Please note the photos below. These photos, taken today, show the products sold at the shop at #2 of the Windmill complex displayed in such a way as to obstruct the use of the council-installed public benches. This, of course, is not new, and was brought to your attention in an earlier letter a number of years ago. I believe the Council acted at that time, but the benches did not stay clear for long.

At various times, and for various reasons, business people in Kuranda express concern over the fatigue occasioned to some visitors who must, or choose to, walk into the village from the Skyrail terminal or Railway station. These benches would certainly offer welcome respite for these visitors, and to residents strolling through the village. My understanding is that they are public property, and do not belong to the shop?





On another note, friends of ours looked after a home in Kuranda last month for several days. On their first night, they went to Billy's for dinner. On requesting water, they were told that the water in Kuranda could cause giardia, and that they should purchase bottled water. For the next few days they were worried about using any water in the home they were minding. I don't think it's very good for Kuranda's image to be warning visitors of a giardia threat. If indeed this danger is real, the council needs to act. I believe the prime concern at Billy's, however, is to increase their profit margin at the expense of one-time visitors. PLOUGHING by Ron Elgar

What springs to your mind when you see or hear the word, 'Plough'? Whenever I hear it I think of the best known of all asterisms, 'The Plough', located within the constellation 'The Great Bear'. Known as the 'Big Dipper' to the Yanks, and 'Plough' to the Pohms, it cannot be seen by the Ozzies. On my last visit to England I was able to marvel at this wonderful group of stars once again, endlessly pointing the way to the North or Pole Star. I don't know why it is called 'The Plough', because to me it looks like a saucepan. Experts say that as aeons pass it will look more like a plough. I can picture the plough handle and the body of the plough with its plough-share-and that's about

A plough stands in our garden at 'Windsong' as motionless as the ruins of Ozymandias that lie in the desert. It's odd but visitors seldom ask what it is, why it is there? It was given to us by our swimming mate, Gerda Williams, in whose caravan park in Kuranda the metal object had lurked for years, slowly falling to bits. Every time I go in or out in the car I pass it, now painted and bolted together so it can last a few more years. It has one 'furrow' (or 'mould-board') and is designed to be pulled by a mule, or maybe a horse. To use it, the ploughman must hang on like grim death to the two handles and try to keep the plough running level and straight, whilst controlling the animal up front. This requires both strength and skill. A plough.

Years ago, in 1966, Pam and I watched a Portuguese farmer ploughing. He was using a cow (four-legged!) as a tractor. At the end of the day's ploughing, we were told, the farmer would milk the cow, and then, with what milk remained, suckle its calf. I'm glad I am not a Portuguese cow – or calf. It's the land that gets the best deal over there.

I watched a 2001 documentary on Afghanistan the other night. A farmer was sweating behind a long, tough stick of wood pointed at the front end (the 'mould-board') and running parallel to the earth. This 'plough' was part of or maybe attached to another stout stick which was angled to the hands of the ploughman (the plough handle). It was pulled by an ox, which the farmer somehow controlled with a third hand! A very crude plough, but all the farmer possessed.

Gerda's old plough is one reminder for me of the halcyon days I spent ploughing on my beautiful Dorset downland farm, and also how I started my farming life. It makes me reflect on the meaning of old farming terminology: acres, roods, perches, squares, furlongs, lands, and so on. In the old days in England a plough-land was a unit of land that could be ploughed by one team of eight oxen during one year (no ploughing when the land was frozen). I'm glad I was ploughing in 1947 and not 1447! I suppose I used to plough four acres in a day. Ploughing is a very ancient skill. Pigs plough the ground with great effect – and huge damage.

So it was that back in 1947 I first lined myself up behind a single-furrow plough with a small mouldboard, and a large cart-horse. I was an apprentice fresh out of the army on a large arable farm in the North Riding of Yorkshire. I recall the other farm-workers were standing at a not-toodiscreet distance - watching ... and waiting... and



those days you, the apprentice, paid the farmer to be taught) would put on a good show. I did!

The farmer, who was a kindly Yorkshire man, encouraged me to get going. I cautiously flicked the traces over the back of the cart-horse (Robin, of course). I had taken up my stance in the open furrow; gripped the two handles with fierce concentration; and instructed Robin nervously to "Giddy-up". With a toss of his large head Robin moved off quietly for the far end of the 'land'. All went well for about half a minute. Then the plough shot out of the furrow and careered from side to side. Robin took umbrage. Unable to control the plough I was pulled over and dragged down the furrow until Jackie (the farmer) halted Robin, who stood still, snorting with disgust. The other farm workers smirked. I was very embarrassed. I retired to tend my cuts and bruises. But worse was to come.

A day or so later I was given a trailer- plough, pulled by an old Fordson tractor with steel lugs (in lieu of rubber tyres). I thought, at least the tractor could not move without my driving it. trailer-plough, it was attached to the draw-bar of the tractor. Simple stuff. No problem. I checked the attachment of tractor and plough as instructed, so I thought, mounted the tractor (no comfy seat: a steel shape to sit on with a springy bar attaching it to the tractor), gave the engine a rev. and set off down the open furrow. I concentrated like mad on the steering, to avoid exiting the open furrow to right or left as I had done previously. Front off-side wheel in the open furrow; hold the wheel firmly; sit down in the saddle; eyes straight ahead. Easy! I was ploughing. I was ecstatic! Towards the end of the furrow I turned my head around to use the lift-lever to raise the plough so an about-turn could be made. Heavens above! No plough! I stopped, thinking I had lost my senses. These I may have lost; I certainly had lost the plough. In fact I had never 'had' it, because I had failed to attach it correctly and there it was where I had started, a hundred metres away or more, with a couple of admiring work mates standing as witnesses

The word 'plough' appears all over the place: skiing, as when the instructor implores you to "Snowplough, please" when you pass him, totally out of control: 'Ploughing your way through the mud or a crowd; 'Plough a lonely furrow', when you are on your own; 'Plough back your money into the business', and so on.

It was never dull or boring (though sometimes rather too cold) when ploughing. I could watch the neighbouring farmers at work; guess the time of day by the sun; dream about holidays or write stories and poetry in my head; visualise people and other objects in the rolling clouds; and eat my 'elevenses' and drink my tea by a hedge that was "quick and green with brier" (Walter de la Mare).

Much poetry has been devoted to the ploughman, and I used to recite or sing many verses to myself as I ploughed. A classic is "...The ploughman homeward plods his weary way..." My favourite song is Benny Hills' boisterous rendition of a farmer ploughing: "...And as the horse and I plough the field nearby your memory I cannot erase; For as I walk at the rear of the horse my dear, I seem to see your

hoping this wet-at-the-knees apprentice farmer (in face..." That farmer could obviously plough with a horse! Then the hymns - "...We plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the land..." There's no one can hear you, or check out your words or notes. The birds don't mind.

> The birds! Well, they were another form of companion. Ravens, rooks, sea-gulls (far from the sea) and smaller birds who would dart in and out from time to time. The sea-gulls were very belligerent – shrieking and mewing and fighting for food. All and sundry would settle in front of the tractor, and just as it was about to run over them they would rise up only to descend again behind the plough, and gobble up the grubs and worms, regardless of my wishes (many grubs are very useful). Then, when all in sight had been devoured, up into the air and back down in front of the tractor. All day long. Endlessly. Great companions. The ravens I did not like as much as the sea-gulls. The rooks made good pies. Sometimes a covey of partridge would take off, or a hare bolt across the field.

> As I said, halcyon times, far from the 'madd'ing' crowd; when one could forget, for a while, national or personal problems.

> One occupation when ploughing was not a success. I quickly discovered that when travelling at even a slow three or four miles-per-hour, the wind caused a down-draft on my pipe and clouds of smoke filled my lungs without any sucking on my part. It was the same with cigarettes. So I skipped smoking. Surely no great loss!

> I have never met anyone who has shared with me these rather artless and, you might say, unsophisticated thoughts about the humble plough; but Pam has. On her trip around Greece she met a Kiwi from the South Island who joined her for her evening meal and they got onto the subject of ploughing. He was a farmer, travelling to Denmark to judge in a ploughing contest. Pam mentioned my love of ploughing and he at once said that he could absolutely empathise with my feelings. He felt the same contentment and peacefulness. So there!

> My plough was a three-furrow mounted which means it could be lifted on the hydraulics when travelling, or when swinging around at the end of a land without trailing on the ground. I never had anything bigger. But there were three-furrow 'reversible' ploughs in those early days which, at the end of the land, would 'reverse' and bring into operation another 3 ploughs, previously up in the air, now down on the ground, so you could simple swing around and go back down the open furrow you had just created. Start at one straight side of the field and work your way across. Much faster. In England this year I saw a massive 8-furrow reversible - 16 mould-boards on the one frame, lifted by equally massive hydraulics, on an equally massive tractor. A far cry from the Afghan farmer. We cannot stop progress.

> Gentle reader, what now springs to your mind when you see or hear the word 'plough'? If you have read this far maybe more thoughts than when you started? Something celestial or terrestrial? Something very old or relatively modern? necessity or delightful fantasy? A great, big yawn? Zero? Anyway, 'I miss my ploughing days.

A Thought for **October**

This month we open our Bibles to St Matthews Gospel Chapter 20 and read verses 1-16. Time and time again throughout his ministry Jesus is talking to us about the kingdom of heaven. When Jesus does this we know that he is trying to explain to us how the world would be if the rule of God were obeyed universally. Our Lord is speaking to us about our concepts of justice and God's concepts. The scene Jesus paints would be familiar to anyone in Australia the systems used on farms who require day labour. Jesus tells of an estate owner who hires workers in the dawn hours. They agree on a penny or denarius, the official minimum wage for a day's work. The owner goes out again and again that day, so that the last to be hired have only an hour's work. However, when time comes to pay everyone all get the same amount, a denarius. Naturally there is grumbling about unfairness. The owner dismisses the charge, claming he is free to do what he likes with his money.

Notice what the unfairness charge centres on. No one can say he was given less than he should have been given. The earliest made a contract, the others after that didn't, but they have got more than the minimum rate. What probably enrages everyone is that the last batch get a whole day's wages for one hour's work. Should not everyone have been

paid proportionately to the amount of the day worked? Of course that's right, we say. But Jesus' estate owner says no, not on his estate it isn't! Why? Because remember that this is a story about the kingdom of heaven, about God's ways, not our ways. Jesus is teaching that God's way is more generous than human justice.

Human justice would have to be in minimal terms; the contract with the first workers would be the measure and all succeeding agreements would be calculated downwards.

God's justice is that the first contract be the level to which all others are lifted. In daily life what might this be about? Let's consider two people. One grows all his or her life in the knowledge of God and with faith, worshipping regularly. In that life God is a reality from which comes meaning and joy and purpose? The other person lives for many years without any thought of God. To that person faith is irrelevant, religion is for fools, and Christ is merely an oath. Then for some reason everything changes for this person. Faith and God become living realities, Christ lives. There is purpose, new meaning, real joy, all now just as spiritually nourishing as in the first person's life. One person has served Christ for many years; the other has just discovered the service of Christ. That is God's way. God does not measure. God gives the Holy Spirit abundantly. The generosity of God is always greater than human justice.

The "Wunderkammer" exhibition we participated in at Hobart's Plimsoll gallery received a review in the last Weekend Australian and is open till the end of the month.



Gardening Tips by Neil Robson,

Last month I talked about how a plant feeds and how water soluble fertilizer stresses the plant. This time I would like to talk about how to help the soil make humus (perfect plant food). To start I would like to point out that plants don't have a stomach so the soil is their stomach - we are feeding the soil not the plant - I still forget this at There is no doubt Council had been advised that if it had approved times. Because it is very fine it has a larger surface area for the micro-organisms to work on so it is available quickly. When the soil organisms start to do their stuff they improve soil structure by making the soil more granulated - the more granulated the soil is the billy tea provided. It's an easy, pleasant walk. Please come along. more oxygen is available and also allows for good entry and drainage of excess water. Humus darkens the soil colour to chocolate or black from the surface down. Our aim is to build humus in the soil as deep as possible.

Using a garden fork, dig a sod of earth, gently lifting it up without disturbing the sod. The soil structure is visible. Is it solid or crumbly? Is there worms and white hair roots? Is there a difference in soil colour near the surface down to the ends of the tynes? TAKING ON THE BIG BOYS AND COPPING A BRUISIN'

If you want to play the legal game, you've got to play by the rules, but they can change mid field, depending on how you interpret them.

In this age of community empowerment, KURANDA EnviroCare bravely appealed to the Court system to help sort out a problem with the new Integrated Planning Act (IPA). Because the Act is new, there are many untested situations. One of these is the ability of Council to decide that a development proposal adjacent to World Heritage is either "minor" or "impact assessible".

If they choose "minor", there is no need to refer the development proposal to any government department or agency for advice. Council can decide to approve or reject it without interference. But, if the "impact assessible" box is ticked, the proposal must then be referred to others for their advice on what conditions should be put on the development to ensure the least damage is caused. This will then trigger a scientific assessment of rare and threatened species, erosion, impact on air and water quality and so on. Assessments of this sort are bound to be costly and time consuming (at least in human terms), but these are not valid reasons for choosing not to go down that road.

In the last few months, Mareeba Shire Council decided that a application to subdivide a large block of land which not only shares a boundary with the World Heritage Area but is also within the EnviroLink Wildlife Corridor, was "minor". KURANDA EnviroCare believed this was sidestepping the need to investigate many potential impacts this subdivision could have. We wrote to Council asking for a conference to discuss this but we received no reply. With time running out and Council about to decide to approve or not this development application, our only recourse was to ask for the matter to be urgently decided by the Court. We understood this needed to be resolved before Council made any further decisions.

With the assistance of the Environmental Defender's Office (EDO), we hurriedly put together the huge amount of affidavits and court documents required (that was on Thursday), serve notice on Council (Friday) and be ready for the hearing on Monday!

The outcome was that, with the benefit of hindsight and lengthy Court deliberation, we probably could have waited until Council had made its decision whether to approve the subdivision or not (on the next day, Tuesday). The issue that we had gone to the Court for was not even debated. Our inability to foresee the future was to cost us money. Council asked that KURANDA EnviroCare be ordered to pay all Council's costs, to which the Judge agreed. It is rare in the Planning & Environment Court that costs are awarded and most unexpected in this

Fact or Fiction..... What the medical evidence suggests.

Does Air Travel increase you risk of catching a cold?

As a GP in Kuranda I see many patients who have recently travelled by air. A disproportionately high number of these patients appear to catch a cold or some other viral Upper Respiratory Tract Infection-URTI. I have long blamed the aircraft's re-cycled air for this phenomenon but recent research suggests I'm wrong and owe QANTAS an apology.

JAMA - Journal of the American Medical Association studied patients on both the older style of aircraft which use 100% fresh air and newer aircraft which choose to recycle. They found the incidence of self-reported colds was the same in both types of plane, although high at 20% passengers questioned. They suggest this above-average incidence more likely to be due to overcrowding, stress, poor eating and lack of

This study suggests that there is a high incidence of colds amongst air travellers, that air circulation is not to blame and that you are just as likely to catch a cold travelling for hours on a crowded bus or train.

HYDROPONIC GARDENING BY JAN COULTER

Spring is here again. My plants are thriving and as they are in a hydroponic system water is not a problem, they only need what is necessary to grow. We have just finished making a frame to protect the tomatoes from the birds. We had to position it in from the fence around the garden so the wallabies could not access it either. It has a bar across the top so the tomatoes can be tied to it and is covered with netting.

I don'nt begrduge the wallabies a bit of green but they are pulling the whole plant out.

I have recently made up two drums of nutrient, one with lower strength and one with high strength nutrient. Low strenglth nutrient is ideal for leaf growth but high strength is necessary for flower/fruit production. If I require medium strength I mix the two. It seems incredible but the amount of trace elements necessary for 1000 letres is about a dessertspoon. Our bore water is very good it contains a lot of the groups will not be lost during the major elements needed for nutrient. They are leached from the soil and enter the transition period between the first aquifer.

Tomatoes, lettuce, cucumbers, herbs etc.can be grown right through the summer months. The only time they can't be grown is then the weather is so bad that it smashes everything.

I have just planted a new batch of basil, like my lettuce they look like a closely with Landcare, integrated flower garden with the different colours and shapes. My bush beans are thriving, I catchment management and don't grow the climbing variety as they take up too much room. Cherry tomatoes are abundant with more coming on. They're very hardy and thrive on very little attention. Lettuce are growing well with a little mulch. Mignonette seem to grow best in my garden.

Parsley and mint are thriving as usual. My bananas are still producing but have slowed down due to less water.

It is possible to have a beautiful garden during these extreme conditions providing mulch is used. Majorie Spear

\$500,000 in Landcare Funding For Leichhardt

Member for Leichhardt Warren Entsch today announced the provision of \$508,500 to the **Natural Resource Management** (NRM) Board (Wet Tropics) to continue landcare and sustainable agriculture projects from Bloomfield in the north to Crystal Creek in the south.

Mr Entsch said the funding will support the continued employment of about 10 landcare facilitators and coordinators in the

"These coordinators play a vital role in assisting communities to adopt regional approaches to natural resource management," Mr Entsch said.

"I am confident communities that participate and support Landcare will welcome the funding announcement, especially because it means the expertise of these coordinators and the good work done by Landcare and second phases of the Natural Heritage Trust (NHT)."

The regional coordinators and catchment coordinators work resource management activities such as the NHT and the National Action Plan for Salinity and Water Quality.

The \$508,500 grant will ensure work can continue in the Herbert, Tully, Johnstone, Mulgrave and Barron River catchments areas.

"The priority is to ensure community input into the development and implementation of regional plans, encourage community involvement with regional bodies and participation in the delivery of local action

grants," Mr Entsch said.

"It is the communities themselves that are best placed to know the types of projects that suit their particular resource needs and circumstances. It also means that the projects funded have significant local community support and will deliver the best results.

"Landcare would not be the huge success it is without the dedication and unselfish contributions of the local communities."

Regional community-based NRM organisation, the NRM Board (Wet Tropics), today welcomed the announcement. Chair Charley Loudon said it acknowledges the valuable on ground work undertaken by the community in addressing the increasingly complex issues facing the region.

Mr Loudon said the announcement is especially timely as the region prepares to make the transition to new regional arrangements for natural resource management under phase two of the NHT.

"Under the new arrangements the community has an opportunity to determine the future direction of NRM in this region and to develop sound long-term solutions that will take us to the forefront of sustainable natural resource management. These positions are essential to support the community in that process."

Mr Entsch also announced the provision of \$80,000 to fund a new coordinator position in the Torres Strait region.

The funding will allow a Torres Strait coordinator set up a landcare program in the region.

There are currently 13 natural resource management regions in Queensland that oversee Landcare projects. With the help of this funding, the Torres Strait will become the 14th.




Gradings are conducted quarterly, the next being held mid December. Now is an excellent time to start training as all students will be learning new material. The first two introductory lessons are free for beginners.








TALES FROM THE VISITOR INFORMATION **CENTRE By Marie Boswarva**

Tuesday, the day was cold, and the wind had been quite strong two days before causing choppy seas. Although it had dropped somewhat that morning, it was still blowing enough to make for a rough trip on the OCEAN SPIRIT CRUISE over to Michaelmas Cay. But nothing could guell our excitement at the prospect of taking a sailing boat out to see the coral.

Jamie Hughes from the Sales Department of Ocean Spirit Cruises met nine of the volunteers from the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre at the Marlin Marina in front of the Pier Market place at eight in the morning, it was his job to 'look after us' for the day.

We bunched up together for a photo on the gangplank. Everyone who sails has their photograph taken as they board. A professional photographer photographs everyone whilst they are participating in different activities all throughout the day, and for those who go scuba diving, a special video captures all the excitement of their dive. These photos can be viewed on the computer before purchasing, and what a great memento to take back home as a reminder of the 'down under' adventure on that special day.

Once on board everyone is counted and coffee and tea is served in the cabin, one of the many staff, Graham, gives us our introduction talk about the day long activities the cruise provides and the essential 'safety talk'. This is nothing like the dry, detached, safety lecture that you get on a plane, but a time for fun between the staff and the audience.

Dave takes his turn on the stage to display how to use the snorkeling equipment that is provided, and I learnt more in that short demonstration than all my previous years of skin diving. For those of us who can't see beyond our outstretched arm without glasses, there are optical masks, and another essential for such a cold day, is the ability to hire wet suits for just \$5. There is no need for those who can't swim or feel a little frightened in the water to worry, as flotation jackets are provided to give you that extra sense of security. Not every person has had the opportunity to experience snorkeling before, so lessons are given at the water's edge before we are taken off on a tour of the coral with a qualified marine biologist. Andrian, the dive master, is next and he wants

everyone to have the opportunity to scuba dive. Many, many people who come to Cairn's beautiful reefs really want to experience the excitement and wonder of seeing the coral and fish through this magical medium, but are afraid to commit themselves to what they see as such a daunting experiment. But on Ocean Spirit Cruises, everyone who is interested is able to have a 15-minute free 'try before you buy' instruction. With expert tutoring in shallow water they can gain confidence in their ability to manage the different equipment, knowing that all times they will be looked after and protected by the qualified, competent staff, then, and later in deeper water.

There are Semi-submersible guided tours twice a day, and guided bird tours on the island or you can just relax on the beach.

Once the introduction was over, we couldn't wait to try everything. I'd brought my own longlegged wet suit [I call it my electric blanket] and Beverley, who rarely feels the cold, hired a wet suit to insulate her against the cold wind. After struggling into our wet suits and gathering up facemask, snorkel and flippers we boarded the beach buggy to be taken to the island, although all the others were barefooted 1 still hadn't abandoned my warm shoes and socks or my ear warmers.

Everyone in the water is observed closely not only by the instructor in the water but also by safety officers on the beach, 'the most important job on the cruise' he informed me, and how right he is, with so many overseas tourist enter the domain of the water for the first time.

I watched all the brave snorkelers enter the water and quickly following the instructor instructions, spat on the facemask and rinsed them before putting them on, and lowering their bodies put their faces in the water - I watched. They swam around practising - I watched. I put my feet in the water - it was freezing. I ran back to the safety, and in comparison, warmth of the beach - and watched some more. 'Are you coming in,' the instructor called. 'Later when you go on the tour,' I quibbled. 'We're going now,' he informed me. There was no escape now, either I gathered my courage and went in or I would miss out on seeing the coral up close. My son had told me that it was only cold when one first entered the water in a wet suit, but once the water between the suit and the skin warmed, one no longer felt the cold but that warming seemed to take forever.

I swam around imitating the actions of all the best skin divers movements I had seen on underwater TV shows, whilst at the same time trying to keep close to the group, making it easier for the instructor and the 'safety lookout' on land to keep on eye on us. The instructor pointed out the beauty of different coral shapes; everyone was having a great time. My electric blanket had helped to keep my body from turning to ice, but nothing could protect my ears from freezing. I had to abandon the coral and get out quickly. As I fumbled out of the water falling clumsily over my distorted flipper feet, the 'safety lookout' rushed to stop me from collapsing and helped take off the flippers, I was shivering too much to master it myself. As much as I had enjoyed the experience of seeing the coal through a facemask, I couldn't wait to get back to the vessel and put on my many layers of warm clothes. There would be another opportunity to see the coral again in the dry Semi-submersible after lunch.

Lunch! Another way the OCEAN SPIRIT is completely different to the airlines is the food. Only fresh produce is taken on board, where a resident chef prepares the hot and cold smorgasbord daily. The produce that Australia is famous for all over the world is there for the hungry tourist to savour: prawns, hot and cold meats, fish, cooked the best I have ever tasted, various salads, and the sweetest fruit. Even

without the exercise in the water increasing our appetite, to just look of all that beautifully arranged food set our tummy rumbling.

Every seat on the Semi-submersible was taken for the afternoon show. As we carefully weaved our way through the channels between the coral, our guide pointed out the many

different specimens. Some we had seen on our morning snorkeling, but others were

completely new. Many fish, both tiny and huge, of the most brilliant colours swam around close to the coral just outside the windows; the submersible was familiar and posed no threat to them. For those who don't want to swim, this is an excellent way to view our spectacular coral.

Back to the beach, some for another swim, others to lie on the warm beach and sun themselves. As usual when one is having a great time, all to soon the day was over and it was time to return to Cairns.

All the tourist signed in, and was again counted - no one had been left behind,

Unfortunately not our entire group had been able to participate in the exciting adventures offered by the cruise, nor eat the excellent food provided, for they had been seasick. Elfriede slept all day in the cabin, Sylvia sat as still as she could outside in the centre at the back of the ship, where the roll of the ship was at a minimum, until she could escape onto the motionless beach, and I have never seen someone as sick as Steve. With his face white and drawn he sat curled up in misery, shivering one moment and sweating the next. The ship's staff could not have been more attentive or helpful. Everything was done to lessen his suffering. Blankets and waterproof jackets were wrapped around him to keep in the warmth, seasick pills were administered, a constant supply of fluid were supplied to minimize dehydration, Adrian even tried the application of pressure points to relieve the sickness, there was also talk about flying him back to land via a helicopter, but nothing it seemed was going to work except extended time on stable land. Poor Steve, it must have been hard for him to watch us having such a good time without being able to join

On the way back with the sails fully unfurled and filled with the wind, the Ocean Spirit was truly a beautiful sight. Inside the cabin the 'water staff had turned singers, entertaining the passengers with their excellent voices singing well-known songs.

For those who had avoided seasickness, we had a wonderful day. For those who had been incapacitated they had had a different experience - special treatment from the concerned staff. With a ratio of one staff to nine tourist, everyone who sails with the OCEAN SPIRIT can expect the same kind of services, whether it is in the capacity of teaching, advising, serving, helping with any problems that may arise, as well as the all important - looking after your safety, or just making sure that you get the best out of your day that is possible.

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\$3,893 in Child Care Funding a Boost for Kuranda

"This funding will benefit the Kuranda State School P&C and help to ensure Kuranda kids and their families have ongoing access to quality child care," Mr Entsch said.

"In rural and regional areas, families often have fewer child care choices than their city counterparts and it is important that, wherever possible, services in these areas are given additional support.

"Many families living in isolated areas are often faced with situations where both parents need to be at work on the farm or are required to travel long distances for work, and at times like these easy access to quality child care is vital.'

Mr Entsch said outside school hours services provide care for children before and after school and also during school holidays, which helps parents on the land to balance the demands of work and family life.

To assist with the costs of child care, families which use Commonwealth approved outside school hours care services can claim Child Care Benefit.



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
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
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
