From Wet Tropics Management Authority: Individuals and organisations who have contributed to conserving, protecting and raising awareness of the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area (the Area) were recognised on Friday 6 September at the 20th Cassowary Awards.

More than 170 people enjoyed the prestigious event at Tjapukai NOW on Djabugay Country in Smithfield, where awards were presented across eight categories to leaders in conservation, rehabilitation, tourism, innovation, education and climate change response in the Wet Tropics.

Hosted by the Wet Tropics Management Authority (the Authority), the Cassowary Awards are the only awards program in Australia to recognise excellence in community contributions to World Heritage management.

The Authority's Chair, Chrissy Grant, said the Cassowary Awards were a night to gather and pay tribute to champions of the Wet Tropics, some of whom have dedicated years or even decades to helping protect/raise awareness of the Area.

"The Authority has long recognised that caring for the Area is no easy or short-term task, and can't be done without the community. It was community that led to the Wet Tropics' World Heritage listing and it is community that continues to work tirelessly to ensure its Outstanding Universal Value is maintained for future generations."

Ms Grant said it is also community that nominate these Wet Tropics champions and community that sponsor the event, making the awards possible.

"For us to be celebrating the 20th Cassowary Awards is a real milestone and testament to the enduring commitment of the Wet Tropics community to continue to be custodians of the Area."

2024 QUEENSLAND STATE GENERAL ELECTION - 26 OCTOBER 2024

Get ready to vote on what counts for you in Queensland's State General Election to be held on 26 October 2024. Voting is compulsory.

As this edition goes to print before the election has been officially called (the writ which starts the election process is to be issued on Tuesday 1 October 2024) and before the process to certify candidates and generate ballot papers has begun, *The Kuranda Paper* is only able to provide general information in this edition. For all queries and election information including checking your registration and changing registration details, go to the Electoral Commission of Queensland website www.ecq.qld.gov.au.

The election period will begin when Jeanette Young, the Governor of Queensland, issues the writ for the election on 1 October. The election dates below are determined by legislation. The writ will specify additional dates such as the close of candidate nominations.

- Issue of writ Tuesday 1 October 2024
- Candidate nominations open Wednesday 2 October 2024
- Early voting period Monday 14 October to Friday 25 October 2024 from 8am–6pm (excluding the weekend)
- Postal vote applications close Monday 14 October 2024 at 7pm
- Election day Saturday 26 October 2024 from 8am-6pm
- Postal vote return deadline Tuesday 5 November 2024

In Kuranda, voting will be available on Election Day (26 October) at the Kuranda CWA Hall on the corner of Barang and Thongon Streets between the hours of 8am to 6pm. Early voting is not expected to be available in Kuranda itself. Postal vote applications are now open.

A GOOD SIGN

Like many local residents I am disturbed by the progress (or lack of), on the Kuranda Range repairs. Luckily I may have the solution.

Regular users of the range road will be familiar with the signs (pictures attached) at the Kuranda and Smithfield ends of the road. On a conventional map north is up and south is down. Although not marked, this is the case with the Smithfield sign. You will notice that Kuranda is on the left of the map and Smithfield on the right.

However.

On the Kuranda sign they have drawn north at the bottom and south at the top, unconventional for a map. This means when reading left to right, Smithfield is on the left, which might be conventional for an upside down map if Smithfield were the nearest town. But it's not.





I believe this lack of convention has resulted in many travellers becoming lost on our daily commutes and the costly diversion of road maintenance crews doing searches. Hence the \$34M in cameras?

Conventional wisdom would suggest swapping the Kuranda sign with the current Smithfield sign. This would mean at Kuranda, north is up, south is down, and the nearest town is the first one listed when reading left to right. And Kuranda has always been a little left. Right?

Alas, by also moving the Kuranda sign to Smithfield, north would still be down and south would still be up. The upside is, Smithfield would be nearest town in a conventional read from left to right.

Perhaps, (and this may be unconventional for government

departments) they should be conventional and put the same sign at Kuranda, as at Smithfield, where north is up, south is down, west is left and east is right. Right?

And to overcome the whole reading left to right conundrum they could add a little arrow saying "You are here", however briefly.

Then just fix the road!

Unfortunately it still remains difficult to see a GP, although we were lucky to secure additional locum doctors to work in the latter part of August and early September.

Dr Daniel Sacoor has been here on several occasions and repeatedly proves a great asset to this practice. We are still waiting on the arrival of permanent doctor who is moving from Holland to work in Kuranda. Unfortunately the bureaucratic process has endlessly delayed the start date and we are hoping that he will be here early next year.

One issue that is causing further difficulties for the medical practice is the 'DNA rate' ... Did Not Attend. One day in early September, we had 12 patients who had booked and confirmed appointments and yet failed to turn up. Some had booked an appointment in the morning and failed to turn up for a consultation in the afternoon! So I would really encourage all patients to attend for booked appointments. If you are unable to attend then PLEASE give us a call—with as much notice as possible—to cancel that appointment, as we have a huge waiting list of people waiting to be seen. Please be mindful of something as simple as the 'DNA rate' can be the straw that breaks the camel's back and will lead to the closure of this



Tablelands based artist, Helen Hume, has travelled widely in the West Indies, Asia, and Mexico in particular. Although travelling overseas Helen's works also relate to outback Australia. The ancient cultural aspects of each of these countries feature in Helen's artworks in this collaborative exhibition Travellers Crossing.

Toni and Helen add character to their work. They radiate a positive energy that could also be called hope. Soft yet powerful, their artworks imagine the possibility of a future where diverse cultures will be beautifully intertwined together, not fighting, not competing, just being. Creating a cross-cultural, cross-border dialogue in the fabric of their artworks.

These two artists have crossed paths over the years on both the Tableland Regional Gallery Advisory Committee during the gallery design years, the Tablelands Regional Arts Development Fund committee, and in turn, in their local Shires after de-amalgamation in 2016.

Councillor Visit to Kuranda: Infrastructure Projects in Focus

During the first week of September, the Councillors and I inspected several projects currently underway in Kuranda and celebrated the completion of a few others. It was a great opportunity to see first-hand the progress being made to critical projects in and around Kuranda.

We visited two sites that required landslip remediation works following Tropical Cyclone Jasper, namely the Hilltop Close Reservoir and Barron Falls Road. We also inspected the ongoing repairs at Myola Road and the site of the gully crossing replacement at Jarawee Road.

It was wonderful to see the recently completed Kuranda Heights Cemetery, located at 70 Kuranda Heights Road, the upgraded Anzac Park, and the work completed at the Kuranda River Walk after tonnes of sand was moved from the track. The River Walk and Anzac Park are both very popular attractions for locals and visitors alike.

We are committed to upgrades to current infrastructure, and we visited the Kuranda Skate Park that is currently being upgraded by TRACQS. The project should be completed soon, and the Councillors and I look forward to the re-opening of this facility for the community.

Crawford's Corner **I**

\$2.65 Million for Kuranda District State College

Congratulations to Kuranda District State College which was were successful in receiving \$2.65 million to upgrade their Multi-Purpose Sports facility. This funding will go towards expanding and weatherproofing the existing sports facility and will include a new canteen, new covered walkways, new gym, grandstand, and toilets. It will be designed so it can still be opened to allow for the beautiful views and breeze to pass through.

This funding is through our Go For Gold funding. The Go for Gold Fund prioritises locations in regional or remote Queensland, aiming to increase active pathways in communities with lower student participation rates in sports. The overarching goal is to ensure that more young Queenslanders have access to modern sporting infrastructure, which will encourage them to be more active and foster community use of school sports facilities. Thank you to Principal Desley Kirby and the team for having me to discuss the exciting new plans.

I'm working with the school and Kuranda Envirocare to create a rainforest corridor on an unused paddock on the Department of Education's landholdings which will link two habitat areas of the critically endangered Kuranda Tree frog. There are opportunities for students to become involved in data mapping which will help with the conservation of this unique species. Students and the broader community will be able to come together to assist Kuranda Envirocare with vegetation planting. Visiting school and university students from interstate and overseas can partner with the school to study and monitor the new frog habitat.

Kuranda Village Tourism & Infrastructure Funding

The Queensland Government will allocate a \$1.7 million boost to Mareeba Shire Council to support tourism infrastructure projects in Kuranda Village. This will contribute to the liveability and vitality of the town centre, ensuring that our village in the rainforest retains its uniqueness.

This funding has been released from the Skyrail levy and is in addition to more than \$14 million that has already been allocated directly to the Mareeba Shire Council as part of Works for Queensland funding for their discretional use for projects across the Shire since 2016.

Great news also for the Kuranda Amphitheatre, receiving \$73,487 to upgrade their facility and install a solar system. This funding was received from the Super Round of the Gambling Community Benefit Fund. These upgrades will help reduce operating costs and contribute to green energy initiatives. Vital upgrades to the venue will help to continue to attract quality events. Well done to the team of volunteers who dedicate their time to this great community asset.

Community Nursery and Landcare

Caring for Kuranda's environment "by standing on the shoulders of those who have gone before"

A wonderful, but underutilised, resource

The Australian Tropical Herbarium (ATH), at James Cook University in Cairns, is a joint venture of the CSIRO, Parks Australia, Queensland Department of Science and Environment, and James Cook University.

The herbarium is a research institution that houses over 180,000 dried collections of plants as well as 'wet' collections (14,000 jars) and a DNA/tissue bank. The entire collection is databased and details of its collection may be found online at Atlas of Living Australia.

Significant amongst its collections are those of:

- Bernie Hyland, Bruce Gray and Andrew Ford which are important voucher material for the online Key to Australian Tropical Rainforest Plants (>45,000 specimens), and
- Hugo Flecker (1884-1957) an early collector in North Queensland who was a part of the North Queensland Naturalists' club (>3,500 specimens).

The herbarium employs over 20 staff and attracts a large number of research students. There is also a large number of adjunct researchers and volunteers who assist with curation of the collection or undertake taxonomic research. Some of the projects include research related to: ethnobotany, biodiscovery, vegetation mapping, biosecurity, conservation, and the development of tools to assist plant identification.

The herbarium maintains a small Public Reference Collection that is available, 9.30am to 4pm Monday to Friday, for the public to identify plants. No appointment is necessary, but please ensure you register with the receptionist upon arrival.





Book Review - The Medicinal Garden by Caroline Parker with illustrations by Lucy Mora, published by Thames & Hudson Australia Wurundjeri Country, released



Publishers Blurb: Grow your garden and herbal first-aid kit with herbs, flowers, and foraged weeds. The Medicinal Garden is a considered guide to revitalising your health by soothing your mind, body, and green thumb. Add a nourishing boost to your diet with a variety of recipes for salads, snacks, treats, and drinks. Featuring easy, natural remedies for your skin, gut, muscles, heart, and mind with recipes for oils, tinctures, compresses, steams, washes and more.

Welcome to spring! It's time to treat, feed and soothe-all from your medicinal garden.


As soon as I saw this book, I knew that it would make its home in Kuranda Library. It has a fresh, pleasing design using beautiful, yet simple, painted illustrations that really compliment the themes and captivate the reader's attention—bringing the herbs and recipes to life. The black borders which segment each page are reminiscent of the view of a rural landscape from an aeroplane, with fenced off paddocks and an abundance of open space. The uncluttered layout and minimal text is calming and as serene as the recipes, remedies, and infusions that the book contains. It truly is a well thought out and gloriously arranged book which celebrates the bounty of nature on every page. The recipes and remedies contain basic procedures made from readily available herbs, weeds, and mulches.

The book demonstrates the many ways herbs can be used for general land care. For example, they provide natural fungicides, loosen up compacted ground, improve water drainage, and aerate the soil due to the deep taproots grown by herbs. I even learned high nitrogen weeds make great compositing activators! There is also information on how to use herbs and weeds for complementary planting, and gardening construction for specific soil types and drainage requirements.

I particularly liked the section 'How to Build Your Herbal Medicine Cabinet' which features interesting items such as ginger and lemongrass lozenges, sleep, headache and flu posies, tinctures for sunburn, steams to clear the head and lungs, and sore throat sprays. There is also a herbal chart which lists the herb name and an illustration, the part of the plant that can be used, the condition it can improve, preparation instructions, the body part it will effect, and details of possible cautions in the use of the plant.

I would recommend this book to everyone, from people interested in alternative or natural remedies, to the courtyard gardener who is excited about experimenting with the natural benefits of plants. The presentation of information in The Medicinal Garden is striking and modern, however, I would have liked to see acknowledgement that plant-based cures have been practiced for hundreds of years by First Nations peoples with extensive medicinal plant knowledge.

Performing Place,

Practising Memories

Books we've been reading included Performing Place, Practising Memories: Aboriginal Australians, Hippies and the State by local author and anthropologist Dr Rosita

This covers the wave of 'counter-culture' people who moved into rural Kuranda in the 1970s. With an emphasis on the relationship between the settlers and local Aboriginal population, the book concentrates on the political anthropology of place and performance through a number of linked social dramas and interviews about the sometimes-contested use of both public and private spaces. These include the Kuranda Amphitheatre, the Markets, the building of Skyrail, and more.

Next up for discussion was the Amazing Ants of the Wet Tropics Field Guide - a free, fun and interactive guide for parents and kids about all the ants found around FNQ is published by the Wet Tropics Management Authority. Still dealing with the current infestation of yellow crazy ants as a priority, the guide is a popular introduction to citizen science. Free copies are downloadable at www.wettropics.gov.au/ ant-guide

One group member was reading Buddha books as part of an online study group, while another was reading the Picador Book of Worst Journeys - a serious collection of travel stories by some recognisable big name international authors.

A find from Possum Corner was an old and battered Penguin Short Stories of Henry Lawson edited by John Barnes. What better way to study the core elements of the short story form for a budding writer to emulate? Speaking of Lawson, when it came to screen, there was applause for Leah Purcell's movie The Drovers Wife: the legend of Molly Johnson, a retelling of the dramatic 1892 short story by Henry Lawson but from an Indigenous and feminist perspective. Notably, the UnderStory Film Festival of the best FNQ-made films screened at the Kuranda Library in late August were very much enjoyed.

When it came to the box, the Aussie Return to Paradise series based on the successful BBC Death in Paradise series set on the fictional island of Saint Marie in the Caribbean got a downward-tilted thumb, while the British Unforgotten series on ABC got a thumbs up. Under the Banner of Heaven, a drama series on SBS-on-demand based on happenings within a fundamentalist US faith group, also got a mention.

What could not pass without comment were the close parallels between the 4-season Succession series starring Brian Cox and Australian actor Sarah Snook and the real-life drama that sees Rupert Murdoch and his children currently in a US court contesting the anointing of Lachlan as Rupert's sole choice to inherit the helm of his media empire. Note that 93-year-old Rupert married his fifth wife in early 2024! Currently in the same dynasty cast is the 3-part Australian Story on Lachlan Murdoch himself, and the James Packer interview focussing on his struggles with bipolar on Seven Network's Spotlight. When life imitates art, who needs

Unlike films, books don't have a rating system like PG, MA and R to act as a warning for readers. The homework writing shared did raise questions about warnings to readers regarding content that may be triggering, and whether or not this was necessary or acted as a spoiler. There is something to be said for hitting the reader hard from the first page in the hope of achieving a page-turner in a similar way that the trend in crime movies now is to establish the crime in the first 30 seconds. But on the other hand, if the opening is too graphic, the reader may not go on at all.

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

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
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

Are you interested in taking a walk in the Kuranda Cemetery?

KHS is working on bringing together resources using public records and family recollections to discover history in Kuranda's Cemetery. We've started with a well-known Kuranda family, the Veivers. Here's a brief outline of the past four generations of the Veivers family in Kuranda.



The grave of George Alexander Veivers and his wife Joy Elizabeth Veivers. The grave number is K152 (AU Cemetery INDEX) above the parking area at top level Kuranda Cemetery.

George Alexander Veivers II, born 1922, died 1976 aged 54. His wife, Joy Elizabeth Veivers, died 2018 aged 91 yrs. (grave K152)

Their son, Ronnie Veivers remembers his father George was "a good humoured, quiet man who used gestures at times rather than speaking, played the piano and harmonica. He passed away from heart disease." Ron shared that "Joy used a firm hand to keep her 'boys'; George, Ron, Chris and Des in check." Joy played the mouth organ and button accordion, living to just shy of 92." George II was in partnership with his younger brother Maurice (Maurie) (b. 1924, d. 1997). They assisted in the war effort by supplying red cedar for the rifle butts on .303 army rifles. George's timber cutting family ran their own bullock teams from the Speewah area where the family owned various blocks of land. Their first timber lorry was a 1942 Ford and the bullock team loaded the lorry. George was the mechanically able partner and was motivated to buy an Allis Chalmers crawler tractor in 1954 which had a winch and a steel bobtail which was towed behind. They built ramps to enable them to load the logs onto the lorry, and so the bullock teams were retired. George delivered the logs to Cairns Timber Limited, Sawmillers, later known as Capricornia Plywoods.

George Alexander Veivers (George I) (grave K57) (George II's father) was born 1884, died 1965 at 81 yrs.

The family ran Brahman cattle in the Clohesy, Koah and Davies Creek areas. A timber cutting family, George drove bullock teams down past the Bottom Pub to the railway station. George I's wife, Rose May Veivers (née Newman) was born 1881. Rose died 1985, she and her 3-month-old daughter, Enid Rose Veivers, have a combined grave (K15A). Their children were Irene, George Alexander, Maurice, Ivy and Enid.

Walter Hill Veivers was George I's father. He was born in Canonbie Dumfriesshire Scotland in 1848 and came to Australia at age 23 yrs. Walter Vievers died 1912 aged 63 yrs from a stroke. Georgina Black (Hope) Veivers was Walter Hill Veivers' wife, born 1860 and died in 1935 aged 75 yrs. There is a grave stone on the Roscommon property at Speewah.

Walter had been invited to come to Australia by his Uncle Walter Hill – brother of his mother Mrs Grace (Hill) Veivers. From a large family, he arrived in Queensland in 1873 by the ship *Young Australia*. In 1876 he married Georgina Black Hope, fourth daughter of the late George Hope, of Nerang. They had eight children – six sons and two daughters. Walter arrived in the Cairns' district in 1883 'pulling timber', his wife worked as a midwife. They moved to Speewah in 1893.

From TROVE CP2012 – The uncle "Walter Hill born 1821 Scotsdyke, Dumfriesshire Scotland, arrived 1852 in Australia. Walter Hill died 1904 Conon Lea, Eight Mile Plains. Walter Hill, a Botanist, was the first Superintendent of Brisbane Botanical Gardens 1859, well known for the introduction of many commercial crops around Qld., including macadamias. He was in the Barron River area in 1876."

We are all too familiar with the small bush flies that fuss around our faces and try to mop up moisture from around our eyes and even from our mouths. We seasonally endure the biting March Flies as they attempt to drink our blood. Although this is the classic annoying fly behaviour as we know it, it does not apply to all flies. There are flies that are not in the least bit interested in us humans; their focus lies elsewhere, in their own kind - other invertebrates.

With a robust and powerful body, spiny legs and huge eyes, Robber Flies are predators to be feared in the insect world. Although their name suggests they steal a meal from another insect, they are in fact actually stealing their lives. They will often patrol a territory, keeping a watchful eye for any unsuspecting insect that looks like suitable prey. Their prey consists both of flying and crawling insects, particularly those which live above the ground in leaves and grasses. Once a Robber Fly spots its target, it zooms in and plucks the insect up with its powerful limbs, plunging its needle-like proboscis into its victim. It will then find a safe spot to land and suck the juices out of its meal. Many Robber Flies are active at night, and will often catch a large number of other insects napping. They also feed on invertebrates which are mobile at night such as crickets, cockroaches, beetles and spiders.

Another fly which occurs locally that has little interest in us is the Hairy Maggot Blowfly, Chrysomya rufifacies. Blowflies are a very familiar group of flies, and most people have experienced them at a BBQ or in the less pleasant company of a dead animal - irresistible to blowflies. You would think that being the first to a dead carcass would be the best thing in the world for a blowie, but not in this case. The Hairy Maggot Blowfly arrives later once all the other blowfly maggots are already at work. Its maggots then go to work attacking and feeding upon the other maggots. In many ways this species is actually beneficial to us in reducing the number of 'primary' blowflies, and also helps to reduce the incidence of fly strike on sheep.

Some flies will attack other insects in more subtle ways.

known as a host. They usually have some sneaky way of getting their eggs onto the host without the host knowing or being able to do anything about it. Their larvae then go to work, usually eating the least important internal organs first so that their host lives as long as possible, providing them with a nutritious food source. Once they have had their fill (or when the host dies due to the damage) they leave the body and pupate in the ground. I have personally witnessed a large stick insect drop dead and several large well-fed parasitic fly maggots crawl out of the body.

With thousands of species of flies, there are of course many that are interested in pestering us and other vertebrate animals, but in the scheme of things much of their continual 'warring' takes place within their own invertebrate world.

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
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The Speewah District Residents Association

Lying awake for the umpteenth time with that horrible kind of indigestion that feels like you have either swallowed an adult bandicoot or are in the throes of a heart attack, I made a vow to buy a pair of cute jammies, something suitable for being found in rigor mortis by young paramedics hoping for a more eventful lifesaving evening than rescuing ageing hypochondriacs with severe dyspepsia.

You may or may not know that old adage, "One cannot think well, love well, sleep well, if one has not dined well". Personally I always thought that was a load of codswallop (polite term for bs).

"Um, have we got a salad coming?" I would ask plaintively, which would be met by a withering look from my trendy friends, and the rolling of eyes by the waiter. What's more, because it was "minceur" and thus in vogue, it cost twice as much for half as much food.

My Dad went to cookery classes when I was a young teenager, and all of a sudden our salads turned into gourmet grazing platters. I think I have mentioned in a previous column that tinned mandarin oranges appeared in our classic side salad of lettuce, tomato and cucumber, mostly from Dad's garden. Whatever they lacked in creativity, they made up for in flavour, being home grown, but they lacked that certain je ne sais quoi. A soupçon of shredded zucchini, or rocket, or even a nasturtium leaf wouldn't have gone astray. These were the days before microgreens or home-sprouted mung beans, artichoke hearts, artificial sprinkles or sunflower seeds.

Reading the above, you would be excused for thinking I have been to French lessons lately. As a Pom of my generation, we learned French at school and I suppose we were talking about Cuisine minceur (the slimming kitchen) which was 'invented' by Michel Guérard, whose longevity (91) was a result no doubt, of his healthy diet.

As I got older and wiser and could make my own decisions about what to make for dinner, I relished this freedom. To my mind, it was one of the best parts of growing up and becoming independent, and one reason why I would hate to be a dog in my next life.

Living with three guys and two girls in a flat in South Kensington (I just Googled the street, and our flat would now be worth \$3m!), we girls cooked for the boys when they were nice to us. That was actually most of the time; they were a great trio, but they were boys,

> and boys will be, well, boys and at our age then, I wouldn't put it past them to accidentally poison us.

So on Saturday nights we girls were off with our boyfriends or doing whatever we did in those days, which I only remember as fun, and the boys would go out, get stonkered, come home and cook a late

night, alcohol-induced fried meal. The frying pan would be left on the top of the stove, two inches deep in congealed fat through which could be clearly seen a trail of mouse feet and tiny teeth marks on Sunday morning. We could hear those mice all night, running around in the roof. They sounded more like a pack of staffies, but I suppose that wasn't surprising given their diet of solid fat.

In a saucepan, on the roof outside the kitchen window, Hugh, the nerd, would leave his smelly socks soaking to hang up on Sunday morning to be ready for work on Monday. We girls never did cook in that saucepan.

Following a dream, and a boyfriend, or maybe I should join those two words, I choofed off


As a Geologist's assistant, in other words my then geologist boyfriend's love interest, Johannesburg Consolidated Investments paid for all our food. The Swazi and Mozambique camp cooks loved this free rein, cooking something like 7-8kg of meat every night with ne'er a trace of vegetable. The reasoning behind this huge amount of cooking was that it was far beyond what we, as the five strong geological team, could

eat, as well they knew, and they would get the leftovers to take back to the compound. A veritable feast, enough to feed all their mates. As a result of that and experience with pork (only available in the expat supermarket and probably ancient) in Abu Dhabi, I very rarely eat any meat apart from the odd steak these days.

Arriving in Australia in 1977, I became hooked on a weekly visit to the Drummovne markets, where in those days meat, fish and vegetables were so cheap, and my friend and I would buy in 'bulk' and share. Contemplating different potatoes one day, I asked my Irish friend why pink skinned potatoes were considered superior. In case you don't know, purple skinned potatoes are higher in antioxidants, but she said they taste better and she should know; she's Irish.

Suddenly, I dropped the potato, grabbed her arm, turned on my heel and hurtled through the crowds, hearing my friend breathlessly muttering "What, what?" We ran to my car, where I shoved her into the passenger side without explanation, and hopped into the driver's seat. We raced back over the Drummoyne Bridge, me yelling eee err eee err out of the window, for no other reason than to take my mind off what I had done. We broke all speed limits heading for my unit in Artarmon as I explained I had left potatoes on the stove for a potato salad for our lunch on return from the market.

The building I lived in was home to myriads of elderly folk, and I could see the headlines the next day. "Dumb blonde and Irish friend responsible for multiple deaths after burning spuds". We got back to a pan welded to the stove element, black as the ace of spades but thank God, no deaths (and no potatoes).



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
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

Red Leaf Amaranth and Pigeon Pea

Saving seeds from your organically grown garden for replanting increases ecological biodiversity and strengthens local seed availability. It keeps our genetic food heritage alive.

Pigeon Pea is flowering and setting pods at the moment. The bush is nitrogen fixing and good for mulch. The pea is edible green or dried and you can make a flour as well. They contain a high level of protein.

The Red-winged parrots love the pods and peas so I bagged a few pods to make sure I have seeds for the future. We share and enjoy each others company and I love their call. One year the parrots stripped a whole bush and the bush eventually died. I quick-smart learned from this experience. Harvest the seeds for seed saving when the pods are dried, brown and just before they open up.

I spotted the Bean pod sucking bug (there are two species - Riptortus serripes and Riptortus linearis) in the Pigeon pea bush. That's bad news. I usually find them on my beans. They feed on the juice in the seeds and the beans fail to mature. The seed pods shrivel and die when attacked by Riptortus. I go in the garden in the morning and give the *Riptortus* a shake up and tell them to go elsewhere.

Marigold is one of my favourite plants. They are great as a companion plant. Marigold attracts lots of different pollinating insects. Mine have been flowering for months and I harvested lots of seeds last week to share with my community. The seed pods must be completely dry and you harvest the seeds on a dry, sunny day around noon.

Over the years I have compiled a list of companion plants. The list is available at www.acreativewriter.com go to Archive. Use search box, type in 'Companion planting'. Click read more and you will see my full list. When you practise

companion planting you are creating a friendship among the plants and produce happy seeds for the future. Plant seeds of kindness and friendship will grow.

Red leaf Amaranth has been very productive in my garden. I use the

leaves in salad when they are

very young. The leaves are a great source of antioxidants. Older leaves go in the soup or stir-fry. Cooked leaves are a rich source of vitamin A and C and calcium. The birds love them too, so keep an eye out for when the seeds are ready for harvesting as the birds will nip off the flowers. The seeds can be added to any bread making.

The Seed Savers' Handbook by Michel and Jude Fanton is a great book and covers all you need to know about growing the plants and how to save seeds.

Come along. Join a seed savers group and you become part of supporting the survival and thriving of diverse foods for future generations and help improve strong adaptations for plant species.

Northern Bettong Field Trip at Emerald

Buluwai Rangers were pleased to be involved in the recent Northern Bettong Recovery Team meeting and field trip at Emerald Creek. The field trip was organised TERRAIN NRM other and included agencies involved in the preservation of the species.

The crew were excited to see the interest in bettongs on Buluwai

country and the many activities that are funded to care for threatened species that will ensure stability of the local population going forward. In contrast to Buluwai country, where they are thriving, in other areas where the bettong once lived, they are not faring so well due to country being degraded and no longer able to support the species.

Last year Buluwai Rangers were involved with the translocation of bettongs from Davies Creek to a predatorfree enclosure at the Australian Wildlife Conservancy's Mount

Zero-Taravale Sanctuary, 80km north-west of Townsville on Gugu Badun country. The translocated population is now established and breeding which is great news for the project and helping to heal Gugu Badun country.

The next step is for our Buluwai Rangers to work with Western Yalanji Rangers and the Northern Bettong Recovery Team to increase bettong numbers at Mt Spurgeon, the only other place with a tiny wild population.




















A guide to the pronunciation of Djabugay words

/a:/ is pronounced like the /a/ sound in "father" but longer e.g. **buda:dji** (carpet snake)
/i/ is pronounced like the /i/ in the word "bin" e.g.

bina (ear)

(ear)
/i;/ the vowel sound is lengthened and pronounced like the vowel sound in "heat", "beat", "feet" e.g. biri: (again)

/u/ is pronounced as the vowel sound in the English word

"book" e/g. **mudu** (back)
/u:/ the vowel is lengthened and pronounced as the vowel sound in the words "good", "tool", "rule" e.g. **djungguu**: (behind)

Consonants

/dj/ The sound is like a /d/ and a /j/ pronounced simultaneously e.g. **djulbin** (tree)
/g/ is pronounced as in the word "gun" e.g. **gindan** (moon)

/rr/ a trilled, or rolled /r/ as in Scottish pronunciation of the word "sporran" e.g. **burra-v** (to fly)

the word "sporran" e.g. **burra-y** (to fly)
as in the American pronunciation of /r/ in car
e.g. **biri** (fire)

/ny/ is like the initial /n/ in onion, like an /n/ and a /y/ pronounced simultaneously e.g. **nyurra** (you) /ng/ as in the word "singer" e.g. **bungan** (sun) when you see the n.g broken by a stop do not run the

two sounds together e.g. **djin.gal** (sky)
ngg/ is pronounced as the ng sound in the word "finger"
e.g. **nyinggarra** (eel)

/ay/ is generally pronounced as in the English word "eye' e.g. **Djabugay**

Stress

When saying Djabugay words which syllables should we stress?

In words of two syllables, the first syllable is stressed e.g. $\underline{\mathbf{bi}}$ na (ear).

In words of three syllables, the first syllable is stressed e.g. **gan**yarra (crocodile).

However, if a long vowel occurs in the second syllable of a word of three syllables, it is stressed e.g. buda:dji (carpet spake)

In words with more than three syllables, stress falls on the first syllable and on the syllable before the last one e.g. **gan**yarra – **ng**gu (crocodile).

St Saviour's Thought for October

This month we focus on a passage from St Marks Gospel and read Chapter 8 verses 27-26. This month's reading brings us face to face with one of the great questions of the Bible, a question that has been asked in particular circumstances in the past, but which confronts anyone in any age who claims to follow Jesus of Nazareth.

Who do men say that I am?" asks Jesus, and receives various answers from his disciples. We too face different answers in our time. We live in a world where there are many responses to any question asked. Yet we often have to commit ourselves and make a decision. "But who do you say

That is the question every Christian must come to terms with. To respond to it we cannot use merely intellectual assent. Jesus Christ is not an intellectual problem which we try to solve. Jesus Christ is a person, a relationship, to which we respond with commitment, or not. "The Son of man must suffer ... be rejected ... be killed ... and rise."

When we look at the sequence that way, we realise it forms a creed, a statement of belief about Our Lord. It reminds us that our relationship with him cannot be one of mere sentimental cosiness. His life teaches us certain grim but glorious truths about our own lives. No life is without its cross. No life is without rejection. No life is without the thousand daily deaths that come from the struggle.

Above all and this is the good news at the heart of the Gospel of Jesus Christ no life need be without its rising from these things with the help of his grace. "Get behind me, Satan." These truths are not easy to accept. It is a question we all in our own way will try to avoid. When Peter tries to move Jesus off this painful subject, he is acting from deepest instinct. Yet Jesus is extremely stern with Peter, and we can but presume that our unwillingness to face these realities earns the same sternness. Jesus utters three massive truths about life in the last verses of this reading.

First, we must "take up [our] cross." We must assume responsibility for our own lives. Second, if we try to hoard

or save life by focusing on ourselves, it will slip through our fingers. If we are ready to spend or lose life for others, we will mysteriously get it back. Third, total self interest can have a fearful if not fatal price. Such are the insights of Jesus. To acknowledge them is to transform our lives. Each one of us must choose how we respond to the question. For Jesus continually asks us "Who do you say that I am?"


