

Due to unforeseen circumstances, our volunteer judges were unable to commence judging in time for this edition, and as we had such a great response, a decision was made to not rush judging to meet a short deadline. We received a total of 10 stories and we felt the judges should be able to read and respond to the stories without time pressure.

So writers and readers we thank you for your patience, and we are sorry for keeping you in suspense. Results and the winning entry will appear in the May edition.



At around six months old, my daughter started to crawl. I watched one of her early practice sessions in the sunroom at Grandma's house. With huffs, grunts and Herculean effort, she squirmed, tested her muscles and struggled forward. She was completely absorbed in her body and her goal – a fluffy stuffed cow. She locked eyes with the toy, lifted her body on chubby arms and swayed. Painfully, she inched forward, her gaze never leaving the prize. She was alone in her battle to succeed. The world around her seemed to have disappeared.

A cousin walked in. "Good girl! Clever girl! You're crawling!"

My daughter, absorbed in her journey, was startled. She looked up at her 6-year-old cousin and dropped to her belly.

"Moo!" Her cousin made the cow dance. "Come on! You can do it!" He called. She smiled and trained her eyes on him. The cow and her original goal seemed forgotten.

Later, during a few brief moments of silence, when her cousin was distracted by Thomas the Tank Engine, my daughter's focus returned to her cow. She was up and swaying once again, her little face a picture of concentration. Inch by inch she struggled forward, finally reaching her goal and collapsing, her face buried in the white fuzz of her cow. Her private joy was unmistakeable in the sweet gurgle and curve of a lip visible through the fluff.

Immediately, she was surrounded by a small, loving crowd. "Good girl! You did it!" Again, my daughter seemed startled.

She slurped up the cuddles and attention, but the initial instant when she'd reached that goal had been its own reward. That triumphant, hidden smile was hers alone.

In that instant I had glimpsed my daughter's pure sense of self.

That sunny morning led me to wonder whether children are born with a deep sense of self and that we, as the adults (or 6-year-old cousins) in their lives lovingly train this out of them.

When a child presents us with a picture she's drawn of a yellow dragon with blue eyes, or a story she's written about a boy with enormous feet, I wonder if she is making a statement: *Your opinion is more important than mine*.

We add to this belief with kind but judgemental language: *Good. Pretty. Wonderful.* As innocuous as this seems, it is also sending a subtle message: *You're right. My opinion on your accomplishment is at least as important as yours.*

What I'm suggesting is that we find out a little more about the dragon or the boy with giant feet. Instead of a judgment call, no matter how positive, we can offer our interest.

Why is the dragon wearing a vest? Does the boy have a hard time finding shoes that fit? What do you think?

Questions like this not only encourage a deeper line of thought, but they show a child that their ideas are respected and valuable.

They encourage a child's sense of self.

A few years after my daughter learned to crawl, she and a friend were drawing at the kitchen table. Their murmurs and giggles had become white noise until one line pierced the fog.

"You don't have to like it, but I do."

Music to my ears.

IMPORTANT - Changes to Trans North Kuranda Bus Service Route 851




The changes are:

Thank you for your patience while Transport and Main Roads (TMR) undertook emergency works on the Kuranda Range road this past month. Following the damage sustained during ex-Tropical Cyclone Jasper, Queensland Rail has been working tirelessly to get Kuranda Scenic Railway services up and running again. The good news is – Kuranda Scenic Railway plan to run two services daily from the end of March 2024 arriving in Kuranda at 10.25am and 11.25am and departing at 2pm and 3.30pm. Again, thank you to everyone for your patience, I understand tourism and small businesses are hugely affected when the Kuranda Scenic Railway is not running.







A Grinter's Tale

Harry looked at me this morning and said "I am so over this rain", yet again. Predictably, I replied "Who isn't?"

I thought to myself, if I could pull in a dollar for every time I have heard someone utter that in the last month, no, maybe four months, I could buy a Landcruiser, maybe two. Or a week in the Gobi Desert. Or even a really good raincoat.

Harry's a dog of course, so you might ask yourself why he said this, well not so much 'why', because that's obvious, but how? But you know from my Conversations with Dog, when you live and work 24 hours a day with three dogs, you know what they are saying by their facial expression, or maybe you're just losing the plot.

Thank God for my friends, or I would be swinging through the rainforest canopy making chimpanzee noises.

Outside the back door, you would think there was going to be a nighttime air raid. All light is blocked by the row of wet rain jackets hanging to dry, or to not dry.

In the living room, the dogs are learning how to make chickpea fritters on SBS Food, after the dulcet tones of the background pastoral music on Rick Stein's 'Venice to Istanbul' gastronomic tour sent them to sleep.

It nearly sent me to sleep too, the kind of music that sees sheep jump fences in slow motion, and conjures images of hillsides covered in daisies, fairies in the dell, and content Jersey cows with big eyes and all sorts of udder things. Yawn.

Every human and animal has a "What did we do to deserve this?" look in their eyes lately, except perhaps the native ducks, sitting smugly down there at the edge of the dam giving credibility to the expression, "Great weather for ducks".

And the flies. The ubiquitous flies and their resistance to everything except passive drowning in jars of beef stock and sardine juice saved specifically for pest execution.

At this time of year, I try to think of the positives. When my horses are itching and plagued with flies, the dogs are suffering from lack of a multiple kilometre walk and so am I, and even my wellies are wet on the inside, I want to crawl into a hole and wake up when the sun comes

The sun came out the other day, and I was a different person. I'm not sure where evil Suzy goes when the sun comes out, but I don't really care, I don't like her anyway. I thought I left Suzanne and her Seasonal Affective Disorder in England in the 70s, bah humbugging at the grey skies and the grey faces, and so glad I would not have to wash the paws of, and towel dry a dog every time it went outside.

We used to "Go Troppo" frequently in the wet, but for periods of two or three weeks, not for nearly four months. BOM certainly seems to live from day to day, like us. The goal posts on the forecast keep getting moved, in fact if it goes on like this, all the goalposts in Cairns will fall over. We had better not get a late cyclone, as it won't just be the goalposts falling over after all this rain, and I'll be convinced there is mischief afoot.

Anyway, it's a good opportunity to get organised. Having become addicted to jigsaws lately in an attempt to stop myself working on wet weekends,

I opened a new to me one from the Possum Corner Op shop to find some very thoughtful, organised person had put the edge parts in one bag and the rest of the pieces in another.

Whoever you are, or wherever you are in Kuranda, I salute you. You have inspired me. Once I finish this, and have knocked the breadcrumbs out of my keyboard, I am going to get organised.

I'll begin by tidying the pantry. Perhaps. Or maybe I will just close its door. As a kid, I recall my mother groaning in exasperation "Close the larder door!" It was this weird plastic concertina thing, which would never close properly on first go.

My mother, who often features in my column, was a neat freak. She's still a neat freak, but there is only so much neat freakiness you can orchestrate in an aged care home. If she was more mobile, she would be out in her wheelchair cleaning window frames, doorknobs and fellow residents' Zimmer frames.

When she came to visit me at Clifton Beach in the early 2000s, my house was a dream for three weeks. I came home from work one day to find her on a ladder cleaning the ceiling fans with cotton buds. She was "getting at the fiddly bits around the motor".

I can't say I have inherited her enthusiasm, although I don't mind cleaning, except in the wet season when the walls are like those sticky fly traps we used to hang in windows. Where does all this detritus on

the walls and bathroom and kitchen tiles come from, for heaven's sake? A hygienic coating of dog hair covers all surfaces, including occasionally my healing broken nose, and that is so very irritating.

However frequently I clean, everything is back the same way the next day. I have given up checking the second bathroom's loo for froggie's misdemeanours every day, although I suppose he would say he is toilet trained if I admonished him. I do warn guests to prepare to meet their doom when I realise too late they are half way through the door leading to the room of many surprises. A bit like the Range road really.


KURANDA MEDIA ASSOCIATION COMMITTEE 2024

GEORGE WAGNER EXHIBITION – A LABOUR OF LOVE

He was born and grew up in Java, Indonesia so it was like a homecoming back to the tropics. At the time, there was not much call for interior designers in the north, but business slowed down in Sydney during the cooler months so it was a perfect couple of months to spend around Cairns.

Fast forward some years and George made the decision to leave Sydney. Armed with some reminders of his elegant city life, he embarked on his next trip to the tropics. Many things had changed around Cairns and a wrong turn landed him in the hills and Kuranda village.

It didn't take long for George to decide that this was where he wanted to stay. He bought a one-bedroom house with a large veranda across from the Kuranda Police Station. During his time in Kuranda, he frequently visited Bali. Eventually George moved to Smithfield across from JCU and stayed there until he spent his last days in 2019 at Regis Redlynch (aged care home).

George became a good friend of ours while we had our

bookshop in Smithfield and he often dropped in for a coffee and chat. Before he died, I promised to have an exhibition of some of his work. There will be approximately 20 paintings exhibited from the many he left with us for safe keeping.

Explore the Ancient Landscapes and Living Cultures of Australia's Heartland at Cairns Museum

Cairns Museum proudly announces the opening of the Kirrenderri, Heart of the Channel Country exhibition from 15 March to 22 June 2024.

Curated by Mandana Mapar, Tracey Hough, and Shawnee Gorringe, and produced by The University of Queensland Anthropology Museum in collaboration with the Mithaka people, this exhibition invites visitors to explore the profound history and culture of the Channel Country and the Mithaka Indigenous history through a captivating visual and narrative journey.

Featuring the monumental Scorpious Stone Arrangement, photographed by Lyndon Mechielsen, this landmark exhibition not only showcases the geographic marvels of one of Australia's most remote areas, but also highlights the significant cultural intersections and trade networks that have existed across the continent for millennia.

The Kirrenderri project, initiated in June 2019, is a comprehensive cultural mapping venture aimed at conserving the unique environmental and cultural heritage of the Channel Country.

The collaboration brought together distinguished researchers and the local Indigenous community to uncover and preserve the rich tapestry of the region.

Visitors to the exhibition will be treated to a rich collection of artefacts, historic and contemporary photographs, maps, archaeological discoveries, and rare interviews that together paint a vivid picture of the Mithaka region's cultural and aesthetic richness.



15 MARCH - 22 JUNE

These include significant contributions from author Alice Duncan-Kemp, whose personal items and writings offer a unique window into the life and times of the Channel Country's pioneering and Indigenous families.

Key highlights include explorations of the 10 Mile quarry, the Debney Peace Site, and Mooraberrie station, which underscore the historic milestones and enduring relationships that have shaped the Channel Country from the late 1890s onwards.

The exhibition also reveals the story of Mulkamukana, a site of early reconciliation between local Indigenous people and pastoralists, and showcases artefacts from one of the world's largest known Aboriginal stone quarries, documented in unprecedented detail with 3D imaging.

"We are proud to host this touring exhibition that brings to life the stories of Aboriginal peoples' deep connections to Country, incorporating European settlers' history and scientific research in a respectful and enlightening way. We warmly welcome the Mithaka Curatorial Team and extend our thanks to the University of Queensland Anthropology Museum for sharing the remarkable history of the Channel Country" says Daniela Vavrova, Cairns Museum Curator.



Lieselotte Edwards

We are happy to profile Lieselotte Edwards this month – a long-standing member of the Kuranda Arts Co-op.


German-born Lieselotte migrated to Australia in 1989 and has lived in Speewah for many years. From managing her own business 'Palette Designs' and travelling extensively, she now calls Australia home.

Lieselotte began painting in New Zealand in 1989 and studied batik printing, porcelain, and glass art in Ghana for three years while residing there. As an award-winning visual artist, Lieselotte is continually inspired by the colours, shapes, and movement found in her environment. Her spontaneous style is forever evolving whilst experimenting, exploring and incorporating found objects in her creations. Her past successful exhibitions of her eclectic oil encaustic artworks have been seen in galleries all over North Queensland. Many of her fine works are found in private collections LieselotteEdwards with her artwork all over the world.



Lieselotte uses the encaustic method in her work. Encaustic painting, also known as hot wax painting, is a form of painting that involves a heated wax medium to which coloured pigments have been added. The molten mix is applied to a surface - usually prepared wood, although canvas and other materials are sometimes used. After the paint has been cooled and hardened, a heating element is passed over the surface until the individual brush or spatula marks fuse into a uniform film. This 'burning in' of the colours is an essential element of the true encaustic technique. Other mixed media can also be added, creating a textured effect. Encaustic painting was invented by the ancient Greeks and was brought to the peak of its technical perfection by the genre painter Pausias in the 4th century BCE.

Her smaller works on timber are very popular with the visitors as they include our local colourful birdlife. You can see examples of Lieselotte's work on our website kurandaartscoop.com/artist-lieselotte-edwards/







Lieselotte's artworks L-R: encaustic detail, bird and flowers with power.





WHAT IS FELDENKRAIS?

Feldenkrais is a gentle modality that helps people find greater ease in moving through life by creating an awareness of how you move. It is suitable for all ages and bodies. Feldenkrais benefits include enhanced daily actions, wellbeing, balance, improved thinking abilities, and easier breathing.

Feldenkrais can assist with all aspects of ageing, gardening, help with injury prevention and assist with current injuries. It can help people in pain, support children and adults who are physically and neurologically divergent.

Awareness Through Movement classes (ATM)

These classes guide you through sequential movements inviting you to explore your body and the way you move. We do these movements gently and slowly in a safe, comfortable environment. We use breath, imagination and your senses to develop new ways of being attentive about how we move, think, feel. This modality can help create new pathways in your brain, which can enhance, restore, and strengthen your body.

Other benefits of an ATM class:

- calming your nervous system
- regaining balance and confidence
- alleviate discomfort,
- help in getting up/down from the floor, a chair, a bed etc.

ATMs are done lying on the floor, sitting and standing, and can be adapted to individuals' requirements.

Functional Integration F.I.

These are one-on-one sessions, done on a Feldenkrais table (like a massage table but wider and lower). The person is fully clothed and we explore safe and effortless movements. The practitioner uses gentle precise touch and communication with the client to bring unfamiliar parts of your body into your awareness. An F.I. has many similar benefits to ATM classes such as calming nervous systems, improving a range of movements and overall general wellbeing.

The Role of Genetic Research in Conservation – by Lance Neville

When I lived in Tasmania twenty years ago, it was not at all unusual to speak to people on the land and hear how their grandad had trapped or shot Thylacines (Tasmanian Tigers) around the farm prior to the thirties. Only a few thousand years ago they were found in grasslands, forest, and semiarid rangelands right across Australia. I'm sure many of us are aware of controversial plans to bring the animals back from extinction, but the only reason this is scientifically feasible for the Thylacine is that specimens had their DNA preserved in alcohol, not formaldehyde, which destroys the DNA sequencing. There is also a fully mummified and intact Thylacine specimen from a cave in Western Australia with intact DNA.

Also in Tasmania, Devil Facial Tumour Disease (DFTD) management has largely employed the use of genetic research to identify the cause of the disease as well as to identify conservation options for Tasmanian devils as a species.

Suitable DNA from long extinct species can also be found in cooler regions of the world, not just extinct megafauna like mammoths but also birds such as the large, flightless Moa from New Zealand, whose bones have been found with largely intact DNA in cold caves. In our own backyard, Cassowaries have had their numbers estimated in the Wet Tropics by methods based on genetic sampling of droppings to help determine the species current conservation status.

The genetic makeup of our very own critically endangered frog, the Kuranda Tree frog has had its DNA researched, work that has been led by Dr Conrad Hoskin to see how genetically different the animals are across the streams that they live in,

and importantly, to what extent the animals breed between the creeks. The more diverse their genetics the more resistant individuals may be to disease and impacts of climate change and habitat disturbance.

We are, of course, much more than just the DNA in our cells, and conservation of species around the planet will take much more than DNA technological breakthroughs alone. Genetic research has been a source of contention, inspiration and hope for agriculture, medicine, understanding our own origins as well as for conservation of animals and plants all over the planet.

Ancient indigenous cultures the world over have described in their own different ways how living things are related to each other and their environment. But importantly, maybe all this science and ancient wisdom should remind us of how connected every living thing is in the environment, including ourselves.





KURANDA CAPITAL WORKS BY COUNCIL IN PROGRESS

Hans Pehl Signs

In Kuranda, residents and visitors have seen the return of the Hans Pehl sign artwork in town. Hans Pehl, a North Queensland based artist and blacksmith, has used approximately 10 tonnes of iron to make more than 100 pieces of metalwork art over the last 30 years.

"My artwork includes a range of bins, handrails, chairs, street bollards, street signs and native animals and insects found in Kuranda," Hans Pehl said.

"When I was first looking for inspiration for the project, I was sitting in a local café and noticed how visitors were often in a hurry. It was then that I thought to create artwork that would encourage visitors to slow down and appreciate our unique 'village in the rainforest'."

Council recently worked with the artist to repurpose the original street directional signs after the new way finder signage was installed throughout the town.

There are different themes for the signs, including the capital cities from the largest international visitor markets for the region, Australian capitals, and Australian tourism attractions.

THE INVERTEBRATE ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES

With so many legs to control, it is surprising that millipedes are such capable walkers considering we often have trouble coordinating our mere two. Nevertheless, they cruise along in an apparent effortless glide over all manner of obstacles. Up and down trees, across rough terrain and over muddy wet surfaces; their legs all moving in a hypnotic wave-like motion, perfectly evolved to their low profile life-style.

Contrary to their name ('milli' meaning one thousand'and 'pede' meaning foot), millipedes do not actually have a thousand legs. Their legs usually number in the hundreds, but the final count depends on the particular species. They usually have two pairs of legs coming from each body segment, and this makes them easy to tell apart from centipedes (which have only one pair of legs per body segment).

Australia has around 2000 species of millipedes, with most being nocturnal and feeding within the rotting logs, leaf litter and mosses of our moist forests. Millipedes are important animals in the decomposition of forest timber and leaf litter. As they feed on these materials their droppings become nutritious meals for other decomposers such as earth worms which ultimately feed nutrients back into the soil.

Millipedes protect themselves by exuding a horrible smelling, and in some cases caustic, liquid. It is for this reason that most predators will steer well clear of them. Some animals however, have learnt to use the chemicals millipedes produce to their own advantage. In the jungles of Venezuela, researchers have observed monkeys collecting and rubbing annoyed millipedes through their fur – the defensive chemicals (benzoquinones) acting as a very effective mosquito repellent. A very unique relationship between mammals and millipedes!

Mating millipedes is a sight to see. They must embrace face to face, interlocking legs before the male can transfer sperm from special organs (gonopods) on the underside of his 7th body segment to the female. The eggs of millipedes are laid



underground in moist areas. From these hatch babies which are usually pale in colour and have less body segments (and legs) than their parents. They grow by shedding their outer skeleton, and after each moult, emerge with extra segments and legs until they have the full complement. Australia's largest millipedes are found practically in our backyards - the savannah forests of north Queensland to our west. They can reach lengths of up to 20cm. We also have some of the stubbiest species locally – those called pill millipedes. They look a little like isopods (slaters and pillbugs), and make use of the ability of some of these look-alikes to roll up in a ball. They are easy to tell apart as pill millipedes have over twenty pairs of legs – a vast contrast to the seven pairs of the isopods.

With the wet-season still very much with us, millipedes are very active and it's the best time of year to spot them out and about at night.



GOOD VIBES IN A NATIVE PLANT NURSERY

A NURTURING ENVIRONMENT

One of the nicest things about working in a native plant nursery is the feeling you get of rhythm, seasonal rhythm. You plant seeds into rich soil and you walk the nursery benches day after day, sun after rain, and experience the thrill of tiny heads popping up through the soil. Magical. Some seeds break the earth with a drum roll and a trumpet blast like the Black Beans, Candlenuts and Bunya Pine. Tiny cotyledons nourish the first leaf growth then one leaf becomes ten and there's no stopping the orchestra of greens and shapes.

Over the top, you say? Maybe, but it's just a feeling of elation you get.

NEW IN THE NURSERY

A friend of KCons gave us a big box of shooting Bunya Pine seeds. We've never seen anything like it. You can be lucky to get a few fertile nuts from a massive Bunya cone, but this was bountiful. We might just have learnt something about how to propagate this tree species.

A MUST-HAVE - ABELMOSCHUS MOSCHATUS we call it Helen's Hibiscus

It is hard not to smile when you are greeted by a bright pink, full-petalled flower every morning when you open your door. We give more of these plants away than we sell because it is such a happy plant and we just want to spread the happiness.

Helen Adams introduced us to this beauty. She was a quiet leader in environmental issues. Her soul is reflected in this gracious, giving, welcoming flower. She gave so much to us in her life and through this flower, she keeps putting it out there.

DIRECT SEEDING

We've talked about direct seeding of Lomandra mat rush along the banks of waterways and to control landslips, but there are other seeds that you just need to plonk into a shallow depression in the soil and they'll grow without any help from you. Trees like Candlenut and Black Bean are in this category, but there are many more. You don't have to have green fingers.

CASSOWARY ART TRAIL

The purpose of this project is to promote information about cassowaries and to bring tourists to the region.

Support continues to grow for this marvellous idea of Jurg Jutzi's. The Trail is now mapped

to start at Mission Beach, with painted cassowary statues spotted throughout the Wet Tropics. They can be found at the Mamu Tropical Skywalk (Palmerston Hwy), Wildlife Habitat (Port Douglas), Rainforestation Nature Park (Kennedy Hwy, Kuranda) and soon to be at Hartley's Crocodile Adventures (Wangetti). There are four located in Kuranda - The Heritage Markets, Terra Nova Gallery, Kuranda Village Centre and the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre.

CASSOWARY UPDATE

As the months cycle around, we again find juveniles moving out on their own at this time of the year. If they don't go willingly, they will be aggressively ejected by the visiting female and rejected by the up-till-now adoring father. In the next month or two it will be mating time again and there's no room for youngsters. We'll start to see juveniles/sub-adults on their own and adults in mating pairs from now on.

It's a hard time for the youngsters; they have to find a new home range (ever diminishing as we subdivide, remove their food trees, grow plants that don't belong here and fence our properties). All this following a possibly violent removal from the comfort and support of their father. We people have to keep a sharp look out for disoriented cassowaries dashing across roads and in our properties.

1 teaspoon bicarbonate soda 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

PREHEAT oven to 180°C.



Yams

Yams are a wonderful nutritious, easy-to-grow staple food in many tropical and sub-tropical areas, and quite a few different edible species grow very well right here. I have been growing four or five types of yam, and enjoying them in many different ways as an easily-grown, easily-sourced nutritious

It seems different yams have their 'roots' in different cultures across Africa, Asia, the Pacific, Caribbean and South America, being a major culturally celebrated food source for many thousands of years. In some areas special yam-houses are built above ground to store the bumper harvest to last the family and community many months into the future or until the following harvest. This creates abundance and plenty for meals and ceremonies and celebrations which have been wrapped around the yams for many generations.

In some languages 'yam' means 'to eat', and so the fundamental nature of this food plant in to the heritage of cultivation is even in the language. Some of the yams are in the Diascorea family, including alata and others.

The yam can easily replace the often more sensitive and disease-prone potato, and can be added to sweet potato dishes like 'sop-sop' in coconut milk, or baked, mashed, stirfried, air-fried, shallow-fried or deep-fried as chips, or grated into fritters, or cut into stews and soups, making it a versatile and easy food, though the digging of the yam can take some

time if it is a big one. Some can be easily half a metre long and almost as wide, with care needed so as not to damage the root itself. Once recovered from the ground a section can be cut off and used for the meal, and a slight skin will form and protect the rest of the yam until you are ready to use another portion, with no need even for refrigeration, so this is a sturdy and useful plant in our area.

Some varieties have bulbils (small yams also growing on the twirled stems) which are edible, and others which are used for planting for the next crop. Some have 'aerial potatoes' as well as a root crop, and others various sizes of root vegetables. Ask around at your Seedsavers meetings to garner a tuber or cutting or seedling for the beginning of your yam journey.

A trellis or fence or tree is helpful, as when the vine grows from the root for the next season there is a lot of vine and leaves, so don't plant them too close to your neighbours unless your neighbours are friendly and like-minded and into sharing abundance and plenty. Another great idea is to build a mound to plant the yam into which can be surrounded by rocks too (to keep the creatures out), and then create a tripod of bamboo around them for the vine to grow on, like in the photograph.

When the winter arrives the leaves drop, providing good mulch below, and the vines separate into handy silica-rich

> composting sections too, and that indicates the time to start to harvest the yams.

There are yams native to Australia, including the yam daisy with a gorgeous yellow flower, and the 'elephant foot yam'. There is also the pretty red or orange oca which has come from the Incas and is very popular in Aetoeoroa, New Zealand and beginning to catch on here too.

It is always a good thing to have some of your supplies safely growing and stored under the ground awaiting your harvest and enjoyment and sharing.







BOOK REVIEW

The Last Lifeboat by Hazel Gaynor

A mother's nightmare What would you choose? Keep the kids in London with its nightly bombing raids? Or send them on a dangerous journey to safety?

Extract from Publisher's Blurb: Liverpool 1940. Alice King stands on the deck of SS Carlisle, waiting to escort a group of children to Canada as overseas evacuees. But disaster strikes in the Atlantic and Alice and Lily will find themselves bound together forever by this event.

Review:

Life in London during the Blitz was confronting. There was the constant fear, the devastating losses and the deprivations which were made even harder when you had children to consider.

Lily hears about the evacuation plan, and while it tears her apart to lose her children, she signs up for it. What an excruciating choice!

Alice knows she is good with children

and wants to do her bit for the war, so she volunteers to go with them.

Gaynor's novel is inspired by true events.

During World War Two, the SS City of Benares set sail from England to evacuate 90 children to safety in Canada.

When the Nazi's torpedoed the ship in September 1940, hundreds died, including many children - and one lifeboat was left adrift at sea for eight days.

The scenes are vivid in their description evoking Hollywood movies depicting the relentless bombings of London during World War II and prowling U-boats sinking ships at sea.

It was chaotic and terrifying. Some of these scenes of loss were just heart-breaking. Imagine how it was for the children. Alice became the rock the children clung to.

Imagine the parents back home hearing the news. Thinking the worst but hoping against hope that their children were among the survivors.

It's a very moving story of hope and of courage, set in a time when there was great need of both.

Kuranda Writers Group

Discussion at the recent Kuranda Writers Group at Kuranda Library was lively indeed. Everyone took turn to share what stories they were listening to, reading or watching, their current writing, then what book was begging to be next from their TBR (to-be-read) pile.

Kuranda children's author, Ann Harth, said she was writing something for older women while reading rural noir by crime writer Chris Hammer who impressed everyone as a panellist on the Biggest Book Club at the recent Cairns Tropical Writers Festival (CTWF), especially on the book Horse by Geraldine Brooks. Set prior to the American Civil War when the entire horse racing workforce were slaves, it has both slave and slave-owner characters speak.

This prompted a spirited discussion on appropriation. Just who is allowed to speak for whom? Can men write women characters and vice versa? Of course, but are their assumed voices credible? At the other extreme, can just anyone without any lived experience assume identities to write for or on behalf of Indigenous, LGBTIQA+, or 'others' all the way to the Demidenko impersonation scandal (look it up). Clearly not without contention, but just where to draw the line is being hotly contested in literary and movie circles.

Audiobooks versus print was raised. Does hearing the voices of characters supplied in audiobooks live up to creating voices in one's own imagination while reading 'real' books?

Malcolm Frost told us he was following local author Stephen Chong's writing prompts as a work-in-progress. He's just finished reading The Far Pavilions by M.M. Kaye about the Dutch East India Company and is embarking on some A.A. Milne of Winnie-the-Pooh fame, Kokoda by historian Paul Ham, and with his background in forensic psychology, some works by the Irish crime writer Jayne Seymour.

A wide discussion about the crime and punishment debate followed, partly prompted by US author Dr Ravi Shankar (no not that sitar-playing one) as another writer at the Cairns festival regarding his book Correctional. This chronicles his personal experience of being racially profiled at a traffic stop then incarcerated within the US criminal justice system while also being a Professor of Poetry working internationally. Backed by further research he exposes the exponential growth of US incarceration as a privatised 'industry' to be a direct extension of US slavery. Yes, inmates actually do make Victoria Secret lingerie.

The obvious parallels with Australia's Indigenous incarceration rates and the recurrent tough-on-crime drumbeat at election times raised the internal management styles inside and their consequences, particularly the higher rates of recidivism after dehumanising retributive punishment compared with active inmate rehabilitation.

A few of us watched the series Boy Swallows Universe based on the best-selling book by Trent Dalton who has become something of a rock star at literary festivals. Partly autobiographical about a dysfunctional family growing up in the 'burbs of Brisbane, Boy Swallows Universe became No. 2 on Netflix, so telling local stories does matter.

Malcolm reported he's come away from his first writers' festival somewhat discouraged at the narrow prospects of ever becoming a published author. While chances of getting a publisher to invest their company's staff and dollars in any author for a commercial return are slim, self-publishing has grown, though there are pitfalls. A big one is 'vanity publishing' where authors pay someone just to print their book without any distribution plan through

At the Kuranda meeting, Toni Rogers spoke as a former Mareeba Shire Council arts and cultural award recipient, artist and author. While her artworks made of fibres and feathers based on her Pacific Island upbringing are at Kuranda Arts Co-op, Toni announced her exhibition coming up at Tablelands Regional Gallery in November. She finds herself mostly writing artist statements and speeches for politicians or openings. A proofreader, including for The Kuranda Paper, Toni said she imagines carrying around 'A Pocketful of Apostrophes', itself perhaps a good book title? Reading-wise it's a history of the Jews in Portugal in The Last Kabbalist of Lisbon by Richard Zimler, The Kite Runner by Khaled Hosseini which is also a film, and re-reading The First Stone by Helen Garner.

The meeting welcomed a newcomer currently house-sitting in Kuranda, Jayne, who told us about writing for children and her travel writing from her caravanning around Australia.

A show of hands confirmed that most of us had entered the Kuranda Media Association story competition for A Spirited Tale.

Now on the second Monday of the month, the next Kuranda Writers Group meeting will be at the Kuranda Library from 10am-12pm on 8 April. See you there!

St Saviour's Thought for April

This month we read from St John's Gospel chapter 20 verses

Mary returns to the tomb alone in the early dawn. By doing so she becomes the voice which announces the unbelievable event to all succeeding centuries. She tells the others. Two of them run from their hiding place. John, the writer, was with them, and he remembers in great detail. How could one ever forget? John even recalls the head-cloth being a little distance from the other cloths. Somehow John knew. He didn't understand, but he knew.

It is important for us to realise that. We are tempted to try to understand the resurrection of Jesus, to seek explanations. Our Western culture is mesmerized by the how and why of life. But even those who were closest to Jesus, who witnessed all this, who actually touched him after it - they never claimed to understand. They just knew. And how do we know they knew? Because it utterly transformed them.

John tells us that they "went back to their own homes". Why is that important? Because that is where we have to live out faith in Jesus. We live it out wherever "home" is, the familiar places of our lives - the home itself, the office, the


"They have taken away my Lord," cried Mary. Many people feel this today as they try to find faith in a changing world and a changing church. There can be fear, resentment, confusion, and anger in that cry. But Mary turned and Jesus was there. We who feel alienated and discouraged need to know that. Jesus is in his church and in his world. It is difficult to find him in much of what is happening, but he is there. We

might assume that he is saying to our resentment and regret for past things, "Why are you weeping?" It's a good question. Why am I angry? Why can I not accept this or that certain thing? What is really going on in me? Are these difficulties only symptoms of deeper things inside myself which I have never dealt with? Once such things are admitted, Jesus can help us deal with them.

"Do not hold me," said Jesus to Mary, "but go to my brethren and say to them, I am ascending. "Our Lord says to us in many ways that we cannot hold him. We cannot keep things as they used to be. We know it, but we find it very difficult to accept. Only when Mary accepted the fact that she couldn't hold Jesus for herself, and turned to tell the others of his risen life - only then was she able to say, "I have seen the Lord." When you and I can say those words, we will have to own our Christian faith. Christ will have risen in us. Mary said, "I have seen the Lord." Have we? What would that mean for us today?
