A man escaped with minor abrasions after being struck by a fuel tanker on the Kuranda side of the Barron River bridge just after 8pm on Monday November 14.

The pedestrian/cyclist route between Saddle Mountain road and Kuranda township qualifies as an extreme action adventure ride. And it's free! I should know, having traversed it almost daily for 5 years. I've found the best time for action is around 3pm weekdays. Many vehicles don't move over on the bridge - others being too wide, can't. And none of them slow down! I have had many close calls. Many locals perceive me as single, but my good wife, as do others devoid of a death wish, stay home, or drive (the long way) to the township.

For safety reasons. I would like to see the highway upgrade start at the Kuranda end, and as an intermediate measure, have:

- A pedestrian warning sign before the Kuranda side of the bridge.
- A reduction in bridge speed limit to 60kph for vehicles crossing towards Cairns.
- A bike/pedestrian lane linking Saddle Mountain road with the bridge
- The few faded markers left replaced with a larger, stronger and more visible barrier.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

In reply to Howard Small's letter, Friends of the Earth (FoE) Kuranda do still oppose the proposed \$0.5 billion, 4-lane highway from Smithfield to Kuranda. So do a majority of local people according to a recent telephone survey commissioned by the Department of Main Roads.

We support measures that would improve the safety and environmental impact of the Range road. However the proposed highway is not the answer.

The planned road surface has a poor safety record and the concrete barriers on either side and in the middle of the highway have been called death traps by researchers in Europe.

Increased volume of traffic on the range due to the large-scale urbanisation in the Kuranda area that the proposed highway would facilitate, in addition to the above design features of concern, could lead to a greater number and **Congratulations!** to more serious accidents than occur now.

The short term, negative environmental impact of the proposed highway is not disputed by anyone. 50 hectares of forest would be cleared and another 50 hectares of habitat destroyed by edge effect.

As for economic benefits, what would be the effect of the proposed highway and urbanisation of the Kuranda area on the tourism that many of us rely upon for a living? Would tourists want to come up on Skyrail over a construction site where rainforest is being bulldozed? Would they still come to visit Kuranda if it was updates on bringing The Kuranda Paper to you and thanks surrounded by urban sprawl?

Views from the road into the rainforest and to the coast that make the present road such an attraction would be The Reef Casino Community Benefit Fund obscured by the proposed barriers. These pictures below simulate the end effect.

Friends of the earth Kuranda are actively seeking solutions to the transport and planning dilemmas we face. We have regular meetings, hold workshops, run stalls and take part in festivals. attempts, the Wright brothers managed to get their `flying machine' off the ground. They were the first to fly. They immediately sent a telegram to their sister, Katherine, to tell her the great news. It said: "We have actually flown 120 feet. Will be home for Christmas." Katherine immediately rushed to the editor of the local newspaper and showed him the telegram.

He looked at it, and said: "How nice, Katherine, you will have your brothers home for Christmas." He missed the big story that the Wright brothers were the first to fly! It's very easy to miss the big story at this time of year.

Christmas has a habit of taking over our lives. There are just so many preparations to make, and presents to buy, and so little time, that by Christmas Eve we are exhausted. It is very easy to miss the big story that Christ is at the centre of Christmas because it is his birthday.

For the first 300 years of Christianity, Christians didn't celebrate Christmas. They celebrated Easter and the message that Christ had risen from the dead. But later on, Christians began to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, and various customs grew up in different parts of the world. Some of these reflected the Christmas story and involved the use of candles to show that at Christmas we celebrate the birth of the Light of the World.

St Nicholas, who was a popular saint known as Santa Claus, was gradually changed from being a bishop and patron saint of children to a red-clad

In December 1903, after many failed and bearded Father Christmas. Over the years, the religious side of Christmas has been gradually eroded as the commercial world sees it as the big earner. Winter Wonderland, Frosty the Snowman and even a new bird Suzy Snowflake(even in 35 decrees of heat) have replaced the carols telling of the birth of Jesus.

> One of the earliest carols, written by St Ambrose in the fourth century, is Come Thou Redeemer of the Earth. It tells the big story of Christmas and how God came to live on earth, and it recognises Jesus as both human and divine. God reveals His love in the birth of a baby.

> It is because God got involved in the world that Christians have a duty to get stuck in. It may mean feeding the hungry and caring for the poor and it may mean fighting for peace and justice and speaking up for the voiceless.

> Christianity cannot be an escape from the real world, and the birth of Jesus in the stable and His death on the cross are reminders that the Christian faith is rooted in poverty and pain. At one Christmas Eve Eucharist, a young single parent brought her baby. The baby cried and cried and screamed, and mother and child received disapproving looks from some of the congregation, and then to everyone's astonishment the Priest thanked the young mother for bringing her baby to church and reminding us of what Christmas is all about.

ST SAVIOUR'S CHURCH 90TH ANNIVERSARY

People gathered from far and wide to celebrate on Sunday 23rd October to celebrate the nineteenth anniversary of the dedication of St Saviour's Church a commemorative luncheon followed the service.

Rector of Cairns, the Rev. C. Warren Torrens was among those who commenced activities to build the church as far back as 1911. Rev, Ernest Dawson, who came from serving as Curate at St Saviour's Poplar, London, arrived in 1913 and kept the momentum progressing and in 1915, a start was made on building the Church.

While the Anglican Church has been operating continuously in Kuranda since 1889, the first service was held at St Saviour's Church on September 19, 1915. The first wedding was when Rosie Newman, daughter of the builder, married George Veivers of Speewah and the first baby baptised was Elsie Moffat and so started the amazing history of our local church.

The current presentation of the church as one of our town's historic buildings is largely due to this continuing generous support and effort on the part of benefactors.

St Saviour's has a strong local congregation and is visited each year by many tourists who admire the simplicity and join in Worship with the locals.


Melbourne Cup "Hemp N Henna" Community Fashion Show



The Kuranda Arts Co-operative is proud to welcome local indigenous artists working through Djurri Dadagal Art Enterprises. This group is auspiced under the umbrella of Ngoombi Cooperative Society and markets work by local Kuranda indigenous artists. The Enterprise is totally run by local indigenous artists and all paintings and artifacts are made locally. The indigenous artists are exhibiting as new members of the Kuranda Arts Co-operative and it is envisaged that the Co-operative can develop a more substantial partnership with Djurri Dadagal Art Enterprises in the future. These are early days but the works in the KAC Co-operative Gallery are already receiving much interest from visitors. The early sales of the Djurri Dadagal works are extremely pleasing. Our initial display includes canvasses, boomerangs, clapsticks, bull-roarers, bookmarks, and burnie-bean necklaces. Artists currently represented are Glenis Grogan, Tania Hunter, Leandra Cannon, Monica Brim and Fabian Riley. Plans are to expand the current display over the next few months. More artists and more artefacts will be represented. Soon we will have artists from Djurri Dadagal painting at the Co-op one day a week, and we will be announcing which day when this is established. Visitors to the gallery can now enjoy quality local indigenous art and craft, as well as works from our existing member artists and craftspeople direct from the artists at the Kuranda Arts Co-operative. It's great to see local artists working together, both indigenous and non-indigenous - a first for Kuranda. The artists at the Kuranda Arts Co-op are very excited about this development. Hopefully we may see some collaborative work come out of the association.


Applesauce Cake Recipe






CLARK'S CORNER

As yet another year draws to a close it is interesting to reflect back on 2005. I hope that you have had a good year, achieving personal goals, meeting challenges and strengthening ties with family and community.

The big local issues keeping me busy have been the planning for the move of the primary school to the high school campus, the Kuranda range upgrade,



Next year, 2006 will be a critical time for many of these projects. Construction of the primary school buildings and pool should get underway with openings in 2007 if all goes according to plan. The Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre should open at no 6 Rob Vievers Drive mid year while more houses should be under construction at Top Kowrowa. It will take good will, patience and persistence working with a range of stakeholders to bring these projects to fruition but I hope there will be much to celebrate next year.

The proposed Kuranda Range road upgrade is much more problematic and divisive. The Federal Department of Environment and Heritage and Wet Tropics Management Authority will have determined the outcomes of the development applications currently under considerations. Regardless of the outcome of this process it will create divisions within the community that will have to be addressed.

The big issue State wide has of course been the state of our health service with two separate inquiries – the Departmental review by Peter Forster and the Royal Commission headed by Morris and then Davies. In light of the significant nature off this issue I have provided below a summery of the situation following the October mini-budget.

Rebuilding the health service is the government's number one priority. The mini-budget last month injected an immediate \$547.6M increase in this years health budget to \$5.7 billion dollars as part of an additional \$6.4 billion over the next 5 and a half years. Far North Queensland will share in this funding to renew and reform our public health system. By 2010 Queensland Health will receive an additional \$1.5 billion dollars every year.

The additional funding is bringing immediate benefits to Cairns Base Hospital including;

- 16 additional acute beds to relieve current pressures on the emergency department
- 2 extra intensive care beds
- Boosting chemotherapy services by recruiting more nurses and allied health and administrative staff
- \$100,000 immediate relief funding to increase renal operating sessions
- \$500,000 for 160 additional coronary angiograms procedures at Cairns Base Hospital
- new clinical positions in community mental health services and "dual diagnosis" specialists to assist patients presenting with problems caused by substance abuse as well as mental illness. When combined with additional funds to the NGO sector, this will mean a significant improvement to mental health services in Cairns and surrounding areas.
- \$382,000 to start urgent work on elective surgery waiting lists
- \$440,000 a year extra to employ a new obstetrician/gynaecologist and a senior nurse to co-ordinate maternity services throughout the region.
- Increased funding for cardiac rehabilitation services

FNQ will also receive a share of 1200 additional doctors, nurses and allied health professionals to be employed over the next 18 months. A Health Services Plan for our region will be developed next year to ensure that our additional funding is spent where it is most needed.

I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank Phil Cammish, Manager of the Cairns Health Service District on behalf of our community for his leadership and commitment over the last 2 years that has seen a significant improvement in services and boosted the morale of staff at CBH. Mr Cammish is returning to New Zealand to take up an even more challenging position and I wish him every success.

Ross and I are planning to stay in Cairns for our Christmas break this year after our Asian holiday in July. Where ever you are and what ever you do for the festive season - enjoy and stay safe.

Kangaroo sits in an old gum treeright here in Kuranda

Lumholtz-Tree The elusive kangaroos are macropods especially designed for arboreal life. Slow and clumsy on the ground they have developed exceptionally long tails for balance and stronger forelimbs, including non-slip soles to climb with. Though unable to move much more than walking pace on the ground, in trees they are bold and agile. They are expert leapers and 9-metre jumps from one tree to another have been recorded. They have an extraordinary ability to jump to the ground from massive heights (up to 18 metres) without ill effect.

The ancestors to all kangaroos were believed to have been small tree dwelling marsupials like possums. The earliest macropods diverged from this line when they descended to the ground and evolved bodies adapted for rapid motion on the ground. Why ancestors of the tree-kangaroos at some point turned around and returned to the trees is not known.

Nocturnal creatures, these kangaroos have a distinct 'black mask' over the front of their face, making them easily distinguishable. Their main diet consists of leaves and fruit and they have large stomachs that function as fermentation vats where bacteria can break down fibrous leaves and grasses.

These rare tree dwelling animals exist in tropical rainforests of Far North Queensland and New Guinea. Here they are found in rainforest patches in the Atherton Tablelands



and surrounding hills, relying on the fragile and swiftly diminishing their rainforest environment for survival. Predators such as dingoes and dogs pose a further threat.

One effective strategy in ensuring the survival of this rare and endangered marsupial is to provide wildlife corridors between preserved forest fragments, not to mention keeping dogs under control and taking care while nighttime driving.

Recently I was lucky enough to spot this magnificent creature right here in Russett Park, Kuranda, reinforcing the need to preserve our unique habitat. If we all do our bit, these endangered creatures might just have a chance of

THE BARRON RIVER GREEN CORRIDOR PROJECT

After months in the making, a partnership has been formed between the Cairns Port Authority, Barron Catchment Care (BRICMA), Conservation Volunteers Australia and an evergrowing list of community Landcare and environment groups (including Kuranda EnviroCare) and commercial enterprises, to undertake the biggest environmental rejuvenation project ever seen in the region. Over the next 20 years, this iconic project will see the riverscape of the Barron River restored from top to bottom.

Approximately 140km of the river's riparian area is in need of some degree of rejuvenation to improve its health. The river itself is the main indicator of the health of the entire catchment.

The major problems for the catchment (which are reflected in the health of the river) are loss of vegetation, weeds and feral animals, pollution and conflicting uses of water and land by people. Human conflicts include irrigation, urban uses, recreation and conservation (wetlands and environmental river flows). Evidence of degradation is revealed by bank erosion, loss of natural habitat and polluted water.

Strategies for reducing the problems include stabilising the river banks with engineering and revegetation solutions, restoring natural habitat on the banks and in the river itself and managing our agricultural, industrial and urban lifestyle activities in the entire catchment to keep our water clean enough to drink and bathe in.

The term "corridor" describes an elongated space through which wildlife can move to access other habitats, food or mates. A corridor can be through water, along stream banks or can connect fragmented forests. The Barron River Green Corridor Project aims to rehabilitate the degraded banks of the Barron River system to restore its beauty and health.

KURANDA **EnviroCare** has played an active role in environmental projects between Kuranda and Mareeba at Mantaka, Kowrowa and Koah for the past 8 years, the evidence of which is now a pleasure to behold. We have a keen interest in that section of the Barron River Green Corridor Project which joins up with our current projects and expands on them. One such area that has been degraded for decades, threatening nearby residences and intact wildlife habitat with fire, is at Myola.

The Myola stretch will be one of the first sub-projects to come under the banner of the huge Barron River Green Corridor Project. Many of the trees are currently being raised in the Envirocare nursery and advice for the revegetation of the local area will come from expertise and experience within Envirocare's membership.

Where nearby landholders believe their view of the river may be spoilt by tall trees, low-growing species will be selected in consultation with them so everybody and everything is happy.



BATREACH NEWS



The scrub tick has arrived again and Batreach once again is looking after orphan spectacled flying fox babies. These orphans are from the Tablelands, collected from the ground after their mothers have been killed by the paralysis ticks. Batreach currently has 20 orphans whereas last year they had 150. There are many more out there but Pam just hasn't had time to go out and collect them.

The orphans need 3 hourly feeds consisting of NAN 1, a milk formula for human babies. Why bother you might ask. Adult Fruit Bats are

extremely important in the spread of rainforest



seeds. They are the main carriers of intermediate sized seeds. They also act as pollinators of rainforest trees. Spectacled Fruit Bats are now listed as a vulnerable species, only a small step from endangered. It is said that extinction of the bats would result in the loss of up to 60 species of rainforest trees. Pretty scary to say the least.














RECEIPES FROM KURANDA BUTCHER

RECIPES AND TIPS FOR COOKING CROCODILE MEAT WHERE TO PURCHASE CROCODILE MEAT:

KURANDA BUTCHER, BP SERVICE CENTRE, ROB VEIVERS DRIVE, KURANDA. PHONE: 40937248

Crocodile is a white meat and its nutritional composition compares favourably with that of more traditional meats. It does tend to have a slightly higher cholesterol level than other meats. Crocodile meat has a delicate flavour and its taste can often be covered by use of strong marinades. The fat should be trimmed, as it has an unpleasant taste.

HOW TO COOK CROCODILE MEAT:

Crocodile is easy to prepare and cook. It is best cooked frozen as during any thawing process all the meat juices run out and the flavour is lost. It should be cooked for two minutes on either side and allowed to stand for a few minutes. It is best served just cooked (in red meat terms, medium rare). Do not use a large number of ingredients (other than herbs or spices) – no more than three is recommended. If frying, always use butter or olive oil as they will not impart a flavour that is unique or different. Do not use margarine as the hydrogenated fats can impart an unpleasant flavour and prevent you from using other dairy products such as cream in the recipe. Keep it plain and simple.

CROCODILE KEBABS:

100 gm crocodile boneless tail per serve.

1/4 pawpaw 60 ml white wine Olive oil Bananas

Slice crocodile tail fillet into 10-15 mm medallions across the grain. Thread medallions onto wet bamboo kebab sticks. Crush pawpaw into a flat casserole dish, adding wine and a splash of olive oil. Add the kebabs and refrigerate for 30 minutes, making sure kebabs are completely covered. To cook, pre-heat chargrill-style BBQ, eg an open grill using rocks/ coal, not a plate. Place kebabs over coals and cook until browned. Do not overcook. Place on a plate in a warm place for the same amount of time it took to cook kebabs. To cook bananas, allow 1 banana per serve. Use firm, just off bright bananas. Do not peel, just cut lengthways and sprinkle brown sugar and nutmeg or ginger over the sliced surface and BBQ without turning. The coating will melt and the soft banana can be served whole. Prepare a platter with barbecued bananas placed around a dish, place kebabs in the centre of the platter and serve immediately with cold cucumber and yoghurt salad with some crusty fresh bread.

Garden Jottings

Things to Consider this Month:

December, the month of mangos and lychees and hopefully the heavens opening and pouring rain. Before the Wet, apply a general fertilizer to the gardens, watering in well, as much nutrient is lost in the coming rains. Check carefully where there are bare patches of soil and cover with mulch to avoid compaction and/or soil loss. Again check carefully for any accidents waiting to happen if we experience high winds. Also check possible breeding sites for mosquitos and remove all possible containers where water may sit and provide breeding places.

Talking of breeding places and the Wet, every garden should have a frog breeding pond - fun not only for the kids but a great contribution to the environment. This can be something as simple as a children's plastic wading pool at least 50cm above ground to prevent ingress of the cane toad. Placed to receive at least a couple of hours' morning sunlight with some surround planting to provide frog entry and simply stocked with some water weed and plants to provide egress of emerging young froglets, you are ready to go. Ideally stock with a couple of the local blue-eye or even the common guppy to keep wrigglers at bay. For additional food if necessary, provide just sufficient blanched green lettuce leaf to avoid polution of pond. The following is an excellent reference for tropical frog breeding: http://www.fdrproject.org/ pages/ponds.htm

With the approach of the Wet and warm weather set, costus, gingers and heliconias are coming to flowering. Now is a good time with growing points visible, to divide and plant up your favourites. With a sharp spade, cut through at least one mature cane with a growing eye and move to a prepared bed, water in well and maintain until established. Also a good time to divide and replant the delightful understorey, ground hugging Kaempferia - Peacock Plant, as it is easier now in full growth than to go searching for its fleshy roots when dormant.

Plant of the Month:

Philodendron - Aracae. An extremely large genus with an estimated 400+ species hailing from South America. A wonderfully diverse family ranging from gigantic vines, erect giant shrubs to

smaller self-heading hybrids. With beautiful, mainly cordate leaves although some are intricately divided, this genus is a treasure trove for the keen tropical gardener. Many philodendrons produce juvenile form leaves, only taking on their full mature glory when they start to climb. Some words of warning - all plant parts are toxic to pets, some of the climbers are aggressive and will bring down trees when grown to maturity and many pose threat to our native forest if disposed of carelessly.

Given such a plethora of beauties, a selection of possible favourites would be P. erubescens cultivars, P.gloriosum, P. melanochrysum, P. verucosum and P. williamsii.

Philodendron erubescens 'Burgundy' and 'Golden Erubescens', both vigorous climbers, the former with its deep wine red mature leaves and the latter pinkish orange are excellent for bringing colour to the shaded parts of the garden.

Philodendron gloriosum, common but a strking ground hugger, slowly increasing in girth as it sends up its giant satiny heart shaped leaves with a wide pinkinsh mid-vein. New foliage is often a symphony of pastel tones.

Philodendron melanochrysum, a giant creeper with magnificent iridescent blackish green leaves to a metre length with midrib and lateral veins in ivory. Simply stunning!

Philodendron verucosum, my favourite and again a creeper if one can be so lucky to grow it successfully. With leaves deep metalic green and bronze with paler green edging, red petioles and leaf undersides a pinkish to violet. The effect is of the best Tiffany's glass. This is the one you must have when you weren't ever going to grow a philodendron and although sometimes difficult to obtain and start, it is breathtakingly beautiful when well grown and achieving mature growth.

Philodendron williamsii, up to a metre of arrow shaped deep glossy leafed beauty, again a beautiful climber but may be kept to a short trunked tree form to bring a tropical feel to patio or pool.

All enjoy water and warmth, dappled light and reasonable soil but most are tolerant, once established, to less than perfect conditions and can endure arid

conditions for a long period, although becoming somewhat dowdy. All easily propagated during warmer months from cutting which should be struck in moist but well drained mix and planted out when established as showing new leaf.

To these treasures may be added the numerous and ever increasing numbers of hybrids and cultivars including P. 'Xanadu' and 'Pink Princess', the latter often most infurating in failing to produce its pink splashed leaf. Many of these are sef-headers and often of more restrained growth, making them useful for that tropical look in the smaller garden.


Proiphys ambionensis - The Cardwell Lily is a native rainforest understorey bulb which, when well grown, can rival the Hosta of cooler climes for its magnificent shiny green large veined leaf display. Requiring afternoon shade and good moisture when in growth, towards the end of the season it sends up tall flowering stems wth white bell flower clusters that are very fragrant. Plant among low permanent foliage as this plant is winter dormant.

Q & A

Sorry A, I forgot to write up your question. The large shrub near the fire station bearing red spiny fruit brought in to the Information Centre is Bixa orellana - the lipstick tree or Annatto, from Amazonia where native peoples used its seed arils for dye which practice was later commercialised by Europeans for use in food colouring and lipsticks. Glad to see our youngsters still having fun using it for face painting!

Trevor, you ask about poisonous plants in the garden and risk to children and pets. Both species should be trained not to chew on any plant unless identified as edible by a competent adult. Topping the list are the toxic Datura (upright angel's trumpets), Neriun (oleander) and Thevetia (yellow oleander) followed by Brugmansias, Colocasias, some of the Cassias, Diffenbachias, most of the Euphorbias, many of the Ipomeas and Solandra (the Chalice vine). Even the native Macadamia has a medium toxicity so no plant should be ingested unless absolutely sure that it is harmless. Children and pets should be trained not to nibble in the ornamental garden.

I would take the opportunity to wish all readers a safe and happy Christmas and every thing green, growing and good for 2006. Hopefully next year, the Garden Page will see some specialist contributions by world famous plant authorities living in the Kuranda





GROWING PLANTS HYDROPONICALLY

When you add fertilizer to soil you are hopefully adding what is missing from the soil, with hydroponics you are supplying everything the plant needs. The plants do not have to compete for a limited supply of nutrients and all their energy is used to grow. Hydroponics does not require a lot of space even a balcony can be used as long as there is enough light. It is a means of self sufficiency in any location. The garden can be positioned at waist height, which enables people who can no longer dig and weed to continue gardening. When there is no contact with the ground there are virtually no weeds and a lot less bugs. There are no problems with dogs cats etc. as your garden is out of reach.

Water use- The amount of water used is only what the plant requires, so there is no wastage of water, which in itself is a big advantage.

If you are interested in experimenting with hydroponics a nutrient solution can be made by adding additional components to a general fertilizer e.g. 5 parts Gypsum, 1 part Epsom Salts added to 6 parts Soluble plant food such as Thrive or Aquasol. There are minute amounts of micronutrients in nutrient but to start with this is enough. One level teaspoon of this mixture added to five litres is sufficient to grow lettuce. Tomatoes need double this mixture. You will need containers and river gravel or other medium to support the plants.

There are no problems with dogs, cats etc. as your garden is out of reach.

Kuranda Tapestry Workshop

Woven tapestry is a very old craft, practiced by many cultures all over the world. The Coptic Tapestries, which can be viewed, at the National gallery of Victoria, are some of the oldest. The European tradition has an interesting history with the work designed and woven by men. This tradition was carefully preserved until the time of William Morris, the English designer and artist,

when women in his workshop were encouraged to become involved. Now the designing for the images for tapestry weaving is mostly the concern of the artist-weaver except in the area of commissioned work, which is usually conducted in large workshops employing many weavers.

The Victorian Tapestry workshop in South Melbourne is an example of this practice. One of the largest tapestries in the world was woven in these studios from a design by Arthur Boyd and hangs in the House of Parliament in Canberra.

There are many places in Australia where one can study this subject. Canberra, Hobart, Melbourne and Warnambool, Victoria all offer degree or diploma courses. There is a remote education course available from Warnambool TAFE. If you are interested in learning more about this art practice there will be a study group starting in the New Year where the practical application of the design and tapestry weaving will be studied. This could lead to further study or involvement in a Community Tapestry. The skills can be acquired by anyone, of any age, male or female. It does help if you can already weave or knit because the main quality needed is tenacity!







A Wedding in December by Anita Shreve


