Dear Kuranda Paper,

Having been rejected from becoming a member of The Kuranda Chamber of Commerce three times now; I felt it time to tell my story.

For those of you who don't know me, I have owned and operated Abra Kadabra in Kuranda since 1990. Late in 2004, I thought it a responsible act to be a current member of the Chamber of Commerce. Having been a member in previous years, I sent a cheque for half year membership; only to be notified that my membership had lapsed and I needed to reapply in the usual way.

I filled out the form with two current members as witnesses, only to have this application rejected because I filled out the old form. So I got the new form, filled it out with two witnesses and cheque accompanied, only to be rejected again.

My solicitor wrote the Chamber a letter asking "Please Explain?". The e-mail reply to him was that there was "not enough affirmative votes" and that I could appeal the decision if I wished.

Well, now, I'm not sure I want to join an elite group of over political, discriminative, ineffectual people anyway!

The paradox is that the Chamber writes every month in this paper that they encourage membership. Well, that was certainly not my experience. Nor did they make it easy or welcoming for me as they imply.

Forgive me for actually thinking that it is my right as a business owner and a rate payer to be a member of one's local Chamber of Commerce.

I have been rejected by a small internal group of narrow-minded committee. So rather than appeal, write to higher bodies, or waste my time and money fighting a Chamber which doesn't want me, and which, is supposed to represent me(scary). I have learnt through all this that I no longer need to be a part of this out of touch group to have power in my village.

Like they say, if you want to know what's going on in Kuranda, you have to walk the streets.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

Toby Hutcheon's letter regarding the Bligh Government's solar feed-in tariff misses the key features of the Solar Bonus Scheme.

The Solar Bonus Scheme promotes the uptake of household solar PV, encourages energy conservation, costs Queenslanders one-quarter as much as the alternative scheme, and results in lower greenhouse gas emissions per household.

The Solar Bonus offers PV owners 44 cents per kilowatt hour for all excess energy fed back into the electricity grid.

Consumers are paid for all moments throughout the day where household energy consumption is less than that being produced by their solar system.

Contrary to Mr Hutcheon's allegation, households are expected to receive the Solar Bonus on up to one quarter of the electricity they generate. The other three quarters, which they use themselves, will be free.

The contrary proposal put by Mr Hutcheon would see solar households produce clean energy and sell it to the grid, but continue to run their homes on fossil fuel energy!

What is the point of installing solar and then powering your home with fossil-fuel generated electricity?

Finally, funding a gross-metered scheme would see Queensland electricity prices skyrocket by four times the cost of the Solar Bonus.

The Bligh Government will continue to promote environmentally friendly solar energy without punishing the hip-pockets of working families.

Finally, as the site is Council-owned, it would be possible to stipulate that provision is made for all sectors of our elderly community - including low income earners.



ugust 2008 and the recent winter rains have boosted dams and tanks and brought forward growth and early starts to some plants. The keen gardener is already beginning to plan for Spring/ Summer plantings and how to carry through the garden to the Wet. More gardeners are removing palms from their established gardens as they find increasing damage to understorey plantings as the palms get taller and the falling fronds heavier - a caution here to the beginning gardener. Considerable care should be exercised in selecting any proposed permanent planting, think of eventual size, growth rate and siting. The canvas

you are painting on stretches forward into the future.

I have had just removed a massive monster of Flame of the Forest (Mucuna bennettii) which threatened to take over the entire forest, not only in its rapidity of spread but from the ever increasing seed drop which, despite its very short viability, managed to increase its domain by dangerous dimensions. I will mourn its flamboyant beauty, paying the price for a "must have' and ill-considered planting but relax a little that I won't be strangled in my bed by its tendentious tendrils.

It is a never ceasing wonder, the generosity and willingness of gardeners to pass on plants and knowledge to their visitors and how some many fond memories are often carried across time and place as one recalls the origin of a particular plant. It is so important to pass on this passion for the growing world to young people and every seed of interest shown by children in the wonders of the plant world should be encouraged.

Plant of the Month: Begonia
(Begoniaceae). Who hasn't
drooled over the wondrous patterns
and luxurious velvets of the Rex
Begonia and who hasn't lost more
than one of these treasures? A very
large family with nearly 1000 species
and swarms of hybrids and cultivars,
spread extensively through tropical
and sub-tropical regions, Begonias
are unisexual carrying both male and
female flowers occurring in the same
flower cluster on the one plant.



Ranging from high altitude to rainforest floor and with habitat from wet tropical to semi-arid, the begonia family has something to offer the most discriminating gardener. Rule out the luscious flowering tuberous begonias derived from higher regions and curling their toes in the heat and humidity and if you must purchase one of these offering shortly appearing in the chain stores, see it as a passing pleasure.



A Thought for August

This month we read from St Matthews's Gospel Chapter 13 verse 1 to 23

There are all sorts of ways by which we come to faith. One person cannot point to a moment when Jesus became their Lord because they have never known a period when Jesus was not part of their consciousness. Someone else may have had a totally different experience. Through some event, some book, some relationship, some conversation, they may have been brought to deciding that Jesus was their Lord. The sad thing is that sometimes the latter person will think the former person's way to be not quite the real thing. Of course it is the real thing. It may be gradual, even lifelong, but it can be profoundly real.

Jesus told a story about the many kinds of faith journeys people experience. His image of God is that of a sower striding along a stretch of ground. In long regular sweeps of his arm he throws the seed far and wide. That seed represents all the myriad ways in which God communicates with us and gives grace to us.

A seed falls on the roadway beyond the soil line. A bird comes and the seed is gone. A seed falls among rocks where there is just a sprinkling of earth. It grows but it has no nourishment, so it dies. A seed falls among thorns, struggles to grow, succeeds partially, and is overcome. Finally a seed falls in good rich earth and there are magnificent results.

In a sense the whole story is true of each of our lives. From birth to death God communicates with us, fostering our growth, guiding, inspiring, and calling. Because we are human we go through periods and circumstances when we become each of those places in the story where the seed of God tries to grow. We can be the path beyond the soil line. That may be a stage in our lives when other influences, some of them actually evil, can snatch from us any link with Our Lord. We can become the rocky ground, a person full of initial enthusiasm, but if there comes a time when our allegiance to Our Lord becomes costly in any way, we fade out. We can be the place of thorns. We encounter Our Lord. It affects us deeply, but something more attractive comes and we go in that direction. There are a host of shiny options in today's world to make us do just that. Finally we can become good soil. We encounter Our Lord. We grow in Him and we respond to Him. He becomes the foundation of our lives. We find that life with Him can be far more satisfying than the other shiny options. God sows the seed. We are the ground which receives it. What kind of ground do we decide to be?

As new members enrol, they will have the opportunity to quickly complete the basic courses.

This means that in our group training we can concentrate on courses in the SES Basic Rescue Program. We've applied to conduct Ladders and Ropes, Knots and Holdfasts over the next four training nights and will then move on to General

Rescue and Casualty Handling.

Having another trainer will enable us to conduct different courses on the same night.

HOW TO MAKE A FACE PACK:

SANDalWOOD PASTE PACK: Rub a piece of sandalwood on a clean stone, using a bit of rose water or cucumber juice. Soon you will find a paste being formed. This pack will give you a tingling, fresh feeling, and will discourage pimples also.

FOR NORMAL SKINS: Mix 2 tablespoons of gram flour and 4 tablespoons of milk in a clean container or an empty cream jar, and apply all over your face, leaving the area around the eyes and lips clear. Leave it on for 5 minutes, and then wash off with luke warm water and a clean soft cloth. This is also excellent for a dry skin.

FOR OILY SKINS: Mix 2 tablespoons of honey with 1 teaspoon of lemon-juice and 1 teaspoon rose water and apply over the face. Leave it on for 5 minutes, and then wash off. This pack helps to bleach the skin as well as keep the pores tight.

FOR ALL KINDS OF SKINS: Add cucumber juice to any face pack such as gram flour, kaolin, Fuller's earth and milk powder, and form a soft paste. This is a very gentle astringent pack, which tightens the pores.

FOR DRY SKINS: Mix together the yolk of an egg, a teaspoon of almond oil, and a teaspoon of milk cream. This is excellent for treating a very dry skip.

FOR TANNED SKIN: Grind ten almonds to a paste and mix into a teaspoon of curd. Use this pack to remove a bit of your tan and also to soften the skin. Also use this pack when the skin is tanned dry.

YEAST PACK TO NOURISH THE SKIN: Fuller's earth, brewer's yeast, rose water - mix a little of each of these 3 ingredients to form 2 tablespoons of paste. This mask is very useful and nourishes the skin.

MILKMASKTO NOURISH A DRYSKIN:

Mix 1 tablespoon of milk powder with one teaspoon of gram flour and 2 tablespoons rose water. This is a very effective mask for both dry and normal skins.

AYURVEDIC RECIPE



GREEN BEAN BHAJI

4 cups fresh green beans
1 tablespoon sunflower oil or ghee
½ teaspoon black mustard seeds
1 teaspoon turmeric
2 to 6 tablespoons water
½ teaspoon sea salt

1 inch fresh chopped ginger root 1 small fresh green chilli pepper ½ cup chopped fresh coriander leaves

GARNISH: shredded unsweetened coconut, chopped coriander leaves

Wash the beans and chop into 3 cm pieces. Warm the oil or ghee in a large skillet with a lid. Add the mustard seeds and warm them until they pop. Add turmeric and stir well. Put in the chopped green beans and 2 to 3 tablespoons water. Cover and cook on low until the beans are tender (about 15 to 30 minutes).

Put the rest of the water and the remaining ingredients (salt, ginger, chilli, coriander and coconut) in the blender and puree. Pour over the cooked beans and mix well. Simmer for 1 to 2 minutes or until well- mixed. Garnish with more coriander and coconut.

COMMENT: This goes well with basmati rice or dal.

Three Lucky Little Possums

Maxwell Smart and Miss Money Penny are two very lucky possums indeed. A kind member of the public pulled over to the side of the road near Mareeba and checked the pouch of an adult female brushtail possum that unfortunately been hit and killed by a car. To the person's surprise, inside her pouch were tiny twin possums that were too scared to move and too young to fend for themselves. Cold and hungry they were taken to BatReach in Kuranda where they were successfully hand reared by Julia and Martin.

A few weeks later another possum arrived. A dog had attacked the possums and in the panic mum and baby had been separated. Named Mocha, this little coppery brush-tail possum was covered in scratches and in shock. He was far too young to survive without his mother and was therefore also bought to BatReach to be cared for by Pam Tully.

After several months of care the mischievous twins Max and Penny, along with their coppery friend Mocha, have at last found their confidence. All three are bouncing with health and will eventually be returned to the wild.

The Common Brush-tailed Possum (Max and Penny) are an attractive grey and cream in colour. They live in woodlands feeding mainly on the leaves and blossoms of eucalypt, acacia, and melaleuca trees. It is very unusual for possums to have twins and it's very unlikely that both would survive in the wild. A different colour morph called a Coppery Brush-tailed Possum (Mocha) lives on the Atherton Tableland. These coppery possums live in the rainforest and mainly feed on leaves, blossoms and fruits of rainforest trees. During the day they sleep in hollow logs high up in the canopy and wake up on dusk and spend the night foraging for food.

Be careful when driving at night as these possums often come down to the ground to cross roads. Like kangaroos, possums are marsupials and carry their young in a small pouch. Please stop and check the pouch of any possums that have been hit on the road and ensure that dogs and cats are kept safely inside at night.



'If the world could write by itself, It would write like Tolstoy.' Isaac Babel

What a hugs book. Over 1000 pages of story and history, set at the time of Napoleon invading Russia. And stories are the thing, Tolstoy reminds us, that make up who and what we are. He is quoted as saying the book is not a novel, nor an epic poem, but the truth as he wrote it. A sweep of epic proportions, certainly, the book is about real characters, people that we get to know, and even feel we understand.

I decided about halfway through, the book could have been written today. Tolstoy has a way of showing how the truth of a moment in time can shape the rest of life for a person. And how we feel about things we can't express in words.

But of course it couldn't have been written today. The Zeitgeist now is expressed through technology. Reality shows and Youtube are killing narrative, so storytelling is best found away from popular media.

Tolstoy, with lucid prose and a great storytellers weave of plot and characters, takes us on a journey, best appreciated in a comfortable spot, with the time to enjoy a big book.

Breath by Tim Winton

After the feeding frenzy of each of their risktaking addiction the last pages reveal the ordinariness of their lives. Pikelet sums it up by wondering whether he "could do something gnarly, or was I just ordinary?" A sober thought for us all?

The feel of the novel is often mysterious and we anticipate disaster. However, by the final pages we are cast onto the mundane, the going to work, children etc. It is a let down, after reading about the first wave of the morning, the smells of paraffin wax and brine as the boys engage in a "rebellion against the monotony of drawing breath".

WORK-RELATED CLOTHING DEDUCTIONS

Did you purchase clothing for work purposes? You may be able to claim these items as a deduction in your tax return although there are very strict rules about claiming clothing expenses. You can claim the cost of buying, repairing and cleaning occupation-specific clothing, protective clothing and certain work uniforms.

Compulsory Work Uniform – This is clothing that identifies you as an employee of an organisation. It must be compulsory for you to wear the uniform while you are at work. It must be unique or distinctive to the organisation that you work for. E.g. the employer's logo is permanently attached to the clothing. Clothing such as bartender's black trousers and white shirt do not qualify even if your boss tells you to wear them because the ATO view is that you may wear them other

than at work. Yeah Right!

Protective Clothing – This includes clothing and footwear that will protect you from illness or injury posed by your work activities or the environment in which you work. E.g. Overalls, steel capped boots, safety-coloured vests and aprons. Ordinary clothes such as jeans, trousers and socks do not qualify.

Occupation-specific Clothing – This is clothing that is specific to your occupation. E.g. the checked pants of a chef.

Laundry – You can claim a deduction for washing the qualifying clothing. A reasonable way of working out the laundry claim is \$1 per load or .50c per load if you wash the clothing with other laundry items. The maximum claimed using this method is \$150.

Pocket project as a project of great significance and importance for Kuranda and District that will enhance employment and skilling in Kuranda and

That the Minster be encouraged to intervene in the matter so that the project can progress."

The meeting then proceeded to endorse the Welcome Pocket project as a one of great significance and called upon the Minister to intervene so that the project could go ahead.

A meeting has been arranged by Steve Wettenhall, the member from Barron River between Fr Chris Wright, Mayor Tom Gilmore and the Minister in Brisbane.

Coffee Production in the Kuranda Area

Mareeba is now one of the principal coffee producing areas in Australia, and the town is understandably proud of its quality product. However, Kuranda was a coffee producing area many years before the crop became popular in Mareeba. Coffee was grown in the Kuranda area around 1900 by several people, including A. Street, A.W. Warren and G.R. Mayers. Street's farm was on the bank of the Barron River opposite Remilton's Hotel. It is unclear where the other farms were but wild coffee is still growing in the area in several places.

In 1901 a severe black frost wiped out most of the coffee crops on the Atherton Tableland but Street's crop survived with minimal damage. The Kamerunga State Nursery encouraged coffee growers in the area. The nursery provided seed and gave technical advice to Street and other growers and kept a watch over the crops. Some reports claim the crop was hand picked by children, but other sources report that Aboriginal labour was engaged to pick the crop. One newspaper report said that while the crop was harvested by itinerant labour, Street and his three "stalwart" sons attended to cultivation, pruning and manufacturing the coffee. In 1902 Street had 14 acres under coffee. Of this area 10 acres had full bearing trees from 6 to 8 years in age. He harvested 7 tons of coffee beans from the 10 acres. Reports on the crop state that it took 5 pounds of coffee beans to produce 1 pound of coffee. Street's coffee was sold in tins with bright green and gold labels. The green label variety was a mixture of coffee and chicory and the gold label contained pure coffee. Soon after he began production Street's coffee won prizes at the London and Paris Exhibitions as well as many local

In 1905 Street advertised extensively in the local Cairns Morning Post, the forerunner to The Cairns Post. Several advertisements were carried in each paper:

Wanted Known --- That Street's Coffee secured Three First Prizes and Gold Medal, Townsville Show, 1900, and Coffee First Prize and Special Prize, Cairns Show 1900. Seven out of eight First Prize Cairns Show 1901, and all prizes at Townsville Show 1901.

Wanted Known --- That Street's Coffee is sold by all leading store keepers in North Queensland; and locally by G.R. Mayers & Co., Burns Philp & Co., M. Boland, Fulton & Sons, Cairns Cooperative Store and Sturt & Co.

Please Note --- If your grocer does not stock Street's Coffee, you can purchase it from any of the above firms, or direct from the grower and manufacturer. Alfred Street, Fernhill Coffee Plantation, Barron Falls, Kuranda, N. Queensland. Ask For Street's (red label) Pure Coffee.


If you want No 1 Coffee and Chicory ask for Street's Green Label Coffee, and do not be put off with inferior articles.

Street had a long association with North Queensland. He was very interested in municipal affairs and was elected Chairman of the Cairns Divisional Board in 1884. Street was also involved in commerce as well as agriculture. In 1885 he purchased the Bee Hive Café, and also operated other businesses. There is little evidence to indicate

costs.

A report in *The Cairns Post* of 1 October 1918 announced that: "Mr. and Mrs. A. Street, Kuranda, have been advised that their youngest son, Private C.H.S. Street, has been wounded in France (2nd occasion). Another son, Pte. J.F. Street who was reported wounded last month, and it is now learned, is suffering from gunshot wounds in the thigh and buttocks".

There is little evidence available to indicate what happened to the coffee industry

when Street ceased farming and manufacturing coffee.

In 1905 he took legal action against another prominent Cairns resident, A.J. Draper. Draper operated a cane farm adjacent to a 160-acre farm

owned by Mrs Street at the River. Mulgrave Draper cut off a six-acre section of Mrs Street's farm and fenced it. He grew cane on three acres and ran cattle on the rest. Street subsequently took action against Draper on his wife's behalf, claiming damages of £350. After a case lasting several days the jury found Street and awarded him £30. The judge agreed to restitution of £30 but ordered Street to pay Draper's legal fees and court in Kuranda but it is known that imports from Brazil in the early part of the twentieth century caused a significant drop in local prices. (Sounds familiar? It seems that the more things change the more they stay the same).





672 carers in Leichhardt will receive bonuses from the Australian Government to help manage cost of living pressures being experienced while they perform a crucial job within our society.

"I am pleased to report that payment of the carer's bonus to eligible recipients has already commenced in the Tropical North, "said the Member for Leichardt, Jim Turnour. Rudd Government is enhancing the support available to people in this role."





NEWS FROM THE KURANDA LOCAL AMBULANCE COMMITTEE.

A lot of people have been asking what our Committee is all about and how can they find out more especially after the great quiz night held last month?

Local Ambulance Committees (LACs) are made up of members of the community who, like you, take an active interest in the provision of ambulance services in their neighbourhood.

They know that they can have a direct bearing on the provision of prehospital patient care and work with the QAS to ensure their community receives the best possible service available.

LACs liaise between the community and the QAS, and:

- promote community participation in and an awareness of ambulance services;
- provide advice to the Commissioner in respect of ambulance services in their community;
- carry out fundraising activities for the benefit of ambulance services in their community; and
- manage money held in trust for the benefit of ambulance services in their community.
- LACs work with their community for the benefit of their community.

All moneys raised by local fundraising activities, donations or bequests remain in their respective communities.

 LACs therefore, have a direct impact on the delivery of services in their community.

LACs liaise between their community and the QAS by:

- representing their local community on matters affecting the provision of ambulance services;
- advising local ambulance officers about local community expectations for ambulance services;
- being represented on the selection panel to appoint the local station Officer-In-Charge; and
- monitoring the purchase and use of equipment funded by the local community.
- LACs promote community participation in, and awareness of, ambulance services by:
- assisting local ambulance officers to promote awareness of the QAS within the community; and

promoting community fundraising for QAS projects.

LACs provide advice to the Commissioner by preparing reports, participating in meetings and conferences and monitoring QAS services at a local level.

Where do LAC members come from?

- LAC members come from their local community and they are elected for a two-year term.
- To be eligible to be on a LAC you must be 18 years of age or over and reside or work in the area served by the LAC.







QCWA NEWSLETTER AUGUST 2008







Pedestrian bridge over the Douglas Track soon to be re-opened.

The Douglas walking track forms part of a walking track network within the Barron Gorge National Park and meanders its way up the range behind Kamerunga. In 2004 the track was closed for safety reasons, but with cooperation between Queensland Rail, and the Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service we will soon be able to re-open the track with a new sturdy galvanised steel staircase crossing the Kuranda rail line at Red Bluff. Subject to suitable weather, it is expected the project will be completed at the end of August 2008.

The Douglas Track follows one of the first trails linking the Hodgkinson goldfields (west of Mareeba) with the port of Cairns. Climbing above the northern side of Stoney Creek valley, the track crosses through both rainforest and open woodland. Landmarks including Red Bluff and Glacier Rock provide excellent panoramic views. A variety of animals can be seen along the track, including musky rat-kangaroos, skinks, butterflies and birds such as the catbird, black butcherbird, emerald dove, sulphur-crested cockatoo, spangled drongo and cassowary. It is a 7klm (one way) trip that I can highly recommend.

FNQ 2025 Regional Plan: A reminder that any submissions in response to the FNQ 2025 Plan are due by August 8th. I have received a number of enquiries about how the proposed Plan affects individual properties. It is advisable that you contact State Dept of Infrastructure and Planning at Ph 40398867 as they will be able to provide the exact details that you require. It is also advisable that any landowner has a look at the FNQ2025 Plan to see what is proposed for your area and if this will potentially impact upon what you do with your property in the future. The FNQ 2025 Plan is a state government plan and you are able to access the plan online

at www.dip.qld.gov.au Budget: The 2008-2009 Budget will be presented to Council in early August. Council has been developing the Budget during a number of Budget workshops. Firstly, it is important to note that auditors have now completed audits of each of the former four shires' financial records and we are in the black! Over the past months there have been a variety of stories about Councils carrying debt into the new amalgamated council. This is not the case. Our biggest challenge in the 2008-09 Budget lies in balancing escalating costs (in particular the cost of fuel, the cost of providing expanded services due to changes in state government legislation, the continued provision of ongoing Council services) and the need to come up with a fair rating structure across the whole region. Your rates will be affected by both the increase in land valuations (set by state government) and rising costs involved in providing services. We can all expect to have some increase in our rates, however at this stage I am not able to predict what the increase will be. I can assure you that we are trying very hard to keep increases to a minimum.

pointed a caretaker to live onsite in their own caravan and start basic clean-up and small basic repairs at the old school. Welcome to Claude and Shiree who have already started to make a difference to the site. Over the coming months Council will consider the Building Report in detail and make some decisions on which areas to repair first with the intent that some areas can become available for public use. However this will take time and money and we do need to ensure that all public areas are safe. Again, I must emphasize that I am committed to ensuring that the old school remains as a community facility.

Welcome Pocket Aged Care Facility:
Council is very supportive of the proposed facility and the Mayor travelled to Brisbane last Thursday, along with Fr Chris Wright, to speak directly with the Minister regarding the need for the 2025 FNQ Plan to be amended so as to allow the Welcome Pocket project to proceed. The Mayor, Council's Senior Planner and I attended the recent public meeting in Kuranda and it is evident that this project is widely supported in our community.

Council Services: Council has a number of staff engaged throughout the region to assist in animal and pest management programs. For example, Environmental Health Officers have recently been involved in assisting residents with the management of feral animals encroaching on some residential areas. These officers are also responsible for weed control programs and water testing.

Tourism matters: Council has recently approved a name change for the Kuranda Village Promotions Program. The KVPP will soon be known as "Tourism Kuranda". Council is also in the process of arranging new signage near the Railway and Skyrail stations. This will show visitors a map of the Village area as they arrive by train or Skyrail. The draft map/sign is available for comment.

Road Safety issues: Council sponsors a Traffic Advisory Group which meets bi-monthly to examine matters of road safety. The group is made up of Main Roads, Council, Police and Community members. Currently the group has very few community members and would welcome interest from members of communities within the region. I have forwarded a number of issues to the Traffic Advisory Group and am happy to put forward any other issues of road safety that residents wish to raise.

Local Laws: Council administers a whole range of local laws which are legislated by the state government. These include such areas as noise management, overgrown properties, fixed and mobile food licences, food handling safety, keeping and control of animals, commercial use of roads, signage, busking, parking etc. In fact I recently learnt that we administer over 150 local laws. (A reminder to make sure all your registrations are up to date!)

Congratulations: Congratulations to Jane DeCol for the excellent Sport and Recreation Program that is being provided within our community. It has been extended for 6 months and the TRC will continue to advocate for the program to continue.

On Monday 21 July, President Vanderweyde, Secretary

Phil Pearce and Treasurer Bob Hammond enjoyed a visit to the Primary Campus of Kuranda District State College to formally present, on parade, a sound field system. Head of Curriculum, Leanne Plasto, had successfully applied for the system.

Provision of sound field systems to primary schools is an initiative of Lions Hearing Dogs Inc and began in 2006. It is funded from the interest from a \$4.8 million legacy from Beth Klugh, a former member of the Lioness Club of City of Adelaide. Lions Hearing Dogs Inc provides two systems per Lions Club District per year.

Thank you to Rob Jennings, Head of the Junior School, who during morning tea guided us on a most informative and pleasant tour of the junior school. After the parade, we met Ken Mclean, new Principal of District State College, and visited

the 4P classroom, where teacher Teresa Porasjki demonstrated the effectiveness of the sound field system.

The system has a number of speakers, a base station and a lanyard microphone worn by the teacher. By overcoming problems associated with noise, distance and reverberation. Sound field improves learning and literacy outcomes, creates enhanced classroom harmony and improved student behaviour, and reduces voice strain among teachers. We certainly noticed that the teacher's voice could be heard quite clearly at the back of the classroom and this would mean that less time would be spent on repeating instructions and information.

Learn to Swim Equipment-During the parade, the Lions Club invited the primary school to apply to them for funding for learn to swim equipment. Primary Physical Education teacher, Michael Cavanagh, is preparing a list.

Bus shelters- Over many years, the Lions Club has responded to community needs by erecting bus shelters along school bus routes. On the parade, quite a number of students put their hands up to say they got wet waiting for school buses. We would like to hear from School Bus Committees, Bus Operators and students about the need for bus

shelters. 

Weed Alert along the river

The vine we love to hate, Turbina, is flowering at present. It has heart shaped leaves and produces masses of white flowers at this time of year. There's a massive one flowering in the tree tops on Little Rd river ford, off Myola Road and just after Warril Creek. The stem has a characteristic "ropey" look. It infests the banks of the Barron and is now escaping deeper into the rainforest. If you see anything resembling Turbina in the Kuranda area (apart from along the Barron), please contact Druce Horton - ph: 4093 8208. It's readily killed by simply cutting its stems.

Hymenachne control week (a class 1 declared weed) in June this year and some of you may have seen spraying on the river banks by people in canoes. This is part of the control action for this weed which 3 years ago was spread over all the sand banks downstream from Mareeba and is capable of growing in up to 2 metres of water. Without the persistent effort over recent years by the Mareeba weed control officer, Sid Clayton, BRICMA landcare coordinator Jane Page and their various helpers, this weed would have choked the waterway as it was growing on all sand banks. Now it's almost vanished from the river, from Mareeba to Koah. It still persists from Koah to Kuranda weir as fewer treatments have been done. If you see any strange looking grass with leaves clasping right around the stem but not hairy like guinea grass, please let Sid Clayton know on 40 924311 or email sid@msc.qld.gov.au or Cathy on 40 93 9926

We're coming to the end of a massive rearrangement of the nursery. This brings to fruition a long held dream that the community nursery would have its own secure place for the long term.

Now we have our potting shed, shade houses, soil mixes and tools ergonomically arranged to enable us to do our stuff in comfort and efficiently.

It's been thanks to the Mareeba and Cairns Green Corps teams, the QiTE Farm Force team and our regular Workers for the Dole that we got this huge job done. And we had heaps of fun and challenges.

Thanks also to our regular volunteers and their amazing skills that have seen major welding jobs done so professionally. Thanks Di Daniels for lending out your welding wiz husband, Phil. What an asset! "Jaxtrax" the tractor did an awful lot of earthmoving and lifting.

You're most welcome to check us out and share a cuppa when we have a break. If we're not out planting, we're at the nursery (1 Pademelon Lane) every Saturday morning.

Our "This is Cassowary Country" exhibition at the Cairns Regional Art Gallery next April is well on track. This exhibition will coincide with other Cassowary-focused events in Cairns so you're likely to be caught up in it

We've just taken delivery of a Cassowary scat collecting kit that will ensure we collect scat material correctly for DNA analysis.

CSIRO will train us and do the analysis. This will enable us to identify the movements of individual birds and the area they cover in their seasonal wanderings. This is cutting edge research.

Meanwhile, we continue with seed identification of Cassowary scats and propagating them so we can be sure we're planting the right food plants back into their habitat.

Our own PIG TRAPS are being fabricated, so soon you'll be able to set up a trap on your place and hopefully remove the troublesome trotters from the system.

"This is Cassowary Country" signs are in stock for you to put up on your gate or fence to let passers-by know the environmental value you place on your land. The signs are FREE.
