

What's going on there?



Another new addition to the Park is John Beasley's sculpture "Smoke in the Palms' which incorporates a stylised Licuala fan palm leaf. The sculpture stands 1300mm high and is carved from a variety of black Chillagoe marble called "black ice". The smoke represents previous aboriginal occupation of the area as well as the loss of fan palm habitat in recent years through clearing and burning: a loss that continues to this day. John's work was funded by the Levy also and he was very pleased by the ease and professionalism of Council in its commissioning of the work and contract. John urges all other Kuranda artists to register for such commissions which will be ongoing as the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan continues its implementation.

The latest installation has been Hans Pews' hand forged rails on the staircases on both the eastern and western sides of the Park. These incorporate vines, frogs and lizards. This work was something of a challenge as the long length of the rails for the western side necessitated the construction of a special forge.

Still to come in the Park is more seating, bollards and further additions to the playground as funds become available.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

During March this year three people were charged with taking dogs into Barron Falls National Park. This offence carries a hefty fine. In general, dogs are not permitted in National Parks either on or off a leash and this also applies to the Jumrum Environmental Park, a popular walking track for dogs and their owners. Exceptions do apply under certain circumstances, e.g. guide dogs. If, when apprehended, you refuse to give your name and address, you are committing an additional offence under the Nature Conservation Act. Also, it's good to remember that shooting the messenger will make things a good deal worse. Conservation officers are required to respond to unlawful activity, even when they are off duty - they are only doing their job (and that is what we voted for); being offensive is not likely to evoke leniency! National Parks are places of outstanding beauty, often protecting an array of special plants and animals. They are for the enjoyment of everybody. Communities demand that National Parks be given extra protection to ensure they remain intact for future generations. It is understandable that dog owners would want to exercise their dogs in a beautiful place, but unfortunately National Parks and dogs are not compatible. Australian animals have not evolved many anti-predator behaviours and cannot survive the onslaught of dogs (and cats). Responsible dog owners who care about our native wildlife, DO NOT take their dogs into National Parks, including Kuranda's Jumrum Environmental Park.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

To clarify any misunderstanding about Mrs Rosetta Hunter's situation regards the Tenant Agreement on 9 Coondoo Street, Kuranda.

First of all, Ngoonbi Co-operative Society did not evict Mrs Hunter even though she breached the Residential Tenant Agreement a few times between her and Ngoonbi.

According to RTA Act 1994, any tenant who is behind one week in rent has to serve a Notice to Remedy Breach (form 11), and Ngoonbi sent more than two letters of Remedy Breach over a period of six months, However, she did not respond well, nevertheless the Board of Directors gave her another chance to pay her rent and catch up with her arrears. Still she did not commit to the agreement. Ngoonbi then sent a letter to inform her of the decision to sell the premises, (9 Coondoo St., Kuranda) early Feb '97. But the idea of selling the house was not suited with the ATSIC time frame and also the pressure from the local communities to save and preserve the building. Two Ngoonbi representatives had discussion with

Mrs Hunter early April, 1997 regarding the idea renovating and leasing out the premises. She totally agreed and supported the concept of leasing. Moreover she suggested of moving to Mona Mona to wait for another house. Ngoonbi are still waiting for \$1.15 m which ATSIC has allocated;\$650,000 to buy houses and \$500,000 for renovation and maintenance. Therefore Ngoonbi may buy at least four houses and will help to minimise the overcrowding. Ngoonbi Board of Directors always have a positive attitude to help the locals but some minority try to take for granted the opportunity they receive.

ARK meets every third Wednesday 7pm at the Kuranda Sports & Social Club, Fallon Rd. All Welcome. All levels of Government were represented at the May public meeting with Mayor Chris Lewis, Councillor Ned Brischetto, Warren Entsch MP Member for Leichhardt, Lyn Warwick MLA Member for Barron River in attendence. It certainly was good to be able to exchange information about so many issues affecting Kuranda. Reports from all were given and questions asked by members and residents.

Full and comprehensive minutes are sent to members each month. Membership is \$10 per year (\$5 concession) and forms are available from the above address, at meetings or at the Green House Environment

Shop 26 Coondoo St. The following is a brief outline of some issues discussed:

AIRCRAFT OVER KURANDA: early morning (5.30am) flights continue to be a problems as well as the lack of control over the operations of light aircraft. ASA have requested a response to the changes to jet flight patterns which were implemented last December.

PEDESTRIAN ACCESS TO & FROM BLACK MT RD & TOP OF THE RANGE AREA: is dangerous, especially along the Kennedy Highway. ARK has requested Main Rds to investigate options for safer access. The replacement of the first bridge (currently closed) on Black Mt Rd now appears to be further off than anticipated prior to the local elections, as Council is currently reviewing all its capital works programs. LIBRARY: similarly appears to be further off due to capital works program review.

CASSOWARY CONSERVATION: ARK's working group C.A.S.S. (Cassowary Alliance for Species Survival) was able to host a very productive meeting thanks to the great efforts of Dr Lesley Clark. Attending were representatives of the relevant departments including Tor Hundloe, Chair Wet Tropics and Lindsay Delzoppo, Regional Director of the Department of Environment. Progress does appear to be happening, with Warren Entsch and Lesley Clark able to confirm at the May public meeting that the long overdue Federal listing of the cassowary as an endangered species is proceeding and we hope for good news soon. Warren was also able to tell us that a separate action to undertake essential research into the status of the northern (Iron Range) cassowary population is also being proposed.

A letter from Lindsay Delzoppo, urging residents not to feed cassowaries was read. More details regarding the problems this may cause appear in the Kuranda Environment Association column in this paper (Page 13). SPORTS & RECREATION FACILITIES: there was quite a degree of discussion regarding the need for certain facilities, most especially playing fields with the Mayor agreeing but pointing out how large the Shire is and that there is strong demand from communities across the Shire for such facilities to be developed. Ken Harley from the Kuranda High School P&C stressed that the High School Committee had always wanted to see the High School be a "community school" addressing as many aspects of community service as possible and urged sporting groups to be involved in establishing the High School.

NQ JOINT BOARD: comprised of 11 FNQ Councils, is seeking input from communities on areas along rivers suitable for revegetation projects. Ph Bob Madden on 930 169 for more information.

KURANDA TRAFFIC STUDY: Mayor Chris Lewis outlined some of the consultants' recommendations in the report, now available for viewing at the Kuranda Council Office, Kuranda Library or for sale (\$30) at the Council Office. The recommendation with possibly the farthest reaching implications is a proposal to build a bus interchange on the railway housing land behind Skyrail, with a capacity for around 30 buses. ARK has called for costings and projected timetable for implementing, as well as funding options, to be made available to allow residents to make an informed response to the proposal. As this constitutes a major departure from the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan, it and other recommendations, require Council to undertake full consultation with the community on these issues.

The public consultation process for the Report is now underway and will finish on June 20th. A public meeting to discuss the Report will be held at the CWA Hall on Saturday June 14th 2pm-Spm. RESIDENTS ARE

THE BARRON RIVER AT KURANDA: A public meeting was held on May 12th to discuss water levels, power generation at the Barron Gorge Power Station and other matters of concern. Attending were Qld Minister for Energy Tom Gilmore, representatives from AUSTA ELECTRIC, POWERLINK, Lyn Warwick MLA Barron River, a few Kuranda residents and a lot of Tableland irrigators ! Clearly, the water in the Barron River is regarding as of more than just environmental value. The major problem facing the River between July and November this year will be the requirement for the Barron Gorge Station to take over the generating load during daylight hours from one of the major Northern feeders, which will be de-energised to allow for the construction of the Woree -Chalumblin powerline. This is because the line passes through World Heritage areas and the new line must be built as close as possible to the existing one to minimise environmental impact. However, the use of helicopters etc in close proximity to the old line necessitates the deenergising. AUSTA have promised, barring unforeseen circumstances, to keep the levels in Kuranda at the 4.5 metre level at the weir face. However, due to the large amounts of sand deposited in the River from the Bridge to the weir by Cyclone Justin in late March this level does not guarantee an acceptable depth of water anymore. Mayor Chris Lewis advised the ARK meeting a week after the river meeting, that AUSTA have decided to proceed with dredging the river to remove these deposits. Access to the River for dredging will be from the coast side of the River, below the Bridge on the Kennedy Highway.

KURANDA HIGH SCHOOL: is now underway, with roadworks due to start in July. DCP FOR THE VILLAGE: now finalised. Some changes so check with Council.


DCP FOR ENVIRONS: draft still being finalised before being opened for public review.

KURANDA TOURIST LEVY: the Minister for Local Government, Di McCauley signed the revised levy agreement which extends the original 10 year agreement to 20 years (with 17 left to go). This is good news and follows a lot of hard lobbying and negotiating. Lyn Warwick has been instrumental in this and paid great appreciation to Mayor Chris Lewis and former Councillor Oliver Gilkerson for their unflagging effort on behalf of Kuranda. It is however important to note that the extension will not provide funding surplus to that needed to meet the original capital works program, as due to a less that projected income from Skyrall, coaches and private vehicles (other than locals) the infrastructure program had fallen behind budget. It will however allow the works to be finalised for the benefit of visitors and locals alike. Recent works funded by the tourist levy include a number of public artworks including John Beasley's sculpture, Hans Pels' handforged handrails, Martin Joys' Kuranda and Mareeba Shire map-paintings as well as the first stage of the playground in Centenary Park, The regrading of the walk from the Station continues.

The above were just some of the issues discussed. A strong community is an informed community. NEXT MEETING: Wed June 18th 7pm Sports & Social Club.


THERE Spring Fair **THIS** YEAR?

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



MAREEBA SHIRE COUNCIL DOG REGISTRATION 1997/98

If you own a dog, or keep a dog at your home, Council requires that you register your dog. The dog should wear the registration tag, so that it can be identified and returned to you if it is lost or injured.

Dog registration fees, as listed below, are now payable for the year 1st July 1997 to 30th June 1998. If these fees are paid before 30th June 1997, a discount, (as indicated in the right-hand column), is available.



Fees are payable at Council's Office in Mareeba between 8.30am and 4.00pm, Monday to Friday, Council's Office in Kuranda between 9.30am and 12.30pm, Monday to Friday and the Kuranda Veterinary Surgery. Dog owners should note that full registration fees are payable after 1st July 1997. Legal action may be taken against persons who fail to register their dog.

It is your responsibility to keep your dog within your property. Erect a fence capable of preventing your dog from straying.

Close your gate after exiting or entering your property.

RESEARCH BREAKTHROUGH ALLOWS DPI TO CUT BLOCK NUMBERS

The Department of Primary Industries is reducing the number of insecticide treated caneite blocks in the North Queensland Papaya Fruit Fly Quarantine Area by more than fifty

Mr Sing said, DPI's research into the efficiency of the blocks represented a major breakthrough and meant new blocks would be left at each site for eight weeks, two weeks longer than previously, without significant loss of effectiveness. In addition, all old blocks would be removed leaving only one new block at each site. Previously there were two blocks at each site or in close proximity with the old block left to ensure sufficient insecticide and attractant was present. These new blocks carried a pink band on one edge and were easily recognised. Where pink banded blocks had been installed, residents who found any other blocks should report their location to the Papaya Fruit Fly Hotline (Freecall 1800 650 268) for removal by trained DPI staff.



Jax Bergersen, secretary, did a splendid job in preparing the application.

Jax Bergersen represents environmental issues on behalf of members of the Kuranda Environment Association on both the Barron River Integrated Catchment Management community committee and the Water Allocation Management Planning community panel. She keeps a close eye on the constant flow of water quality and quantity issues in the Barron River catchment and is a Waterwatcher.

The funds are sufficient to implement a program designed to awaken public awareness about water, how we use it, how we must modify our attitudes about its quality and availability, and how we must manage it in the future.

By the end of the project, the aim is to have a community better informed, more careful and more appreciative of this precious commodity. It is planned to achieve this by training speakers from all sectors of the community who will then attend meetings of every sporting, social, environmental and ratepayer group from Cooktown to Cardwell and deliver a short, informative message about local water issues.

The target population of the awareness campaign will be the people who do not feel that water issues are of any particular concern of theirs, yet they still drink it, bathe in it, wash their dishes, wash their car, hose the garden and wash down the concrete driveway. They are also those who don't get around to fixing the leaking tap or toilet. Equally, they are the farmers who irrigate their crops by flooding water through the field and allowing the excess, possibly full of the nutrients of fertilisers and the poisons of pesticides, to flow away onto adjacent land, into rivers and streams and into the groundwater reservoirs.

Those best equipped to convey the important messages about how to use our water may well be their better informed farmer, housewife and next door neighbours. You might be one of these people who would like the opportunity to take the message to your ratepayer group, P&C, golf club, soccer club or social club, and to learn more about our precious water resource and some public speaking skills as a bonus.

As an adjunct to the awareness campaign, it is planned to hold a one-day regional forum within six months, in Cairns, where everyone in the region will be able to participate. With adequate sponsorship, the forum will be an opportunity for the Departments of Natural Resources, Environment and Local government & Planning as well as the array of committees and groups studying water issues in this region, to come together and share their knowledge for the greater community understanding and benefit. All local councils in the region play a major role in delivering healthy water to their residents and will therefore have a primary interest in exchanging information. Most of the conference speakers will be from this region, however a couple of too-good-to-miss presenters from southern Queensland will be invited.

The farmers, residents, industry groups, tour operators and hydroelectricity providers are the end users. They all have expectations and experience which is valuable to managing our finite, but reusable water resource. They all appreciate that the key to healthy water is a heathy environment and that a healthy economy flows from it.

Mareeba Unicare - Garden Settlement



THE GARDEN SETTLEMENT

[This is the first of a series of articles on the services offered by Mareeba Unicare in Mareeba and Kuranda for the benefit of Mareeba Shire residents]

The Mareeba Garden Settlement was built about 19 years ago to provide hostel and nursing home facilities in Mareeba. The nursing home was later expanded and the facility now offers 51 hostel places and 45 nursing home beds. Five of the current residents are from the Kuranda area.

When first opened, it was anticipated that many residents would be well aged couples wishing to retire in Mareeba and happy to have the level of care provided by a hostel. With the aging of the Australian population and changes in Government policy, this has changed dramatically in recent years.

Residential care is expensive (the Garden Settlement employs close to a hundred staff), and the Government has increasingly moved to keep people in their own homes as long as possible. To enter the hostel now requires an assessment of need by the Geriatic Assessment Team, currently based in Cairns but very soon to operate from Mareeba.

As a result, residents entering the hostel are increasingly frail, and unable to cope on their own or with family. This has put extra demands on the staff to cater to the needs new residents bring, and has also meant that the length of stay of residents is much shorter than it used to be. There is generally a waiting list for places in the hostel. Once in the hostel, residents automatically move to the nursing home when that level of care is necessary.

The new Federal Government is currently moving to change the system to While there is as yet no cure for

integrate the hostel and nursing home systems. It may well be in future that a new resident will be given a room which becomes theirs for life, the level of services responding to their needs.

Entry Contributions

The Government has also cut funding for aged care, and is introducing a user pays principle whereby funds for building upgrade are derived from entry contributions. Mareeba Unicare recently decided to introduce entry contributions to the hostel to a maximum of \$50 000 per resident. Entry contributions only apply to those who can afford them, and entry to the Garden Settlement is on the basis of need. In fact, most residents in Mareeba do not qualify to pay an entry contribution.

Under new legislation, from July entry contributions can also apply to nursing home residents. In practice, anyone who has assets in excess of \$22500 would be asked to pay an entry contribution when entering a hostel or nursing home. Part of this money can be used by the home while the rest is held in an account and refunded to the resident or their estate on leaving the home. Up to \$13000 of the contribution can be used by the home over a five year period.

Dementia Care

One of the saddest consequences of the greater life expectancy in Australia is the increasing numbers of elderly people suffering from dementia. Dementia is the general term for a number of conditions including Alzheimer's disease that result in progressive loss of memory and behaviour disorders as brain functioning is affected. Dementia is particularly hard on the families of sufferers, who not only find the person they love is becoming lost to them, but who have to cope with altered behaviour such as wandering.

dementia, and only limited evidence that its onset can be delayed, there are well researched ways of dealing with the disease that provide the highest possible quality of life for sufferers.

Mareeba Garden Settlement is proud of the progress that has been made under the present Director of Nursing, Barbara Foggin, to improve dementia care. New facilities, including a secure garden area, have been provided. More importantly, improved management principles which involve all staff have been implemented. The result is that dementia sufferers in the nursing home receive individual care that meets their needs, allowing them to enjoy life even while their disease progresses

Building Upgrade

Mareeba Unicare is currently spending \$m1.2 on a major upgrade of facilities including kitchen, laundry, nursing, office and dining facilities. A chapel has also been added to the complex. This work is almost complete. As well, Anita Kitchell has been hired as a consultant to upgrade the gardens, so that the Garden Settlement will live up to its name. More work remains to be done, and it is likely that upgrading of the hostel bathrooms and toilets will be the next project.

The Unicare Committee

Mareeba Unicare grew out of the amalgamation of previous Garden Settlement and Blue Nursing committees which had been set up by the Uniting Church in Mareeba. With the opening of a Day Respite Centre, there are now three services offered under the Unicare umbrella.

The chairman and two thirds of the membership are appointed by the church, the remaining third of members coming from the community in an election held at the AGM each October.

Regionalization

Until recently the Unicare Committee was responsible for most day to day management of the three services. Now a regional structure is being established with a regional office in Townsville which will provide management services more economically and allow the appointment of specialized staff to support the centres in North Queensland. Two of our staff, Chris Fisher and Frances Graham, have been appointed to the region, Chris in Townsville and Frances to operate in the Cairns and Tablelands area

The new role of committees is still being formalized, but it is expected that the committee will continue to have an important advisory role within the regional structure, and will continue to have a close hands on relationship with the services in Mareeba and Kuranda. All funds raised locally will continue to be spent here.

The Future

Mareeba Garden Settlement is very concerned to continue to provide the highest quality of care for residents in a period when change is extremely rapid. A huge effort in 1996 resulted in accreditation for quality assurance, one of the first nursing homes in Queensland to do so. This will ensure that the needs of residents directly influence the service

There are many challenges. The greater needs of residents have led to changes in staffing and the introduction of new

systems. The Committee is attempting to ensure that persons from different ethnic backgrounds receive the care that is appropriate - everything from the variety of foods available to sensitivity as to how nursing care is provided. Funding cuts from Government are forcing close monitoring of the efficiency of services.

With all this, it is the standard of care as staff interact with residents that finally is most significant. We aim to continue to provide the highest quality of care, where personal attention is paramount. The home is not so large that individuals get lost, yet large enough to remain viable. Training and the constant upgrading of staff skills, together with the quality assurance program in place, will maintain this high quality of care into the future.

A THOUGHT FOR JUNE

This month we turn to the Gospel of St. John and read chapter 10 verses 11 to 18; read it over a few times. However the role of the Shepherd also requires tenacity, strength, courage and leadership. We have only to read the first verse of the passage to hear Jesus define the reality of the Shepherd's role with chilling foresight. "The Good Shepherd says Jesus "lays down his life for the sheep" to do anything less is to betray the flock, to care nothing for

"I am the Good Shepherd" what might that be asking of my life? If a Shepherd cares then the question is whether I am becoming an essentially caring or a self-centred human being. That may seem obvious. Yet pattens of behaviour change our lives, we need to examine them from time to time. Again if a Shepherd leads then in what sense am I leading other lives, perhaps those younger than myself. Leading can be an exercise in ego and power. It can be domineering. Obviously Jesus' patten of shepherding does not call for that. Rather are there vocations in my life that I can give some time to/ Is there some aspect of our local community that we can become a part of to guide others - such as K.I.S.C., A.R.K., C.W.A., LIONS, ROTARY, SCOUTS, GUIDES, P & C and many more. Is there a self help group to which from my own experience I have something to give? all these things are shepherding. Such callings may seem tame and mundane compared with Jesus laying down His life as the Good Shepherd, but we are not all asked to do what Jesus did - to lay down one's life can mean many things at many different levels; one thing is certain, you and I are never going to lay our lives down for anything until we give even a small part of ourselves for something! Surely there is not one of us who cannot response in some small way to the call of Jesus, the Good Shepherd.


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### PROTECTING YOUR PET WITH A MICROCHIP

Every week people bring us lost and injured pets that have no identification and clients ring us to tell us their pet is missing. Why does this happen so often?

Accidental loss occurs when visitors or tradespeople leave the gate or door open. In our experience no pet or yard is fully escape proof - accidents happen. Escape by pets with "wanderlust" is common, especially young animals before desexing, and in certain breeds who love to see the world. THEFT:

Attractive and valuable animals are stolen to keep or to resell for profit. Other pets are stolen by neighbours who see them as a "nuisance". They remove the collars and tags and take them to a pound out of the area for surrender and destruction.

The problem with collars and tags is that they often fall off or are removed.

The best form of identification, and hence the best protection against loss or theft, is a microchip. A microchip is a tiny computer chip with a unique number that we place under the skin of your pet. Once in place it cannot be lost, removed or altered for the life of your pet. "Chipping": is not painful and can cause no harm - it is just like an ordinary vaccination. Once your pet is micro chipped it is registered for life on the Australian Animal Register. All pets taken to pounds and vets are scanned for the presence of a microchip - when one is found a quick call to the Register locates the owners, ensuring a happy reunion.

Thousands of owned pets are destroyed each year simply because they lack identification.

In our experience losing a pet can be even more traumatic for the owner(s) than the death of a pet, especially where children are involved. That is why we recommend micro chipping as part of our preventative health program for all

#### GARDENING ORGANICALLY by Marjorie Spear

It is wonderful growing weather for lettuce and chives in my garden but not good for the cabbage family as horrible insects are eating them to pieces. I have been advised not to mulch with straw, the cabbage moth infestation might have been worse if I had done so. I mulched with chips lightly. I have started feeding by spraying with seaweed and fish emulsion.

Cherry tomatoes are thriving in a warm sunny spot with plenty of moisture. I have a delicious big fruit variety.

Citrus fruit is thriving and the mandarins have been ripening for eating. But the sucking moth has caused sadness. It pierces a hole and the mandarin then falls off, Often still eatable but not that stung section. If you shake the tree daily the stung fruit will fall off. You can store them in the frig. Suggest you pick the orange coloured fruit before the piercing moth gets busy. See you at the Herb Farm on June 14th. All welcome, please bring a plate.

High praise to Teena Kennedy, Vice President of the Kuranda Environment Association, for her organisational skills and artistic talent. She succeeded in presenting a line-up of the region's best authorities on pet care, grooming, training and control. Cooperative links have been forged with Mareeba Shire Council and the Kuranda Veterinary Surgery to pro-actively promote pet management through microchip registration. When our pets are properly managed, the people with pets are happy, the people without pets are happy, our pets are happy and the wildlife is happy.

With cooperation across the community, there are less complaints, less dogs in National Parks, including Jumrum Environmental Park, more birds and less mounds of offensive "do" underfoot.

Please see the May edition of EnviroNews for more on the Doggy Do and "Why a Cat Curfew" by Andrew Easton of the Kuranda Veterinary Surgery. This is about how you can help to save the wildlife and still have a happy cat.

### CASSOWARIES - KILLING THEM WITH KINDNESS

Les Moore, speaker at our April meeting, made these points about why feeding cassowaries puts them at risk. He says this is due to:

their dependence upon the food source;

the encouraging of birds to concentrate their activities around one focus point creating social tensions within the local population and increasing the chance of dog attack, eg. the Mt Whitfield incident;

it can encourage birds to cross roads more frequently to access feeding sites and thereby increase the risk of road death;

the danger posed to people as cassowaries learn to approach other peo-ple and vehicles demanding food. Most reports of cassowary "attacks" are due to this behaviour;

some food is unacceptable to cassowaries ie bread and mouldy fruit etc. These can cause a fatal fungal disease in young bird and old uneaten food poses substantial health risks to both adults and young cassowaries;

the danger to people of being kicked and the negative response that this will create with the public.

### FERAL PIG TRAPPING PROGRAM



Many reports of feral pig sightings are coming in. A number of traps are set at residences along Blackmountain Road and across the highway towards the Skyrail towers. Evidence

of pig activity has been reported from Platypus Creek, ad-Jacent to Mason Road and at Speewah.

Information about where the pigs are, their size and the number of young in the pack, are useful data. Even if the pigs pose no threat to you, this information is useful. Please call 93 8834 or 0412 263 279.



As the end of the financial year approaches and we are going through the paper work, it would be the ideal time to look at taking out that subscription to make sure that no unexpected big Ambulance accounts come along, just at the wrong time. Although no time is right for large accounts. If you are already a subscriber, please make sure the details you have supplied are correct; eg. name and number of dependents, address, contact numbers, pension numbers etc.

### TREVORS TIP:

SHOCK: is a medical term used to describe the pallor, sweating clammy skin and bluish extremities, mental confusion (sometimes unconscious), rapid feeble pulse and sighing breathing that may follow an accident or illness. Similar symptoms may be caused by an emotional crisis. Shock implies a sense of urgency - the patient needs immediate treatment. CAUSES OF SHOCK: The reduction of circulating blood due to: \* Blood loss from bleeding, \* The loss of plasma (as in burns),\* The loss of fluids as in vomiting and dehydration,\* The reduction of the pumping ability of the heart,\* The pooling of blood in the peripheral blood vessels (eg arms and legs). This may be a simple faint or the result of toxins causing blood vessels to dilate (enlarge) as in infections.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS: \*The classical picture of shock is a patient who has:

- \* Cold, clammy skin
- \* Pulse that become rapid and feeble
- \* Change in the conscious state
- \* Sighing respiration (air hunger)

TREATMENT FOR SHOCK: If the patient is unconscious, turn on side. Care for the airway, breathing and circulation. Stop any bleeding. If patient is conscious lay torso flat (head level with heart) and elevate legs if possible. Protect from heat and cold. Do not give anything by mouth but moisten lips. Do not give alcohol. Seek URGENT Ambulance medical help on 000.

And the ash resulting from the burning of these materials is also toxic to plants & would accumulate in your system if used on plants to be eaten.



# Richard Arthur Burge

Dick Burge was born at Echuca, Victoria on the 17th December 1912. His early childhood was like that of many country lads along the banks of the Murray and around the docks of what was then Australia's largest inland port. When Dick was six his father moved the family to Bendigo where he worked an old gold mine - pick and shovel work that returned a uncertain living. Dick attended a local school until he completed his primary education and he then left home and obtained a position as a PMG telegraph boy in Essendon, Melbourne.

Through his ability to work hard and combined with his sharp intelligence; Dick began to work his way up in the postal service when he was lucky to meet a lass named Rene Glen who lived at Pascoe Vale. They married and moved to Bon Beach where three children were born to share their lives. This suburban domesticity was shattered by the outbreak of World War II. Dick was never one to be backward in coming forward. He was one of the first to enlist in the AIF. He was sent to the Middle East where he served at Sidi Barrani; Bardia; Derna and other postings. He suffered continual lung problems which developed into pleurisy and he was repatriated back to Australia. Back home again; he was discharged as medically unfit from the Australian Armed Forces. Dick was a determined man and didn't take no for an answer. He joined the RAAF as a navigator of small ships based out of Melbourne to sail between there and New Guinea. Dick had no knowledge of seafaring and navigation and his first Captain upon discovering these unfortunate lacks, expressed the view that they were in for an exciting voyage - possibly ending in Tokyo Bay instead of Madang Harbour. Dick served with the small ships around the northern islands until again illness overcame him and he was again discharged from the forces. After a considerable period of convalescence - he was granted a TPI pension.

Dick's father had instilled a great appreciation and interest in politics and in the union movement. Dick was deeply involved in the ALP movement in Victoria and he had made many friends on both sides of the Federal and State Parliaments. Fred Daly and Dick were often together planning, plotting and stirring the pot. One of the people who did not appreciate Dick's humour was Prime Minister Bob Menzies who described Dick as one of the "Faceless Men of the Labor Party". Dick's other life long passion

In 1966, Rene convinced him that he would be better in the clean country air of Kuranda and they moved to a property in the Speewah area. Upon arrival in Kuranda, Dick with the aid of a few other oldies, re-established the ALP branch in Kuranda and he also devoted himself to developing a computerised system for successfully backing race horses. These remained passions until his passing.

As Dick's illness worsened into Emphysema - and encouraged by his lifetime friend Frank Hardy - Dick began to write stories based on his early experiences. Much to his surprise, his earliest story submitted to a Truckies magazine was accepted and earned him a small remuneration. This spurred him on to more story writing and this became a

Dick was dedicated to helping pensioners. He was a driving force for the Kuranda Pensioner's League, the Far North Queensland Pensioners League and the Cairns T.P.I. Association. He was also closely involved in assisting his Aboriginal friends and he was sadly missed by them when his worsening illness curtailed his activities and mobility.

Dick spent his life working and fighting for his family and for the community. His passing in the 24th March was a sad loss for a great many people who remember him fondly and with a high respect and regard. It can be said that through his efforts he left the world a better place than he found it when he arrived.

# KISC DRUG AND ALCOHOL BULLETIN "DEPENDENCY AND ADDICTION"

The main sign of a bad relationship with a drug is difficulty in leaving it alone. Dependence on drugs (both leisure and medical) is common, in fact dependence is a basic human problem not limited to drugs. People can become dependent on substances, practices, experiences and on other people. All these situations share similar tendencies such as tolerance/diminished pleasure and withdrawal/difficulty separating.

THE REAL PROBLEM WITH DEPENDENCE IS THAT IT LIMITS PERSONAL FREEDOM.

Dependencies become problems when they take up vast amounts of time, money and energy; create guilt and anxiety; and control one's life. Dependence on anything is not easy to break. Often people just switch dependencies from one thing to another without gaining more freedom. Good relationships with drugs do not involve dependence. Once you become dependent on a substance it may be very hard or almost impossible to get back into a good relationship with it. It is better to either avoid the substance or create a good relationship with it from the start. The terms "dependence" and "addiction" are loosely used these days. Properly speaking, drug addiction is marked by physical changes such as needing higher doses for effect, and withdrawal if discontinued. The treatment of drug addiction has become big business, but despite the increase in the treatment industry, the rate of addiction is not decreasing. Addiction can be seen as a basic human problem whose roots go very deep. Most of us have at some time been wounded or hurt in some way, we long for a sense of completeness and wholeness and often search for satisfaction outside of ourselves. We give away our power in exchange for a transient sense of wholeness, then suffer because the objects of our craving seem to control us. Addiction can only be cured when we consciously experience this process, reclaim our power, and recognise that our wounds must be healed from within.
