#### Dear Kuranda Paper,

Toilets and water at Barron Falls?

We are curious of the reasons the KCCT is pursuing this issue as it seems an irrational, unnecessary and costly exercise.

Living near the Barron Falls and walking most mornings to the Lookout we have not noticed any signs that people have had to visit the bush for toilet emergencies. As most tourists arrive at the Barron Falls Lookout by car they then spend approximately 10 -15 minutes doing the board walk. What we have noticed though is an increasing number of overnight campers at the parking area leaving rubbish behind, and we agree a rubbish bin or two would be useful. We collect at least a full bag of rubbish each week from this area!

However, if toilets and water would be provided at the Lookout carpark the number of illegal campers would increase; why would the business community want this? What about putting "No Overnight Camping" signs there and also at Wrights Lookout with appropriate fines for same? These signs have proved successful in the Port Douglas and Mission Beach areas to steer people to caravan parks and other local accommodation businesses.

As for walking to the Barron Falls from the village, this at present is a very dangerous activity due to the narrow road and traffic. As tourists walk two or three abreast, we local drivers know to take extra care, but it really is an accident waiting to happen. Walking this road is certainly not recommended. Generally only independent travellers coming up by public bus and returning the same way would walk to the Falls, as other tourists can enjoy the Barron Falls from the train or Skyrail or by driving out.

Has anyone in KCCT actually done this walk? In defence, pointing the finger at Ergon's contractors is not a good move. They are a different kettle of fish and should be reprimanded for

their actions of the present and to be constructive and monitored in their actions of the future in our Village in the Rainforest'.

Perhaps your club (which my Oxford Dictionary states is a 'world-wide charitable society of business and professional people organised into local Rotary clubs") could come to the party by lobbying Ergon on Kuranda's behalf to employ a horticultural advisor before attacking vegetation in sensitive areas like ours. That would benefit the whole community and indeed be charitable.

Incidentally, palms removed diagonally across the road from your sign appear to have been two Alexander Palms and one Golden Cane. Although as common as the Alexander Palms, the Golden Cane would never have been a threat to the power lines so a bit of knowledge is required.

Kuranda's two "Green Groups" (neither of which I'm a member) would be valuable to consult with to replant spots, which have been desecrated by Ergon contractors and other unknown perpetrators.

KURANDA HAS GONE TO THE DOGS & CATS. We as residents of Kuranda are in for a very interesting 4 years with our newly amalgamated council. For those who are concerned with the local politics I suggest that you view the council meeting minutes on the web at www.trc.qld.gov.au/ Some Kuranda-ites may not be aware that we have a dog kennel nestled in our tranquil rainforest in Kuranda.

For over two and half years now a lot of residents of Boyle's road and surrounding areas have been lobbying Mareeba Shire Council against the noise from the dog kennels with zero success. The Kennels before Christmas 2007 made application to council for a Material Change of Use (expanding the kennel capacity from 40 to 80 dogs and the added bonus of 50 cats) the Mareeba Shire Council rejected this application due to the fact that they needed to seek legal advice over this application. We were able to have an independent acoustic engineer (at our expense) evaluate the acoustic reports submitted to council for operational noise regulations and they were found to be questionable.

Rather than enforce the kennel operation into a period of time (when at capacity '40 dogs') for monitoring to ensure that they can meet their regulations.

The new council's way of resolving this issue was not to enforce the original 40 dog capacity noise restriction but to allow the kennels to increase their capacity in a hope that the kennels will be able to control the triple up of animals. If they could not control the noise of 40 dogs how the hell are they going to control 80 dogs and 50 cats??????? Mayor Tom Gilmore assures me that if the dogs cannot see each other they will not bark, (thanks for that pearl of wisdom Tom that's why you are Mayor and I am not) try telling that to someone who has been living next door to this 24/7. Council also assures us that this

It's absolutely terrible and now they say 40,000 dead, and 42,000 missing and 5,000,000 homeless. Poor buggers and no warning from a cruel world...

I'm so lucky. I was more then 200k's away from the epicentre without a scratch and a big scaredy cat compared to the amazing bravery of those poor people buried under the thousands of destroyed buildings. I watch Sichuan TV and the astounding acts of bravery by the PLA boys diving right into tangled masses of debris held up by cranes to retrieve trapped children. I'm a bit nervous here in Nanchong because my 8th floor apartment continually shakes and we have had a couple of big aftershocks that sent everyone

On the day, Monday 12th May at 2.38 pm my apartment began shaking and I couldn't work out what was happening. Then I heard everyone shouting and I scooted down 16 flights of shaking and twisting stairs in record time. Our school and our city survived OK but when I returned to my apartment it was a mess with everything high up, fallen down and broken. The whole town, 600,000 of us have slept outside for the following nights.

So I jumped on my bike on Friday and rode off to Bazhong, the first city we lived in when we first came to China and about 230 k's to the northwest away from Nanchong and about 400 k's from the epicentre, to see my good friends and booked into a hotel that has an '8' earthquake rating, and charging for it, and all the time I'm thinking of the 1,000,000's of people who have no option but to deal with the catastrophe while I'm scuttling away to save my sorry little ass.

And so as if retributive, on Sunday night at 1.05 there is a huge aftershock, a '6', in the nearby province of Gansu. So, in fact, I've ridden closer to the trouble I was seeking to avoid. So far it had been much calmer in Bazhong than in Nanchong but Sunday night I was woken by the rockin' of the aftershock and all the glasses chattering away in my hotel room and the mirror bouncing on the wall and the bed shaking and people running and screaming down the hallway and it's just like the

THE KURANDA PAPER June 2008 Page 3 ground feels like water and so I rode back to Nanchong on Monday to head for some relative calmness but that night, as all the school kids and I were sleeping outside, we got hit by a '5' aftershock and I get that feeling again that the ground is just like water. It just feels as if there is another big one ready to break out again. And I don't know much about earthquakes, but this one's been a killer because it was so close to the surface and that means it can pop up again anywhere anytime. So scaredy Pete just keeps on running and riding and now I've run to Chengdu and tomorrow off to Kunming about 1,000 k's to the south and can't help thinking again and again about the people who had no escape and now have a very sad future and the thousands of people who have died.

And as I rode through the villages and towns between Nanchong and Bazhong I can see what it must be like to have everything flattened, no escape, no future and no luck. It could have easily been us but not this time. So thinking of you all in Kuranda town.

une and the year half gone. Looks like a cold hard winter with mulching and watering The major tasks: Time to clean up the gingers and heliconias taking out spent flowering stems and dying leaves. Mark wintering bulbs and rhizomes to avoid damage when digging. With skies the blue of a Ulysses' wing, a good time to open up that new garden bed, checking soil pH, adjusting to growth requirements, enriching and mulching for planting on warmth returning. Fence if necessary as the turkeys are getting territorial and the bandicoot bandits are on the move. Regularly check hanging baskets and pot plants for watering needs - they dry out quickly. Place orders for citrus and other fruiting trees. A great time for planning and poring over catalogues, preparing wish lists of plants desired.

No Plant of the Month - space constraints and time to catch up on the mail bag.

Q. & A

Dear Gabrielle, Regarding weeds in paving and pebbles. Not wanting to use a systemic poison, a good organic solution (pun intended) is Vinegar. Household vinegar has an approximate 4% Acetic acid content while industrial grade, a 20% content – the latter does the job. Another product is Bioweed, a weed-killer derived from plant materials. With low toxicity and short with-holding period, this weed killer and industrial grade vinegar are both available from Enviromart and are recommended for the "green" gardener.

Dear Stan, From your description, the flowering basket plant purchased at Smithfield Markets is probably a Columnea. Belonging to the Gesneriaceae family and hailing from South America, Columneas produce magnificent flowering hanging baskets. Columneas are trailing or semi-erect plants with brilliant yellow, orange, red, pink, or combination colored tubular flowers several inches in length and up to one inch across with flowers developing year round in the axils of leaves and projecting away from the foliage.

The secret to success in growing most Gesneriads is a light, well drained, porous but high water holding mix. Commercial growers and researchers agree that "soilless" mixes composed of peat and sand, vermiculite, or perlite are best suited with a popular mix consisting of 50% peat and 50% perlite or vermiculite amended with two tablespoons of

dolomitic limestone for each quart of prepared mix. Commercial "African Violet" mix is available and can be improved with a bit of tweaking. Avoid pressing the medium around the roots but gently tap to settle the mix.

Some other "basket" plants in the same family to expand your hanging collection are the Aeschynanthus species and hybrids having brilliant red, orange and yellow tubular flowers produced in abundance in spring and summer. The emerging red flower buds and tubular calyx of A. radicans and A. pulcher resemble a lipstick, hence the common name, Lipstick Plant.

Episcias (a special favorite of mine) are grown mainly for their attractive, somewhat fuzzy, often multicoloured foliage and colourful funnel-form flowers. Leaves may be of silver, bronze, emerald green, or steel blue over brown or they may be decoratively veined in contrasting brown, green, silver, or rose. Flowers are produced in a variety of shades from pink, red to lavender. These plants are particularly prolific in their stolon production making it easy to build up a good display in reasonable time.

Watch it Stan, this vast family is alarmingly addictive and of the easiest propagation. Sounds like you may already be hooked. If interested, I can deal you a great Gesneriad Catalogue due out end of July.

Apologies: You introduced yourself in Condoo Street outside St. Saviours and I have forgotten your name. The yellow flowering creeper you mentioned growing above the upper entrance to Jumrun Walk is Merremia tuberosa (Convolvulaceae) "The Woodrose" from South America. Much beloved by floral artists for its attractive woody seed case, this creeper has high "Weed" potential. The "Hawaiian Baby Woodrose" Argyreia nervosa, is also a perennial climbing vine, also known as "Elephant Creeper" or "Woolly Morning Glory" and is native to the Indian subcontinent. With its much larger, lusher leaves, more vigorous growth and large whitish flowers, this creeper is highly invasive and also has hallucinogenic properties in some

Several enquiries about obtaining plants/ seeds of Telosma cordata, ( Asclepiadaceae) "Pakalana Vine" or " Tonkin Jasmine" featured in the last edition of TQG. With a very heavy lemon-like fragrance similar to Ylang-Ylang, clusters of golden yellow flowers form along the vining stems during summer months. This ornamental and fragrant climber is fried or boiled in several South East Asian recipes. The cut flowers are sold in markets wrapped in banana leaves with the flowers tasty and rich in carbohydrates, proteins and vitamins A and C. Can any reader help in sourcing? Spider and Rose

Spider McCall is a 22-year-old ambulance driver with 'attitude'. His final day on the job lands him the assignment from hell-driving an elderly patient from a Sydney hospital to her son's farm in country Coonabarabran. His patient, Rose Dougherty, is a well-preserved 70-year-old who's as spirited and willful as her driver. They embark on a journey that changes both their lives. Ruth Cracknell is outstanding as Rose, in what is arguably the best film role of her

career. The wonderful chemistry between her and the self destructive 'Spider' (Simon Bossell) is the key ingredient in this film's success. Add in an AFI Award winning supporting performance from Max Cullen as Jack the beekeeper, confident direction from Bill Bennett, smooth, lush cinematography from Andrew Lesnie (who has since shot 'Babe', the 'Lord of the Rings' trilogy and 'King Kong') and a laid back musical score from the Cruel Sea, and this cross-generational road movie just cruises nicely along.

Salaam Bombay

This is a sympathetic study of poverty on the streets of Bombay from the point of view of an 11 year old boy who becomes implicated in Bombay's drug trade and prostitution. In the light of the film's success in Western art cinemas a recent critique has raised questions about Salaam Bombay's implied eurocentrism which presents Third World urban poverty as 'other' so feeding Western misconceptions ..... in reality there is an interdependent network of exploitation involving the drug trade, the commodification of women and the First World's own urban crisis.



From the Baha'is of the Tablelands

A Thought for June

This month we read from St Matthews Gospel Chapter 7 verses 21 to 29

Human nature says one thing and does another. We begin in childhood. We say we will not play in the water but we do. As youths we say we will tidy the room but we don't. We will tidy it tomorrow or next Saturday or when the exams are over, but we don't. So the pattern goes on in our lives, always leaving a gap between saying and doing.

The Gospel says that Jesus knew what is in us human beings. Nothing is hidden, so we might as well save our energy spent hiding things we do not wish known to Our Lord. Our Lord had no illusions about our infinite capacity for saying one thing and doing another.

It is interesting to see that this point is left to the last in this Sermon on the Mount. Usually we put the really important things either at the end or at the beginning to emphasize them. If that is true then there is no doubt that Jesus really wished to get across this message!

Jesus knew that it is easy in spiritual matters to make all kinds of promises, to experience great emotion and great highs in our lives, to have wonderful visions in which we see ourselves doing this or that in the future. But all these feelings and promises can disappear in the face of the demands of daily life, its busyness, its temptations, its very real problems and sufferings. So Our Lord bids us watch very carefully the relationship between our saying and our doing.

Jesus tells us a story about two people who each build a house, one on sand, the other on rock. Both houses presumably look very much the same, each quite attractive and impressive. Each serves very well as long as the sun shines and the birds sing and life continues along pleasantly. But life changes, clouds gather, rain comes. Life becomes difficult, demanding, challenging. Stress builds. One house withstands the pressure and strain, the other collapses.

What Jesus is telling us is that we very much need a rocklike consistency in our spiritual lives. One



While working at the Myola site of the Barron River Green Corridor project last week, we got into a spot of bother. Our Conservation Volunteers Australia vehicle slipped into a ditch and was precariously balanced on an angle such that if it slipped, our water tank and pump could be seriously damaged.

Ken Harley came to our rescue and was able to

#### **AYURVEDIC RECIPE**



#### RICE AND POTATOES

- 1 cup dry rice, basmati or brown (3 cups cooked)
- 3 medium potatoes
- 3 tablespoons sunflower oil
- 1 teaspoon mustard seeds
- 1 teaspoon turmeric
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 teaspoon sea salt
- 1 bunch fresh dark leafy greens, chopped (optional)
- 1 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/2 hot green pepper, chopped (optional)
- 1 teaspoon honey

Garnish: cup fresh coriander leaves, chopped.

Cook the rice in two cups of water and cool. While rice is cooking, cut the potatoes into ¼ inch pieces. Wash twice with water, draining each time.

In a large saucepan, heat oil and mustard seeds. When the seeds pop, add turmeric, potatoes, greens, ½ cup water, and ½ teaspoon salt. Mix well. Cook over low heat for about 15 minutes or until the potatoes are soft. Combine the rice with the cooked potatoes. Add lemon juice, pepper and rest of salt and mix well. Cook for an additional 3 minutes, then add honey, drizzling it over the dish then stirring it in well. Garnish with fresh coriander pool circle upon circle. If we're reading.

COMMENTS: Serve it as a lunch or light supper. Extra lemon can be squeezed on top.

## Influenza Season:

#### Call for Older Australians to Protect Themselves with a Free Vaccination

Jim Turnour, Member for Leichhardt, today said older Australians in the Tropical North should take steps to protect themselves from potentially life threatening winter illness - and have their annual free influenza shots.


"Last year, 2.57 million Australians over the age of 65 received the free flu vaccinations from their GPs, at clinics or in aged care facilities across the country, Mr Turnour said. "In the last five years, influenza and pneumonia were responsible for 2.5 per cent

of all deaths in Australia - and in 2006 resulted in 2725 deaths - making it the 12th highest cause of death."

"Flu can be very serious for any age group, but older people can be more susceptible to influenza complications, like pneumonia. Influenza can also complicate existing illnesses such as diabetes, heart conditions and severe asthma - with people needing to be hospitalised when conditions became life-threatening," Mr Turnour said.

The Government not only recommends annual vaccinations for people 65 years of age and over, but provides them free of charge to this age group under the Program. The Government has provided \$26.2 million for the influenza vaccine program.

Further information is available on the Fight Flu web site developed by the National Institute of Clinical Studies. The address is www.fightflu.gov.au. The influenza season usually commences in late-May and continues until September.

#### KURANDA VILLAGE TAX TIP

#### SUPER CO-CONTRIBUTION

The Super Co-contribution is a contribution that you make to a super fund and the Australian Government will match \$1.50 for every \$1.00 that you contribute up to a maximum co-contribution of \$1,500 if you are eligible.

You are eligible for the cocontribution for the 2007 - 2008 financial year if:

- · you make a personal super contribution by 30 June 2008 into a complying super fund
- your total income is less than \$58,980 (this is not your taxable income)
- 10% or more of your total income is from eligible employment, running a business or a combination of both
- you are less than 71 years of age at 30 June 2008
- you do not hold an eligible temporary

resident visa

you lodge an income tax return

If you contribute \$1,000 to a super fund the maximum amount of the co-contribution is \$1,500. However, you must reduce this by 5c for every dollar you earn over \$28,980 up to \$58,980. You can use the Super co-contribution calculator on the ATO web site at www.ato.gov.au to work out how much you will get.

Example: Matilda is 40 years old. Her total income for the 2007 - 2008 income year is \$25,550. During the financial year she made personal contributions totalling \$1,000 to her super fund. Matilda meets all of the eligibility criteria for the co-contribution. The Australian Government pays a co-contribution of \$1,500 into her super fund.



# Barron Falls Tragedy

BARRON FALLS attracts many admirers each year, both locals and tourists. It is quite apparent that although this is a picturesque spot it is also a very dangerous place. I don't know just how many people have met a tragic end at the falls, but one such tragedy in particular received considerable coverage in the local press.

The Cairns Post of Monday 20 December 1920 carried the story of E. Galt, a nurse working at the Cairns District Hospital, who fell 700 feet (230 metres) to her death at the Barron Falls. Nurse Galt left Cairns alone by train on Thursday 16 December for the Barron Falls. The Post said "It will be readily understood why the nurse should make such a trip alone when it is mentioned that she was a landscape painter, and one of Nature's lovers". Nurse Galt came originally from Western Australia, and before working in Cairns spent two years at Sydney Hospital. She lived and worked in Cairns for six months before her death. The Post stated: "Nurse Galt wanted to paint the beautiful falls and gather ferns and other botanical specimens, which she had heard grew profusely on the cliffs nearby the rushing waters". She had previously asked another nurse to accompany her but she couldn't get away.

When Nurse Galt left the train at Barron Falls Station two men also alighted. They met her while descending the steps to the base of the falls, but when they asked her to accompany them she declined. She then proceeded to return to the top of the stairs. The article in the paper said that "As a Nature Lover she wished to commune with

Nature by herself. That was the last any person saw her alive.

When Nurse Galt failed to return to the hospital on Friday, the Matron reported her missing. The Cairns police contacted Constable Bamback of the Kuranda police who immediately searched the area around the falls. He failed to find the nurse, but he learned that a young woman and two men had left the train at the falls on the Thursday. The police issued a request through The Cairns Post asking the two men to contact the officer in charge of the investigation to give any information on their contact with the woman. The men, who were strangers to each other, confirmed to police that they had spoken to the woman briefly, but knew nothing of her movements after that. On the Saturday a contingent of people went to the falls to search for her. The party included some police, the Chairman of the Hospital Committee, the Matron and one of the nurses who worked with Nurse Galt.

Police Inspector Allen interviewed some of the line maintenance men, but they had not seen the missing woman. After making further enquiries at Kuranda he initiated a more thorough search. One search party led by Constable Brown found articles believed to belong to Nurse Galt at Knight's Rock, a lookout point with a very good view of the Barron Gorge. The articles included a pair of lady's tan boots, a small leather handbag, a fancy cloth bag and a book. The *Post* stressed that contrary to a previous report there were no stockings found. The searchers found that some large ferns growing on the brink of the precipice were disturbed.

The Cairns Post then gave its view of what the searchers would have speculated: "Then her eyes must have rested on the pretty ferns growing at the edge of the rock. No doubt she coveted some of these, and to secure a better foothold removed her shoes and laid them down with her bags and book while she went forward to gather the green beauties. The spot where the ferns grow looks as if Mother Earth supports them, and the nurse must have stepped out on this treacherous part. She found herself slipping, but tried to save herself by clutching at the ferns, which gave way beneath her weight, and with an agonising shriek she went over the cliff to an awful death". The report said "The signs all suggested that is what happened".

The spot from which the nurse was suspected to have fallen was a piece of rock outside the guardrail at the viewing area. Inspector Allen climbed down a 200-foot cliff with the aid of a rope but had to return without success. Several railway navvies then made the descent but the rope proved too short. Another 200 feet of rope was sent to the site by train and another attempt was made to locate the nurse. This time the searchers found a blue cloth hat and other signs that she had fallen there. However, the rope was still not long enough to reach the bottom and a car was sent to Mantaka for more. Four searchers, Wilson, Fry, Connors and Summers then descended to the bottom and found the nurse's body on a rock upstream from the Devil's Pool. Attempts to bring the body to the top of the cliff failed. The searchers then opened up an old track leading from near Robb's Monument to the river. This task proved very difficult and only seven of the twenty men who made the attempt were able to reach the Devil's Pool. By the time they reached the body they realised they would be unable to retrieve it before dark, and the decision was made to resume the task next day. The climb back was so difficult that Inspector Allen almost collapsed and had to be helped out by his companions.

Next morning, a Sunday, a large party left Kuranda at 6.00 a.m., and by 9.00 a.m. five of them had reached the body. The rest of the party had fallen by the wayside as their enthusiasm and endurance waned. The body was wrapped in some material and suspended on a pole to enable it to be carried out. The task was very difficult and it was not until 1.00 p.m. that the recovery party reached the foot of the track leading to the top. Fifteen men worked to pull the body up the slope by rope while two men travelled with the body to protect it from being damaged on the rocks. The party took two hours to complete this task, after which two members of the Cairns Ambulance Brigade wrapped the body in clean linen before taking it to Freshwater on a hand railway car.

Many of the retrieval party, including Mr Allen, Chairman of the Hospital Committee, and Constable Brown of the Cairns police, were completely exhausted after the arduous task. More than thirty people helped in the search and retrieval, and special mention was made of Miss Remilton of Remilton's Hotel and Mr Pearce of Pearce's Hotel, who made the workers comfortable while they were in Kuranda. The two hoteliers also sent food and refreshments each day to the party at the Barron Falls. The funeral of Nurse Galt was held at 11.00 a.m. at St John's Church on Monday 20 December 1920.

# BatReach

Kuranda residents would no doubt agree that one of the major pleasures of living in this beautiful region is the abundance of wildlife. It is unfortunate, however, that our wildlife is often adversely affected by the necessities of human existence. Most of the orphaned/injured creatures received at BatReach are victims of powerlines, barbed-wire fencing, roads, cats, dogs and habitat destruction.

A recent arrival at BatReach is Irwin, a baby Striped Possum, whose mother was a victim of dog attack. Striped Possums are found only in the northern tropics. These small noctural mammals find shelter in tree hollows and epiphytes during the day. At night they move swiftly and deftly through the trees in search of insects, native fruits and leaves. An elongated fourth finger assists the Striped Possum to probe bark to extract insects. These fascinating yet little-studied creatures have a distinctively pungent, sweet odour, which becomes stronger as they reach maturity.

The aim of BatReach is to rehabilitate injured/orphaned wildlife and return them to their rightful place in the wild. Such is the case with Irwin. When he is ready for release in four to five months, he will go through a gradual, monitored, supported release process.

We can all help to preserve and protect our precious Kuranda wildlife by driving slowly, confining our dogs and keeping our cats indoors, especially at night. We can also plant native trees to provide food and shelter for our wildlife.

Kuranda Group's Other Roles
Flood Response and Boating:

We also have two trained in Search as a Member of an Air Search Team and Work in an Aviation Environment. We need more trained for both aspects. Training for Land Based Search is conducted at group level, and Air Search at regional level.

Emergency Welfare and Catering Support is provided to SES operations or other agencies on site or in the field. Sufficient people need to be trained in Safe Food Handling and be able to monitor any assistants under their supervision.

Incident Management requires training in Work in an Emergency Operations Centre and applies the AIIMS ICS system to manage any activity. Two members have been trained in Work in an Emergency Operations Centre.

#### **Fire Season Awareness**

Regardless of where a fire originated or who lit it, a landholder or occupier of a property with a fire on it, is responsible to contain or extinguish that fire immediately upon becoming aware of its existence.

Rural fire fighters are there to assist. They are community minded volunteers, not servants - they do not get paid, so be active and help out where possible. Remember, where volunteer brigades are located, there is not a



Heavy fines can be and have been imposed in the past, for inaction. Litigation by neighbours has also occurred.

Adequate breaks must be maintained by occupiers of land to prevent fire escaping onto other property and also stop fires entering.

A permit system is in force for the lighting of fires. Your local Warden will issue a permit with certain provisions stipulated, depending on weather and other conditions at the time. This is for your protection. An applicant MUST abide by the conditions on the permit and not be of the belief, that just because one has a permit one can burn when or how.

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
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
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## Town Talk Community News

Recently there have been a number of decisions made by our State Government which will affect our community. Namely the decision not to proceed with the Kuranda

Regional Plan:

The draft has effectively ruled

out a major upgrade to the Kuranda Range road at least until 2023 - if not beyond - with the Mt Peter area south of Edmonton designated to take the bulk of projected population growth. As well, the draft plan appears to have allayed fears rural residential developments and major tourism developments on the Atherton Tableland would be stymied by a plan based on southeast Queensland.

Mr Lucas and Ms Bligh stressed the FNQ plan - the first statutory regional plan in Queensland - had been built around the region's unique features and lifestyle and diverse economy. Ms Bligh said the plan would cater for regional population growth without compromising natural assets or allowing urban sprawl. "It protects World Heritage Listed Great Barrier Reef and Wet Tropics by containing development in identified areas and preserving natural drawcards for future generations," Ms Bligh said. The draft has ruled out development in the Koah, Myola and Clohesy areas on the Tableland by saying there is enough land near Cairns to cater for regional settlement centres until 2025.

However, the Chamber is still working towards toilets and water at the Barron Falls. Recently Management Committee inspected the toilet facilities at Speewah camping grounds. It is certainly an eye opener to see such first rate facilities in such a remote setting. There does seem to be reluctance on the part of the State Government and our local authority to provide such facilities at Barron Falls. The Chamber will continue to lobby for such facilities in one of the most visited tourist destinations in North Queensland.

The Chamber would like to extend our congratulations to a number of new businesses in our area, namely Silver Chain Jewelery and Kuranda Kitchen Café. Special mention must be made to the refurbished Frogs Restaurant and the Original Kuranda Markets. It is wonderful to see owners taking such pride in their premises.

Chamber would like to extend an invitation to anyone wishing to join the Chamber to come along to our meetings. With the amalgamation of the councils it is of the utmost importance that Kuranda has a voice with our local Council. This can only be obtained by people willing to become involved and putting their ideas forward.

The next General Meeting will be on the 3rd June at the Kuranda Hotel Motel commencing at 5.00 pm. All current members and guests are cordially invited to attend.

#### Safety Requirements Priority at Old Primary School

Cleaning up vandalism and general restoration work on the old Kuranda Primary School site is a priority for the Tablelands Regional Council to ensure that the facility meets safety requirements before becoming available for use by community groups.

Since its purchase by the Mareeba Shire Council in late January 2008 for \$750,000, ongoing vandalism has created hazards at the site which the Tablelands Regional Council will need to fix before an investigation into restoration work can commence.

With many local groups showing interest in using the site, Mayor Tom Gilmore promises to keep the community informed throughout the upgrade process, assuring that a planned approach will be undertaken to identify and complete necessary upgrades.

"Our first priority is to make sure the facility is safe," stated Mayor Gilmore. "Vandalism of any public building or amenity is shameful, and in the case of this site, broken glass is causing a serious safety issue. Next we will find out the costs involved in upgrading the facility to meet fire safety requirements, with a report outlining the business case to be presented to Council. Once we have an understanding of costs, where the funds will come from and an expected timeframe for upgrades, we will be able to go back to the community with our approach," concluded Mayor Gilmore.

Submissions lodged to the Mareeba Shire Council regarding use of the facilities at the old Kuranda Primary School site in January have been considered and will be used for ongoing stakeholder consultation.

#### MYOLA RURAL LIFESTYLE AND ENVIRONMENTAL VALUES SAVED:.-FNQ 2025 DRAFT REGIONAL PLAN RELEASED.-

Former Mareeba Shire plans to turn Myola into a satellite suburb of 11,000 are set to be superceded by the new FNQ 2025 plan released in Cairns by Premier Anna Bligh and the Deputy Premier Planning Minister, Paul Lucas.

I lobbied hard to get former premier Beattie to agree to fund this new statutory plan because I know that only a plan with the force of law really works. As a member of the advisory council that helped shape the plan, I also argued for Myola to be outside the urban footprint and for stricter development controls to protect our environment.

The plan achieves both these important outcomes and much more. Now that there is not going to be thousands more cars commuting up and down the range road, the need for the four-laning of the road will obviously be well into the future.

In the meantime, my campaign for safety improvements for the range road will continue.

FNQ 2025 will steer population growth in Cairns to the Mt Peter southern corridor - while in the northern suburbs, growth will consolidate around 'transit orientated communities'. These are urban nodes that will be designed to allow people to work, shop and play close to home while maximising the use of public transport, walking and cycling.

At present, the meetings rotate around the 4 former shire centres and are held in either Atherton, Mareeba, Herberton or Malanda. I am hopeful that later in the year, there will also be meetings held in other centres such as Kuranda.

Old Primary School: I have

regarding the future of the old Primary School site. Council has inspected the site and a report is being prepared on the current state of the site and repair requirements. Now doctors say bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

S \* Ask the individual to SMILE. T \* Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE (Coherently) (i.e. It is sunny out

R \* Ask them to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

If they have trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call 999/911 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

New Sign of a Stroke -Stick out Your Tongue - Another 'sign' of a stroke is this: Ask the person to 'stick' out their tongue. If the tongue is 'crooked', if it goes to one side or the other, that is also an indication of a stroke.





Myola Urban plan excluded in draft FNQ2025 regional plan

Good news for all those who didn't wish to see a 10,000 person satellite suburb of Cairns located in the Myola valley!

The draft FNQ2025 excludes Myola as an urban node for the next 20 years and the new 4 lane Kuranda Range Road is also excluded due to lack of government funding. Many thanks to all those who have supported the work to ensure this outcome. We will still need to work on keeping Myola urbanisation excluded from the final plan.

Plant id workshop - Sat. 28 June free

Nine community members enjoyed the plant id course run by Druce Horton in May. As one participant said – "I never knew there was so much to learn about leaves".

Here's a little excerpt: "Taxonomists organise plants into families on the basis of their descent from a common ancestor. As with human families, there is usually a resemblance between family members (but not always). Though there are a bewildering number of plant species in the wet tropics, nine plant families account for more than 50 % of the trees so, as an aid to identification, it is worth trying to familiarise yourself with some of the characteristics of these common families. The avocado (*Persea americana*) and that marvellous cabinet timber species Black Walnut (*Endiandra palmerstonii*) are members of the

Lauraceae family. The rainforest laurels often have oily fruit with a texture similar to the avocado fruit and these fruit are favourites of the fruit eating pigeons".

A number of people who are required by Centrelink to put in some time with a community organisation are choosing K-Cons (Kuranda Conservation Community Nursery). We've quite a team atmosphere building up at the nursery with many types of jobs to be done ranging from carpentry, renovating and welding (pig traps) to seed collecting, propagating and planting. Workers can choose the type of work they like doing. This makes for contentment and that's a great way to get the jobs done.

We also host a QiTE Farm Force team and Green Corps teams, sometimes all at the same time, so our place is abuzz with activity.

You might wonder how we find time for anything else, but we've just been accepted by the Cairns Regional Art Gallery prestigious ground floor space to hold a "This is Cassowary Country" exhibition next April. This will involve many artists in Kuranda. The Wet Tropics Management Authority wants to be

involved too - and it's early days.

Talking Cassowaries, with funds from the Gaming Community Benefit Fund, we've purchased specialised computerised microscopic equipment to help us to study the content of Cassowary scats (poo, that is). Our keen botanist is finding all sorts of fascinating things about Casso poo that can't be see with the naked eye. This will give us insight into their feeding habits and their role as a vector for spreading microscopic fungi and

From the scats we take samples for **DNA** analysis by CSIRO. This will help us to identify individual birds and give us a better idea of the area they cover. This is cutting edge research.

even weeds.

When a Cassowary swallows fruit, it digests the flesh and defecates the indigestible seeds. Some fruit pass through their gut untouched. We're there at the back end to pick up the scat, claim the seeds, count and identify them and propagate them in the nursery. The plants we grow, we plant in nearby Cassowary country, and your property, if you'd like us to.

That's what we do - is there anything else you could possibly want to do?!

#### PIGS ARE MOVING IN

Locals are informing us that feral pigs are moving onto to properties where there's fodder and water.

If we are serious about reducing the pig threat, we're going to have to take responsibility ourselves. There's not a lot of help available out there!

At K-Cons, we have been given some steel mesh (thanks Warren) that we can make into pig traps, get them out there, catch 'em and dispatch 'em! There's a way, now we only need the will.

If you have the skills to make a trap, we'll supply the rest to make it happen.

Let's do it.

There is a good specimen near the entrance of Rainforestation and another on a block, corner of Mason Road/Platypus Close. Once you learn to identify it, you will spot numerous examples close to the roadside as you drive the range.

The Alstonia has a very distinctive architecture. The branches come off the main trunk more or less horizontally and grow out twisting and turning every which way. The tree looks as if it has been tortured or maybe it just had a really bad hair decade. This shape is caused by a fairly odd growth habit. Instead of the branch growing from its tip, new growth begins from a node behind the tip. So rather than just elongating, the branches extend like a game of leap frog with the growth from the node behind the tip overtaking the old tip. As well as growing in Australia, it also occurs through most of Asia. Its timber is of a fairly poor quality and its species name "scholaris" is derived from its use for making school desks in Asia.

Its leaves are clustered together in whorls (like an umbrella tree). It has a very milky sap. The sap has been used in India to treat abdominal pains and dysentery.

Milky sap is a common trait in the family to which this tree belongs - Apocynaceae.

The sap contains alkaloids which are usually toxic or medicinal. You will often see Alstonias growing alone in paddocks or near roadsides. They are fairly resistant to cyclones. They survive by dropping their branches, leaving a bare trunk.

For people using the CSIRO key: - The leaf features: L3- leaf simple; L7- leaves whorled; L20 - intramarginal vein present; L26 - more than 20 veins: narrows it down to 23 species. The white sap is a good indication that it probably is in the Apocynaceae family. Now you are down to 13 species. If you then go to the leaf images, you will see that Alstonia scholaris is reasonably easy to pick


