This paper is for us all and the more community members use it for their news and views the more interesting it will become.



The Environment Shop in Coondoo St is a welcome addition to Kuranda... stimulating interest in preserving Kuranda's remaining vestiges of Rainforest flora and fauna. The majority of our Mareeba Shire Councillors do not care a hoot for our environment. The

devastation of fan paims etc for the Saddle Mountain subdivision is appalling. A Green Party candidate, John Felan, is standing for Barron River (which includes Kuranda) in the forthcoming Queensland State elections. Maybe Green support in Parliament could halt such tragedies as the Rainbow Harbour development.

Many residents dread the prospect of Sky Rail. If we do not fight what will be left of our precious environment. Thousands more tourists will cost us higher rates to maintain the town streets and toilets unless a tourist levy comes in very soon. Let's fight against every subdivion of small acreages. There is tree devastation and danger of many ,many septic tanks with effluent going into waterways. I remember nigh on twenty years ago attending a mass protest meeting in Barron Falls Road. It was Kuranda's first subdivision and we battled unsuccessfully to have the blocks made a minimum of 5 acres. The Council won with one acre lots.

As a resident of many year's standing I remember the plans for a Sound Shell (afterwards called the Amphitheatre) to be made in our quiet rural village. RE: Landscaping and Walking Paths in Kuranda. I would like to extend my appreciation to the Council for the landscaping recently completed along the Barron River frontage. The walk along the riverbank has been very much enhanced, with access from both the station and at the bridge behind the market. I assume that there are plans to complete the school end of the walk to provide easier access-termination at that end

The riverbank park and walking area is, unfortunately, little known to Australian or overseas visitors to Kuranda, I would suggest that this 'attraction' be more widely advertised and sign posted in order that more people benefit from this beautiful habitat which is part of the natural appeal of the village of Kuranda. A suggested circle walk taking in the riverbank and the town could be posted near the train station. Indications as to the variety of flora and fauna to be found could be posted along the walk. Thanks are also due for the much awaited refurbishment of Barang St, at the entrance of the village. I regret, however, that a footpath along Barang St, linked to the walkway in the rainforest along Rob Vievers Drive, was not included. This would have provided an extension to one of the few (the only?) walking paths in Kuranda, linking it to the "Jungle Walk" and beyond At the same time, it would have made walking along Barang St less dangerous. The confusion of visitors misled downstairs to the carpark and the underneath 'bazear' gives a bad name to the Kuranda destination as a whole

No doubt the idea is to jump the business queue by shortening the distance between the railway station and a new Kuranda 'markets'. The town works best with the railway at one end and the legal Kuranda Markets at the other, with every single business in between getting a chance at the passing pedestrian trade. For this reason, the new Far Away Tree shopping complex near the station should be pressured into dropping the word Market yes, with a capital M) from its promotion in the Visitors Guide.

Last month's committee meeting was taken up with obtaining long term professional planning for Kuranda. We are awaiting news from the Federal Dept of Local Government as to whether our submission 'Kuranda: Everybody's Place 'which seeks "innnovative ideas towards a positive environmental, economic, social and cultural future" for every person living in Kuranda will be funded. This project would be step one in planning for suitable land use and sustainable development in Kuranda. We are also conferring with Council on the proposed tourism levy: anyone having received their rates bill will agree the community can no longer afford to subsidise the tourism industry to the extent it has been. But the levy is not an answer in itself: the first objective of the levy would be to initiate a very much needed study into the needs of Kuranda well into the future and set guidelines for suitable, sustainable development. The committee is adamant that this study must consult with the Kuranda community and take into account community concerns

John Felan from the Green Party (sitting for Barron River) joined the last meeting and it was obvious that the huge challenge to preserve and protect environment and lifestyle in Kuranda was brought home to him. He addressed the meeting on these issues and passed on information about UNESCO's Global BioRegions: these areas (hundreds worldwide) are part of UNESCO's Man and the Environment program. Kuranda may well qualify for listing. Details contact John Felan 553368.

Of great concern is the loss of streetscape and character in the Village. The Consultative Group urges you to express your support for preservation and protection of our heritage. Also it was decided to ask Council to advertise propsed developments etc in the Cairns POst not just the Advertiser.

We are awaiting the Strategic Plan in Kuranda and urge you to view it carefully and respond in writing. This is vital as it will dictate future planning. Written support for the current DCP and updating of same is also vital to long term planning.



AROUND THE RIDGES

The Strategic Plan for the Shire of Moreebo will be on display for 60 days at the Shire Office from 1.8.92. The Kuranda display dates have not yet been finalised.

The Mareeba Shire Council has not adhered to the guidelines of the Kuranda Development Control Plan of 1984. The Strategic Plan will have to be adhered to in conjunction with the Town Planning scheme for the Mareeba Shire and will specify future dominant land use. All residents may participate in the decision making process by studying the map and reading the supporting information. Councillars are available for assistance.

DVERVIEW.

The last financial year saw many goals achieved by council. We limited programmes to ensure that the Budget was not exceeded. The general fund (all divisions.) had a substantial credit balance which was taken into consideration when providing a balanced budget for 1992/1993. All minor funds had satisfactory credit balances, except for the Kuranda benefitted area and the Kuranda water scheme, which had small overdrafts at 30th June, 1992.

The Trust fund ended the year with a substantial credit balance. During the year there were a number of new initiatives made by the Commonwealth and State Governments in relation to. Health & Safety, Building Acts, Environment and Planning, Freedom of Information, World Heritage, Regional Planning and Accounting Standards.

JOB SKILLS.

Expenditure provided: Division 1 \$2,000 Division 2 \$10,000 Division 4 \$3,000 AGED PERSONS COTTAGES.

Four cottages have been completed Two of these will be permanently available to listed RSL applicants.

RATE INCREASE.

Rates have been increased by 6% - many areas which are now being settled need better roads and services and work cannot be undertaken this year without these additional funds.

Sewerage charges were reduced by 10%, there was an increase in water charges to offset last

years budget deficit.
PUBLIC HALL - LIBRARY RESERVE FUND.


Credit balance of \$171,869 which will earn approx. \$10,000 interest in 92/93.

GENERAL FUND.

Division 4 rates arrears as at 15.6.92 were \$70,713 & interest owing \$6,014.

COUNCILLORS ALLOWANCES.

Councillors were paid travelling expenses and set allowances for attended meetings, inspections, seminars, public function etc that have been minuted by Council resolution. All other inspections, meetings and travel were at a Councillors own expense. As your local representative my total allowances for the last financial year amounted to just over \$9,000 plus travelling expenses.

Despite our short and relatively mild winter arthritic joints still make their presence felt. A common form of arthritis is osteoarthritis which is the slow disintegration of cartilage in a joint. Here are some ways to decrease the load on our joints:-

*avoid being overweight

*do specific exercises to increase the range of movement in tight joints

*use a bed which is firm but still able to support body curves and a pillow which can be moulded to support the neck.


*place a pillow under knees when legs are straight in sitting or lying

*if a certain activity/position gives you pain use your imagination to modify the situation rather than persist in pain.







HELLO EVERYONE IN KURANDA,

A LETTER FROM AMERICA

I'm writing to you from Lochern Girls Camp in Vermont, America. I'm spending two months here as a Camp Counsellor and Snorkeling Instructor to girls spending their summer holiday at Lochearn. The camp setting is beautiful. Woods all around a picturesque lake, very quiet and peaceful. Really lovely. We are approximately 30 minutes from the nearest town about the same distance as Cairns is from Kuranda. I am in a cabin with eight 13-14 year olds and am responsible for their happiness and well-being. The other counsellors are multi-cultural, all from English speaking countries so we have some interesting discussions when we all get

I am the main snorkeling instructor, I had to learn to drive a boat to take my students to interesting parts of the lake e.g. beaver dams. I have four lessons each day two lifeguard duties each week and night patrol once a week. I have one free day each week but I'm so exhausted from my working week I have very litle energy to go anywhere. Teaching a class is a lot harder than I expected however we all seem to have a lot of fun. I'm picking up a lot of American slang. Everything is "neat" "awesome" "regular". They have condy instead of Tollies and cookies instead of biscuits. One thing I have no intention of following is their addiction to peanut butter. I'm getting sick of the number of foods containing peanut butter many kids even eat their vegetable sticks dipped in it Carrot, celery, capsicum the lot - Yuk! Apart from that the food at camp is very good very healthy, plenty of fruit and vegetables I'm going to leave this camp much heavier than I started. I'm eating so much. I am having a marvellous time in Carlsbad Caverns in New Mexico where I stayed overnight. The coverns are incredible! Next stop was New Orleans where I had a fantastic time. The French Quarter was amazing, the swamps beautiful but spooky and the Jazz Clubs incredible. I had a ball! From there I went to Richmond Virginia where I spent a week with a penfriend and then on to camp. I finish here at the end of August. I intend to sight-see around this area before travelling by train across Canada finishing in Seattle America where I start a two week organized tour through the Rocky Mountains including Yellowstone National Park and the Grand Canyon finishing in Los Angeles. Back to my starting place then home to Australia.

I can recommend this experience to any one wishing to experience life in America, it's a fantastic way to have a paid holiday.

The bright sunshine and the cold nights were great for winter vegies. Nasty insects disappeared and with water and nourishment plants grew well. If you grow cabbages (hopefully we shall have more sunny winter) either buy plants or plant seeds in boxes and transplant when approximately three inches high This also applies to broccoli as the roots need to go deep. Quick growing cobbages suit Kuranda best. Broccoli you should cut out the centre just before the flower opens. You should then have a good mass of flowers to cut and more flowers will grow from the cut stalks. Broccoli has wonderful food value if cooked in a deep saucepan with the stem in water. The flowers cook in the steam from the boiling water.

Earlier I mentioned the Japanese green Senposai - very hardy and growing madly. As instructed on the packet I planted my seeds where they were to grow. Directions said pull and eat when young

I transplanted some, contrary to instructions. They were slow to take off but the result was terrific They are like outside cabbage leaves, very useful for poultry and my dog gets a big cup of very finely chopped leaves mixed with his row mince, grated coconut and bananas. Lettuce has done well, so well that with this the recent moist sunless weather some of my beautiful lettuce rotted (slugs). I should have cut some of the outside leaves off to give the hearts more air and spaces. Lettuce, unlike cabbage and broccoli, can be planted by seed where they are to grow. They must then be thinned out. I neglected to thin mine out sufficiently and the bed was not raised enough


Celery has done well. Keeping the light away from the stalks thicken when you cut the mature stalks at the base. The plants should continue producing till October with food and moisture. Questions to me via a the Kuranda newsagent. They will be answered in these notes.





The Tenth Muse - An occasional article devoted to Food and Wine

There are writers who write about food and there are Foodwriters. And there was M.F.K. Fisher, who has died June 22, 1992, at the age of 83. To her friends she was Mary Frances and to other food critics, she was the author of The Art of Eating which has become the food critics' bible. Fisher's gift. learnt as a young Californian living in France during the twenties was to transform cuisine into "a focused love of life".

In The Gastronomical Me she wrote: "There is a communion of more than our bodies when bread is broken and wine is drunk. It's like a religion. If you have a glass of water and a crust of bread with somebody and you share it with them it is much more than just bread and water. I really believe that It's all very betraying, how we eat." Her five most famous books have been collected in 1963 and have been published by Picador as The Art of Eating. If you are at all interested in food and, as a bonus, in some of the finest prose, seek it out.

From How to Cook a Wolf here is one for those who love kidneys.

Kidneys in Sherry



watercress as garnish. M.F.K. Fisher comments: "this recipe I got from Spain, but it is the same everywhere. Different herbs are used, or lemon juice instead of sherry, or sour cream is put in at the last or a little brandy is poured in. In other words, you can do what you like, remembering always that kidneys have a strong pungent taste which needs to be curbed by the even stronger flavours of herbs and liquors." Try it!



We wish Tom all the best for the future. Contributed by Ray Wintour.









MODULVAL GLASS MAXING TECHNICIES

by Jim Francis


Stained glass windows in Northern Europe were made by a successful technique that has survived almost intact today. A painter and metal craftsman, Theoph-ilus, a German Monk wrote describing several medieval crafts including stained glass which was made in two ways:

The MUFF method - gathering a blob o molten glass on the end of his pipe the glass blower blew it into a ball and rolled the pipe till a long bubble or muft formed, cutting both ends of the muff and splitting it with a hot iron, then cooling and flattened in an enneeling oven to a sheet of glass about forty by sixty centimetres, about the size of today's handblown glass.

The Crown Method, not used much today. The molten glass bubble is twirled rather than swung to make a flattened disc about sixty centimetres in diameter.

Apart from the modern glass cutting wheel, electric soldering irons (instead of the heated iron rod), and machine rolled glass, glassmaking hasn't change much. Metallic salts or oxides added to the molten glass, with the impurities in the metals and silica produce the imperfections of colour that make the glass so dazzling. Glass coloured right through was called Pot metal. A thin layer of coloured glass covering clear glass during manufacture was called Flashed glass, both terms are used





BARCELONA

Site of the XXVth Olympiad A City Rich in History

Barcelona is the major Spanish port on the Mediterranean. It was probably named by the Barca family, the famous rulers of Carthage - its original name was Barcino. Tradition has it that Hamiltan Barca himself founded and named the city c.230 B.C., when he began to carve out a colony of Carthage in what is now Spain.

In the autumn of 218 B.C., Hannibal, Hamilcar's famous son, crossed the Iberus (now Ebro) River with 90,000 infantry, 12,000 cavalry and 37 African war elephants and marched via Barcelona into the Alps and on to Rome. The second Punic War had begun.

After this war, Barcelona fell under the domination of Rome and was named Colonia Faventia Julia Augusta Pia Barcino. It was later called Barjalünah by the Moors. After the domination of the Visigoth invaders (A.D. 415), Barcelona fell, around 717, under the power of the Islamic world. In 801 the Carolingian emperor Louis I the Pious expelled the Arabs and the Counts of Barcelona made themselves independent in the 10th and 11th centuries.

Epidemics of the plague decimated the population and brought a period of decline in the 14th century. Barcelona also lost political ground in 1442 when Naples replaced her as capitol of the Catalan-Aragonese Monarchy.

It was to Barcelona that Columbus returned triumphant after his first voyage to the New World. Here he was received by Ferdinand and Isabella. The Columbus monument towers 197 feet high in the Puerta de la Paz overlooking the port.

In the 19th century the city had to recover from the subjection under Napoleon, and after that, industrialisation got under way.

In the 20th century, Barcelona was the stronghold of the Catalonian separatist movement and, following the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War in 1936, became a centre of Republican strength. Its fall in January, 1939 led to the Republican government's final surrender. By the 1950's, Barcelona had again begun to prosper.

With a population of over 2 million inhabitants in Barcelona proper, it has one of the highest population densities in the world.

The Bus Fuss

Numerous complaints to the Council and Lesley Clark MLA by locals unable to pick up mail at the Post Office due to buses, has resulted in the following action—repainting the white lines, and a parking limit of 10 minutes on both sides of the Post Office Street. Police have been notified of the new parking limit, so beware not to get booked.

Council decided against signs designating the P.O. area for CARS ONLY, despite the fact that BUS ONLY areas already exist on all three sides of this block (as pictured). This means that buses may still block resident's access to their P.O. by parking on this fourth side of the block. This is made worse by the needs of hundreds of locals for quick turnover at this site to pick up mail, because we don't have a mail delivery service. Residents are urged to continue lobbying the Council in writing if unable to use our own town. A permanent solution for bus parking in Kuranda has yet to be established.




