

Kuranda Tourism in a Bygone Era

During the first half of the twentieth century Kuranda was one of the premier tourist attractions of North Queensland. The Kuranda area is now readily accessible to the tourist by train, road vehicle or Skyrail, but prior to the second World War a trip to Kuranda was much more complicated. Road access to Cairns was limited to gravel tracks north to Mossman and south to Innisfail, with a single lane, one-way "road" up the Gillies range to the Atherton Tableland. It was possible to reach Kuranda by road only by travelling up the Gillies Range then back to Kuranda through Mareeba. The road was very basic and only the brave or foolish attempted this trip.

Before the completion of the coastal railway line in the early 1930s most tourists arrived in Cairns by ship. Those wishing to visit the Atherton Tablelands or Kuranda took the train up the Kuranda Range. The Railway Department was an avid promoter of North Queensland tourism and frequently provided trains at the ship's side at the wharves to take passengers

straight to their destination. In 1914 Margaret Clow wrote a small book about her experiences while visiting Kuranda. This account gives us an insight into how the tourist experience has changed, and sometimes not for the better. The average tourist now spends about five hours in Kuranda, which contrasts greatly with the extended visits of previous years. Like many visitors of that time Margaret Clow and her friends spent two leisurely weeks in Kuranda. During this time they visited more natural attractions than are visited by the modern tourist - or even the present locals. Very few people now would know some of the places they visited.

The ship's purser arranged to have a train waiting at the Cairns wharf to take the group to Kuranda. The visitors were so impressed with the trip up the range from Redlynch that she describes it as "a panorama which for sheer beauty is unsurpassed in Australasia, if not the world".

The group stayed at Hunter's Barron Falls Hotel, and the hotel proprietor, Mr. Hunter, organised tours for them. In the absence of viable roads, all tours were by walking or boat. The first trip they undertook was to Rocky Hill View, which entailed a half-mile walk along the railway line and a climb up a low grassy hill. The views over Cairns, the Barron Range and the sea are described as "exquisite". After the climb the tourists were treated to a "billy" and a feed. After this "Mr. Hunter, who is thoughtfulness personified, has brought out a small flask, containing an amber coloured liquid. 'Snake-bite cure" says he, with a twinkle in his eye. The gentlemen all claim to have been bitten by the deadly reptile, and are accordingly cured".

Another attraction was F.P. Dodd's insect collection. Dodd's collection was one of the best examples of butterflies and insects in existence. In addition to the collection Dodd exported thousands of insects and butterflies to all parts of the world. Kuranda has lost the Dodd collection, but part of it is now on show at the Queensland Museum.

One of the highlights of the trip was a visit to Fairyland Tea Gardens. Fairyland was situated on the

Barron River on the opposite side to Kuranda. In 1914 Fairyland was owned and operated by the Dick family. The trip to the gardens began with a walk along the railway line for a mile and a-half to a place opposite Fairyland. The visitors saw nothing but rainforest, but a loud coo-ee brought the inhabitants of a small cottage to the opposite bank. Miss Lorna Dick rowed a boat across the river and transported the visitors to the opposite side. The first impressions of the visitors was of awe: "Landing, we are led up a low bank, and lo! We are in Fairyland. Through a maze of leafy trees, palms, ferns, and luxuriant grasses, we follow our guide along a narrow, winding pathway, where the trees tower high above our heads. Presently we come to a gigantic Kauri pine, with a girth of 21 feet! We are told that the first limb is 80 feet from the ground! This tree is under the protection of the Government, and is one of the many sights of Kuranda".

After experiencing the variety of rainforest vegetation the group wandered through a grove of fruit trees, including paw-paws and bananas. Then they were taken to a place described as: "Fairies' Bower, where the little people have magnanimously provided rustic seats and a rustic table for those human beings who invaded their dainty arbour. The tea is delicious, and the cake and bread quickly disappear beneath the inroads made upon it by the hungry people. Bananas from the plantation are set before us, and never before have I tasted any with such delicious flavour as these".

One of the most unusual attractions visited by the group was King O'Malley's Chair. After travelling by train to Barron Falls Station the group walked to the steps leading to the natural platform of rock where King O'Malley's Chair is found. The so-called chair is a smooth ledge of rock with a high back-rest. It is named after King O'Malley, a Minister in the Federal Government. O'Malley originally came from the United States.

The party then went on to cross Mervyn Creek before climbing some steep steps to Lady Robinson's look-out. This spot was named after the wife of Queensland's Agent General, Lady Robinson, who visited the area. From here they had a fine view of Robb's Monument.

Another area visited was Milne Dell, a short distance from town. After travelling through an area known as "Lovers Walk" they went down the edge of an "Arcadian stream" which was "rippling over a gravel-strewn bottom between lily-lined banks, babbling over stones and pebbles, with giant tree ferns adorning either bank, or flowing silently, dark and calm, between overhanging trees thickly massed, this most wonderful of wonderful of streams, winds a circuitous course for three miles, from its source in the green hills, before joining the Barron, just below Kuranda Station". This effusive description can only refer to Jum Rum Creek. After crossing the creek near its mouth they climbed a hill before entering Milne Dell. Margaret Clow describes the Dell as "the most wonderful I have ever seen", with all the thousand and one scrub trees and vines.

It is clear that the experiences of the tourists of the past were greatly different from those of the present visitor. However, it is a testament to the special attractions Kuranda has to offer that people from all corners of the earth still find the area worth visiting.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

I take this opportunity to respond to the Kuranda has Gone to the Dogs & Cats letter published in 30 May 2008 edition of the Kuranda Paper.

In September 2007, an application was made to Council for approval to expand the capacity of the kennels from 40 dogs to 80 dogs and 20 cats to 50 cats. Council at its General Meeting held on 4 March 2008 resolved to defer, not reject, the application pending further independent expert advice. The application together with further expert acoustic advice was resubmitted to the Ordinary Meeting of 23 April 2008 where it was approved subject to conditions, including all conditions suggested by the acoustic expert. The conditions include a requirement for additional screening between the kennel enclosures and exercise areas.

The approved increase in capacity cannot commence until all appeal rights have been exhausted and then must comply with all conditions of approval. Submitters will have twenty (20) business days to lodge an appeal to the Planning and Environment Court against Council's approval.

At present the kennel is still operating under the original planning approval which limits the capacity to 40 dogs and 20 cats. In October 2006, sound monitoring of the kennels was undertaken by the Environmental Protection Agency. This monitoring determined that the 40 dog capacity kennels were in compliance with the conditions of approval.

FIRST THE GOOD NEWS. Following the feasibility study, 33.3 ha of land was purchased and progressed to Architect, Surveyors, Town Planners, and Consultant Engineers. More recently the project moved forward considerably when a Consultant was engaged to prepare a Business Plan to advance the project to the Local Government Approval Stage.

During the whole process (to date) numerous meetings have been held with former Mareeba Shire Council and recently with the Tablelands Regional Council. The Anglican Church, at the behest of the Kuranda community has already spent over \$800,000 (eight hundred thousand dollars) on the project – much of which has been raised by the Kuranda community.

NOW THE BAD NEWS. The State Government has a Draft FNQ2025 Plan that proposes to FREEZE ALL development in the Myola area.

What does OUR FUTURE hold when you consider (at this very time) there is a 250 bed shortage in the area for Aged Care,

Dear Kuranda Paper,

Good planning and meaningful public consultation can help avoid bitter disputes such as the furore over the Kuranda Pet Resort on Boyles Road.

The new Tablelands Regional Council had a chance to do things right when it re-visited this issue in one of its initial meetings. Unfortunately, it botched this early test of involving the community in decision-making. None of the previous objectors were even notified that Council was about to reconsider the matter. Dissenting locals found out only AFTER Council had approved further expansion of the controversial Pet Resort.

Councillors should deal with community concerns head-on, however tiresome this may seem. Most of the time, they receive little feedback from their constituency. When strong opposition to new projects is expressed, it's probably a sign that something is amiss. At minimum, objectors should be given a fair opportunity to present and argue their case.


The State Government showed the same tendency to brush aside public dissent when it wasted millions of dollars of tax-payers money on consultancies and reports advocating a grandiose Highway-building scheme for the Kuranda Range.

Objectors noted at the outset that the proposal was a non-starter from the twin-perspectives of climate change and Peak Oil. The Beattie Government responded by ignoring our objections and refusing to provide any serious intellectual response.

Fortunately, under Anna Bligh's leadership, the Queensland Government now seems to be taking a more rational and approach to planning policy in FNQ. Our new Council would be well-advised to do the same.



Controlled Burn-off on June 26th

Cairns and District Hillslopes Committee plan to carry out a test of emergency services response times on the 25th and 26th of June. They will be lighting two controlled fires: the first on Friday at Clifton Spur along the ridge to Buchan's Beach and the second on Saturday in the Mona Mona area at Pineapple hill. Controlled fires are used in National Parks as a means of reducing the risk of wildfires.

This procedure is carried out each year, with the district varied; last Residents should not be alarmed by seeing smoke, but if they are concerned, should ring Queensland Fire and Rescue. The exercise will be cancelled if the weather is not suitable and will be re-scheduled at a later time.

Queensland Government Introduces the Great Solar PV Swindle

A much heralded promise to introduce real incentives for domestic solar power in Queensland was confirmed as greenwash in the Queensland Parliament recently according to Queensland Conservation

'The introduction of a net feedin tariff for domestic solar PV systems in the Clean Energy Bill is nothing but greenwash and a swindle' said Queensland Conservation. The Bligh Government has effectively blocked suburban solar energy systems from receiving a fair price for the clean energy they produce,' he continued. 'It seems that the government is more interested in looking good rather than actually providing an incentive to install solar energy'.

The Opposition parties clearly recognised the flaws in the Solar Bonus Scheme,' said Hutcheon. Queensland Conservation applauds their efforts in Parliament to amend the Clean Energy Bill to provide a gross feed-in tariff. Had the amendment they proposed received

government support, it would have given real incentives for householders to produce clean, renewable energy at

Figures presented by the government on the scheme have been publicly challenged by Queensland Conservation. Our challenge showed that anyone using a 1 kW PV system would never generate more energy than they consume, and never qualify for the

The Department of Mines and Energy has refused to discuss its figures despite broad concerns on their accuracy.

Properly constructed the Solar Bonus Scheme would have been a world best practice initiative on solar PV systems. It would have established the government's renewable energy credentials and given a real incentive for Oueensland's householders, businesses, community and sporting organisations to install solar systems. As it stands it is an opportunity lost,' concluded Hutcheon.

GARDEN **JOTTINGS** BY ALECTURA

uly and the recent rain has been a boon. However, the rain has also bought on the weeds. The diligent gardener will remove these before seeding and compost. Presently in flower are many of the Callistomon and Grevilleas so beloved of various honeyeaters. These natives, available from prostrate to tall, are very rewarding, responding well to pruning and only require an open position with maximum sunlight and good drainage.

Generally in the garden, July is a time for cleaning up plantings and preparing beds for the return of warmer weather. Take inventory of your garden tools and the time to sharpen blades of secateurs and other cutters, oiling wooden handles and putting an edge on spades. A "lady's" digging fork with its narrower profile and lighter weight is a good investment and invaluable for dividing clumps and planting to established beds. When buying tools go for the best rather than be 'penny wise and pound foolish'.

Plant of the Month: Alocasia "Elephant Ear or Taro" (Araceae) is a genus of broad-leafed rhizomatous or bulbous perennials with over



70 species occurring throughout Asia, Oceania and South America. Grown mainly for the beauty of their leaves, these plants, particularly the larger (and I do mean LARGE) can bring a definite "wow" factor to any planting. With their close relatives Colacasias and Xanthosmas, the gardener is spoilt for choice in the amazing range of leaf shape and colourful foliage. Mostly requiring dappled light and well watered positions, they are of the easiest cultivation but some fencing may be required as the rhizomes are eagerly sought by forest munchers. To obtain best results, regular feeding and mulching should be given.

Eventually forming large trunks and when established with leaves over a metre long, and plants to 3 m, some giants of the family are: A. portii with its deeply incised leaves and A "Sumatra Giant" with entire leaf. Definitely not for the faint hearted.

More refined, colourful and lower growing plants for the garden and which quickly make stunning potted plants are A. amazonica, A. cuprea (once readily available in FNQ but now more difficult to obtain and a little expensive) with its emerging leaf the colour of newly beaten copper, A. "Hilo Beauty" with its clown dapples and blotchings of cream and grey greens, A. lowii with its arrow shaped leaf a metallic blue green and silver mid-vein, A. sanderiana and not least A. watsoniana, said by some to be the most beautiful leaf in the world.

Extensive crossings, much work by hybridizers and with tissue culturing, there is a stunning choice for the average to zealot gardener. A variety of Alocasias is often available

at local markets for a nominal sum. Keep your eyes peeled for a recent introduction A. "Bebe", miniature and quickly clumping - definitely one for the houseplant enthusiast.

A word of warning, while some Alocasias are used as a food source, with stems edible, all contain raphid crystals of oxalic acid that can numb and swell the tongue and pharynx. Edible corms require prolonged boiling before serving or processing as a food.

To whet your appetite for these tropical lovelies without too much boiling, the following site gives pictures of various Alocasias:

Dear Jo. Sorry I could not help source seed/plant of the "Okinawa Spinach" (Gynura crepioides). Your idea of an ornamental vegetable ground cover deserves top marks. A succulent vine with dark green leaves with purplish undersides and a full green form are cultivated. With its litany of common names Handama, Dawn Dewa, Leaves of the Gods, Googoolipid, Mollucan spinach, Cholesterol Spinach, it would appear appreciated in many places. Any reader able to help in tracking down please contact Alectura.

Dear Eloise, You can certainly import seed and plants but stringent conditions apply. Best start your quest with reference to the AQIS site that sets out terms and conditions of import. http:// www.aqis.gov.au/icon32/asp/ex_querycontent.

Type in your seed/plant name and see whether it is allowed. All seed must be clean and free of any foreign matter so packing in any plant material such as peat or sphagnum means seizure. Seeds must be scientifically and clearly labelled with seed mixes not allowed. While most O/S reputable seed companies are aware of conditions for import to Australia, if purchasing on Ebay you may need to advise vendor of conditions.

The importation of plant material is another matter, full of constraints, concerns and costs with frequent losses arising from gassing and during quarantine. I would highly recommend you discussing your needs with David Liddle, world-renowned Hoya expert who has licensed quarantine facilities just this side of Mareeba. If anyone can do the best by your investment in importing plant material, David can. The following site gives contact as well listing his extensive Hoya collection.

Despite recent bad press, from my own experience, I have generally found AQIS staff most helpful in dealing with the bureaucratic details. Given the high risks to our flora and fauna, no attempt should be made to "smuggle" in any plant or seed materials.

Dear Jill, The "Sweet Pandanus" used in many Asian dishes especially sweets is P. amaryllifolius, today distributed over Southern India, South East Asia, Indonesia and Western New Guinea with a long tradition of cultivation. Of uncertain origin as it only has one known instance of flowering, this is a low growing suckering form with no or little leaf serration. A recent guest from Malayasia with great delight took several leaves and used them in cooking rice to impart a subtle delicate flavour so what was just an ornamental is now another spice plant.

The mere mention of Pablo Picasso draws pictures in our minds of twisted figures and faces in a cavalcade of colour. However, there is much more to Pablo than Cubism, and among the sea of literature praising and criticising the hero of modernism is a two volume set edited



It is the same urge that produces the never-ending flow of new gadgets and the non-stoppable flood of new applications in the IT industry.

Since Picasso (and Duchamp and Warhol et al.) we are all artists if we can but see it. Pablo knew that what he was draughting was not the image that he was seeing with his eyes, but a 'representation' of the image or a mimetic

representation, a 'mime' of the object. Since a mime only indicates the image it carries with it both a representation as well as an abstraction of the original article. By assessing both qualities he was able to create a 'hybrid' that is pleasing in its representation and enjoyable in the craft of its abstraction.



The Arts Co-op role in the community

There seems to be a misconception with some in the community about the role of the Kuranda Arts Co-op. We are not 'just like any other gallery' in

The Arts Co-op has operated as a not-for-profit organisation in Kuranda for over ten years. The community involvement has also contributed to its longevity. With the exception of a couple of small project grants, it has been self funded and self sustained for all that time. The gallery is open 7 days per week from 10:00 am - 4:00 pm and is fully operated by volunteers. It has an active membership of approximately 30 local professional artists.

The gallery in Rob Veivers Drive is the main activity of the Arts Co-op. It is the only gallery in Kuranda that displays solely the work of local artists. The gallery acts as a showcase where visitors can gain insight into an important aspect of Kuranda's cultural life.

The Arts Co-op plays a pivotal role advocating for the visual arts in the community and contributes to the economic sustainability of many local professional artists. All work is juried on a selection criteria to ensure only quality art and craft is displayed. This high standard has been recognised in 'Lonely Planet' and 'Fromers Guide' publications.

The Arts Co-op is a financial member of the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce and Tourism and during the past two years has hosted two Chamber social meetings at the gallery, along with members of the then Mareeba Shire Council. The Co-op artists donate artworks to many community organisations for fundraising raffles and Christmas gifts.

The Arts Co-op is currently financially 'extremely hard pressed'. We believe our situation has been contributed to by two main factors; the recognised decreased tourist numbers and our location - we are not in the main street. We

Although it has been raised with Chamber and the then Mareeba Shire Council regularly since 2005, there is still no street lighting in Rob Veivers Drive.

The Arts Co-op works closely with Cairns based Arts Nexus, a regional arts and cultural development organisation. Under the banner of 'Craft Connect' the Arts Co-op assisted over two years a number of local artists at Reeds Trade Fair at the Sydney Convention Centre, and also with an exhibition and sales in Singapore. A Thought for July

This month we read from St Matthews Gospel Chapter 10 verses 24 to 39

'Jesus said to his disciples, 'Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father ... So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. --- Matthew 10:29, 31

In the year 1905, an American woman called Mrs Civilla Martin became friends with a Mr and Mrs Doolittle in Elmira, New York. Mrs Doolittle had been bedridden for twenty years; her husband set off to work each day in a wheelchair. When the Martins asked them how their faith in God kept them so cheerful, Mrs Doolittle replied, 'His eye is on the sparrow, and I know he watches me.' Mrs Martin immediately wrote a hymn with these words as the refrain, and it's been popular ever since:

Why should I feel discouraged, why should the shadows come. Why should my heart be lonely,

and long for heaven and home, When Jesus is my portion? My constant friend is he:

His eye is on the sparrow, and I know he watches me.

I sing because I'm happy, I sing because I'm free, For his eye is on the sparrow, And I know be watches me.

Jesus probably chose to speak about sparrows because they were the commonest wild birds in the Holy Land. In Mauritius they will take food off the table. The

cheeky way that sparrows peck up seeds in gardens or streets led to Londoners calling themselves 'Cockney sparrows'.

Yet the lives of sparrows are short, and to suggest that the creator of the universe cares about each individual sparrow which falls dead to the ground was an astonishing claim to make. But we're used nowadays to the thought of super-computers which can hold billions and squillions of facts in their memory at one time. Whatever picture we have in our minds of the awesome greatness of God, surely he can do the same and more so. Therefore, as Jesus said, if God can care for each unthinking sparrow, how much more will he care for you! You're the creatures he's made able to think and reason, to be aware of God's love for you, and respond by loving God in return. Surely God will care, then, about even the most trivial things that happen to you, and nothing's too unimportant to ask him about in your prayers.

That isn't to say that he keeps you from suffering, any more than he stops the sparrow falling to the ground. He didn't lift Mrs Doolittle from her bed or Mr Doolittle from his wheelchair. But Jesus, on the cross, shows us that Almighty God cares so much about our suffering that he comes down to earth and suffers with us. It's knowing that, which helps suffering Christians keep cheerful: God cares about suffering sparrows, and God cares about suffering people.

Jesus uses this comparison

in the context of a warning to his followers that they'll be persecuted. Roman Emperors could, and did, take the lives of Christians who refused to deny their faith, and Christians were very frightened of the Emperor. But all the Emperor could do was kill their body, predicted Jesus; he couldn't touch their immortal soul. Whereas if they escaped from the Emperor by saying that they didn't believe in a loving God, then they'd be liable to the judgement of God, who's much more powerful than the Emperor. It was not the Emperor they should fear, said Jesus, but God, who could judge them for being faithless.

Yet for Christians who are faithful, it's not God the judge we're dealing with, but the loving God who cares even for the sparrows. We're unlikely to risk our lives for our faith these days.

But if we admit to being a Christian, we may risk mockery by our friends, we may risk our job or our promotion, we may risk being written off by our relations as oldfashioned and irrelevant. And we shall very likely have to endure physical suffering, great or small, at some time in our lives. But be steadfast, hold on to your faith, proclaim it boldly, and Jesus will be with you in your suffering. Then store these words in your memory for when you feel low:

I sing because I'm happy, I sing because I'm free, For his eye is on the sparrow, And I know be watches me.

... Not by bread alone ...

BUTTERFLY MAN OF KURANDA REMEMBERED

Dr Geoff Monteith of the Queensland Museum recently led a working bee of local and visiting entomologists to clean up the grave of Frederick Parkhurst Dodd, the "Butterfly Man of Kuranda". His grave can be found on the top of the hill in Kuranda cemetery. When the accumulated lichen and grime were removed from the grave, Geoff read aloud to the group Longfellow's poem, an excerpt of which appears

as the epitaph on Dodd's head stone.

Dodd was a well-known entomologist of the early 1900s, who collected insects extensively in the Kuranda area as well as other areas of Australia and

Dodd was born on 11th March 1861 in Wickliffe, Vic. and died in Kuranda on 27 July 1937.

He worked as a banker in Charters Towers and at the age of 34 quit his job to collect insects. At the age of 43 he moved to Kuranda with his wife and children. His family home was on the site of the present day Post Office. They also ran a guesthouse next door, opposite the Top Pub. Dodd supplied insect specimens to both professional and amateur collectors. His home became a tourist attraction with his children Colin, Katherine and Elizabeth acting as doorkeepers and assistant guides to his extensive personal collection that was arranged artistically rather than in a scientific manner.

and deposited in prestigious institutions such as the British Museum. Dodd himself was the author of 27 scientific publications and well over 90 insects have been named after the Dodd family. Dodd's interest in insects obviously rubbed off onto his son, Alan, who became a professional entomologist. Alan published copious scientific papers, named over 378 species of wasp alone and was instrumental in the success of the prickly pear project, bringing Cactoblastis moth to Australia from Argentina and being awarded an MBE and OBE for this work. Dodd, assisted by his children, took his collection on tour around Eastern Australia setting up his displays in public halls.

Many of Dodd's specimens that were sent overseas were new, unknown to science and were described and named by overseas entomologists

Research Centre in Charter Towers was named in his honour.

Chamber invites every business owner in Kuranda and the surrounding areas to become members and contribute to the prosperity of our area. It is only by increasing our membership base that we


will be listened to by those who determine our future.

SANDALWOOD: Found in India and Australia. The wood is used among Hindus. The essential oil is extracted from it. The main property of sandalwood is as a strong kidney antiseptic, regulates overlong periods in women. In the Orient the perfume of sandalwood is very much appreciated. Used for furniture for its solidity and its resistance against destruction by insects. Reduced to powder it is burned

STYRAX: It is a resin coming from a very old tree in Mexico and Central America. Has a great influence in the treatment of very severe skin conditions. Also acts well as a rejuvenating element.

THUYA: "The Tree of Life" originally found in China. Cultivated now in France, is an expectorant-sudorific, anti-rheumatism, is also very good on warts, polyps.

THYME: Well known plant used as an aromatic in cooking. Very strong general stimulant, aphrodisiac antiseptic - antivenomous, used for dermatitis, boils, One of the most used plants by Egyptians, Greek and Roman practitioners.

YLANG-YLANG: The tree is found in Java, Sumatra, Philippines and La Reunion. The essence is extracted from the flowers. Strong antiseptic, aphrodisiac, regulator of the heart, impotency, frigidity. Ylang-Ylang is used mostly in perfume.

There are many other essential oils, but it is not possible to list them all.

1/2 teaspoon turmeric

1 clove garlic (optional)

1 tablespoon coriander powder

Garnish: chopped small green chilli pepper and chopped dry ginger.





TAX RETURN CHECKLIST - SALARY AND WAGE **EARNERS**

Well, it is that time of year again. I find it is very common for clients to make an appointment to do their tax return and then forget to bring items required to complete the return. The following list is a general list of items that salary and wage earners may be required to bring along to their tax agent. This list is not exhaustive and your tax agent may require other items not mentioned below.

- All Payment Summaries (previously called Group Certificates) from employers, Centrelink and pensions.
- Bank interest earned
- **Dividend Statements**
- Trust or Partnership Distributions
- Sale of capital items e.g. shares and rental properties
- Foreign income
- Rental property income
- Details of any other income not already mentioned

Deductions

- Work related expenses e.g. motor vehicle, travel, uniform, protective clothing, self-education, union fees, telephone and any other expenses incurred for work related purposes.
- Gifts or donations
- Tax agent fee for previous year
- Rental property expenses

Other Information

- Days spent in zone areas
- Private Health Insurance details
- Names and dates of birth of dependent children or spouse
- Net medical expenses for your family
- Bank details BSB and Account No. (this will generally speed up your refund)

Dear Kuranda Paper,

I am adding my voice to those who have tried to bring the unspeakable noise problem created by the dogs housed at the Kuranda Pet Resort to the attention of the local council responsible for the well being of Kuranda residents. I live next door.

The owners of the resort sought Development Approval for a Material Change of Use to increase their quota from 40 dogs to 70. This was voted against by Council last year who then took legal advice as to how to deal with the violation of noise issue. This resulted respectfully suggest that adequate air conditioning be in approval in principal being given that has the more provided for the animals in the sound proofed areas.

stringent conditions attached to it. My personal concern is how will Council manage these conditions, as it has already been proved that the kennels noise restrictions don't comply with the regulations for the 40 dogs currently housed.

The current submission states the animals will be housed in a sound proofed facility but this is obviously not going to be the case as the animals are constantly outside and barking for 75% of the day and

There is a paragraph in the Council Meeting Minutes that reads as follows:

(D) Assessment Manager's Advice

1. (iv) Implementation of the noise management conditions suggested by Air Noise Environment Pty Ltd should result in the proposed development having a minimal/ lesser impact on the amenity of the locality.

I draw your attention to the word 'should'. As a resident living 500 metres away from a facility housing upwards of 50 dogs, how can the 'amenity of the locality' ever return to the peace and tranquility one expects in a quiet rural area.

The minutes also reference Noise Control in Schedule F as follows:

(F2) Noise from the operation of Kuranda Pet Resort must be limited such that the average maximum level of noise when measured at any adjacent noise sensitive place as the LAmax,adj,T must not exceed more than 5 dB(A) above the background noise level (LA90,T) for daytime hours (7 am to 6 pm) and evening (6 pm to 10 pm) and not more than 3 dB(A) above the background noise level for night time hours (10 pm to 7 am), where T is defined as 15 minutes.

I ask that you imagine the sound of a dog waking you up in the middle of the night by barking continuously for 5 minutes, either in the street outside your home or in a back garden adjacent to your home. Imagine that this happens more than once a night, every night and then imagine what 15 minutes of this unabated noise would do to your sleep each night. Asking that T be defined as 15 minutes is outrageous when applying it to night time hours. Any and all dogs need to be housed inside a sound proofed shelter at night, and during the day, any dog that starts barking should be immediately placed inside the sound proofed facility.


Given that this facility is in the tropics, I

There does not appear to be any valid reason why the original decision, to deny the expansion by the previous council, should have been overturned by the incoming council.

Since when should the needs of animals take priority over the rights of people, especially when hard work and savings have gone into creating the quality of life expected by the residents in the immediate surroundings.

The pet resort should relocate to an uninhabited rural area and not be constructed in the middle of a rural neighbourhood where families are bringing up children and endeavouring to make a life for themselves away from the stresses of city living. The unrelenting sound of dogs barking cause sstress and this expansion cannot be allowed to take place. It would be preferable that the kennels be instructed to relocate so that normal life can be resumed.



Computer Tips:

Hi, and welcome to my rave. The aim for this month is to give Novice and Intermediate PC users some educational information to enable you to care and maintain your computers Operating System. The focus here is simple computer maintenance, speed and security. If you do not fall into this category I will endeavour to bring interesting info in future raves.

One common problem I come across on a regular basis is, there are a large number of PC users who do not know how to perform a Disk Cleanup and how to Defragment their computer; these two basic tasks are very important in keeping the computer running well.

The Disk cleanup utility will remove old temporary files and unused data that are taking up valuable space on

your hard drive. This is best performed before you Defrag. Disk Cleanup can take a little bit of time, so please be patient; once this is completed the next step is to Defrag.

Here is one simple analogy of how fragmented files affect your computer:

OK, so you have a filing system at home or in the office and you don't pay much attention to how you file your information, A-Z etc: when it is time to retrieve a certain document it may take you quite some time to locate this file, wasting time and energy in the process. Your computer needs to have regular file compacting and sorting to help maintain space and speed of file location; the same as you would have to do to clean up your filing system to make it more efficient.

If this is not carried out on a fairly regular basis, one of the effects is that it can slow down your computers speed and efficiency. It is important that you have at least 15% free disk space on your hard drive to defrag; if you do not, your system is getting close to having some serious overload problems and needs attention.

I could easily go into a lengthy explanation on how to perform Disk Cleanup and Defrag. Instead I suggest you view this web link below, as it has screenshots and step by step instructions for these procedures.

Another general misconception is that if you are running Windows Firewall and AVG FREE that this is enough protection for your computer. This is not the case as there

are many different types of Viruses, Malwares, Worms and Trojans that can infiltrate your system. AVG FREE does a good job in blocking a lot of these, but the free version does not totally cover this broad area. I recommend that in addition to AVG FREE adding SPYBOT SEARCH AND DESTROY, SPYWARE BLASTER and AD-AWARE. These extra free programs are easy to run and will give your computer much more protection from possible threats. Make sure that you follow the set up instructions and update and run these programs every week or so. These free programs are readily available from:

http://www.filehippo.com also a great site for a lot of other freebies.

One last important area that needs addressing is updating your operating system. A simple way of doing this is to turn on Automatic Updates. To do this, click on Start>Control Panel>Security> and turn on the Automatic Updates. These updates are vital for internet users in keeping your computers O.S. up to date with security, patches and drivers. A well maintained Computer is easy to do and makes your computing time a lot less frustrating.





Those were the good old days.

Brings back many happy memories of the street I lived in and all the great kids, now adults that I was friends with!

CONGRATULATIONS TO ALL THE KIDS WHO WERE BORN IN

THE 1930's, 40', 50's, 60's and 70's !! First, we survived being born to mothers who smoked and/or drank while they carried us. They took aspirin, ate blue cheese dressing, tuna from a tin, and didn't get tested for diabetes. Then after that trauma, our baby cots were covered with bright coloured lead-based paints.

We had no childproof lids on medicine bottles, doors or cabinets and when we rode our bikes, we had no helmets, not to mention the risks we took hitchhiking. As children, we would ride in cars with no seat belts or air bags. Riding in the back of a van - loose - was always exciting and great fun. We drank water from the garden hose or tap and NOT from a bottle.

We shared one soft drink with four friends, from one bottle or can and NO ONE actually died from this. We ate cakes, white bread and real butter and drank cordial with sugar in it, but we weren't overweight because WE WERE ALWAYS OUTSIDE PLAYING!!

We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the street lights came on. No one was able to reach us all day. And we

were O.K. We would spend hours building our go-carts out of scraps and then ride down the hill, only to find out we forgot the brakes. After running into the bushes a few times, we learned to solve the problem.

We did not have Play stations, Nintendo's, X-boxes, No video games at all, No 99 channels, No Pay TV, No cable, No DVD movies or surround sound. It's crazy! We even had No mobile phones, No text messaging, No personal computers, No Internet or Internet chat rooms....... We fell out of trees, got cut, broke bones and teeth and there were no lawsuits from these accidents.

We played with worms and mud pies made from dirt, and the worms did not live in us forever. Made up games with sticks and tennis balls and although we were told it would happen, we didn't poke out anyone's eve.

We rode bikes or walked to a friend's house and knocked on the door or rang the bell, or just yelled for them! Local teams had tryouts and not everyone made the team. Those who didn't had to learn to deal with disappointment. Imagine that!!

The idea of a parent bailing us out if we broke the law was unheard of. They actually sided with the law!

This generation has produced some of the best risk-takers, problem solvers and inventors ever! The past 50 years have been an explosion of innovation and new ideas. We had freedom, failure, success and responsibility, and we learned how to deal with it all! And YOU are one of them! CONGRATULATIONS!

You might want to share this with others who have had the

luck to grow up as kids, before the lawyers and the government regulated our lives for our own good. And while you are at it, forward it to your kids so they will know how brave their parents were.

Kind of makes you want to run through the house with your eyes shut holding a pair of scissors, doesn't it?!



KURANDA DISTRICT STATE COLLEGE WINS ANOTHER AWARD

Education and Training Minister Rod Welford has congratulated Kuranda District State College on winning another excellence award for its Families as First Teachers program.

"The school has just been named the winner of the National Award for Quality Schooling for Excellence in Family School Partnerships," Mr Welford said.

This follows the school last year winning the 2007 Network Ten Showcase Award for Excellence in the Early Phase of Learning for this same program.

"The Families as First Teachers program is about helping Indigenous families support their pre-school aged children's early literacy and numeracy development and preparing them for school."

Kuranda District State College has a high enrolment percentage of Indigenous students from nearby communities who have English as their second language.

"School is a daunting prospect for many of these children but this program has made a big difference with Indigenous students now arriving to start their compulsory years' schooling, ready to learn," Mr Welford said.

"Consultation with the community in 2005

revealed that the community wanted to understand school better so the program was established to take school culture into the familiar surroundings of the five Indigenous communities. This gives them an understanding of the role the family plays in ensuring their children's success."

Member for Barron River, Steve Wettenhall, also congratulated the local school and said he had seen firsthand the success of the program.

"It breaks down the barriers that have made Indigenous families reluctant to visit schools and has encouraged them to value good early childhood education," Mr Wettenhall said. "The program has been enormously popular with parents attending workshops to learn to make alphabet and number charts, puppets and playdough and play games to help their children's learning.

"It is run by Kathryn Mannion, who has extensive experience in Indigenous schools in the Northern Territory, the Kimberley and northern Queensland, with teachers, teacher aides and Indigenous education support officers. Parents are running their own playgroups for their children and for the first time parents are becoming confident enough to come to the school unprompted to discuss their children's progress. The awards are not only a valuable validation of the school's program but the Indigenous community is also getting recognition for the work they are doing for their children."

Community Meeting on Kuranda Sport & Rec Program

On the 20th June 2008 an urgent meeting of Community and Stakeholders was held at the Kuranda QCWA Hall, concerning the impending "Loss of the Kuranda Sport & Recreation Program" based at Ngoonbi Co-Operative Society Ltd. This meeting was called as a response to community concern, and was also raised at the Kuranda Interagency Meeting held in June at the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre.

Local, State and Federal Government representatives and MPs, Kuranda Police and PCYC, QLD Health, Kuranda Interagency Members, local organisations, Indigenous and Non-Indigenous Community members were invited to attend.

Concern over the past 5 months as to future of the Program had arisen from the lack of forthcoming information from the State Government regarding the future accessibility of organisations to identified Indigenous Sport & Rec Funding. Over the past 5 years Ngoonbi Co-Operative Society has contributed over 30% towards the overall cost of this Program but is unable to continue this significant contribution.

As a result of letters to the Minister and calling the community meeting, representatives from the Queensland Department for Local Government, Sport & Recreation advised there would be an extension of agreement for up to 6 months with the transition of the Indigenous identified Sport & Recreation funding being made

This initiative has been handed down from the Minister for Sport Judy Spence and is part of the Agency Budget Highlights for 2008-09 towards Improving the Health & Well-being of Indigenous Communities.

BatReach volunteers are looking after me until I am strong and big enough to be released. I miss my striped possum mother and sometimes I cry so that Pam has to come and cuddle me. I now have some baby cereal solids as well as my bottle of milk, and some wood to chew, to get my insides used to it. I like custard apple, guava, and avocado too. Donna gave me a cricket to eat the other day, because I am actually omnivorous and I must get used to eating creepy crawlies — I didn't like the cricket, because it tickled my nose. As you can see from the photos I am being well looked after. There is a brushtail possum here too, and a squirrel glider. Three sugar gliders live together and keep each other warm in the cold Kuranda nights and early mornings. Every day at 4.00pm the volunteers come to prepare our food — there are lots of flying-foxes and some microbats too. The flying-foxes eat a lot of fruit which has to be washed and cut up by the volunteers, but we possums and the gliders have a more varied diet including nuts, lettuce, corn and seeds.

PUBLIC MEETING TO DISCUSS THE DRAFT FNQ 2025 IMPLICATIONS ON AGED CARE

FACILITIES PROPOSED FOR KURANDA

A Public Meeting was called for Wednesday, June 25 at 7.00pm at the Kuranda QCWA Hall by the Friends of Welcome Pocket to discuss the draft FNQ 2025 and its implications for the proposed Welcome Pocket Community Care - Aged Care facilities at Myola.

The project has been moving forward slowly for the past three years since a 33.3ha site was purchased near Myola by the Anglican Church. Since then consultants have been planning the development with construction due to start in 2010.

A spokesperson for the group Mrs. Lorraine Gould said the draft 2025 plan has left the project in limbo. "Nearly \$1 million has been spent on the project, much of which had been raised in the Kuranda community. In a nation where

there is an acute shortage of these facilities, and our hospitals are choked with the frail and elderly, it was a huge blow that the draft FNQ 2025 would seem to rule this development out," she said.

Reffold/Kuranda Springs Estates Highway Access Denied.

Concerned residents living on Fallon, Mason and other connecting internal roads are organising action against a recent Department of Main Roads decision to deny building of highway access from these estates.

Major factors cited in their appeals are the rise in internal traffic and that projected from the 200+ new housing sites, poor alignment of Fallon Road and its single lane culvert crossing cut in heavy rains. When cut, traffic is forced through the Village, also adding time to emergency call-out of Ambulance and SES.

Residents living along Masons Road are already reporting rises in wildlife kill and are concerned about increase in traffic, noise and pollution as well as the increase in accidents at the Fallon Road Highway entry and along the soft-shouldered Masons Road.

Some cynicism has been expressed when major highway access is in construction for a quarry entry but is denied on Highway efficiency to these major residential developments.

The developer of Reffold estates was prepared to donate land for this highway access and the decision may have negated a proposed purchase by the Tablelands Regional Council of land linking these estates.

Protest organisers, aware of other poor planning decisions with long-term consequences for the area, see this decision as affecting not only estate resident and households along existing routes but also the Village itself. JENSEN'S **JOTTINGS**



After 3 months in the job, after many meetings and miles, the Tablelands Regional Council has started to find its rhythm. There are still many challenges but we are definitely moving forward. In writing this monthly column for the Kuranda Paper, I hope to be able to provide you with some of the feedback from Council. Your comments are always welcome.

Old Primary School: The building report on the current state of the buildings at the old Primary School has now been completed. The report indicates that there are significant building repairs required in order to make the buildings both safe and useable. Council will need to consider the matter and the costs involved before any decision on the future use of the old Primary School can be made. Future maintenance and upkeep costs will also need to be considered. Unfortunately this means that community groups will not be able to occupy the buildings yet. In the interim, Council has appointed a caretaker to live onsite in their own caravan and start basic clean-up and small basic repairs. I am committed to ensuring that the old school remains as a community facility, even though this process may take some time to begin.

Budget: The 2008-2009 Budget preparations are underway and will be presented to Council within the next month. Part of the budget considerations are of course rate charges for the coming year. At this stage I am not able to predict your rates amounts. However, it is to be expected that there will be some rise; hopefully this will closely align to CPI, given that the costs of providing services has risen.

Council Services: Council offers a number of services that may assist community groups and individuals. Currently, the Youth Development Officer is developing some programs to engage with youth in this community; the Events Officer is looking at ways

KURANDA COLLEGE WINS ANOTHER AWARD

Kuranda District State College has won another excellence award for its Families as First Teachers program in June. The school was named the winner of the National Award for Quality Schooling for Excellence in Family School Partnerships. This follows the school last year winning the 2007 Network Ten Showcase Award for Excellence in the Early Phase of Learning for the same program. The Families as First Teachers program is about helping Indigenous families support their preschool aged children's early literacy and numeracy development and preparing them for school. I congratulate everyone involved in the program.

STATE BUDGET 08-09 HIGHLIGHTS MYOLA ROAD FUNDING

Majorlocalroadsimprovements will include further safety improvements and re-surfacing on the Kuranda Range Road, and widening and resealing sections of the Myola Road. Also \$125,000 has been allocated to for bridgeworks and approaches on the Myola - Oak Forest Road.

SENIORS AND PENSIONERS BENEFIT

Seniors and pensioners will receive a \$20 increase in the electricity rebate up to \$165 per annum (to eligible concession card holders) - a 13.8 per cent increase in the rebate payable at a cost of \$10.7 million.

Continuation of the Pensioner Rate Subsidy Scheme of up to \$180 per annum; and 50 per cent discounts on motor vehicle and boat registration are also offered to pensioners and seniors saving \$109 on registering a four cylinder car.

INCENTIVE TO REDUCE HOUSEHOLD GAS

A new \$60 million homebased service was announced to help Queenslanders reduce their household greenhouse gas emissions. The ClimateSmart Home Service will commence in January 2009 - funded from the proceeds of the Queensland Government's Climate Change Fund. Modelled on the successful Home WaterWise Service - the new ClimateSmart Home Service will help Queenslanders reduce their greenhouse gas emissions by assisting them to improve energy efficiency from the beginning of 2009. The service will involve the installation of energy-saving devices and detailed advice on ways to

further reduce their carbon footprint. For \$50, a tradesperson will visit your hometoprovideadviceandenergysaving tools, including a smart energy monitor, compact fluorescent light globes (CFLs) and water efficient showerheads. Seeing how much energy is being consumed and being able to measure the effect lifestyle changes can make to electricity consumption will encourage consumers to become more energy efficient.

The ClimateSmart Home Service will also include a home energy audit to help households further reduce their energy consumption. The program will provide 260,000 services across the State in its first two years. The installation of 15 CFLs, a shower rose and an expected 15% increase in energy efficiencyasaresultoftheenergymonitor means that every house participating in the service could save up to 3.6 tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions per year and up to \$240 on their annual electricity and water bills. 



Accessible Taxis for Queensland initiative

Kuranda Taxi Service Area

A new wheelchair friendly taxi, funded by the Queensland Government, is now on the streets of Kuranda providing needed transport services for local people. The new taxi will be used for general and community transport when not required by wheelchair passengers. The vehicle is provided under the government's Accessible Taxis for Queensland (ATQ) initiative which is administered by Queensland Transport.

The government established ATQ and allocated \$4.8 million to fund wheelchair accessible taxis in rural and remote communities that have a taxi licence but no wheelchair accessible taxi. It is expected more than 70 vehicles for communities throughout Queensland will be funded by the end of 2008.

The ATQ initiative is the first to be funded under the Queensland Government's qconnect initiative, which will improve regional public transport services and connections.

The ATQ initiative is also part of a bigger picture for improving taxi services in Queensland, which includes the rollout of taxi security cameras and more taxi licences.

Queensland Transport has funded the introduction of a wheelchair accessible taxi in the Kuranda taxi service area. The taxi service licence owner operating the ATQ funded vehicle has amended their licence to incorporate the wheelchair accessible terms and conditions, which will be permanently in place. This means that there is a total of one taxi licence in Kuranda, which is provided under a wheelchair accessible taxi licence.


