

Shortage of Camping Areas for 'Grey Nomads'

In the last edition of *The Kuranda Paper* Wolfgang Rusch, from Trinity Beach, suggested that the old Primary School could be used for what he believes is a shortage of camping facilities for Grey Nomads in Kuranda, which could not be further from the truth.

I was a Grey Nomad until the end of November 2011 and am no longer after discovering the Kuranda Rainforest Camping Park on Kuranda Heights Road.

The ambience of the place blew me away: it has a more comprehensive range of facilities, well appointed, than most of the dozens of caravan parks I have stayed in and at a price even a retiree on a government pension can easily afford. The management and staff are always helpful and go to great lengths to keep the park's facilities spick and span. Personally I can't see myself ever shifting and maybe in time would like to utilise this park for workshops and conferences covering the various fields of endeavour the writer lectured on around the world for eight years.

For whatever reason the number of Grey Nomads visiting Kuranda are few and far between. Over the four months I have lived in the park I doubt there has been even ten Grey Nomads who have visited, and only three, to my knowledge, stayed more than one day. When one adds up the days, the sites they occupied would have, at the outside, amounted to less than 30 days. The Park would have had sufficient vacant sites over the four months I have been here, to have been able to accommodate at least a thousand Grey Nomads.

The 120 plus days from 1st December to the 31st March times the average 30 vacant sites over that period meant the park could have accommodated 1800 Grey Nomads staying an average of two days, which will never happen because Kuranda does not cater for Grey Nomads.

If it wasn't for the likes of me and the others who have discovered this park and settled here plus all the young overseas tourists and the commercial travellers who enjoy coming here it would have had to shut up shop.

There definitely is no shortage of camp sites in Kuranda for Grey Nomads or anybody else who chooses to visit.


Welcome to Cairns, Port Douglas & Atherton Tablelands

Roads got half fixed, and many things just didn't get done right. The effort was there, and the intent; but the action missed the target. We need a lot of common sense, and a councillor who views the problems from





Gardening in Kuranda



MAY and the rains have been, the soil is moist and the last month to get in those potted shrubs, trees and other "hang arounds" before the soil cools and night temperatures start to seriously fall.

In any planting out, think of eventual height and spread and consider shape and foliage texture to complement/contrast with other plantings. Some gardeners have an innate eye for this creating of visual jewel boxes that either hold the eye or lead one forward. This ability to visualize the end effect is rare.

It is usually wise to prepare the planting spot, opening out and enriching the soil and do remember to set up some protection and watering until established. Our furred and feathered friends seem especially attracted to the newly planted out which are vulnerable to set-back or total destruction until established.

Remember the **Cairns Tropical Garden Show** at Cannon Park Racecourse on Sunday 13th May – a great place for plants and gardening ideas and usually enough activities to keep the kids entertained, while dad lugs the spoils.



Plant of the Month: AspleniumNidus (Bird's Nest fern) Although somewhat ubiquitous, easily and cheaply obtainable, these naturally epiphytic ferns are ideal for making a statement when well placed as their large deep green well form sets of so many other plantings.

In their rainforest homes, growing high in the crooks of trees, they can reach enormous size and weight. They grow in a series of erect, elongated-shaped and apple-coloured fronds that rise from a central rosette, dying off at the base as they age. Healthy plants can have fronds up to three feet and are beautiful all season, Filtered light to light shade is best and some burning may occur in too much direct sun. High humidity and good watering is best although they prove remarkably hardy even if drying out.

While they may be used as a potted subject, their full potential is best achieved mounted or grown in situ with loose rich organic compost. During the growing season, fertiliser weekly or biweekly with weak liquid fertiliser, avoiding fertiliser pellets in the central cup.

Problems are few. Watch for scale insects, spray with soapy water followed by clean water and the occasional aphid invasion on emerging new growth can easily be sprayed off with a hose burst.

With increasing hybridisation and tissue culture, various forms are becoming available with cristate spooned, rippled and undulate forms although some of these are proving somewhat more difficult in open garden cultivation.

Q @A. Dear Sue, Thank you for finally solving the problem of several readers. These had reported the sighting of "humming birds" in their gardens – small nectar sipping species native to the Americas. Given the number of sightings and description of the hovering movements and darting flight of the unidentified visitors, the answer finally came with a request for sourcing of host plants for the "Humming Bird" Moth (Sphinx or Hawk Moth family). With a recent report of sighting several of the "humming birds" attracted to the rain induced flowering flush of Phaleriacl erodendron(Scented Daphne), the pieces fell into place. Humming Bird Moths are sometimes day-flying but more seen at dusk and early evening. Two other native plants Psydaxodorata (syn. Cantiumodorata and Pavettaaustraliensisare) also highly attractive to these interesting visitors.

Dear Rudi, Thank you for the invitation to visit your garden. For someone no longer collecting the rare and bizarre, you certainly have some very interesting specimens. That peculiar and intriguing flower is Drymoniacoccinea. Drymonia is a very large genus of more than 100 species, which grow throughout much of tropical Central and South America. Although generally terrestrial, the plants are usually rooted in the ground, tending to climb and vine through the forest trees with some species epiphytic. You made my day in showing me a plant I had not ever seen before and which had me totally stumped as where to even place it. Thanks again for the frisson! http://www.gesneriads.ca/gendrymo.htm

'Chillagoe Fossil' ready to break the 1000km mark in 2012 Great Wheelbarrow Race

When Jon Booth celebrates his 76th birthday a few days after the 2012 Great Wheelbarrow Race, he wants to also celebrate another milestone – breaking the 1000km mark.

Jon has competed in every Wheelbarrow Race since its inception in 2004, but ran the first two years as part of a team, and while he has competed in the past 6 races as a solo competitor, Jon has yet to reach the 1000km mark.

"I only counted the kilometres I ran with the teams for the two years and now as a solo competitor for the past six years, so I will break the 1000km mark this year," he said.

Known as the Chillagoe Fossil, Jon has become somewhat of a hero to many young competitors who marvel at his courage in taking on the gruelling 140km race by himself.

Jon says he has been training about five times a week, but will start to push even harder in the next few weeks to get ready for the three-day event which is held from 18-20 May.

Jon will be one of around 450 competitors this year who take on the race from Mareeba to



PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT

Douglas Track Action Group

On the 26th of March a committee was formed to facilitate opening access to the Douglas Track at Speewah as an off-road leisure trail. The purpose of the trail is to provide a pathway between the western and eastern ends of Speewah for bush walkers, horse riders and mountain bike riders.

While much of the trail is currently open for such activities, a section of about 360 metres is blocked by dense wait-a-while where the pathway is overgrown. It is the purpose of the committee to facilitate the clearing of this section while mitigating any environmental, social or cultural impacts.

This project is aligned with the Tablelands Community Plan which identified the importance of the development of the Douglas Track at Speewah as an off-road trail to the community there.

The committee recognises that the Buluwai people are the traditional owners of the trail (named Yalbogie) and respects their strong cultural, spiritual and historic connections with it.

In consultation with the Buluwai people, the committee plans to interpret the heritage significance of the trail. The Douglas Track was also used as a packhorse route linking the seaport of Cairns in 1876 with the goldfields at Thornborough.

The committee is using historic survey maps with current DERM maps and a GPS to best determine the most appropriate route for the trail at the overgrown section

Suzie Grinter has been elected as Chairperson for the committee and Annie Austin as Secretary and Treasurer. It was determined at the meeting that an administration fee of \$5.00 is charged to committee members. The next meeting will be held at 7.30 p.m. on Monday the 7th of May at the Speewah Rural Fire Brigade shed. The agenda is to identify the funding requirements and organise a group walk for the trail. 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
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QCWA Kuranda Branch


DAB President Alison Gotts said she was delighted to be working with DMC and believes the skills of the two organisations were complementary.


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Kuranda Rangers Soccer Club

To listen to **Trish Molloy** playing her piano is a rich, emotional and most of all, colourful experience. The sound is elegant, silky smooth and a creamy blend of notes. The wall behind her piano is draped with framed posters, instruments and a personal art collection. Trish's home studio is completely nestled deep in the rainforest of Kuranda, surrounded by perfumed gingers, dark foliage, and today, a patch of blue sky.

Where is your current studio?

Mainly in our lounge room. In one corner is an electric piano and guitars. On the facing side of the room is a drum kit. For a more sound-proof space for making a lot of noise or recording I can use our Coaster bus parked in the garden.

Do you work alone or with others?

I do both. I often write alone, although I sometimes write with other people. But I get a lot more out of playing with others – music is far more satisfying as a collaboration. My partner Zach and I jam together, he is great drummer and poet, and the kids often join in too. Holden is a fantastic drummer and Bila knows all the

I perform with In the Wild Wood - with Nick Emtage on trumpet and Alan McLean playing drums. We are the resident band for the Kurandacoots circus theatre troupe - writing all the music for the shows. It's like being in a giant band where some of the instruments are aerials, juggling, poetry and hoops. The Kurandacoots are a big inspiration for my writing. In the Wild Wood also play local gigs and festivals, and we just played as support for John Butler Trio and Zennith a couple of weeks ago. I recorded my first CD in 2011 and it was released this year.

I also play with the group "Secret Tuesdays" with Leah Kelly (piano and guitar) and Odi Gorman on banjo. We play once a week at Leah's which is always great fun. We perform at local festivals, and have played gigs in Kuranda and Townsville.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Instruments – piano, guitar, ukelele. Good acoustics helps too. I also need personal time and space so that I don't drive my family batty with the repetitive practice of the passage of a new piece. Music, especially in a shared space, can be intrusive and I have to keep the noise down late at night. It's a fantastic and great fun art form, but I think its challenging to live with a musician!

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

I am nocturnal. I can easily work until 1-2am. I try to cut off at midnight as I am conscious of my responsibilities the next day. However, I do most of my playing and writing at night time.

Describe the work you do in your studio.

Creating, writing, playing, dreaming, recording and rehearsing.



Why is music your chosen medium?

I grew up with music and attended music camps while at school. I always wanted to be an artist and studied visual arts when I left school. I did a lot of writing and after Uni I worked in theatre as part of the crew, not as a performer. I picked up on music again when the children were little to introduce music into their lives. Now I've lived a little I feel like I have something to say about the places I've been and the things I've seen. I love collecting stories and retelling or reimagining them.

List three things you listen to while working.

Myself and the other musicians I am playing with. I also have to listen to the music in my head, the other arrangements that come to me when I'm figuring out a piece.

Your favourite tool?

My piano. Any piano. Mine is a full-sized electric piano with weighted keys. It is portable and fits in the back of the car, and can handle the damp rainforest climate better than an upright.

How do you identify your work?

Mainly by playing it. I am a member of APRA and my original music is under Copyright.

How do you sell your work?

Through performing, selling CDs at performances, and royalties from live performances. The CD In the Wild Wood is now also available online through CDbaby, itunes etc.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No, I don't teach or sell from home. I am starting to develop song writing workshops for festivals.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

I undertake part-time tutoring with indigenous students at James Cook University in Cairns under the ITAS scheme. I also do a lot of grant writing, and I am a volunteer at the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre, and now at the Kuranda Amphitheatre.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be? I would soundproof an area for when I am working at night or the band is here. I would love to upgrade the speakers and get some more equipment.

If you were not working with music what would you be doing?

Writing – short stories. I really enjoy my writing where I can make up a world. I have also spent a fair bit of time in academic work, in community development and social justice.



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More Than Just A Sting

SCORPIONS are those lethal creatures that crawl across the screens in film and television and kill people in a matter of seconds, right? Well, perhaps not. In reality there are very few scorpions in the whole world which are capable of killing people with their venom, and none of our Australian species have venom that potent. We have somewhere between 100 and 200 species of scorpions in this country. They are found in habitats right across Australia, including plenty in our region. The venom of most Australian scorpions is certainly capable of killing their prey, but would only cause us local pain and swelling – the most venomous could cause pain over several days.


Scorpions are living relics; they have been around for over 400 million years hunting the primitive forests of this planet before the dinosaurs even appeared! They evolved long ago to be perfect hunters and haven't changed much in all that time. The prehistoric scorpions however were much larger than they are today, some growing up to a metre long!

Australia has some highly specialised scorpions. Some are well adapted for desert life, have big powerful bodies and dig deep winding burrows to escape the heat of the day. Others have become suited for life amongst rocks, and have flat bodies to allow them to squeeze into tight spaces.

All scorpions have two well known features which most people are familiar with; their claws (pedipalps), and their long tail with the sting on the tip. These two things make them very recognisable, but they do have some other unique features which aren't as obvious. One of these is a pair of 'pectines'; small comb-like structures on the underside of the scorpions body. Scorpions use their pectines to sense chemicals (the scorpions' way of smelling). Pectines are also used for detecting tiny vibrations through the ground, and for sensing temperature.

Scorpions have eyes but they are quite small, so they don't see very well. Australian scorpions have two eyes in the middle of their heads and two or three pairs on the outer edge near where the claws join their body. To capture their prey, scorpions make up for their relatively poor vision with an excellent sense of vibration. They use their pectines and many fine sensory hairs which cover their claws and body for this purpose. They are so sensitive to vibrations that they can detect the footsteps of an ant, or the wing beats of a moth as they approach. This incredible sensitivity allows scorpions to hunt in complete darkness and still capture their food.

Another remarkable fact about scorpions is that they give birth to live young. The tiny babies are born one at a time, and cradled in the mother's legs before being helped up onto her back. Baby scorpions will ride on their mother's back for many weeks before leaving her to face life on their own as miniature predators.

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Bob Madden - New Beginnings

We profile this month a well known resident of Kuranda/Speewah, Bob Madden, and we talk about his new lease of life following recent

Bob was born in Bega NSW to farming parents of Irish Catholic and German Aussie backgrounds during World War II. He was raised with two brothers in that state. At a young age he began working in a bank before moving to the Patent Office in Canberra. He developed an interest in alternate lifestyles, causing him to visit Cairns in 1962. A year later he returned to work on the Tablelands in a dairy farm for a while. Back to Sydney, he joined the Post Office sorting mail, later moving to clerical work. He met Marie, his present partner. She was working with Telstra and on weekends assisting an osteopath. They became friendly and have stayed together ever since. They have no children.

Bob decided to study accounting at TAFE, passing in 1979. He also stood unsuccessfully for a council election. He rose to the position of

Employment Manager for the Post Office in NSW. In 1988 he took early retirement so that he and Marie could move north. They came to Cairns in 1989 and then moved to their Speewah house where they still live.

Bob became very active in the community. He joined the Tablelands Organic Growers, becoming President and Marie Secretary. He joined ARK with Arch McArthur and others. He was active in the Kuranda Media Association and was president for several years. He joined with the late John Beasley to form the Speewah District Residents Association. In 1991 he was a candidate for election to the Mareeba Shire Council, but was not elected as the wards were abolished, leaving Kuranda without representation. He was also on various other community groups such as WAMP, Chamber of Commerce and the Development Control Plan Group for the area. At the same time he ran his own TV and antennae business.

In 2011 Bob became quite ill. Originally it was a muscular problem, probably from working on roofs in the heat. Then this developed into an infection of the sinus which must have moved into his brain causing a clot. He was by then seriously ill although the doctors were not sure of the cause. In hospital he spent two weeks



in intensive care and four days in an induced coma. He was not taking food or drink normally and was seriously dehydrated. He had hallucinations and was near death. As he came out of the induced coma, he remembers having what can only be called a near death experience, a feeling of the end of bodily life but with an appreciation of a new life after physical death. In his words it was more of a vague feeling rather than a rational thought, and quite bizarre.

Bob spent a long time in hospital, and finally the doctors found something that worked in a form of hormone therapy. He began to recover. He had lost 25 kilos and most of his muscle tone, but began to improve as his appetite returned. Soon he was mobile again, even if thin. He was eventually able to return home.

He now feels much happier and is very grateful for his recovery. He now views the world in a much more positive light and is loving the experience of still being alive. It is like a rebirth to him. His appreciation of the

good things of life has greatly improved, such as relationships, nature, good music and good food. He was recently seen at a local function relishing the food on offer and enjoying the company. Marie too is feeling better after a lot of stress as she has kept friends informed of his progress.

They say that you have to experience the depths of the negative before you can really begin to appreciate the positive, that which is of greatest value. This is one of the justifications for the existence of what can be described as "evil" or "destructive" in life. One commentator wrote "Tests and trials only cause agitation to weak hearts". But it requires the exercise of a strong will and personal effort to make the most of the negative experience as you come out the other side. Bob seems to have this. It is good to see you up and about Bob.

Book Review

"A Search for Sovereignty"

by Lauren Benton (2010, Cambridge UP) ISBN 9780 521 707435, RRP \$40.95

In this book, Professor Benton examines the classic notion of national "sovereignty" as adopted in Europe in recent centuries to define the nature of the contemporary national state or country.

That is, in one view, that each state has, by international agreement and recognition, absolute 'sovereign" legal power and authority over the whole of its territory within the agreed boundaries and over all the people within those boundaries, to the exclusion of all other states and people.

The author's central thesis is that the growth of European Empires overseas under the process of colonialism did not exhibit this simple, classic notion of a single, exclusive "sovereignty". Rather, the colonial claims to sovereignty of the various European states, such as in the Americas, Africa, Asia and the Pacific, really comprehended a great diversity of notions and concepts, with no single model.

This, he says, impacted in many different ways on those colonies and their peoples, as well as on the colonial masters, such as in matters of the law, politics, economics, etc., etc., with repercussions right up to the present day. He concludes that this must change our very notion of history.

He gives as an example the well-known early 20th century maps of the British Empire, showing a uniform red colour over much of the globe. This, he says, was really inaccurate.

It was more of a patchwork of colours, different shades of red and pink, with gaping holes and alarming variations, a viscous and uneven medium. Territorial control was, in many places, an incidental aim of Imperial expansion

A claimed territory might be politically fragmented and legally differentiated, and encased in irregular, porous and sometimes undefined borders. The Imperial control that was exercised was mainly over narrow bands, or corridors, or over enclaves and irregular zones around them. Claims to sovereignty were often mixed with the entanglements of local legal politics and inter-Imperial contests.

Benton illustrates this view by impressive documentation of the various claims by European powers to overseas territories and how they arose.

Interestingly, one of these illustrations is by reference to a particular case in South America that was the subject of a recent movie viewing by the Kuranda Film Society, the title being "*The Wrath of God*". Quite a gory movie from the 1970s (no doubt

much of the early colonial conquests in the Americas were quite gory), it depicts (I am not sure how accurately) a Spanish-Peruvian mid-16th century expedition over the Andes into the Amazonian jungle.

The quest was said to be for a new Eldorado or gold find for the Spanish King. It is documented that one Lope de Aguirre rebelled against the expedition leader Pedro de Ursua and induced others to follow. They installed their own puppet leader, or "King", and carried on with the expedition through the jungle down river, meeting many challenges both within their group and external to it and eventual failure.

Benton says that this case was exceptional, not because it was the subject of a revolt leading to Ursua's death, but because Aguirre refused to draw up documentation to declare that the action was caused by Ursua's tyrannical rule and so to seek a pardon from the Spanish King.

Rather, Aguirre was not afraid to declare his treasonable action in defiance of the Spanish King in his personal quest for the fabled Eldorado. News of the fate of this expedition, it was reported at the time, contributed to the quieting of rebellions in the Indies.

Benton contrasts this case with that of Raleigh, who sought riches in Central America in order to seek a pardon from the English King. Many other interesting examples are mentioned. But typically these adventures lead to a European jurisdictional net that was long and thin and strung along waterways. The up-river country was often seen as treacherous and conducive to treason.

Benton concludes that the classic notion of sovereignty is often more of a myth than a reality, more a story that politicians tell about their own power rather than a definite quality.

While Benton is only addressing the nature of Imperial colonial claims, there are parallel lessons to be learned in the modern contemporary context. In this present age, claims to traditional state sovereignty are under ever-increasing pressure from supra-national forces, as the world becomes ever more interdependent and boundaries are becoming more porous.

This is caused by many factors such as well publicised global discrepancies of wealth and opportunity, the global nature of trade, human movement and communications, the global impact of conflicts and gross human rights abuses, and the inevitable growth of regional and international regulation and agreements.

No country is fully "sovereign" in the sense previously mentioned any more. It was Donne that wrote quite a few centuries ago "No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main". This is even more true today.

A book for thoughtful readers of history.

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A Thought for May

HIS month we open our bibles and read from St John's Gospel Chapter 10 verses 11-18

Of all the images which Jesus used for his person and his work, the image of the good shepherd has shone most over the centuries of the Christian tradition. The role of the shepherd became very much linked with such values as trust, faithfulness, dependability, gentleness. However, the role of the shepherd also requires tenacity, strength, courage, leadership. If these values are placed beside the others, we avoid childish images of a Jesus who is merely meek and mild.

We have only to read the first sentence of this passage to hear Jesus define the reality of the shepherd's role with chilling foresight. "The good shepherd," says Jesus "lays down his life for the sheep." To do anything less is to betray the flock, it is to "care nothing for the sheep." "I am the good shepherd." What might that be asking of my life?

If a shepherd cares, then the question is whether I am becoming an essentially caring or a self-centred human being. That may seem obvious. Yet patterns of behaviour change in our lives, and we need to examine them from time to time. Again, if a shepherd leads, then in what sense am I leading other lives, perhaps those younger than myself. Leading can be an exercise in ego and power. It can be domineering.

Obviously, Our Lord's pattern of shepherding does not call for that. Rather, are there vocations in our lives that we could give some time to? Is there some aspect of Counselling,

Hospital visitation, Pastoral Care, children of alcoholic parents – anything like this that we could be involved in to guide others? In terms of adults, could we give time to Bible study?

Is there a self-help group that we can give something to? All of these things are shepherding. Such vocations may seem very tame and pedestrian compared with Jesus laying down his life as the good shepherd. But we are not all asked to do what Jesus did. To lay down one's life can mean many things at many different levels.

One thing is certain. You and I are never going to lay down our lives for anything until we give even a small part of ourselves for something! Surely there is not one of us who cannot respond in some way to Our Lord's call to be a shepherd.

OUR **VILLAGE IN THE RAINFOREST** quickly resumed its daily life after the flourish of activity recently: Kuranda's Fun Family Day activities, the record crowd at Kuranda Amphitheatre, school holidays and visiting tourists.

Afterwards the inevitable 'big cleanup' began. How much of that rubbish ended up in landfill I don't know, but in the future, rubbish from public events like these will be more responsibly handled as the Tablelands Regional Council Waste and Recycling department reviews the regions waste management systems.

Recently the TRC has, throughout regional high schools, promoted the Student Poster Recycling Competition to highlight household responsibility. The themes: Recycling and the future of the Tablelands and TRC – Working Towards a Cleaner Community. The winning poster (soon to be announced) will be displayed in all Tableland Libraries and on Waste Management trucks.

Take a look at TRC's website which offers four areas for householders to consider:

- Reducing the amount of waste you create (eg. take reusable bags shopping, buy in bulk to reduce packaging)
- Purchasing products that can be used over again rather than disposable products
- Creating a compost bin to put all food scraps, shredded paper, lawn and garden clippings
- · Recycling as much as possible.

As this is the Year of Reading and many books etc, are made of paper, here are a few ways we can cut down paper products and leave the trees standing.

In this issue are ways to refuse, reduce, recycle, reuse or revamp books of any kind including school textbooks, encyclopaedias, and atlases.

Ideas for other paper products such as magazines, newspapers, catalogues, comics, phone books and yellow pages, office stationery, copier/printer paper, old calendars, junk mail, office mail etc, will follow in a later edition.

Books: Refuse to buy new books. Join your local library and read theirs. Reduce your spending on books, magazines, catalogues etc, read them online, or via ipad or kindle.

Recycle your books or textbooks: Ask your local library if your collection is suitable as a donation. If not, donate them to local charities for pulping and

shredding. Or donate to needy schools in third world countries (via your local Rotary, Lions, Apex or church organisation or non government agency).e.g. www. bookaid.org donates to refugee camps, hospitals schools and universities in war torn countries.

- Donate to your school library or day care centre for children's art & craft activities or to art co-ops.
- Donate to your local hospital, nursing home or even a backpacker hostel's free book nook.
- Donate to a youth centre, women's refuge, men's shed or any waiting room.


Squirrel Gliders will usually give birth to two young, who will spend 70 days in the pouch and then a further month following their mother before becoming independent.

With her successful surgery, Shelby will be able to return to the wild. Released without the surgery, she would be unable to breed and would be ostracised by others of her kind.

Squirrel Gliders are a threatened species due mainly to habitat loss, ensuring Shelby's release adds to the survival of the species. This species have a diet of nectar, foliage, bark, fruit and insects. They will also feed on tree sap from eucalypt trees.

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

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

NAVUA SEDGE

It's that stalky green grassy plant with a pompom of seeds on top which lines all the roads that are regularly mowed. If you have but one plant in your lawn and you mow over it, you're guaranteed to have a lawn full of it in no time. Dig it out.

PIGS

All our traps are out there, but the last few are the hardest to catch. Please report sightings to us so we can see if numbers are increasing.

SNAKES

They should be slowing down now but give us a call if you don't want to share your space with one.



The Cairns Birdwing butterfly is said to be the largest in Australia. Its eggs are laid on both the Aristolochia acuminata and tagala vines. The tiny caterpillar moults several times and munches its way (you can actually hear it) to the size of a large man's finger. When it's too big to eat another thing, it morphs into a chrysalis and just hangs about for a month or more before emerging as this splendid thing. The males and females can be seen flying one above the other, about 300mm apart, in a courtship "dance" before getting serious (out of sight). They live for some weeks.

Is that our very own local frog?

special place to live. And as if to confirm that, several years ago Dr Conrad Hoskins, an evolutionary biologist, discovered that we have our very own frog species, Litoria myola, found nowhere else in the world. Since it's limited to 12 known breeding sites, totalling 3.5 square kilometres, all contained within a tiny part of our Kuranda area and estimated at only 700 individuals (2009) it's listed as critically endangered on the world IUCN Red List. Found in the lower sections of streams entering the Barron River, between Kuranda, Myola, Mantaka, Kowrowa and Oakforest, it's been hopping about for roughly 10,000 years, quite new for a species.

Everyone knows that Kuranda is a special place to live. And as if to confirm that, several years ago Dr Conrad Hoskins, an evolutionary biologist, discovered that we have our very own frog species, Litoria myola, found nowhere else in the world. Since it's limited to 12 Males and females are generally a mottled pattern of tan and brown on the upper surface and pale underneath. A green crescent is present in the upper iris and the back edge of the forearms and legs are fringed with small skin extensions.



Maybe you are reading this before April 28th; maybe you are reading this after April 28th; Regardless of the outcome of the Council elections, I would like to say "Thank You" to all Kuranda district residents for your support over the past four years and "Best Wishes" to the new Council which will be in place by late May.

Council Budget 2012-13: One of the first tasks of the new Council will be to finalise the 2012-13 Budget. The current Council has been working on the development of the Budget for some months.

"Business as Usual": You can be confident that Council services will continue as normal, despite the election and transition period. If you have a complaint or request for Council action, you can easily and quickly log this, either via email to info@trc.qld.gov.au, or by using the link "Report a Problem" on the Council website, or phone 1 300 362 242.

Road Projects: Good news received last week that Federal funding (NDRRA program) has been approved for major road projects in this area. The Mona Mona Road has been allocated \$2.1 million for reconstruction; Black Mountain Road \$1.8 million, Ganyan Drive/Speewah Road \$660,000; Still awaiting approval for the submission for funds for work on Koah Road and Windy Hollow Road. In addition, the Fallon Road Bridge is planned for construction in the coming year and the Morton Street/Rob Veivers Drive intersection is planned for July-October this year.

Increased hours for Kuranda Transfer Station: Council has approved an increase in opening hours for the Transfer Station. The contracts are due for renewal and new hours of operation will start from July 1st. The Transfer Station will open for four full days each week from 8am to 5pm on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays. These new times will be advertised beforehand.

Kuranda Pedestrian, Traffic and Parking Study: The Final Report with over 60 recommendations was presented to Council last week by Bitzios Consultants. The full Report is available on the Council website. The recommendations range from immediate minor

signage improvements to more long-term traffic improvements. The project has been fully costed and will be included in budget considerations for 12/13 and future years. The new Council will make the decision on funding and budget.

Kuranda Infrastructure Committee: The Committee has a vacancy for a Community Rep which will be advertised soon. All loans have now been paid off and the fund is in a healthy position. The delivery and construction of a number of projects is now commencing. Design work for the Riverwalk project has been completed and is awaiting construction. Council is still negotiating with Queensland Rail regarding the possibility of a rail crossing at the end of the walking track. The new Visitors Centre is in design phase and Charles Wright Architects have been appointed. (Construction to be completed within 12 months.) Design for the improvements at the traffic area at the front of Skyrail/Scenic Rail are almost complete, as is the Covered Walkway from the station to the village.

Fluoride: Council has written officially to the State Minister requesting review of the requirement for all Councils to add fluoride to town water supplies. The completion of the Kuranda Fluoride Plant is currently delayed til approx late July/early August. Before the fluoride is added to the water supply, by law, residents must receive at least one month's notice beforehand.

Recycling Strategy Plan for TRC: A strategy Plan for managing Recycling across the region is currently being developed for consideration by Council in June/July 2012. If you have particular comments regards this, please contact TRC Environmental Planning Officer, Kirsty Lamperd at kirstyl@trc.qld.gov.au or by phoning Kirsty at 4043 4390. In the interim, recyclables can be left at the special bin at the Kuranda Transfer Station.

Tourism Kuranda: The tourism promotion group continues to do a wonderful job of promoting the Kuranda Village, with Marc Sleeman providing the hard work. Members of the TK Committee are all volunteers who devote hours to promote Kuranda. The current Committee is due to retire in August and nominations for positions on the Committee will be advertised mid-year.

Library Hours of Operation: The new Financial Year will also hopefully see an increase in Library opening hours. As the Kuranda Library also provides basic Council office services, it is proposed that the Library also be open on Mondays. This decision is not yet finalised.


RosCommon Speewah: The small unisex toilet block will be constructed at RosCommon near the Children's playground. The project is still funded but will be delayed by a few months and will be constructed later this year.

Kuranda Community Precinct: Applications for use of the community spaces in Building C (the newest building) have now been approved. Groups such as the Junior Rugby League and Yoga and Dance classes will soon be using the facilities. Council has ensured that the current facilities available at the CWA Hall and the Kuranda Recreation Centre are not disadvantaged. Tenders for the removal of the older buildings (buildings A and B) are now open. Council is working towards the future construction of a purpose built facility at the Community Precinct. Planning work has already commenced for the establishment of the Library at the Community Precinct. The entire lower floor of the Block C building will be used to create a spacious community Library and resources hub, with space for small meeting rooms and additional library services for our community.


Thank you to the Kuranda Community for engaging in the extensive public consultation last year. The Advisory Committee will soon be reformed and will work towards a long-term plan for the facilities. It will take some time until the site is able to be used to the full potential.

Off-Leash Area for Dogs: Many pet owners have asked about "off-leash" areas for their dogs. I have made a submission for funding of such an area in Kuranda through the 2012-13 Budget. The area would be fenced appropriately. The exact location has not been decided.

I'm standing for election this year to represent you, the residents of Kuranda, Mareeba, Speewah, Koah, Myola, Oak Forest and Bilwon.

Most people in the Kuranda region know me through my previous role as Post Master and, over the past decade, as the mail delivery contractor. Many also know me through my involvement in executive positions with over 30 regional organisations over the past three decades. They include the Queensland Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the RSL,

I was initially reluctant to stand, even though I missed out last election by a whisker. Too many things have been half fixed, or half done. Speewah Road, Ganyan Drive, Koah Road and many others are glaring examples. Windy Hollow Road or Shanty Creek Road are bizarre responses to normal road maintenance. A playground built without shade, or contracting road machinery that cannot get over a bridge are sad indicators no basic common sense. Reducing the old primary school development from 5 buildings and 26 rooms to one building with two community rooms at a cost of over \$250,000 is difficult to believe, let alone to boast as good achievement. It is not — it is a tragic failure! Council refused the offers of assistance and never considered facilitation — as opposed to top down direction.

Those residents who don't know me, I urge you to ask the many locals who do know me well. Many don't like me, but more do. They will tell you that I can be hard and will drive for what I see is right – against any odds. Sometimes my comments are harsh, but rarely wrong. That is what our community needs in Council. We need someone who understands board management procedure and the bureaucratic processes; but who also recognises that you must have vision from ground up. Otherwise the wheels fall off.

We need someone who will fight for our fair share, and for what is needed. We need someone who finds solutions rather than quoting obstacles. I will be the councillor from division 8 rather than the councillor for division 8. If a Dimbulah need is critically desperate – they get first go. But we will get our fair and our full share; and our own desperate needs will be fixed – first time, every time. That is the best and cheapest way to fix problems.

This is not an easy job I am placing myself forward for. It is a hard 80 hour a week task that must be done efficiently, economically, responsibly.


