## PONY RIDES AT KOAH MARKET

The marvellous Mister Nelson and owner Kerry Scott of Koah, will be again providing "One Horse Open Sleigh" rides at the 2025 Koah Christmas Market on Saturday 6 December.

Mister Nelson is a small Shetland pony, standing just 9 hands tall. Kerry acquired Mister Nelson in 2018 as a 6 year old on the Tablelands. He was bred in Myola according to his previous owners.

Kerry consulted a friend-of-a-friend who taught her how to train him to harness. Kerry drove Mister Nelson to the Koah Market regularly from 2020 as part of his training, then she was asked to do rides at the annual Koah Christmas market and the "One Horse Open Sleigh" rides were born.

Kerry says the sleigh is a basic sulky for which she made the sleigh sides and attached to the cart. This year she is revamping the sleigh for this market.

"Mister Nelson loves driving and I have had children as young as 8 years old drive him under supervision. Mister Nelson loves people and attention. He is a super star in my book." says Kerry.




#### **Cover Masthead**

This month's masthead features details from *Grevilleas*, a hand-embroidered circle on silk (20cm in diameter) by Gayle Hannah. "I have been participating in a 52 week embroidery challenge. Each week has 'rules' including stitches to use. This piece was my introduction to Pistil Stitch, an elongated version of the French Knot. The history of the Pistil Stitch predates the Arts and Crafts movement though it was used by 18th century embroiderers at William Morris's company. To me it evoked the complexity of Grevillea flowers"

Works are continuing throughout December on the Kuranda Centenary Park amenities block, including painting and upgrades to the basins and plumbing. Council has also been progressing work on the footpath along Arara Street, linking the library and Barang Street.

The upgrades to the bridge across the Barron River on Oak Forest Road were completed in November and I want to extend my sincere thanks to residents for their patience while these important works were underway.

In other news, the Lighting Up Kuranda project was recently recognised by the Institute of Public Works Engineering Australasia, receiving an Excellence Award for Projects Under \$2 Million. The Lighting Up Kuranda: Twilight Trading in a Rainforest Village initiative was proudly funded through the Queensland Government's Building Bush Tourism Fund program, which provided \$200,000. The remaining funds were provided by Council and through the Kuranda Infrastructure Agreement, also supported by the Queensland Government.



Last weekend, the Premier David Crisafulli, Terry James MP for Mulgrave and I hosted our first "Thank You For Your Service" volunteers event where we welcomed incredible volunteers across the region to thank them for what they do.

It was great to share the evening with Kuranda Rural Fire Brigade and Speewah Rural Fire Brigade representatives, Barry Childs and Mick Dub. We are hoping to make this an annual event and look forward to welcoming more volunteers next year.

I also want to thank our local SES for their continued support. SES celebrates 50 years this year and our regional FNQ SES team recently competed in the state SES Disaster Rescue Challenge and guess what - they came third! What an amazing achievement!

Our veteran family community also has some fantastic news. Land for a Legacy House in Smithfield has been confirmed, thanks to the Cairns Regional Council and I'm thrilled to share that the Crisafulli Government has committed \$1 million to get this project underway. Earlier this year, I launched a petition calling for funding for the Legacy House and over 1,000 locals added their voices to support it. To everyone who backed the campaign, thank you.

#### **KURANDA RANGE ROAD**

If you're travelling along Kuranda Range Road (Kennedy Highway, Cairns–Mareeba) this holiday season, here's what you need to know:

No night closures from Thursday 18 December 2025 through to the end of January 2026. Night works will continue with single-lane traffic control starting early January 2026. Some short-term or ad-hoc night closures may occur in 2026 – advance notice will be given.

From 18 December 2025 to 4 January 2026, roadworks will be minimised to make travel safer and smoother. Only one single-lane traffic control area will be in place at Henry Ross Lookout.

Our masthead for the last edition for 2024 featured mural artwork by graffiti artist Jak Lilley (Paradox Creative), commissioned by Council for the long awaited upgrade of the Kuranda Skate Park. News on the front page suggested we should all celebrate having made it through an incredibly challenging year, with Christmas Twilight markets set to end it on a high note. An end of year update from CleanCo detailed the incredible amount of repair works done through the year to the Kuranda Weir and the riverscape of the Barron at Kuranda, following the Cyclone Jasper flooding in December 2023. A Grinter's Tale reminded us that as we look forward to a New Year we can all make small changes and the first step towards that is to shrug off apathy and get involved.

Our masthead for the month featured an original painting *Platypus Wandering* by local artist George Norman Riley. Our front page story was also platypus related, with the good news that Djabugay Bulmba Rangers had discovered Ngunba (platypus) in three different locations around Kuranda, for some the first sighting made in 40 to 50 years. Works continued on the Kuranda Weir Recovery Project and CleanCo reported that works were ahead of schedule.

There was sad and unexpected news of the passing of councillor Kevin Davies, creating a vacancy on Council and raising the issue of whether a by-election needed to be held, the decision ultimately being made by Council and the Minister for Local Government.

Local author Ann Harth gave us the first of eleven columns for 2025, generously sharing her tips for writing fiction. Our resident astrologer, Rob Hart, welcomed us to a new year with a wish that "May your planets align and May you thrive in the year of 2025" (Rob promised no more poetry but we weren't convinced). Speewah Fire Warden Mick Dub was awarded a Highly Commended Community Service Award as part of the Mareeba Shire Australia Day awards.

The Cassowary Art Trail Project welcomed the seventh hand-painted cassowary statue *Bimby-Djaruy* (Father Bird) painted by Yirrganydji artist Corrin Skeene, taking its place at Hartley's Crocodile Adventures. More Cassowary Art Trail Project news was the approval by Mareeba Shire Council for the Kuranda Big Cassowary, planned for Centenary Park, to proceed to the detailed planning and fundraising stage. Our masthead for March featured an original painting *A Moment's Quiet Contemplation* by local artist Kirty Bell. Meanwhile many residents were contemplating if Council's decision to hold a by-election following the untimely passing of Councillor Kevin Davies was a controversial one, given that Council could have just filled the position by giving it to the March 2024 election runner-up as has been the process previously. Many ratepayers questioned the not insignificant cost of holding a by-election.

Following inspections by Queensland Rail, a number of the railway bridges between Kuranda and Mareeba were found to have damage requiring repairs and were unsafe for the iconic Savannahlander train to travel over. Arrangements were made to truck the Savannahlander to Mareeba so lucky travellers can still experience the Savannahlander journey even if its new starting and ending point was in Mareeba while the bridges are being repaired.

Council continued with Cyclone Jasper flooding disaster recovery works, tackling multiple land slips around Kuranda. February can be muddy, muggy and buggy but it can also be one of the best months for birds and butterflies as Kuranda Conservation reminded us. Minibeast Wildlife gave us a little glimpse into how they have contributed to award winning natural history TV programs. Productions filmed in Kuranda include *Micro Monsters* with David Attenborough, *Life in Colour, Planet Insect, Earthsounds, Tiny World* and many others. In 2024, Minibeast hosted the BBC for a month working on a new invertebrate series called *Hidden Planet*.

Rainfall for the month: 592.6 mm



Our masthead for April featured details from a digitally altered photograph Fan of Leaves by award winning local artist and naturalist Buck Richardson ("The Mothman" of Kuranda)

Work was well underway on improvements to Coondoo Street, addressing a number of maintenance issues arising since the major re-development of the Village in 1997-98, including footpath upgrades, repairs to planter boxes, remedial works for the iconic State-heritage-listed Kuranda fig trees, replacement of ageing (some non-functioning) street lights and the addition of fairy lights to the upper Coondoo Street fig trees, bringing a little extra magic to the village after dark, with twilight trading and other events in mind.

It was a sad farewell to Hannah Wattel, known to many as CocoNut Mama, a fixture for many years at the Kuranda Original Rainforest Markets and for many visitors someone who embodied that Kuranda 'hippie spirit' they were hoping to come across.

The Mareeba Shire by-election was scheduled to go ahead on Saturday 5 April. Frustrating news for Kuranda Range Road users was that changes to traffic conditions were set to continue for the rest of the year, including night closures five nights a week. The Kuranda Historical Society presented an overview of the importance of oral history with tips on interviewing, processing and archiving.

Rainfall for the month: 96.1mm



Our masthead for May featured an aerial photograph of the Kuranda Railway Station and adjacent Barron River by Kevin Explores, a birds-eye view of the iconic buildings and riverside location.

Anzac Day in Kuranda 2025 was held on a rare (for us), wonderfully fine and dry day, marking the 110th anniversary of the ANZAC Corps landings on the Gallipoli Peninsula. The Kuranda RSL Sub Branch again hosted the Dawn Service at the Kuranda Railway Station, followed by a 'Gun Fire' breakfast and the Anzac March up Coondoo Street, culminating with a service and wreath-laying in Centenary Park. And the Anzac Day dinner at the Speewah Tavern was also deemed a great success.

The Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre was pleased a grant through Neighbourhood Centres Queensland would assist in extending their community food program through a community garden, with earthworks to make the site more accessible for community members and the installation of above-ground garden beds.

The Yellow Crazy Ant Community Taskforce was changing, following 10 years of intensive activity which has seen these terrible invasive ants now under control in the current area. The Taskforce having largely achieved its objectives, the new model has Kuranda Envirocare taking over educational activities, while residents in the treatment areas will liaise directly with WTMA rather than through a taskforce coordinator.

Rainfall for the month: 171.5 mm



Our masthead for the month was (we think) a Kuranda Paper first, being an original design Red Tail by local tattooist Alex Harris from the Folkhouse Tattoo Studio, located in the Kuranda Original Rainforest Markets.

Impressive funding for important conservation programs through the North Queensland Wildlife Trust was highlighted with news of their annual distribution to worthy wildlife causes. The Trust is operated by Angela and Peter Freeman, better known to many as the owners and operators of the iconic tourist attractions Hartley's Crocodile Adventures, Kuranda Koala Gardens and Birdworld Kuranda, where a number of revenue raising programs operate, including bottle recycling and an automatic donation for every wildlife encounter photo. All of which contributes to causes such as local bat rescue, care and rehabilitation, strategic habitat purchase in the Daintree and the Magnetic Island Koala Hospital, among others.

MP Bree James, Member for Barron River shared information and graphics from the Department of Transport Main Roads (TMR) as part of the business case summary for the Barron River Bridge, Kuranda, Replacement, with a recommendation to build a new bridge on a new alignment, downstream from the existing bridge. The old bridge will stay in place until the new bridge is completed. Provision for a safe pedestrian path would also be included. Still a long way to go with TMR now moving to the next stage of planning.

June was set to be a big month for bats with the annual Cairns Bat Festival, including the Flying Foxtel cocktail-mocktail Trail. Seedsavers made the case for saving and sharing the seeds of the fascinatingly named African Horned Cucumbers and Winged Beans.

#### Rainfall for the month: 41.0 mm

Our masthead for July featured an illustration by Sandi Steffensen from the award-winning book The Trees, authored by her brother Victor. The Trees won the 2025 DANZ (Diversity in Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand) Children's Book Award.

July was also our 34th anniversary edition, the very first print edition of *The Kuranda Paper* having been published on 26 July 1991.

CleanCo reported on repairs to the Barron River riverbank at Kuranda as part of a multi-year project to address the incredible damage inflicted by flooding post-Cyclone Jasper in December 2023. Repairs were on the homestretch with early works focused on urgent repairs and stabilising key parts of the riverbed. The team was moving into the final and most comprehensive phase of the job. Construction was set to continue throughout the year with work expected to be completed in early 2026, with final infrastructure repairs following in the 2026 dry season. As climate extremes become more frequent, the current recovery project is a reminder of the importance of resilience, preparation and local collaboration.

Locals watching locals: the Kuranda Kooky Film Fair was set to be an entertaining and probably hilarious night at the Kuranda Amphitheatre, featuring works by a number of local filmmakers. A new Mareeba Shire RADF (Regional Arts Development Fund) Advisory Committee was announced with Bianca Velder, Brioni McGrath, Connie Rovina, Kylie Lambert, Melissa Waters and Theodore Tremblay being appointed for a three year term, bringing with them a diverse range of experience and passion for the arts, culture and heritage.

A major redevelopment project for Skyrail was announced. It will take place between July 2026 and November 2027, with an estimated cost of \$85 million. The project includes major upgrades to gondolas, stations and lines and will take place in three stages. Skyrail will have shuttle bus services available between Smithfield and Kuranda when parts of the line are closed during the project.

Locals continued to be treated to world class music concerts at St Saviours Church, always a magical event. This time it was local musician Toshi Sakamoto and Japanese duo Soubugen, visiting from Hokkaido. A wonderful atmospheric venue, especially now that the fairy lights are twinkling outside in the fig trees.

We welcomed back Youthlink with a regular column. Kuranda Conservation recommended a new app produced by QPWS Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service) QWildlife, which can be used to record sightings of local cassowaries. It's free and available from your preferred app supplier.

Rainfall for the month: 22.9 mm



Our masthead for September featured the historic ceramic tile mural outside the Ngoonbi Office on Coondoo Street, the photo being taken just before the tiles were removed for safekeeping as the site undergoes a major re-development. The mural was designed by Edward Deemera from Yarrabah Pottery and installed in 1975, under instruction from potter Peter Van Der Helder from Kuranda, when the Jilli Binna Information Centre was operating an arts, craft and museum space in the building. The tiles will be re-integrated into the new development.

Front page news for Ngoonbi Community Services Indigenous Corporation (Looking Forward, Looking Back) was reaching 50 years of service, originally established as the Ngoonbi Cooperative Society Ltd in January 1975.

With the change of hands for Frogs Restaurant, owner Terry Pates shared some fascinating memories from his 40 years running Frogs, while musician Brian Clarke recounted how the venue had been pivotal in developing and supporting local live music.

The annual Speewah to the Hat Charity Walk attracted almost 60 intrepid trekkers and raised \$6405 for two local community groups and a mother in need of a little help as her child undergoes medical treatment. This year's total means that in the past six years since the Walk has become a fundraiser, it has raised over \$30,000.

Our masthead for October featured a hand-embroidered panel Sampler #1 by local textile artist Robyn King, one of eleven artists from the Kuranda Arts Cooperative whose works formed the Gathered exhibition, running at the Tablelands Regional Gallery in Atherton during October and November. "This work is an expression of my admiration for the resilience and beauty of Australian flora" said Robyn.

Council called for community consultation and input for a planned playground project at the Arara Street Community Precinct (old Kuranda school site).

Mural works by Koah-based artist Violet Shaban were well underway in Centenary Park, bringing new vibrancy to the heart of the village. Here at The Kuranda Paper we were happy to be able to get our new newspaper trolley stands installed at several locations in the Village. Thanks to John Carroll for his design of the stands and the Kuranda Men's Shed for help with construction.

Myola residents John and Kathryn Edwards took out the Champion Garden award in the 2025 Mareeba and District Lions Garden Awards.

The Buluwai Indigenous Corporation launched the free Kuranda Talking Trails app, featuring Traditional Elder Willie Brim and TV presenter Mel Symons, offering personal insights and local knowledge of over 40 tour stops in and around Kuranda.

Senior's Week was celebrated by both the Kuranda CWA and Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre with community morning teas.

Our masthead for November featured an aerial photograph by Kevin Explores of the Savannahlander train crossing the Surprise Creek bridge on the Cairns-Kuranda railway line in July 2023. Concerns remain that repairs to several railway bridges between Kuranda and Mareeba have not been completed and mean the Savannahlander train has not been able to resume its usual route from the coast westwards since March 2025. Currently it is based in Mareeba but it is hoped that there will be both funding and political will to repair these bridges as soon as possible and keep the full length of this historic railway track open for all users.

Our front page was given over to coverage of the Kuranda District State College 2025 Awards ceremony, which celebrated student excellence on the beautiful grounds of the Myola campus. celebrating student excellence. The Kuranda Media Association, publishers of The Kuranda Paper, were pleased to be able to once again donate prizes for both Primary and Secondary Creative Writing Excellence Awards.

Local teenager Hunter Thompson, aged 17, shared some photos from his recent representation for Australia at the 2025 ITF Taekwon-Do World Championships in Jesolo, Italy in October. Hunter wished to express his thanks to everyone who had supported him and made it possible for him to take to the world stage.



#### This month we are delighted to welcome Glynis Lee, mixed media artist, to our Gallery.

Can you describe your artistic style. What is your preferred medium and why? My imagery could be described as subtle, often with hidden or elusive messages. I create prints on paper and textiles and am particularly keen to produce three-dimensional forms. I use a variety of printmaking techniques such as etching, photogravure, woodblock, screen print, lithography, drypoint, collagraph and encaustic. However, I like combining my prints with layers of other processes such as plant dyes and prints, felting with silk and wool fibres,

photography, watercolour and cyanotype. I like the variety of mark-making effects that can be achieved through different printmaking techniques. I am keen to combine processes to achieve individual artworks using the same imagery in different ways. Sometimes I think I should concentrate on one or two processes, but then I get an idea that involves a technique I haven't used in a while and then I get involved in that process again.

What motivates you as an artist? My fellow artist friends often motivate me through sharing their knowledge and experience, encouraging me to join art groups, workshops and exhibitions, or just creating art together. Working to a theme can make you think outside the box and try new things.

My inner creative motivation is to investigate cultural and environmental connections in search for a sense of place. In addition, my recent focus has been on science-inspired creative projects incorporating plants, birds and insects of Northern Australia.

Describe the best piece of art you have created It's difficult to choose one artwork that is the best, but I think the installation work *Into the in-between* is a favourite because it contained so many elements such as artist books, two and three-dimensional textile prints, lights and sound. It was a fully immersible experience with works on the walls and floor as well as suspended from the ceiling. I wanted to create a meditative environment for the audience.

What artists inspire you and where do you find inspiration? Many artists inspire me, either through working with or meeting them, to seeing their artwork in galleries or online. I am amazed by the amount of work and dedication many artists put into their craft and their passion for bringing an idea to fruition.

I am inspired by my surroundings, particularly in the natural environment, from microcosms to colours, patterns, sounds, light and shadow. That's one of the reasons I love living in this area. Travelling to other environments and cultures is also inspiring to me as an artist.

How do you learn new skills and/or techniques? I increase my skills and techniques

through workshops, learning from fellow artists or through on-line methods. Sometimes I have travelled to other states and countries to learn techniques, but it's great when specialists are brought here to impart their skills to the wider

community.

What has been the challenging and rewarding part of being an artist? The most challenging part of being an artist is the marketing administration involved in exhibiting and selling artworks. For most artists, the enjoyment is in creating art. The most rewarding part is when someone likes your work enough to buy it.

What do you like to do when you're not creating art? I enjoy singing and playing music with others. Like visual art, music is a creative process that brings a lot of joy and fulfilment. I am also a keen bushwalker and traveller.

Can you describe your studio/workspace and your favourite time of day to create? My home studio is light and airy and has enough space to allow me to spread out when I'm working. I prefer to work in the mornings when I'm more alert, but sometimes the day disappears before I know it.

What is your favourite tool that you can't do without? I couldn't do without my etching press as so many printmaking techniques I use require a heavier pressure than you can produce with hand printing. However, I also couldn't do without my camera to capture all the moments and imagery that inspire me, especially when I don't have time to sit and draw or paint on the spot.

Do you think art is important in society? Art, whether visual, performative, auditory or sensory, is essential for society. It documents history, gives voice to the individual and can engage whole communities. Art is a conduit for creative thought and an excellent way to relieve stress.

Visitors are delighted to discover locally crafted pieces they can take home as meaningful reminders of their time here. 

Collecting population data is a vital step in helping this endangered species to recover. It tells us how the species is faring over time and whether our management actions are making a difference. 

#### **EcoArts in 2026**



## Welcome to Speewah

#### **Speewah Mural Unveiling & NBN Support Event**

Residents travelling along Speewah Road or walking through the neighbourhood will have noticed the striking new mural taking shape on the concrete water tank in front of the Speewah Fire Brigade. This vibrant artwork, titled Frontline Fire Management, has been created by local artist Violet Shaban and her team, funded through a successful Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) grant application by the Speewah District Residents Association (SDRA) to the Mareeba Shire Council.

The mural is a powerful tribute to the Speewah Rural Fire Brigade's long-standing commitment to sustainable fire management, including the use of cool burning practices since the 1980s. It also honours the collaborative efforts between the Brigade, community groups, government agencies and the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporation (DTAC)—showcasing how shared responsibility strengthens both public safety and environmental care.

Beyond its environmental message, the project provides a meaningful platform for local artists, celebrating regional talent and fostering pride in the creative spirit of the community. By transforming Roscommon Park into a space of storytelling and celebration, the mural

invites conversation, connection and appreciation across generations and cultures.



## A Grinter's Tale

As a pom some time back in ancient history, I have to admit I preferred freezing my butt off on a hard wooden church pew at midnight than throwing the bedclothes off on another hot night in the Tropics.

There was something magical about driving through deserted streets, carol singers long in bed, sometimes snow falling, with just about every house sporting a colourfully lit Christmas tree in a window facing the road.

Reindeer, snowflakes and snowmen just don't work in the Tropics and I often find myself wondering why children don't ask their parents why Santa would wear such ridiculously warm clothes. It's a right giveaway if you ask me.

Sitting here waiting for the approaching thunderstorm to turn the power off and stifle my creativity, I was wondering how I used to fill two pages of a Christmas letter sent to friends all over the world. I looked back at an old yuletide epistle written in the early 2000s, bordered with an array of Christmas décor including snowmen and I can only think that I must have had an air conditioner on in my city office that day to even consider such extraneous clipart.

There was something special about midnight mass as a kid, especially if it was snowing. Aside from staying up late and of course, the aesthetic aspect, it gave me the rare chance to exact revenge on my big brother. One year, when he had been insufferable in the car, as big brothers can be, I stuffed a handful of snow down his polo neck jumper just before he passed Father Gallagher at the entrance to the church, preventing said brother from swearing or retaliating. My mother, seeing her poor son suffer (I saw it as penance), swore in her own little Irish way. "Jaysus, Mary, Mudder of Gawd", she muttered in exasperation as she dipped her icy cold fingers into the holy water font to thaw before blessing herself and audibly praying for me to grow up.

Father Gallagher was a good sport, a huge man with a ruddy face. His face appeared to grow around the arms of his glasses, which disappeared into his flesh like skis into deep snow, holding the scratched lenses atop a red nose like an all year round Rudolf. His claim to fame was being unbeaten hoopla champion at the summer fete and he would thank the Lord profusely as he successfully hooped the bottle of Irish whiskey every single year. I often wondered how he could even see the table through his dirty glasses and he never aimed for the Heinz spaghetti tins or bottles of ketchup, strangely enough. All the ladies would whoop as he hooped and thought he was the best thing since sliced bread.

Those were the days when black lace mantillas were de rigueur for any woman or girl entering church. I still don't understand why, as there were no mosquitoes in that neck of the woods. But then there's lots of things I didn't understand, like why, after listening to Latin dialogue for well over half an hour (except for the sermon, because that went on "in sæcula sæculorum" and he wasn't that good), FG would lapse into English. Just before Holy Communion, he said "Are you staying?" In a loud voice, I asked, "Why does he ask that every time, mummy?". Now this was a very genuine question, as it seemed to me that no-one ever had the guts to leave, even if their baby was screaming or a kid like me was coughing its little heart out. If you were dying for a pee, hard luck.

Mum had the grace to laugh (along with most of the congregation) and explained in a whisper. "He said, 'Agnus Dei', which means Lamb of God." Amazingly, I can recite that whole prayer in Latin now, but I still don't understand the Lamb bit.

Those were the days when all the shopping centres had inert nativity scenes with statues of

the holy family, the three wise men (the magi), miscellaneous shepherds who, it appears, had lost all but a couple of tame or curious sheep and at least one donkey who was quite glad to have borne the expectant mother to a place where there was hay, rather than the local pub. I loved those

little settings of figurines, there was something about them that was magical and reminded people exactly why we celebrate

> Our primary school in the UK put on a nativity play and I always hoped for the lead role, but only ever made it to a regular angel (as opposed to the higher rank of an Archangel, with meant wearing coveted silver wings). Nowadays I aspire to be even a regular angel, sadly without success. This was basically just a crowd part, requiring no skill except the ability to stand still and not fidget or wave at your parents, as that would dislodge your wings and possibly knock your neighbour into the wings of the stage. One could only hope.

Joseph and the shepherds, armed with the ubiquitous walking staffs, used to have swordfights with their tree branches backstage and some poor unsuspecting sheep or donkey would end up in tears or a fight would ensue, depending on the gender or mood of said wee beastie. On reflection, I was probably glad to be a low ranking angel and not a sheep.

I vividly remember the audience of parents and teachers gasping in horror as the Virgin Mary (goody goody Sarah F) dropped the baby Jesus when she tripped on her long dress, while Joseph guffawed amazingly loudly for a skinny little 8 year old. It stopped him picking his nose for a moment though. I am sorry, that is very irreverent, but it's a fact and it was only a doll and was just a boy with a nose that obviously needed picking. Sorry, sorry, too much information.

Unlike her mum, my daughter attained the lead role of the new mother in her school nativity play in Abu Dhabi, but looking back at the photos, Mary looked utterly fed up. All things aside, this was actually very well acted, as who wouldn't be feeling a bit miffed having a baby in a stable, surrounded by male strangers with useless presents and donkey dung. It may even have been the start of post natal depression. In any event, I was proud of my little girl's acting, although it was noted that she maintained the maximum allowable distance from Joseph, as if he had Covid. I was always a little jealous that she had made it to Mary status when I was just a mere lower ranking angel.

In many ways, I enjoyed my early childhood Christmases of yesteryear so much more than our totally commercialised, dereligionised celebration in the 21st Century. For the most part, gone are the days of homemade gifts, decorations and baked goods, even Christmas crackers and real Christmas trees. Fire was always a bit of a worry. Our family developed an aversion to fire at Christmas after my father having to dump the Christmas pudding in the kitchen sink one year after lighting the brandy swamped dessert next to a paper hat and panicking at the height of the ensuing flame. The following year he lit the candle in the heart of a beautiful, gifted Christmas centrepiece, the latter combusting on my mother's treasured Swiss tablecloth. The French doors were opened in a flash by my quick thinking cousin and the fiery missile hurled into the rose bed in a style worthy of Pat Cummins' praise.

Well, only 28 sleeps till Christmas. By the time you read February's edition I will have broken every one of my 10 new year resolutions. I am not going to tell you what they are, as I haven't made them up yet, but one will be to try and become an angel. Destined to fail. I wish you all a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year. Reach out to those who may be alone on Christmas Day and here's to peace and growing awareness in 2026. Ad Meliora!

#### Kuranda Kindergarten Cultivates Global Citizens Through Language Program

Kuranda Community Kindergarten is fostering a rich multicultural environment with its unique language and culture program, which has seen significant growth this year. The initiative exposes young children to a variety of world languages and deepens their connection to our local Djabugay culture.

At the heart of Kuranda, our kindergarten is making a world of difference. We have been developing a special language and culture program that brings the globe to our Kindy. This year, the program has continued to flourish, with parents actively participating by reading stories to the children in languages such as German, French, Japanese and Djabugay. This initiative is designed to offer more than just new words; it aims to build a foundation of cultural understanding and respect from a young age. The kindergarten emphasises the significant cognitive and social benefits of early language exposure.

According to the program's philosophy, hearing different languages helps enhance problem-solving skills, improves memory and strengthens a child's sense of cultural identity. Ms Amanda hopes that "early exposure to different languages and cultures will help foster a greater understanding and appreciation of diversity, leading to more positive social interactions,". This approach also supports "metalinguistic awareness," helping children better understand how language works which in turn strengthens their proficiency in their primary language.

A key component of the program is its focus on local

culture. The Djabugay Language and Culture Program has continued to thrive, thanks to the dedicated efforts of Mrs Tahalani. Visiting the kindergarten twice a week, she engages the children in Djabugay culture through games, songs and stories. This interactive and visual project is making the language and culture tangible and exciting for the young learners.

As the program grows stronger each year, we have already started planning for next year. Families with children ready to start in 2026 are invited to a welcome day on Wednesday, 21 January 2026. This event will provide an opportunity for both enrolled and prospective families to experience the kindergarten's vibrant and inclusive atmosphere firsthand. By weaving global and local threads into the fabric of early education, Kuranda Community Kindergarten is not just learning through play while preparing children for school, but for a connected and diverse world.

We would like to say a big thank you to everyone who has contributed to the growth of our Kindy in 2025. Out on the Nyuwarri Estate, we've wrapped up riparian restoration along Warril Creek and finished Stage 1 of the new walking track, Gudju Gudju Djumburru (Rainbow Snake Track). The gardens are now bursting with mayi (native bushfoods and medicines). Big thanks to our mates at the Kuranda Envirocare Nursery for helping bring that to life.



Two of our Rangers took part in specialised flying-fox training with Terrain NRM and the whole team has been out on Country for water-quality testing with local scientist and zoologist Megan Comerford from Megan's Wild Science, keeping a close eye on the health of our wuru (waterways).

#### CHRISTMAS BEETLES COUNT

For the last few years, our December article in *The Kuranda Paper* has focused on the Christmas Beetle Count project and this year is no different – we still want people to get involved in this yearly citizen science project. And this year, beetle season has started early, with observations being made across Australia since October. Since the project started in 2022, there have been over 20,000 observations of 39 different species of Christmas beetle made across Australia. You can head to the project page of the Christmas Beetle Count in the iNaturalist website to see all the beetles that have been observed so far: https://www.inaturalist.org/projects/christmas-beetle-count. Details on how to get involved are below.

Summer in Australia is signified by all sorts of occurrences in nature, but one which many people identify with is the appearance of Christmas beetles. These stunning beetles usually emerge in early summer, coinciding with Christmas. In the past, they have been seen in large numbers, decorating gum trees in their own unique way. Unfortunately, it is mainly the older generation of people that remember these beetles, as they are sadly in decline. The mass emergence of these beetles during the Christmas season is becoming a thing of the past. Scientists are trying to discover why and we need your help!

Christmas beetles belong to the scarab family of beetles. We have over thirty species of Christmas beetles in Australia, with colour forms which include brown, green, blue and even stunning gold. The majority of species are found along the east coast of Australia and most are endemic (found only in Australia).

The life cycle of these beetles is the same basic cycle as most beetles. In this case, eggs are laid underground in grasslands adjacent to eucalypt trees or forests. The grubs (larvae) feed upon grass roots and their growth is dependent on soil temperature. Those in warmer climates may emerge a year later, whilst those in cooler regions may spend two years underground. The larvae are called curl grubs – they are crescent-shaped with a pale, reddish-brown head and three pairs of legs, but can be quite difficult to distinguish from other beetle larvae.

After pupating, the adults time their emergence with warmer conditions and are also stimulated by rainfall. Different species will emerge at different times throughout the summer; perhaps to avoid direct competition. Other factors can influence the exact timing of their emergence, such as seasonal variations in weather patterns. Most Christmas beetles emerge from November to February, but as we know, many appear in late December. But in the last 15 years, the number of beetles emerging each year is declining. Why is this? We simply do not have enough information currently to know for sure. There are some contributing factors. One is definitely habitat loss, as grassland areas and open woodland areas are cleared for developments. The second is our use of insecticides in the garden and around the home and the third is climate change. These beetles are essential to a healthy ecosystem, as they provide food for mammals, birds and reptiles at a time when these animals are raising young.

So, how can you help with saving the Christmas beetle? The University of Sydney has teamed up with Invertebrates Australia, an organisation that is dedicated to the conservation of invertebrates all across Australia. They have a project called the Christmas Beetle Count and they are asking you to record when you spot a Christmas beetle. This is called citizen science and it is an exciting way to be part of a large research project.

#### The steps to be involved are simple:

- 1. Download the iNaturalist app. This can be on your smart phone or mobile device, or you can also access it on a
- 2. Create an account this is completely free
- Search for the project "Christmas Beetle Count"
- Take a photo of the Christmas beetle that you have found. Christmas beetles are nocturnal, so it is likely you'll find them flying to lights at night, but you might also spot them on gum trees through the day.
- Add your observation and photo to the iNaturalist app and include as much information about where you found the beetle as possible. Even if you haven't joined the project, any sighting of a Christmas beetle will be included. Be sure to update the geoprivacy to open (which gives the exact location the photo was taken), or obscured, which will round the location data to a 20km radius.

And that's it! But what if you don't know how to identify a Christmas beetle? The Australian Museum has an app that will help you ID a Christmas beetle - it's called Xmas Beetle ID Guide. iNaturalist will also help to ID your beetle from the thousands of records it already has on beetles. A few guidelines are that Christmas beetles tend to be oval in shape and are quite chunky beetles. They are often iridescent in colour, but not always. Their head has a sort of 'duckbill' shape and their back legs are thick, like they are wearing a set of leg warmers.

### TREET TREES OF KURANDA

This month it has been a shrub rather than a street tree which caught the eye. Flowering in a Coondoo Street garden was the hard working and undemanding Cat's Whiskers (Orthosiphon aristatus). This is the white version; a purple version also exists.

This plant is a medicinal herb found mainly throughout southern China, the Indian subcontinent, South East Asia and tropical Queensland, Australia. As a medical herb, it is used for increasing excretion of urine, lowering uric acid, protecting

kidneys, reducing oxidative stress, reducing inflammation, protecting the liver and stomach, lowering blood pressure, ameliorating diabetes, ameliorating hyperlipidemia, fighting microorganisms and fighting anorexia. It is known as kumis kucing in Indonesia and misai kucing in Malaysia, both of which translate to cat's whiskers.

Orthosiphon aristatus is used in landscaping to attract bees, butterflies and hummingbirds to its nectar. It strikes easily and can form an attractive hedge in short time.

#### Did you Make a Ceramic Tile at the old Kuranda Primary School?

Did you or your children attend the old Kuranda Primary School where the library is now? Many of you will remember making ceramic tiles in your classes and you may know that these tiles have so far been preserved (or perhaps just overlooked) on murals that were once classroom walls. The buildings have been demolished, but the tiles are still there and many of them have peoples' names on them.

Here at the Kuranda Historical Society (KHS) we noted recently that the Mareeba Shire Council have announced that they have funding for a Kuranda Community Precinct Playground Development. This seems to focus on the creation of a new playground in the "Precinct" - that is the area where the old primary school once was.

Those walls of tiles, made about 30 years ago, are still there in the area we believe is earmarked for the new playground and we at KHS feel they should be preserved and protected as a worthy part of Kuranda's history.

Did you make one of these tiles? Would you like to identify it for posterity? We would like to hear from you if you can identify the creators of each or any of the tiles. We will create a record and add it to the KHS online collection (www. thecollectingbug.com/kurandahistoricalsociety/) so that it can be preserved for future generations.

And we hope that the actual murals will also be preserved somehow in the new playground area.

Also new reports are coming in about Merlin with two chicks in Black Mountain Road and most recently Dad with two chicks in Black Mountain Road. Road sightings are always frightening as we worry about their safety. Please look out on any rural road for a possible, sudden and unexpected appearance of cassowaries – and any wildlife, for that matter.

Researcher Skye Anderson and her team have

returned to Kuranda to collect the cameras she placed across the greater cassowary habitat region, including around Kuranda some two months ago. Skye is undertaking this camera trapping project towards her PhD studies at the University of Queensland for the Ecological Cascades Lab. Her project will contribute data to the Wildlife Observatory of Australia.

What she finds when she's checked out all the cameras, with the many shots of the wildlife that have passed by them, will greatly add to our knowledge of the wildlife around us. The pictures may also reveal feral pigs and dingoes and other things not anticipated. We are honoured to have hosted Skye and her team while they were here in Kuranda.

#### 2025 Presidents Report - Annie Clarke

It's been a full year - finishing off projects and most aptly described as consolidating, using the time to step back a little to review the direction of the organisation.

We have taken the first step in writing an updated Strategic Plan, sending out a survey asking Members where they would like to see Kuranda EnviroCare head going forward. Responses indicate Members want the nursery and revegetation activities as a priority.

We were successful in gaining yet another Yellow Crazy Ant community engagement contract with WTMA where Rachel Reece (also our Nursery Manager) plans events to make sure the community is kept alert for Invasive Ants. We also celebrated 10 years of the YCA Community Task Force. An amazing achievement.

Our frog surveys have continued with Chloe now leading the surveys. These surveys monitor the endemic Kuranda Tree Frog and inform local conservation efforts in collaboration with JCU. Thank you Bruce Wannan for pulling all the data from the last 12 years together.

We have renewed our working relationship with Djabugay Rangers and have a signed Memorandum of Understanding.

Margaret Zehntner organised the revision of our Welcome to Kuranda booklet for new residents who seek

local information on environment and community. Plans are progressing with the Kuranda District State College to continue the Kuranda Tree Frog corridor along the Barron

Our Small World program (interstate students seeking give back to the environment experience) continues.

Our Cain Creek sign was erected next to the very successful Cain Creek re-vegetation demonstration plot along Myola Road.

This waterway re-vegetation project has only been possible with support of the adjacent Cain Creek landholders, NQ Wildlife Trust and dedicated volunteers including TAFE students. The creek's banks are now shady and stable with the watercourse resuming its natural meandering and the water is clear and cool. It would be lovely to see platypus and the Kuranda tree frog back in there again. Thank you Andrew Horn for making this happen. It's a great example of how revegetation can bring a whole suite of benefits. Plans for next year: The Envirocare nursery is in need of a rebuild and we're looking at designs and funding sources to progress this project.

We know that some members of the community continue to be conflicted over Envirocare's use of glyphosate. We are revising policy and Standard Operating Procedures to address these concerns.

This Christmas, challenge yourself to gift consumables and

ideas for reducing waste at Christmas by applying the Rs of the waste-reduction hierarchy: rethink, refuse, reduce, reuse, repurpose, repair, recycle, rot.

Rethink the idea that bigger is better: Christmas is a celebration of love and life, not consumerism.

You can choose to refuse Christmas gimmicks and reduce the amount of stuff you buy this festive season. Before you buy a random gift, ask the receiver for gift ideas. You could contribute to a single, more significant gift. Embracing Secret Santa or "KK" (where each person in a group gives a gift to only one other person in the group) results in fewer (and usually better) presents. Support local businesses instead of department stores and choose natural materials to reduce the environmental impact.

I am a fan of gifting consumables (things you use up), like home-made treats and preserves, or gourmet goodies from the health-food shop, local markets or delicatessen. Kuranda has local honey, candy, chocolate and tea. Bottles from local wineries, distilleries and craft breweries make easy gifts. Kids like receiving cash that they can use to practise saving and spending.

Experiences make great gifts too and are another way to avoid contributing to the mountain of unwanted stuff that overwhelms our op shops after every festive season. In the last few years, I've given gift vouchers for ice-creameries, movies, a fairy tea party, water parks, a Santa steam-train ride, massage, family chiropractic care and streaming services.

Reuse at Christmas by sourcing second-hand decorations, gift bags and wrapping paper. Op shops have loads of them! Reuse your tree and decorations, year after year. I have enjoyed making reusable Advent calendars and cotton Christmas bunting to avoid the throwaway plastic

alternatives. Or make your own ornaments from felt or scrap fabric or recycled materials.

This year I decided to repurpose some freebie magnetic calendars from previous years: I peeled the plastic film off them and glued on family photos to create DIY photo magnets! What could you creatively upcycle to bring joy this Christmas? Judicious regifting is also a form of repurposing.

Or could you offer to repair something for someone this Christmas? The gift of your time is a valuable and thoughtful present. Some do this in the form of a "gift voucher" or IOU for time or services.

Don't forget to recycle this Christmas by taking recyclables to a local recycling station. But note that foil, plastic and glitter embellishments on Christmas wrapping and cards are not recyclable.

Plan Christmas food with your family: who will bring what? How much will be plenty? Choose reusable plates, bowls, cups and cutlery at your Christmas gathering, then make the clean-up a family activity!

The days after Christmas can be catered for by creatively using up leftover meat and veggies in salads, sandwiches, pizzas, fried rice and frittata. Use bones to make broth that you can freeze (to make soups and stews another day).

Rot the rest in the compost. Merry Christmas, Waste-**Busters!**

## Are you disaster ready?

#### How do I prepare for disaster season?

- Understand your risk
- Sign up to the Early Warning Network to receive severe weather emergency alerts by SMS, email or voice to landlines.
- Decide in advance if you will evacuate or shelter in place.
- Know your evacuation route and prepare an emergency plan, including emergency numbers:
  - Police, Ambulance or Fire: 000
  - o SES: 132 500
- Clean up your yard, secure loose items and move possessions to high ground if you live in an area prone to flooding.
- Take appropriate steps to protect your property.
- If necessary, get sandbags ready early, contact the local SES for
- Pack an emergency kit. Have enough supplies to last at least 3 days, locations that are easily isolated should keep supplies for 5 to 7 days.
- Get to know your neighbours.
- Purchase a battery radio to keep informed about disasters in case you become isolated and lose power and communications.
- Familiarise yourself with the Australian Warning System symbols.



#### Advice (Yellow):

An incident has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes.

#### Watch and Act (Orange):



There is a heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing and you need to start taking action now to protect you and your family.



#### **Emergency Warning (Red):**

An Emergency Warning is the highest level of warning. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk.

#### What do I do during an event?

- Listen to advice from Emergency Services.
- Be aware of your surroundings and action your emergency plan.
- Keep informed visit MSC Emergency Management Dashboard and the Bureau of Meteorology.
- Keep in contact with your friends or family.
- Follow on Facebook My Police Tablelands, QLD Fire Department and Mareeba Shire Council.
- Listen to local radio stations ABC Far North (Cairns / Kuranda 801AM, Mareeba 106.7 FM, Dimbulah 91.7 FM, Mt Molloy 95.7 FM), Black Star (96.7 FM), KIK-FM (88.7 FM) 4AM (558 AM).
- Download Emergency Apps SES Assistance QLD, Emergency +, BOM, Red Cross First Aid and SunWater.

#### What do I do after an event?

- Listen to advice from Emergency Services.
- Stay away from fallen powerlines
- To report electric shocks or fallen powerlines 24/7 dial 000 or call
- Never drive in flood waters, there could be hidden dangers.
- Returning to affected buildings? Be mindful of electricity and gas connections, water and food safety, fallen trees.
- Phone Ergon Energy on 13 22 96 If you have lost power or are experiencing electricity supply problems.
- Visit Mareeba Shire Council Emergency Management Dashboard for up-to-date information on road conditions and power
- Contact your insurance company to lodge a claim and seek guidance for the next steps.
- Visit Mareeba Shire Council's website for the latest information on assistance and grants available.

#### How does Mareeba Shire Council respond during a disaster?

Local governments are primarily responsible for co-ordinating disaster events in their local government areas.

MSC is responsible for the development and implementation of a local disaster management plan. Coordinated disaster management is achieved through the LDMG (Local Disaster Management Group).

Membership of the LDMG is comprised of representatives from Council, State Emergency Response Agencies (SES, QLD Police, QLD Fire Dept), Department of Health, Department of Education and Department of Transport & Main Roads

The LDMG has four sub-groups that support different sectors and assets of the community. The Economic Sub-Group, Public Health and Environment Sub-Group, Built, Environment / Infrastructure Sub-Group, and Community Support Sub-Group.

In the event of a disaster, the LDMG may establish a Local Disaster Coordination Centre. Requests for assistance will be directed through this centre and escalated as necessary.

Council hosts the Emergency Management Dashboard to provide residents with up-to-date information from multiple state agencies and sources in one place.

Council will keep the community informed of any changes to services during this time, such as water outages or rubbish bin collections, via the MSC website and Facebook Page and broadcast messages via local radio stations.

#### How does Mareeba Shire Council respond after a disaster?

Immediately following an event, Council's primary responsibility is to restore its essential services as soon as possible. This includes:

- Ensuring access to local roads
- Maintaining water and waste services
- Continuing kerbside waste collection

You can help Council by reporting incidents on 1300 308 461.

After addressing immediate needs, Council begins other restorative works such as repairing local roads and restoring public facilities and infrastructure.

State and Federal funding are often required to repair disaster damage through Disaster Recovery Fund Arrangements.

**FESTIVE FOOD** should not be a source of stress for either cooks or guests. Especially here in the bountiful tropics where we have ready access to such a wonderful range of fresh fruits and vegetables. Special dietary needs can easily be addressed without causing too much effort - especially if options such as vegetarian, vegan or gluten free are just included as delicious parts of the meal which anyone can enjoy. Many dishes, such as salads etc, are already vegan/vego/gluten free until the sauce or topping is added. By keeping the sauce or topping as a separate optional dressing everyone can partake. Similarly, if roasting or BBQ-ing vegetables just keep some or all away from any meat or fish during the cooking process and serve in separate dishes.

Of course it's great to expand one's culinary repertoire to include some tasty plant-based treats - and is always very much appreciated. Here are a few plant-iful party dishes everyone will appreciate. Served alongside more traditional fare as well as fruit platters and salads, they will ensure everyone can enjoy the many social gatherings common at year's end and new year's beginnin

#### Thai Green Curry Samosa Pinwheels via contentednesscooking.com Makes 24

Ingredients: 2 sweet potatoes peeled and cut into cubes, 1 425gm can chickpeas (or fresh cooked and cooled), 1/2 cup coconut oil room temp, 5 cloves garlic peeled, pressed, salt, pepper to taste, 1 batch Thai Green Curry Sauce, 4 tortillas (gluten free), optional: 1/2 cup cashews + tandoori spice mix (just mix Cashews with Tandoori Mix, salt, pepper, curry, ginger, turmeric, chili powder), 1/4 cup raisins, fresh coriander, chopped.

Instructions: For Curry sauce: 2 tbs Cashew Butter, 1 tbs Green curry paste, 1/3 cup water to thin. Prepare the curry sauce: Combine all the ingredients in a small bowl and whisk until smooth.

Cook sweet potatoes then mash with coconut oil and chickpeas. Mix with garlic, salt and pepper. Allow mix to cool. Assemble your pinwheels: put 2 heaping tbs of the potato mixture in your tortillas, sprinkle with Thai Green Curry sauce, roll. Cut into fingerfood size portions.

Baked Vegan Spicy Vegetable Samosas via eathealthyeathappy.com

*Ingredients:* 2 the olive oil, *Spices:* 1 tsp red or yellow curry powder, 1 tsp garam masala, 1/4 tsp smoked paprika, 1 tsp cumin, 1/2 tsp chili powder, a scant 1/8 tsp-1/4 tsp red pepper flakes, depending on how hot and spicy you like your samosas. Vegetables: 1 med onion, 1 med carrot chopped fine, 2 med potatoes, peeled and finely diced, 2 med red bell peppers, diced, optional – 1 or more red or green chili peppers to taste, seeded and chopped fine, about 1 tbs fresh ginger, grated 1 tsp garlic minced, 1 cup water, about 11/2 cups green peas, fresh or frozen and thawed, 10 spring roll wrappers.

Instructions: Combine the oil and spices in a large skillet over medium low heat. Stir for about 2 minutes. Add the vegetables, raise the heat to medium and stir-fry for about 5 minutes. Stir in ginger, garlic and water. Cover and simmer for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally, turn heat down a bit if needed. Stir in peas and until they're heated through. Take off heat and let come to room temp. When you're ready to fill your samosas, position two racks in the middle of the oven and heat it to 180°C. Grease two cookie sheets or line with baking paper and have a little container of water, a pastry brush and your wrappers ready. As you wrap the samosas, arrange them on the cookie sheets. You should be able to get 5 on each sheet without them overlapping, brush tops with olive oil then pop them into the oven for about 8 minutes. Get them out, turn them over to brown on the other side and return them to the oven, switching rack positions, for another 8 minutes. You can eat them straight out of the oven, let them cool a bit first (which I like), or let them cool completely and then reheat them whenever you like.

#### Cranberry Salsa via frieddandelions.com

Ingredients: 2 cups fresh or frozen whole cranberries, 1 large orange, quartered with peel ON, 1/2 cup shallot, 1/2 cup coriander (or alternate herb), 1 jalapeño, 1/4 cup coconut, salt to taste.

Instructions: Place all ingredients in the food processor. Pulse until the ingredients break down, but are not pureed. You are looking for a relish consistency and should be able to see bits of all of the ingredients. Serve with tortilla chips or such.



#### A 9-step Plotting Path

For my final article, I'd like to touch on structure.

There are countless methods of developing a plot for a story. I've tried dozens. If you don't count cramping in the lotus position and waiting for the muse to strike, most of these have worked to a degree. But not one gave me the consistent technique I wanted. I finally came up with a visualisation that works for me – a plotting path. It's straightforward, simple and makes me laugh, which is desperately needed at the plotting stage of my writing.

The plotting path is based on one specific premise: your relationship with your main character. It will not always be sunny, but love him, respect him and, above all, challenge him. The objective is to make him work for the dubious honour of playing the main role in your story.

Feel free to adjust this plotting path to make it fit into your own style of creating.

- 1. Create your main character. As most readers have trouble identifying with perfection (no offense intended), make sure he is three-dimensional, likeable and has some interesting flaws. Many won't truly identify with someone who refuses to swipe a finger through the chocolate frosting. Let's face it; we all swipe the frosting at times.
- Give him a goal. Often, if you develop your character well enough, one of his less-than-perfect character traits will point you in the right direction. The critical thing here is to give your main character a goal that is personally important and easily defined. Your main character and his goal will change with every story, but your plotting path - your visualisation - is the main character's journey toward this goal. Visualise the goal as something tangible: a star, a soccer ball or a Ferrari if you like.
- Throw an obstacle at him. Once your character's goal is clear and definable, send him along the wooded path to achieve it. Make sure you perch on a comfortable branch above him with your bag of tricks. As he spots the shining star through the trees and strides toward his goal, toss a banana skin under his feet.
- Throw him another one. When he regains his footing and catches a glimpse of the star in the distance, race ahead of him and push over a massive tree, blocking his path.
- Throw him a third (this is optional). The star still beckons. As he's climbing over the trunk or finding another way around the tree, clamber back into the highest branches

and scramble along the canopy. Pull a cleverly situated chain that releases a pack of dogs, trained to block the path. You can now allow your maniacal laughter to escape as he won't hear it over the growling canines.

- Throw him your biggest and best. After he's distracted the dogs using his courage and ingenuity, the star is brighter than ever. It's time to throw him his final and seemingly insurmountable obstacle. Pull your magic powder from your bag of tricks and sprinkle it on the path. Watch with glee as it sparkles and grows and becomes a large body of water shimmering between your main character and his goal.
- Allow him to wallow. Your character wants to give up. He shakes a fist at you and nearly turns back. He's tired of
- Let him succeed in spite of you. He decides to give it one more try. The star shines like the sun and, after all, success is the best revenge. With pleasant visions of sprinkling itching powder in your underwear and mutiny on his mind, he builds a raft and paddles across the sea. He grabs his star, reaching his goal. At this stage, it's up to you whether you throw a couple of great whites or piranhas into the water, but it may be time to give the guy a break. He had a goal, overcame many obstacles and achieved his aim using unique and unexplored skills. You were no help at all.
- Allow your character to grow. As your character curses you and struggles to reach his goal, make sure that he is learning. External conflict can be riveting - the ground slippery, the path blocked and the dogs mean. But internal conflict is where your readers will find the satisfaction. Your main character can fight laziness, boredom, fear of failure, lack of confidence or a difficult relationship. If you have the stomach to throw angry Rottweilers at him, you will have no trouble giving him a debilitating character trait.

If the plotting path doesn't strike a chord with you and you'd rather try waiting for inspiration in the lotus position, it can't hurt. (Wrong, it can hurt but your main character will love you for it.) But if you decide to use this plotting path, just remember to challenge your main character and give him enough untapped ingenuity or strength to succeed in spite of your evil ways.



At the same time Sun, Mercury, Venus and Mars all enter the air sign of Aquarius. 

Welcome to that time of year when folks start to form ideas for their New Year Resolutions. Turning over a fresh new leaf is a great aspiration and opportunity for renewal, to forge new interests or to take uncharted pathways.

It's surprising how often people tell me they aspire to express themselves and to write more. Some talk of daily jottings or ideas (including drawings) much like a diary. Others talk of journaling to keep track of personal or family events, or simply to enjoy some uninterrupted 'me-time' in touch with one's inner-self in the tactile pleasure of flowing handwriting.

Others tell of a wish to write fun-filled and endearing short stories about quirky family pets, wild animals or the natural environment to share with their grandchildren. Featuring our own local fauna and fauna is a subtle form of education about our own special time and place within World Heritage Listed Wet Tropics rainforest.

Another common desire I hear is to write a memoir, or more specifically, small snippets recounting significant moments in one's own life, before they are lost forever. This could be a personal record to pass on to new generations of the family, or it may have epic implications if historic events like world wars or famous cyclones are backdrops that impact on the story.

Of course, one of the best ways to begin a memoir is to just write word-for-word the stories of real events that you have aired repeatedly at gatherings over and over, as based on audience reaction you have already refined these into tightly edited stories for maximum impact.

Be aware that often when starting out you may get nervous, freeze or shrink into more formal or dry language. To circumvent this stasis, you could make it more 'live' by setting up a video camera that you quickly forget is there while someone you trust asks you the key questions to keep you on track. Making a text transcript of this for print later is as easy as a click these days, after which, you can continue to refine it further to your own satisfaction.

The monthly Kuranda Writers Group meetings are there to support all aspiring local authors to take their next steps. So, consider whether it might be a plus in the New Year for you to join the group as a nurturing environment to air your efforts? Containing both experienced and new writers, feedback is optional. It may be more than enough for new writers reading their work aloud for the first time. Others seek specific suggestions for improvement.

The monthly meetings often have a 'prompt' to write to as a stimulus. The current one for the 8 December meeting is 'The Wet'. You can bring along a short piece to share on the topic, or you can simply share your recent writing instead, we are that flexible. We often devote some time to discuss what we have been reading, watching or listening to lately, which inevitably leads to free-wheeling conversations about life.

Newcomers to the group for the December or January meetings, on the second Monday from 10.00am - 12 noon at the Kuranda Library at, will be warmly welcomed. #### **BOOK RELEASE: A RAIL TRAGEDY REMEMBERED**

The Steam Train crew members who lost their lives or were seriously injured following a rail accident near the Barron Falls, Kuranda, Queensland on 25 November 1918 have been duly honoured and remembered with a new book titled The Kuranda Range Railway Tragedy of 1918, authored by Mareeba based history enthusiast Michael Musumeci

Michael Musumeci has compiled a book that includes the Coronial Inquest, rare photographs and shares his research findings about the Queensland Rail employees who lost their lives in the tragedy.

The book provides a detailed insight into the locomotive that was returning to Cairns on that morning when it left the rails, crashing into a wall of rock at the head of the Barron Gorge. On board were three employees Thomas Patrick Duignan

(Driver), Evan William Whiting (Fireman) who lost their lives and James Patrick Foely (Guard) who was seriously injured.

'The book captures a tragic day Far North Queensland was saddened to learn and experience the loss of these brave men, who went to work, but never came home. It's a tragedy that shouldn't be forgotten, but duly honoured and our local history needs to be told to our younger generations. Steam Train crews back in the early 1900s built the foundations of how so many of our northern communities were born, built and supported and

#### **Book Review: How to Keep Your Clothes Forever** by Leah Giblin

In this last year, I have been slowly learning how to sew my own clothes and as I have learned more about the process, I have become increasingly aware of how unsustainable the current fast-fashion world we live in is.

So, it was a nice surprise to come across this this book in the library! The author, Leah Giblin, a textile and clothing designer, educator, sustainable fashion advocate and dress-up-box enthusiast, has created a book that really focuses on giving us positive solutions that we can

implement straight away, that will help us reduce our fast-fashion footprint, fall back in love with the clothes we already own and how to make the best sustainable and ethical choices possible when we need to buy new.

The book is broken down into three main sections: One about how to assess our buying habits and how to buy less or buy better, one about how to care for your clothes to help them last and one about how to mend or upcycle your clothes, or what to do if you really can't, or don't want to,


I appreciated the practical exercises throughout the book – how to go about doing a wardrobe stocktake to figure out what you already have and what you really need in your day-to-day life, the best ways to wash your clothing depending on the fibre content, recipes for spot cleaning and stain removers, how to interpret care labels, simple mending guides for spot-fixes, or how to completely upcycle an item and create something new out of it.

There was also a lot of interesting information and resources talked about throughout to help figure out the best way to make the best sustainable and ethical choices you can and helpfully, further resources are listed at the end of the book if you want more information.

I also liked that Giblin leaned into the 'dress-up-box' mentality throughout to make the practical exercises fun and not too much like a chore. After-all, while we all have our practical reasons for wearing clothing, it's also a great tool of self-expression and for me, I think this book succeeds in helping you feel more inspired and excited about what is already in your wardrobe.

It's also a very pretty book from a graphic design perspective - the photographs used throughout, layout, the heavier paper and the bright colour used for the text make it a feast for the eyes as you read through. If you have an interest in fashion, sewing or sustainability, I think this one is well-worth checking out.


