Aid For Flood Victims

A message from QCWA State President

EOPLE IN OUR COMMUNITY can assist in a practical way by donating to the QCWA Public Rural Crisis Fund. These donations are tax deductible. The Fund is used to help those in need in the general community by giving them store credit cards e.g. Woolworths or IGA or letters of credit with other specific stores if in a small rural community where there are no bigger stores. We sometimes pay their household accounts such as electricity, telephone or chemist. The limit they can request is \$500 but they can re-apply at a later date if things continue to be bad for them. The application is one page and can be downloaded from our website http://www.qcwa.org.au/ or by sending their cheque to QCWA, 89-95 Gregory Tce., Brisbane 4000. We can assure the donors that 100% of monies received are distributed in practical aid for those in need of it. (The QCWA covers all costs of collection and distribution from other sources.) People who make sizeable donations can also direct how they would prefer to see it used, for example for fencing replacement (thousands of kilometres needed), seed replacement, fuel for farm vehicles or whatever else you like to nominate. The money donated is spent in the local communities so this helps the community get back on its feet.

We know from experience that many of the people in rural and regional areas "fall through the cracks' when it comes to Government handouts or assistance – especially the elderly and families. It is amazing how sometimes something as simple as a \$200 Woolies voucher, or paying the power bill, or buying some school shoes can make an enormous difference to someone's life – and outlook.

Locally, our Division will be holding a Variety Concert QCWA Flood Relief Fundraiser at Cairns Civic Centre on Sunday 27th February at 2pm. Tickets available through Ticketek.

Artists so far include: Sing Australia, Cairns Choral Society, Cairns Brass, Lou Cadotto & Lou Pensini, Geoff Mann (bush verse), Jackie Wilson's dancers (performing Highland and Irish), Jodie Agius dancers doing a variety of styles (modern, tap, hip hop etc), Larry Hammond and his students (and probably Wilma Reading), Cathy Knight...so it looks like it should really be a variety concert all right.

There is not even any finesse in the way the paint has been daubed to make a frog green or a lizard red – I find it disrespectful to the original artist and to those who admire and appreciate the artwork which is so much a feature of our village.

I am appealing to those responsible to please stop defacing the artwork and if anyone reading this knows who is responsible please pass on the message. Surely any frustrated artists out there could find a different creative outlet.

Welcome Pocket

Just before Xmas the signage went up on the fence on the proposed "Welcome Pocket" development and I feel there needs to be some pertinent information regarding this proposed development made known throughout this community. I now take the opportunity to present the following facts:-

- 1. Several years ago this community successfully lobbied the State government long and hard re their opposition to Myola becoming an "urban node".
- 2. The owners/developers of the proposed "Welcome Pocket" development then went and lobbied the State government to grant them special/privileged exemption from Myola's urban development exclusion.
- 3. Under this State government "special" exemption the "Welcome Pocket" site was to be developed "only for the facilities and activities associated with the accommodation and care of the elderly". I, probably like most of you, read this as being for medium to high levels of aged care. The details of this development appear to stretch this definition.
- 4. This "aged care" (the predominant adjective that to date has been attached to the definition of this proposed development) proposal is for the following sum of people 140 Aged care places over a 2 Ha area. 600 Retirement places (the major component of the development) over a 13.7 Ha area 50 childcare places.
- 5. Shopping facilities, tennis court/s, pool, bike tracks etc.
- 6. Traffic assessment on Myola road -1225/day.
- 7. Then further down the track a school.

I can't help but ask the question – just when/ where does this development ever stop????? This all inevitably leads to the questions:–

- Is this proposed development appropriate for this area?
- What exactly IS it? An "aged care" facility like the one at Malanda? A "retirement village" like so many other commercially orientated retirement villages out there?
- Just who are the beneficiaries of this development?
- Is this proposed development genuinely to serve the needs of our elderly population irrespective of financial means or is it in fact a very well thought out commercial development by very experienced and successful developers with the aim of being a COMMERCIAL success as against a SOCIALLY responsible success?
- How genuinely representative is/will our TRC representative be in their position on this development? Are they going to represent ALL the surrounding landholders or just this one developer? History to date shows many interesting "coincidental" and complimentary covert parallels between our previous Council and the developer.
- What impact will it have on our existing rural and rural residential lifestyles? Is it compatible with the existing Myola residents' expectations?
- What resulting financial costs will inevitably result(rate increases/water/sewerage connection costs/road upgrade/electricity upgrade etc)?
- Who will bear these additional infrastructure costs? The local and surrounding landowners or the developers? Will this stand long term or will these additional costs inevitably and covertly be shifted onto the surrounding landholders?
- Will/is there plans down the track to change the existing dead-end Boyles Rd into a connecting road onto the Kennedy Hwy?
- Isn't this the same group who dishonoured the wishes of the property donor of Taylors Point?
- How/why were they and they alone given exemption from Myola's "no urban footprint" classification?

The ramifications of this proposed development upon the landholders and residents of Myola itself will be devastating. While I know there are so many of you who disagree and are angry about this proposed development and particularly how it has been so misleadingly "sold" to our community, it is now up to YOU to register your objections to this proposed development to the Mayor and every TRC councillor. If you let this go, you will not only have to live with the consequences but with the knowledge that you failed to stand up for your beliefs on just what is appropriate for our rural Myola community.

Gardening in Kuranda



Back to Basics

Before shelling out for that new plant, the question to be asked is: will it grow in my garden? Many factors come into play to determine whether or not a plant will perform well in your garden so it pays off to know your plot. Each kind of plant has its own needs and requirements and the more you know about the specifics of its origin, the more likely you are able to reproduce the conditions needed for its successful growing.

Generally the success of weeds is their tolerance of a wide variety of conditions, while others, such as the tassel fern, have very exacting requirements. Before you spend the time, effort and money attempting to grow a new plant in your garden, it is best to do some research to learn something about the conditions that the plant needs to grow properly. A Google search or a good reference book will provide this information and save you \$\$\$\$ and heartbreak!

Here are some of the environmental factors that influence plant growth:

Temperature

Plants grow best within an optimum range of temperatures and the range may be wide for some species, narrow for others. Plants survive only where temperatures allow them to carry on life-sustaining chemical reactions. Just because a plant comes from the tropics does not mean it will necessarily thrive in our area – think about the plant if it comes from over 1000m, perched on a branch in a cloud forest – will you be able to reproduce its growing requirements?

Heat

Heat tolerance varies widely from species to species. Many plants that naturally

grow in tropical regions are very heat tolerant, while most cool climate and alpine plants show very little tolerance for heat. High night temperatures are often the most limiting factor for many plants.

Cold

Plants differ in their ability to survive cold temperatures. Some tropical plants are injured by temperatures below 15 Celcius. Coffee and Breadfruit trees are susceptible at these temperatures.

Water

Different plants have different water needs. With our hot, wet summers, many plants that tolerate drought during the summer are vulnerable. These include many Mediterranean and South African species – hence the struggles to maintain lavenders, proteas and many WA treasures. Other plants need a consistent supply of moisture to grow well. Careful attention to water requirements can help you select plants that need a minimum of irrigation to perform well in your garden. With our high rain falls, good drainage is vital to most plant requirements.

pН

The ability of plant roots to take up certain nutrients depends on soil pH, which is a measure of the acidity or alkalinity of your soil. The pH scale runs from 0 to 14, with neutral at 7.0. Less than 7.0 is acidic (sour) and more is alkaline (sweet).

Most plants grow best in soils that have a pH near 7.0. Lime can be used to raise pH and materials containing sulfates such as aluminum sulfate and iron sulfate can be used to lower pH. The solubility of many trace elements is controlled by pH, and only the soluble forms of these important micronutrients can be used by plants. If a soil is too sour or too sweet, plants cannot take up nutrients like nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P) and potassium (K).

Tomato plants favor a neutral to slightly acidic soil. A pH range of between 6.0 and 6.5 is considered ideal

Iron is not very soluble at high pH and iron chlorosis is often present in high-pH soils, even if they contain abundant iron – often seen in citrus and gardenias.

Daylength

Daylength is sometimes a critical factor in regulating vegetative growth, flower initiation and development, and the induction of dormancy. Many plants such as chrysanthemums and poinsettia require specific daylength conditions to initiate flowering.





Inside My Studio

Interview by Toni Rogers



It didn't matter that the rain was tumbling down or the sun was not shining, the colour and energy generating from Mollie Bosworth's garden and surrounds compensated. as of 24 January 2011. Marissa joins us as a GP Registrar Mollie's office is an artwork in its own right, with designs, in her Subsequent year of Training. photographs, memorabilia and 'scribblings' wrapping around the office walls. 'Ordered chaos' I think it is called. Centre on a part time basis, including the fortnightly You can see immediately that this is a working area of a very creative mind.

Where is your current studio?

My studio is located downstairs, under my home at Top of the Range estate surrounded by my garden and the rainforest. When I get going my pottery activities take over most of the house. The office computer is the hub of communication and design, the spare bedroom doubles as a packing room and the veranda is used for photography sessions.

Do you work alone or with others?

I design, make and market all my work alone. On rare occasions, I have collaborated with other artists on special projects.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

It has to have electricity, a pottery wheel and kiln, access to running water and good light.

Describe your work pattern - hours/days/weeks.

My work pattern can be very erratic. It is often driven by deadlines for exhibitions or wholesale orders. It often goes in cycles of two or three weeks. After each firing, works are packed and sent off and I relax and clean up for a few days before starting the next group of work. My time is fairly flexible and I can usually take time off when

Describe the work you do in your studio.

I make porcelain pieces by either wheel throwing or hand built methods. These are worked in series with no two pieces being exactly the same. Wheel thrown bowls currently make up most of my work. These are decorated in many methods with laser prints being a current favourite. The designs for the prints are worked from images in Photoshop. Each piece is hand polished and goes through two kiln firings. My recent work uses very little glaze.

Why is clay your chosen medium?

It is the plasticity of clay which attracts me. There are so many ways of 'making' to explore. There is also an endless choice in clays, firing temperatures and glaze styles. I have mostly specialised in high fired stoneware and porcelain clays. I enjoy using Southern Ice porcelain, brought up from Victoria. It is so white and translucent.

List three things you listen to while working.

ABC National radio, Dig radio and an eclectic mix of music on CDs.

Your favourite tool?

Probably my Japanese Shimpo pottery wheel which my father bought for me over 20 years ago. I have just been bogging the rust spots and I'm sure it'll keep going for another 20 years. I certainly hope so. Other little tools I've made myself for specific jobs are hard to do without.

How do you identify your work? (signature/stamp/chop)

Usually I use a little clay stamp with a 'MB' symbol which I have been using for a long time. Special pieces sometimes get a full signature.

How do you sell your work?

Mainly retail sales, at the Kuranda Arts Co-operative Gallery and several selected outlets in Cairns and the Tablelands. Nationally, I have outlets in Perth, Melbourne, Sydney, Mittagong, Canberra and South Australia. I have received invitations to participate in ceramic group exhibitions both nationally and internationally and the sales and recognition I have received from these experiences have been pleasing. I am getting a good response from my website, mostly from galleries, retail outlets and professional opportunities. It is certainly a 'must-have' tool for a world-wide presence and promotion.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

I have conducted regular small pottery classes from my studio for several years, currently being held on Thursday mornings.

What do you do with your seconds?

What seconds? Seriously, any artist who experiments, pushes the boundaries and evaluates their work honestly, will have work they aren't happy with. In pottery, we have work we are happy with but the kiln can change our expectations sometimes for the worst. I am learning to smash up all inferior work or put some pieces in my garden. Sometimes seconds sit on the studio shelf as learning pieces for problem solving. They remind me of what can and does go wrong.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid jobs?

Rarely paid jobs, however, I am remunerated to teach or demonstrate my craft at workshops or conferences. I went to Perth to demonstrate in October last year. Apart from that, I volunteer at the Kuranda Arts Co-operative Gallery three or four times a month and assist in its administration as Chairperson.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

A building extension for packing, photography and display would be great to keep it all in the one area. I have just extended for the kiln room so I don't think a further extension will be happening very soon.

If you were not working with pottery what would you be doing?

Probably gardening. It lures me away from my studio work and sometimes it is hard to go back. I can get totally absorbed in my plants and the colour and design. However, it is the endless jobs in the garden that can consume me.

Mollie Bosworth's ceramic works can be found at the Kuranda Arts Co-operative Gallery in Coondoo Street. Mollie has won many awards, and commissions. Her work is highly sought after by discerning collectors. Mollie's creativity extends into her garden and for a number of years has featured publicly with the Australian Open Garden Scheme. This is currently on hold to enable Mollie to renovate and revamp the front section of her garden with pebbles and new plantings.

"Before the Fallout: from Marie Curie to Hiroshima"

(Berkley Books 2006)

Diana Preston ISBN 9780 42520 7895 \$15.95

We are all accustomed to the reality of radioactivity in our material lives. We hear it talked about, we are aware of its uses, both for good and for bad. We know that it has its dangers, and we may have different views on such things as the advisability of nuclear power generation and the value or otherwise of the nuclear deterrent. But its practical use in some form or other now seems to be an established feature of modern society – for example, in X-rays and in the treatment of some cancers.

But what do we know about the complex history behind the unlocking of the secrets of radioactivity, and in particular the human aspects of how this was done? Here is the classic example of something, the reality of radioactivity, that was hidden within nature and then brought to light. It was perhaps inevitable with modern advances in science and technology that this was going to happen. Radioactivity is a potentially benevolent force, existing harmoniously in nature. But being of the greatest magnitude, it is so powerful that it could, once discovered and misused, destroy humanity. The chain of events from the early discoveries of the Curies to the terrible events at Hiroshima and Nagasaki and beyond to the present day, hold lessons for all of us. This books details those events in an illuminating manner that holds our attention, causing us to also consider what is yet to come.

The book highlights the work of famous scientists such as the Curies, Rutherford from New Zealand, Einstein, Fermi, Teller, Oppenheimer and others. It also details the concerns felt among the Allies about progress towards a "dirty bomb" by the Nazis and the real dangers that this posed to the War effort and to civilization (foreshadowing the fears of nuclear proliferation today). The testing of the first atomic bombs is discussed, leading up to the first and so far only aggressive use of nuclear weapons at Hiroshima and Nagasaki. The effect of these events on the course of history is analysed. Also referred to are the attitudes of the scientists involved, ranging from simple objectivity through to one of concern for the consequences of their actions and discoveries.

The book is a cause for reflection. All things in nature are neutral and cannot be categorized in terms of their goodness or badness. There is no point in referring to the existence of radioactivity in nature as a negative or bad thing. Nature operates according to a regime of natural, interlocking laws of amazing dynamism, complexity and design, with all things having their legitimate place. However some organisms can, if taken or used in certain degrees by humans, have a detrimental effect – for example – natural poisons. Radioactivity is similar in its effect. It is human beings that have the capacity by choice to take and use aspects of nature in new ways. It is only in this element of choice that assessments of good or bad can be made. Humans are responsible for the choices they make and are accountable accordingly.

So far, in this and in other ways, humanity has made many bad choices. On any rational or moral basis, humans have sometimes used and applied the principles of radioactivity in ways that deserve to be strongly condemned. We must learn from history's mistakes. There is a strong argument that it is time to revert, on a united planetary basis, to the rational and morally defensible use of nature on an ongoing basis. Failure to do so may be catastrophic. It is a matter of choice and

The book ends: "In thinking about history but, above all, about the future, we should not depersonalize situations but remember our individual responsibility for them and the consequences for others."

We should read this book to understand how, by the use and misuse of radioactivity in nature, we have reached this point in human history, as well as its lessons for the future.

SENATOR THE HON JAN MCLUCAS SENATOR FOR QUEENSLAND

KEEP YOUR BACK-TO-SCHOOL RECEIPTS

As families across the Far North are preparing for the commencement of the school year later this month, Senator Jan McLucas is reminding parents to hold on to their receipts as they do their shopping.

"The start of the school year can put strain on the household budget however the Federal Government's Education Tax Refund will put some money back into the pockets of eligible parents," Senator McLucas

The Education Tax Refund helps with the cost of educating primary and secondary school children.

Families can claim 50 per cent of eligible education expenses, up to a maximum refund of \$794 for high school children and \$397 for primary school children on back-to-school items.

Senator McLucas said a range of items may be claimed under the **Education Tax Refund including:**

- school textbooks and other printed learning material, including prescribed textbooks, associated learning materials, study guides and stationery
- home computers and laptops
- computer-related equipment such as printers, USB flash drives, software for educational use and aids to assist in the use of computer equipment for students with special nee
- home internet connections
- prescribed trade tools for secondary school trade courses.

"Keep your receipts and claim everything you are entitled to. The Australian Government introduced the Education Tax Refund to help families with education expenses so I urge local parents to hang on to those receipts, which really can add up to a sizeable amount, and put some money back in their pockets."

The Education Tax Refund, along with the Child Care Rebate and Paid Parental Leave scheme, reinforces the Government's commitment to reducing cost of living pressures on working families.

Living in Kuranda

Living With(out) Mould

If the "La Nina" weather pattern continues, more rain is expected through the "Wet Season" until April or May, extending the #1 tropical housekeeping hazard - Mould.

Queensland's current flood disaster drastically highlights flood victims' next battle with the toxic black mould, which requires help from flood damage specialists. (See video online at http://tinyurl.com/2dftsrt)

While the rain continues, make life healthier with these easy precautions. However, black mould inside your home must be removed with proper safety precautions or professional advice.

Mould grows where there is excess moisture, little sunlight and no air circulation, cross ventilation or extraction.

BATHROOM

- During the wet season, always use your exhaust fan, portable fan or dehumidifier after removing towels and wiping dry all wet surfaces.
- Dry your body with a thinner towel, or cloth towel, so they dry quicker.
- Don't hang towels under the fan in your living room it will spread the dampness throughout your home.
- Hang them under cover in your carport or patio and have a portable room fan blowing over them for quicker drying.
- Now and then, spray cleaning vinegar, eucalyptus/metho spray throughout your bathroom to inhibit mould growth.

LAUNDRY

- No clean clothes? No clothes dryer or it's stopped working? Options:
- Ask a favour from a friend or neighbour.
- Use the local Laundromat.
- Just wash important clothes, don't soak them. Wet clothes or clothes sat in water
- Put clean laundered wet washing in plastic grocery bags (colour coded), and store in your freezer. Hang them out when the sun shines again.
- Don't put dry clothes from the washing line onto your bed, or you'll be sleeping with spiders and caterpillars!

IRONING

- Spray clothes with clove spray or vinegar while you iron.
- Completely dry your clothes before hanging them in the wardrobe.

CLOTHES STORAGE

• To stop your clothes absorbing moisture in cupboards, use wardrobe dehumidifiers or make your own absorbent pouches from rice, clay cat litter, shredded paper or stored excess toilet rolls. Damp-rid type products are a constant expense unless you recycle the liquid.

GENERAL

- There's no 100% method for stopping mould, it's the nature of the tropics. Only persistent cleaning will keep your home healthy and toxic free.
- If you care about our green frogs, geckos and other animals in and around your home, please use environmentally friendly cleaners.
- Bleach doesn't kill mould, only fades or 'bleaches' it. Good alternatives to harsh chemicals are:
- salt & water (if it's safe to use in your septic system), cleaning vinegar (Acetic Acid), and aromatherapy essential oils such as clove oil spray or this recipe: 1 tblspn eucalyptus or tea tree oil,1 tblspn methylated spirits, 2 cups water in a

Mould will get worse if you don't fix the problem; e.g. unsealed weather-prone walls, leaking taps, roofs, gutters, condensation on fridges or freezers, indoor Feng Shui waterfalls or over-watered pot plants etc.

Vitamin D – the Sun Vitamin

'But you live in Australia, in the tropics, how is this possible?' This question came from my Mum who lives in the north of Germany, close to Scandinavia, a part of the world where the 'Sun' is being worshipped whenever it is nice enough to raise its head through the clouds. Faces, arms, legs and whatever other body parts are quickly turned towards the sun, soaking up as many rays as possible in fear it disappears again.

I had just told Mum that I was diagnosed with severe Vitamin D deficiency. Who would have thought. I have always been passionate about health and nutrition, but never took much notice of this particular Vitamin (which acts more like a hormone) and comes to us mainly via the sun and only a view food sources. Fish and fish oils are good, the best being Cod Liver Oil – yucky! Also egg yolks, fortified cereals and milk, and surprise, surprise - Sunflower Seeds! Unfortunately, most of us don't quite chew enough of those.

Most of us do the responsible thing when we go into the hot sun - we slip, slap, slop in fear of some little red dark or raised dot appearing on our skin being diagnosed as skin cancer. We all have seen an old farmer somewhere with part of his nose or ear cut off and he'd be one of the lucky ones - so, apparently Australians have one of the highest rate of known Vitamin D deficiency in the world (I wonder how the Arabs would score?)

It is not to be taken lightly though. Some of the things Vitamin D is needed for is absorption of calcium – the lack of it can lead to osteoporosis, bone deformities, depression, chronic fatigue, heart disease, low immune system and the latest studies show that it affects cognitive impairment - so it is also badly needed by our brains!

It's tricky – it's a 'Catch 22'. Even harder for those of us with fair skin, as darker skin has more melanin and can absorb a lot more sun before it gets burned. So, what do we do? I guess, now that we are aware of it, we can eat more foods that contain Vitamin D, we can take supplements (1,000 to 2,000 IU daily) or we can sunbathe for 15-30 min. three times a week hoping that our freckles and horrid age-spots won't get worse. Of course, remember, this can only be done in the early morning sun (preferably before 8.00am) and after about four in the afternoon! Good Luck. In health and harmony,

Reiki, Connect and Annabel Muis

OUR FIRST PROFILE of the new year is of **Annabel Muis**, Reiki Master, author, personal development trainer and former social worker. Annabel has lived in Kuranda since moving here from Darwin in 1996, and since then has become well known around the locality from her workshops and training, her writing and other activities.

Annabel was born in the South Australian country where she lived until she moved as a child to Adelaide. She was encouraged to go to University there, completing a Diploma of Social Studies. She worked initially in Repatriation in different cities until her first marriage to an army officer. This required her to move around a lot, as well as one year without him while he was in Vietnam. She had two children, and during much of this time she had casual part time work as a social worker.

When the marriage ended she bought a house in Sydney for herself and her two children, and a couple of years later married a doctor who was at that time working with the Department of Defence in Sydney. They married and

together with her two children they moved in 1979 to Darwin, where her husband established a medical practice. Annabel continued working as a social worker, all-in-all a career that lasted for 20 years. She also undertook part-time lecturing at Darwin Community College and ran some personal growth workshops. Then she took a position with a Division in the NT Public Service Commissioner's office, which provided management and team development, change management and staff consulting for all NT government departments. She was the Director of this Division from 1986 to 1988 until its functions were outsourced. For the next ten years she conducted her own consultancy business, doing much the same kind of work.

In 1996 her second marriage ended very unexpectedly. By then her children had grown up and she felt the need to move away from the Northern Territory and start her life again somewhere new. Her association with Kuranda began when she bought a property here. For some years she travelled backwards and forwards to Darwin for her business, but then she took a staff development position with Calvary Hospital in Cairns for five years until she retired.

She now enjoys her life in Kuranda and loves meeting with people. Having begun her life in the country she has a great feeling for nature and is also interested in reading and classical music. But her two main areas of activity now are Reiki and Connect Magazine.

Reiki is a holistic, hands-on healing practice developed in Japan in the 19th century that is now popular in Australia. Annabel first became interested in it in Darwin. After attending an initial workshop she decided she would like to teach



it, so for two years she assisted a Reiki Master from Perth who came to Darwin from time to time. In 1991, Annabel was initiated as a Reiki Master and began teaching on her own. This she continued when she came to Kuranda, and she also offers Reiki treatments from her home here. She had previously investigated Christianity and various New Age teachings, but was not satisfied. Now she regularly attends a meditation group in Kuranda, and this together with her personal practice of Reiki has become a more fulfilling spiritual practice.

Annabel is on the Board of Reiki Australia, a Reiki membership organisation that was established to develop professional standards for the public practice of Reiki. Currently the organisation is developing training to assist its members to comply with compulsory standards introduced in 2008 by the NSW Government for all non-registered health practitioners, which includes public Reiki practice.

She has also been involved with Connect Magazine, a popular spiritual and new age magazine produced in Cairns,


since it began some six years ago. She is part of the editorial group for the Magazine, and is a frequent writer in it. Her writings concentrate on subjects that people can relate to and hopefully obtain some benefit from, such as personal growth, finding the inner self, self worth and letting go. She has also written and published a book with Lesley Moseley, herself a former Kuranda-ite, entitled "Turning Points – Regaining Joy After Loss"[1].

Annabel and her current partner Mark, who is also a Reiki Master, have added a special room to their Kuranda house dedicated to their Reiki practice. Together they have already undertaken some workshops in Cairns for Reiki practitioners who are interested in deepening or enriching their personal practice, and Annabel continues her training and treatments. Her long training and experience in social work and professional personal development, as well as that of Reiki, have all contributed to her considerable capacity in this regard.

BOOK REVIEW

Reef and Rainforest

Michael McCoy – published by CSIRO

CSIRO has recently published Kuranda resident Mike McCoy's latest book, a 256-page photographic work titled "Reef and Rainforest". It sounds a bit like an up-market restaurant dish and it is certainly a banquet for the eye and mind.

The geographic coverage of the book is tropical North Queensland, Solomon Islands and Papua New Guinea. The book comprises around 250 colour photographs with about

half being Australian based. The majority of these have been taken in and around the Tablelands, with many from the Kuranda region. The underwater photographs are mostly from the Solomon Islands with others from Papua New Guinea and the Great Barrier Reef. There are also a few photographs from the savannas bordering the western margins of the Tablelands. The book is intended for a general audience and each photograph has its own lengthy and detailed caption. These are 'soft' science; imparting fascinating aspects of the animal or plant's biology and ecology. The wonder of these startling photographs oozes out between the lines and drives you to want more details, more marvels.

The photographs were taken over a period of more than 30 years while McCoy was living in Solomon Islands and in tropical North Queensland. The species depicted in the photographs range from the abundant (mother and young agile wallabies at Speewah); to the iconic (the recently discovered Kuranda tree frog); to the super rare (the giant orange "tiger huntsman" spider on the Barron Falls boardwalk); to the bizarre (the coral cage constructed by a

tiny crab on the Great Barrier Reef) and even to the historic (the sunken coralencrusted wreck of the B-17 bomber in the sea off Guadalcanal).

The CSIRO's Ecos Magazine summarises:

"The beautiful photographs of intrepid photojournalist Michael McCoy are the core of the visually stunning Reef and Rainforest. McCoy's photos show marine and terrestrial life in the tropics of north-eastern Australia and the South Pacific nations of Solomon Islands and Papua New Guinea,

McCoy is not only a skilled photographer, but also a talented communicator. His lucid and accessible writing conveys a good deal of science, and brings his images to life with stories of the circumstances of their capture". I must concur with Ecos' opinion. This is really an autobiography of a man who speaks with vision. McCoy has authored a book that engenders our wonder and fires our thirst for more knowledge. I actually felt privileged to share in his work when reading this book.

"Reef and Rainforest" is McCoy's fifth book. He has extensive photographic experience, having worked on contract assignments for National Geographic Magazine (Philippines, Solomon Islands) and photographed and written for Australian Geographic (magazine articles and a book on the Great Barrier Reef), undertaken consultancies for various television documentaries (including the BBC National History Unit and National Geographic Television) and lectured in Photojournalism at the South Pacific Media Centre in Suva, Fiji. In McCoy's 2006 book, "Solomon Islands – A South Seas Journey", Prof. Tim Flannery wrote in the Foreword: "McCoy ranks among the world's great natural history photographers."

A Thought for February

THIS month we read a passage from St Matthews Gospel Chapter 3 versus 13 -17 Why was Jesus baptised! This question has always teased Christian minds for centuries. The Gospel of Mark tells the story quite simply and directly, but Matthew is obviously troubled by it and pictures John as reluctant and Jesus insistent. Luke Gospel gets rid of the whole matter in one dependent clause. The gospel according to John skirts around it.

Why, then was Jesus baptised, why was Jesus baptised by John the Baptist if he was already the Christ, the Son of God? From one point of view, that question makes sense. Matthew tells us that John the Baptist baptised for repentance and Jesus had no need of repentance. But there is another point of view and if we grasp it we may have another understanding of Jesus' baptism and of our own as well.

The reading from Matthew tells us that the baptism of Jesus changed baptism. It is true that John baptised penitents. His baptism was from sin. But when Jesus was baptised he turned baptism into the sign of the new creation. Remember for a moment the story of creation at the beginning of the book of Genesis. We enter that story through the powerful image of the ancient waters being blown by the wind or Spirit of God. It is only when that image has been fixed in our minds that the creation story starts. The same image returns at the baptism of Jesus: water and the breath, the wind, the Spirit of God, come together so that the new creation may begin. And the prophet Isaiah tells us what that new creation is to be like (and remember Jesus applies these words to himself in the synagogue at Nazareth in Luke's Gospel). Isaiah says (and Jesus repeats him), "The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me because the Lord has anointed me to bring good tidings to the afflicted ... to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound." Driven by the creative wind of God, the prophet proclaims the overthrow of oppression, comfort to mourners, bouquets of flowers instead of ashes, ointment instead of tears, the robes of praise instead of the nakedness of timidity. And in his baptism Jesus makes baptism itself the point of entry into just such a new age.

Some of us were taught to think about baptism chiefly in terms of repentance and forgiveness of our own sins. The baptism of Jesus does not deny our need for repentance and forgiveness, but it changes the emphasis

Baptism is about the new creation, baptism is about being blown by the creative and transforming wind of God, baptism is not so much from sin as for new being, not so much about ourselves as about those to whom we are called (as the speaker in Isaiah and Jesus were called) to offer healing, freedom, comfort, and strength. The baptism of Jesus was for the re-making of the world. And so is our baptism. It's a challenge isn't it?

Thought of the month from the Baha'i Faith

"Still another cause of disagreement and dissension has been the formation of religious sects and denominations. Bahá'u'lláh said that God has sent religion for the purpose of establishing fellowship among humankind and not to create strife and discord, for all religion is founded upon the love of humanity. Abraham promulgated this principle, Moses summoned all to its recognition, Christ established it, and Muhammad directed mankind to its standard. This is the reality of religion. If we abandon hearsay and investigate the reality and inner significance of the heavenly teachings, we will find the same divine foundation of love for humanity. The purport is that religion is intended to be the cause of unity, love and fellowship and not discord, enmity and estrangement.



Her natural beauty took his breath away. "I may look like just an ordinary man," he said to her, "but in just a few years, my father will die, and I'll inherit \$200 million."





A beautiful strange creature

LAST WEEK as we went for one of our usual walks through the garden at the Cedar Park Resort, we spotted this 25cm long cocoon decorated with tiny sticks hanging in a bush. "What kind of butterfly or moth might appear one day?" we wondered.

Nevertheless, we continued our walk. However, when I came back with my camera a few hours later to take a picture of this strange creature, it was gone. At first I thought someone had enjoyed a nice snack. But when I looked closer, I saw that a caterpillar was about one-third of its length out of the cocoon and it was already starting to crawl along the branches.

I had no idea what kind of caterpillar this was, but after a few Google searches on the internet I was much wiser.

And now that I know these cocoons are made by case moths, I see them all the time, in all sizes and decorated with all kind of leaves and sticks. Happy New Year to all residents. I hope that 2011 turns out to be a good year for you.

Flood Appeal

With the devastation of the Queensland floods, we have all been impacted. The damage and loss has been almost beyond belief. I urge you to contribute to the Flood Appeal if you are able to. This is the best way that we are able to assist. Council has offered assistance to some of the affected areas and is waiting for specific requests from other Councils.

New 10 year Kuranda Infrastructure Plan

Council recently approved the new Strategic Plan for Kuranda Infrastructure. The Plan will now progress to the Minister for Local Government for final approval. Major projects over the next 10 years include upgrade to the Visitors Centre, construction of a Riverwalk with access to Kuranda Village, improvements to the Amphitheatre facility as well as other projects. (details elsewhere in this edition). This is great news for Kuranda as these projects will add benefit to both visitors and locals.

New Aged Housing

You may have noticed some activity on the start of the construction of the Aged Housing units in Barang St. The construction will progress very soon. Later this year, additional aged housing units will also be constructed in Harriman St and in Thoree St near the Library.

Parking Review

Over a long period of time, many residents and businesses have been concerned about the availability of parking in the Kuranda Village area. Council will be undertaking a Parking Study/ Review to determine the best way to improve parking options. It is expected that

funding will come from Parking Reserve Funds held by Council.

Kuranda Community Centre

Works to ensure safety and fire compliance of Block C will begin soon. The building should soon be available for community use. As well, progress on the independent community consultation to decide on future options for the site has been made. Tenders for independent consultants have closed and the successful consultant will begin work soon. This will allow everyone to have a say and a wide range of consultation techniques will be used. (Some face to face, some meetings, some web based etc). Because there are so many viewpoints, the end result will be an informed future plan for the site.

New Planning Scheme

The draft Planning Scheme is progressing well and Council have recently considered Draft zoning for each town on the Tablelands. The Kuranda Local Area Reference Group (Steve Dominikovic, Mark Freeman, Syd Walker, Gerald Hobbler, John Beasley, Marg Yandell) will meet to consider the Draft for Kuranda and to provide feedback.

Speewah News

The lights for the tennis courts at RosCommon have been delayed; however these are expected within 4-6 weeks. Council is continuing to work with the federal government to resolve the issues relating to television reception and the digital changeover. Telstra Countrywide have agreed to attend the next Residents' Association meeting to discuss mobile phone reception issues for the Speewah area.

Koah News

The new tanks are installed and the plumbing upgraded at the Koah Hall. Finally the hall now has a drinkable good quality water supply. Recycling: Council is working on the development of the new TRC Waste Management Strategy. Options are being explored and no decision has yet been made as to recycling and budget options.

Community Planning

Consultation for the new 10 Year Community Plan (a requirement of all Councils to guide Council plans and budgets) is coming soon. You really need to have a say on this as it includes all issues that affect you. Draft dates are as follows: (more details later) Koah: March 1st, Speewah: March 23rd, Kuranda Indigenous community: June 16th, Kuranda area: June 28th

Mona Mona Handback

12 December 2010 will be a day to remember for everyone who has fought so hard for so long to achieve a just and appropriate land tenure outcome for Mona Mona. At a ceremony attended by hundreds of locals, I had much pleasure and pride to officially witness the signing of a 30-year lease of land to the people of Mona Mona. The ceremony is a milestone for not only the people of Mona Mona but for Indigenous land management rights in Queensland. I am exceptionally pleased to have been able to support the people of Mona Mona to bring about this important land tenure agreement with the Bligh Government. We have listened to the people's aspirations about the future of the land and delivered on an election commitment I announced in 2009 to re-examine the future land tenure of the reserve. After negotiations with the people who have traditional and historical connections to Mona Mona, a 30-year Trustee Lease has been issued for the entire 1,600 hectare reserve. It is also a significant step forward for reconciliation as we turn a new page on the history of the Mona Mona - a place that has seen much hardship and injustice but also a place where people lived and worked and found happiness in family, culture and country.

The new land tenure arrangements are designed to conserve the social, cultural and environmental values

and assets of the land. Most importantly, it protects Aboriginal people's connection to the land which will ensure that elders and youth will continue to maintain a sense of belonging with Mona Mona now and for generations to come. I would like to acknowledge the long years of struggle and determination of the people of Mona Mona. We will continue to work closely with the custodians to support them into the future.

I attended the Family Fun Day on Wednesday, January 19, 2011. It was great to see so many children with their families enjoying the day. Thank you to all the Ngoombi staff and numerous volunteers who supervised the activities and staffed the information booths. Congratulations, the day was a huge success.

Infrastructure Program Aimed at Boosting Kuranda's Tourism Potential

A 10-year infrastructure program

aimed at boosting Kuranda's tourism potential has been approved by Tablelands Regional Council.

The \$6 million program of works will now await final approval from Minister for Local Government and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships, Desley

Projects contained in the Kuranda Infrastructure Plan are funded by the State from revenue collected through fees and levies associated with the transportation of passengers through the World Heritage area on Skyrail and the Kuranda train. The funds are provided to Council by way of the Kuranda Infrastructure Agreement 2010-2020, which was renewed last year with the State Government.

Chair of the Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee and Tablelands Mayor Tom Gilmore said he was delighted with the projects outlined in the 10-year

"This has been a very professionally managed project that has involved extensive community consultation which identified a raft of potential projects that will help to enhance the visitor experience in Kuranda," Cr Gilmore said.

During the consultation phase, visitors, commercial operators and residents identified four key strategic directions for the town - Improved visual and physical access to the natural attractions including the rainforest and Barron Gorge; Developing more authentic activities, services and retail options; Introducing elements that will improve pedestrian comfort and; Encouraging a greater diversity of uses and extending operating hours to create a livelier town centre.

"From the more than 50 projects that were identified during the consultation process, a final list was chosen that we believe will provide Kuranda with muchneeded improvements and boost the overall tourist attraction of the village," Cr Gilmore said.

The projects outlined in the report include two that have already been approved the Kuranda River Walk (approx cost: \$150,000) and the new Transport Interchange area (approx cost: \$70,000) - as well as three new projects considered to be top priorities, and several long-term projects.

Council to Seek Changes to Election Process

Tablelands Regional Council will write to Minister for Local Government Desley Boyle seeking changes to the Local Government election process.

Council will request that the Tablelands region be granted full postal voting for the March 2012 election due to the difficulty faced by many voters trying to get to polling booths.

At the 2008 election, 28 Councils throughout the State opted for full postal voting.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said full postal voting made good common sense, given that elections were always held in March which is traditionally one of the wettest months of the year.

"Many people don't opt for postal voting, only to find themselves unable to get to a polling booth on election day due to localised flooding," he said.

"By making the entire region a full postal voting area, it will remove the need to go to a polling booth and we won't have the same sort of frustration many people faced last time when they could not get access to a booth."

If full postal voting is not approved, Council has asked the Minister to make changes that will allow people to vote at booths outside their own division which was another major issue at the 2008 election.

Council Rejects Pay Rise

Tablelands Regional Councillors have rejected a proposed 2.5 per cent pay rise.

The increase was determined by the Local Government Remuneration and Discipline Tribunal but Councillors rejected the proposed rise, expressing their concern about the tough economic times the community is experiencing.

"Given the economic situation confronting our community, I could not support any increase," Tablelands Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

The decision by Council not to accept the pay rise will result in an overall drop in wages due to the loading for amalgamation being reduced.

The salaries for the calendar year of 2011 will be: Mayor - \$134,695 (2010 comparison \$137,460) Deputy Mayor - \$91,020 (2010 comparison \$92,640)

Councillor - \$80,870 (2010 comparison \$82,570)




