

**Youth Substance Misuse Service (YSMS):** A drug and alcohol program for young people aged 10-17 will be providing an outreach service one day per week (Wednesdays) based at KNC. **Lifeline Financial Counselling:** Lifeline financial counselling sessions can be arranged at KNC on Monday mornings. The counselors are experienced workers who can help you sort out how to manage financial problems, debts and budgets. # **Twenty Red Roses**

The chirruping sounds of birds in the early dawn drew Laura Mitchell reluctantly out of a deep, dreamless sleep. Half awake, she rolled over in the bed to where her drowsy mind expected to find her husband Frank. As full wakefulness emerged, awareness struck her overwhelmingly; he was not there and never would be again. As always, the shock of realisation assaulted her senses as if the events of his death had taken place only yesterday, instead of more than three years ago.

She wondered how long it would be before she could accept his dying without this terrible pain. She turned to lie on her back again, eyes closed, a lone tear sliding down one cheek.

She knew that the unexpectedness of his death had contributed to the difficulty she was experiencing. He had been seven years younger than she was, and she had always assumed that he would probably be the one left alone by death. So she had been totally unprepared for the fatal heart attack he suffered at the age of sixty-nine. The doctors told her that he must have been experiencing quite intense pain at times, but he had never complained of discomfort, except for what he attributed to indigestion.

They had been married for forty-five years, and she had depended on Frank in ways that now left her floundering, physically as well as emotionally. She had never learnt to drive, for example, although in the earlier years of their marriage he had quite frequently suggested that she do so. Eventually he stopped mentioning it, perhaps realising that the time was past when she would have the confidence to learn. The many things they did together had always been enjoyable shared time for her, and he never appeared to begrudge driving her wherever she wanted to go.

Laura had thought of them as self-contained; they didn't need anyone else. Although childless, she had rarely had paid employment, apart from occasional casual cleaning, and over the years that Frank worked as a salesman he would always share the interesting points of each day with her. From his descriptions she was as familiar with many of his clients as if she had met them.

Almost the only area of Frank's life in which Laura did not participate was his passion for growing roses. Frank had adored his roses. "If you had to make a choice between me and your precious roses, I believe you would choose the roses," she had said to him more than once. Because this was an area of his life that he seemed unwilling to share, she begrudged the time he gave to what was, she considered, only a hobby. She particularly resented time he would spend just sitting, eyes closed, on a deckchair in his greenhouse. "The roses help me to relax," he would explain, and when she asked why he didn't come into the house to relax, he would simply smile his gentle smile and say nothing.

The roses were really the only area of their life over which they didn't agree. Not that they actively disagreed; Laura could truthfully say that in all their years of marriage they had never had an argument. But if she was honest she would admit that this was mostly due to Frank's easygoing nature. When Laura was irritable, Frank would answer her quietly and then go out to his rose garden or greenhouse until she was over her bad mood.

Frank had grown roses for as long as she had known him. He had learnt about roses from his father, and after their marriage he established beautiful rose gardens at the front of their house, eventually adding a greenhouse where he grew rare and sensitive varieties.

Recalling Frank and his roses, a sudden realisation came to her: today was the twentyninth of February, and it was her birthday; her eightieth birthday, in fact. Since Frank's death she had not paid attention to her birthday (which they had usually celebrated on the twentyeighth anyway), because there was no one to share it with.

Frank had always remembered. From the first year of their marriage he had given her roses on any special occasions. Red roses were her favourite, particularly perfumed red roses. When he discovered this Frank had sought out a beautiful, highly perfumed red rose, 'Velvet Fragrance', and propagated it in his greenhouse with his other delicate varieties.

Since his death Laura had had neither the motivation nor the knowledge to take care of the roses as Frank had done. They continued to bloom and she sometimes cut flowers for the house, but the bushes had become straggly and untidy from lack of pruning, dead heads were not removed, and the foliage looked less healthy due to nutrient deficiencies.

She missed him unbearably. She found no joy in her life now; the things they had done together had no meaning when she had to do them alone. She had few real friends because she had never sought them; her marriage had been enough for her. Acquaintances who, since Frank's death, had invited her to lunch, to the movies or just to visit had pretty much given up because she always declined. All that she could think about much of the time now was how long before she could be free to be with her dear Frank again. If only there was some way that they could still communicate, she believed she could wait more easily until it was her time to go.

Realising that she had stayed in bed far later than usual, Laura got up and fixed herself tea and toast. A fine birthday breakfast, she thought derisively, but what's to celebrate? If only I had the courage to end it all, but I don't even know how to go about doing that.

Carrying a slice of toast, she walked outside into feeble early spring sunlight. A stiff breeze was blowing and she was tempted to return indoors immediately, until she noticed that the branch of a tree had snapped off during the night, and was hanging off the greenhouse roof. She walked over and removed it, and for the first time in weeks she felt drawn to go inside. The pictures in her mind were so clear: Frank out here working away with his roses, or lying back in his chair, eyes closed. Normally the pain of it made her avoid going inside; today however, she walked around the side and opened the door.

She was immediately struck by the almost overpowering scent of roses. As the perfume filled her nostrils, she felt a surge of joy for the first time in many months. Looking around she saw that several bushes were in flower, but most evident was her Velvet Fragrance. It was literally covered in blooms, far more than she had ever seen on it, even when Frank was carefully nurturing it. Overwhelmed, she walked towards it and began to count the roses ...17 ...18 ...19 ...20. Twenty flowers at one time, how amazing; how absolutely beautiful! She counted again to make sure. Yes, there were definitely twenty.

All at once she felt as if Frank was in the greenhouse with her – if she turned quickly she might see him. In her mind she could hear him saying, "Twenty red roses for my beautiful twenty-year-old wife." It had been a joke that he repeated on her birthday – her real birthday – that because she had a birthday only every four years she was far younger than he was, and the gap continued to widen. So today they would have celebrated her twentieth birthday.

Suddenly she knew that Frank was indeed with her – they had never been separated. Feeling a little faint she sat down in his chair, lay back and closed her eyes, as she had so often seen him.

I can see why he would sit like this, she thought sleepily, as the perfume seemed to become even stronger. I feel so warm, so totally relaxed.

A neighbour discovered her late that afternoon. Noticing that her morning paper had not been collected from her front lawn, he came over to check on her wellbeing. After a search of the unlocked house and of the yard, he opened the greenhouse door and saw her, apparently sleeping. When he looked more closely he realised that she had died.

Hands crossed on her heart, she held a single red rose, and on her face was a smile.

When people ask me how something as simple as breathing could heal them, I usually first ask them if they believe that our state of mind, including our tional stress levels, are as important to our health as proper diet, sleep and exercise. 



# Graceful work life

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# **Benefits of Detoxing**

# Why detox

- Can help with weight loss, mental clarity, boost immunity and improve skin. Carcinogens and free radicals left in the body can cause cancer and may lead to other disease states.
- If you're suffering from headaches, indigestion, wind, constipation, eczema, dark circle under the eyes or constantly tired you could be suffering from toxic overload and benefit from a detox.

### What are toxins

Wheat-grass/Spirulina/Chlorella: All high vitamin and mineral content including powerful antioxidants. Contains chlorophyll which works directly on the liver and lymphatic system to eliminate toxins. Stimulates cleansing of the bowel; is a blood tonic and cleanser. Aloe Vera: Balances the gastrointestinal tract, helping irritable bowel and constipation. Milk Thistle, Dandelion, Globe **Artichoke:** increase the efficiency of the liver and kidneys, stimulating regeneration and improving ability to filter toxins; Pau d'arco, Wormwood, Black walnut: Kill worms, candida and parasites; Olive Leaf, Ginger, Garlic: Antimicrobial: kills fungal, viral & bacterial infestations; Cascara, Peppermint, **Barberry:** Bowel stimulants for increased elimination. Complete Detox Programs are available as teas, tablets, liquids and powders. They can be done in combination with a regular diet ranging from 7 days to a month.

NB:Detoxing can cause nausea, headaches and dizziness. Pregnant, breast feeding or convalescent people should avoid detox. **Detox foot spas** and **foot patches** are alternate methods. **Consult a health practitioner or naturopath for the best program to suit you.**

# Inside My Studio

### Interview & Photographs by Toni Rogers

It was a perfect, sunny, winter Kuranda Saturday morning and I met with **Peter** Thompson (Peter Potter as he is affectionately known) in his garden library – a small table strewn with the weekend papers under the shade of a colourful garden umbrella. We drank tea from his large signature handmade continental breakfast cups, a classic design historically from the French Jesuit priests; 100ml rice bowls with a handle. We talked about his past, his present and his future projects and luxuriated in the soporific warmth of the morning.

### Where is your current studio?

At the bottom of Clay Lane, now known as Kuranda Heights Road. The studio is in a setting of secondary regrowth trees and potted tropical plants

### Do you work alone or with others?

Always alone, however, when it comes to long term fires (80 hours), I am joined by a team of people to assist, local and sometimes it can be visiting international potters, French or NZ's. Wood fire kilns have an international connection. My tunnel kiln (Anagama) is for extended high temperature fire.

### How long have you been working in your current studio?

Since 1975 – but with a few added renovations. Initially the studio was closer to the house and three extensions have been undertaken over the years.

### What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Good open space and ventilation. I have large areas, where I used to build fibre glass boats, and are now incorporated in my working studio area.

### Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

Pretty slack really, but certainly 7 days a week. Mostly as I feel during the day. Deadlines hunt me along a bit. I am dictated by the firing date. I nominate that date and then work towards it.

### Describe the work you do in your studio.

Fiddling around with mud. As well as my exhibition work I make a lot of domestic pieces for the community – I trade goods to stay financially afloat and I am a 'break even co-operative of one and a half'.

### Why is clay your chosen medium?

It was accidental. Clay has a history and is a backyard science; ie space, material, human science – all working together closely. I enjoy the malleability of clay and the satisfaction of creation.

### List things you listen to while working.

The ABC - both national and local radio stations, When I tire of the repeats I tune to Triple J, but always non-commercial stations. I am a radio nut. I have some CDs but my player is cactus. Anyway, I prefer the radio. It is always on.

### Your favourite tool?

A little handmade bamboo 'throwing rib', pointed on one end and rounded on the other. Peter produces two small especially tooled bamboo pieces shaped like a delicate leaf and covered with wet clay. They wear out over the years and I have to make new ones. Commercial tools are available but I prefer to make my own. This comes under the heading of 'trade skills' and are a part of my background.

# How do you identify your work? (signature/stamp/chop)

With a soapstone chop carved with Chinese characters. I have multiples of them and it depends on what I want to express at the time. For instance, on 'grocery money' pieces for locals I use a 'Kuranda' stamp.

## How do you sell your work?

I don't, my work sells itself. Some may be purchased at exhibitions otherwise locals and visitors drift in and out of the studio to look for special pieces. Many of my sales come from word of mouth.

# Do you teach from your studio?

No, I don't teach pottery. I like to do residencies but I don't like teaching.

# What do you do with your seconds?

Potters get a lot of seconds and these are sold privately. Sometimes the seconds basket is full, sometimes it is empty. Seconds have minor faults, a shape distortion or slight variations – these are very personal and in most cases only noticeable to the potter. The bad ones or breakages get turned into gravel.

# If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I would have a more purpose built clay room and a resident's apartment; a guest room where I too could live for a week or two. I would like a roofed clay work area, and machinery for clay processing would live there. This has been a fantasy of 30 years, but there are always other priorities.

# If you were not working with art what would you be doing?

I would be on the Sea Shepherd disabling whale chaser's boats. I feel very strongly about the cessation of whaling and this would also be one of life's great adventures. Otherwise I would be a gardener. (Emperor Ching Pi said "if you wish to be happy for most of life, become a gardener.")

Peter Potter is currently working on pieces for his next wood firing in October. They include tall and elegant sculptural and ornamental vessels. He is using kaolin, a pure form of refractory clay from the Skardon River on the western side of Cape York. He is creating 'tatooed monks', depicting contemporary political characters, and sculptural marquettes of the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society's Ady Gill ( after the wrecked protest boat sunk in the Southern Ocean off Antarctica last year) to add to the October firing.

# **Barron River Community** urged to think Policelink

Member for Barron River Steve Wettenhall has advised local residents needing to report non-urgent policing matters to access a new and dedicated service, Policelink on 131 444.

Mr Wettenhall said the new service would allow for a better direction of police resources in the local community.

"The Bligh Government has invested \$54 million to establish Policelink to focus on those incidents which are not threatening or immediately occurring," Mr Wettenhall said. "Currently the Queensland Police Service receives approximately 450,000 Triple Zero calls a year, but only around 4% of these relate to a time critical or life threatening incident. Policelink is not about replacing the current methods of contacting Queensland Police, and I still encourage people to call ooo in an emergency. It is another way to contact police when non-urgent assistance is required. If the crime is not happening now or is not life threatening, I urge the community to call Policelink on 131 444."

Mr Wettenhall said it was estimated the Policelink contact centre would handle more than two million calls per year and free up 260,000 police hours equivalent to over 130 full time officers.

"The state network of Triple Zero call centres needs to be able to focus on critical and life threatening incidents – and the Policelink service will allow this, operating 24 hours a day, seven days a week.'

Mr Wettenhall provided some examples of when calling Policelink would be a better option than calling Triple Zero. "For instance if there is a party next door which is getting out of hand and people are getting hurt, call 000. However if it is past 11.00pm and the noise from a party next door is keeping you awake, call Policelink on 131 444."

# "Endless Universe"

(Broadway Books, New York, 2007), Paul J Steinhardt and Neil Turok - ISBN 9780 767 915014 - \$24.95

There is no doubt that there is a widespread fascination with the work of scientists trying to discover the origins and history of the universe, even if we do not understand all the scientific terminology and mathematical theory that can accompany this grand enterprise. The latest aspect of this is the search for the so-called "God particle" in Europe and the USA using massive circular particle accelerators. And we are now accustomed at least in general terms to hearing of the theory of the "Big Bang", describing how the universe was created from a single point in a gigantic explosion of matter and energy that has been said to have resulted in an ever-expanding universe. But it is rare to find a scientifically-based book that is descriptive of this, in a manner that a layman can grasp and make some sense of. It is even rarer to find such a book, written by some of the most knowledgeable scientists in the contemporary field, that challenges some of the premises of the "Big Bang" theory, and which has profound ramifications for many areas of human knowledge. This is such a book.

I am no scientist. But I have had my own perhaps simplistic problems with the idea of the "Big Bang" as commonly understood. After all, we live in a post-Darwinian era, when the literal idea of a once-only, Divine Creation in 7 days has been largely rejected. Science confirms that as described in the Book of Genesis and in other creation myths, this once-only event in 7 days cannot be literally accurate. Rather, the amazing universe seems to be a place of constant movement and change, an "evolutionary creation", not a static, once-only creation. But it has worried me that the modern scientific version of the creation story, the Big Bang, has some elements of similarity to these creation stories, only over a very, very long span time instead of 7 days. It is about creating something from nothing, usually called the "singularity" aspect. It may be no accident that one of the main originators of this theory was Georges Lemaitre (1894-1966), a Belgian mathematician and Catholic priest. To him, the burst of fireworks that is now known as the Big Bang was the beginning of time, taking place on "a day without yesterday". It was the real act of Divine creation. Is this a case of 20th century "Genesis hankering"? This book states that Lemaitre saw this "beginning" as a flaw in his model and struggled with it throughout the rest of his career.

But at least my scientific knowledge extended to the theory of the conservation of energy/mass. Wernher von Braun described it in these terms "Science has found that nothing can disappear without a trace. Nature does not know extinction. All it knows is transformation." This is echoed in various religious texts, going way back. The Baha'i leader, Abdu'l-Baha, had said "Hence do you have the conservation of energy and the infinity of phenomena, the indestructibility of phenomena, changeless and immutable, because life cannot suffer annihilation but only change." If this was so, then to my simplistic way of thinking there must have been something before the Big Bang, some transformation on a gigantic scale. But an eminent USA scientist Rolf Sinclair gave me a negative answer as to whether science had yet shown up anything coming through the Big Bang.

So it is most encouraging to find in this book a modern scientific view that rejects this common, singular, ever-expanding version of the Big Bang theory and which describes an alternate, credible view. Some of the key aspects of this view are described by the authors as follows:

"The big bang is conjectured to be the beginning of time and space, but there is no clue as to how or why the big bang occurred...This book concerns the emergence of a new theory of the universe, according to which our cosmic history consists of repeating cycles of evolution. Each cycle begins with a bang, but the bang is not the beginning of space or time".

"To be sure, the theory of an endless universe is still in its infancy...But in our opinion, the issues that have been raised by this theory may so strongly affect the way one views the universe and humanity's place in it...".

"Philosophers have grappled with the issue for thousands of years without making much progress. Some people appeal to religious faith for arguments supporting the creation of something from nothing. Even here, a careful reading of the original texts reveals a certain ambiguity... Ancient Hindu cosmology presents a remarkably detailed and quantitative vision of cyclical evolution".

This is fascinating stuff.

# KURANDA 4RTS CO-OP

### **Resale Royalties**

Copyright Agency Limited (CAL) has been appointed by the Federal Government to administer the Resale Royalty scheme established under the Resale Royalty Right for Visual Artists Act 2009, and commenced on 9 June 2010. Under the scheme, artists are eligible to receive five per cent of the sale price when their original works are resold through the art market for \$1000 or more. The resale royalty right applies to works by living artists and for a period of 70 years after an artist's death. The scheme covers original works of art, such as a painting, a collage, a drawing, a print, a sculpture, a ceramic, an item of glassware or a photograph. The resale royalty right applies only on resales where the seller acquires a work after the resale royalty legislation takes effect.

The scheme entitles visual artists to receive payment of a 5% royalty on certain resales of their works. It also requires art dealers, galleries, auction houses and Indigenous Art Centres to report certain information about their commercial resales. Artists and galleries are required to report resales. Online reporting can be undertaken at www.resaleroyalty.org.au




# **New Arts Co-op members**

The San Francisco-based Dole Pineapple Co. is the focus for this essay on the way Third World production is smoothly controlled by First World multinationals. This chain of production, in a sense, renders the American consumer as powerless as the Hawaiian plantation worker. Gitai's approach amounts to a special kind of agit prop, most explicit in his method of interviewing which is deceptively lackadaisical in style but elicits the answers he wants. In place of linear progression through sequences of shots, each shot in Pineapple is complete in itself forming a capsule which is part of a carefully structured mosaic operating on the accumulation-of-interconnections principle.



# Permaculture Festival in Kuranda

The big gardening news for Kuranda this month is that the village is host to the Tenth Australasian Permaculture Convergence on September 24-27, 2010. US actress and environmental campaigner Daryl Hannah will be there as a Gala Dinner keynote speaker and the co-founder of permaculture, Mr Bill Mollison will spend two days at it, being a guest speaker on Saturday, September 25.

The Festival of Permaculture on Friday and Saturday will be a celebration of Permaculture at work in our communities now. Inspiring speakers, leaders and educators will be offering various practical how-to workshops and presentations throughout the day, and visitors can talk with relevant business and community groups at the Trade Display – I'll be there at the Moon Gardening Calendar stand so come and say hello. And Costa Georgiadis from Costa's Gardening Odyssey will also be attending.

Don't forget Sunday, September 5 is Carnival on Collins in Cairns, which is also worth a visit for plants and a fun day out.

The end of September starts to get pretty hot in the garden so make sure you've got your mulch up to plants and go for deep watering rather than light sprinklings (otherwise it won't penetrate the mulch). You may need to add some shade cover to tender vegetables like lettuce and pak choy to stop leaf burn and extend their growing time. We often get a cooler spell again in October so don't give up on those traditional vegies just yet.

The warming weather will start to see tropical rhizomes like turmeric and edible ginger start to emerge again. Sweet potato can also be planted from runners or a section of tuber. Hill up the soil a bit to ensure good drainage for when the wet arrives as these can take 4-5 months to develop good-sized tubers. The young leafy shoots are also edible so try these steamed or chopped into stirfries. Sweet potato is a favourite of scrub turkeys so take precautions if that's a problem in your area.

Now also is the time to hang fruit fly baits if you haven't already, especially if you've got tomatoes still going strong.

Fruit trees like citrus will benefit from regular watering and a light dressing of lime or dolomite will help to keep the new season's fruit sweeter. Make sure to water the ground well before and after applying lime to help it soak into the soil.

Pawpaw trees should really start to take off so keep up the mulch, water and fertiliser.

# The Five Streams of Robin Oods

THIS MONTH in Profiles we look at Kupin Dous. The Michael Read property over which he has been on the five real streams that meet at his Myola Road property over which he has been building, over many years and with his own hands, a strange timber structure that he calls a house. Others might describe it as a "folly". We look at the enigma that Robin

is, a gentle and friendly man of the rainforest yet of a quite retiring nature.

Robin's life might conveniently be broken into two stages, pre-Kuranda and Kuranda. Robin was the product of an English-Scottish inheritance, born in Sydney to welloff parents. He has prominent colonial ancestors. On his father's side he had a grandfather who, as an architect, invented the Queenslander house. On his mother's side there is a great grandparent Augustus Barton who at a young age hand-built a boat and sailed up the Murray River, later to become a director of Bundaberg Rum. Robin's own father was a doctor in Sydney.

He had a good childhood in Sydney, interrupted by the War. He attended Sydney University of Technology to obtain a diploma in wood technology. Then he worked in a timber firm. He was an active but quiet young man, going skiing, sailing and other activities, attending the ballet and theatre and taking an interest in early television. As one of the first people employed in commercial television, he was head of video recording with Channel Seven and did a TV production course. He saved his money, and in 1958 travelled around the world for one year. Then again in 1961 he travelled again around the world for two more years, living in Japan for some eight months acting and teaching English, before moving overland to England.

Upon arrival in England, he immediately embarked by

ship for the return to Australia. On board he met his future wife Joan, now deceased. She was a nurse by training. Back in Australia, they drove from Fremantle across the Nullabor and up to Darwin, then down to Cairns where they married. From there they purchased their present property in Myola Road in 1964, a lovely stretch of rainforest with a house at the top of a hill. It was here that the second stage of Robin's life began, centering on the new rainforest location. Gone were the wanderings. That part of his life was complete. Robin was captured by the beauty and serenity of nature. The rainforest can have a strange, calming effect on some people, and Robin was one of Robin was content to follow Joan around the small Kuranda Village as she became

very active and well known in the community. Articles have appeared previously in this Paper about her. He constructed a unique cart from which Joan sold icecream

> in the Village. They had two girls and there is now one grandchild in England. Robin worked on the Amphitheatre project and helped where required but most of his time was spent on his property. This included when Joan went overseas. He became a keen gardener. Then he found a spot where the five streams meet deep down the jungle valley and began construction of his unique building, projecting out over the streams, with views over the canopy as well as down to the streams, a place of escape that still fascinates him. He now knows that he will never finish it. He reads

> A philosophy of life emerges with investigation. He quotes Cavafy in Ithaca:

> "to arrive there is your final destination. But do not hurry the voyage at all. It is better for it to last many years, and when old to rest in the Island, rich with all you have gained on the way,.." Shades of John Maxwell: ...success is a journey rather than a destination".

> So what of the five streams of his life? At the top of the list is peacefulness and quietness. Next is spiritual communion with nature, the rainforest and its plants, animals and birds. Then comes solitary meditation to the sounds of nature and sometimes good music. After that, the very happy life he shared with his late companion Joan. And lastly, his family and friends. He is not a religious man in any formal sense, but he feels closest to God down at

his five streams house. For a man who so enjoys solitude, the warmth of his greeting is quite moving. It is very hard not to like him. I think I have come to understand something of the enigma that is Robin Dods.

From the Baha'i Community of the Tablelands





But you might also find me travelling around in a van, struggling to pitch my tent somewhere on a beach or a mountain or sitting in a café with a nice cup of cappuccino and a book. Having dreamt for long years about coming one day to Australia, a few years back I finally managed to make it over here. And the following year again and then...again. Besides the awesome landscapes and the laidback way of life it's the animals that are endemic to Australia that keep me coming back. This very reason explains my stay in Kuranda. For the last weeks I've been a volunteer at BatReach. Helping Pam to look after all the animals she cares for means a lot to me and I'm sure I'll miss them once I'm back home again. 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# Works Underway to Improve Kuranda Range Safety



A SAFER TRIP along the Kuranda Range is on the way with works started to widen two curves on the Kennedy Highway between Smithfield and Kuranda.

Member for Barron River, Steve Wettenhall said the project started late last week and will continue until the end of August to widen a curve near the bottom of the range near Avondale Creek, 1.4km from Smithfield.

"I ask drivers to please be patient during this month-long project. The works will require single lane road closures, traffic controllers and speed reductions to 40km/h between 9am and 3pm," Mr Wettenhall said. "These works will really improve safety for motorists travelling up and down the range with a tight curve to be widened, visibility improved and extra asphalt laid, These \$300,000 works are being carried out under the \$66 million Safer Roads Sooner program, which is designed to help reduce the road toll and the number of accidents where people sustain serious injuries."

Minister for Main Roads Craig Wallace said the improvements will be a welcome boost to safety for motorists who commute to and from Kuranda on the vital road link.

The department has also started planning the final set of works for extra road widening, gabion wall construction and soil nail installation to be undertaken about 4km from Smithfield.

These curve widening works are in addition to more than \$326,000 worth of Intelligent Transport Systems for Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) with additional wet weather sensors. These signs will replace Variable Message Signs (VMS) at the top and bottom of the range and are scheduled to be installed later this month.

# Tax refund delays

Has your tax refund taken longer than usual this year? You are not the only one! The ATO has recently advised; "Overall, the regular flow of assessments and refunds has not been consistent during our first four weeks of processing as we would have liked and we have taken steps to smooth out these fluctuations."

This may be due to a new computer system installed earlier this year. I have clients who have received their refunds in a week and others who are still waiting after six weeks! The ATO will generally not investigate the late refund until it has been lodged for 30 days, however, they advise that the service standard is still 14 days. I'll let you form your own opinion about the delays!

# **Claiming gifts or donations**

Did you make any gifts or donations during the financial year? Not all gifts and donations are claimable in your tax return. You can claim a deduction for voluntary gifts of \$2 or more to an approved organisation. Approved organisations include:

- Certain funds, organisations or charities which provide help in Australia
- ✓ Some overseas aids funds
- ✓ School building funds
- ✓ Some environmental or cultural organisations.

Your receipt will generally indicate whether or not you can claim a deduction for the gift. If you are not sure if the organisation is an approved one you can check with the organisation, call the ATO or go to www.abn.business.gov.au.

To be tax deductible a gift must:

- ✓ be made to an approved organisation
- ✓ really be a gift
- ✓ be a gift or money or a certain type of property
- comply with any relevant gift conditions.

You cannot claim a deduction for a gift or donation in your tax return if you received something in return (e.g. a raffle ticket even if you did not win) except in certain fundraising events.

Deductions can also be claimed for contributions to registered political parties and independent candidates in an election for parliament.



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# **First Motor Vehicles into Kuranda**

There was no road from the bottom of the range to Kuranda until 1939. However, at least three road vehicles made the trip well before the range road was constructed. Those who complain about the present state of the road should spare a thought for the first intrepid travelers to climb the range in a motor vehicle.

It is sometimes very difficult when researching an event to sort out the reality from the recollections. In his memoirs of his time in the Kuranda area as a youth, Major W.E. Hughes said that the first vehicle traveled over the range to Kuranda on 9 May 1922. As this was an historic event I searched The Cairns Post for one week each side of this date for any mention of the trip. I had no success, so expanded the search to other documents. In Dorothy Jones' book Trinity Phoenix I found a reference to the trip, but she put the date as August 1922. The Cairns Post of Wednesday 23 August 1922 carried a small article about an attempt by W. Moller to reach Kuranda on 13 August. However, Moller, failed to complete the trip and had to return after traveling only about two-thirds of the way. He said if the fallen timber was removed from the track he would reach Kuranda. The article said that "a seat will be reserved for Miss Remilton. This well known lady previously booked a seat with a car proprietor, who some time ago intended to do the same trip, but failed in the attempt". Bill Moller was a cane farmer from Aloomba, who fought in France and Belgium in World War I.

The Cairns Post of 28 August carried a further article titled "Trial Trip to Kuranda by Car". It said the Kuranda Progress Association received a letter from Moller stating that he intended to make an attempt on the range soon. He asked the Association to clear and repair the track and give any necessary assistance. The Association agreed to his request and said the road would be clear within the next week. It said if the attempt was successful Moller would have rendered the Kuranda district a great service.

Apparently there was a story in The Cairns Post about the successful trip to Kuranda by Moller, as the article prompted a letter written by a correspondent using the pseudonym of "Scribbler":

Out of fairness to Mr. W. Moller, who on Sunday last accomplished the first successful trip over the range from Cairns to Kuranda by motor car, as one who was present during the whole trip, I feel it my duty to draw your attention to a paragraph in Wednesday's issue of your paper, headed "To Kuranda by Car." The portion to which I refer is as follows: "The successful trip to Kuranda by motor car, which was accomplished by Mr. Moller on Sunday afternoon, was perhaps even excelled by a party of four." As one greatly interested in Mr. Moller's trial trip over the Range, I may say that with many other residents from Kuranda and district, I met Mr. Moller at the foot of the Range on Sunday morning at ten fifteen. We immediately left with Mr. Moller, who in his car, commenced the trip. At 11.30 we were on the highest point, at 12.15 we arrived at Street Creek, where we settled down for lunch, remaining there until 1.30 p.m. At 2 o'clock we were in

the trip Mr. Moller carried five others: J. Bartley, W. Veivers, R. Veivers, J. Leahy, and J. Fisher for the biggest part of the trip. Actual traveling time then being two hours 30 minutes. During the trip, no assistance was given to Mr. Moller, except on arriving at Street Creek, a tree was tied to the back of his (Moller's) car, while he was descending, no other difficulty being met with during the whole trip. The other car referred to left Cairns at 2.45 (this being after Moller had arrived at Kuranda), and arrived at the crossing at 12 midnight, traveling time, nine hours 15 minutes (against Moller's two hours 30 minutes), and I may say that, had it not been for a party of men who accompanied Moller, who returned when they received advice of the second car being on the track, the

second car may still have been there yet, although the second driver, only had to follow the wheel tracks of Moller's car to put him right, but the driver of the second car had to send for the assistance of Mr. Moller's wheel chains. Taking into consideration the time taken to accomplish the trip by the second car with assistance, against that of Mr. Moller's car without assistance, a difference of 6 hours 45 minutes exists, you will agree with me when I say it is most unfair for anyone to even suggest that Mr. Moller's trip had been excelled by the second car. In conclusion, I may say, that Mr. Moller is up till this morning, the one and only driver of a motor car who has accomplished the trip from Cairns to Kuranda and Mareeba by road, and is to be very highly praised on his most successful trip, and it is doubtful if the second car would have made the trip at all, if Mr. Moller had not accomplished the trip before the second car left Cairns.

Moller drove his Overland car to the bottom of the Whitfield Range where the old dray track over the range began. (A careful search of The Cairns Post failed to locate the offending article, so it must have been well hidden).

Although "Scribbler" said that Moller had no help on his trip Major W.E. Hughes reported in his memoirs that he had help from Bill Hughes, Walter and Jack Veivers and Alex and Dave Crothers to clear the track of fallen timber and new growth. Hughes said that when the vehicle reached the

Barron Rive crossing near Kuranda the water was too deep for it to cross under its own power. Consequently, a horse team was used to tow the car across the river. Once across Moller drove the vehicle into Kuranda to the cheers of the local population.

Hughes reported: "Miss Florence Remilton of the Kuranda Hotel presented Bill Moller with a bottle of champagne and two five-pound notes. (This would be equivalent to at least \$600 now!!) She put on a morning tea for all present to celebrate the historic occasion. A photo was taken and those I recognize in the photo were the Remilton sisters, Andy Henderson, Happy Harry Salmon, a visiting showman, Bill Hughes, Ernie Carter, Alex and Sam Crothers, Billy Austin, Walter Veivers, Bill Moller, Jack Leahy and Eric Hussey. Another motorist called Iken, drove a new Overland for Cambell and Fitzsimons, car dealers of Cairns, behind Bill Moller. This car had radiator problems and reached Kuranda the next day". (This is presumably the second vehicle that The Cairns Post said excelled Moller's successful feat).

An article in The Herald on 6 September praised Moller's trip, and said it was prompted not as a professional test but "merely a wish on Moller's part to prove that this road could be put into a state that would make it quite good for all motorists". This is certainly a different view on traveling over rough roads to the present situation. Road authorities now classify almost all gravel roads as "four-wheel drive only".

Major Hughes claimed that the first motor vehicle to reach Kuranda via the range was a 1918 model Indian motorcycle. This ten-horsepower motorcycle was ridden over the range by Jack Leahy in 1921. Leahy placed a bet with a railway train driver for five pounds that he could leave the Cairns railway station with the train and arrive at the Kuranda railway station before the train. Leahy rode up the old dray track, which was very steep and covered with fallen trees and grass. He had to manhandle the motorcycle over the many obstacles and eventually reached the crossing of the Barron River. The motorcycle had to be taken across the river in a boat, and reached the Kuranda railway station just minutes before the train. After collecting his bet Leahy rode his motorcycle back to Cairns along the railway line.

John Leahy rode 1918 twin cylinder 10 horsepower motorcycle " I set out from Cairns at full speed, past Redlynch, across the Kamerunga crossing then following the road to the bottom of the range where the cairn now stands. He recounted his story in Shep Humston's book "Kuranda: The Village in the Rainforest 1888-1988".

"Here the old bullock track commenced. It had not had any wagon traffic for 30 or 40 years and was in a very steep rough state, with steep pinches, long grass and logs. I had to manhandle my 8cwt bike across four logs that were 3 feet high. (one metre). It was easier going down the other side, past the site of Street's old coffee plantation (where there now exists an orange orchard) until I hit the Barron River.

Here, the water was 16ft deep, so I left the cycle, swam across, hotfooted it to the railway station, beat the train and collected my five-pound bet".











# Barron River receives funding in the fight against pests

Barron River will benefit from a \$4.5 million Bligh Government program to weed out feral pigs, goats, foxes and plants from Queensland's national parks and state forests.

Member for Barron River Steve Wettenhall said \$35,000 had been allocated this year to wipe out the Class 1 pest plant miconia or velvet tree.


"This project aims to eradicate Miconia from Barron Gorge National Park, Jumrum Creek and Mt Whitfield Conservation Parks," Mr Wettenhall said. "Miconia is a particularly aggressive invader of moist rainforest habitats and can cause irreversible damage. That's why this money is particularly welcome this year and I hope we can finally rid our protected areas of this invasive pest."

Mr Wettenhall said the announcement was about one of 80 strategically targeted projects across the State to manage plant and animal pests.

"Pest animals and plants have serious economic, environmental and social impacts across Queensland's rural landscape," he said. "The impacts are increasing, and this relentless invasion of pests is one of the major threats to biological diversity. "Our national parks and forests are home to some of our most treasured species, but their habitats can be ruined by pest animals and plants."

Mr Wettenhall said the main pest animals being targeted were feral pigs, goats and foxes. "Major pest plants being targeted include Siam weed, prickly acacia, bitou bush, Mexican bean tree, miconia and mikania vine, rubbervine, parthenium, hymenachne, parkinsonia, lantana and pond apple," he said.

"The Department of Environment and Resource Management is progressively developing plans and strategies for the control of pests across the land it managed, to ensure best practice. "All landholders need to work together in an integrated, coordinated way to protect rural landscapes from pests. "To help achieve this, the Department is working closely with neighbouring property owners and other members of the rural community, Local Government and other Queensland Government agencies. The Queensland Government will continue to lead the way in dealing with this threat to our environment."



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
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
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

These laws cover a whole range of areas such as regulated parking, animal complaints management, illegal camping, overgrown land, goods on footpaths. Over the next 18months the new Local Laws will be developed and this will involve community response to the draft laws. If you have any comments, you can certainly send these to Council at any time.

### **Kuranda Community Centre**

Work has progressed further on Block C. It is expected that disabled access from Arara St, new carpets, refurbishment of the tuckshop area and kitchenette facilities will be completed before Christmas. Residents will soon receive the first of regular quarterly Newsletters to keep you updated on what is happening in the development of the site as a community Centre. This is a long and costly process, but Council has committed to a Master Plan for developing the site as a Kuranda Community Centre.

### **Aged Housing**

Six new units will be constructed in Kuranda. The first of these should be completed by January and will be available for aged persons. Details on how to apply can be obtained form Council.

### **Garden Competition**

The winners have not yet been announced, but the judges have certainly been around the area this week.

Good to see 5 entries from Kuranda this year.

### **Community Plan**

The TRC Community Plan is due to be finalised in approximately 18 months. Public Consultations around the region have commenced. Separate meetings will be held in the Kuranda, Koah and Speewah communities in early 2011. The 10 year Community Plan is a legislative requirement and will provide the major themes for Council Planning over the next 10 years. I encourage residents to be involved and have your say.

### **Congratulations**

Great to see the continued success of the Amphitheatre. President Mandy Dewey recently attended a Council meeting to update Council on KAS projects. It was impressive to hear a brief summary of the long list of cultural and economic benefits the Amphitheatre provides to Kuranda and the region.

## Safety improvements continue on Range Road

Long vehicles will find it much easier to negotiate sections of the range following curve widening works completed in August near Avondale Creek (1.4km from Smithfield). Thanks to all motorists for your patience during this important project. At a total cost of \$300,000, safety for all road users will be significantly enhanced. The works were funded by the Queensland Government's \$66 million Safer Roads Sooner program – designed to help reduce the road toll and the number of serious injuries. Construction of the next stage is due to commence in early September and will include road widening, gabion wall construction and soil nail installation on the range about 4km from Smithfield. Road users will also notice new Vehicle Activated Signs at the top and bottom of the range to alert motorists to drive to the conditions. The signs are equipped with sensors and will flash during rain and some 20 minutes after rain. They will replace the old Variable Message Signs (VMS) at the top and bottom of the range.

# **Pool gets shade protection**

Swimming in the shade is on the way at Kuranda pool thanks to a Queensland Government grant of \$40,000 toward the cost of shade structures for the toddler pool and parents' area. With the help of Queensland Health, a master plan will be developed to guide further funding for extra shading in the future.

# **Grandparents' Day – November 7**

Queensland will hold its very first Grandparents' Day on November 7 this year. Grandparents' Day will be a chance for grandchildren, children and the community to thank them for their love and support. The idea of Grandparents' Day was raised by the community during extensive consultation as the Bligh Government formed the Positively Ageless Seniors Strategy. Many grandparents are the primary carers for their grandchildren and are a source of support and guidance to mothers and fathers on parenting issues.

# **Eradicating pests**

The Bligh Government has allocated \$35,000 this year to wipe out the Class 1 pest plant miconia or velvet tree. This project aims to eradicate miconia from Barron Gorge National Park, Jumrum Creek and Mt Whitfield Conservation Parks. Miconia is a particularly aggressive invader of moist rainforest habitats and can cause irreversible damage. That's why this money is particularly welcome this year and I hope we can finally rid our protected areas of this invasive pest.

# Lights for safety at Smithfield Roundabout

New traffic light signals are now operating at Smithfield roundabout to control traffic entering from the Kuranda Range section of the Kennedy Highway, during peak periods. Traffic on the Kennedy Highway will be required to stop on a red signal at the stop bar before the roundabout. Once the red signal has gone (there is no green signal, only amber and red), motorists can proceed up to the Give Way sign at the roundabout where the normal rules apply. The works also include the installation of a traffic camera that will feed traffic information back to the department's Traffic Management Centre (TMC) in Cairns to adjust phase timings to improve traffic flow.
