Heat two cups of the apple juice with rice malt and vanilla essence. Dissolve agar and arrowroot in the half cup of apple juice. Take one cup of the warmed apple juice and dissolve tahini. Add dissolved agar and arrowroot to hor liquid and bring to the boil. Remove from the heat, cool slightly, add tahinimixture and stir until smooth. Pour into flan case and allow to set.

Assembling The Slice: When the tahini custard has set, arrange sliced Kiwi fruit (or straw-berries) on top. Brush with an apple juice glaze made by boiling 250ml of apple juice with half a teaspoon of agar or, give the glaze a pink tinge by adding a little dark grape juice

to the apple juice. Allow to set. A gastronomical delight by Star.

# Alcohol & Drug Bulletin

KISC applauds the recent local efforts to discuss concerns about drug use, and especially the fact that a collaborative effort between various interested community organisations and members is being made. In the following article we again contribute information we hope will be of interest and use.

"NO QUICK FIX" It's more puzzling than ever why addicts need a bigger hit. Scientists assumed that drug tolerance developed as a result of opiate receptors becoming reduced in cells chronically exposed to addictive drugs, and that addicts had to take higher doses to get the same effect. However recent American research has discovered that the body's own painkillers, it's natural opiates, removes even more receptors than addictive drugs such as morphine and methadone. While it is too early to say how this new understanding can be used to treat addiction, scientists involved are excited by the possibility of being closer to discovering the physical causes of addiction through the knowledge that natural opiates and addictive drugs working on the same receptor may make the cell do different things. (from "New Scientist" 4 Sept 1999)


