Dear Kuranda Paper, Whilst the community support for the Mareeba Wild Animal Park is commendable, upcoming Court Hearings will allow the other side of the story to be heard. I have witnessed on an almost daily basis the cruel and unnecessary death of native animals and birds, including small marsupials, on electric fences at the park. More distressingly, on a hot afternoon last October, I and several others witnessed the electrocution of three Japanese Macaques. This occurred after repeated requests by senior staff to Mr Gill for authority to turn down the voltage on the fences.

I am not surprised that Mr Gill has fled to England as I believe my experience is just the tip of the iceberg. I can only hope that justice is done in the courts and the public learns the truth. I also hope that the new owners of the Park will make it a success and provide a humane environment for the animals. After all it is the animals that most come first. Steven Herdegen Kuranda

Dear Kuranda Paper, Time may be running out for stopping the construction of the Kuranda Range Highway. Perhaps as early as the end of this month, public submissions will be called for under the Commonwealth EPBC act and also the Wet Tropics Management Plan. These are 2 separate environmental approvals that are needed. The highway can't proceed without these.

So come along, get involved and get active. Let's stop this unwise project before it goes any further.

Dear Kuranda Paper, Many motorists travelling on Condoo St from Therwine St do not seem to know they have to give way for traffic travelling on Thongon St. Cars have been seen to drive straight across the intersection without giving way, and this has caused a few near-misses.

Dear Kuranda Paper, Wouldn't it be wiser and more valid to defer support for or against the Wildlife Park until charges are investigated and resolved. I cannot understand any thinking person blindly supporting the operator and criticising the authorities when issues of animal cruelty and threats to the unique Northern Australian ecology are at stake. This was a most inappropriate location to site many of these species, which had they escaped (due to improper fencing or any other reason) may well have thrived in the surrounding landscape, putting native species in danger from predation and competition.

Whilst I do not believe in animals in captivity, prefering to support initiatives and behaviour that protects habitat and reduces threatening processes, I would have had more respect for the operator and the park project if target animals had been rare and endangered native species of which this bioregion has plenty. Primarily, this zoo was a business, not a conservation initiative. I think the public deserves some honest answers to why the owner received a \$500 000 grant from public monies and what has happened to that money?

I congratulate the government agencies for fulfilling their obligations and acting to ensure the safety of the park animals and protection of our native fauna and flora.

Dear Kuranda Paper, I was very impressed with the quick action in which MSC attended some problems in Kuranda following the huge amount of rain we had in March. I reported bad smell and water overflow near the pumpstation at the end of Therwine St, debris from river flooding on the walkway at the river front and also a huge amount of unsightly garbage under bridge.

I was contacted the same morning, and personel were working on the pumpstation soonafter to rectify the problem. The debris and garbage has also since been cleared. Hopefully it sends a message to people responsible for the mess to clean up after themselves.

Dear Kuranda Paper, The Mareeba Council approved the Development Application to build a shopping complex in Kuranda despite, in their own words "the conflict with the Mareeba Shire Strategic Plan and the Kuranda Village DCP No 2".

The Council, sited in Mareeba without representation from Kuranda, then proceeded to iterate what was good for Kuranda residents and business, despite 217 submissions from Kuranda residents and business folk against the development application versus three in support.

The only community consultation processes in this sorry state of affairs were the Strategic Plan, which was overruled and public opinion/submissions, which were ignored. And I thought

democracy was for the people, by the people. Now that this proposal has apparently fallen through, can any future similar development application be refused?

as we get older, it is not the things we did that we often regret, but the things we didn't do. DESIGN FOR KURANDA RANGE ROAD ON SHOW MID-YEAR

Transport and Main Roads Minister Paul Lucas says the preliminary design of the proposed route for the Kuranda Range Road upgrade will be publicly released about August 2004

Mr Lucas said the design plans would give stakeholders and the local community a chance to see how Main Roads had addressed issues raised during last year's consultation period.

Main Roads carried out consultation last year to gain input into the project's preliminary design, as part of the upgrade's Concept Phase.

"The proposed Kuranda Range Road upgrade triggers federal government environmental requirements including a period of public notification," Mr Lucas said.

"While Main Roads meets the federal environmental requirements, it will also use the same timeframe to complete its community consultation.

"It was agreed that to reduce the risk of confusing the community, Main Roads would publicly release the preliminary design in combination with the federal environmental requirements.

the opportunity for the wider community to gain an understanding of the preliminary design in light of the debate about the road that has occurred in

"I understand the preliminary design and associated material will be widely advertised through local media and the Main Roads' website and I encourage everyone with an interest in the road upgrade to take advantage of this opportunity to be well informed on such a major project." Ms Clark said

"Submissions received during the public notification period will be used by Wet Tropics Management Authority to consider whether works will be carried out in the Wet Tropics World Heritage area by Main Roads.

"Individuals and organisations concerned about the environmental impacts of the proposed road upgrade should use this opportunity to ensure their voice is heard and considered."

Mr Lucas said. "Thanks to extensive consultation carried out in 1998 to 2000 for the Integrated Transport Study for Kuranda Range, Main Roads has been able to accurately gauge the public's opinion of this project

Member for Barron River, Lesley Clark welcomed DESCRIPTION OF THE PARTY OF THE

IPPIES INVADE KURANDA. In the late 60's the population of Kuranda was dwindling as the young local people went away to find work and adventure. But in the cities there was a revolt against the conventions. "Let's be free," they cried, and the tropical sunshine, and land at £40 an acre lured southern folk to Kuranda.

Groups of friends set up house together, often in old busses, under tarpaulins or in timber dwellings with grass-thatched roofs. They were joined by others experimenting with vegetables and waiting for the mushrooms to pop out of the cow dung. There was a musician who transported his grand piano to Forgan's lookout, the view of the ocean was his inspiration to write concertos.

Weir Road was a popular living area within reach of the railway line and walk ways to the pools above the Barron Falls. The tourists flocked to Kuranda once again, the highlight of the train trip was a glimpse of naked, body-painted hippies dancing and waving by the railway line.


The residents were bemused by this invasion and some were angry. School children travelled on the trains and outraged mothers complained to the Railway Department. The bare-breasted bike rider who was careful to put on her shirt before she came to the village shop and the dalmatian on a lead with his purple spots were frowned upon.

In the 70's the people from the communes drifted north and those who went back to the cities in the south talked of the tropical peace and beauty of Kuranda.

The next settlers were the followers of the so called alternative life style. People with imagination and artistic talents came to the village. They hand-built simple and unusual homes of local brick and timber, and practiced their crafts. The village community grew and prospered, and the people look forward to continuing to live here in a way that harmonizes with the beautiful setting of the village in the rain forest. NOTE: Also in the 70's came a new kind of Kuranda resident-the Cairns commuter-tired of the noisy suburbs of the city and willing to make the daily trip to Cairns for work, just for the pleasure of living "away from it all" in the peace and quiet of the "village in the rainforest".

Somewhere along the line, the various lifestyles have merged and Kuranda still retains its village atmosphere.

Tourists Call for Halt to

Kuranda Range Highway.

The campaign against the Kuranda Range highway went international in April with more than 230 tourists from all around the world signing a letter to Peter Beattie in Kuranda in just three hours.

Di Horsburgh, secretary of Kuranda Range Defenders reported "The support was overwhelming. People said that they had come to see the rainforest and were concerned about the destruction of 27-54 hectares (the final figure has not been released yet), some of which is in the Wet Tropics World Heritage area. This letter calls on Peter Beattie to stop the highway before it's too late."

A State Petition is also circulating with more than 1000 signatures. Di added "If you don't want to see this highway built with the massive urbanisation that's planned, get involved now before it's too late. These next few months will be crucial to the campaign with public submissions expected to be called for soon.

"The next Kuranda Range Defenders Meeting is at the Sports and Social Club on Tuesday 4 May at 7pm . Speakers will include representatives of Main Roads and Mike Berwick, Mayor of Douglas Shire who will be talking about sustainable development and the importance of the Wet Tropics World Heritage areas to the region. Everyone concerned about the highway is welcome."



Global warming and the Kuranda Range Highway

The majority of scientists across the world now agree that global warming is inevitable as a result of human activity. Burning oil and coal for energy and transport produces the carbon dioxide, which is building up in our atmosphere at a greater rate than anytime in the past 400,000 years.

Road transport contributed 14.3% of Australia's greenhouse gas emissions in 2000. Also a major study by Aschauer and Campbell (1999) showed the economic benefits generated by building highways were less than half that of the benefits generated by public transport spending.

Risks to the Barrier Reef and the Rainforest

Extreme weather events are already occurring more frequently due to global warming. In the last 5 years the Great Barrier Reef has experienced the 2 worst bleaching events in its history because of rising sea temperatures.

A report commissioned by the WWF and the Queensland Industry Tourism Council stated that in the worst-case scenario, the coral reef will disappear in the next 100 years. North Queensland relies heavily on the tourism generated by the reef with thousands of jobs and millions of dollars at risk.

The rainforest will also be affected .According to a Rainforest Co-operative Research Centre report released in March, temperatures are expected to rise between one and 6 degrees over the next 100 years. Frog and bird numbers could drop dramatically causing some species to become extinct.

A Sustainable Future

"We urgently need to reduce transport emissions by investing in rail freight and public transport and making fuel efficiency standards mandatory for private and commercial vehicles, not by building new highways" said Margaret Zehntner of Kuranda Range Defenders.

"By increasing the carrying capacity of the Range Road by 800%, our government is abandoning any responsibility for the future of our children and grandchildren and the environment on which the human economy depends."

A Thought for May

This month we open our bible to St Johns Gospel Chapter 21 and read verses I to 19 'I am going fishing."

When we experience bereavement or any other great shock we often take refuge in doing what is utterly familiar to us. We will insist on getting on with the housekeeping or going to the office.

For the disciples Jesus is dead, their dreams are over, and there is nothing but to go back to what they have always done.

"You have no fish, have you?"

Could we imagine a more everyday thing to say at such a moment? There are no grand eloquent, speeches; there is no obvious mystery. Here I am, he seems to say, real, approachable, alive, still very much involved in your lives, still your friend. We are seeing the beginning of the strong strain of the sacramental in Christian faith.

Christ is Lord and King, but he is also present in the simplest ways, in such things as bread and wine. "It is the Lord!" Notice the different reactions of the disciples, the different types among them. John is intuitive; he recognizes who it is. Peter's instinct is to swing into action. The others continue their task deliberately.

As it takes all kinds to make this community, so it takes all kinds to make a study group or a committee or a congregation! "Bring some of the fish." Notice how Jesus makes sure that they bring something to this encounter.

Their gifts and their work are important to his plans. Every time we bring our gifts to the altar we are doing the same thing. Jesus is asking us for the blessings he has given us in the first place.

The conversation with Peter is fascinating. Peter and Jesus had unfinished business. In the upper room, on the night before the terror and the pain began, Jesus had told Peter he would fail. Peter had not accepted the possibility but it had happened, and he felt deeply ashamed. Here on the beach in the dawn we see Jesus putting this magnificent man back together again. Jesus is in effect telling Peter, and not only Peter but also every one of us, that it is all right to fail. Life doesn't

We are now more aware of our limitations, realistic about ourselves, and understanding of the weaknesses of others. Jesus shows us that failure can sometimes be the best preparation for accepting new responsibility.

Good news on a number of issues this month. Firstly I 'm delighted to confirm that the Queensland Department of Housing has purchased the brick house at no 19 Thongon Street opposite the CWA hall for the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre. As you may recall it was intended that a house be built at no5 Thongon Street but the purchase of an existing house that could meet their needs was considered a much better option by the KNC management committee. There will be work required both inside and outside to provide parking, telephone office connections, disability access etc but I believe this house will ultimately provide a great permanent home for KNC after more than 10 years of service to the Kur nda Community in less than satisfactory accommodation. The Kuranda Child Protection Service will continue to operate from the KNC when it relocates. I look forward to working with Cherry and the management committee to bring this project to a successful conclusion.

I visited Top Kowrowa recently with officers from various agencies to inspect progress on the \$4M redevelopment and was pleased to see the road works completed and work on the first three detached houses well underway. Families should be able to move in by mid year with work planned for the next 3-4 homes. I am currently trying to ensure that local residents also have the opportunity to work on this construction project whilst also receiving training that will assist them to obtain future employment. The 12 new houses to be built at Top Kowrowa will provide a significant improvement but if the current level of overcrowding is to be reduced more Aboriginal housing is urgently needed and I am working with all levels of the government and community organisations to address this issue.

RESULTS OF POLL OPTIONS FOR KURANDA'S FUTURE conducted in Kuranda in March 2004

During the month of March 2004, a poll of Kuranda's residents was undertaken to determine the range of attitudes regarding our voicelessness in Mareeba Shire and what options we might pursue to remedy the situation. The poll was open to people over 18, who live in Kuranda be they voting or non-voting residents or ratepayers. Every polling form was initialled by an issuing officer during the poll to ensure only one person submitted one vote.

The results are summarised in the table below:

64.2% want to leave Mareeba Shire. 88.4% are not happy with existing "no voice"

These figures are consistent with the Local Government election results of 27/3/04 in which I, standing for a voice for Kuranda. won two-thirds of the Kuranda vote but did badly in the rest of the shire. This, too, is consistent with how each of the population centres within the shire voted for the candidates they knew in their own areas.

Kuranda generally gave high support for the independent candidates and low support for the sitting council. This was contrary to how the rest of the shire voted generally. The fact that Kuranda voted differently from the rest of the shire illustrates that the vast majority of residents in Kuranda see their Wet Tropics place and tourist industry as different from Mareeba's Dry Tropics and farming communities.

We proved what we set out to prove, that no amount of support for a Kuranda person will gain a voice for Kuranda within Mareeba Shire's current no-divisions system. This is the first set of figures that gives us an idea of how Kuranda feels about its existing and future situation.

There is an electoral boundary review scheduled for March 2007, in time for the next election. We, as a community, should now feel confident to press to be included in the electoral boundary review to achieve a voice in our destiny, either within the Mareeba Shire or without it.

So that the push for a community voice does not get gobbled up in a committee, but remains with the community at large, I am offering to be the secretariat/coordinator of the project - A Voice for Kuranda - and keep in touch with all of you who want to proceed to investigate ways of improving our situation through a dedicated column in the Kuranda Paper. From time to time it will also be necessary to send questionnaires to all residents when choices arise so that I am given direction from the community as to how to proceed.

It should be made clear that the project is to push for a voice for Kuranda, not to debate whether we want one or not. That has been done and the results are clear. Those who are satisfied with the current arrangements in the Mareeba Shire should form their own group if they feel the need to do so.

To date, I have aired our case with the new Minister for Local Government & Planning, Desley Boyle, and spoken to a number of Local Council mayors and officers. There is no doubt our plight is recognised and appreciated. Out of courtesy, I have reported to Mareeba Shire Council the results of the public poll and asked for its cooperation in achieving a voice for Kuranda. I will publish the response when one is received.

With its showy red tulip shaped flowers, African tulip trees are a serious environmental weed in north Queensland. It reproduces via seeds and suckers and grows to 24m. Removal is highly recommended, particularly in gullies, around waterways and disturbed rainforest.

Young African tulip trees can be dug out or hand pulled when the soil is moist, but stumps of felled trees need to be treated with Tordon DS herbicide. Follow up treatment with Tordon DS should be applied to all new suckers.

Rose-coloured Glasses can help Dyslexia

People with dyslexia are neither dumb nor stupid. Neither will they "catch up" or "mature". Dyslexia is a specific learning disability characterised by difficulty in learning to read. Some dyslexics may also have difficulty in learning to write, pell and s ometimes, speak or work with numbers

It affects many children including those who are bright academically, capable physically, emotionally healthy and come from good home environments. Children with dyslexia are not all alike. They simply share a difficulty with reading.

Samuel Orton a US neurologist who investigated the problems of learning to read in the 1920's, found that dyslexics commonly suffer from:

- Difficulty in learning and remembering printed words.
- Letter and number reversals (b-d, p-q, 6-9, who-how etc).
- Leaving out or inserting words while
- Substitution of words or sounds.

Persistent spelling errors.

Difficulty in writing.

In addition many dyslexics are left handed or ambidextrous and have difficulty in telling left from right. Sometimes clumsiness and illegible handwriting accompany the condition. It affects more boys than girls and often runs in families.

Even though educational and psychological causes have been postulated, the most likely cause is some difference in brain functioning. One recent breakthrough is the discovery that light can have an adverse effect on the brains of some people who are genetically disposed to it. Light affects part of the visual processing system and causes it to malfunction so that the brain finds it difficult to interpret what the eye sees. This is called "visual perception difficulties".

This is the basis of the so-called "rose coloured glasses" or tinted filters. These filter out the specific wavelengths that cause processing difficulties in the

and here's the story that goes with the quote.

Envirocare had an email from a grade 2 school teacher from Hawaii asking us to accept a donation from her students. She said her students came from a poor part of town but had saved a meagre sum of money that they wanted to donate to saving the rainforest in Australia. All they wanted in return was a certificate of appreciation. We replied that we were deeply moved by their kind thought and would find a plot where we would plant a tree in the name of each child. We have undertaken to take before and after photos and to send them photos from time to time so that the children can see how the trees are progressing.

It's sad but true that these children live in what was once a rich, lush, diverse rainforested island. Much of the landscape has succumbed to weed infestation as a result of human activity and development. There's not much left to save in their own country but they do recognise that there is still a chance to save the rainforest in Australia's Wet Tropics.

Now, that's thinking globally.

Are we to be trusted to protect what little rainforest is left, in the face of pressure to expand residential development, build super highways and put up parking lots beside supermarkets?

Or will we not realise what we've got until we've let it slip away?

TALKING THE INTERNATIONAL LANGUAGE

On 20th April, Conservation Volunteers arranged for 25 Japanese workers' unionists to visit the nursery and plant trees on two sites, one beside the Myola Rural Fire Brigade shed and the other on the bank of the Barron River at Big Sands. They were a delightful group and our inability to converse made little difference.

320 trees were planted in double-quick time. These were not office workers, they were fit individuals who knew how to wield a mattock. True to form, nursery manager Pam Norman, laid on inspiring native fruit muffins and marmalade and poppyseed biscuits. No wonder our fame is spreading across the globe!




their country in the WTWHA. A long sort after objective and something that is good for all of us!!!



INTRODUCING NEW SPORT & RECREATION OFFICERS FOR KURANDA

In November 2003 Ngoonbi Cooperative Society employed 2 Sport & Recreation Officers, Jane De Col & Blaine Richards. This was made possible with support funding from the Queensland Government provided through the Indigenous Community Development Program to get more Queenslanders active through sport and recreation.

Ngoonbi is principally an Aboriginal Housing organisation in Kuranda, and because of their lead role in the community and community need. Ngoonbi acts to sponsor other activities such as the Community Justice Program, HACC Program, Work for the Dole Projects, Community Corrections and now Sport & Recreation.

The main aim of the new Officers' position and projects are to develop and support apportunities to increase participation in physical activity in Kuranda & District, particularly amongst the indigenous community

The Sport & Rec Officers kicked off with a

series of school holiday activities that have been generously supported in 2003-04 by the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre through the Child Protection Service.

On December 23 a Christmas Funday was held in which 78 indigenous youth attended. This was followed by a Movie Day in January. provided by ATSIC and keenly supported by 110 youth, Lead by Willie Brim, a cultural awareness opportunity for our non indigenous SRO was combined with a family bushwalk and visit to the Bare Hill site in Davies Creek National Park.

Building school community links is one of the objectives of the Sport & Rec Program. The SRO's worked with the High School to organise an excursion for senior students to attend the "Locker Room Forum" in Mareeba which was presented by Sport & Recreation Queensland. Blaine recently commenced specialist League training with Kuranda High students and Jane and Blaine have been meeting with the District State School and

Sport Leaders to bring Aussie Hoops Kuranda an afterschool activity.






KURANDA STATE HIGH SCHOOL VISITED BY RUGBY UNION
