Mulberry Leaves - Can You Help?

At the Australian Butterfly Sanctuary, we've got plans to have a display of silkworms so that people can see for themselves how these larvae develop and then go on to create the silk that is used to make garments. In order to have a good display though, we need to do some trials and check what these caterpillars do and don't like to eat. We know their preferred food is White Mulberry, and although we have some trees planted, it will be many years before they are big enough to sustain even a small caterpillar population (they eat a lot). I have heard that it is also possible to feed them on other types of mulberry leaves, and that some people in Kuranda do have mulberry trees growing on their properties. Is there anyone in Kuranda that would be able to give us access to a tree(s) so that we can do some trials? Of course we would not cut to the point where the tree suffers. Any help would be very much appreciated. Please ring us during working hours on 4093 7575 if you can help us.

Damage to Fence



1st Motorcycle Expo +2

As Events Manager to all three 1st Motorcycle Expos and long-term Kuranda Amphitheatre Society (KAS) member, I would like to shed some light on the 2010 1st Motorcycle Expo +2 due to the many misconceptions and misleading rumours that were generated around this event. The first Expo in 2008 was held at the Kuranda Sports and Social Club (now the Kuranda Recreation Centre). The Amphitheatre was preferable, but management at that time was disinterested in hosting it, probably not realising what a beneficial event it could be. Realising this, I went about securing mobile staging, portaloos, security fencing, skips etc. and with the help of locals and Cairns bikers plus \$18,000 of my own money to stage this event. As a first everyone agreed it to be very successful and with the help of Arch McArthur we pulled it off with all profits going to the Sports and Social Club.

The second event in 2009 was staged at the Amphitheatre. Like the first one I was able to attract some nine bands that played throughout the day and night and from the \$10 entry fee plus bar, food and merchandise and owing to the beautiful sunny day, a grand profit of \$15,000 was promptly banked as general revenue for the KAS. By this time we could see a great future for this event.

The third event in 2010 had many more people willing to help out and join the Amphitheatre, some for the first time, raising the membership substantially and it was decided by the Expo team of volunteers that we would like a headline act worthy of such an event. After realising this could cost us upwards of \$20,000, we came across a great band from Finland that were only too happy to play for free, providing we pay the flight from Helsinki to Sydney and back. Knowing that the Amphitheatre would not be in a situation to pay this upfront, some of us decided we could pay the \$8,500 instead and after putting to the Committee and KAS membership, it was agreed by majority vote that we would get our money back from takings after all Amphitheatre costs were paid back. The band LORD were on there way to Japan and heard about this event and because they were passing through, offered to play at this event for free. The whole day rained continuously but still managed to attract some 380 patrons in addition there were around 150 volunteers and band members. A great event was had by all and those that were there loved it. Owing to the \$20 gate charge, the bar and the food, we just managed to pay all costs including the airfares and PA hire. During the run-up to the event, the Amphitheatre management committee was not unified and some were susceptible to false information about the bands.

Ridiculous rumous like "white supremicists" and "neo Nazis" were bandied about. A new Treasurer had also just been installed and with Leon Cartledge, Vice President, not in town, the committee in their wisdom decided to cancel the event three weeks from its opening. After many phone calls and concerned

conversations as by now we had some \$9,000 in sponsorship from 45 businesses, we were advised that due to the cancellation letter being unconstitutional we proceeded with caution and requested to set a date for a special meeting for the President to step down, hoping this would give us breathing space to continue on. After one and a half weeks, we withdrew the request as we were only interested to complete the many requirements necessary to stage the event. Some two weeks after the event, a poorly run special meeting was held and another general meeting some two weeks after that culminating in the Amphitheatre committee agreeing to a letter of apology to the Expo Team stating regret for their unethical behaviour. This was duly sent out for which we are very grateful.

The many people involved in this great event are far too many to be thanked by name, but some must be mentioned here: Leon Cartledge, Steve Accatino, Kate Mosely, Lyn Mosely, Anja Bakker, Mike Richardson, Shane Little, Adam and Jeannie, Simmo, Clarrie, Noel Graham, Kitty Clignett, Dave Knights, Dave Dobinson, Dave Harris, Bruce Skilbeck, Arch McArthur and Warren Entsch and all the many others I have been unable to state here. I thank you so much for your hard work and steadfast support. Without such determined volunteers through thick and thin, we once again produced a great event for the whole community.

Marc's Tourism Tweets

JAPAN SALES MISSION:

Tourism Kuranda will be visiting Japan at the end of the month for the very first time as a part of the upcoming TTNQ Japan Mission. The Japan Mission is designed to reaffirm our commitment to the market and show support to our airline partners. We are on target to attract 154,000 Japanese visitors by the end of 2011.

The Jetstar four times weekly service from Osaka along with the daily services from Tokyo, have been performing above expectations during the important July-September period.

Additionally, Continental Micronesia will reinstate flights to operate four services weekly between Guam and Cairns from 26 December 2010.

The mission will consist of Cairns & Great Barrier Reef seminars, workshops and networking functions held in Tokyo, Nagoya and Osaka commencing on Tuesday 30 November 2010. We will meet approximately 230 key travel industry people representing both traditional channels (wholesalers/group staff), and new distribution channels (online and retail distributors) who are based in those cities. Tourism Queensland will also support and be co-partner for the mission.

The focus will be:

- 1. Support for Jetstar Tokyo/Cairns daily services in Tokyo
- 2. Support for Jetstar Osaka/Cairns four times weekly service in Osaka
- 3. Support for Continental Nagoya/Cairns via Guam services in Nagoya
- 4. Provide strong competition to alternate holiday destination in the Japan market

MAD HATTERS & DRUIDS TEA PARTY:

Kuranda's first Mad Hatters & Druids Tea Party was held on the 13th November at the Original Kuranda Rainforest Markets and was a huge success for the village. Locals and tourists both joined in the tea party celebrations which ran throughout the day. The Mad Hatter and Alice in Wonderland were very popular with the tourists as the cameras went crazy. NEW KURANDA A4 "TEAR OFF" MAP:

KCCT's next meeting is our annual Xmas Dinner at Cedar Park on 7th December 2010 commencing at 6.00pm for 6.30pm dinner.




Wow, here we are in the December issue already!

It is estimated that '940,000 people in Australia suffer from type 2 diabetes with only half of them aware

What is diabetes

A disease that results in high blood sugar. The body breaks down carbohydrates consumed in foods and turns them into glucose (sugar). The pancreas then produces insulin which transports the sugar into our cells where it can be used for energy. Those with diabetes either don't produce enough or don't respond to insulin, resulting in sugar building up in the bloodstream.

There are two types of diabetes

Type 1 is typically diagnosed in childhood and requires insulin injections. There is no known prevention or cure.

Type 2 is also known as non insulin dependant or mature onset diabetes. It is often related to lifestyle and diet; associated with high blood pressure, high cholesterol and weight gain (especially around the waist). This form of diabetes is far more common (approximately 90%). It is avoidable in most cases and with certain lifestyle changes, many professionals believe reversible.

Symptoms

Increased thirst or hunger, blurred vision, fatigue, slow healing wounds, headaches, dizziness and mood swings. It increases your risk of: heart disease, stroke, kidney disease, eye and nerve damage.

Factors leading to Diabetes

Lack of exercise, family history, poor diet: i.e. excessive consumption of sugars, lack of fibre, high intake of bad fats and mineral deficiencies.

What can you do to reduce your risk

Exercise and sleep play important roles but most relevant is your diet.

Avoid simple sugars, high sugar fruits, juices, rice, potatoes, honey or any foods containing flour. Increase your dietary intake of:

- 2. Good fats (omega 3, 6 & 9): fish oil, flaxseed, hemp oil
- · Watch portion sizes, eat regularly including snacks and never skip meals.
- Eat *low GI foods and protein with every meal. This will not only facilitate weight loss but also help keep your blood sugar balanced.

*Low GI refers to the glycemic index of foods. This is based on how quickly the sugar in foods is released into the blood stream. Low GI means it is released gradually.

Herbs & Minerals to help

Gymnema, Cinnamon, Korean Ginseng, Stevia, Bitter melon, Fenugreek, Onion, Garlic: all help to lower blood sugar levels and/ or address symptoms caused from diabetes.

Chromium is the main mineral for balancing blood sugar and also helps with weight loss by reducing sugar cravings. Lipoic acid, calcium and magnesium also play important roles.

Talk to your local health practitioner to help access your diet, address deficiencies, facilitate weight loss and reduce your risk of developing Type 2 diabetes. According to the lancet diabetes is amongst the worlds top 5 killers. Don't risk being a statistic. Become informed and take control of your health today.





Inside My Studio

Interview by Toni Rogers



I was mesmerised. The rainforest was so close to the home outside, and then inside the house the foliage was mirrored and reflected in the sleek and shiny Yamaha piano standing in the glassed breezeway. Ruth Beasley has been the proud owner of this piano since 1984. It is so easy to see how, in this peaceful and tranquil setting, her beautiful sacred music is created and develops. It was such a privilege to sit and talk with her.

Where is your current studio?

I have two studio areas in my home at Speewah. One is in this breezeway with the piano and the other area houses my computer.

Do you work alone or with others?

Mostly alone. My composing has largely centred around four cantatas, choral works with narration, which can be sacred

or secular. Mine are sacred. I compose the music to words supplied by my sister in Perth, Western Australia. We work together and modern technology has made it possible bearing in mind the tyranny of distance. I also appreciate the interest, expertise and critical appraisal of a close friend in Malanda. When a score is completed I am then working with a large choir – up to 70 wonderful voices.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

My piano and computer. Also, there must be no interruptions of mechanical noise. I must have peaceful surroundings. (This is no ordinary computer – it types music notes and symbols. Comprehending sheet music requires a special form of literacy. Ruth has the refined skill and the ability to look at a new piece of music and hear most or all of the sounds (melodies, harmonies, timbres, etc.) in her head without having to play the piece. TR)

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/week.

It depends what project is on hand. Currently I am working on a cantata "God With Us – A Celebration of God's Love for all People" and it is almost a full-time job.

Describe the work you do in your studio.

I compose. I write the music on the computer. When not working on a cantata I am preparing music for a small singing group at the Uniting Church in Mareeba. My keen interest is in choral music, in particular sacred music.

Why is music your chosen medium?

I started playing the piano at the age of six and then followed the progression through the grades. At Teachers' College I was trained in classroom singing. In schools I trained choirs, later became a piano teacher and formed a singing group in Mareeba Uniting Church. This led to the formation of a community choir. I found many of the music scores I wanted were unavailable or unsuitable so I started composing my own.

What do you listen to while you are working?

My head only, listening to the words, rhythm and melody flow until I get it onto paper.

What is your favourite tool?

I have two – they work in combination; my piano and my computer. My computer makes it easy to transcribe what I compose.

How do you identify your work?

With my name. It is typed on the manuscript below the title. For example:

Music by Ruth Beasley

Words compiled by my sister. (*Her name appears on the manuscript.*)

How do you sell your work?

My completed manuscripts are available for sale. The first copy is chargeable and this fee includes my permission to copy what is required.

Do you teach from your studio?

I do not teach anymore. I have now retired.

If you could change thing about your studio what would it be?

I would love the piano and computer in the one room.

If you were not working with music what would you be doing?

I guess I would be getting back into different craftwork. I have always been interested in craftwork, in particular, sewing.

Ruth Beasley's cantata 'God With Us – A Celebration of God's Love for all People" will be performed by her community choir and soloists just before Easter 2011 at venues across the Tablelands. Anyone who enjoys singing is welcome to join this choir. The performances will be advertised well in advance in the Kuranda Paper. Ruth has received some financial support for her Cantata choir performances from Tablelands Regional Council (RADF) program

"What Makes Us Human"

(One World, Oxford, 2007) Charles Pasternak (Ed.) ISBN 9781 851768 5196 \$29.95

A few years ago there was a conference at Oxford at a biomedical centre, at which 5 distinguished speakers gave their views on this most important and topical question. To these views have been added the views of another 10 likewise distinguished persons covering a range of expertise, drawn from different countries, and designed to cover a broad spectrum of views on the same question. The result is this book. Some of the views in it canvas new scientific research but presented in a way that is intelligible to the lay reader. Others look beyond the science. They provide a wide range of perspectives and theories.

What makes us human? With recent extensions of human knowledge — genetics, brain sciences, anthropology, sociology, etc, there are now many views. They range from the purely materialist view that humans are simply animals with some particularly refined skills that have evolved from their former animal state, all completely explainable by science, to the more traditional view that humans are unique, at the pinnacle of evolution or creation, with some exclusive facets that are in whole or part non-material in nature.

This traditional view was often associated with ancient religious teachings that saw humans as a separate, once-only divine creation, invested with a soul, with the task to exercise dominion over all the earth. But increasingly, as the facts of evolution has become scientifically established and accepted, including as to homo sapiens, and as the planet and its peoples are increasingly seen as being under serious threat from environmental and other factors, these older religious ideas have had to be revised.

A contemporary holistic approach places humans firmly as part of a much wider ecological context, with vital responsibilities as to conservation, sustainability, global peace and planetary nurture. This has provoked a rethink of what it is to be human.

Some of the views in this book, perhaps even a majority, reflect the view that the whole answer to the question can be found in science. But whatever view is adopted, it has to be recognised that, even if the anatomical, physiological and genetic differences between humans and the apes are small, the differences in relation to mental capacity and the development of ideas, art and cultural expression and appreciation, ethical consciousness and its effect on conduct generally, in the capacity to radically change the environment and in other respects are significant. They can't be ignored. As one writer puts it, "Humans are a very odd species".

Views still differ among these authors as to what actually caused humans to be different from the "lesser animals" – in very simple terms one author puts emphasis on the capacity for imitation, another the capacity for language development, another the capacity for mental time travel, another the innate curiosity and quest of humans, another their symbolic mental activity, another their deep social mind, and in some case perhaps associated with larger brain size. But one is still left to wonder whether they are in fact answering the question. They may be advancing possible causal factors for these differences, but are they really explaining exactly what makes us human?

The purely scientific view seems to reduce us to something like an extremely advanced and sophisticated computer and robot. I for one find this concept absurd and debasing. As one writer puts it, it is a form of reductionism and determinism.

Fortunately for me several of the authors take a wider view in recognising the significance of the differences between humans and (other) animals. One writer, speaking from a religious point of view, asserts that mind or consciousness is not reducable simply to the physical brain, even though they are clearly connected. The capacity for intellectual and spiritual quest points to a non-material aspect of the person.

Another writer points to a non-material, conscious, mentally empowering, but physically bounded aspect of a human that ends at death. But he says there is even something more, the spirit of a person, as testified by many ancient traditions, involving the capacity for change for the better that flows from self-directed, conscious, willed action. In other words, all is not predetermined, like a mechanical apparatus. Both physical inheritance and the physical environment play their part, but that is not the whole.

The very capacity of the human to aspire to nobility in character and virtue is in my view critical in these troubled global times. Without this I see little prospects for the long-term future of our race on this small and fragile earth. It is what breeds the will, courage, hope, faith. Read this book and see what you think.

Dennis Potter is arguably one of the great playwrights of the last century. His chosen medium was the television screen and his work has often been overlooked because of that. Anyone who remembers "Pennies from Heaven" or "The Singing Detective", however, will probably disagree. Potter's work certainly bears comparison with that of artists in the Film medium and we have here two of his early works.

Brimstone and Treacle

Brimstone and Treacle was recorded by the BBC in 1976 but not shown at the time because the then Director of Programmes found the play "brilliantly written and made, but nauseating" A slightly edited version was shown in 1987. Since then it has lost none of its relevance, humour or power to shock.

Tom and Amy Bates' lives were transformed when their beautiful undergraduate daughter Pattie was the victim of a hit-and-run driver. Now she is wholly dependant on them: strapped to the sofa, unable to wash or eat by herself and only able to garble unintelligibly. So when a young man claiming to be an old friend of Pattie's offers to look after her Amy gratefully accepts. But is Martin really the angel she thinks he is? A very young Michael Kitchen (Foyle, in Foyle's war) stars.

Blue Remembered Hills

"When we dream of childhood we take our present selves with us. It is not the adult world writ small; childhood is the adult world writ large" – *Dennis Potter*.

Dennis Potter's acclaimed play, though the most straightforward and realistic of his popular works, is both an hilarious and incredibly moving story. Through the simple act of using adults in the roles, Potter was able to emphasise the darker aspects of children's innocence and imagination, creating an altogether more complex and ambivalent picture of that "land of lost content"

On an idyllic summer afternoon in 1943, a group of children play in the West Country hills, fields and forests. With no adults around they indulge in spontaneous games and horseplay: sometimes echoing the distant war, at other times revealing their own insecurities and petty vindictiveness. But as they tease, fantasise and fight the day away, their innocence is about to be destroyed for ever.

Candlenut opening of Majella Mary Hall & Library

Candlenut Steiner School, nestled on 40 acres of beautiful bushland on Boyles Road, has achieved two major milestones over the last week.

On Friday 11th November the school officially opened the Majella Mary Hall and Library; a large multipurpose facility funded by the federal government's Building Education Revolution program. The ceremony was opened by Wally Brim with Welcome to Country, followed by all the school children singing a song especially written for the event. The school was privileged to have Senator the Hon. Jan McLucas to commemorate the building with the unveiling of a plaque. Tom Gilmore, Tablelands Regional Council Mayor and Councillor Jenny Jenson also attended in support of the new facility.

Also on this day, the school received official word from the Non-State Schools Accreditation Board that their application to extend the educational program offered by the school to include Classes 8-10 had been successful.

Since then the school has grown rapidly and now caters for 134 children from Kinder to Class 7. 2011 will see the first Candlenut Steiner High School students begin Class 8 at the Kuranda Campus. In 2012 the school will offer Classes 8 & 9 and Classes 8 -10 in 2013.

Candlenut Steiner School is the only Steiner School in North Queensland and will be one of only 3 schools offering a Steiner High School Program in Queensland. 1. You'll be better prepared 2. You'll dig deeper 3. You'll learn and 4. Competition makes you sharper. Someone can copy what you do, they can't copy who you are. In most cases, the first instance of copying is more cheeky than serious. Remember that competition really is good. It'll keep you on your toes, it push you to constantly improve. But yes, it's annoying.



New Vehicle for Speewah Rural Fire Brigade

Member for Barron River Steve Wettenhall has welcomed the delivery of a new fully-equipped Nissan Patrol light attack vehicle to the Speewah Rural Fire Brigade.

Mr Wettenhall said the vehicle and equipment worth \$73,000 would not only be of assistance for Speewah – but also provide assistance for the Kuranda-Myola, Koah and Davies Creek brigades.

"The State Government wants to make sure our local firies are equipped to deal with our challenging natural environment," Mr Wettenhall said. "Everyone knows local firies do a terrific job in keeping us safe, and we want to continue working with them to make sure they have everything they need for the job."

Speewah Rural Fire Brigade's 1st officer, Chris Plasto, said the new Nissan Patrol is a great addition to the fire-fighting team.

"The need for fire safety is part of living in rural and regional Queensland, so it's vital we have the appropriate tools to work with if our local community is threatened. The new vehicle is a 2-person diesel pump 4x4, with carrying capacity for 500 litres of water, a single electric hose reel, 2 personal protective blankets and UHF and VHF radios."

Mr Wettenhall said the State Government is also in the process of delivering on the "Supporting our Heroes" policy, which will invest \$13 million over five years to strengthen the response capability and preparedness of emergency services personnel by boosting volunteer numbers and providing additional equipment and resources.

The new Nissan was one of 10 vehicles delivered to rural fire brigades all over the State during the 09/10 financial year.



Life "A Matter of Choice" - Joyce Berendes

OUR PROFILE FOR THIS MONTH is the author, actress, dancer and playwright Joyce Berendes of Speewah. Joyce came to my attention as a result of the launch of her first children's story "Nulla and the Purple Poison Plant" this month. By the time this is published, she will have had her first launch at Speewah on 13 November and the official launch by the Tablelands Mayor at the Atherton Library on 25 November. You can still catch the Cairns launch at the Earlville Library, a special children's launch, on Saturday 11 December for an autographed copy.

Joyce has had an interesting and active life, not without its hardships but also with its share of successes. She was born in Holland and as a young girl had to cope with life under the Nazi occupation. It was a struggle just to survive. But survive she did with her parents and sister. She grew up with a passionate interest in dancing and drama. While travelling with a children's touring theatre she met her future husband Carel, former motorbike road racer and glider pilot who liked small engines. He was planning to emigrate to Australia and wanted Joyce to do likewise. Joyce loved her work too much to immediately agree. But after about one year, she agreed and moved to Brisbane. Carel had a small engine business and she

pursued her interest in the arts as a skilled and seasoned performer. They have had no children.

She studied speech and drama and then had lead roles in a number of plays – "The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie"; as Lola Montez in the musical of the same name, and then "A Game of Numbers". She won Brisbane's Twelfth Night Theatre best actress award for the latter. She started a Children's Operetta Group, for which she wrote the book and lyrics of two musical plays that were performed. She also wrote several one act plays for children. She was a member of the Queensland Writers' Centre and on coming to Kuranda was the treasurer of the then local branch of the Queensland Arts Centre. In that capacity she was involved in organising conferences, art exhibitions, workshops, etc., as well as choreography, directing plays and teaching drama workshops.

She then set about the task of writing an adult musical "A Fool's Gold", including composing the music with Glen Gummow, another well-known Kuranda person since passed away. The musical was due for a trial run at the Cairns Civic



Theatre but they were unable to cast the chorus-line so the production had to be cancelled.

She and Carel purchased their large property at Speewah about 30 years ago and have since made their home there. Before that they went on a four-year trip around Australia with a four-wheel drive and motorbike. They were caught in the Karumba floods in January 1974 and had to be evacuated by ship, with Joyce finishing up as the cook on board. Then they were caught in Cyclone Tracy in Darwin in Christmas 1974, the worst of which they avoided by driving down the track (a wise move). Afterwards they returned to Darwin and Joyce landed the job of issuing entry permits in the Cyclone aftermath. Joyce recalls this as a stressful time.

At the start of 2000, Joyce set about writing novels. Her first effort was not successful, but she adapted the work into her first successful publication as a novelist, "The Fourteenth Day". This was nominated for the "Sisters in Crime" Davitt Crime Writers' award. It took some time to find a supportive publisher, but this was eventually achieved through Zeus Publications. Then she published the novel "And Then Came the Rain", set in

Karumba. Her last novel, "Matters of Choice", was published in 2009.

Joyce has now ventured into writing children's stories. The story of Nulla, just launched, is based on Joyce's earlier work "Nullagundi", a musical play. It describes how the men of the area are lured away by a bad spirit. Two children go looking for their father. On the way they meet an Aboriginal boy who is looking for his father also. This is the second installment of the article "The District of Cairns" from *The Cairns Post*, 14 June 1890.

The District of Cairns

[By our own Reporter]

The first selection called at this week was that of:--

Mr. Charlie Davidson, which is situated on the right hand side of the main Thornborough road from the Middle Crossing, and adjoining that of Mr. Barkley. The selection, 6v Formartine, is 80 acres of scrub land, rejoicing in the rich red soil in common with all the selections over the range. (This block would have straddled the present highway and taken in the land between Rob Veivers Drive and the highway.) Its splendid situation cannot be denied and although like Mr. Barkley's far from resembling a bowling green it has every advantage for the establishment of flourishing orchards and verdant paddocks. Thirty acres are fallen and burned off which item alone represents a vast amount of solid graft. The usual estimate of the cost of falling the scrub is £3 10s per acre and £1 an acre for burning off. Getting rid of the logs and hard timber is the most difficult task to be accomplished on a selection. The manual labour required to fall the scrub is not considered by the hardy pioneers as much, but the burning off is always looked upon as a big item. Getting a good "burn" is a matter of anxiety, and unless the timber is perfectly dry and well hauled together and stacked (taking a great amount of work to do) the fire simply runs along and takes off the leaves, leaving perhaps but few of the big trees burning, which smoulder for weeks without being destroyed. When time is not an object, the selector can afford to wait until the timber is perfectly dry, and then brush the undergrowth and be pretty sure of a good burn. The problems of cultivation of paddocks covered with huge logs are manifold and patent to everyone. Besides retarding the work of the selector and taking up a lot of room on the land, all sort of noxious weeds spring from under and around a fallen log, continuous rows of plants cannot be put in, the work of the hoe is to a great extent hampered and altogether a great number of logs lying on a paddock are not at all desirable. It is of course quite impossible to get a perfectly clean burn, but the less timber left on the ground the better. Mr. Davidson has done a great deal of work on his selection and although not going into cultivation to any great extent at the present moment he has a lot of solid improvements done ready to come in when the railway to the Middle Crossing opens. Although the clearing has had a fire over it once, Mr. Davidson intends to take the first opportunity of a spell of fine weather to get another and a perfectly clean burn. Buffalo grass is destined to spread and render green the hills and dales of this selection. A good area is already under grass but not of the variety to resist weeds and undergrowth which the buffalo will do. The growth of this wonderful grass and its utility to the selector will be seen by-andbye when other selections are dealt with. Mr. Davidson has erected a neat and comfortable domicile built of sawn stuff cut and dressed on the ground. Fencing operations are soon to commence and in a short time Mr. Davidson will be the possessor of a grand piece of land with all the advantages of climate and situation.

Journeying back to the Crossing I rode up to a farm with a flourishing and prospering aspect, the equal of which one would be inclined to imagine could hardly be found even in a country where the difficulties of settlement were not so great as here. This selection, situated directly on the railway line at the Middle Barron Crossing, is No. 8v, Formartine, the holding of Mr. Herman Meyer, one of the earliest settlers in the district. While going in for a great deal of cultivation, Mr. Meyer has planted extensive paddocks with grass. Of the 40 acres of scrub cleared, 17 acres are securely fenced with a post and top rail provided with two strong barb wires as a boundary fence, and two thickset four-point barb wire fence as a dividing barrier, impregnable alike to large and small animals. The chief grass paddock of 17 acres has been planted with Buffalo grass. Upon enquiring of Mr. Meyer the reason why the absence of all weeds was so conspicuous I was told that the buffalo grass, planted from cuttings lightly distributed over the area but a year ago, had

encroached upon, stifled and eradicated every weed. Indeed, from observation one could clearly see that the quick, vigorous and irresistible growth of the grass rendered it monarch of the ground, and would in a few months tread underfoot the few weeds that remained. The bright verdant aspect of this paddock and the healthy look of the 13 head of cattle and the pack horses, which I was assured were worked almost every day and received but little food except pasturage on the luxuriant grass, was quite sufficient to prove that buffalo grass, besides having the most wonderful property of running down all weeds and keeping a paddock clean which no other grass will do, possesses most important sustaining and fattening qualities which renders it the most suitable grass that can be planted by the selector on rich scrub soil. It resists drought well, and does not become rank with too much wet, spreads rapidly, and is eaten greedily by cattle and horses. Couch and other grasses commonly planted or sown on scrub land are powerless to resist weeds, apart from being unable to kill those already established on the ground. Buffalo grass is therefore by a long way superior to any other variety of grass, and its utility to the selector is beyond contention. Even the one fact that it keeps down all sorts and conditions of weeds sets it up as the best grass to plant for grazing purposes. The method of planting is simple – small shoots or runners are taken and planted in the ordinary manner at intervals among the logs. The ground requires no preparation beyond clearing as much as possible. The paddock is planted lightly or thickly, according to the length of time that can be given to allow the grass to cover the field, but its growth is so rapid that little labour need be spent upon the work. When once the grass has taken a firm hold of the soil, stock do not pull it out by the roots as they might do when it is newly planted, and the selector will, after a time need a number of cattle to keep the grass down. Mr. Meyer has made a wise selection in using this grass and his success is leading the rest of the selectors thereabouts to plant buffalo in favour of any other grass.



This is the third installment of the article "The District of Cairns" from *The Cairns Post*, 2 July 1890.

The District of Cairns

[By our own Reporter]

The next selection I called at after leaving that of Mr. Meyer is situated behind Gordon's, being approached by a track from the main road, was the holding of Mr. Donald McIntyre. I found him "moving" from the valley below (close to the water) to the hill above, where a splendid view can be obtained and beautiful atmosphere exhaled. There is a nice bit of work done on this selection and to make the home he has reared up for his family more complete and enjoyable, Mr. McIntyre has laid out a garden *a la* Fred Bendig (of whom later.)

There is nothing so conducive to cheerfulness and contentment than a few flowers, and where there are children there should flowers be. The little bit of time they take can never be grudged when their presence among the wild surroundings of jungle and brushwood tend so greatly to make a place seem like home. Mr. McIntyre has accomplished a very fair amount of improvements. Sixteen acres of scrub have been felled and upon the parts prepared 100 fruit trees have been planted.

There is nothing like variety when planting fruit trees. If one sort was planted and a plague of insects deadly to that genus of plant come on a visit, or the season is too trying to that kind of tree, all hope of a return that season is gone. But if several varieties are planted the failure of one crop is but a fractional loss and a return is obtained from the rest.

Mr. McIntyre has planted citrons, oranges (seedlings), mangoes, guavas, bananas, vines, &c., besides which pumpkins, potatoes and the rest are also in evidence. Part of the clearing is destined to become a paddock, grass being planted already. A very good creek flows through this selection, scarcity of water being a calamity unknown.

From the house one of the most beautiful views towards Cooktown (Yes, I double checked what it said in the article and it indeed said Cooktown!) in the district can be obtained. Although rather rough in places the selection of Mr. McIntyre boasts of a good bit of flat and good soil. The wisdom of planting is fully recognized on this selection.

Before a plough can be put in without doubt a selector so far away from the town cannot do better than with fruit or some product that will give a fair return from a small area of ground. Fully five or six years must elapse before the stumps are rotten enough to be knocked out with the axe and during that time all cultivation has to be carried on with the hoe.

One stalk of corn takes up as much room and requires as much hoe as a citron tree, and although

about ten corn stalks can be grown while a citron tree is maturing, in five years time the tree pays for itself over and over again. Mr. McIntyre has made great progress and the house he is building up, will, in a year or two be a valuable one.

From this selection I rode to that of Mr. Fred Bendig, which although not in Formartine is very close up, being on the Cairns side of the road. The fame of "the gardener" (by which title he is known by the selectors around) has reached into town and outside for some time, and his beautiful garden is known by a great many by hearsay, but to few by inspection.

The pleasure grounds of bonnie England, and the botanical gardens of the capitals of the colonies certainly have to run their hardest to tie with the garden laid out, planted and tended by Mr. Bendig on his selection over the range some 23 miles from Cairns. The garden of Eden among the scrub, backed by trees and grape vines and with its red borders, green lawns, fantastically shaped beds, and many coloured flowers, must be seen to be fully appreciated.

Not the least attractive part of this charming place is the old gardener himself, who seems to derive such extreme satisfaction and contentment from the beautiful result of years of toil, that his cheerfulness becomes contagious, and the visitor takes more than a passing interest in the garden, and feels more than a fleeting wave of pleasure and satisfaction stealing over him. Let us walk round this scented garden with Fred. We see rose trees – such rose trees that we cannot imagine what they must look like when in full flower.

Across on the other bed is the robenus, here the snapdragon, there a group of camelias, and close by blows the gardienia (sic). Then Mr. Bendig points out other beds, and rattles off the names of its tenants with a rapidity that forbids their transportation to my note book. What a splendid blending of colours these beds will be in the summer.

I can have no idea beyond a carpet of carione designs worked out in brilliant colours. This genial clime called the "Land of sun and light," should also be called the land of flowers, and their beautifying effect and the refreshing influence they possess should render their cultivation universal amongst our selectors.

What can be more pleasant, more resting to the wearied, more relieving to the oppressed, more comforting to the troubled or more conducive to a healthy frame of mind, than the shady luxuriant bush house or the scanted flower beds?

When at the end of the days toil the selector who is struggling to make a home and attain independence sits him down to rest, his surroundings, if they are of a deserted nature tend to irritate and depress him, and make him discontented with his lot, but if he comes home to a bright, cheerful, beautiful home, be he ever so tired or depressed, he will be cheered and rested by his surroundings.

And in Queensland where such grand results can

be obtained from flower gardening, should not every selector spare an hour or two to his garden? The various forms, habits and conditions of different plants, their mode of growth, the wonderful development that may be seen to take place in a very short time must tend to induce habits of watchfulness and have a good effect upon the character of him who has a love for flowers. We are awakened from our reverie by an invitation from Mr. Bendig to have a look at his grape vines. They are laid out in beds trenched in the usual manner and trained on cane fastened to split posts.

Here are vines 12 months old which show healthy and promising canes. Black Hamburgs (in two years) are flourishing well, and the white hermitage is proving itself a very strong grower. Mr. Bendig has gone in for all the best varieties, comprising Black Hermitage, Black Spanish, Isabella, Catawba, Regina, Othello, Rockton, Diana, Goethe, Vilda &c. These are mostly the American sorts.

The Black Hamburg is the universal sort doing well under any conditions and having a ready sale as a table grape. The Goethe is a very sweet table grape, and the Catawba and Isabella have the fact that they are splendid bearers to recommend them. We shall eagerly wait the result of Mr. Bendig's vines, and his perseverance with this most useful and economic fruit is highly commendable, while the selectors around should look upon him as a benefactor for introducing the vine to the district, and proving the suitability of North Queensland to so many valuable varieties of grape.

En passant I might mention that those who desire to start a vineyard, can obtain cuttings from Mr. Bendig. It is very easy to send sown South and get a list of grapes from a nurseryman, but it is not always so easy to be able to pick from the best varieties of vines those which the soil and climate suit best.

The only way new plants are introduced into a district is by growing tried sorts and experimenting with others out of the profits. Certainly Mr. Bendig deserves the universal wish that his vines will prove remunerative this season. Besides the grape vines Mr. Bendig has 50 orange trees – grafted.

English rose potatoes, sweet potatoes, double blossom flat china peaches and a beautiful and useful hedging, a barrier far more effective than post and rails and any amount of barb wire. Mr. Bendig will have nothing to do with seedlings and all his trees are grafted. His peaches will soon be worth interviewing. The English potatoes are growing freely and doing well and here as in other places will do the sweet spuds bad. The luxuriant buffalo grass lawns rivaling any Brussells carpet are responsible to a great extent for the beauty of the place, for beautiful it is, and whoever visits this garden in the scrub must carry away a lasting remembrance of the pleasure it afforded them.



Peter "Potter" Thompson and Kylie Moore are about to splash paint around any day now to brighten up Kuranda after 5pm. It would be worth a walk around the town after-hours just to see the artwork, but then, if you're going to be around, the shops might just stay open.

PLANTING OUT COONDOO STREET:

Concern was expressed by many members regarding the choice of non native plants for the revitalisation of the planter boxes in the village. It is good to see the irrigation lines go down - this will benefit the big figs. It's also good to see the laying of ample mulch around the trees and thanks to Council staff for getting the job done. But, what an opportunity missed to celebrate Kuranda's uniqueness by planting vegetation that belongs to everywhere else but Kuranda. Hopefully the gardens will look good but they won't say much about Kuranda or Australia's World Heritage Wet Tropics.

TRC's Tim O'Brien's (now resigned), advice is, in part:

- Parks and Gardens Nursery Depot Northern has taken delivery of plant species specified by the Kuranda Garden Club. Many of the species belong to plant groups synonymous with Tropical plantings. These over the years have been sourced from many of the worlds tropical locations.
- TRC does not have a policy of having only plantings of native species as the current plantings are seen as tropical.

ON THE AGENDA:

Excitement is growing over development of a project to create a walking and cycle track from Boyles Road to Koah. There is also considerable enthusiasm over promoting products that are "unique" or "pure" to Kuranda", that is, these things will be made in Kuranda and only available from Kuranda. This might interest you!

This means that the legislation will also impact buyer's and seller's entering into contracts now and also those existing contracts due to settle on or after 1 December 2010.

Dear Kuranda Paper.

It is a pity when old trees and landscapes have to be removed or changed. However, nothing is forever and many trees in the tropics have a relatively short life. Our litigious society requires organisations like the TRC to create as safe an environment as possible. I thought Di Russo (Letters Nov 2010) was drawing a long bow to suggest cultural ties to the old Mango (an introduced tree) that was removed. I would like to point out that the big old figs that were put in during World War II are in fact South African figs (I think *Ficus jonesii*). The others put in a few years ago are native figs. The shiny leafed one down near the Top Pub is F.benjamina and the others, say outside the church or Art Co-op with the small leaves, are F.hilli. I think the latter were a bad choice due to their large leaf and fruit fall. This has proved dangerously slippery, especially in wet weather. Very careful planning needs to be done to put in appropriate vegetation in the village area to save its removal in the future and to save upsetting the locals who have got used to "old friends".





Dear Kuranda Paper ... Further Discussion on the Old Primary School Site

Background

- Mareeba Shire Council purchased the school from State for \$1m with no strategic plan: how is that even possible? In my mind, "for community use" is far too vague to merit funding from ratepayers.
- State had been unable to get any Govt. dept to take on the site - perhaps that's because they understood considerable funds would be needed to turn buildings designed for primary school children into something workable for offices / adults; it seems also likely that there is simply insufficient population density to justify the use of the site.
- TRC has already spent at least \$70k on addressing vandalism to the site. From the outside, all that is apparent is the boarded-up windows. Photographs in the presentation pack show water damage, which tends to get expensive very quickly. There are ongoing outlays to ratepayers for security, maintenance and repairs. The site is an asset but the buildings are a liability.

Public Meeting community suggestions:

At the October public meeting, various suggestions were made for community uses of the site, when there are under utilized facilities already in existence within Kuranda that could be put to better use.

For example:

- Homework centre: use the purpose built Kuranda State College
- Sports centre: the Kuranda State College, where the local pool is now situated (for which ratepayers in the community pay a levy). Further State funding for Sports at the college has just been approved, ref. Steve Wettenhall, November edition of the Kuranda Paper. It makes sense to consolidate so that there is only one set of overheads for the community in terms of security, power, water, staffing.
- Arts Centre: the underused amphitheatre could be far more suitable – the Tanks in Collins Avenue, Cairns are successful.

With regards to creating a training centre for indigenous youth, this will obviously be State or Federally funded. Ratepayers cannot be asked or expected to underwrite the costs of a building for a commercial venture under the auspices of it being an

Kuranda is a rural community, with a small, widelyspread population of around 3,000 people. It cannot begin to duplicate facilities which exist in Cairns with a population of 120,000 and more. If people want the facilities justified by a city, then they need to move to a city. Kuranda leans heavily on nature as a draw card; over-development undermines that.

Ageing Population Facts

The 2006 census found Australia to be an ageing population. The proportion of the under-15s age group has decreased from 20.8 per cent to 19.8 per cent over the last five years. The 2006 Census also found that whilst the proportion of working age people aged 15 to 64 years remained relatively stable between 2001 and 2006, the number aged 55 to 64 years experienced a large increase from 9 per cent to 11 per cent; by 2047, the proportion of the population aged 65 and over will be 25 per cent.

Australians now have the world's second longest life expectancy. Currently, there are some 2.8 million Australians – about 13 per cent of the population – aged 65 and over. This number is expected to triple in 40 years.

Australia as a whole is severely lacking in accommodation for aged care and Queensland lags behind even this, with around 50% of the funding

The 2006 census suggests old people and children are equal in terms of numbers in Kuranda. It ignores the fact that our elderly have to move away as there is nothing here for them, as much as they wish to stay. There are many fiercely independent older people in their late 60s and mid-70s who are beginning to find managing a rural block too much, and who are anxious that there be assisted-living communities locally. These are not people who want to be put into an isolated Care facility or a hospital bed; they simply want to be able to move to a down-sized accommodation which reflects their needs.

As people grow older, their worlds become smaller; seemingly small distances become a barrier. People wish to stay in touch with their family and friends in the community they call home.

Kuranda and the Tablelands population is rapidly aging - yet there is a desperate lack of facilities. Who has not read of the problem of Cairns Base having 55 elderly people taking up hospital beds due to a lack of places for them in aged care facilities? I personally heard one elderly lady ask Cairns Base nursing staff to shoot her on being told she was going to be sent to Atherton because there was no bed close to her family in Cairns.

There is a wide gap between deciding that a rural block is too much and a hospital bed with 24/7 nursing care. People wish to retain independence, dignity and financial control. They want to feel and be useful, and have a great deal to contribute to the community, including supporting community facilities (CWA, the Neighbourhood Centre and the OpShop are all prime examples of pensioner-managed facilities), and partor full-time work.

Proposal for the site:

My proposal is that the TRC work with Senator Jan McLucas to turn the old primary school and Bartley Park site into a transition and assisted-living community centre for the aged. There is Federal funding available. It is ideally situated, being in a quiet residential area close to the town and the river. It means that occupants of the site can walk to the shops and along the river – a beautiful situation for anyone previously used to living in harmony with nature.

The site can be sold back to State on a Head Lease. The decision to purchase the site from State was made by an outgoing council just before amalgamation. It seems a poor decision, given there was no predetermined strategy for the site. With aged care a State and Federal responsibility, Council's role should be one of guidance, consolidating and reflecting community

The purpose of retaining a Head Lease is to ensure that Council retains their stake in how the land is developed. The money recouped from the reversal of the sale can be returned to this and other Kuranda community developments.

Funding:

On November 5th the Federal Government announced funding for 37,000 new aged care places. On November 7th it announced additional funding of \$293m for transition care places, which allow people to return to their homes.

Capital grants of up to \$44.5m per proposal

are available in funding www.health.gov. au/acar2008. The submission deadline is 29th December; which realistically gives us one month for preparation.

I believe it is possible to combine private and pension housing on the same complex. Aged care providers such as Bluecare and OzCare can advise.

A win-win would be to encourage local design and construction firms to provide a set of competitive designs and constructions based on a central theme. With a single vision for the site, a sustainable, ecofriendly assisted living development in the Green Village of Kuranda could be a showcase for both TRC and State.

- Invite Pro Bono architectural designs;
- Aim for a range of price and levels of assisted living.
- Encourage cost-plus capped-price construction, allowing smaller construction firms to tick-over as the construction market slows;
- Allow a degree of show-home competition, including sponsors and awards in a number of categories.
- There are numerous grants available for environmentally sustainable development.

There is a great deal of expertise and talent in terms of construction, landscaping and technologies within Kuranda, which can all be leveraged ahead of spending State or Federal funds. Many of these are people in their mid 50s who are beginning to look to their future and have a vested interest in creating a world in which they wish to live.

Welcome Pocket was and remains poor from a location point-of-view; older people need to be part of the community, not shipped out to Woop Woop. Under the 2025 plan, it appears to have run into difficulties.

There remains an urgent need for transition care, sheltered accommodation, nursing home and respite care in Kuranda and the region, a need which will only increase in the years ahead.

Looking at the range of activities supported by these facilities I am left wondering just what our community wishes to do that needs additional facilities? Where are these activities presently held – presumably if they are so important the participants have found a way to operate without extra premises.

Or is this a combination of misplaced nostalgia and a grab for assets? I can understand that past students and their parents may have fond memories of the old school building but it is the memories that are important, not the decrepit buildings. After all, if the buildings offered such great facilities what was the need for a new school at the present District College site?

Which brings me back to your article: we must have public consultation to determine the purpose and need for a facility but accept that one of the outcomes from a proper study may well be that there is no need.

THE RECENT PUBLIC MEETING to discuss the usage of the Primary School site brought up some interesting issues:

- There has been an investment of capital, both money and political, in Block C.
- There is currently no funding for further work on the
- There is some community support for renovation of all the existing buildings.
- Council proposes a sell-off of plots to finance needed works (mainly Block C and demolition of the others)
- Council proposes that the site be used for a community centre.

Time has passed, there are entrenched views and resentment, money is short, investment has been already made. Unfortunately, there are no concrete requirements for, and little or no clear definition of what a community centre should contain, how much it would cost, and how to avoid an impact on such sites as the CWA Hall. I think that we are in danger of putting the political cart in front of the

matched dormice we currently have pulling it.

For me, the biggest issue in the area at present is not an additional public space or attempting to deliver inappropriate services that we cannot afford. It is finding a solution to the issues facing the elderly in the area. Kuranda has an aging population. As a rural B zone it has little in the way of aged care. There are few options between an aging couple managing a 100 acre bush block and taking up hospital beds in Cairns Base. The Welcome Pocket initiative is grinding onwards, carries its own baggage, and is physically isolated from the community. As was pointed out in the meeting, land in the centre of Kuranda is a valuable asset. Once sold it is unavailable – gone forever. There are, however, alternatives that might provide a self-funding option.

The Australian Dollar is at an all-time high. Tourism is suffering. Kuranda will feel the pinch. The construction industry is also experiencing hard times. When this occurs, the skilled workers move to where the work is, or to the mines, and deskill the area.

In my experience, a large proportion of the aging block owners are fiercely independent, and do not want to leave the area. However, managing their property has become hard, and they would like a local alternative option. They don't want to completely stop and play shuffleboard, they want to be useful.

In broadest terms, the proposal is to convert the Primary school site into an aged housing community in toto. The positioning adjacent to Bartley Park offers the possibility of communal facilities with a public segment overlooking. There is no reason that whatever community facility requirements are identified cannot be woven into the project.

In essence, the Council would not subdivide to raise money, it would sell covenanted leases and building permissions and use the community for increased leverage.

Segment the land into leased plots around a community hub. Strata title might be appropriate.

Seek a pro bono architectural design for the entire site, or run a public competition. Present allowable variations – reutilisation of existing buildings, recycling of components or green-field demolition. Ensure that adjacent public spaces are integrated.

Create a design document for the housing that provides the covenants for construction. Use the architectural vision to generate 'binding' elements to tie the designs together.

Collate and filter community needs to generate a requirement for the community space. Ideally this will be multipurpose, and used by the elderly community as well.

Either integrate Block C with a radical facelift, or demolish – guided by the architectural plan.

Seek funding at State and Federal for technology contributions, aged care, community... whatever categories can be made to fit.

Seek commercial sponsorship at all levels throughout the State; direct sponsorship, advertising sponsorship, community contributions of products and services, prizes and awards. Utilise the Tourism side of Kuranda to create and maintain a website, seek sponsors, create advertising guidelines and link it into the community.

Seek Ergon contribution for the creation of a testbed Solar Community. Impose a requirement for Solar hot water and Solar Electricity panels on every home, or as a communal plant. Consider micro-hydro from the Barron. Consider excess power generation infeed as part finance to the community. Seek Federal funding for solar power.

Involve the community at all levels: integration with tourism, input from business, contributions advice and assistance from community groups.

Plan for communal water recycling. Integrate plant and garden watering, allotments.

Create a design and build competition for the local construction firms with a number of monetary and design categories and prizes. All homes to be elderly-friendly; high efficiency, low maintenance. Range of cost is acceptable. Allow for medium to high-density buildings.

Council would raise money on the lease sales (perhaps the Estate Agents would work pro bono, too). It would impose some additional contribution for communal facilities (Water treatment). It could impose a money or resource contribution requirement on communal works.

Allocate a percentage of the plots to public retirement housing (possibly high-density), but keep them in the design competition, and use the same linking features.

Involve the environmental groups in native plantings and water-efficient garden plants.

Create garden designs (again, with community input and support) and vegetable garden allotments for residents. Seek sponsorship from hardware suppliers for hardset irrigation, design and construction.

Create, allow for and run with 'myspace' decorative areas, kid friendly public areas, community areas.

One guiding principle is to accommodate those who used the Primary School in the fifties. Western society has a tendency to try to isolate the young and the aged, but there are benefits in allowing the two groups to mix.

ON THURSDAY 18TH, after six months of requests, the Council finally permitted an inspection of the site by representatives of five local community organisations.

Our main inspection was of B block, the building closest to town, but we also examined A and C blocks.

Val Shannon and Doug Barber were very helpful and explained repair and renovation requirements in full detail. I personally thank them for their time, and excellent and professional counsel.

"A" block, the oldest building in the middle of the complex, is doubtless due for demolition. We fully concurred with Council's assessment that for this lovely old building – it is time to go. B block is a different matter. Council has estimated that it will require \$70,000 to bring this building up to compliance standards and a further \$123,000 - to make it pretty and functional. However,this is really more a guesstimate as no asbestos audit has been done in recent years and no building compliance report has been prepared. Council admits that the costs are very conservative (on the high side) and they really don't know what it would cost in reality. "B" block is a very big and very usable building and would cost well over a million dollars to replace with something similar. Also Council's estimate of annual maintenance costs appear to be a figure plucked from the air rather than a fully costed and calculated amount.

C block has been extensively renovated by Council and is looking good, and very usable. Sadly the "pretties" have been done before the necessary compliance repairs. Therefore we have kitchenettes and carpets, but not fire reels. I understand that Council has done work as and when funds became available, but if the essential had been done before the optional, Kuranda could have been using this building by now. There is no doubt that this building will be a great asset to our community and there is about another six weeks of work to be done before it can be opened in reality. That doesn't mean it will be done in six weeks, just that it could be.

Part of the problem arises from Council's determination to do all of the work and present our community with a fully completed, fully renovated and very lovely facility. This is a laudable aim but it costs buckets of money and, in some instances makes a facility that is over engineered for the organisations that want to use it. Also the ongoing maintenance costs are increased and these expenses will have to either be subsidised by Council in the future or passed on in higher rental costs. For example, the estimated maintenance costs for "C" block are \$50,000- per annum and this means that the rental costs of a quarter of the building (one big classroom and a small adjoining room) would be \$250- per week plus public liability insurance. This is getting into the realms of commercial rental and would be beyond the means of most small community groups.

There is an opportunity for Council to work with our

local community organisations in a symbiotic and mutually inclusive way. For example, with "B" block; if Council was prepared to do the early hard essentials such as asbestos removal and fire hose plumbing and then agreed that renting organisations had to complete the lighting, and internal walls, and floor covering, and internal pretties on time and to Council's inspection standards - it would save tens, maybe hundreds, of thousands of dollars. It would happen much faster. It would open up means of funding presently unavailable to Council. Our community has done this many times before. Look at the CWA hall, funded and built by our community. It was later extended by the Lions Club, done with our community's effort and expenditure. We did the same for the Amphitheatre, the Scout Hut and the Sports Club. In these cases Council provided the wherewithal, and our community provided the bulk of the funds and the bulk of the work. This type of process makes it affordable to all parties. That way we are all doing what we are best at. No Council is good at economical construction work or timely response. All successful community organisations are great at getting the best results for the minimum expenditure. To me, it seems such an obvious process of mutual involvement.

As for the sale of the land, maybe the pre-school has to go to provide funds. I think it is sad, but maybe it is required. However, the sale of the large open spaces of land would be little less than a criminal disaster. We can do so much with this land in the future; maybe in a decade, or maybe two. Once it is sold, we can never get that asset back

WHILE UNDERSTANDING the TRC's need to recoup/ realize on monies committed to refurbishment and ongoing maintenance of the old Primary School properties, the proposal to sell off parcels of land on this site only provides a quick fix and once gone, no more.

Given the immediate and ongoing needs in the area for low cost public housing, this site provides the opportunity to develop a long term social investment and, with considered planning, a secured return.

As well as major establishment costs met under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement (CSHA), this proposal would:

- Boost local public housing stock
- Obviate and militate social issues associated with homelessness, overcrowding, social dislocation and associated health issues.
- Generate an ongoing revenue
- Boost employment and local economy
- Provide possible opportunity for local "emergency" and/ or specialised accommodation
- Remove need for proposed on-site caretaker

The idea that public housing needs be grim and sterile does little justice to projects that are well planned and maximise opportunities for privacy and security as well as opportunities for social interactions. This site offers great scope for innovative and considered design and layout and such an investment would be our community's. [Hopefully the bumblings and dead-hand of Qbuild could be avoided or at least minimised in any such development.]

While not providing the immediate fix that TRC proposes, this proposal, if carefully planned and delivered over time, could provide a more enduring and considered use of this once in a lifetime opportunity to capitalise on the site.



A Thought for Christmas

I'm not generally in favour of whingeing about the world; whingeing rarely has any good effect. Yet, as we come to the end of 2010, I find myself reflecting on a world where selfishness seems to have the upper hand. It appears that bankers cannot wean themselves off the big bonus culture and obscene profits; MPs cannot wean themselves off spin culture; the Western world is unprepared to wean itself off the big carbon emission culture, and the developing nations are not prepared to try, unless they are bankrolled by the richer nations. I, of course, have my own problems, where I can't see how my selfishness impacts in a negative way on those around me. Where does self-interest turn into selfishness?

And the trouble is that one person's selfishness makes us all feel selfish: if they're looking after Number One, perhaps we need to as well.

Ultimately, the Christmas message is the opposite of selfishness: One part of the Bible puts it this way: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who has faith in him will not perish but have eternal life." Christians believe therefore that the baby of Bethlehem is the final word in selflessness. One early Christian wrote that we should follow Jesus' example. "Take to heart among yourselves what you find in Jesus Christ. He shared the nature of God; yet he didn't claim equality with God, but made himself nothing, accepting the humblest role. As a human, he became obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross."

This is the cutting edge of Christmas: God loves and desires our friendship so much that he gives himself totally to us in an attempt to win us out of selfishness into love for him and the world. In a world where so many are putting themselves first, and looking after their own interests – is that the sort of world we really want? Is that the sort of society we really want to build? Or does the Child of Bethlehem have something to teach us after all? In his adult life, Jesus is quoted as saying: "Beware, keep well away from greediness of every kind, for the real quality of anyone's life does not depend on the extent or abundance of possessions".

All over the country this Christmas, the truth of these words will be lived out. There will be little and big acts of generosity, as people care for their relatives, take on the task of visiting, working with shut-ins, providing parcels for adults and children in need. It will warm the hearts of those who receive, and those who give. These green shoots of love point to a different world, and one in which the truth of Christmas becomes a fulfilling way of living. Such life is one of the truest Christmas messages of all.





CHANGES ARE COMING.....

to laws governing your pets

New State laws will apply for the governance of cats and dogs from 1 December 2010. The laws are part of the State Government's new Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act

2008.

How does this affect you?

- All cats and dogs are required to be registered with Council from 1 December 2010.
- All cats and dogs born on or after 8 September 2010 MUST be microchipped and registered with Council from 12 weeks of age.
- Cats and dogs born prior to 8 September 2010 are not required to be microchipped, but MUST be registered with Council. Council encourages ALL pet owners to have their animals microchipped as it is the best form of identification that cannot be lost.
- A cat or dog cannot be microchipped under the age of 8 weeks.
- Cats and dogs that change ownership MUST be microchipped and registered.
- Cats and dogs sold from refuge facilities MUST be microchipped desexed and registered with Council.
- Working dogs and Government-owned dogs are exempt. (Definition of working dog means a dog usually kept or proposed to be kept on rural land; and by an owner who is a primary producer, or a person engaged or employed by a primary producer; and primarily for the purpose of droving, protecting, tending, or working livestock; or being trained in droving, protecting, tending, or working stock.) Happy Christmas! Again the Christmas season seems to have crept up on us. I would like to wish all residents a very happy Christmas and New Year. Time for some festive cheer and relaxation with family and friends!

Kuranda Community Centre: Discussions are still continuing about the development of the site at the former school. Thank you to everyone who has offered feedback. Please continue to let me know your thoughts. A Newsletter will be distributed to all residents in December to update you on Council's position. At this stage, Council has agreed to look at engaging an independent consultant to fully consult with our community on the development of the site. I have pushed for this as I believe that it is important that Council hear from a wide range of residents and that the process is conducted independently. There are many, many viewpoints and desires for the use of the site. We all know that not everyone can have a piece of the facility and I am very keen that we look to the future and plan for what this community needs over the next 10-20 years. I have asked Council to carry out no further work on sales of the small parcel of land or removal of old buildings until we have the results of an independent consultation process. I have also asked Council to review the rewording of Clause 3 (f) of the 2 June 2010 Council resolution, so that lots 3 and 4 (the area on Arara St with the large trees) are used at a later date for a service that has community support and compliments the use of the neighbouring blocks. Further meetings of the Advisory Committee will take place after Council has received results of the community consultation process. The current Committee have done a great job in difficult circumstances. Please engage in the consultations as we need to hear from all sections of our community. As always, all final decisions are subject to the decision of a majority vote of Council. I welcome your thoughts. This project is your project.

people in our community who willingly give their own time and energy for the benefit of the community. New Laws for pet owners: New State Government legislation comes into force on December 1st. The new law requires all dogs and cats to be registered with the local Council and microchipped by the time they reach 12 weeks of age unless born on or before 8 September 2010. The microchip contains the details of the owner. The laws do not apply to existing dogs, except for those that are subject to a change of ownership after 1 December. Working dogs and government-owned dogs are exempt.

Ros Common: Works are almost completed. The lights for the Tennis Courts and the filling of the dressage area should be finished before Christmas. Residents are already enjoying the new outdoor fitness equipment.

Street planting Coondoo St: Garden crews have progressed the planting in the Coondoo St gardens. The irrigation systems have also been upgraded. Work is expected to be finished very soon.

Koah Hall: Koah hall users can now expect good quality water following the installation of tanks to replace the bore water.

Boost for justice

Funding for the Kuranda Local Justice Group of \$97,000 has been confirmed as part of an increased allocation of \$4.04 million to the State's 52 community justice groups. The Bligh Government is committed to ensuring people in Queensland's Indigenous communities have access to a fair and accessible justice system. Community justice groups play an important role in helping to reduce the number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who have contact with the criminal justice system and, particularly, the disproportionately high rates of Indigenous imprisonment. They also provide support directly to the courts, making submissions on relevant cultural matters that magistrates and judges can consider when they are sentencing offenders.

Candlenut Steiner School's new facilities

Congratulations on the opening of the Federal Government's \$925,000 Building the Education Revolution new multi purpose hall, library and shade structure. The school has also received more than \$545,000 in State Government recurrent funding and nearly \$382,000 in capital assistance over the past five years which I know has had a positive impact on the school. I look forward to continue working with the school in their incredible growth since moving to Kuranda from Stratford two and a half years ago.

New Health facility

An integral part of the \$446.3 million Cairns Base Hospital redevelopment, the new Cairns North Community Health Facility on Sheridan Street, was officially opened last month by Queensland Premier Anna Bligh. The \$15 million facility, is the new home to the Sexual Health Service, Oral Health Service as well as the Australian Red Cross Blood Service's Donor Centre.

The grant will allow Cancer Council Queensland to develop an accommodation and support lodge for regional cancer patients who travel to Cairns for cancer treatment by refurbishing the iconic Coolabah Motel on Mulgrave Road and provide recurrent annual funding of over \$400,000 to run the lodge and provide local support services, including counselling.

Pet owners urged to take advantage of discount microchipping

Pet owners can have their animals microchipped for about half what it usually costs at Tablelands Regional Council's microchipping days to be held in four locations across two weekends later this month.

Microchips are about the size of a grain of rice and cause no discomfort to animals, but they are of great value should an animal be found wandering and picked up by Local Laws officers.

The bar code on the microchip is linked to the owner's contact details and recorded on a Central Animals Records database for the life of the pet.

This means animals are permanently identified Australia-wide and can be returned to their owner if they are located - even if the collar and the Council ID tag has come off.

"Microchipping is a very simple procedure to have done, but it certainly pays off if your dog or cat is picked up wandering the streets," Tablelands Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

"The sad reality is that 248 dogs and 146 cats have had to be put down since the start of this year because we simply can't find their owners and the owners haven't come looking for their animal."

The total number of dogs impounded since January was 492 and the total number of cats impounded was 185.

From 1 December, all dogs and cats will have to be registered by law, and all dogs and cats must be microchipped by the time they reach 12 weeks of age. The microchip contains the details of the owner. The laws do not apply to existing dogs, except for those that are subject to a change of ownership after 1 December. Working dogs and government-owned dogs are exempt.

Council's discount Microchipping Days at four locations: Mareeba (PCYC Hall, Walsh St) on 20 November; at Atherton (Atherton Showgrounds) on 21 November; at Malanda (Tablelands Veterinary Surgery, Atherton Rd) on 27 November; and at Ravenshoe (Tablelands Veterinary Surgery, Moffat St) on 28 November.

Pet owners can have their animals microchipped for \$25 (approx half of the normal charge). There is no need to book. Dogs must be on a lead and cats must be in a cage. Enquiries about the microchipping days can be directed to 1300 362 242.

Book launch for Kuranda author

The latest book by Kuranda author Joyce Berendes will be officially launched by Tablelands Mayor Tom Gilmore at Atherton Library on Thursday 25 November.

The book, Nulla and the Purple Poison Plant, is the latest creation from the author who had her first book, The Fourteenth Day, published in 2007.

Nulla and the Purple Poison Plant is a fantasy story set in the early 1900s, somewhere in Australia's bush country in the horse-and-buggy days, and is based on a musical play for children called Nullagundi, which Joyce wrote for her then Children's Operetta Group some years ago.

The story goes: "All the men of the area have mysteriously disappeared, lured away by Bulogen Dhung – the bad spirit of Mount Badoran. Desperate to find their father, Susan and Johnny Telford set off in search of him. On their way to Mount Badoran, they meet an Aboriginal boy called Nullagundi, who is also looking for his father. Helped by the Bush Creatures Society of Animals, the three children form a rescue team."

A one-time winner of Brisbane's Twelfth Night Theatre's Best Actress award, Joyce came to Australia as a fully qualified ballet dancer. She studied speech and drama for two years, then taught drama and dance, and started a Children's Operetta Group, for which she wrote the book and lyrics of two children's musicals and one play that were later performed by schools and local amateur theatres.

As a member of the Queensland Writers' Centre and treasurer of the Kuranda branch of the Queensland Arts Centre, Joyce was involved in organising conferences, art exhibitions, workshops etc, as well as doing the choreography, directing plays and teaching at drama workshops.

She and her husband travelled throughout Australia for four years, with Landcruiser and caravan, experiencing many adventures, some of which she has incorporated into her writing

Stock up for wet/cyclone season now!

People living in rural or remote areas of the Tablelands region are being strongly urged to stock up on food, fuel and other essential items now in readiness for the oncoming wet season.

With the Bureau of Meteorology predicting an early and very active season, residents are advised to act now to ensure they have adequate supplies to sustain them in the event that flooding occurs and roads are cut.

Residents living in urban and rural areas should have at least three days' supplies, while people living in more remote areas should have at least one week's supplies or more if possible. People should consider their needs in terms of water, fuel, non perishable food, medications and pet food.

Tablelands Local Disaster Management
Group Chairman Cr Chris Adams said it
was imperative people took action now before the wet season rain hit.

> "The message is to be as prepared as you possibly can be for the season

- everyone should have enough supplies to get them through for a short period of time at minimum, and for a week if they live in remote areas," he said. The following list contains items that should be considered in emergency preparation plans.

Water

- Store water in clean and safe plastic containers.
- · Each person will need a minimum of five litres of water per day to allow for drinking, food preparation and personal sanitation; 10 litres would be preferable. Remember that following a cyclone or flood it is likely to be extremely hot and humid requiring a high level of fluid intake.
- If you live in an area with a town water supply, plan to have at least a three day supply of water for each member of the family. If in a remote area, one week's supply or more may be

Food

- Store at least three days supply of non-perishable foods.
- Choose foods that don't require refrigeration, can be eaten without preparation or cooking, require minimal water and have reasonable shelf life.
- Choose compact and light products just in case you need to evacuate.
- Ensure cooking facilities such as a gas BBQ, and gas/fuel/spirit camping stove are available

Include the following foods in your kit:

- · Ready to eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables
- · Canned juices, milk and soups.
- Staples such as sugar, pepper, salt and high energy foods such as peanut butter, honey, jams, biscuits and muesli bars
- Vitamins
- Food for babies, children, elderly persons or any special dietary requirements
- · Comfort foods such as biscuits, lollies, cereals, milo, coffee and tea
- A First aid kit Tools and supplies
- · Plates, bowls, cups, knives and forks (paper or plastic plates and utensils do not require
- Battery operated radio and spare batteries Battery operated torches
- Cash Non-electric can opener Utility knife Toilet paper/towelettes
- Soap/detergent Personal hygiene items Duct and masking tape
- Matches in waterproof container Disinfectant Mobile phone and charger
- Insect repellent and sunscreen Pliers, screwdrivers, drills, wrenches, spanners, bolts, screws and nails for temporary repairs
- Ropes, chains and pickets for securing outdoors items such as boats and garden sheds Extension cords and power boards • Non-electric clock
- Plastic sheeting or tarps Special items Baby needs such as nappies and bottles
- Medications
 Contact lenses or prescription glasses

- Important family documents in a waterproof container: Wills, insurance policies, contracts, deeds, stocks and bonds, Passports and immunisation records, Bank account and credit card numbers, Inventory of household contents, Important telephone numbers and contact details, Family records such as birth, marriage, divorce and death certificates.
- Fuel for vehicles and generators Pet food and supplies
- Entertainment for the family such as games, books and puzzles

\$16,000 of assistance for community groups/individuals

Tablelands Regional Council has approved a total of \$16,065 of financial and in-kind assistance to a number of community groups and organisations.

A cash donation of \$3000 was granted to CC's Boxing Team Mareeba to assist the group to tender for the 2011 Amateur Boxing State Titles, while the Mareeba High School P&C was granted \$3000 to improve hockey facilities at the school.

The Far North Endurance Riders Association was granted \$1000 to hold a Chief of Stewards School, and a Temperature Pulse Respiratory training course for owners whose horses participate in endurance events, while the Tablelands Obedience Club was granted \$3000 to improve lighting at their clubhouse in Atherton.

The Kuranda District State College P&C was given \$1000 to stage a Community Bush Festival in 2011 to raise funds for additional shade at the school, while the Kuranda Festivals Association was granted \$200 of in-kind assistance to stage their Carols in the Park in late November.

St Vincent De Paul was granted a waiving of fees totalling \$1157, while Yungaburra Community Association was granted \$828 of in-kind assistance to stage its centenary celebrations. The Tablelands I Mountain Biking Association (TiMBA) was also granted \$500 to support a visit by an expert in the field to progress the region as mountain biking destination.

Council also granted \$200 to the Mareeba High School Chess team and \$200 each to four other young people attending the National Futsal championships.

Council also waived fees for the Atherton Turf Club (\$757), and the Lions Club of Millaa Millaa (\$385). The Malanda Community Kindergarten was also granted a total of \$238 of inkind assistance and waiving of fees to assist them in staging a fundraising disco.

Nominations are now open for the 2011 Australia Day Awards.
