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FOLLOW THE EASTER BUNNY TO KURANDA

The countdown is on for Tropical North Queensland's biggest Easter egg hunt with more than 2000 Easter eggs to be hidden in Kuranda on Easter Saturday. There will be plenty for the kids to do with jumping castles, an animal farm petting zoo, games and face painting, while the adults will enjoy music in the park, whip cracking, toad races and plenty more. Hot FM's Marty and Jess will be doing an outside broadcast on the day to add to the excitement. Celebrate Easter in the tropics with all the fun Kuranda is renowned for at Centenary Park from 10.00am to 4.00pm on April 23.

LEG POWER CHALLENGES LOCO MIGHT

A rollercoaster climb and dense tropical rainforest are just two of the challenges competitors will face when they try to outrun the iconic Kuranda Scenic Rail train as it ascends the Barron Gorge on its historic route through the Wet Tropics rainforest from Freshwater Station to Kuranda.

The inaugural 18km Cairns Kuranda Great Train Race on June 25 will start with a 5km road run from Freshwater Station to the Barron Gorge National Park before runners hit an 8km trail on the undulating four-wheel-drive McDonalds Track to Wright's Lookout, then revert to a 5km road run on the Barron Falls Road to Kuranda Station.

Runners will be faced with a challenging ascent as they leave from a few metres above sea level on a steady climb to 50m before an extreme ascent to more than 300m, at times topping 400m. Meanwhile, the Kuranda train will be winding its way through tunnels and bridges along the spectacular 31km winding track through the Barron Gorge National Park.

Lifeline Counselling: Counselling by Lifeline is returning to Kuranda after a break due to program restructure and staff vacancies. Appointments can be made directly to Lifeline or through the Centre for Wednesday afternoons. Please note that all referrals and sessions are strictly confidential.

Family Day in Centennial Park 20th April 2011: There will be a family day in the park on the Wednesday of the Easter school holidays. There will be displays, games, children's activities and much more, so mark it on your calendar. If you would like to be involved in the day, provide an activity or display, please contact Marg, Ceri (40938933) or Lolita (40937118).

Step Forward: *Step Forward* is a relapse prevention program that identifies the change cycle to assist people modify behaviours that are causing ongoing negative consequences in their lives. The program is held by Ceri Hughes and myself with face to face counselling available through an Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs Service (ATODS) counsellor upon referral. The next program commences on Wednesday 6th April from 10.30 - 12.30 weekly for four weeks. Referral is necessary - please contact us to find out more or fill in a referral form. The program is strictly confidential and we do not even need to know what behaviour you are seeking to change.

Family Support Items Needed: Thank you to those who have generously donated items recently. This program is growing with the support of the local Kuranda Community and we have been able to assist families in need of essential household items. Right now we know families who need: double or queen beds/mattresses, washing machines, freezers, lounge suites/sofas, dining table and chairs, fridges and baby items. Need a new washing machine, fridge or other essential houshold goods?

The No Interest Loan Scheme provides interest-free loans for individuals or families on low income.

How much can you borrow?

It varies, but usually up to \$1,000 and the repayment period is up to 2 years.

Anyone holding a Health Care Card or Pension Card. See Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre for more details.



Gardening in Kuranda



April. Well, a watery sun is making brave attempts to dry and warm our gardens but the SOI is giving predicted 50–70% above average rainfall until the end of May so keep those wellies handy. The thrifty gardener will make a judicious choice as to fertilising before the onset of cooler weather with its slowing of plant growth and the depletion of soil fertility caused by leaching after the prolonged heavy rains. There is still time to divide and move clumps of Heliconia, various Gingers and Costus allowing them to settle in to take off on return of warmer weather. Established clump of these plants should be cleaned with old flowering stems

totally cut away.



Plant of the Month: Crotons (Codiaeum variegatum) their myriad shaped and highly coloured leaf forms, hybridized from the original fairly unspectacular species found in Indonesia are a valuable contributiontothetropicalgarden although somewhat disdained as "common" by the gardening gurus. (Yes – an unplanned close planting can look a bit like a pizzatopping chunder so use them for statement and highlight.). Any fairly good well drained garden soil and a situation with the early afternoon sun will keep them going. Too much sun may cause red and orange colors to fade, while too much shade can prevent colors from forming.

Appreciating good watering during the warmer months, careful attention must be paid to ensure good drainage avoiding plant collapse during the Wet.

Fertilise crotons as acid-loving plants, using either liquid or granular fertilizer and apply every other week during active growth and stop fertilizing during the cooler months.

Extensive hybridising has resulted in such recent introductions as C. variegatum 'Africa', C. *variegatum* 'Mammy', C. *variegatum* 'Togo', C. *variegatum* 'Zambesi', and C. *variegatum* 'Zanzibar'. Most of these have short compact bushy growth. A considered cutting-back at the beginning of the growing season will restore shape particularly with older taller and more leggy plants.

Crotons are easily propagated through stem cuttings. Croton "sports," or shoots that are completely different from the parent plant can be propagated while seed is unstable and the offspring will not resemble the parent.

Crotons are relatively pest free; ants may sometimes carry scale and mealy bugs, easily corrected with a spray of white oil.

Q & A Following last month's article on Anthurium, I was asked about propagation. Leggy plants may be rejuvenated by taking top cuts, preferably with roots. The bottom should head again. Some growers advocate taking top cuttings as early as possible as dormant eyes are more likely to sprout; also by division as some of the A. andreanum hybrids quickly form clumps and lastly by seed. Fruit when ripe falls easily and seed should be removed from pulp and sprouted, barely covered on moist sphagnum moss. During warmer weather no cover on the pot is usually needed. One grower recommends placing a small drop of honey on tip of spadix, increasing insect visitation and likely fruit set. Remember the key to successful growing is open, well drained mix and regular feeding.

Q & A Street planting at old corner store is Stromanthe sanguine Tricolor (Family: Marantaceae). Stromanthe, with a number of forms from plain green to various variegates, is easily grown in part to full shade. Not particularly fussy as to soil types, its main requirement is good moisture. In hot dry weather it may be subject to partial collapse and burning of highly coloured leaves.

Kuranda Community Kindergarten to be Powered by the Sun

Kuranda Community Kindergarten will be powered by the sun as part of the Bligh Government's \$5.76 million Solar Kindergarten Installation Program.

State Member for Barron River, Mr Steve Wettenhall MP, said the program – part of our drive to make Queensland the solar state – would help save the environment and also save operating costs at the kindergartens.

"Our children are our future, which is why the Bligh Government places such an emphasis on the provision of quality kindergarten services," Mr Wettenhall said. "The government's Solar Kindergartens program is a win-win situation – our kindergartens will save money and our children will be attending more sustainable services that are helping to save the planet. As well as reducing the amount of greenhouse gas produced by each kindergarten, these solar panels will help reduce their annual electricity bills by up to \$400.

This is good news for parents and kindergarten operators, who will be able to use the savings for more resources for the children."

The Solar Kindergarten Installation Program is a collaborative effort between the Bligh Government and the Creche and Kindergarten Association (C&K).

Education Minister Cameron Dick announced this month that under the program, 166 C&K kindergartens throughout the state will be retro-fitted with 1.5kW solar-power units from April this year.

He said solar-power units would also be installed at up to 240 new kindergarten services being established as part of the government's commitment to give all Queensland children access to quality kindergarten programs.

The Solar Kindergartens program builds on the government's Solar Schools program, which has resulted in solar panels being installed in 1164, or more than 94 per cent, of all state schools in the past three years.

BREAKING NEWS

Project confirmed: tunnel to link Cairns and Kuranda

Campbell Newman, the "can-do" Lord Mayor of Brisbane, announced a major project for the Far North to be commenced immediately if he is successful in his bid for State Premiership later this year. It is thought the tunnel will be finished by 1st April 2013.

A spokesman confirmed that several recent LNP 'think tanks' chaired by Mr Newman considered that it was essential that a major project for North Queensland be commenced soon after the election, to prove to rural Queenslanders that the new government would not be purely concentrating efforts on the south-east, as has been past perceptions.

"Many projects put up by LNP members were considered by the think tank", the spokesman said, "including a bridge from Cairns to Green Island, but the Cairns to Kuranda tunnel received the majority of support."

Mr Newman said that after his anticipated Premiership win, he would be hitting the ground running, with a new Germanbuilt Tunnelgrindermeister being shipped to Cairns as a matter of priority.

"The beauty of the proposed tunnel is obvious. It is win win all round. Look at Skyrail, and its mimimal impact on the rainforest and its inhabitants – simply because it goes *over* the forest. The tunnel will go *under* the forest with equal success."

When questioned on the cost of the proposed tunnel, Mr Newman admitted that there would be a small toll on the tunnel for the first 25 years.

"I think people would agree that a toll of \$69.00 each way for a private vehicle is reasonable. We may be able to offer locals a 10% discount if they are travelling the tunnel every day."

He went on the say that the problems of under-use of some of Brisbane's toll tunnels would not apply here, as the current range road would be permanently closed, thereby forcing all traffic to use the toll tunnel.

"It's either pay the toll or drive south to the Gillies Highway, or north to the Rex Range Road," he laughed.

I walked into a kaleidoscope of colour and reflected light as I entered **Esther Hodi**'s studio. Multi-coloured beads were hanging like crystal curtains against the window panes. It made me immediately forget the inches of rain falling outside and the colours gave the room a sense of festivity.

Where is your current studio?

In my home at Mareeba. I have taken over the family room now that the children have left home.

Do you work alone or with others?

Both. I partner with Penny Moore, another Tableland glass artist, when fusing glass. Penny has the kiln. We are an inspiration to each other. Although we work independently and differently, we 'bounce off' each other. I really appreciate the time we work together.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

Glass itself has no toxic properties, however, the chemical (baker's soldering fluid) used in the process, does. Therefore I require ventilation and good light.

$Describe\ your\ work\ pattern-hours/days/weeks.$

I am an inspirational worker, I am not regimented by time.

However, once I start on a piece, it is best the process be continued as it is advantageous to complete the piece as soon as possible.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

Mainly copper foiling, stained glass, lead lighting and mosaicking.

Why is glass artwork your chosen medium?

I started with mosaicking but as my work expanded and I went on to other modellities I found I was able to express myself in a much fuller way with other techniques.

List three things you listen to while working.

I often just work in silence or I may use the time watching previously taped TV series. I also listen to new age music.

Your favourite tool?

I really don't have a favourite, but I could not work without my 'pointed end' tweezers or my pistol oil glass cutter. My glass cutter would be the most important as the majority of my work is hand cut.

How do you identify your work? (signature/stamp/chop)

I don't have any identifying features on my artworks, however, I am working on it. I realise it could be necessary. At the moment, I guess my individual style identifies my work; my flamboyant combination of colours. They are easily recognisable.

How do you sell your work?

Through galleries, word-of-mouth and exhibitions.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

No, I don't do either. I have taught in Cairns in the past, in a hired hall, but I was the teacher only and not the organiser.

What do you do with your seconds?

If the inspiration comes from the heart – my creation, then I don't tend to have seconds. The only seconds in my glass work are the few which break. Cracks though, can work in my favour and don't distract from the overall effect, however a 'shattering' certainly puts an end to the piece.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

I am in a machinery hire business with my husband. I am the book-keeper. I also do voluntary work, ie rostered days where my work is displayed at the Kuranda Arts Co-operative and the Mareeba Art Society galleries.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I dream about a separate building or a totally self contained room. With that sort of space and work area I would be able to take students.

If you were not working with art what would you be doing?

I would certainly be going crazy. I have always been a craft person. If I was not working with glass I would be doing something else, perhaps quilting – a medium of which I am particularly fond.

Esther Hodi's glass masks, boxes, and jewellery pieces can be seen at the Kuranda Arts Co-operative Gallery in Kuranda.


Update from Kuranda Medical Centre including current advice on Seasonal Immunisation

I have now worked in Kuranda for 10 years and I am pleased to write that we are now fully staffed with GPs! For years access to a GP "on the day" for an urgent appointment has sometimes proved difficult but that should no longer be the case. Dr Aileen Traves (previously Underhill) has passed all exams and has joined the practice permanently to job share with me. Dr Marissa Woodburn is now our full-time registrar (until July 2011) and Dr Alex Lapanga joined the practice on a full-time basis in January 2011, moving up from Hervey Bay.

Autumn is usually the time when flu immunisations start and this year is no different. We will be offering all eligible and high risk patients a "Fluvax", an injection that contains vaccine against swine flu (H1N1) & normal seasonal influenza (H3N2). It is safe, all the immunising particles in it are dead and so it will not (can not) cause any sort of infection. Please phone the surgery (4093 7118) for an appointment for immunisation or just talk to the GPs about it when you are there for another problem.

Good luck against the mould, mossies, sandflies and crocs and let's hope the flu keeps away this year.



"Understanding Death: The Most Important Event in your Whole Life"

by John S Hatcher (Baha'i Publishing, Wilmette, 2009 ISBN 9781 93184 7728 \$31.95

The author Hatcher is a Professor Emeritus of English Literature at the University of South Florida and a prolific writer. At the time of writing this book, he says that he is 68 years of age. He writes that he is still healthy, but feels as if he is frantically trying to live each day to the fullest: he simply does not know how many more days are allotted to him. So the book is a meditative reflection of his thoughts on the subject of aging and death and their significance for him. As such, for those of us of older generations , those in the seventh stage of life in Shakespearean terms (and there seems to be more and more of us these days), it is a subject that strikes some cords within us, pleasant or unpleasant as that may be.

But is this topic meant to be a meditation of the morbid variety? Is that the inevitable approach for us to take in our latter years? As the author says about the art of dying:

"I call this a "lost" art because it is really only in this modern age that we have come to view death as alien, inappropriate, or unnatural."

The author refers to the best-selling book by Randy Pausch, "The Last Lecture", in which that author, in a very unpretentious and useful account of his own path to his approaching death, sets down the noble strategies he devised as a response to death and dying. In that case the author was said to have only six months to live, a circumstance which is bound to acutely focus the mind. But what of those of us that are still reasonably healthy (given the odd artificial part and a tablet or two)? Should we just ignore the subject, as if it is not going to happen, it being all too morbid and debilitating to warrant our own navel gazing? We hear of old people who still run marathons or fly around the world and other incredible things, treating life as if it has no ending, and just hoping to be carted off unexpectedly in their sleep while still planning the next adventure. Is this the way to go?

What of our ancestors and their approach to death? They seemed to have a much better understanding of death through a closer contact with the prevailing forces of nature. Death was often much closer to hand, more unpredictable. And death was seen as a part of the process of life, not something distinct and unmentionable. Hatcher writes:

"In my own reading and study, I have concluded that in those cultures that remain somewhat close to nature, whether as simple farmers or as members of what remains of extant tribal communities, likewise seem to approach death – whether their own or that of friend or family – with a degree of acceptance, wisdom, and ritual calculated to deal artfully with this point of transition."

Hatcher seems to decry the fact that for most people, the art of living is discussed publically and often, but the art of dying is most often an entirely private thing. For the author, aging is a simple but remarkable and precious gift. The more we, as part of this process, aspire to intellectual and spiritual development, the more we must gradually cease to rely on physical and sensual experience as an end in itself. Sure we should still try to keep fit and enjoy life, but it is also a time (if our brain allows it) for mature reflection, for assembling a lifetime of learning into increasingly complex and creative insights into the meaning of life itself. From the author's perspective, it is a time when our relationship to the physical reality is specifically designed to extricate us by degrees from attachment to our lower or physical nature.

To Hatcher, death is a transition, a passing over. It is like our third birth (after the beginning in conception and then physical birth into this present world). We should focus on our preparation for that third birth into the next life, the spiritual world. It is not a time of extinction, of sorrow and grief. Only the physical body is discarded. This life is a training ground for the future, for the continued progress of our spirit that is an integral part of each of us. Hatcher talks of the lost art of dying without despair. To achieve this we need to increase our detachment from the physical world and increase our attachment to the spiritual. Without this, death can be a fearful thing.

Surely aging is a time for the development and expression of wisdom, a faculty that in earlier generations was always prized and respected in the elders. But do we not sometimes now see the paternalistic expression of views towards the elderly as if they were simpletons, descending into a second childhood? Physicality and youth are king. This is largely a modern invention. Aging should be seen as a valuable part of life, to be exercised as an art, with careful thought and dignity. It deserves respect and an acknowledgment of its significant value to the community. And it should be seen as part of an ongoing process, not as a black hole ending totally at death. To take this latter view is destructive and robs humanity of much of value. This book makes a useful contribution in helping to avoid this consequence.

After a good downpour, rainforests seems invigorated; washed clean and green, new growth is seen everywhere, the grass grows higher and new growth unknowingly feeds the new generation of caterpillars of our local insect population. To some gardeners, a sudden vibrant flash of the blue Ulysses Swallowtail, the zigzag flight pattern of the Blue Triangle or Green Spotted Triangle or a cruising green male Cairns Birdwing brings joy and delight. But you could mistake their caterpillars for pests if you can't identify them.


An unwelcome explosion of other insects occur too; ants, cockroaches, sandflies and mosquitoes. So with the current Dengue Fever warning in North Queensland, the focus this month is mosquitoes

MOSQUITO CONTROL – WHAT CAN I DO?

- Around your garden eliminate mosquito breeding habitats
 Look for mosquito larvae (wrigglers) in stagnant or standing water
- Water under your house? Dig a trench and let it drain away
- · In compacted soils or clay soil, to improve soil drainage and speed up water penetration, sprinkle
- Septic tanks; screen off the vent pipes with a fine mesh or 'ScotchBrite' material
- Cover exposed tanks or manhole lids with plastic and secure in place
- · On flat roofs, water may puddle. If you are in a well known dengue area, inspect roof often and
- Gutters and drain pipes, remove all leaves and debris
- Landscape light fixtures. i.e. garden solar lamps. Repair flooded garden lights, empty out water, spray cooking oil or insecticide inside to prevent more larvae
- · Lawn ornaments, sculptures, outdoor containers: empty water regularly
- · Outdoor furniture, tilt sideways to allow water to run off
- Rainwater tanks or barrels, add cooking oil to make an "oil slick' barrier on top, repair or cover entrances tightly with a fine mesh screen so mosquitoes or other pests can't get in and breed
- Bird baths, empty water regularly and check for wrigglers
- · Fountains and ponds, stock with goldfish or guppies. They love to eat the larvae
- Inspect pet dishes regularly for wriggler larvae, and remove water
- Palm frond ends; turn over so they don't collect water
- Pot plants; don't over water them during the wet season
- Fill pot plant trays/base with course river sand or spray cooking oil to form a 'slick or protective barrier' when it rains
- · Around known mozzie infested garden vegetation spray insect spray make your own spray. See recipe links
- Outdoor buckets or containers turn them upside down, or remove to a sheltered area
- · Spray stored tyres with cooking oil and keep in your shed
- · Check children's play equipment regularly
- Children's tyre swings, drill holes so water drains out
- · Block up or cover hollow galvanised fence posts with metal or plastic caps to keep out mosquitoes
- \bullet Rubbish bins keep lids shut tight, place new spaper on the bottom to absorb water or liquids
- Empty 44 gallon drums or turn upside down and regularly check for wrigglers
- · Boating and farming equipment, use a bilge pump to remove standing water or remove or undo
- Toss out water in your refrigerator drip tray
- Empty water from everything you find around your home
- Remember, mosquitoes transmit heartworm in dogs, so spray their sleeping areas too.

INSIDE YOUR HOME

- \bullet Only female mosquitoes bite. They find us by following our carbon dioxide breath
- Did you know they will bite Blood type O people, before A or Bs (www.guardian.co.uk/ notesandqueries/query/0,5753,-24800,00.html)
- · Mosquito species in North Queensland that spread Dengue Fever need to be around humans and water. They will bite in the daytime and before dawn and dusk and are easily recognized bytheir black and white striped legs
- · Normal mosquitoes are active anytime, especially if you are camping or hiking. Always wear insect repellent.

Our Condolences

One of the best things about visiting the Kuranda Arts Co-operative, so many of our gallery visitors tell us, as well as seeing high quality local artwork, is being able to meet the artists personally. Many of the visitors to the gallery are themselves artists of varying mediums. Introductions are made and friendships form. A good number of our visitors are from New Zealand.

Our publicity officer, Toni Rogers, was rostered at the gallery about five years ago and met Christchurch visitor Ann Field. Ann is a master weaver, spinner, author and tutor and for the past 25 years has been teaching regularly in NZ, Australia, Europe and the United States. Ann has her studio on the first floor in the Arts Centre in Christchurch where she works on her 16 shaft AVL, computer-assisted loom.

Ann and Toni have kept in touch since that meeting in Kuranda; they share a love of fabric, weaving and creativity. Toni has visited Ann's studio in Christchurch twice in the last three years. The Arts Centre is situated in the centre of the city and consists of studios, galleries, markets, theatres and cafes.

On 22nd February, the second earthquake in six months hit Christchurch, killing many of the city's people while they ate their lunches, strolled in the city streets, and in this case, worked in their studios at the historic Art Centre. Much of the Art Centre has been badly damaged but all the occupants were able to safely get out of one of the city's most treasured buildings. It was a week before Toni was able to communicate with Ann and confirm her safety. Access to the building is currently denied and Ann is due to lecture in the United States this month and has been unable to retrieve from her studio her warps and yarns ready to post for her forthcoming trip. She has related sadly that it will be years before the historic Art Centre will be restored completely. The clean up in Christchurch will be counted in bricks and the Arts complex will certainly have a different feel to it in years to come.

The Kuranda Arts Co-operative extends sincere condolences to our fellow artists and those who have suffered loss in this second earthquake.



In doubt about grey?

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The District of Cairns

This is the sixth instalment of the article "The District of Cairns" from The Cairns Post 9 August 1890 (Continued)

r E. Torazzi's nursery and experimental plant raising next engaged my attention. Six V and 7 V comprise Mr. Torazzi's land which is situated on the railway line at Kuranda. This gentleman's views upon tropical agriculture are so well known that I need not do more than give the results of the various experiments and the condition of the nurseries. The nurseries altogether contain 10,000 trees and seedlings grown upon the octavi system, which is several times transplanting and pruning the roots each time. The major portion of the trees are Lisbon lemons, citrons and limes, with some few oranges and mandarins. The trees in all stages of growth are remarkably free from blight or insect pests, and the deep green leaves testify to healthy and vigorous growth. These trees are being grown because Mr. Torazzi contends that fruits that can be manufactured must be the most profitable to raise, as if only table fruits are cultivated the market must soon be filled and consequently prices must go down. Other trees are – date palm, apple, pear, peach, figs, nectarines, &c. Mr. Torazzi does not hope much from the apple or pear, the winter not being cold enough, but thinks they might be acclimatized after a few years. He is a great advocate of manure, both liquid and solid, and goes to great trouble and expense to procure all possible. There can be no farming, he says, without manure, no matter how fertile the soil. On 6 V Mr. Torazzi has eight acres cleared and surrounded with a lime hedge. This area is planted with lemons, citrons and limes. Vines are being experimented upon and promising satisfactory results. As showing what thorough cultivation will do Mr. Torazzi showed me a pine-apple plant of enormous size and of the prickly variety. It bore fruit more than a foot long, and was double the size of its little brother a short way off which had been planted at the same time as the one under notice, but had been left to its own sweet will to thrive or not as it liked. A wild banana plant is also being experimented upon. But for the seeds, the flavour of the wild banana is excellent, and there is no reason why it cannot be educated, by cultivation, into bearing fruit the same as the ordinary varieties. The soil here is a clayey one. A peculiar feature of the selection if that the old bed of the river can be traced right through it, and unmistakable signs of the presence of water hundreds of years ago can be observed in the soil.

My next trip led me up the river, but before I go further I should like to mention the hospitality

extended to me by the selectors around. In fact I am generally puzzled to know which place I shall stop at, but wherever it is I am always sure of a welcome. My personal thanks are due to Mr. Davidson for his kindness in accompanying me on my visits around. Without someone who knows the lay of the place it is next to impossible to find many without very great loss of time. I am speaking now of the selections past the end of the second section where neighbours are miles apart – where roads exist not – and all around is scrub. Here without a guide he who is a stranger is doomed to roam up and down timber tracks, blackfellows tracks, or any tracks but those which lead to habitation unless he is lucky enough to hit one. On this and other trips as I before stated, I was accompanied by Mr. Davidson who piloted the way in a more expeditious manner than I could have hoped for. The soil does not improve by any means higher up the river. Most part is very young scrub and light forest. The scrub has evidently but recently encroached upon the forest and all along forest trees are seen in the scrub. It is undeniably good country though, and after being cleared it is again covered with young trees and multitudes of weeds and vines in a very few months. Some of the land that has been cleared and left has saplings eight feet high all over it, and the axe has to be brought to bear upon it. The timber here is hickory, beech, bloodwood, a variety resembling bloodwood, silky oak and silk wood. These latter are beautiful woods for building purposes. Oaks also grow in plenty, and there is an extremely hard yellow wood which is very useful. Any amount of creeks find their way through this country to the river, so water is abundant. After traversing a mile or two of tracks cut by the selectors themselves, we reached the selection of Mr. Shearers. This selector has only lately taken up the land which had been forfeited and thrown open again. He is engaged in the construction of a sawn-timber house for himself and family. It is really a nice looking residence on 7 ft (2.1 metres) blocks with a hip roof of iron. Not including the verandahs it will have, the house is 24 ft (6.6 metres) by 14 ft (4.2 metres) and will, when finished, present an appearance equal to a fashionable town residence, being put together in a workmanlike manner and match boards and weather boards used on the walls. The frame work is of silky oak, a beautiful wood to work in, and the boarding of pine. All the wood was pit sawn in the scrub and carried out. Ten acres was cleared by Mr. Shearers' predecessor, but it is

almost entirely grown over with high weeds and burrs. This selector intends going in for grape vines, oranges, quinces and figs at present, and has a few on trial. Cherry guavas, and mangoes have also been put in. The newly made track from middle Crossing to Welcome Pocket passes Mr. Shearers' place.

Further on is the selection of Mr. Jack Russell. This pioneer is the oldest resident in the "interior," if I can use the term. The selections now under notice are neither on the main Thornborough road or on the course of the railway, but lie between – away back in the never-never country. Here Mr. Russell stuck for three years without roads and far away from the nearest neighbour. He has the largest clearing around, 40 acres of scrub having been felled and burned. All this is planted more or less with grass, and the undergrowth, which will spring up if left but a few weeks, will be brushed and destroyed shortly. Here Mr. Russell is putting up a sawn timber residence the same as Mr. Shearers, only on 2 ft blocks instead of 7 ft. A big place this for a bachelor! It will have two 7 ft verandahs. The walls are 12 ft high giving very lofty rooms. The most serious item in building here is the iron which costs pretty heavily to pack up from Kamerunga to the Middle Crossing and then on to the ground. An acre and a half has been enclosed with a fence of posts and four wires.

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How to Cook a Tiger

Tiger. This sounds quite simple but in fact it is not as easy as one may think.

There is no easy way to catch Tigers, fresh otherwise, in fact any contemporary chef will acknowledge that the catching of Tigers is fraught with problems.

According to Tony Roberts there are no longer any problems, just solutions. I must remember to ask Tony what is his favourite solution to the non-existent problem of catching of a fresh Tiger.

And fresh it must be–I will not have it any other way. If you have ever had the experience of dining on a stale dish of Tiger, and I must say here that it matters not one iota which sauce you use, whether it is the Indian Bengali recipe or the Guan Mushroom Sauce with Pink Peppers or even the New Yorker (not the magazine, the sauce), your Tiger must be fresh.

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Food for Mood

Almost all of us have experienced 'being depressed' at least sometimes, especially in wet weather when everything seems dark and gloomy. We might just feel a little bit down and out for a short time, but there are also those of us who suffer from severe depression for very long periods. When we are in a good mood, we are happy; in a depressed mood we feel sad or angry and extremely negative. Moods affect the way we look at the world around us.

There are lots of reasons why a person might be depressed and it is far too complex to go into it at any depths. For the sake of this article we will be looking at it from a nutritional point of view only. The fact is that our emotional response is very closely related to our brain's health and chemistry. Neurotransmitters such as Serotonin and Dopamine which regulate mood, are made from amino acids which in turn we have to get from food.

These chemical pathways require vitamins and minerals as cofactors for their normal functioning and almost every vitamin or mineral deficiency can cause psychiatric symptoms such as depression, anxiety, irritability, low stress tolerance etc. Deficiencies in B Vitamins, especially folic acid cause low serotonin levels in the brain.

There are also certain substances in food such as preservatives, colourings and additives that can cause reactions such as fatigue, headaches, anxiety, irritability and depression.

When depressed, we often reach for junk foods, lots of coffee, sugary things or any kind of 'Uppers' we can put our hands on to make us feel better. Just remember, what goes up has got to come down! Over-use of coffee, black tea and colas are powerful stimulants that over stress the body, depleting Vitamin B and in the long run the adrenals. All these things, including alcohol and drugs will make us feel better only for a short time and exacerbate things in the long term.

It is not easy without other tests to determine if and who might be lacking what, but here is a small guide of possible signs for lack of Serotonin.

Serotonin deficiency: depressed, nervous, fearful, worrying, thinking about the same thing over and over again, crave sugar/carbohydrates, feel worse in rainy weather, chronic pain (headache, backache), obsessive compulsive tendency, family history of alcoholism, ADD.

Serotonin is synthesized from the amino acid Tryptophan, which is also available as a supplement. As far as food goes, the highest amount of Serotonin is found in walnuts. It is also found in pineapples, bananas, plums, buckwheat and tomatoes.

Tryptophan is a precursor of Serotonin. The best sources of that are high-protein foods such as dairy, free range chicken and eggs, beef and turkey. Whey powder is excellent and so is cottage cheese, soya protein and peanuts. Our brain is largely made of fatty acids, so don't forget the good oils (fish oil, flax seed, olive oil etc.). They are very important for our nervous system.

Besides being on a healthy diet, I recommend taking supplements like a good Multi Vitamin, an extra B-Complex and possibly L-Tryptophan. There are also very good herbal treatments for depression, anxiety and lack of sleep such as 'St John's Wort', Passion flower and many others. Ask in the health food store.

Last, but not least, from my own experience, another fantastic thing to combat the 'blues' is exercise! Playing sport, cycling, running, swimming, yoga, dancing or just simply walking on a regular basis will help to produce some happy pheromones.

Keep smiling, there will be a rainbow at the end (when the rain stops!) In Health and Harmony...



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
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The Perrys of Foodworks

EVERYONE IN KURANDA is aware of the opening of the big new Foodworks store in Kuranda Village just before the cyclone. But not so many of us know about the owners of this business, the ones who have accepted such a significant challenge, both financially and otherwise. So **Ray and Colinda Perry**, the owners, deserve to be profiled in this column

Ray and Colinda have been in Kuranda since 2004 after moving up from Mission Beach. They bought the old Supermarket in Coondoo Street in that year and moved to live in Kuranda permanently. But as the business progressed, it soon became clear that the premises were too small. A much better service was required for Kuranda. So they began looking for a large enough property in Kuranda that could be used as a much expanded supermarket. They finally settled upon the vacant property on the corner of Thongon Street and Thooree Street, the site of the new Supermarket. With the assistance of Foodworks and a financier, plans were prepared and the building erected. Then there was the move

from the old site to the new. Ray says it was a hectic time, involving running the old store until the new one was ready, finishing the building, training the staff, installing the fittings and facilities and stocking up the new shop. It involved long hours of work.

Finally they opened the new store not long before the recent cyclone. Everything went reasonably well, so much so that they were open the very morning after the cyclone. They have been open every day since, 12 hours a day, 7 days a week. There have been some shortages in supplies due to the wet weather, but fortunately they were well stocked before the cyclone came. They now have 36 staff on a three-part roster; a major employer in the Kuranda region. The turnover has improved, perhaps not as much as Ray and Colinda would like, but they have plans to improve this. This includes a fuel voucher system of four cents per litre credited to customers on production of the voucher at the checkout on purchases at the store of \$30 or more, and a 5% discount scheme for March (and possibly later months) on purchases at the store of \$30 or more (other than cigarettes). Customers now have air-conditioned comfort in which to shop, underground parking with covered access and trolley ramp, an ATM and a deli. Les, the butcher, sells his meats within

the store. There is seven times the space of the old Store.

Ray, himself, is a country lad. He was brought up in Mission Beach. His father had a small cane farm. Ray took an apprenticeship in boilermaking at the Tully Mill in 1980, and stayed on at the Mill as a boilermaker and pressure welder. It was hot, confined work, but he stuck with it. He met Colinda in Mission Beach. She came from Melbourne and was a dental nurse. They had a nice home on the beach and have had two children. But they decided they needed a change. Ray had come to Kuranda on and off since he was a youth, and liked the area. They were used to the warmer, wetter climate, and they like the quiet of the rainforest but still with the facility of Cairns city being so close by. They looked into various possibilities, and eventually decided to purchase the old supermarket business. They have not regretted the move, although it has been very hard work. A few years ago they were married here.

They are quiet, retiring people by nature. The pressure of work does not leave much time for outside activities,

so everything tends to revolve around the business and family. They believe in supporting the local community and are members of a number of organisations in the area. Through the business they have supported two Cassowary rugby teams and other sports groups, the Ambulance Service, SES, the Amphitheatre, Bike Show, Pony Club, Pre-School and other non-profit organisations. Their plastic bag levy helps support the SES, BatReach and others. They have donated some of the equipment from the old store to good causes. But they have far more requests for help than they can respond to. Their emphasis remains on the local community, of which they feel a part.

Ray says that the mural proposed on the rear wall of the new Store cannot now proceed on Council's orders. Several pensioner cottages are planned to be built between the Store and the Library parking area. And the drainage problem onto Thooree Street is to be fixed by the Council as part of the development.

Whatever one thinks about the architecture of the new Store, both it and the Perrys are an asset to the Village and to the region.

Thank you to Georgia Bruce who contributed to the project by doing the cover artwork and the many others who supplied photos, stories and letters of support.


The Kuranda library supported the project by purchasing some books, one of which is available for loan.

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Cairns Beaches

Nation wide on an annual basis, 2010 recorded the lowest level of dwelling sales activity of any year during the past decade. Home buyers are deserting the property market in the wake of recent natural disasters with latest figures showing the biggest monthly slide on record. The weather crises in Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria in December and January have kept home buyers sidelined, with property values slipping

While the natural disasters occurred in three states, its impact on the property market has spread across the nation.

The disasters kept people out of the market, particularly in Brisbane. But it also impacted on potential buyers in other states because they holiday in Queensland or they have family and friends there.

"Why are there are so many properties for sale in Kuranda?" This is a question that is asked frequently. Based on area population (Source: Census 2006) the properties that are for sale at the moment in the Kuranda region (Source: realestate.com.au) represents a moderate level that allows comparison with most suburbs at the Northern Beaches with the exception of Palm Cove and Trinity Park, where the quantity of For Sale properties is considerably higher. Port Douglas tops it all; there the amount of properties For Sale in relation to the population is multiple times higher.

In regard to Kuranda's property market, I am convinced that nothing at all is lost; the demand for properties has not ceased, it's just delayed. With the Far North drying up soon, more properties will come onto the market and buyers will show up in larger numbers again and I predict a very comfortable rise in property sales.

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- All mosquitoes prefer undisturbed air and dark areas
- Install and maintain tight-fitting fly screens at all doors and windows
- Do not use blue lights or blue plastic tarpaulins (Is it true mosquitoes love blue?)
- During the wet season, spray insect repellent or insecticide, under and inside all furniture
- Repair or replace leaking plumbing pipes and taps
- Drain holes: spray insecticide or cooking oil on top of standing

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• Mosquito Zappers or Mosquito carbon dioxide attractants – Research this yourself.

PERSONAL PROTECTION

- No screens at the windows? Then shut windows and spray your rooms. Use mosquito nets for sleeping and apply insect repellent on your body. If worried about babies and children and there are no flyscreens, make temporary door/ window screens using terylene curtain material and secure with masking tape
- Before bedtime, spray home made repellent or commercial insecticide in the room and wait a while before entering the room
- Burn mosquito coils if it's safe to do so. But not around babies, toddlers, sick or elderly people or pets! Why? Because scientific research says Asian brands contain a cancer causing agent!
- Buy a locally made mosquito coil holder that actually holds broken bits. http://tinyurl.com/4w3j6pj
- When sleeping use a ceiling fans to disturb the air and prevent them landing on your body
- Around BBQ areas, ponds, sun lounges and relaxation areas or when entertaining, put a desk fan on the floor, the circulating air disturbs them around your legs and ankles. Or buy a battery operated hand fan
- Wear long sleeves clothing, long trousers but this is no guarantee, they will bite through thin cotton material
- Avoid wearing dark clothing or brightly coloured clothing, perfumes and hairsprays, these attracts mosquitoes
- Apply insect repellent regularly to exposed areas. i.e. hands, arms, feet, ankles, legs, your back, neck and hair
- Do not spray or apply repellent around eyes or mouth, to open wounds, or apply repellent to babies' hands
- Do not re-apply if a rash or irritation occurs
- Do not scratch insect bites they may become infected and need more treatment.

- Yes, Natural or home made repellents are easily made, but care must be taken if you are allergic to some oils
- Home made creams don't last long and must be reapplied every 20 minutes. Do not spray or apply repellent around eyes or mouth.

Babies & Children

- DEET is unsuitable for babies under 2 months of age.
- Repeated use of repellents over several days is not recommended, especially for pregnant women and children.
- Anaphylactic shock following mosquito bites is rare, but it has been reported.
- For babies and children highly allergic to insect bites and stings, parents must always carry anti-histamine creams.
- Use mosquito netting over your child's stroller, bassinette or bed.
- Mask their body scent to deter mosquitoes from landing on them.
- Dress children in light-coloured clothing
- Do not apply to open wounds
- \bullet Do not spray or apply repellent around eyes or mouth
- Do not apply repellent to babies' hands
- Do not re-apply if a rash or irritation occurs.

MOSQUITO BITE RELIEF

- Aloe Vera gel, banana skin, and pawpaw soothe the itchy bites

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

often get told. "Oh you don't know what it feels like. You have never experienced anything like what I have being going through" is a not an uncommon reaction from people who have been facing up to tragedy in some shape or form. We can try to sympathise. We can try to draw on our own experiences or observations but sometimes they just don't connect with the experience someone is facing. What they need is someone who can draw alongside them who will be able to sympathise and to fully understand. Even as a Priest I sometimes find myself at a loss in such situations. I know, however, that I can point them to God as someone who will understand and with whom they can share their feelings.

Jesus is at the right hand of God interceding for us, St Paul reminds us in Romans 8, and he is someone who in his life here on earth experienced suffering in many of its forms. At his birth he was a refugee, as his family fled to Egypt. He faced up to temptation in all its forms – and faced that temptation to the full, because, unlike us, he did not give in to it. During his ministry he experienced misunderstanding and persecution. His followers were slow to understand him, his enemies quick to attack him. He was even rejected by his own family who labelled him a mad-man. He experienced hunger and thirst, poverty and homelessness. He knew grief as he wept at the death of his friend Lazarus. There's quite a few of the pressures we face in that list.

However, it is in his 'Passion' that we see Jesus plumb the depths of human suffering. Over the next few weeks we turn our eyes upon the cross of Jesus and the arrest and trials which led up to it. There he experienced betrayal by one of his followers. All his friends ran away, leaving him to face the music alone. He was falsely arrested, accused and condemned after a rigged trial. He was abused, mocked and mistreated. He faced physical agonies - beaten and scourged, nailed to a cross - his mobility taken away, feet and hands nailed to a cross, fighting for every last breath as he hung there, until his heart gave up. He even experienced the spiritual pain of feeling deserted by God. (He was bearing the judgement of God on our sin, a judgement that came between him and the Father with whom he had always lived in perfect fellowship.) Physical, mental, spiritual, emotional pain Jesus experienced them all.

Whatever our problem we can take it to Jesus. We can be assured of his understanding and of his love. His death and resurrection enable us to know God's love and presence in our lives. Having dealt with the judgement of our sin, the barriers between us and God have been broken down. God can come into our lives. Jesus is Risen from the dead, he is alive for evermore. He has overcome all the evils of this world. There is hope for the future where sin, sickness and sorrow will all be done away. That gives us hope for the future but now we can know he is there for us. It is to this Jesus that we can turn in prayer. We can be sure that he understands and cares. Those around us may not understand our troubles but Jesus can. His life, death and resurrection are a guarantee of that.

TRC Sport and Recreation Officer appointed: With some State funding assistance, Council has appointed a Sport and Recreation Officer. Christine Leet has commenced in the new regional role and will focus on strategic directions for regional sport and recreation initiatives and assistance and advice to sport and recreation organisations.

Fallon Road Jum Rum Causeway: We were all saddened at the recent tragedy and condolences to family and friends. Council has immediately undertaken a Safety Assessment and Compliance Audit of the crossing and approaches. The crossing meets FNQ/ Safety standards, however, given the large number of vehicles that now use Fallon Road, some works may be undertaken. A report will be presented to the next Council meeting for consideration.

Be my friend on Facebook?: I have my "trainer wheels" on and am trying to improve my "facebooking' and hope to post regularly with news, updates, information from Council etc. If you are a Facebook user, please let me know so that we can be Facebook friends. Gravel Road Reseal Program: Last week Council signed off on the Gravel Road Re-Sheet Program. Works will be undertaken on the following local roads: Black Mountain Road, Oak Forest Road, LA Road, Fantin Road, Cedar Park Road and Kanervo Road.

Kuranda Parking and Traffic Review: Work on the Kuranda Parking/ Traffic Study has commenced. The study is now in the early planning stages; the major outcome will be improvements in the current arrangements for parking, traffic and pedestrian movements within the Kuranda Village area. Some of the key issues already identified are parking and traffic movements near the Post Office and Foodworks, loading zones, disabled zones, parking for workers, parking on Coondoo St., coach and bus parking and set down, traffic movement, signage, pedestrian access and regulated parking areas. Feedback on other issues is very welcome. Council has funds in the Kuranda Parking Reserves to support future changes. In the meantime, current parking regulations in Kuranda do still apply.

Roadworks: Barang Street will unfortunately be closed for some time as restoration works need to be undertaken. The area is closed due to safety concerns and subsidence of the road. Sealing work at the end of Speewah Road is expected to commence in early May. Council has also prepared some design work for formalising the current bus turnaround area near the Speewah shop and tavern.

Community Planning Meetings in Speewah and Koah: The Koah and Speewah meetings were very well attended by local residents and there was a lot of discussion about the direction for the next 10 years. This will feed into Council's new 10 Year Community Plan (a requirement of all Councils to guide Council plans and budgets over the next 10 years). More information and a summary of the workshop ideas are shown on the TRC Community Planning Facebook page. You can still contribute your comments and ideas either via Facebook (search "Tablelands Regional Council" on Facebook), or by emailing joyw@trc.qld.gov.au. Further Community Workshops will be held on these dates: Kuranda on Tuesday June 28th (6pm start) and Tuesday June 14th (indigenous community workshop). There will also be a stall outside the **Post** Office all day on Friday 8th April.

Speewah Digital Television Switchover: Council has agreed to upgrade the Re-Transmission site at Speewah so that residents will be able to access digital TV services when the analogue is turned off towards the end of this year. Without this arrangement, each resident would need to apply directly to the commonwealth government and pay the required charge (approx \$400 per television set). Council will consult further with Speewah residents regarding the "switchover" and the costing. It is anticipated that the cost will now be less than \$100 per residence (regardless of however many television sets). Details will be available at the Speewah Residents Association Meeting mid year.

RLCIP Projects: Design work has started for projects in Round 3 of the Commonwealth Funds for Community Infrastructure. The Kowrowa playground project with walking access on Myola Rd is currently being discussed with the local community at Kowrowa. Lights for the Speewah tennis courts are on the way!

Water Main Cleaning Program in Kuranda: As

a part of the regular maintenance program on water supplies, the water mains cleaning (air scouring) was carried out recently in the Kuranda area. All residents should have received a notice prior to the cleaning program commencing.

Extension to Kuranda Visitors Centre: The architects have been appointed and initial planning meetings have been held. Preliminary designs have already been considered by volunteers at the Centre and the promise of more space and better facilities has volunteers very excited. Works on the current Visitors Centre will be funded through the Kuranda Infrastructure funding program.

International Women's Day March 8th: This year's event was held in Atherton with Prof Sandra Harding as Guest Speaker. Next year, I hope to see this regional event in Kuranda.

Consultation Community for Kuranda Community Precinct: Newsletters went out to all households last week, to introduce Michelle Feenan who is undertaking the consultation. Please have your say on your vision for the use and direction of the old school site. The consultation will continue through until May. Please email pat@engagementplus.com.au or phone 3368 3008 if you have comments, questions, and ideas. More details will be coming out soon regarding how you can be involved either in person, online or by mail. A wide range of consultation methods will be used, so that everyone can have their say. Myrtle Rust: A serious fungal disease caused by Uredo rangelii that effects plants in the Myrtaceae family has been detected in Cairns. This impacts common Australian native plants such as eucalyptus, tea trees, paperbarks, bottlebrushes and lilypillies. The disease can cause deformation of leaves, heavy defoliation of branches, dieback, stunted growth and plant death. Based on experience in Queensland and New South Wales, myrtle rust is spreading quickly. Weather takes its toll on road network

Council is aware that heavy rainfall has affected our roads and other infrastructure over the past few months. Council has approved a \$1 million gravel re-sheet program for 41 roads to date, and is currently preparing a submission to the Federal funding body (NDRRA) for an estimated \$50 million of works that are needed to repair and restore our region's transport network.

Residents who have concerns or issues with roads and drainage infrastructure in their area should submit a Customer Request, through either the website or by calling 1300 362 242 to register these issues.

While Council cannot attend to all the works required in the short-term, they will be listed on Council's works schedule and be undertaken as soon as possible.

Clearly at this stage of the wet season the emphasis is on dealing with emergent works issues essentially aimed at making roads safe.

Preparation and approval of the restoration submission is expected to take 5-6 months to complete and priority will be given to Council's higher order roads. The majority of works will be constructed using the services of appropriately skilled contractors. Council has a number of weather affected capital projects underway and works on these will recommence as soon as weather

ACTION PLAN aimed at saving energy and costs

Adjustments to the energy tariff on several Councilowned facilities have resulted in a saving of \$33,540 in just one year.

The change to the more economical tariff was made after an an audit was carried out in 2009 as part of Council's commitment to reduce energy consumption and costs. The savings are being held in a reserve account and will be returned where possible back to the facilities via climate change initiatives such as energy efficient lighting, water saving devices, public education, and so

Council's commitment to reducing its energy use is part of the TRC Sustainability Action Plan which is aimed at reducing Council's greenhouse gas emissions, with a strong focus on reducing fuel and electricity consumption, and therefore, associated costs.

take advantage of your RATES DISCOUNT

More than 23,000 ratepayers have until close of business on Tuesday, 5 April to pay their half-yearly Rates Notice in full and receive a 10 per cent discount on the general rates portion of the account.

The notice contains all charges including general rates, water access, water consumption, the State fire levy, and applicable waste and sewerage charges.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said he recognised the difficulty people had paying their rates and other charges and encouraged them to contact Council immediately if they were experiencing

"The message is 'don't wait until it's too late' - people should call Council and make an arrangement to pay if they are having problems," he said.

Pensioners should be aware that they may be

eligible for a Queensland State Government Rate Subsidy. This 20% rebate allows for up to a maximum rebate amount of \$180 per annum.

All applications are to be completed and lodged at Tablelands Regional Council Service Centres. Please note when applying for remission, all applicants are required to present their relevant pension card/s for copying by a Council officer.

Ratepayers can pay via a number of options: paying in person at any Australia Post Office; phoning 13 18 16 at any time of day to pay by credit card; going to www.trc.qld.gov.au to pay via credit card; using Australia Post Billpay (www.postbillpay.com.au), or going to one of Council's service centres. Ratepavers are advised to make their payment 3-5 days prior to the discount date to ensure they do not miss out on their discount.

Changed Traffic Conditions: Windy Hollow Road, Kuranda

A section of Windy Hollow Road, Kuranda has been signed posted as having "Changed Traffic Conditions". Traffic is reduced to 40kmh along Windy Hollow Road, Kuranda. Due to recent weather events a section of Windy Hollow Road has failed and as a consequence Council has reduced this section to single lane traffic.

Motorists are requested to adhere to the directions shown on the signage installed at the site for the duration of the changed traffic conditions.

Green Waste Pick-up Nearly Completed: Free mulch available at waste transfer stations

Tablelands Regional Council has nearly completed the green waste pick-up after Cyclone Yasi, collecting 17,000 cubic metres from properties around the region.

Council has been picking up the waste for several weeks now, with 5500 truck loads collected over that time and deposited at waste transfer stations.

The waste has been transformed into mountains of mulch being offered to residents for free at any of Council's waste transfer stations.

With this in mind, the recent QCWA variety concert was a great success, raising \$11,500.00 for cyclone and flood relief in Queensland. It was an enjoyable afternoon with many local artists giving their time freely to help others. There was also a Charity Golf Day that raised \$16,018.50 for cyclone relief. As mentioned before, 100% of all monies donated through the QCWA Rural Crisis Fund is distributed where needed.
