



Rebranding Kuranda – Clarification

The Kuranda Traders Association (KTA) has received some comments regarding our previous updates in the last two editions of The Kuranda Paper, where we put a call out for expressions of interest (EOI) from community members interested in engaging in discussions about rebranding the 'tourist' aspect of Kuranda.

Whilst we have had no formal EOIs via email, it seems that there is a great misconception that the KTA wishes to rebrand from the current 'Village in the Rainforest' slogan.

To clarify, the concept of the rebranding of Kuranda was raised during many hours of interviews across a broad spectrum of participants including both residents and business owners. The outcomes of these interviews were collated into a report by Pinnacle Marketing who then presented it to the KTA. The data supporting these recommendations was then circulated amongst our members, Mareeba Shire Council (MSC), and the new Mareeba Local Tourism Organisation. The data is available on request to the KTA.

The KTA is happy to facilitate the process towards rebranding, but not without community consultation, hence the call out over the last editions of this paper.

The KTA will not engage in any discussions on Facebook or discuss one-on-one in person, as we like to ensure all discussions are minuted for consideration and discussion at our committee meetings.

Crawford's Corner

Dear Kuranda residents,

I hope everyone had a wonderful Easter break and now that school has resumed for term two, don't forget to slow down in school zones morning and afternoon and watch out for our children.

Next time you're passing the Henry Ross Lookout, you might consider checking out the new plaque commemorating the first crossing of the Kuranda Range by a motor vehicle. The journey, up what was the Old Smithfield Track, eventually paved the way for the Queensland Government to invest and build the Kuranda Range Road, opening up Kuranda and the region to tourism and economic development.

A new \$15 million initiative will be trialled in Cairns, Townsville and Mount Isa local government areas to help seniors with the cost of securing their homes. The initiative will help subsidise practical home security improvements such as strengthening window locks and shutters, installing CCTV cameras, and addressing other security weaknesses.

Assistance of up to \$10,000 (GST exclusive) per household will be available to eligible customers to undertake security works.

Finally, although you will notice ongoing maintenance and inspection works on and around the Barron River bridge, alternatives to the current method are being investigated to reduce the interruption to traffic. Importantly, we are expecting planning to be completed early next year for the long-term replacement, duplication, or upgrade of the bridge — the site has some very sensitive cultural and environmental factors to consider in addition to the complex nature of bridge engineering.

Djawarray, also known as uncle Bertie Riley, is a talented musician and songwriter hailing from Ngunbay (Kuranda) and born in Gimuy (Cairns). "Djawarray" means "thunderstorm" in Djabugay language, the voice of Gudju Gudju (The Rainbow Serpent). Djawarray's highly anticipated EP, titled *Binal*, will feature four original songs that share traditional knowledge and important messages from both his Djabugay and Western Yalanji heritage.

Djawarray has collaborated with Koahlition Reggae Band to bring ancestral First Nations songlines to the forefront, captivating audiences with songs that embody cultural identity and vitality. The EP's title, *Binal*, is the Western Yalanji term for "understand", however it has multiple meanings which cannot be described in language alone. Djawarray best describes *Binal* as "understanding your pathway, where you are from, and acknowledging the country you stand on. Listening, comprehending, thinking about, recognising, realising, and reconciling the law (l-o-r-e) of the land" (Riley, 2022).

Djawarray is well-regarded for his leadership of Mayi Wunba dance troupe and music among the local community, with powerful songlines that convey the emotion and spirit of the Dreamtime or The Dreaming. Djawarray's music passes down and pays respect to the stories of self, culture, values, symbols, information, and laws that were shared with him by his Elders through yarns, song and dance.

Supporters can also show their support by purchasing a CD, merchandise, streaming the music online, sharing, or donating.

The official launch will be held on Friday 26 May at the Kuranda Ampitheatre Understage. Djawarray will be joined by his nephews and their up and coming band Cloud 9 and the Mayi Wunba Dancers.



His songs have been the soundtrack to the everyday triumphs, struggles, good times and celebrations for Australians from our small towns to the big cities and everywhere in between.






Tropical Writers Celebrate





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ROBOTIC TRAPS AND FERAL CATS



Robotic traps and feral cats, oh my! You may have heard about Australia's 'legendary black panthers', but have you heard about the robotic traps we've started deploying in a trial to control feral cats in Queensland's Wet Tropics?

"Cats are incredibly cunning and feral cat control is notoriously difficult, no matter where you are. When you put this into a remote rainforest situation it suddenly gets to a whole other level of difficulty," says Ranger Chris.

But fear not, robotics and artificial intelligence may just be part of the solution to this huge problem!

Led by Resource Ranger Chris, Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service (QPWS) has been trialling a novel feral cat control method using robotic traps and artificial intelligence for over two years in the dense rainforests of Wooroonooran National Park, part of the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area.

The robotic traps use laser and image sensing technology to detect movement and artificial intelligence to distinguish feral cats from other non-targeted wildlife.

These 'Felixer' grooming traps have already been trialled in other areas of #Australia, but the harsh conditions of the wet tropic's rainforest will really put their pest management success to the test!

We are currently in the middle of a three month trial of an updated version of the trap and the results are looking really promising. "We're only targeting quite a small area, a 10km stretch of road, and already 25 cats have been removed using these traps," says Ranger Chris.

NEW CSIRO PROJECT TO CRACK THE CODES OF AUSTRALIA'S MOST INVASIVE SPECIES

CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, has embarked on an ambitious new project to unravel the genetic blueprints of Australia's top pest and invasive species to better enable their management or eradication.

The Australian Pest Genome Partnership (APGP) will generate the genomic data of hundreds of pests and weeds and make it freely available, along with digital solutions to help analyse the data. The data will assist researchers working on pest and weed species and underpin next generation species-specific solutions.

Invasive species have cost Australia \$390 billion over the past six decades, with weeds costing the agriculture sector at least \$5 billion a year. This presents a significant burden to Australia's agriculture and livestock industries, as well as the significant and ongoing environmental impacts created by these invasive species.

APGP has now prepared its first 28 genomic datasets, and this year, with its collaborators, will make public genomic data assets for some of Australia's top pest and invasive species such as mosquitoes, khapra beetle, cane toad, fall armyworm, fox, feral pig and cat as well as weeds such as wild radish, rye and rat's tail grasses.

CSIRO principal research scientist Tom Walsh said data is easy but analysis is hard. APGP intends to make genomic data more easily accessible and usable to support industry, government and the scientific community in managing pests.

"This project has the potential to drive new science and digital innovations to safeguard Australia's environment and biosecurity from existing and growing threats posed by invasive and pest species," Dr Walsh said.

"In the same way genome sequencing has helped inform medical advice, pest genomes can help us unlock new ways of protecting our environment, agricultural sector and public health with a quick and targeted response," he said.

CSIRO senior research consultant Rahul Rane said the fit-for-purpose genomics database being delivered through APGP will be a game-changer in invasive species control and management.

"Genomes and genetic diversity data can tell us all manner of things including where a particular pest species has travelled from, what environments it may thrive in, and whether it has developed resistance to chemicals and pesticides,"Dr Rane said.

"The more we know about the genetic characteristics of a pest, the better our ability to make informed decisions to effectively control or eliminate them safely.

"Ultimately research based on these new datasets will benefit all Australians by reducing public health risks and the impact of these pest species on our environment and agricultural production," said.Hundreds more he pests are being sequenced this year, including jellyfish, invasive ants and beetles, termites, African boxthorn, crown of thorns starfish, ticks and head lice.

APGP is looking to partner with companies, government departments other research and organisations to continue sequencing and collating the

genome of pests impacting Australia's biosecurity. The project received investment from the Australian Research Data Commons (ARDC), and has received co-investment from Australian BioCommons and Australian National University, Genomic datasets were developed in collaboration with Macquarie University, University of Melbourne, University of New South Wales, University of Queensland, University of Western Australia, Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries and South Australian Research and Development Institute.

The ARDC and Australian BioCommons (Bioplatforms Australia) are funded by the National Collaborative Research Infrastructure Strategy (NCRIS).

Kuranda Infestations update

The recent survey at Russett Park in March, discovered a small patch of yellow crazy ants in the centre of the

infestation area. Two years ago, yellow crazy ants were detected in the same location and spot treatments were applied to the site. Small, remnant populations detected during the eradication process are neither uncommon nor unexpected and these are targeted for detailed spot treatments. Yellow crazy ants were not detected at the site in 2022. This demonstrates the need for ongoing surveys.

When yellow crazy ants are in very low numbers, they become difficult to detect. The Wet Tropics Management Authority's Yellow Crazy Ant Eradication Program uses multiple tools to improve the probability of detecting persistent populations including the use of odour detection dogs. Before declaring eradication, there must be several consecutive surveys over a period of several years.

The annual survey at Green Forest has again shown no sign of yellow crazy ants, with both lure survey and odour detection dogs only producing negative results.

Yellow crazy ants were first detected in Green Forest in 2017 and the same intensive management as Russett Park has been underway. Thanks to the splendid work of the Wet Tropics Management Authority's Yellow Crazy Ant Eradication Program, this site is also in the later stages of eradication.

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



Volunteer Habitat Protection mechanisms

Of all the historical pictures I've seen on the internet, this one made me smile, so I had to copy it. This image brought back the best memories of my childhood growing up in Thongon Street, Kuranda during 1960–70s.

The Barron River was always the lifeblood of our people (black and white), living along its banks and because we had no crocodiles, the native wildlife made sure us kids could swim until the sun went down. A river so clean you could see the sand on the bottom, and with that, a healthy ecosystem.

Sugar gliders flying tree to tree, giant Golden Orb spiders. Outside the top pub, hundreds of Hercules moths fluttering over the street was a sight to see. Platypus in our creeks. Native fruit, bush honey, is something else. At night, our critters came out to play and our night glowing fungi is pretty cool too. Sadly, a cassowary roadkill sacrificed for us.

Within a conservative 50 years, what do we now see? The Barron isn't blue. Overkill of our life-sustaining species and Cairns sprawl creeping towards Buluwai country. For me, native title for Buluwai, is Government recognition of our Natural Law, one of preservation and conservation of our ancient land and all that it holds. I know at the current rate of threatened species, my grandson will not see our native wildlife in their natural habitat.

Every generation doesn't have authority to impede the next. For our future, our unique native flora and fauna, is worthy of protecting and preserving. Converting freehold land to wildlife corridor conservation zones, is necessary. Buluwai is proud to work alongside communities and dedicated professionals, who also feel as we do.

MINING BAN PROVIDES EXTRA LAYER OF PROTECTION TO WET TROPICS WORLD HERITAGE AREA

The Queensland Parliament's decision to ban mining in the Wet Tropics of Queensland World Heritage Area (the Area) is a significant milestone for ensuring this globally important biodiverse place is protected for future generations.

Wet Tropics Management Authority's Executive Director Scott Buchanan said, "This year marks the 50-year anniversary of the World Heritage Convention, and 18 April is World Heritage Day where the theme is working on the future, what better way to celebrate than to announce a ban on mining within the Area."

"We at the Wet Tropics Management Authority are proud to announce another significant step towards this goal, where the Queensland Parliament last month passed a change to the Wet Tropics World Heritage Protection and Management Act 1993 that causes mining to be prohibited in the World Heritage Area."

"The proposal to prohibit mining was consulted extensively with the public during the review of the Wet Tropics Management Plan 1998 – support from the community and industry was almost unanimous," Mr Buchanan said.

"However, to achieve the prohibition we needed Parliament to change the Act, and we thank the Queensland Government for their support."

"This is an important milestone in providing an extra layer of protection to one of the world's most important biodiverse places, we at the Authority are committed to protecting and presenting the Wet Tropics of Queensland World Heritage Area for the world and these latest amendments to the Act strengthen this protection," Mr Buchanan said. 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The webs that appear at night



Garden Orb-weavers *(Hortophora species)* are harmless spiders and are fascinating to watch as they construct their intricate webs. The web is a classic round 'orb' web, which is suspended in a position that is likely to be a flight path for insects. One of the things that often perplexes people is how they get their web from one place to another. The answer is simple – the air carries it. When the spider is ready to build a web, it moves to a high vantage point, puts the tip of its abdomen in the air, and releases a steady flow of silk from its spinnerets. The silk is so light that the slightest breeze will carry it, and it will float on the wind until it snags against a solid object. The spider continues to do this until is has a line attached to a suitable site. Once the spider has this initial line in place, it can move out along it to build the rest of the web.

Unlike some other spiders such as the Golden Orbweavers that construct a web and stay in it day and night, Garden Orb-weavers remove the web at dawn each day, and construct a new one each night. The reason for this is predator avoidance. These spiders would be sitting ducks for hungry birds, so they have developed the hide-by-day strategy. Although the main 'orb' part of the web is gone during the daylight hours, some of the structural lines are often left in place, and the spider usually shelters at a point where these meet a tree, house or fence. The camouflage of the Garden Orb-weavers is excellent when they are in 'daytime' mode; their compact, mottled brown bodies and tightly folded legs look just like a bump on a branch.

At night these spiders take on a completely different look, spreading their legs out in the 'ready' position as they sit in the middle of their web. The upper joints of their legs which are hidden during the day are exposed and are usually red in colour. Their web is designed to catch flying insects, and the most common at night are moths and beetles. When prey strikes the web, Garden Orb-weavers move like lightning – they must. If they give a struggling insect time to thrash around in the web, it will usually free itself, so speed is of the essence. Once the spider reaches the prey it will wrap it quickly with copious amounts of silk in bandage-like form, before biting it and returning with the prey to the central hub of the web. Like all spiders, Garden Orb-weavers can only eat liquid food, so the indigestible solid parts of their insect prey are discarded and dropped to the ground below the web.

There are several species of Garden Orb-weavers, but even within each species there is a great deal of variation



in the colour and pattern. Our local species can be cream, yellow, various shades of brown and even charcoal coloured. Some have stripes down the middle of the abdomen which can be white, cream, yellow and orange-red, looking a little Redback-like. Regardless of their colour, Garden Orbweavers are considered harmless to humans.

FRIGHTFUL **GUNPOWDER ACCIDEN1**

Each year an organisation publishes a list of people who qualify for the Darwin Award. Wendy Northcutt, in her book History And Rules explains how the awards are chosen:

"In the spirit of Charles Darwin, the Darwin Awards commemorate individuals who protect our gene pool by making the ultimate sacrifice of

their own lives. Darwin Award winners eliminate themselves in an extraordinarily idiotic manner, thereby improving our species' chances of long-term survival."

The Darwin Award did not exist in 1893, but if it had, it is probable that it would have been presented to a man who worked on the third section of the Cairns to Mareeba railway line.

On 4 February 1893 The Cairns Post reported on a serious accident at Myola...

"On Wednesday W. Thomas, railway guard, aged 23 years, and Thomas Those, locomotive fireman, were brought into the Cairns Hospital suffering from the effects of an explosion of gunpowder at Myola on Tuesday last. It appears the men, who are in the employ of Messrs McKenzie & Co, the third section contractors, were instructed to destroy four kegs of damaged blasting powder by rolling them into the Barron. Instead of pouring the oil on troubled waters, the unfortunate fellows indulged in the insane idea of destroying this powder by ignition, and after lighting a fuse one of them threw the match away, which alighted on one of the kegs immediately causing a terrific explosion. Those suffered the most severely, his sight being destroyed, and his face being destroyed beyond recognition. Thomas also sustained serious injuries, the unfortunate men being literally blown out of their clothes and boots. No particular danger is expected in Thomas' case, but very grave fears are entertained with reference to Those, who has never completely recovered consciousness since the accident. Before being sent into the Hospital the sufferers received every possible attention at the hands of Dr. Doble. The poor fellow Those had worked on the first and second sections under Mr. David Lyons, and was considered one of the nicest and most courteous of the men engaged on the lines. Travellers on the second section by Robb's engine will have a good recollection of the man."

On 8 February The Cairns Post reported on the progress of the two men...

"On enquiry at the Hospital yesterday we heard Thomas and Those, the poor fellows blown up by gunpowder, were doing well. At all events Dr. Koch said so, and we have to thank him for the most extreme discourtesy. If Dr. Koch treated his patients with politeness as a cure they would all choke. The man has got a good billet, and why he cannot be civil is a mystery to everybody."

Obviously, Dr. Koch was not well liked in the Cairns community, as no one came forward to protest this harsh criticism of his 'bedside manner'.


There was no mention in the paper of just when Thomas Those died, but his funeral was reported in the paper on 11 February. He was buried in the Cairns Cemetery.

On 18 February it was reported that W. Thomas was recovering well and was expected to be discharged from Hospital within days.

A Magisterial Enquiry was held to investigate the accident. On 22 February The Cairns Post reported that the enquiry had concluded. W. Thomas gave evidence that "they were destroying some gunpowder by igniting it with a fuse, when a heap, over which the deceased was standing, exploded unexpectedly and caused the fatal injuries." The paper did not report the finding of the enquiry.



A 'WEATHER SERVICE' FOR WATER QUALITY

In March CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, launched AquaWatch Australia, a mission to deliver a world first ground-to-space water quality monitoring system for Australia and the globe.nAquaWatch will provide near real-time updates and predictive forecasting in essence a weather service for water quality – once fully operational.

Using an extensive network of Earth observation satellites and ground-based water sensors, it will support better water quality management, with early warning of harmful events such as toxic algal blooms, blackwater and runoff contamination.

The system will also increase the resilience of Australian communities who depend on water, as well as improved outcomes for our natural environment after events like bushfires and floods.

CSIRO, with foundation partner SmartSat CRC, is bringing together research, government, and industry with an initial co-investment of \$83 million to design and develop AquaWatch. CSIRO Chief Executive, Larry Marshall, said water is one of the most important and vital resources in Australia and across the globe.

"Imagine taking your family to the local swimming spot and being able to open your phone and check the water quality before they dive in. Or better yet, getting a forecast for the water quality days before you planned your family day out," Dr Marshall said. "Now imagine the impact of this if you were an environment manager, able to receive advance warning of the oxygen-depleted blackwater events often responsible for mass fish kills. Or an aquaculture farmer able to plan ahead for an impending algal bloom.

'The ingenuity behind AquaWatch is it integrates Earth observation with other science capabilities like in-situ sensing, ecosystem modelling, engineering, data science and artificial intelligence. It is the latest example of CSIRO's Missions Program which are large-scale scientific and collaborative research initiatives aimed at accelerating the pace and scale at which we can solve some of the nation's greatest challenges," he said.


Working with a range of implementation partners, AquaWatch will extend from river to coasts, with the ability to monitor bays, coastal wetlands, aquaculture farming, mangrove forests and coral reefs, including the Great Barrier Reef. SmartSat CRC Chief Executive Officer Andy Koronios said that space technology will be a key aspect of AquaWatch and essential to developing an accurate understanding of Australia's water systems. "The AquaWatch partnership is a prime example of the benefits of cross-agency collaboration and demonstrates how much we are able to achieve when we combine our efforts and know-how for the benefits of all Australians. This collaborative effort to harness the data gathered from satellites will play an essential role in safeguarding our future water supply and improving our natural environments," he said. Data from both the sensors in the water and on the satellites will then be integrated at a central data hub where CSIRO's capability in data analysis and AI can provide forecasts a few days ahead. AquaWatch already has six pilot sites set up around the country to test the system for several uses such as monitoring toxic blue-green algae blooms at Lake Tuggeranong in Canberra. a popular spot for recreation. It is also being tested around our coasts, with another pilot focused on how sediment flow from the Fitzroy River out to the Great Barrier Reef affects water quality.

KURANDA ROOTS TURNS 21!

Australia's longest running reggae infused event turns 21 this year!

On 14–16 July Kuranda Roots will be returning to stunning Emerald Creek Falls (Kanjini, Camp 2) to connect and celebrate the abundance of culture, art, music and nature that flourishes in tropical North Queensland.

Kuranda Roots – originally called the Kuranda Reggae Festival – was created by Kuranda duo Morgyn Quinn and Billy Dread with the invaluable help of Mikki Sellton (Reggaetown/Katchafire), Nicholas Mills and Stephen Foster (The Tanks) in 2003.

Since its inception, the festival has played host to a huge range of reggae and bass music stars, and this year will see Australia's number one reggae crew, The Strides (pictured right), headline the main stage.

The Strides are a force for Reggae music, fronted by roots man Ras Roni from Barbados, Fijian MC LTL GZeus, and Sierra Leonian ragga powerhouse Blaka C. The Strides deliver a musical experience that



is as explosive as it is authentic. The Strides' music faithfully builds on

the foundations of classic roots reggae with a hip-hop edge, forging a sound that brings together modern dance hall, dub beats and reggae-pop.

After 15 years on the road and having graced the stages of some of Australia's biggest music festivals, including Splendour in the Grass, Byron Bay Blues and Roots festival, and WOMEADelaide, and having supported the likes of Tony Allen, Julian Marley, Groundation and Third World, this world class 9-piece have become a reggae institution, melding a diversity of cultures and instrumentation under the one universal consciousness.

Coming in hot on the Dreadagade stage are Bristol producer extraordinaire Chris Munky and SubTribe front man RayJah 45 on the mic.

Permablitz – A Grow it Forward Energy Exchange

Too often when I walk around our property I see work rather than a beautiful landscape. And I see work that needs to happen, not all the work that has been done. This tunnel vision takes away the enjoyment of the moment and also negates all the hard work accomplished. So now I try garden walks with the express purpose of enjoying the fruits of our labour or even the fruits of nature's labour ie. all the stuff left to its own devices. I try and see how amazing it all looks even with only half the jobs and weeding done. And because we are very lucky to live in the stunning wet tropics that is always abundant and beautiful, I usually succeed.

But sometimes I wish for magic fairy helpers to come in and with a wave of their wands complete all those niggly jobs that have been waiting for, in some cases, years to be completed. Like labelling all the fruit tress in the orchard, or planting out the shady driveway with gingers, or putting up kites on bamboo poles to scare away the cockatoos from the citrus harvest.

Or those huge tasks like growing a massive compost pile to have lots of ready-made humus for the new garden beds, or putting up five trellises for all the vines that are still in pots in the nursery, or pruning all the orchard fruit trees, or laying stacks of cardboard to start off new food forests.

But I need wish no more. There is a magic method called

a permablitz. And it works like this...

You throw your name into a hat (actually on a list but it didn't have the same panache); if you are selected you provide all the tools and materials for your project plus lunch and some groovy music; then a whole group of magic fairies turn up at your place for a day and you all chip in and get the jobs done to the *many hands make light work* tune. If you are not selected for the month then you get to be a magic fairy and go to someone's place and help them realise their garden dreams. Twelve wishes can be realised each year - one wish will be yours and the other eleven times you get to be a fairy helper while meeting like-minded folks, eating delicious and learning a ton of knowledge and skills to apply to your own place. And did I mention there are always free cuttings and seeds to be had.

So where's the hat to throw in my name? Well lucky us, it's held at our local Seed Savers (seedsavers@kurandaregion. org). Contact them to get the Kuranda Region Organic Garden Blitz rolling. The Mareeba Seed Savers and others have been doing magic fairy blitzes for quite a while now so we need to catch up. Let's start such a magic community energy group that we will need to blitz twice a month to accommodate all the fairy helpers with their magnificent gardens. Abracadabra!

Permablitz is an open volunteer system where people help each other get their gardens going. First-time gardener or veteran vegetable grower, everyone has something valuable to offer - whether it's time, energy, or different skills. It's all about hands-on community action and about people connecting. Permablitz initiative is based on reciprocal support, so you volunteer in other people's gardens too Permablitz's can include such things as: planting seeds; pruning fruit trees; setting up a wormery or other compost system; making swales; creating planters or raised beds; suggesting how to store rainwater; making bug hotels; creating chicken coops and inoculating logs with mushroom spores

Dragonfruit

The beautiful, interesting and quite striking cactus dragonfruit grows very well in our area. One would wonder how such a deliciously refreshing fruit took such a long time to find its way to us from the tropical and sub-tropical area of the Turtle Island Americas-Mexico, North and South Americas-and also along the Pacific regions including Guatemala, Costa Rica, El Salvadore and the Caribbean. Plants were taken to Asia in the early 1800s and they are grown profusely there and are gaining popularity here and in other tropical and sub-tropical regions of the world.

Previously found in only the most exotic restaurants, dragonfruits are becoming much more available as they become more sought after, with more farmers and market gardeners adding them to their crops, making many more available at the markets and fruit stores in season. Though delectably luscious peeled and eaten straight from the plant, it is also a gloriously colourful addition to any fruit salad. Try a mousse of dragonfruit, chia seeds, banana and coconut cream, or a dragonfruit/mango gelato. Dried dragonfruit is an attractive and delicious treat that children big and small will love, and fresh or powdered dragonfruit is used in smoothies etc., sometimes indicated as a 'superfood' with good vitamin C and minerals and fibre, antioxidants and other benefits.

The seeds contain omega 3s and 9s so the dragonfruit is definitely not just a pretty face. Some people have found drinking dragonfruit and fresh turmeric juice to be an excellent repairer for prediabetics, so this would definitely be a good one to include for many people.

The dragonfruits can grow in guilds and syntropic systems if care is taken to provide for their needs, which are few, though over-watering can stress a plant and give little fruit, as well as rotting the root system and destroying the plant. Too much shade can also limit blossom and fruit-growth, though they do grow successfully in semi-shade, up a tree (their natural habitat), or on an easy trellising system, a strong pole with a pushbike wheel on the top. Four cuttings can be planted on different sides at the base of the pole, and their aerial roots will grab on to this, a tree, fence or wall, and grow with little attention. Tie them lightly to the pole

for starters until the roots grow, and to 'train' them on the trellis for fruit access.

You may even get fruit in the first or second year, though it may take longer. For more fruit, give a good composting, worm-castings or seaweed mulch or all of these things in a 'compost tea' watered in once a month or so, and cover the ground around it with mulch and/ or living groundcovers such as queen of herbs, pinto peanut, sambung etc to keep the soil from dehydrating.

Dragonfruits (Hylocareus undatus), otherwise known as Pitaya, Pitahaya, Strawberry Pear, Moonlight Cactus, Than Long, and other names in various languages, are in the Cactaceae family, and have quite a few species and many varieties. Cactus Fruits Australia here in North Queensland is said to have those available in Australia with over two hundred varieties growing and fruiting in season (as well as over two hundred varieties of other cactus fruits). These are an excellent drought tolerant food plant.

The plants can grow five to ten feet tall, so ensure that you cut it at the height you wish the dragonfruit and it will lean back down so that you can reach the fruits. Keep an eye on them they don't grow out of reach.

If your plants are not fruiting, try helping the pollination with a soft brush – you'll have to be ready as the flower only blooms, so gorgeously, for just one night. You can also catch them in the morning before they start drooping – just brush the pollen from one flower to another, hopefully you have more than one dragonfruit plant to increase the fertility chances. Usually the pollination is done by native bees, moths, insects and bats, so perhaps plant more

to attract more pollinators to your garden/farm.

Dragonfruits are very easy to grow, requiring little care. On farms they can be grown in rows between other crops, just be aware that they do branch out and some varieties do have spikes, so select the type for your space and make room available around it so you can easily move through your garden.

Easy to grow from seeds (there are many seeds in each fruit), just pot them up in a welldraining organic potting mix, chemicals are completely unnecessary. As the cute little cacti grow, you can stake or tie them until you plant out or give to your family and friends. You may get differences in the fruits from seeds, which you will not know for some time. This, and purposeful natural cross-pollinating has created the great selection that we now have, so if you want a particular kind, ask for or seek a cutting.

Seedsavers often bring dragonfruit cuttings to our meetings to share, and there are also plants available from the Koah Markets and other places.

It was then that I realised if the Gilberts of the world unite... Look Out, beware their might.



The Bama (people) of this area (bulmba) shared a common ngirrma, language.

The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like the archaic English word 'aye' for yes.

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji

believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have people been able to preside continuously in one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual word 'bulmba' has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the weather and the authority of

the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of the year, the season and the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for help with selection of wordsearch words and to the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporations for their work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

BUYURRIL: to drag, to pull. *Nganya wumarri! Help me! Ngawu gudji nalmal buyurril-a-galing. I'm going to drag that log.*

DALNGGAY: to limp. *Ngawu dalngga-dalnggang. I'm limping.*

DARRBAY: to slip. *Gari darrban!* Don't slip! *Ngawu burrgi-burrging. Ngawu darrba-darrbang.* I'm sliding. I'm slipping.

DIDAY: to return. Birii didan! Come back again!

DJANAY: to stand. *Gudji Bama djanay-galing. That person is going to stand.*

MANDAY: to trap. *Nganydji djun.gi manday-galing. We are going to trap small crayfish.*

MARRIY: to cross something. Ngawu Gimunydja marriy-galing. I'm going to cross Gimuy.

NADAL: to step on. *Gari ngayang djinaa nada! Don't step on my foot!*

NYINAY: to sit, to stay. *Ngawu nyinay-galing.* I'm going to sit.

WADIL: to drift, to float. *Ngudaa wadil djin.gal-nda*. *Clouds float in the sky*.

WALAYIY: to pass, go past. *Gudji mudaga walayin!* Pass that car!

WANDAY: to fall. *Djudan djulbin-mu!* Come down from the tree. *Nyurra wanday-galing.* You are going to fall.

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St Saviour's Thought for May

This month we read a passage from St John's Gospel Chapter 20 verses 19 to 31. Jesus said to [Thomas] "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." John 20:29.

Things went a little haywire for Thomas, at a time when the other disciples were daring to believe that the unbelievable had actually happened. Thomas could not take the news on board without proof. So Jesus allowed him to go a week beyond belief, in continued doom and gloom and uncertainty - and then, very daringly, challengingly and convincingly, made it impossible for Thomas not to believe. That was the 'God of the second chance' at work.

As we re-live the wonderful Easter story, doesn't it home in on us that God is in the risk business in a big way, as we see one after another of the disciples, nearest and dearest to Jesus, failing to understand, doing or saying the wrong thing, being slow on the uptake? It took Jesus most of Easter Day to get the message across to those in whom he was placing his trust to take the Church out from Jerusalem and into the world at large. He had to convince them that it had happened – that preaching the gospel was more important than trawling in a netful of Galilean fish. So what chance have we of convincing the millions of people out there that the gospel today is worth more than the National Debt?

At times we are like Peter, Thomas and the rest. We are slow to respond to God's hints and prods. Sometimes, when we think we're actually doing quite well, we let down our guard and do, or say, the wrong thing - not deliberately, please God, but often because we've taken off some of the attention our Lord requires. But God is still the 'God of the second chance'.

And nothing is too big or too trivial for him. We have his word that if we sin in ignorance, he understands. Yes, he does, and we are not to be too hard on ourselves. God not only forgives sins confessed and repented of, he also forgets them. If God is so magnanimous, we also need to forget them. The world will try to tell us that such is not the case; but the world does not, in general, know the meaning of magnanimity and love.

But then, the world is not God. If we let go the pull of the world, and hitch on to the gentle pull of God, we shall let go all those inner tensions that threaten to surface, and which tell us we are no good; we've failed in our calling; it would be best to chuck in our lot with the rest of the world.

If Satan can get us to believe all that junk, he is one happy Devil. Peter could have been so devastated by his threefold denial of Jesus that he high-tailed it out of the limelight, never to return. Who would then have become the missionary to the Gentiles, and the first Bishop of Rome? Thomas could have wallowed so whole-heartedly in his doubting that he broke off all relations with the other disciples, and never returned to the upper room. Who would then have been the first to take the gospel to India? - for that is where tradition tells us Thomas went.

Even today, in some parts of India, Christians are known as 'Christians of St Thomas'. The disciple's grave is said to be in the church at Mylapore, near Madras. God knows what it needs to keep us in his will. He'll work with us, as he worked with Peter and Thomas. He will give us all that is necessary to keep us on the right lines. We can bank on it; God's assurance is gilt-edged. And, praise him, it's not beyond belief.

What is the most frequently asked question about the Men's Shed? *WHO CAN COME TO THE KURANDA SHED*?

You will notice I said "Shed". Why? Well, the Kuranda Shed, while officially titled the Men's Shed, is the only Shed in our area to welcome both men and women to come and use the workshop and share the safe environment a Shed guarantees, whilst allowing discussion about mental or physical health issues of all kinds.

We welcome persons of all sorts and types – the Shed is about bringing together as diverse a range of people as possible in order to help each other the most. Take myself as an example. I have had multiple physical traumas, joint replacements, spinal fusions and surgeries of all kinds. But I was welcomed, and in the first session I learnt how to use three new tools and am now set to learn how to do resin inlay work – I have been wanting to learn for years! The Shed Manager could not have been more helpful in guiding me in those first few sessions, and I wasn't once made to feel silly for not knowing how something worked or needing to be shown a second time.

But the Shed isn't just there for woodworking and other handcrafting skills – it's a place to talk and listen to each other. The reason the Australian Men's Shed Association was started back in 2013 was to create a place where people could occupy their hands and clear their minds, have friends around to listen to and encourage them, provide advice, or just be there and be supportive – all in a non-judgemental environment. We have all had traumas and problems in our lives, and the worst of them are always the ones where we are alone and isolated.

The Shed will be holding regular Open Days again soon, so if this article has sparked a little bit of interest in you, come on down! Even better, bring a friend. However, there's no need to wait for an Open Day, come along during our usual hours and say "hi". Tuesday mornings, Friday and Sunday afternoons are for ladies, and Wednesday and Saturday mornings are for the men. Morning sessions are 8.30–11.30am and afternoon sessions 1–5pm.

Any man or woman or adolescent (with parental approval) who enjoys working with tools, creating things or needing a shoulder to lean on is welcome, and the Members and Shed Managers are always there to help and teach. You don't need to know how to use tools, you don't need to know how to use tools, you

don't need to know what you would like to create. Be like me – the first time I went I had no idea what I wanted to do, but walking through the wood shed gave me some amazing ideas that—with help of the Shed (Members and tools)—I am now pursuing.

And hey, who knows, YOU may be able to teach US some new skills!

Moral of my story? Come along to the Kuranda Shed! If you have questions feel free to contact me. I look forward to meeting you at the Shed.




